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With Warheads Russians Test Fire Missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Russians test fired two big long range missiles with multiple warheads into the Pacific over the weekend, the Pentagon said today.

A spokesman said the Russians "could be approaching the point at which they could make a deployment decision with this series of tests."

These were the first Soviet SS9 missile tests announced by the United States since last spring.

However, the Russians have been testing a variety of missiles and Pentagon figures show they have test fired more than 30 since strategic arms limitation talks began in Helsinki last November.

According to the Pentagon, the Soviet missile testing rate has about doubled that of the U.S. tests since the opening of the arms limitation talks last November.

The Soviet missiles each carried a triple warhead, it was said.

The Russian SS9 system at this point in development is capable of hurling multiple warheads in a pattern which Pentagon officials have said could destroy U.S. Minuteman ICBMs in underground silos.

Mine Union Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court agreed today to review a decision dismissing charges that the United Mine Workers union conspired with major coal producers to drive small marginal operators in the southeastern Tennessee coal field out of business.

The court will hear an appeal by the small operators. Their complaint had been dismissed by a federal court in Chattanooga, an action affirmed by a 4-4 vote of the U.S. Circuit Court in Cincinnati.

The appeal contends that the union, beginning in 1950, conspired with the major coal producing companies to fix and control prices and to create a monopoly. The principal part of the theory is that a 1950 national coal wage agreement was amended from time to time to impose impractical or impossible terms upon small operators.

Indictment Dismissed

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — An indictment charging a Cleveland minister with being an accessory before the fact of an abortion was dismissed today in Middlesex Superior Court.

Judge James C. Roy heard arguments last week on a motion to dismiss the indictment against the Rev. Robert W. Hare, 35.

It was testified that the Rev. Mr. Hare, married and the father of one child, belonged to a Cleveland clergy consultation service on April, 1969, and presumably "instructed" a young Ohio woman to go to Dr. Pierre V. Brunelle of North Chelmsford for the abortion.

Dr. Brunelle, 62, was charged last June with performing an illegal abortion and is awaiting trial.

The court found that the minister provided the woman with Brunelle's name and suggested the cost of the abortion would be \$400.

"I do not regard the use of the word 'instructed' as implying the defendant directed the woman to go to Brunelle," Judge Roy ruled.

Testimony before a grand jury confirmed that the fact that the Rev. Mr. Hare gave the woman the name, address and telephone number of a person who would perform the abortion, Judge Roy said, but there was no further evidence of any connection or communication involving Hare.

Train Crash Toll Climbs

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — A train carrying hundreds of weekend holidaymakers back to Karachi late Sunday plunged 30 feet off a trestle bridge in the darkness into a gully 25 miles east of Karachi.

Rescue workers said about 20 persons were killed and about 100 injured but railway officials said five persons were killed and 58 injured.

Two passenger cars were jackknifed into the drybed gully on the main line to Karachi. Four other cars and the engine were derailed on the Karachi side of the small trestle. Three of the cars were overturned.

Hard Rock Show Ends On Sour Note

LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP) — The ill-fated Southwest 70 Peace Festival, described by one spectator as "a financial as well as an artistic flop" ended on a sour note Sunday—its final performance rained out.

It was a typical ending for the much maligned hard rock show, which had been plagued from the start by one misfortune after another.

At its final hour, only about 400 music lovers were present. Promoters had expected more than 100,000 spectators but the total crowd reached only about one-fifth of that.

The festival twice was moved to different locations. It wound up at the site seven miles south of here when a court injunction kept it from being held at the tiny community of Dickens. Townspeople feared for their safety.

Then the unpredictable West Texas weather got into the act. Rain, snow, sleet and dust-blowing winds peppered the festival goers even before the scheduled opening last Thursday.

A mixup in electrical generators caused the festival to be postponed until Friday.

More than 200 law enforcement officers hovered over the gathering and at least 165 arrests resulted. By Sunday morning, sheriff's offices said there had been 50 persons named in felony complaints alleging sale and possession of marijuana. Another 15 were due to be charged.

Temperatures dipped into the low 30s overnight Saturday and fog harried spectators early Sunday leading up to the cancellation.

Military Court Tosses Out Murder Conviction

Will Sentence Duffy Tuesday

LONG BINH, Vietnam (AP) — A U.S. military court today threw out its murder conviction of 1st Lt. James B. Duffy because it didn't realize the conviction carried a mandatory life sentence, and found him guilty on two counts of manslaughter.

The court said it would sentence the 23-year-old officer from Claremont, Calif., Tuesday. The maximum prison sentence he could get is six years.

The court found Duffy guilty of involuntary manslaughter and conspiracy to commit involuntary manslaughter in the killing of a Vietnamese prisoner of war last Sept. 5.

OFF THE HOOK

Duffy's civilian attorney, Henry Rothblatt of New York, said earlier that the court's shift was a "nice chance to take the Army off the hook" and that he would view a manslaughter conviction as an acquittal.

The court on Sunday found Duffy guilty of conspiring with Sgt. John R. Lanasa, 23, of Baton Rouge, La., to kill a Vietnamese prisoner of war last Sept. 5. Lanasa, who is charged with firing the fatal shots, will go on trial soon.

After the murder verdict was returned, the president of the court, Col. Robert W. Selton,

said no member of the court was aware that the life sentence was mandatory. Military law allowed the court to reconsider the verdict, and it decided to do so.

UNTIL TOMORROW

"How do we overlook these things?" the court's military judge, or legal adviser, Col. Peter S. Wondolowski, asked Rothblatt.

"Your Honor, anything can happen in Vietnam," replied the noted criminal lawyer, who was introduced to the local legal situation as the attorney for several of the defendants in the Green Beret murder case.

"Well, I'm a free man—until tomorrow, anyway," said Duffy, who had admitted approving the killing and then telling his superior officer that the prisoner was shot trying to escape.

CLOUD THE ISSUE

After 4½ hours of deliberations today, the court asked its military judge, or legal adviser, Col. Peter S. Wondolowski, for instructions on the lesser charge of involuntary manslaughter.

The prosecution objected, contending that the question of voluntary manslaughter must be raised by evidence, not by the court itself.

The assistant trial counsel, Capt. Robert Bogan, 27, of New York, said the prosecution "cannot see any other crime than premeditated murder." He argued that to inject a new alternative would "cloud the issue."

Rothblatt countered that voluntary manslaughter "logically can be found from the facts of the case."

He cited testimony that Duffy had told Lanasa he could do what he wanted with the prisoner.

Bid To Kidnap Two Russian Diplomats

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — Four young men failed in an attempt to kidnap two Russian diplomats Sunday night, apparently to retaliate for the kidnaping last week of a non-Communist diplomat by a left-wing Argentine organization.

A patrolman opened fire as the kidnapers tried to drive off with their captives in a Soviet Embassy limousine. The shots smashed the rear window of the limousine and apparently wounded both diplomats and kidnapers.

Unconfirmed reports said the Soviet commercial attaché, Ivan N. Diakov, was one of the diplomats.

Beyond confirming that a kidnap had been attempted and had failed, the police and an embassy spokesman declined to give any information.

But a little-known right-wing organization called "Mano" hand-issued a communique describing the four kidnapers as "heroes."

Police said the Foreign Ministry would have to study the case

before they could make any statement. But Alberto Gonzalez Magno, chief of a local police office, denied a report that one of the injured kidnapers had been identified by a hospital nurse as a federal policeman.

Witnesses said the four young men, brandishing weapons, stopped the diplomats as they were garaging the embassy limousine after an outing with their wives and children.

The women and children were forced out of the car, and the terrorists started to drive off with the diplomats. But a patrolman was attracted by the screams of one of the wives and opened fire on the car, smashing the rear window. Witnesses said the car stopped for a moment and a man covered with blood rolled out. He staggered into the Soviet Embassy's commercial office and later was rushed to a hospital, according to unconfirmed reports.

Teenage Voting Bill Gains Ground

WASHINGTON (AP) — Strong support among House Democrats for lowering the voting age to 18 has overcome the resistance of Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., the proposal's chief foe.

Cells is now prepared to seek a House vote on accepting both the 18-year-old vote and an extension of the 1965 Voting Rights Act, earlier passed as a pack age by the Senate.

The 81-year-old chairman of the Judiciary Committee has not shifted in his opposition to teenage voting, but a 5-1 margin among his Democratic col-

leagues in favor of it has persuaded him to drop his effort to separate the age issue from the voting rights legislation.

Cells' main interest is in passing the Senate version of the Voting Rights Act. The measure retains the essential provisions of the 1965 act under which nearly a million blacks in seven Southern states have been registered to vote.

Cells lost by five votes last December when he tried to get a similar bill through the House, which instead passed an administration-backed substitute civil rights bill leaders regard as weaker than the present act.

Although a poll of House Democrats shows top-heavy support for the package, the Republicans are much more closely divided, with most of them declining to say how they will vote.

The administration not only favors its own version of the voting rights act, but opposes lowering the voting age by federal statute. It believes a constitutional amendment is required to set a voting age limit for all the states.

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White House 'Egg Heads'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thousands of children and their parents roamed the White House lawn today, braving 31 degree weather to roll Easter eggs.

Last year the annual Easter Egg Roll attracted 18,000 persons. Adults are admitted only when they are with a child under eight years of age. The age limit was lowered from 12 years this year in hopes of bringing in more toddlers.

The idea is to bring your own eggs, climb the gently sloping lawn and empty the basket to let the eggs tilt down the slope.

Col. Atkinson To Assume Command Of Webb Wing

Col. Anderson W. Atkinson is to assume the post of commander of the 3560th Pilot Training Wing at Webb AFB Wednesday morning.

There will be a formal change of command ceremony as Col. Atkinson succeeds Col. Harrison Lobdell Jr., who takes up duties as the base and wing commander of the 3510th Flying Training Wing at Randolph AFB the same day.

Col. Atkinson since last July has been deputy commander for operations at Webb. He is a former West Point classmate of Col. Lobdell.

He came to Webb from Da Nang Air Base, Vietnam, where he served as deputy commander for operations for the 366th Tactical Fighter Wing for six months. The wing flew F-4C Phantoms. Prior to that assignment, he was chief of the command and center branch, Operations, 7th Air Force at Tan Son Nhut AFB, Vietnam.

been affiliated with operations since entering the Air Force more than 23 years ago. He has been the DCO of the 15th Tactical Fighter Wing at MacDill AFB, Fla., as well as an opera-

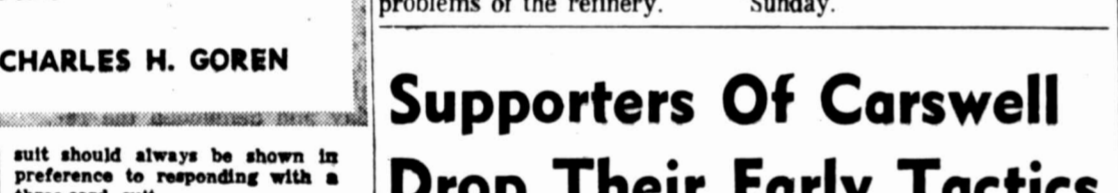

What do you bid? A—Four spades. First of all because there is a good chance you will make it and succeed because the enemy may have available a game contract in hearts which your action will serve to forestall.

Q. 2—Both vulnerable, you have 60 part score, and as South you hold: ♠KQ9 ♥AQ9 ♦AQ64 ♣J92

The bidding has proceeded: East South West North 1 ♣ Dble. 1 NT Pass Pass Dble. Pass 2 ♣ Pass Pass 2 ♣ Pass

What do you bid now? A—You hold a hand of considerable merit. Do not on that account, however, subject yourself to a deliberate loss. Pause for a moment to ask what are the chances of your making nine tricks with your poverty-stricken partner and you will see that discretion calls for a pass. You have given your all.

Q. 3—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠AKJ762 ♥4 ♦8432 ♣A3

The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1 ♣ Pass 2 ♣ Pass

What do you bid now? A—Your hand has very little in the way of defensive values. As a matter of fact, it is totally in partner's bid suit, which detracts from its value. It is therefore improbable that the three club contract can be defeated. In self-defense you should return to three spades.

Q. 4—As South, vulnerable, you hold: ♠J64 ♥10842 ♦843 ♣862

The bidding has proceeded: West North East South 1 ♣ Dble. Pass ?

What do you bid? A—Follow the example of the chap who said, "I seem my duty and I do it." Obviously bid two hearts, the best suit you have. Some players engage in the unsound practice of responding with two clubs on words like hands of this type. Such practice would be acceptable if you had no four-card suit of your own, but the natural four-card

suit should always be shown in preference to responding with a three-card suit.

Q. 5—Your partner has opened with one spade and you hold: ♠82 ♥93 ♦KJ9742 ♣KJ5

What is your response? A—One no trump. This hand is not quite strong enough to justify a response at the level of two in a new suit. It contains only eight points in high cards. It is true that valued at diamonds the hand is worth 10 points, but it is better policy not to make a forcing bid at the level of two with less than nine or 10 points in high cards.

Q. 6—Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠AK8 ♥AK74 ♦AQ88 ♣82

The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1 ♥ West 2 ♣ Pass ?

What do you bid now? A—Three diamonds. Your hand is worth 18 points valued at hearts and 17 at no trump. Therefore, one further try should be made. If partner merely returns to three hearts, you may pass but, if partner bids three no trump or four hearts, you should accept his choice of game.

Q. 7—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠A982 ♥J10943 ♦1054 ♣J

The bidding has proceeded: North East South West Pass Pass Pass 1 ♣ 1 ♣ Pass 2 ♣ 3 ♣ Dble. Pass ?

What do you bid now? A—Your hand has very little in the way of defensive values. As a matter of fact, it is totally in partner's bid suit, which detracts from its value. It is therefore improbable that the three club contract can be defeated. In self-defense you should return to three spades.

Q. 8—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠6 ♥A8 ♦KQ985 ♣AK963

The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1 ♠ 1 ♣ 2 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass

What do you bid now? A—Three hearts. Since partner has made a free bid at a high level, he undoubtedly has a good heart suit. Fate Of Cotton Broker Rests With Jurors

EDINBURG, Tex. (AP)—Six men and six women resumed jury deliberation today in the murder for hire trial of Pete Thomas Scamardo of Hearne.
The jury reported back to 92nd District Court at 9:30 a.m. after taking a long Easter holiday weekend recess. Dist. Judge J. R. Alama had recessed the jury last Thursday after members deliberated two hours and twenty minutes after receiving the case late in the afternoon.
Scamardo, 31, a cotton broker, is accused as an accomplice in the 1968 shooting death near McAllen of Sam Degelia Jr., his former business partner and longtime friend. The indictment alleges Scamardo offered Charles Harsellson of Houston \$2,000 to kill Degelia.
The prosecution, headed by Hidalgo County Dist. Atty. Oscar McInnis, claims Scamardo hired the killing in order to collect on a \$25,000 life insurance policy.
Degelia's body was found by a farmer in a shack southwest of McAllen July 11, 1968, some five days after the prominent Hearne grain broker vanished while on a business trip in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

President's Viet Goal Politically Tolerable?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. J. W. Fulbright says most Americans think President Nixon is getting the United States out of Vietnam, but he sees the President's goal as making continued U.S. presence there politically tolerable.
For this reason, the Arkansas Democrat said in an interview, he plans to press hearings by his Foreign Relations Committee on various aspects of U.S. involvement in Vietnam.
The next round, after the Senate's Easter holidays, will deal with the social and economic impact on South Vietnam of the large U.S. presence. The purpose, as with many of Fulbright's hearings, is to educate Americans.
"They think he is in the process of getting us out," he said. "I think he wants to make the continued U.S. presence in Vietnam politically tolerable."
The problem, Fulbright said, is how to get this point across. "If I knew that," he said, "it would be easy. That's what I'm groping for."
Sen. George D. Aiken, the committee's senior Republican, agreed with Fulbright that President Nixon's troop withdrawals have had a significant political impact on the entire war issue.
"When he started withdrawing the troops," Aiken said in a separate interview, "interest turned from it (Vietnam) to pollution and mediocrity and other matters."
But the Vermont Republican disagreed with Fulbright on how far the withdrawals will go.
"By the end of the President's term, we'll be pretty well out," he predicted, adding he expects any residual U.S. force to be far below the 200,000 some critics have forecast.
Fulbright said he was pleased with the State Department's decision to drop opposition to repeal of the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin resolution, calling it "further reason to go ahead now and liquidate our commitment in Vietnam."
The resolution, passed after enemy forces allegedly attacked U.S. Navy units in the gulf, was used as the basis for major American buildups that followed.
But Fulbright said a negotiated settlement is impossible as long as the United States clings to its insistence on maintaining, at least until new elections, the present South Vietnamese government.

Armored Units Pulled Off Cambodian Border

STAB WOUNDS
Lloyd Carpenter of Dallas died Sunday of stab wounds suffered when he and his wife surprised a burglar in their home. Police shot a man, 20, when he wielded a knife at an officer. Mrs. Carpenter was stabbed and in serious condition. The wounded man also was in serious condition.

FRACTURED SKULL
Robert Rickel, 17, of Munday was killed Saturday night in a head-on collision on Texas 24, from Chau Doc that elements of three armored squadrons and two ranger battalions pulled out of the border area during the last 24 hours and rushed 30 miles southwest to the Seven Mountains.
Officers told Putzel that the border operation had been completed and was not cut short to allow the shift to the area where North Vietnamese regulars in mountain caves and hideouts hurled rockets and mortars at government posts.
From 1,600-foot Nui Cam, they repeatedly shelled the district town of Tri Ton and the nearby Chi Lang military training center, the biggest in the delta, and inflicted scores of casualties.

TWO STRIKES
The U.S. Command helped out early today with two B52 strikes to back up continuing tactical air strikes and artillery fire against the mountain.
Allied officials in the Mekong Delta said the North Vietnamese attacks had not been anticipated even though the area has been under an acknowledged threat of a general attack since December.
Officials said the best explanation for the attacks that began Easter Eve was that the enemy forces were trying to draw South Vietnamese forces away from the border.
While casualty figures remained incomplete and in some cases contradictory, field reports said at least 14 Americans had been wounded—all of them in a North Vietnamese attack into a U.S. Special Forces compound near the Chi Lang training camp early Easter morning.
The latest reports were that 80-85 enemy troops had been killed, most of them in the series of ground attacks.
While some officials thought the North Vietnamese attacks might signal the start of a "spring campaign," the prevailing view was that they were diversionary moves to ease pressure on the enemy's infiltration routes through the western delta from Cambodia.

Friday and again Saturday, South Vietnamese rangers and armored troops crossed the frontier in that area and fought with Viet Cong forces on the Cambodian side, reporting 94 of the enemy killed in the two battles.
There were reports that the South Vietnamese may have made a third foray across the border on Sunday, but this could not be confirmed.
American officials refused to comment on a weekend trip into Cambodia by Col. Ernest P. Terrell Jr., senior U.S. adviser in Kien Tuong Province.
Accompanied by an American newsman, Terrell and a Vietnamese lieutenant crossed a few yards into Cambodia, about six miles north of the province capital of Moc Hoa, an area where Americans have been ordered to avoid any action which might disrupt the possibility of improved relations with Cambodia.

Program To Fight Hunger Falling Short Of Goals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate's special hunger committee charges a special federal program to fight malnutrition among pregnant women and children—especially infants—is falling far short of its goals.
In some cases, the Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs said, funds are given only after a person shows signs of malnutrition, rather than on a preventive basis to potential victims.
In other cases, the panel added, special packets of food are given only to those who ask for help with little effort made to bring in needy persons. In some areas authorities are illegally requiring birth certificates and statements of financial need.
The report of the committee headed by Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., was based on field studies last summer in seven states and the District of Columbia.
Besides the supplemental food program for would-be mothers and children, the committee staff also studied a project to provide food for children in day care centers and other non-school programs.
In evaluating the special non-school food program, the committee said emphasis was placed on established day care institutions with little effort to seek out areas of need.
"This resulted, especially in inner city areas, in an exclusion of small neighborhood day care centers which might not qualify for a state license or have the legal expertise to acquire a non-profit rating," the report said, adding "Yet these are the centers that are most in need."
The report generally praised another part of the program dealing with nutrition aides.
But the panel stressed "The aides have nothing tangible to give—neither money nor food resources to overcome this basic weakness, they are often prevented from performing their services, that of providing useful nutrition information."
States covered by the study included Virginia, Georgia, Texas, Tennessee, Arizona, Arkansas, Michigan and the District of Columbia. Cities covered were Detroit, Atlanta, Nashville, Norfolk and Washington.

Interest Mushrooms In Texas Museums

The mushrooming interest throughout Texas in the small local history museum was reflected in the third Texas Small Museum Institute held March 19-21 in Dallas. Meetings were held in the Museum of Natural Science at Fair Park.

The institute was co-sponsored for the first time this year by the Texas Historical Survey Committee and the newly-formed Texas Museum Association. Over 200 participants attended.

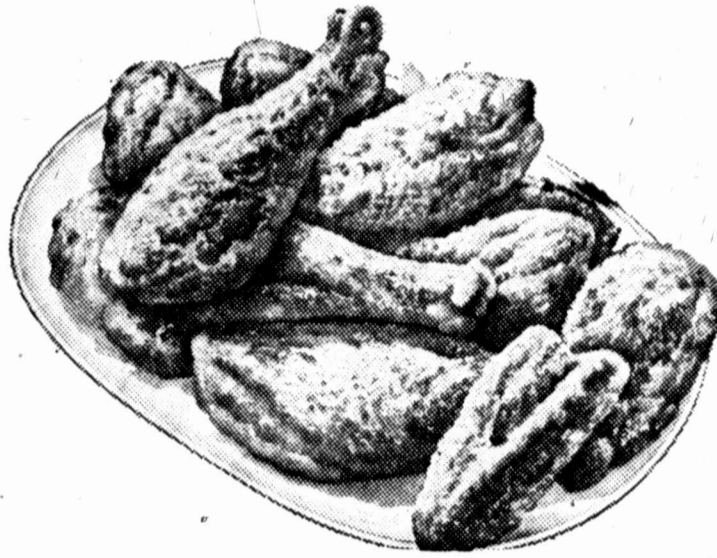

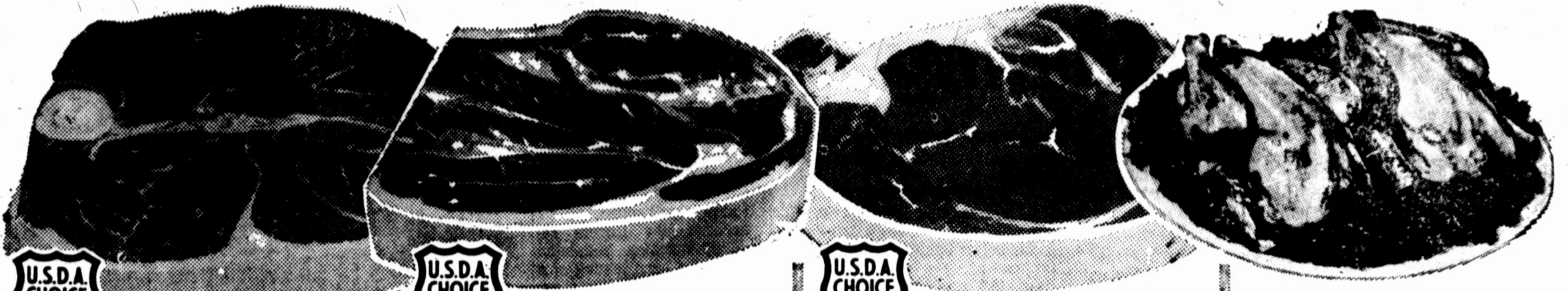

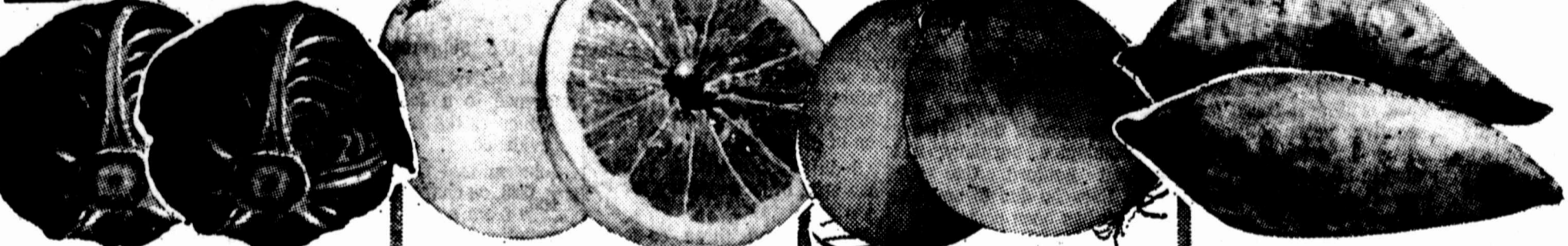

70 American Newsmen Will Visit POW Camps

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Some 70 American newsmen representing over 365 newspapers will leave Dallas Monday evening to visit prisoner of war facilities in South Vietnam where North Vietnam and Viet Cong prisoners are held.

A spokesman for the H. Ross Perot organization, "United We Stand," said the 70 newsmen will be accompanied by about 15 United We Stand and Braniff staff personnel for the trip on a chartered Braniff jet airliner.

About 15 more newsmen will join the group in San Diego and Saigon, the spokesman said. A number of foreign news agencies, three American and five foreign television networks and more than 45 independent U.S. radio and television stations will be represented.

The Perot spokesman said a number of Communist news agencies had been invited to make the trip but none had accepted by late Sunday night. The spokesman also said that word was being awaited from

Hanoi on a request for the journalists to tour detention camps in North Vietnam where American prisoners are held.

2 Korean Agents Killed In Sweep

SEOUL (AP) — A combined army-police force killed two North Korean agents in a sweep near the east coast port of Pohang, 160 miles southeast of Seoul, the Counter-Espionage Command announced today.

The operation was launched about three weeks ago after a small North Korean speedboat was found near Yongbok, 30 miles north of Pohang. One South Korean was killed in the sweep.

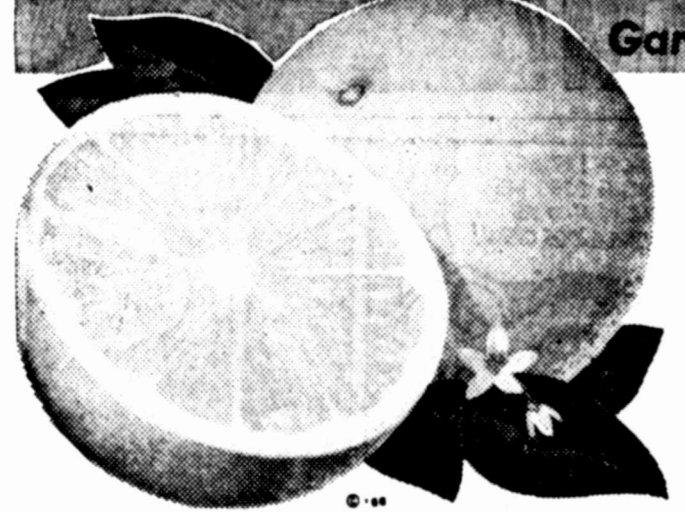

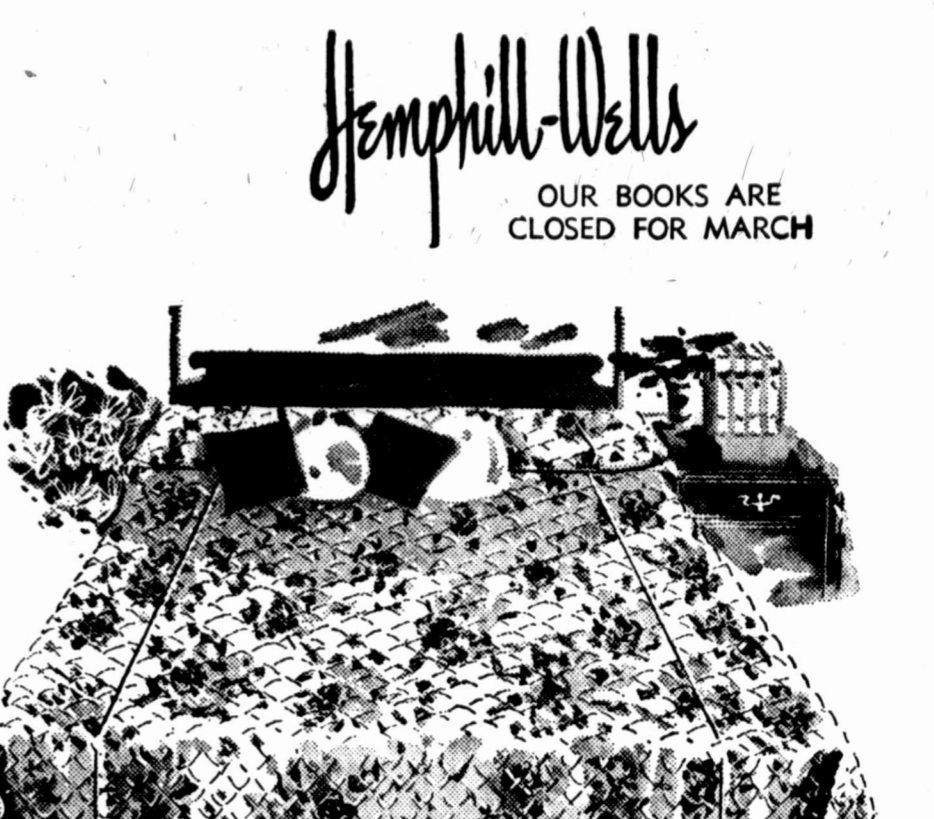
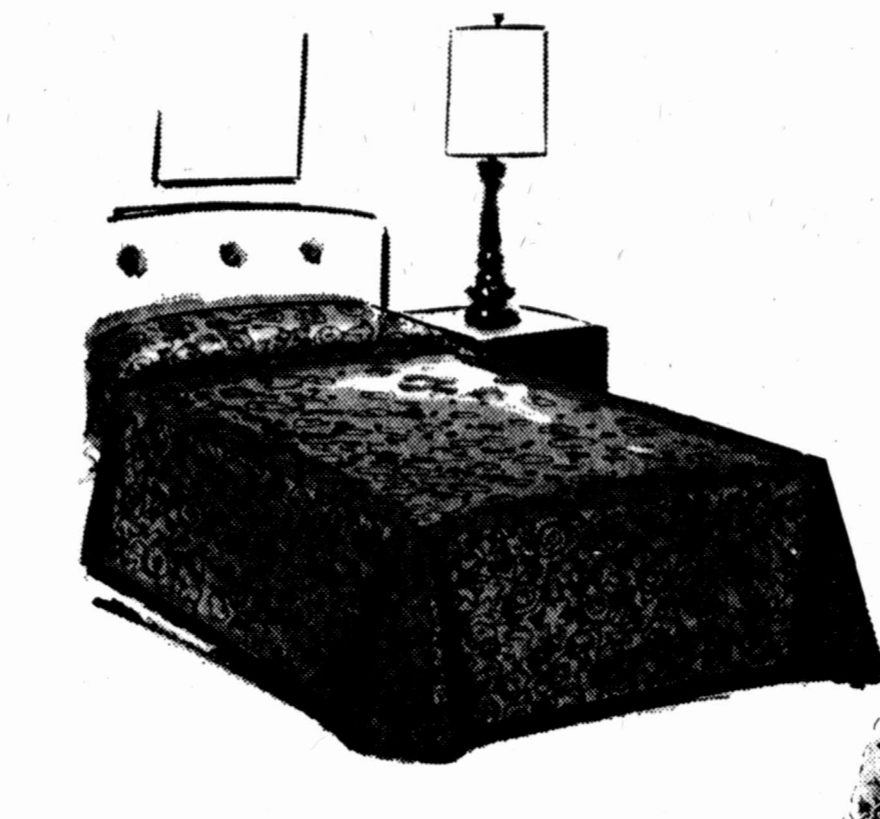

The Federal tax forms for 1969 tax returns have taken on a new look. The new format for the individual tax form 1040 is now only one page, and may be sufficient for most taxpayers. Separate schedules, to be used when necessary, replace the second page of the old 1040 form.

Newspaper Guild Seeks \$400 A Week

Theodore W. Kheel, who is mediating the talks said Sunday he doubted whether the issues would be resolved before the midnight deadline, but said he hoped talks would continue.

Newspapers involved in the talks are The New York Times, The Daily News, The Long Is., Land Press and The New York Post. The 10 unions represent about 13,000 employees.

Leaders of all 10 unions scheduled a meeting for 7 p.m. to review the status of their respective negotiations and to assess whatever wage offer is on the table at that time.
