PRESIDENT CARTER is trying to downgrade the gains made by the Republicans during the recent election, which would in themselves be a threat to his own re-election chances in 1980.

However, it is hard to think that states like Texas, which elected its first Republican governor since 1874, were hardly pleased with the current administration, hence its decision to swing to a more conservative candidate rather than the liberal faction represented by John Hill.

In fact, as one of the news magazines put it this week, Americans sent this message to their government on election day: "Get off our backs and quit spending so much money unwisely."

In fact, it would seem that inflation and soaring prices were branded as public enemy number one by the voters.

One of the most unsettling aspects of the election to many politicians was the big tendency of voters to split their tickets. Voters picked their candidates carefully, to reject candidates with whom they did not agree, often disregarding party labels completely.

And nowhere was this more evident than in the Friona area, where voters went overwhelmingly for Dimmitt neighbor Kent Hance because of his local appeal and experience, yet gave good majorities to Senator Tower and Governor-elect Bill Clements.

We think this is a healthy sign, especially since we never have agreed on voting a "straight party ticket." We have always voted for the "person," without regard to his party affiliation, and we think that by and large most of the voters in this section of the county do likewise.

OUR CONGRATULATIONS to all of the winners in last Tuesday's election, and our thanks to the losers for making the Democratic process possible.

As our friend Preston Smith told us at the airport in Austin last May the day following the primaries, explaining why, in spite of all the hassle, he decided to make the governor's race one more time, "You have to have candidates for the Democratic process to work."

PAUL HARVEY quotes an appliance dealer who tells how to get rid of used refrigerators such as those taken in on trades.

Mrs. Rylander related that it was her pleasure to fulfill the humble request of this military giant.

Area Gets First Snow Thursday

Friona residents woke up to the first snowfall of the season on Thursday, after a week of fog, drizzle and generally disagreeable weather.

The official measurement in Friona was three inches, which added .25 inch of moisture to the monthly total. This brought the total moisture received during November to 2.11 inches, the bulk being the 1.65 received in the thunderstorm on November 3-4.

The moisture continued to put a crimp on farming activities in the area. Cotton farmers, with their crops still in the field, are beginning to be a bit restless. A year ago at this time, there had been over 17,000 bales of cotton ginned in Parmer County, and a comparable figure for

1978 would be only a few hundred bales.

Maize, as well as cotton, had been needing a good killing freeze to complete its maturity, according to local agricultural observers. This may have come this week, since the mercury dipped to 26 degrees on Wednesday morning, and back to 28 Friday morning.


An offering will be taken at the service. This offering will be used during the year to aid transients and meet crises that may happen to community families during 1979. This will be a free-will offering.



The Lazbuddie United Methodist Church is holding its fiftieth year anniversary, homecoming, and annual Harvest Festival on November 26.

The morning services will be conducted by Rev. Wesley Putnam, pastor, beginning at 10:45 a.m. The Harvest Festival service will be a part of the morning worship.

After the morning service, dinner will be served by the ladies of the church in the fellowship hall.

About 2 p.m., everyone will return to the sanctuary where the history of Lazbuddie United Methodist Church will be given. Past pastors and members will be given an opportunity to say a few words. Johnny Ray Watson, our featured guest, will minister to those present in song.

All present and past members, former pastors, and all friends are invited to come and be a part of any or all of the day's activities.

The Lazbuddie Methodist Church was organized in the fall of 1928 by Rev. W.B. Hicks, Methodist minister from Muleshoe. Rev. Lloyd H. Jones was the first pastor of the church, which was a part of the YL circuit.

The first church building was constructed in 1937 at a cost of \$500.00. Members of the church donated the labor to build the sanctuary which is now used for classrooms. The present structure was built in 1955 and was dedicated debt free in 1961 by Bishop Paul V. Galloway.

Between 1928 and 1937 the church met jointly with other denominations in the community, alternating with other ministers, with all services in the Lazbuddie school building.

The parsonage was built in 1947 and Lazbuddie Methodist Church became a "full time" church. The present parsonage was remodeled and enlarged in 1972.

During the past 50 years many good men have pastored the church and many dedicated members have worked hard and prayed long to keep the banner of Christ held high. As we celebrate this day we look back on the ministry of this church with pride, while at the same time we look forward to an even greater ministry for Jesus Christ in the years ahead.

Shane is the first child for the couple.



Hometown folks can be proud of Gene Strickland, a 6'3" senior from Friona, who helped the Wayland Baptist College Pioneers come close to beating the National Team of Finland in exhibition men's basketball action here last week.

Without a doubt, Pioneer Coach Bob Clindaniel must feel he lost the battle, but won the war. Statistics show that the Pioneers outplayed Finland's official Olympic team, but the final 90-86 decision said otherwise.

The Pioneers, anticipating a great season but not expected by many folks to give the Finland Team much of a threat, debuted in almost-grand fashion by never letting the Finns get more than a six-point lead, and oftentimes themselves having a six-point lead before finally losing out. 20-0 Lead Vanishes As Olton Edges FHS

The Olton Mustangs took advantage of the overconfident attitude by the Friona Chieftains, spotting the Chiefs a 20-0 lead and then storming to a 22-20 win on a cold, windy night last Friday at Chieftain Field.

For the Chieftains, it was a case of too much, too soon. The team ran up a quick 20-0 lead after less than 16 minutes of play, and then appeared to take the attitude that they needed to slack off a bit.

Friona never so much as made a first down during the second half of the game, and the team came out with minus yardage for that portion of the contest.

Sparked by a 43-yard run from scrimmage by Rod Owen, the Chieftains drove 87 yards for their first score in the opening quarter. Owen's run was the first offensive spark of the game for either team.

Joe Malouf got the touchdown from ten yards out, and the kick by Jerry Harrelson put Friona on top, 7-0.

Very shortly, the Chiefs found themselves in position to take advantage of a big break.

The Chiefs held following the kickoff, and Olton was forced to punt. The Olton punter dropped the ball, and it was recovered at the Mustang one-yard line.

Chris Barnett ran it over on a quarterback sneak, and Harrelson's kick made the score 14-0. The two TDs had been posted within 2:18 of clock time.

The Chiefs went 92 yards in only eight plays for their third touchdown. Getting the strong north wind to their backs to open the second quarter, Olton had punted the Chiefs into a hole at their own eight.

But Malouf ran for a first down, and Barnett hit Kevin Kothmann for a gain to get the team out of the hole.

Then it was Chitto Caballero who dazzled the sparse crowd with a 65-yard touchdown scamper—the longest run from scrimmage for the Chieftains this season. A high snap felled the point-after try, but Friona's lead had mounted to 20-0 only 3:32 into the second quarter.

Friona was in a punting situation late in the quarter when another bad snap went over the punter's head and rolled on out of the end zone for a safety, and put Olton on the scoreboard, as the score became 20-2.

Local fans found it hard to believe when the Chiefs regained the ball with 1:30 left in the half, inside Olton territory, when the team ran out the

clock rather than try for any more points. In fact, on the last play of the half, Barnett was chased for a 20-yard loss as he killed the clock.

The attitude seemed to carry over into the second half, and Olton liked it fine.

The Ponies used the wind to their advantage in the third quarter, returning a short Friona punt to the Chieftain 33, and then making a short drive for a touchdown. A two-point conversion made the score 20-10.

A little later slender Danny Garcia of the Mustangs made one of the most determined runs seen by Chieftain followers this year, fighting his way 31 yards for a touchdown, as the score became 20-16 with 10:42 left in the game.

Olton kicked off into the high wind, which caught the ball which came down at the Friona 33 with no one but Mustangs around it. Olton recovered and set out on another short touchdown drive.

Quarterback Vance Stoebel got the touchdown which made the score 22-20, Olton. A two-point try running was stopped short.

Frustrated, foiled and frozen, the Chiefs, who had all the right bounces early in the game could not buy a break in the late going.

In their last possessions, their summary reads as follows: minus 22 yards on the ground, as quarterback Barnett was sacked in passing attempts, and one pass completion for minus eight yards, or a total of minus 30 yards.

Adding the 20-yard loss that the Chiefs "gave" Olton to end the first half, Friona had minus yardage for the last 32 minutes of clock time, or the balance of the game after their third touchdown.

Friona outgained the Mustangs, 174 yards to seven in the first half, with eight first downs to only one. Olton won the second half statistical battle, 170 yards to minus nine, and had the first downs, ten to none.







Zelma Thorn Gives Program

The Friona Young Homemakers held their monthly meeting in the High School Cafeteria November 2. Members present for the meeting were Linda Black, Carolyn Buchanan, Beverly Elam, Keri Jack, Lea Lindeman, Amanda Miller, Terri Outland, Amelia Taylor, Sharon White, Paula Wilson, Jayn Looper, Tamela Bandy, Cindy Simmons, Becky Menefee and Cris Alexander. Fontella Cox of Friona came as a visitor.

Advisors present were Valoris Osborn, Gayle Murdock and Sheryl Salyer.

The program was given by Zelma Faye Thorn on "Wood Fiber Flowers." Mrs. Thorn explained how Indian women sliver thin pieces of wood off larger pieces. The wood is then similar to paper. The wood fiber then must be kept soft by spraying it with water, then it is cut into squares and sold in hobby shops. The wood fiber is available in an assortment of colors and in many mixed colors. She showed many flower pieces she had made and arrangements she had put together and demonstrated how to make a rose and an orchid.

To make a rose, she showed how to cut six pieces of the wood fiber into the same shape and lay them in a plastic dish used to make the flowers. She then fixed her stem out of florist wire and put the bud on the end. She explained how important it is to keep the wood fiber moist so as not to tear the fiber when inserting the stem through the hole of the plastic dish and into the wood fiber. She then twisted the stem and removed the dish and displayed a lovely rose.

She then demonstrated how to

make an orchid and showed one she had already made. She concluded her program with a question and answer session.

The hostesses for the meeting were Linda Black, Keri Jack and Lea Lindeman. They served carmel fondue with sliced apples and barbecue pecans, pumpkin cake, green angel cake and Cokes.
