Eye Nuggets Of Eclipse Information

Scientists believe they have taken man's finest record of a solar eclipse, but months of painstaking work must be done for the mass of raw data to be refined to nuggets of new infor-

Within their records of Saturday's total eclipse of the sun may lie the answer to such practical questions as how astronauts might be warned of an impending solar flare.

Or they may satisfy scientific curiosity with data that proves or disproves one scholar's theory that a family of minicomets races around the sun, masked by its glare.

Albert E. Belon of the National Science Foundation said researchers up and down the North American continent put together "the most comprehensive and integrated study of a solar eclipse in history."

They used nearly 70 rockets and seven earth satellites, took readings with spectrographs, infrared detectors and other instruments and observed from aircraft and ground facilities as the moon blacked out the sun.

"It will be a long time before we can answer the questions we asked, but the information is going to be there," said Robert L. Krieger, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Wallops Island. Va., station.

Clouds disheartened scientists and amateur astronomers in Florida and South Georgia but skies were clear for a scientific team that gathered in the highlands at Miahuatlan, Mexico, in the path of totality.

The scientists turned out because a total eclipse permits observations of the sun, stars, planets and space not otherwise obtainable. They expect new information in three primary areas: meteorology, ionospheric physics and solar physics.

The eclipse was also viewed by millions of private citizens in Mexico, the United States and Canada. Most apparently heeded prior warnings that direct observation of the event could result in severe burns of the ret-

In Laos Fighting Pathet Lao **Puts Forward Peace Plans**

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) -The Pathet Lao put forward a peace program for Laos today calling for an end to U.S. intervention, withdrawal of the Royal Laotian government's forces from all areas "illegally occupied," resettlement of persons forcibly removed from their homes, and payment of compensation to them.

The proposal also called for a cease-fire, an all-party political conference to establish a provisional coalition government and eventual election of a national assembly.

The Royal Laotian government announced it would exchange diplomatic messages with the Communist leadership on the proposal.

An aide to the Laotian premier, Prince Souvanna Phouma, said the government had received a message from Prince Souvannaphong, Souvanna Phouma's half-brother and the leader of the Pathet Lao. The message said Souvannaphong wanted to send a more detailed message which officials in Viennew peace proposal.

The rift between Georgadjis and Makarios stems from their abandonment in 1957 of enosis -union with Greece-as an aim of government policy and from the Byzantine complexity of Greek Cypriot politics.

27 Americans Toll, Combat **Acts Denied**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House has acknowledged an Army captain was killed fighting North Vietnamese guerrillas in Laos but denied the death was due to "ground combat operations."

Capt. Joseph Bush was shot to death Feb. 10, 1969, by North Vietnamese troops. He returned the fire of enemy troops during the engagement at a compound on the edge of the Plain of Jars, the White House said.

A White House official said 26 other Americans have been killed or reported missing due to hostile action in Laos.

But Deputy Press Secretary Gerald L. Warren maintained Sunday President Nixon stands by his statement that "no American stationed in Laos has ever been killed in ground combat operations."

EXPOSED HIMSELF Bush's death was "due to hos-

tile actions," Warren said. "He was not engaged in combat operations . . . he was a military attache," Warren explained. "When the compound was attacked by commandos, he did take action, firing a gun, in an attempt to protect other persons in the compound and in taking this action he exposed himself to enemy fire and was

The controversy over Bush developed after President Nixon said Friday in a formal statement that "No American stationed in Laos has ever been killed in ground combat opera-

The American's death was reported Sunday in a copyright story by freelance writer Don A. Schanche and distributed by the Los Angeles Times. Warren said Nixon was unaware of Bush's death at the time he issued his formal statement on U.S. involvement in Laos.

LONG-RANGE FIRE

Although Bush fired at the North Vietnamese commandos. the White House said, the death could not be attributed to ground combat operations because the compound was "about 10 miles to the rear of the expected line of combat.

Hostile action covers casualties in circumstances other than direct combat, including ambushes, long-range artillery fire and mines. A White House authority last

After a ride of about 10 minutes, he was transferred to a truck and he believed, taken out into the countryside.

While in captivity, he was moved twice and at one point was put on a horse.

At times his captors conversed with him and removed the dark glasses, but without his own glasses he was unable to get a good look at them. He noticed that they kept their faces masked. "They never let go of those machine guns,"

he added.

Glimmer For The Democrats

The unanimous selection of Lawrence F. O'Brien as chairman of the national Democratic Committee must be about the most heartening thing that has happened to the Democrats in quite a while.

Until the party was ready to draft him, O'Brien, a former national chairman and later postmaster general, held back. Whether this spirit of unity is real or a bit of expediency remains to be seen, but O'Brien was able to obtain a show of unity.

He possesses some of the atributes so sorely needed by the Democrats. First of all, O'Brien has no personal political ambitions (which correctly or incorrectly had been imputed to Sen. Fred Harris, who recently resigned the post). Secondly, he is

a seasoned and skilled organizer of political campaigns (as witness those for former Presidents Kennedy and Johnson). Last, but by far from least, he is a good money raiser. With about eight millions of deficit to manage or erase, the national Democratic party needs this talent.

The Democrats have been in disarray since the last election, but this may be deceptive. Will you please answer the following question in your column: Do you consider it sacrilegious to pray silently for Divine guidance as how one should vote while in a voting booth? P.H.J.

I can think of no better place to pray, and no greater object of prayer. The right of franchise is one of our great privileges in a free world, and since there are so many unknown quantities involved, earnest prayer is most desirable. The Bible teaches that God is interested in the affairs of nations, and in the lives of the leaders of the nations. In Psalms 7:6-7 we read: "Promotion (election) cometh not from the east, nor from the west, nor from the south. But God . . . putteth down one, and setteth up

another.' So it is fitting and proper that we pray, both before, during and after an election. The Bible says, "Blessed is that nation whose God is the Lord." Woe unto America if we ever get to the place where we feel we can dispense with Divine leadership and counsel. MEMBERS OF Congress felt, howconsider the details of the legislation and that the best way would be to pass a resolution postponing for 37 days any strike or lockout action. This would give ample time for further discussions and would also allow an opportunity for Congress to study all legislative proposals relating to transportation strikes.

The resolution means that no strike or lockout could be called in the intervening period. It is conceivable that the dissenting union might change its mind and sign the contract, making unnecessary any new legislation on this dispute. But the larger problem of how to avoid work stoppages in the future would be left to Congress for further consideration just the

MR. NIXON has suggested a new idea. In his message of February 27, he proposed that, when all other efforts had failed to bring settlement of a dispute, a neutral group of three members would be appointed to examine the "final offers" submitted by labor and management. They would have authority to select the "most reasonable" proposal made by both sides. The final offer of one side or the other would become the actual terms of a new contract ordered by law. Neither side would know what the selection board would do until it had held hearings and made the

THE WHOLE SUBJECT of wage and price control has been avoided by the Nixon administration thus far, and the plan to intervene with some form of settlement is confined only to certain large industries. While this may reduce the threat of work stoppages, it does not, from an economic standpoint, afford any protection against rising prices due to higher wage costs.

THE PRESIDENT has recommended that a national special industries commission be established to make a comprehensive study of labormanagement relations in those industries "which are particularly vulnerable to national emergency disputes." He feels that the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service should deal with disputes in the railroads and the airlines, as it does with disputes in other transportation industries — maritime, longshore and trucking. These already are subject to the emergency provisions of the Taft-Hartley Act and would be covered in any new provisions creating a board of inquiry. Mr. Nixon believes that, while the government should stay out of private labor disputes as much as possible, the nation cannot tolerate "protracted work stoppages in its transportation

Crisis In The Health Industry

WASHINGTON - There are strong costing lots of money signs that the health industry is rapidly approaching a crisis. It is already at the critical stage for many who have recently experienced serious and prolonged illness. The system by which America heals its sick, is itself a failing patient. The chart of rising health-care costs shows a degree of fever which calls for urgent remedy.

The burden of a cure rests partially on medical men themsleves, who must act to protect their honorable calling from radical, and perhaps disastrous measures. Perhaps it rests even more on government not intruding into the sensitive doctorpatient relationship. Responsibility falls on the public who, whatever happens, will continue to pay the bills.

LAST YEAR, individuals and groups spent more than \$60 billion on health. This is almost seven per cent of our National Gross Product. So it is one of the biggest businesses in the nation. Of this sum \$52.6 billion went for personal medical care. By comparison, in 1950 the bill was about \$20 billion. Fully half this \$40 billion increase can be charged to price rise

Many factors conspire in these price rises. Inflation generally is, of course, first. This in turn has put pressures on those who make medical-care work, to increase hospital charges.

THERE HAVE BEEN tremendous advancements in medical hardware. These are machines undreamed of a generation ago, which help make people well — sometimes at great

There have been countless improvements in surgical techniques, saving many lives that a generation ago would have been lost — but again,

There has been an almost phenomenal development in medicines that cost millions in man-hours and research to discover. They have saved

lives that are beyond price. RESULTS LESS dramatic have been caused by Government thrusting itself into health programs adding the heavy hand of bureauracy to mushrooming medical cost. Estimated cost of medicare and medicaid payments is placing a threatening burden on our Social Security system.

These conditions build a crushing load on the back of the patient who, the record shows, often adds to the burden himself by demanding services he does not need.

In the face of this mounting medical crisis, almost by reflex it seems, the Federal Government is turned to for more answers. Pressures are building up for more Federal health programs devised, administered and paid for by taxes from all the people. All sorts of schemes have been proposed, yet many are vague, undefined and in-

THE SOCIALIZATION of medicine does nothing to divert deterioration of services or reduce its price. Other countries, which are trying it, have found it stifles the medical profession which has raised America's medicine to eminence. The protection of that eminency and personal relationship with the patients and those that administer to them, is the duty of both the medical system and of the public which depends on it.

The Ways and Means Committee of the Congress is struggling to find better answers to a mounting problem. Unless there are better solutions found, the entire health system is in

Washington's Crime Nothing New

WASHINGTON — Forgive me for what may seem a grisly viewpoint toward the most recent developments in Hell City's crime wave. But I cannot resist suggesting that something may be done about this marble snakepit now that the names of relatives and friends of Very Important People have been added to the list of victims. Notice is hereby taken:

OF HOUSE SPEAKER John Mc-Cormack's distress over the aftermidnight beating on Capitol Hill administered to his grandnephew, a Georgetown University senior.

Of Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield's outrage, expressed in a long Senate speech, over the murder of two fellow Montanans.

I INTEND no derogation of these two national legislators in pointing out that over the years they appeared not to notice when thousands of faceless Hell City residents were being robbed, attacked, raped and murdered. Presumably, they were busy with other matters. The important thing is that Mansfield and Mc-Cormack have become personally acquainted with the anarchy of Washington's streets, and that as men of influence their protests carry enormous weight.

Noting that people from all over the United States have been drawn here by "the hope of a capital fit to symbolize a confident, capable, compassionate and cultured country,' Mansfield asked two bitter questions: "Where is that hope now? What has happened to that dream?"

AND HE ANSWERED those questions with an even more bitter conclusion: "The truth is that we do not have a capital fit for a great nation. There is reasonable doubt even about Washington's fitness for the decent survival of its citizens. It is a capital blanketed in fear. Fear

stalks the streets. It afflicts rich and poor. People flee the streets at dark and, more and more, even in daylight. We begin to resemble the cities of the Middle Ages with brightly-lit shrines scattered in a fear-laden

BUT IN MY impertinent way, I cite that crime in Hell City is nothing new. It has been building up since the very early 60's, as it has been building up in cities across the country. Anonymous people named Smith and Jones have been its tragic victims. Since Washington is 74 per cent black, most of them are, or were, members of that race of which glandular liberals have been so professionally solicitous.

In Alabama, Georgia and Louisiana among those Southern enclaves demeaned by careerists of the wetpants liberal set - these black citizens would have been immeasurably safer than they were in the nation's capital. In Hell City, scores - perhaps hundreds — of small black capitalists have been forced to close their shops simply because they were afraid to stay in business. Almost daily, there is serious violence in the public schools, which are 94 per cent

FOR THE MOST part, whites in Hell City have escaped this criminal plague, because there are fewer of them and because they live in safer, more "respectable" neighborhoods. So I suppose it is news when a white citizen, especially one with important connections, is slain or beaten.

But I reject the implication that it makes Washington's crime wave worse than it was yesterday. Those blacks, victimized almost at will in their hazardous ghettos, are just as dead as Mansfield's Montanans, their bodies just as battered as the body of John McCormack's grandnephew.

Cavalrymen **Battle Reds Along Border**

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. air cavalrymen and their supporting planes and helicopters battled North Vietnamese forces along the Cambodian border in the northern part of War Zone C today for the fourth straight day.

The U.S. Command said 43 North Vietnamese were killed in four clashes Sunday and today in Tay Ninh, Phuoc Long and Binh Long provinces. Six of the 1st Air Cavalry Division soldiers were killed and 29 wounded. while South Vietnamese militiamen in one of the battles reported very light casualties.

Three ground clashes Sunday were followed by a heavy North Vietnamese mortar attack early today on Fire Base Flasher, about three miles from the scene of the action Sunday in Tay Ninh province. U.S. spokesmen said 150 to 175 rounds were fired, but most of them landed outside the camp perimeter.

The shelling caused very light casualties, with no fatalities and no damage, headquarters said. But it reported counter fire from helicopter gunships and artillery killed 10 North Vietnamese.

The U.S. Command also announced that a hamlet just outside Saigon was hit by rockets accidentally fired from an American helicopter gunship Sunday evening, and three Viet-
