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# With Warheads Russians **Test Fire** Missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Russians test fired two big long range missiles with multiple warheads into the Pacific over the weekend, the Pentagon said today.

A spokesman said the Russians "could be approaching the point at which they could make a deployment decision with this series of tests."

These were the first Soviet SS9 missile tests announced by the United States since last spring. However, the Russians have been testing a

variety of missiles and Pentagon figures show they have test fired more than 30 since strategic arms limitation talks began in Helsinki last November.

According to the Pentagon, the Soviet missile testing rate has about doubled that of the U.S. tests since the opening of the arms limitation talks last November.

The Soviet missiles each carried a triple warhead, it was said.

The Russian SS9 system at this point in development is capable of hurling multiple warheads in a pattern which Pentagon officials have said could destroy U.S. Minuteman ICBMs in underground silos.

### Mine Union Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court agreed today to review a decision dismissing charges that the United Mine Workers union conspired with major coal producers to drive small marginal operators in the southeastern Tennessee coal field out of business.

The court will hear an appeal by the small operators. Their complaint had been dismissed by a federal court in Chattanooga, an action affirmed by a 4-4 vote of the U.S. Circuit Court in Cincinnati.

The appeal contends that the union, beginning in 1950, conspired with the major coal producing companies to fix and control prices and to create a monopoly. The principal part of the theory is that a 1950 national coal wage agreement was amended from time to time to impose impractical or impossible terms upon small operators.

# Hard Rock Show Ends **On Sour Note** LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP) -The

ill-fated Southwest 70 Peace Festival, described by one spectator as "a financial as well as an artistic flop" ended on a sour note Sunday-its final performance rained out.

It was a typical ending for the much maligned hard rock show, which had been plagued from the start by one misfortune after another.

At it's final hour, only about 400 music lovers were present. Promoters had expected more than 100,000 spectators but the total crowd reached only about one-fifth of that.

The festival twice was moved to different locations. It wound up at the site seven miles south of here when a court injunction kept it from being held at the tiny community of Dickens. Townspeople feared for their safety.

Then the unpredictable West Texas weather got into the act. Rain, snow, sleet and dustblowing winds peppered the festival goers even before the scheduled opening last Thursday.

A mixup in electrical generators caused the festival to be postponed until Friday.

More than 200 law enforcement officers hovered over the gathering and at least 165 arrests resulted. By Sunday morning, sheriff's offices said there had been 50 persons named in felony complaints alleging sale and possession of marijuana. Another 15 were due to be charged.

The court found Duffy guilty of involuntary manslaughter and conspiracy to commit involuntary manslaughter in the killing of a Vietnamese prisoner of war last Sept. 5.

**OFF THE HOOK** Duffy's civilian attorney, Henry Rothblatt of New York, said earlier that the court's shift was a "nice chance to take the Army off the hook" and that he would view a manslaughter conviction as an acquittal.

The court on Sunday found Duffy guilty of conspiring with Sgt. John R. Lanasa, 23, of Baton Rouge, La., to kill a Vietnamese prisoner of war last Sept. 5. Lanasa, who is charged with firing the fatal shots, will go on trial soon.



Celler's main interest is in passing the Senate version of the Voting Rights Act. The measure retains the essential provisions of the 1965 act under which nearly a million blacks in seven Southern states have been registered to vote.

Celler lost by five votes last December when he tried to get a similar bill through the House, which instead passed an administration-backed substitute civil rights bill leaders regard as weaker than the present act.

Although a poll of House Democrats shows top-heavy support for the package, the Republicans are much more closely divided, with most of them declining to say how they will vote.

Col. Atkinson since last July has been deputy commander for operations at Webb. He is a former West Point classmate of Col. Lobdell.



#### Federal Move On Bomb Terrorists

WASHINGTON — The United States government has taken a significant step toward squelching would-be revolutionists and terrorists. The President has asked Congress to enact laws imposing heavy penalties for bombing threats and criminal bombings. It would be a federal crime to use bombs or incendiary devices to damage or destroy federal governused for ment property or buildings business purposes by individuals or firms "engaged in interstate commerce or in any activity affecting such commerce.

In another section of his statement, Mr. Nixon describes in stern language what has been happening:

"SCHOOLS AND public buildings have had to be evacuated; considerable property has been destroyed; er. lives have been lost. Clearly, many of these bombings have been the work of political fanatics, many of them young criminals posturing as romantic revolutionaries. They must be dealt with as the potential murderers they are.' Private businesses have been the victims in most cases, but federal buildings also have received bombing threats, and several evacuations have been found necessary here in Washington. From July 1, 1968, to June 30, 1969, there were 46 bombing threats against federal buildings, but the number has risen to nearly 2,000 in the current fiscal year thus far. So the federal government is seeking. to protect both public and private property. CONGRESS IS in a mood to enact drastic legislation because the country as a whole has been frightened by the wave of bomb threats. Also, actual bombings have occurred. Whether these are the result of a conspiracy or are the work of scattered individuals has not yet been determined by the investigating agencies of the federal government. It has been recognized for a long time that the responsibility for maintaining law and order is largely that of the states, and the national government deals with law enforcement only when there is obviously an interstate or federal phase. Congress realizes now that those engaged in provocation or conspiracy can send dangerous emissaries from state to state and that the only way to handle the problem is to exercise federal authority THE FEDERAL BUREAU of investigation is one of the most efficient agencies in the world dealing with crime. It works closely with state and local agencies and transmits its findings promptly whenever it believes the data could be of help in apprehending criminals. But often state officials are helpless because suspected persons operate from outside the state or do not remain within the boundaries of one state very long. President Nixon's plan recognizes that the federal government has taken on a new responsibility in crime detection and that this is absolutely essential if the nation is to be spared the terrorism that bombings and bombing threats have produced. #### The Source Of Auto-Driving Ability

One thing and another: Is the typical teen-age boy's ability at the wheel of an automobile really the legacy of a long-forgotten ape-like ancestor in some remote jungle treetop?

As California biologist suggests this may be the case and offers it as a reason why it is so much easier to teach a boy to drive an automobile than physics.

**ROBERT SINSHEIMER** of the California Institute of Technology says he is struck by the fact that he could program a computer to apply laws of physics with great ease, but to program a computer to drive a car would be a monumental task.

It would be the reverse in the case of a 17-year-old boy, the biologist points out. In learning to drive, the 17-year-old makes use, with adaptation, of a set of routines long since programmed into the primate brain.

To gauge the speed of an approaching car and maneuver accordingly is not so different from the need to gauge the speed of an approaching branch and react accordingly as one swings through the trees.

THERE YOU have it - the trusty postman saying the public be damned. and the businessman forced to shutter his shop because he can't afford to support criminal creeps. Shall we all flee the country? Must we abandon the national ship? Surveying the wreckage, the citizen must find himself thinking the unthinkable, wondering whether at long last Tom Jefferson's dream of democratic selfgovernment has become a nightmare.

JEFFERSON, of course, assumed a modicum of good will and selfrestraint on the part of the body politic. He rejected the hypothesis that a self-governing people could not trust each other and therefore they would destroy each other. Is it possible that tomorrow's history books will dismiss him as a false prophet?

We go down, and with few exceptions, our leaders seem to be unaware of what is happening.
