

Nixon Will Offer Congress New Foreign Aid Programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, praising the findings of a presidential task force, says he will propose legislation next January to carry out a "new U.S. approach to foreign assistance for the 1970s."

As the White House disclosed the 49-page report of the presidential task force Sunday calling for more international cooperation, Nixon said the recommendations were "fresh and exciting."

The President, in a statement issued shortly before he returned to Washington from a three-day stay at Key Biscayne, Fla., reported the new overseas aid approach he will offer Congress will be among his major foreign-policy projects for the future.

The 16-member panel—headed by Rudolph A. Peterson, former president of the Bank of America—recommended a basic revision of the U.S. foreign aid program and an increase in money for economic development abroad.

Nixon agreed with the Peterson panel's conclusion that the United States has a profound interest in cooperating with developing nations in efforts to improve their conditions of life.

The task force listed no specific dollar amount but said the downward dip of U.S. assistance for development abroad should be reversed.

Economic development aid should be split from projects for military and security-connected economic assistance, the panel said.

The panel also suggested there should be more economic aid applied through international institutions and emphasis on self-help and use of private enterprise.

The panel recommended that new agencies take over functions now performed by the Agency for International Development—which was created under the Kennedy administration to run the economic aid program.

A new "institutional framework" suggested by the panel would include:

- A U.S. International Development Bank, that would be an independent government corporation starting with \$2 billion in federal funds with power to borrow \$2 billion more from the public.
- A U.S. International Development Institute to seek new ways for science and technology to assist developing nations.
- An Overseas Private Investment Corporation to use U.S. private enterprise in behalf of international development. This agency was created in annual aid legislation passed by Congress for this year.
- A U.S. International Development Council to assure development needs abroad get greater weight in U.S. policy-making.

Total U.S. foreign aid in fiscal 1969 was figured by the panel at \$6.5 billion—including \$3.4 billion related to security. U.S. economic development aid was listed at \$2.7 billion, of which \$600 million went to international institutions such as the World Bank.

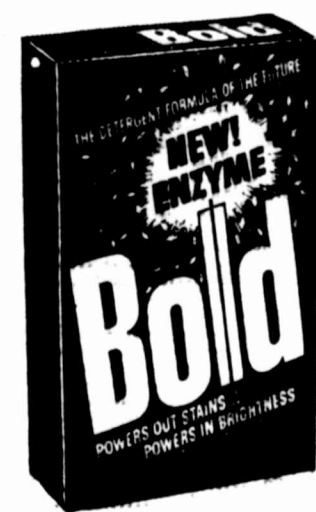

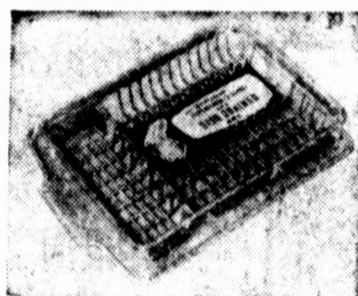

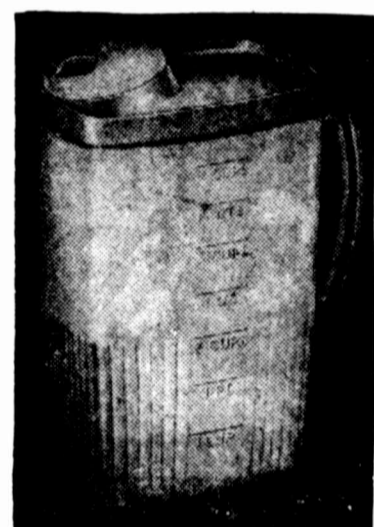

Plenty Of Young Persons Capable Of War Efforts

The North Vietnam People's Army seems highly motivated and well equipped. It appears to have plenty of young manpower—and womenpower—to accomplish its tasks.

Those are the key military impressions from an 18-day visit to North Vietnam, made in the company of four escorts.

The bombing of the North stopped 16 months ago, but the watchword for all—army and

people—is vigilance, an attitude that leaps out at the visitor from those aspects of North Vietnamese life he is permitted to observe.

SOVIET WEAPONS

What I saw and heard leaves the impression that the armed forces are capable of a long, tenacious war effort. That is their history, as they repeat it to a visitor. One thousand years of resistance to Chinese rule. Two hundred years spent fighting the Mongols. A hundred years against the French.

"Frankly, there are things we did not want you to see. Surface to air missiles, for example.

"You know, we developed a truly Vietnamese technique for employing the missiles. Had we not decided to do so, the Americans could have destroyed them all.

"The foreign friends who gave us the missiles said they should be positioned in hardened sites. But we thought that the Americans, if they discovered the sites, would concentrate their bombing on them. We would have one SAM left.

MOVE, MOVE

"We disregarded instructions and handled the missiles to suit Vietnamese conditions, as we know them. We kept the missiles on the move. They never had fixed locations, nor have they now. They move, move, move."

I asked about a 28-year-old interceptor pilot credited with destroying nine U.S. planes. The official paused over his cup of strong, black Viet Nam coffee. Again, his response reflected national pride:

"Young Captain Nguyen Van Coc is a farmer's son, of simple background. Yet he learned to fly a MIG17. It isn't as fast as more modern American planes, but the captain learned to make tighter turns, to change weakness into strength, to gain the superior position for firing his air-to-air missiles. It was a matter of great courage. After four years, he is still flying."

A million North Vietnamese have seen the People's Army exhibition at Hanoi. It is devoted to the successful 1946-54 war to drive out the French, and to the struggle since 1964 with the United States.

MODERN WEAPONRY

For this event, which opened last December, the army gathered an imposing array of modern weaponry and lined the hardware up at the far side of an open square, facing four pavilions. The armament extended for hundreds of yards.

A MIG17 and two MIG22s were parked in a row at the exhibition entrance gate. The line-up continued with artillery of various dimensions up to 155 millimeter. Then rockets of large sizes. Surface-to-air and air-to-air missiles. A heavy tank and several of medium weight. Amphibious and tracked personnel carriers. Huge radar screens. Helicopters. An assault boat. Special trucks of almost every description.

RIDE BIKES

When infiltration by North Vietnam's regulars was claimed by the Americans to be at its height in 1967, they estimated 8,000 a month entering South Vietnam.

Their army trucks carry 24 soldiers. Just 12 trucks a day could carry more than 8,000 soldiers a month, if that's the way they went south in 1967.

Some of the soldiers rode bicycles of Chinese and local manufacture.

They decorated their vehicles with small bouquets of plastic flowers. Their bearing was alert. I could not talk with them. Weapons were not in evidence.

Questions about the size of North Vietnam's armed forces and about forces Hanoi has sent south were turned aside uniformly. The question was not open for discussion.

FOREIGN FRIENDS

Western estimates put the total North Vietnamese army strength at about 450,000. Estimates of the number committed to the battle in the South range from 85,000 to more than double that.

Always with my escorts, I saw little heavy military hardware. A government official explained why.

Preparing Plan To Unify Several Protestant Sects

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Church representatives went to work today on a unification plan that could reshape the life of much of American Protestantism in this decade.

The initial step was up to the Consultation of Church Union, whose annual meeting opened here. Predictions were that it would give a go-ahead to the plan.

The Rev. Dr. William A. Benfield Jr., of Charleston, W. Va., head of a commission that drafted it, predicted its approval.

"It will make the next two years the most creative, effective years in the history of the American Protestant churches and have still greater significance in the years beyond that," he said.

'Midnight Cowboy' Captures Awards

LONDON (AP) — American actor Dustin Hoffman and the movie "Midnight Cowboy" have received from the Society of Film and Television Artists awards which are the British equivalent of Hollywood's Oscars.

Astronaut Neil A. Armstrong was named television star of 1969 and the pictures he and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. showed from the moon were designated the best foreign television program.

Named best actress of 1969 at the awards ceremony Sunday night was Britain's Maggie Smith, for "The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie."

In addition to Hoffman's award as best actor, his co-star Jon Voight was named most promising young actor and there were awards to John Schlesinger, the film's director.

Nine denominations, with a total of 25 million members, are involved in the discussions, with a specific plan of union on the agenda for action for the first time.

Among various provisions to assure blacks a full role in the newly united church, one specifies that the first presiding bishop will be a black churchman.

Questioned about this, Dr. Benfield, a Southern Presbyterian, said it was felt that the unusual requirement was justified to help guarantee Negroes an equitable place in the new church.

"We can't begin on the basis that things are normal and as they ought to be—they're not," he said, adding that blacks won't enter the new church "unless we come through and produce."

About 200 church representatives are taking part in the meeting.

His Latest Play Lasts 30 Seconds

OXFORD, England (AP) — Samuel Beckett's latest play is called "Breath" and it lasts 30 seconds.

The play, presented at Oxford University's playhouse Sunday night as part of a tribute to this year's winner of the Nobel prize in literature, consisted of a baby's amplified cry and breathing, against the background of a pile of trash.

After the play, stage and screen personalities Laurence Harvey, Siobhan McKenna, John Ireland, Patrick Magee and Wolf Mankowitz sprawled on top of the trash pile and read excerpts from earlier Beckett works, including "Waiting for Godot."

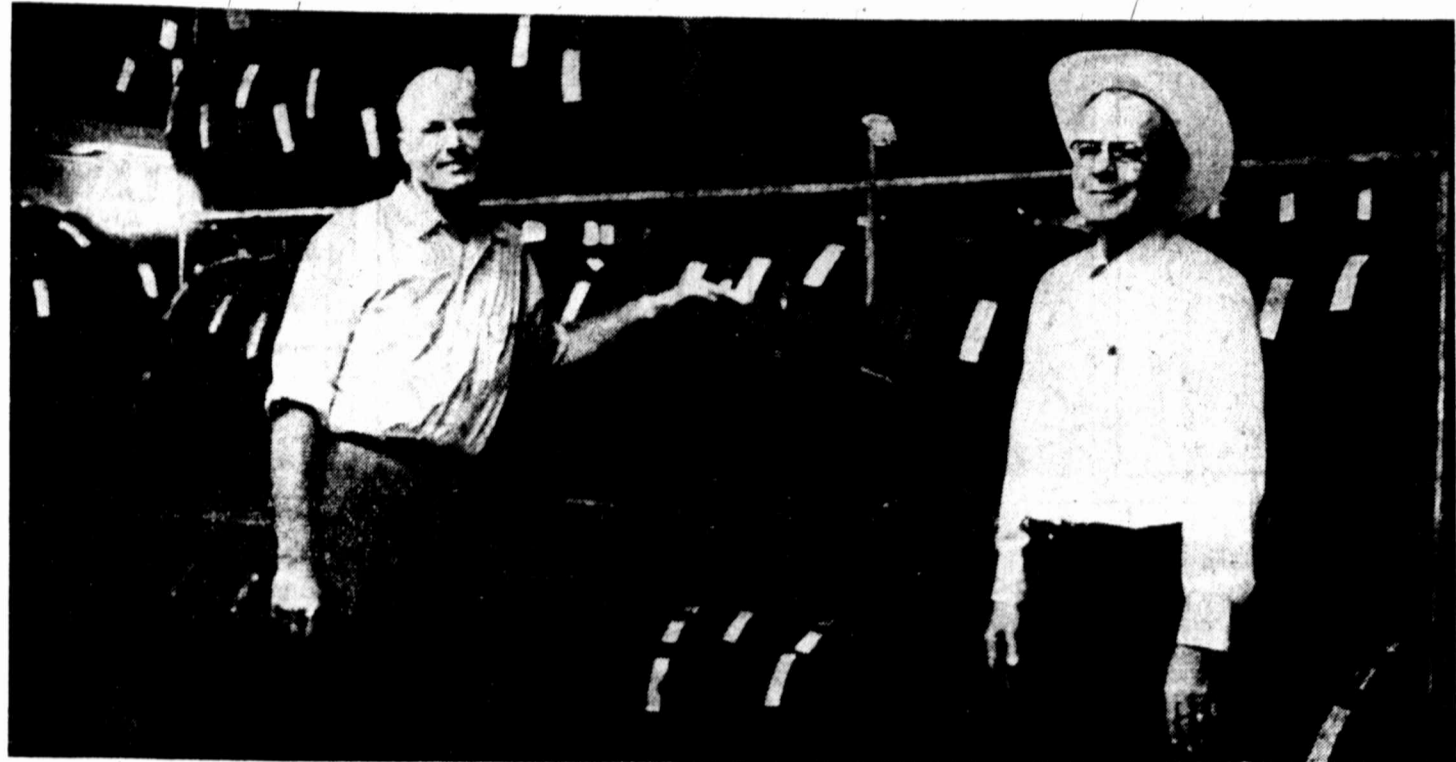
