NORTH KOREANS PROMISE TO FREE PASSENGERS

Hijackers Get Green Light

SEOUL (AP) — North Korea gave a go-ahead today for a hijacked Japanese airliner grounded here to land in Pyongyang, and the plane's hijackers demanded to be flown north at

daybreak Thursday. In a radiotelephone conversation with a Japanese official, a spokesman for the 15-odd Japanese radical students who seized the plane Tuesday demanded that the plane depart for Pyonp.m. EST today.

In the past the students have demanded that the plane's 100 crew members and passengers -among them two Americans -make the trip to North Korea with them. The North Korean announcement said the passengers and crew would be sent back to Japan immediately.

But it added: "Our side cannot assume responsibility for a possible accident on the plane itself.'

Army Charges Capt. Medina With Murder

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The Army charged Capt. Ernest L. Medina today with murder in the 1968 attack on My Lai, and said the charge makes him responsible for the 102 alleged slayings for which Lt. William L. Calley Jr., will be tried next

The announcement from 3rd Army at Ft. McPherson here said the charge was based on evidence obtained by U.S. Army Criminal Intelligence Division

A spokesman said that Modina was charged as a principal under the Uniform Code of Military Justice, and did not have to be present during the alleged killings to be held responsible.

The Army said. "The new charge alleges violation of Article 118, UCMJ, in that Capt. Medina was responsible for the alleged murder of Vietnamese noncombatant persons allegedly committed by members of his company in the village of Song My (My Lai) on 16 March 1968."

Medina, 33, of Pico Rivera, Calif., earlier was charged with murdering four persons, maiming one and assault with a deadly weapon. The earlier charge, filed March 10. accused Mediaa of the "murder of two persons on or about 16 March 1968. maiming and murder of one suspected enemy person, and murder of another, during their interrogation, late in the day of about 16 March 1968, and assault with a deadly weapon on a third individual while interrogating him on or about 17 March 1968." However, the charge filed today was ubstituted for one filed March 17, accusing him of concealing knowledge of a felony.

Medina commanded Company C. 1st Battalion, 20th Infantry, 11th Brigade of the Americal Division in Vietnam.

Company C joined two other infantry companies early in 1968 to form Task Force Baker, which conducted the raid on My



Reports were still incomplete, but the allied commands and other sources in Saigon said casualties were at least 38 Americans killed and 184 wounded, 65 South Vietnamese troops killed and 176 wounded, and 240 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong killed.

The enemy inflicted serious American and South Vietnamese casualties in more than a dozen of the attacks and at the same time kept their own casualties down by employing rockets, mortars and small commando-sapper units hurling dynamite bombs and firing rocket grenades.

The U.S. Command termed the attacks a "highpoint" of enemy activity but said the sharp increase in activity would not be considered a spring offensive unless it continued.

The U.S. Command also announced that a U.S. Air Force F4 Phantom fighter-bomber was hit by ground fire over North Vietnam Monday but said the two crewmen nursed it to within 41/2 miles of their base in Thailand before the plane crashed. The two crewmen ejected safely, but two Thai civilians were injured.

Harrold Carswell from being confirmed as a justice of the Supreme Court of the United States persons in public life today made just because he doesn't hold views speeches of the same kind in the satisfactory to racial groups and some labor-union partisans.

What do you say of the verse in the Bible, "Spare the rod and spoil the child." So many parents think this gives them the right to use brutality with their children. I know so many parents who are brutal with their children. Please say a word about this in your column. M.H.K. The Bible advocates the discipline of children, but it certainly does not approve of brutality. The "rod" must be used discreetly — just enough to hurt the feelings of the child, but not enough to injure him. There are civil laws against brutality, and they are rather severe. Many cruel parents have been arrested and sentenced for

being brutal. But, having said that, I don't believe this is the problem with the average parent of today. This is the age of permissivism, and most parents obey their children instad of vice versa. In one state they just legalized "spankings" in school. The authorities reasoned that the parents were not disciplining their children, and that it would be in the best interest of the child to allow the school teachers to do what many of the parents were failing to do.

We live in a world of law, and if a child is not trained to respect the laws of the home, he may not respect the laws of the land. I don't mean that the home should be under military law, but a little more order in our homes would be better for both parents and children. My parents spanked me, and I certainly don't think I am any worse for it. But, again, they did it in love, and not on many fronts. in angered brutality.

Judge Haynsworth, whose nomination was rejected, continues also as chief judge of the Fourth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. It may be asked ironically why these two men are eligible to remain on the federal bench in the second highest court of the land if they are not acceptable for promotion to the Supreme Court just because partisan groups can gather enough votes

THROUGHOUT our history the Supreme Court has prided itself on indifference to party politics and a devotion to basic principles of law as set forth in the Constitution. But in recent years even these precedents have been broken down, and the Supreme Court has undertaken at times to "rewrite" the Constitution. The British government started off the New Year on a happy note by lifting most restrictions on the amount of money Britons can spend on vacations abroad. A technical limitation of \$720 per trip will remain in force, but the amount is large enough to cover the cost of most vacations and there is no restriction on the number of \$720 excursions that can be taken each vear.

Since World War II, with the exception of a four-month period in 1947, there have been restrictions of one sort or another on the amount of money Britons could take out of the country.

Around The Rim

Boasting About Big Spring

came out with a 24-page edition telling the virtues of the city and Howard County. Our files of the old Herald are sketchy, and we would not have known about this one had not Minnie Earl Johnson brought in a copy of the Pantagraph of (June 4, 1892), plus a copy of the Daily Venture (May 22, 1899) for our inspection. The latter two are worthy of a story within themselves, so let's glimpse at just a few things in the 1908 booster

ONE OF THE MAIN reasons was the recently completed "Big Springs Railroad shops and Division Office," as an eight-column banner described it. The decision to build the facility had been reached in 1906, but the Herald noted that "the chief engineer in his survey set his compass to come by the Springs . . . the value of the spring was then appreciated."

THE HANDSOME native stone new shops for the Rio Grande Division had been built at a cost of \$300,000, an impressive sum in those days. The shops required 400 men who drew an amazing payroll of half a million dollars annually. "The hum of machinery is a familiar sound and the big payrolls may almost be called the life blood of the city," the paper noted, predicting that "when the present stringency affecting the railroad world is past, there is no doubt of the substantial increase in force." It also noted that "the hoarse whistle of the shops which now arouses hundreds of shop men to work is now the most cheerful sound in the

Apparently some were skeptical about rain because the Herald said "the man who is kept away from Howard County for fear that we do not have enough rain is probably the one who lets crabgrass take his crop in Shelby County.

C. E. SCOTT posed in his orchard at the east edge of town. J. B. D. Boydstun recalled how he had experimented with tomatoes and melons in 1883. The following year he harvested \$500 of melons from an acre and a half, and in 1891 sold \$1,030 in fruit from a small orchard. The Herald said that land here would grow five to eight tons of sorghum per acre, 40-100 bushels of milo, 20-40 bushels of corn, as well as one-third to threefourths bales of cotton per acre. Besides, it added, the climate was perfect and "malaria is unknown."

AS FOR THAT climate, the Herald added: "Big Spring is the best location in Texas, possibly the best in the world for building a successful sanitarium." Not given to stinting on challenges, the paper also said "a college should come, an institution prepared to enroll at least 500."

The town was not lagging behind the times. L. L. Stephenson owned and operated Big Spring Electric and Power, and L. F. Nall operated Big Spring Ice Manufacturing, complete with a bottling works.'

Abortion Laws

Under Strong Pressure From Women's Groups By LOUISE COOK

Three years ago, the New York

State Assembly Codes Committee took made . . . is fantastic," said Dr. Alan only 90 minutes to kill an attempt to reform the state's 19th century abortion law. Two days ago, the state Senate,

considered the more conservative of the two houses, passed and sent to the Assembly a bill that not only reforms the law but repeals all restrictions on abortions performed by licensed doctors.

The Assembly will consider the bill next week and chances of passage are considered good. Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller is on record as favoring abortion reform, although he has not endorsed this particular bill.

AN ASSOCIATED Press survey of the 50 states and Washington, D.C., disclosed that in more than half the states it is still impossible for a woman to get an abortion unless her life is threatened.

But the change in climate in New York is typical of much of the country, with relaxed moral standards and strong pressure from women's groups, doctors and social workers combining to make abortion reform if not politically popular, at least not politically suicidal.

There has been more reform since 1967 — when Colorado became the first state to liberalize its abortion

law - than in the century before

"THE PROGRESS that's been Guttmacher, head of the Planned Parenthood-World Population Association. "Nobody could have dreamed this degree of progress. We're now more concerned with the quality of population than the quantity.

Since 1967, 11 states have followed Colorado's lead, adopting laws that permit abortion if the mother's mental or physical health is threatened; if the pregnancy results from rape or incest, or if there is a substantial chance the baby will be born deformed.

All require that abortions be performed by licensed physicians and some require approval by a hospital board. Most have residency requirements. And, despite fears, none has become an "abortion capital."

IN TEXAS, current law, written in 1925, states simply that an abortion is illegal unless it is necessary to save the mother's life and must be performed in a hospital upon medical

Pending in a Dallas federal court are suits filed by a single woman and a married couple challenging the state law. The suits claim the law deprives them of "the fundamental right of all women to choose whether to bear children" and thus violate their constitutional rights. No date has been set for a trial.

Andrew Tully The Relief Check Goes On Forever

WASHINGTON - As Plato or be given without interruption until a somebody once said, it's only money, but April 15 is just around the corner and so it may be relevant to report that the Supreme Court's latest adventure in legislating will cost the American taxpayers upwards to \$1 billion a year.

A Health, Education, and Welfare Department expert offered this estimate of the price tag on the Court's ruling that welfare recipients may not be cut off the relief rolls without a hearing. As he put it, "A lot of creeps who are cut off for cause are now going to fight for their rights just to get those extra relief checks while their cases are being adjudicated."

THE COURT'S 5-3 decision said a recipient must be given a chance to be heard in person by a responsibile official, to know the adverse evidence against him, to cross-examine hostile witnesses, and to be represented by a lawyer if he so wishes. In the meantime, of course, he continues to receive his relief check, and as Justice Hugo Black noted, the government won't be able to collect for payments that prove unjustified after lengthy administrative and court proceedings.

THIS MIGHT be endurable had the majority not resorted to such curious constitutional thinking. Its ruling, as written by Justice William J. Brennan Jr., insisted that public assistance is "not mere charity, but a means to promote the general welfare and secure the blessings of liberty as stated in the Constitution's Preamble." Thus Brennan concluded, the branches. Constitution requires relief payments

THIS IS TWADDLE. The mere fact that a government sets the amount of welfare to be doled out emphasizes that it is "mere charity." Otherwise, at individual could successfully demand as many dollars per week as he claims he needs to subsist indeed. In his dissent, Black termed welfare a "gratuity," which he said is "nice for those who do not work but receive payments from . . . those who do work.'

Despite Brennan's reference to the 'general welfare" and the "blessings of liberty," nothing in the Constitution obligates any government unit to establish a dole, possibly because in those days being on relief was not considered chic.

FOR THE MAJORITY, Brennan declared that cutting off relief checks without hearings denied the welfare recipients their 14th Amendment right to due process of law. Black gave this argument the back of his hand. "Even the Supreme Court," said Black, should be capable of discovering that the Constitution's due process clause applies only to a denial of a person's property and not to any claim against the government.

Grand Jury Indicts Texas Lawmaker

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. John Dowdy, a conservative and colorful East Taxas Democrat with nearly 20 years in Congress, has been with taking a \$25,000 bribe to intervene in a federal investigation of fraud by a now-defunct construction company.

His indictment Tuesday by a federal grand jury in Battimore charges Dowdy with picking up a cash-filled briefcase in a 1955 airport rendezvous, two counts of conspiracy to obstruct the investigation and five counts of perjury in lying before the grand jury last March 4.

If convicted on all eight counts he could receive a maximum of 22 years in prison and \$80,000 in fines.

"I am absolutely not guilty of any wrongdoing or violation of any laws of the United States,' said the 58-year-old Dowdy, who is unopposed in both the May Democratic primary and the fall general election for a 10th full term in the House.

Indicted with Dowdy were Myrvin C. Clark, former sales manager of the Maryland construction firm that was subject of the investigation in which Dowdy allegedly intervened, and Hugh J. McGee, a Washington lawyer.
