Chamber Announces New Award Format

THE FIRST PART of this week produced several days of beautiful "Indian Summer" type weather, and the farmers really took advantage of the situation, working until after dark in some cases to get their grain harvested.

Hopefully, we will have a number of other days just like these for our fall season. The farmers desperately need a number of them, end to end, in order to complete their grain harvest, and then later, the cotton, which is still in the maturing stage.

Overall, it seems that we have had somewhat better weather this year for farming purposes. And the early indications are that crop yields will be up from last years. The price, at least for corn, is better than it was a year ago, so hopefully the farmers will come out better than they did in 1977.

It's going to have to be a continuing process, however, if the farmers keep their problems before the public and before Congress, and the leaders of the American Agriculture Movement are already making plans for a return trip to Washington.

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THE U.S. SENATE continues to carve a reputation for itself as the most liberal group ever assembled in that governmental hall.

Despite the public outcry to do the opposite, and in spite of warnings that the very foundation of the country, the constitution, might be threatened if it did, the Senate passed the time extension for the adoption of the ERA amendment.

Never before in the history of government has such a move been made by our representatives. And the precedent it sets has some very dangerous implications.

How can we continue to preach majority rule, or even playing by the rules, if a lawmaking group changes the rules in "mid-game"?

To pass such an extension, and at the same time deny the other side of the coin: to allow states who had approved the amendment to rescind their action—is beyond belief.

We have been hearing for a number of years that our government is falling out of the hands of the people, and into the hands of the "people planners."

Such action by the Senate as this ERA passage, coupled with their earlier give-away of the Panama Canal would tend to make us think that we have, indeed, lost control of our government, and that "Big Brother" now has control of our very lives.

And where was our conservative voice in the Senate, Mr. Tower, when the latest vote was taken? Apparently he was out campaigning, since he was not in his seat in the Senate. Usually, we in Texas can at least count on a cancelling of the liberal vs conservative vote, with Tower cancelling out Bentsen. We didn't even get this concession on the ERA question.

Speaking in Friona earlier this year, Mr. Tower said "I'm sure the women of Texas by and large are against the things the ERA stands for. If they were, they didn't get their vote recorded."

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IF YOU HAD A headache this past Friday, you should have put a buckeye in your pocket...or a dried potato.

Or, you could ward off troubles by putting rattlesnake rattles in your hat band...or put cabbage leaves on your forehead.

These are old prescriptions for protecting yourself on Friday 13, unluckiest of days.

In most western mythology, Friday is not a good day for anything. And 13 is an unlucky number, making Friday 13th double bad luck. The fear of the number 13 is called "triskaidekaphobia."

The Norse goddess Frigga, for whom Friday was named, had a favorite named Balder who was killed at a banquet attended by 12 gods when a 13th god, Loki, showed up uninvited. Loki was the type who was never invited anywhere.

Thirteen also was the number of diners at the Last Supper. At one time, going even further back, 13 was a vague number that represented everything over 12.

Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture this week announced some policy changes following a meeting of the board of directors.

The Chamber is requesting that nominations to the board of directors come from the general membership of the organization. Previously, each outgoing director would submit two prospective names to be put in nomination as new directors. Business firms and individual members of the Chamber are asked to submit their nominations at the Chamber office no later than October 20.

The new directors will be elected by the general membership of the Chamber and installed at the annual Chamber Banquet in January of 1979.

Outgoing directors are Bill Wilshire, Tom Jarboe, John Cook, Ronald Smiley and JeDon Gallman.

The Chamber is also requesting nominations from the general membership for the annual Man of the Year, Woman of the Year, Employee of the Year, and Boy and Girl Students of the Year Awards. Previously the recipients of these awards have been picked by committees. The board felt that the general membership of the Chamber might like to participate in these choices.

Chamber members are asked to submit names for these honors and a supporting statement for each nomination. These need to be in the Chamber office by November 1.

The Board of Directors also passed a resolution to the effect that in the future the Friona Man and Woman of the Year personalities will be asked to serve as the Parade Marshalls for the Maize Days Parade.

It was felt that this would be a special way of recognizing and bestowing honor upon the Man and Woman of the Year as they ride at the head of the city's annual parade.

At their recent meeting the Chamber Directors also discussed the possibility of obtaining a permanent float for the Queen of Maize Days, for the purposes of entering in other adjoining celebrations, parades, such as Bull Town Days, Border Town Days, Amarillo's Tri-State Fair, etc. The Chamber welcomes any suggestions as to the type of float and the design for such a float to represent the town and the Maize Queen in these festivities.

The Chamber also announces that it will sponsor a Christmas home lighting decoration contest this year. Details such as categories in which prizes will be offered and the deadline for entering will be announced at a later date.

The Chamber will soon be passing out ribbons to local merchants and store clerks. The pin-on ribbons express thanks to shoppers for shopping in Friona.

During the Maize Days Celebration 50 barbecue lunches were donated by the Chamber to the residents of Prairie Acres Nursing Home.

At the meeting, Chamber President Gale Warren, joined the other members of the Board of Directors in congratulating Jerry Poarch for his superior performance as Chairman of the 1978 Maize Days Celebration.

The next meeting of the Board of Directors will be on Tuesday, November 14, at 6:30 a.m. at the Parmer House Restaurant. All members are encouraged to attend the meetings and participate in the Chamber's efforts to promote growth and business activity for Friona.

No Action Taken On Electric Rate

The Friona City Council voted to take no action on the proposed rate increase request by Southwestern Public Service Company at the council's regular meeting Monday night.

A statement was read from City Attorney Gale Warren in relation to the proposed increase, stating that the Public Utilities Commission had made preliminary finding in the case, and the fact that several cities had passed ordinances similar to Friona's, the decision was made on "no action," pending further legal findings at the higher level.

Considerable discussion was had pertaining the naming of two new members to the Board of Governors of Prairie Acres, as there had been some debate as to the method to be used in choosing nominees.

After much discussion, it was decided that in the future, the city council will appoint a nominating committee in July of each year, to make nominations to the City Council.

For the current year, the council approved the names of Betty Reeve and Dr. Lee Spring as nominees, and also passed a motion confirming Jack Hamill's appointment to the board to replace Percy Parsons, who had resigned.

The minutes of the City Planning & Zoning Commission's meeting on September 26 were read, recom-

mending that the north 102 feet of Lot 5 of Carson Addition to the City of Friona be made a "B" zone, with the remainder of Lots 4 and 5 be designated as "A" zone.

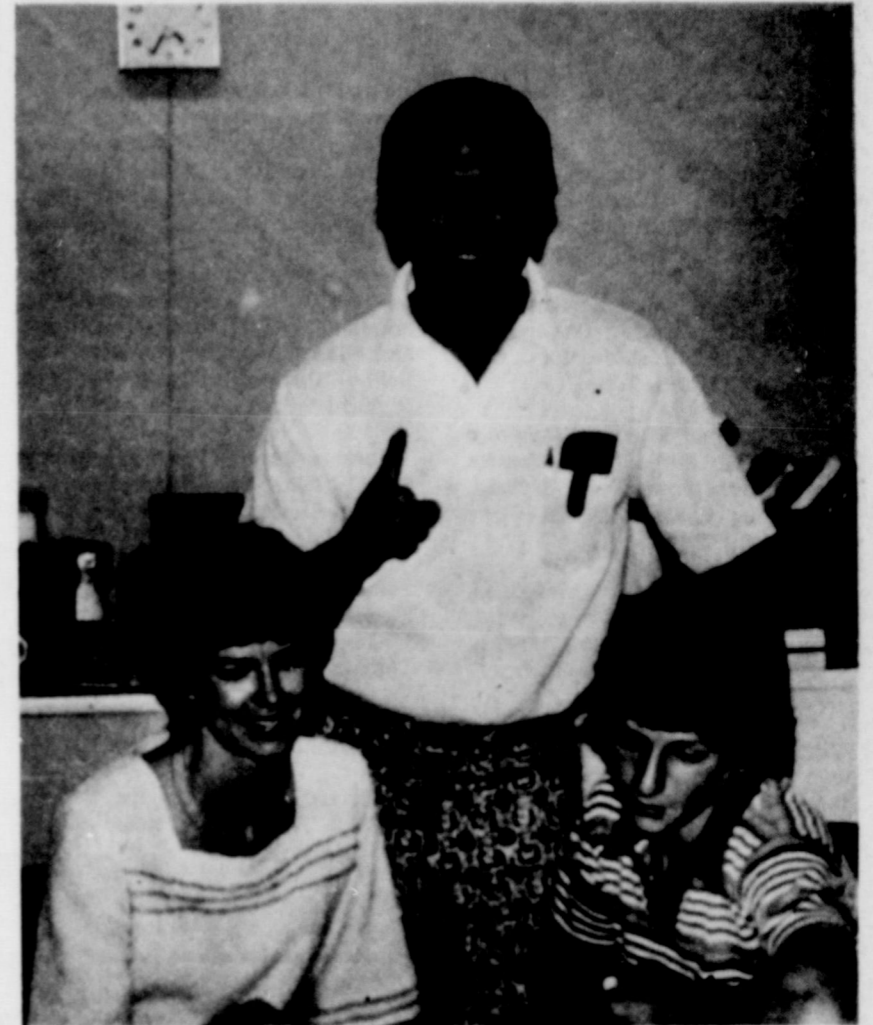
The request had been made by Dr. Jon M. Roden, owner, who plans to build two duplex buildings on the north side of Lot 5, with single residences in the remainder of the two lots.

After ascertaining that the construction would be neat appearing brick-veneer, a motion was passed approving the recommendation from the Planning & Zoning Commission.

City Manager Jake Outland presented a tally sheet from the assessor of the 1978 tax roll, pointing out that final assessments showed \$24,380,193 evaluated in real estate, and \$8,432,184 in personal property, for a total of \$32,813,180.

In other business, the council approved the monthly financial statement, noting that it represented the 12th month of the city's fiscal year, and the majority of the city's departments ended in the "black."

It was noted that the monthly financial statement from Prairie Acres was delayed in that the nursing home has had difficulty finding a qualified bookkeeper and secretary.

Bookmobile Program Debated By Court

The question of changing the procedure for paying for the Bookmobile program was a major item of discussion at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court on Monday, October 9.

The Bookmobile program has been in existence since 1966 serving the counties of Lamb, Parmer, Bailey and Cochran. When originated, the basis for computing each county's share of the costs of the Bookmobile service was the population of each county, as estimated by the Texas Almanac.

Using this formula, Parmer County has contributed 25 per cent of the support toward the program. Lamb County 42 per cent, Bailey County 20 per cent and Cochran County 13 per cent.

The Lamb County Commissioners had complained that the percentage method should be changed, using the percentage of books read in each county. It was pointed out that Parmer County's usage of the mobile library was above that of Lamb, percentage wise.

Lamb County had agreed to participate this year under the old formula, but indicated it would probably be the last time. In the meantime, they submitted a new formula, based on usage, that would put Parmer County paying 27.5 per cent; Lamb County 36.5 per cent; Bailey County 21 per cent and Cochran County, 15 per cent.

"The fact that the Bookmobile is available to every person in Lamb

County the same as it is to those in the other three counties seems to be of no consequence. It appears that the population arrangement is being completely disregarded, and those who use the Bookmobile are being penalized somewhat," said a spokesman for the commissioner's court.

After much discussion, the court agreed to participate under the new arrangement for a one-year period.

"We all agreed that if any county, especially Lamb or Parmer, should withdraw its support, the Bookmobile service would be jeopardized. We also further agreed that it is a good service, and is needed," the spokesman further stated.

Candidate Announces Chairman

Gubernatorial candidate Bill Clements today announced that Ron Awrey, Jimmy Briggs, and Andy Hurst are serving as the Parmer County chairmen for the Bill Clements for Governor Campaign.

"Clements campaign organizations have now been established in all of the state's 254 counties. This is an unprecedented accomplishment in a Republican gubernatorial campaign in this state," Clements said.

Morgan Family Wins

It was strictly a family affair for the fifth week of the Friona Star's weekly contest, with members of the Jackie Morgan family capturing first, second and third place money.

October Is Co-op Month

Farmer cooperatives, perhaps more than any other, have a special interest in the 1978 Cooperative Month theme, "Cooperatives--Democracy in Action."

That's because the theme describes how cooperatives operate. It proclaims that the farmers who are the owners really control the cooperative.

During the October observance, farmer cooperatives will emphasize that they are truly "Democracy in Action" because--

Farmers Establish Their Cooperatives. Cooperatives are established when farmers recognize a need for services that they don't have. By going together, and investing some of their own money for initial capital, farmers can realize the benefits of group selling and buying.

Farmers Control Their Cooperatives. Cooperatives are controlled by a board of directors elected by farmers who own and use the business. The farmer directors set policies and employ a manager who oversees the day-to-day operation of the cooperative.

Farmers Realize Savings From Their Cooperatives. Cooperatives are run to help members get a better return from farming. Unlike most other businesses, cooperatives are operated in a non-profit manner. Any excess of income over expenses is returned at the end of the year to the farmer member in proportion to the amount of business done with his cooperative.

Farmers Have A Voice In Their Cooperatives. Cooperatives encourage farmer members to attend and actively participate in the annual meeting. Each member exercises his control in the cooperative by voting on business matters and director elections. Active participation is encouraged, and training programs are conducted. Over the years, cooperatives have provided one of the best training grounds for the democratic development of leadership in rural America.

Much of the efficiency for which the American farmer is renowned today has been provided through his cooperatives. They have had to expand and grow to effectively compete with giant companies in agribusiness and the food industry. This growth has helped America's family farmers maintain their independence.

Beter LD Service Is Promised

"During the past two weeks General Telephone customers have experienced difficulties in placing long distance calls," O.D. Hearn, Brownfield division manager, said.

General's South Plains and Panhandle communities' long distance service switches through Southwestern Bell's Lubbock office, which had a major conversion to a computerized toll switching system October 1.

Around The House

By LAURA JACOBS

Consumers can "unravel" any confusions about nylon by knowing some basic nylon facts. Nylon's exceptional strength and elasticity make it useful for a variety of products. It is often used in blends with wool and other fibers to give a fabric greater strength and shape-retaining properties. Other advantages are nylon's ability to stay strong when wet, resist damage by mildew and chemicals and to resist abrasion. Also, it can be heat-set in permanent pleats and it washes and dries easily and quickly. However, nylon can be damaged by exposure to sunlight—and by body oils or perspiration, unless it is laundered frequently.

Nylon Uses

Nylon fabrics come in many forms—to suit their end uses. They are generally knitted for use in lingerie, foundation garments, hosiery and blouses. Woven nylon makes raincoats, ski wear, wind-breakers, and some dress fabrics.

Nylon Trade Names

Qiana is the trade name of a shiny, silky kind of nylon used in dresses and evening wear. Antron and Bodyfree nylon have static resistant properties, while Crepeset is the trade name for a textured nylon yarn. Other nylon trade names are Actionwear, Cantece, Enkasheer, Random-Tone, Source and Zefran.

Nylon Care

Nylon care is usually simple. Most items are machine washable and require drying at low temperatures. Delicate items may need special

care or hand laundering. Nylon absorbs color from wash water—and from other fabrics, so always launder nylon fabrics with similar colors. This is especially important for whites. Also, white nylons require whitening occasionally with special nylon whiteners or by bleaching. If nylon items need pressing, use a warm iron. In all cases, for best results, follow the care label instructions, since special finishes may need special care, too.

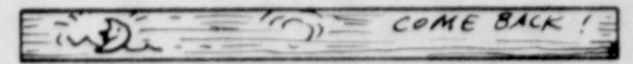

"We made a number of mistakes, but Vega was causing most of them, with their quickness. Also, it was their homecoming game, and they were coming off a bad loss, and it all added up to bad news for us," said Coach Lonnie Phillips this week.

"We were needing a good, tough game to prepare us for our district schedule, and we definitely got one," the Chieftain mentor added.

During the game's opening minutes, it looked as though the Chieftains were going to draw first blood. Chuck Nichols broke for a 22-yard gain, moving the ball across midfield and into Vega territory. The Chiefs made a first down on a

close play at the Vega 35-yard-line.

But then the team's luck took a turn for the worse. Friona was called for having an ineligible man downfield on a pass play, and that moved the ball back to midfield. Two plays gained no yardage, and on fourth down, Kevin Kothmann got only a net of four yards punting into a brisk south wind, and Vega got the ball in good field position.

The Longhorns moved to the Friona 31, but on a fourth down play was called for being offside, and elected to punt. Two plays later, the Chieftains muffed a faulty pitchout, and Vega was back in business.

Quarterback Randal Galbraith scored on the first play following the fumble, and Bob Groves' kick made it 7-0, Vega, with 4:02 left in the first quarter.

Vega drove to the Friona 23 the next time they got the ball, but from here, with the wind to their backs, a 38-yard field goal fell short.

Runs by Rod Owen and Chris Barnett sparked the Chieftains who mounted a ten-play drive during the opening part of the second quarter. But the drive bogged down, and on fourth down Barnett, rushed on the play, passed incomplete from the Vega 34.

Vega then mounted a drive of their own, and climaxed it with a one-yard sneak by the quarterback for their second score. The Longhorns exhibited their speed during this drive, covering 66 yards in ten plays. The kick was wide, but the 'Horns had a 13-0 lead for their ecstatic homecoming fans.

Highlight of the fast-moving third quarter, as far as Friona was concerned, was a 38-yard gain by runningback Joe Malouf, who would have been gone if he had had one more step on his defender. But he was caught from behind, and Vega held to thwart the Friona threat.

Vega recovered a Friona fumble early in the final quarter, and three plays later sprang to Joe Rodriguez on a 41-yard sortie to the Friona four. Two cracks at the line spelled TD for the Vegans, who increased their lead to 21-0.

The Chiefs threatened when Mike Hutson ran for 12 yards, Barnett hit Leslie White for ten and then 13, and

Nichols for nine.

But then disaster struck. Malouf made a fine leaping catch of another Barnett pass, but fumbled the ball as he hit the turf, and Vega claimed it at their 36. Friona had covered 53 yards in only seven plays.

The Chiefs got one last chance after Vega punted them into an apparent hole at their own 28-yard line with just a minute to play.

One pass went incomplete, and then Kothmann hit White on the reverse pass. Leslie, behind the defense, caught the ball at about the Vega 30, and then made a nice run to paydirt, to avoid the shutout for Friona. His soccer-style kick brought the final margin to 21-7, as only 38 seconds were left in the game.

The passing statistics were the only bright spot for Friona, which clicked on six out of ten attempts. "We would have thrown more, except for Vega's quickness," Phillips said, alluding to the fact that Barnett was sacked on two or three occasions.

At least, that seems to be the case for the Friona Chieftains, who will launch their district schedule next Friday by hosting the Muleshoe Mules.

The Mules, 9-1 a year ago and one of the teams involved with Friona (along with Littlefield) in the three-way, tie for the district title with 4-1 records, are off to another fine start.

Although having to make the adjustments of a coaching change, the Mules appear to have lost none of the momentum they built up during the 1977 campaign. Going into Friday night's action, Muleshoe had fashioned a 4-0 season record, and were rated in the top five class AA teams in the state by United Press International.

"They are as solid as a rock. They are just about as quick as the Vega team was, besides the fact that they are larger...and they have momentum," said Chieftain coach Lonnie Phillips this week while thinking about Friona's opponent in the district opener.

"However, we feel like we'll be

ready for Muleshoe. I think the boys will give it everything they have," Phillips added.

The Chieftain gridmaster said that a number of the players on Friona's team had been suffering from colds, so he was glad to see the open date come along when it did, to give them a chance to recuperate.

Otherwise, the team will be in near peak physical shape for the District 3-AA lid-lifter.

"I'm sure that Muleshoe will be remembering what happened here last year, when they came to Friona with a 7-0 record," Coach Phillips says.

If any Frionans have forgotten, the Chieftains spoiled the Mules' season with a 13-6 win, throwing the

district race into a three-way tie.

The Friona-Muleshoe rivalry dates back to 1926, which was the "early days" of football for both schools, and next Friday will mark the 28th renewal of the football rivalry.

The Parmer-Bailey county feud was interrupted for about ten years when the Mules were competing in class AAA, but was revived in 1974 when Muleshoe rejoined District 3-AA.

Muleshoe leads the all-time series, 16 wins to ten for Friona. There have been two ties.

But one thing in Friona's favor might be the fact that it always seems that when the mules are big favorites, the Chiefs manage to come up with an upset.

Kothmann Is Injured

Koty Kothmann, who is attending the University of Texas on a football scholarship, suffered an injury October 2 in a game between the UT junior varsity and the Houston junior varsity.

Kothmann had torn ligaments in his right knee, and surgery was

required on October 4. The knee will be in a cast for eight to ten weeks, and Kothmann will face an eight-month rehabilitation period.

The former Friona Chieftain star had suited up for the Longhorn varsity when they played Texas Tech at Lubbock September 30.

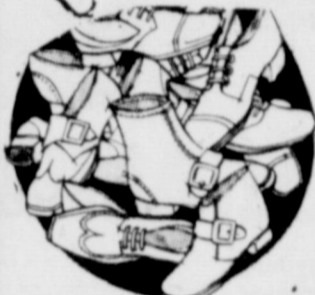

Credit Union Joins National Observance

Members of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union will join in the nationwide celebration October 15-21, 1978 of International Credit Union Week.

All kinds of people belong to Credit Unions—ranging from the 2,178 members of our Friona Texas Federal Credit Union to the President of the United States, who is a member of the White House Employees Federal Credit Union, May noted.

Nationwide, people are joining credit unions at the rate of five (5) every minute. One out of every six Texans is a credit union member added May.

Credit Unions are non-profit cooperative institutions organized to provide financial thrift services to members. Credit Union members are united by a common bond of employment, residence or association such as a church or club.

The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union is chartered to include the entire County of Parmer. And, once

you have become a member of this Credit Union and the member should move out of the boundaries of Parmer County and the account is active, he is always a member of the local Credit Union, May explained.

The local Credit Union was organized October 26, 1954, and at the present time its membership is 2,178. Share deposits as of September 30, 1978 stood at \$1,718,093.68 as compared to September 30, 1977 of \$1,421,316.80.

Loan balances as of September 30, 1978 are \$2,258,462.35 as compared to \$1,771,268.70 on September 30, 1977. Total loans made since date of organization is \$14,605,914.13.

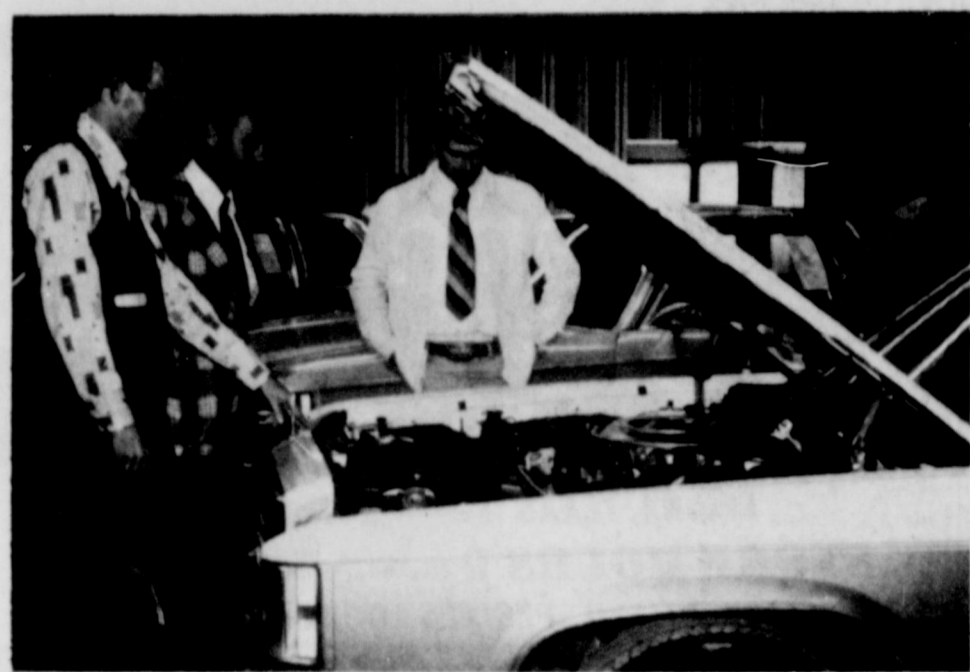
Dividends are paid quarterly on savings accounts and this third quarter dividends totaled \$28,747.43. Dividends paid back to our members for three quarters of 1978 total \$76,133.52.

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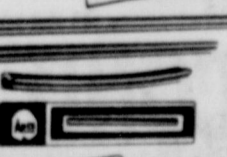
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Heart Association Presents Ben Konis

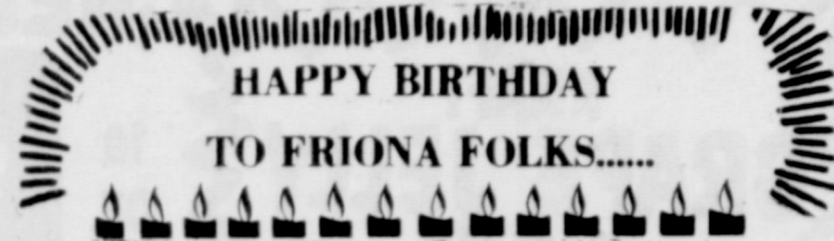

Grace Whitefield, club president, brought the meeting to order. The roll call was answered with "A Scripture To Remember."

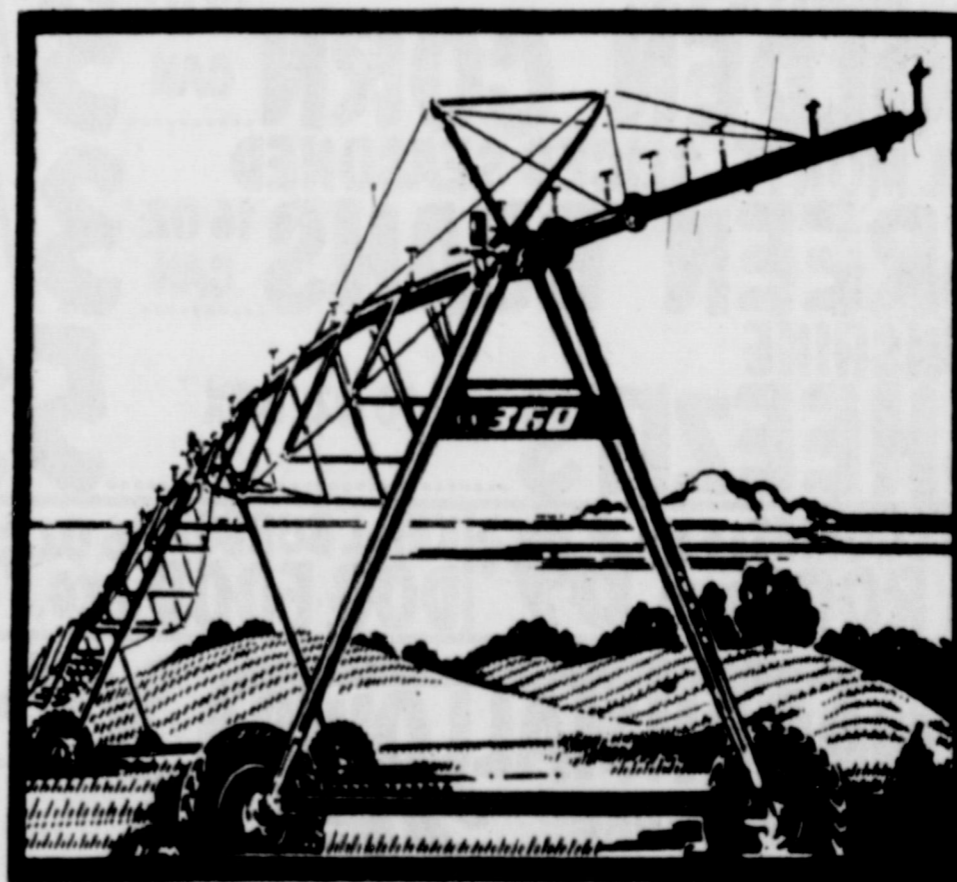
The devotional, "Are You Listening," was presented by Mrs. Whitefield. Old business was taken
