

Employment Hits Record High In U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's total employment edged up in October to an alltime high of 70.6 million, on a seasonally adjusted basis, and unemployment declined slightly following the big jump of a month before, the government said today.

But the average work week, overtime work and average pay all declined, signaling a possible economic turndown later, said Asst Commissioner Harold Goldstein of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The total number of unemployed last month dropped about 119,000 and the national jobless rate dropped from 4 per cent to 3.9 per cent of the civilian labor force. The bureau adjusts the figures in line with usual seasonal employment

The jobless total in October included 906,000 men for a 2.4 per cent unemployment rate, 1.1 million women for a 4 per cent rate and 836,000 teenagers for a 13 per cent rate.

Plotting New Drives To Cut Arms Spending

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate defense costs critics are plotting new drives to cut arms spending, including curbing the Safeguard antimissile system, despite their largely unsuccessful efforts with the \$20.7 billion military procurement authoriza-

Leaders of the bipartisan coalition opposing the administration's missile defense proposal began laying their latest plans even before Thursday's 58-9 Senate vote sent the compromise procurement bill to the White House.

Their new target is the \$70 billion-plus defense appropriations measure scheduled for consideration next month.

But the efforts to amend the money bill by limiting Safeguard funds to research could be hampered by pressures to end the year-long congressional session and adjourn for the Christmas holidays.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., announced the plans to make new assaults not only on the Safeguard but on other items in the appropriations

measure. President Nixon is expected to sign within the next few days the authorization measure that drew some criticism during a three-hour final debate Thursday. The House approved it in just a few minutes by voice vote

Wednesday. for consideration of appropriations legislation, Pentagon backers in the House appear to have set up a schedule that will make it difficult for Proxmire and the anti-Safeguard forces to mount a major fight.

It's a complete mystery to a college professor, a retired farmer, a service station attendant and a teenage girl who got the bills. "It's really weird," John Tackett, editor of

the Stephenville Daily Empire, said Thursday. "We call him the Phantom Philanthropist. He said residents of the Stephenville area, southwest of Fort Worth, still are "buzzing with excitement over the possibility he may return and unload

a \$100 bill on them." The mystery gifts were bestowed on four persons Sunday but the story only came to light after the recipients visited banks to check the legitimacy

Larry Newlin, who pumps gas at a station in nearby De Leon, apparently was the first to catch the mystery man in his bountiful mood. Newlin said the man gave him a \$100 bill

to pay for \$6 worth of gas and told him: "You lucky boy, go ahead and keep the change." Noting Newlin's dumbfounded look, the man

added, "Go over there and see the Indian and he'll tell you what this is all about." Newlin said he approached the man indicated, who was standing near the service station, and

asked him for an explanation. 'No savvy," was all the man would say. "It looks like you're \$100 richer," a banker told Dr. Robert Fain, a science professor at Tarleton State College.

Reds Strike First Time In 18 Months

SAIGON (AP) - An estimated 100 Viet Cong guerrillas assaulted government outposts defending Saigon early today for the first time in 18 months, while other enemy forces made 68 rocket and mortar attacks across the country.

The shelling was the heaviest in more than two months. The South Vietnamese military commander for Saigon and rounding provinces said the sharply stepped up attacks marked the beginning of the enemy's winter campaign. His American counterpart said, "I don't think he's going to get very far with it.'

Most of the attacks were in the Mekong Delta south of Saigon or in the central highlands. Casualties included two Americans killed, six wounded, three Vietnamese civilians killed and 20 civilians and 18 soldiers

Viet Cong guerrillas attacked two outposts manned by South Vietnamese combat police on the southern fringe of Saigon with AK47 rifles and hand-fired rockets shortly after midnight. The posts are about a mile

There apparently was no attempt to infiltrate into the city, as earlier reports had indicated; instead the mission was to destroy the outposts, and it did not succeed, although the posts were lightly defended.

One South Vietnamese combat policeman was killed and seven were wounded. The bodies of three barefoot guerrillas dressed in black pajamas were found alongside one of the posts. Five assault rifles and one rocket launcher were found nearby.

It appeared the Viet Cong were local force guerrillas who live in the swamps on the southern edges of the city. The attack was typical of the Viet Cong guerrilla warfare during the early 1960s

Government forces made no apparent attempt to pursue the guerrillas, but outposts were reinforced

Meanwhile, about 150 North Vietnamese soldiers attacked a South Vietnamese militia outpost 30 miles northwest of Saigon and six miles from the Cambodian border early today. Headquarters said 84 enemy soldiers were killed, 50 of them by American helicopter gunships and artillery, while South Vietnamese casualties were one killed and nine wounded.

Official sources reported that American reconnaissance has detected North Vietnamese forces repairing roads along the Ho Chi Minh Trail in Laos and one source suggested that the enemy is getting ready to resume infiltration of troops into South Vietnam now that the monsoon rains have ended in

"There have been some trucks on the trail system in Laos but it looks like they're just working on the road. There is no indication of any significant pickup in movement yet. The roads are not completely ready to use," the source said

AIDS VETERANS Poppy Day Is Saturday

Poppies will be distributed Saturday to honor veterans of American wars and proceeds will aid disabled veterans. The tiny, scarlet paper flowers are made by men in Veterans Hospitals. Flowers distributed Saturday have been made at Kerrville and Temple VA hospitals.

The American Legion Auxiliary will supervise the distribution of the bushels of poppies by local youth groups, and members of the American Legion Post 355 will assist. Participating groups named by poppy chairman, Mrs. Halvard Hansen, are the Key Club, Future Homemakers of America, and student council at Big Spring High School; Rainbow Girls; American Legion Junior Auxiliary; and the youth group at the Church of God in Christ.

Poppies will be distributed all day Saturday at shopping centers and downtown for contributions. The contributions go to a number of projects aiding needy veterans. A large percentage of the donations are used daily at the local VA Hospital. Each Monday the American Legion comfort wagon visits patients, carrying toilet items, stamps, stationery, candy, gum, and other small sundries. Patients may choose whatever they need

Monthly bingo parties with prizes are held for patients and refreshments are served. Also, the American Legion provides refreshments for the Chaplain's Coffee Hour, held about twice a month. Other services to the veterans include the Gift Shop at the hospital, The gifts, suitable for every member of the family, may be chosen at no cost to the patient and sent gift-wrapped to his family for Christmas. Presents for birthdays may also be sent. The gifts are donated by various local organizations. Gifts are wrapped and mailed by volunteers headed by Mrs. Zelda Rea, American Legion Auxiliary. When a patient is bedridden, a cart filled with a selection of gifts is brought to him by the Legion volunteer.

Part of the donations from the poppies is used to give a \$200 scholarship to Howard County Junior College. The scholarship is for a veteran's child who is a graduate of a Howard County high school. In the past, several scholarships have also been given to students wishing to take vocational nurses

During the holidays the poppy donations are used to send baskets of food to needy veterans' families. Just before Christmas, Post 355 and the Auxiliary visit every patient and give them a card with a new, crisp dollar bill.

In addition, clothing is given to veterans in nursing homes who have no family to provide for them. Hospital equipment, such as crutches, wheelchairs and beds, are provided to needy community residents, veterans and non-veterans, for care of the sick.

The wearing of the poppy symbolizes the concern the community holds for its men who have given their lives or health for the service of their

Astronomers Think There's Life On Venus

AUSTIN (AP) - The University of Texas said Thursday that a majority of scientists at a recent astronomers' meeting agreed some form of airborne life may exist in the heavy atmosphere of Venus.

A discussion was held last month at the 40th International Astronomical Union Symposium at Marfa about the possibility of Venus and Mars, the unisaid in a news release.

Attending the symposium were some 100 scientists, including four Russians.

One of the ten professors in charge of the meeting was Dr. Harlan Smith, UT-Austin astronomy professor and director of the McDonald Observatory near

"Although speculation was raised that the polar caps of Venus might be cool enough to allow the existence of life, the only agreement that could be reached at the symposium was that airborne life could exist in the middle levels of this atmosphere, which is so much like an ocean," the UT statement said.

The depth of the atmosphere below Venus' cloud-cover is estimated at 40 miles, with a pressure about 100 times that of the Earth's atmosphere, or 1,500 pounds per square inch, the statement said.

"The Russian scientists confirmed information from their first Venus probe and groundbased astronomy on Venusian conditions with the information received from their last two probes, Venera 5 and 6. Venus' atmosphere is approximately 90 per cent carbon dioxide. The surface temperature is approximately 500 degrees centigrade over the entire planet," it said.

"Based on spectroscopic examination, the Venusian clouds seem to be composed of hydrated ferrous chloride, a form of dust composed of iron and chlorine combined with a moderate amount of water.'

"A very detailed account of Mariners 6 and 7 was given,' Smith said. "These two fly-bys produced more new information on Mars than the Russian probes did on Venus."

They attributed that mainly to improved equipment on the second and third American probes to Mars, while the Russians' second and third Venus probes were no improvement over the first Venera craft.

Smith said detailed surface studies by television showed the existence of low-level clouds or ground fog in some regions on Mars at various times of the

Family Law Needs Overhaul

The 61st Legislature made several misjudgments, under contemporary concepts of social justice and acceptable social behavior, in drafting a new Family Law Code. While some improvements were made, serious deficiencies and anachronisms remain in Texas' family relations law. The job should be done over again by the next Legislature.

And next time the legislators should enlist expert advice, in sociology as well as in this specialized legal field. If they had done that this year, no doubt they would have avoided a blooper just pointed out by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

The legislators' most obvious error. in devising a modern Family Law Code, was failure to abolish commonlaw marriages. Such marriages, without public license or religious service, are recognized as legal where a couple openly cohabitates and demonstrates marital responsibilities over a reasonable period. This is a relic of the frontier, where pioneer circumstances often delayed official mar-riage ceremonies, and should no

longer be countenanced.

The Legislature compounded that error, however, by failing to consult

the attorney-general's office on the consequences of changing marriage-license law without abolishing common-law marriages. And he now has to say, I could have told you so.

The new code, taking effect Jan 1, prohibits males under 19 or females under 16 from obtaining marriage licenses without parental consent and prohibits marriage of boys under 16 and girls under 14 even with such consent. But the old law, unrepealed, allows males 16 or over or females 14 or over to enter into common law marriages. So a boy 16 to 19 and a girl 14 to 16 can, without parental consent, enter into a common-law marriage that must be recognized as legal in Texas. And the times being what they are, a number may do just that before the Legislature can correct its error at the next regular session in 1971.

In legislation so broad, sensitive and complex, the Legislature should fully avail itself of the research services of the Texas Legislative Council. the bill-reviewing service of the attorney-general's office, and expert testimony in public hearings. Equally important, it should heed good advice when it gets it, as it did not in respect to abolishing common-law marriages.

Protests Pay Off

Some 90,000 seal pups were clubbed to death on the St. Lawrence ice floes by Quebec and Newfoundland fishermen last March. There was nothing unusual about that; this barbarous way of satisfying women's demands for the highly prized white coats of seals only three or four weeks old had been going on for many years.

There was a difference last year: Color pictures of the bloody business were widely published. Millions of people who had been unaware of the annual baby seal carnage were given a graphic look at the glorious hunt. An outery of revulsion arose in the United States, Canada and Europe.
The happy consequence is that the

Canadian government has banned the hunting of baby seals in the Gulf of St. Lawrence next March. Only the taking of "beaters," older seals that have learned to swim and are ready for the migration to Arctic waters, will be permitted - and then only with rifles, not clubs.

Canada also is negotiating with Norway for an agreement to end hunting of baby seals all along the northwest Atlantic coast. Thus there is a good chance that this abomination will be stopped at least in that major seal area. It all shows that protests by the public do sometimes

We who rejected the last one, are responsible that the new one was better," said Dr. Daniel Willard, University of Texas botany professor who was a leader in opposition to the Aug. 5 water bond proposal. Willard then claimed the plan would "destroy the face of Texas" by causing long range

weather changes. "Four general areas need revising: The nature of the planning committee, ecological concepts, administrative arrangements and the method of financing," Willard said in a recent article volunteered to The Associated

WILLARD'S PROPOSALS, briefly, would put more ecologists, conservationists and landscape architects on the planning committee; tighten water pollution laws on municipal and agricultural wastes; "perhaps charge farmers for the costs needed to clean the salts and pesticides from their waste water"; pass laws governing usage of ground water; spell out the rights and requirements of bays and estuaries; declare commercial fishing and tourism as industries; and desalt useful quantities of fresh water.

"Ecologically speaking the great fault with the 1968 Texas water plan may be not that it was too large. but that it wasn't large enough, Willard said. ". . . If the citizens of the state really want \$3.5 billion worth of water facilities perhaps they would endure a pay-as-you-go system. The superb highways of Texas were built under such a system."

CLAYTON SAID his committee certainly will investigate alternative means of financing, since voters showed such reluctance to one big bond issue.

"Perhaps a dedicated water user tax or a one mil dedication of the sales tax." he said, "or submitting several bond issues to voters, in increments, instead of hitting them once for a huge bonding authority."

Turning The War To S. Vietnam

WASHINGTON - President Nixon has found a way to solve the Vietnam problem so far as it involvés the United States. He asks the South Vietnamese government to assume full responsibility for fighting the war. This means that the build-up of a large army will have been virtually completed in the next few months and that American forces will be able to withdraw in large part some time

BUT MR. NIXON, while indicating the process of America's pullout of its combat forces, is not abandoning South Vietnam. Mr. Nixon cannot specify what he will do in every contingency. It is clear that if major attacks occur or there are threats of a mobilization of larger forces against South Vietnam, the United States will be in a position to reconsider and determine just what steps can be taken at once to help the South Vietnamese.

MR. NIXON has in mind the Vietnaminzation of the war. He has been seeking this all along, but he has not been able to demonstrate the meaning of that term as he can today. The Saigon government is well aware of Mr. Nixon's plans to withdraw

Vietnamese will be fighting their own war, and the United States will be helping them — not with manpower but with money and supplies. This should satisfy those elements of American public opinion which have been ignoring the importance of the

Naturally, he would ask Congress to authorize any use of military force.

THIS IS, therefore, really not a new turn of policy but a carrying out of the promise made by President Nixon to place the main burden of the war on the shoulders of the South Vietnamese. They have been fully aware that this move is coming, and they have asked for various kinds of military advisers to help them in training and arming sufficient forces for major combat operations as well as for countering guerrilla warfare.

THE NEW American program has been carefully studied for many weeks, and is not the result of any impulsive decision. The President recognizes that American public opinion has always favored the return of American troops as soon as South Vietnam was prepared to assume full responsibility. What has happened is that the Vietnamization of the war has come to the point of fulfillment. While many things can develop in the next few months, the outlook is for a steady build-up of South Vietnamese military strength as American troops gradually move back home.

of North's spot cards in spades for his own ten at this point, for with a three-one division in trumps he would be able to cash his high club honors and then enter dummy with the fourth round of trumps in order to run the balance of the clubs. Since North had no side entry however, it appeared that declarer would have to overtake the second club in the hope that the suit would split evenly.

Declarer cashed the club king, overtook the queen and took the balance with the dummy's by now established suit.

Whale Heads Toward Delta

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)-A 30oot-long grey whale swam into San Francisco Bay, bumped into a barge and was last seen Wednesday heading toward the Sacramento-San Joaquin River

"He must have been very lost to be going up a river," said Dr. Robert T. Orr. associate director of the Academy of Sciences. "Usually whales stay close to the shoreline and in sight of other whales.'

Orr said this is the season when grey whales migrate down the Pacific coast from the Arctic to Baja California. The whale jostled the barge at Port Chicago and then headed eastvard toward the delta.
