**GENEALOGY**, or the tracing of one's family tree, is now the number one pastime in the nation, we heard the other day.

Certainly the quest for one's family beginnings was given a big impetus by the television special "Roots" a couple of winters ago, and apparently the hobby has been growing by leaps and bounds ever since.

We had always been interested in family history, but really were bit by the genealogy bug early this year, and can attest to the fact that it's a very contagious "disease."

We attended the Texas State Genealogical Society's annual convention in Amarillo last weekend, and discovered that there is a considerable number of us "Genealogy Nuts," especially as evidenced by the number of people who came from as far as Dallas, Austin, Oklahoma City, and even Tacoma, Washington, for the convention.

**Genealogy is a fascinating and rewarding hobby, especially if you enjoy history, and particularly if you have any latent ambitions for being a detective, who can piece together long lost clues in solving your family "mystery."**

The tracing of family roots definitely entails a certain amount of research, that is unless you just want to hire a professional to do all of the research for you. But, that is half of the fun—being able to unravel mysteries such as what ever happened to Uncle Bob, or where the family really lived in 1850.

It's a time consuming hobby as well, and we can see why a good many of the people who have taken up genealogy are retired, or at least semi-retired. It could very easily be a full time avocation.

In the short time we have been pursuing genealogy, we have had to re-evaluate our opinion of the people who lived around 100 years ago.

We had been under the mistaken impression that people who lived back during the "horse and buggy" days were somewhat limited as to transportation and moving, and that perhaps if you "found" your relatives in a particular location, perhaps you could expect to find them in the same county's census records ten or twenty years later.

Nothing could be further from the truth! We have decided that there must have been some "Gypsy blood" in our ancestry, judged by the way that the families moved around.

But in visiting with other family tracers, we find that it wasn't just our own family, but that every family had a pattern of moving, and it can be tied directly to the manner in which our country was settled.

Most families in this area trace their American beginnings back to the Carolinas or Virginia as their "landing point." From there, they migrated, either into Tennessee, Kentucky or one of the adjacent states, as those states were settled and free land was made available. And in our case, they migrated on to Texas during the time that our state was the "frontier."

On the subject of the mobility of the pioneers, in the case of one of our family branches, we found that a family which had settled over in Montague County in North Texas got the wandering fever back in the 1880s and made a 2,000-mile covered wagon trip out to Oregon, to try their luck in that far-off land.

In another case, a group of our Mobley relatives who had moved to Texas in the early 1850s packed up their belongings and went back to Tennessee during the latter part of the Civil War, to see if their relations they had left behind had survived the war.

After they had stayed a few years, and the war was ended, this family, just as if they could call the Atlas Moving Company, packed up again and returned to Texas.

If you enjoy family ties and the stories that are passed down from generation to generation, you should give genealogy a try. But we should also issue this warning: It can be habit forming!

**WE HAVE TO ADD** our plaudits to the Friona Thespian Troupe, for great productions this week of "Cinderella."

The Thespian's annual productions have gotten better and better in the 17 years we have been watching them, and in recent years, the production such as the scenery, music, costumes, etc., has gained big strides.

## Weather On Mild Side Here

Indian Summer prevailed for one more week in the Friona area the past week, with daytime temperatures warm, and nighttime temperatures mild for the most part.

The first official freezing temperature of the season was recorded on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, when the mercury fell to 32 degrees both mornings.

Whether or not it was actually a hard freeze is still under debate, however, since some tomato plants, as well as cotton plants, may have survived.

However, if the weatherman's current prediction comes true, the next northern blast may leave no doubt as to freezing temperatures, as cold and snow are being predicted for the area sometime Saturday or Sunday.

Last Friday afternoon, the Friona area was hit with a deluge of rain that dropped 1.65 inches on the area in a relatively short time.

The rain halted the cotton and sugar beet harvest which had begun, but added moisture for the wheat farmers, and put some good underground moisture into the subsoil.

## Friona Voters Stay In Winners' Column

Friona voters pretty well matched the trend across the area and state on Tuesday with their record at the poll during the General Election.

Voters in the Friona box gave Senator John Tower a 516-331 margin over challenger Bob Krueger. Tower thus held a 60.9 per cent lead in the Friona box. Countywide, Tower also won with 1376 votes, to 954 for Krueger, or 59 per cent for Tower.

The Friona box also went for winner Bill Clements, the first Republican to gain the governor's office in over 100 years, by a margin of 501-355 over Attorney-General John Hill. Clements thus had a 58.5 per cent margin in Friona.

He also had a close win in Parmer County, aided by his Friona triumph, 1212 votes to 1164 for Hill. This edge, an even 51 per cent, more closely matched his razor-thin win margin in the statewide totals.

Friona gave Dimmitt neighbor Kent Hance a rousing sendoff in his successful bid to become U.S. Congressman. Hance polled 603 votes in the Friona box, to just 239 for George Bush, giving him 71.6 per cent of the total.

Hance easily won every voting box in the county, and had a 1,002-vote lead in Parmer County, 1665-663. Parmer County was one of only six counties to give the congressman-elect that much of a margin, and it helped his cause in the come-from-behind win.

Bush had grabbed the lead on the early returns Tuesday night, and his lead reached over 6,000 votes at one stage, before the heavy Lubbock vote and the rural northern counties, Hance's "home territory," turned the tide in his favor.

The Farwell voting box was the only county box in which Bush threatened, getting 42 per cent of the total, although Hance still led, 236-169. Hance carried a 71.5 per cent majority in the county totals, and carried 75.4 per cent of the county excluding the afore-mentioned Farwell totals.

City and county voters went for incumbent lieutenant governor W.P. Hobby, but Friona voters favored Jim Baker over John White in the attorney-general's race, 430 to 403. County totals were 1188 for White to 1083 for Baker.

The final unofficial totals showed that Hance was the winner of the race with 54,690 votes, to 48,056 for Bush.

Friona voters, who did a considerable amount of split-ticket voting, favored Jim Baker in the Attorney General's race, 430-403.

County Commissioners elected on Tuesday were Jack Patterson in the Bovina-Rhea precinct and Raymond McGehee at Lazbuddie.

Patterson won by a 311-219 vote margin over Republican Vernon Estes. The winner carried the

Bovina box, 231 votes to 204, and almost scored a shutout in his home box of Rhea, 58-1. Patterson also won the absentee box, 22-14.

At Lazbuddie, McGehee ousted incumbent Jimmy Briggs by a 225-131 margin. The commissioner's race at Lazbuddie attracted 338 voters, or a whopping 76.8 per cent of the qualified voters in that precinct. Lazbuddie was the only voting box to outdraw its presidential total of 1976.

The turnout of voters in Friona and Parmer County was above average, according to state totals, where only 37 to 40 per cent of the eligible voters went to the polls.

Friona had a turnout of 47 per cent. Its turnout of 871 was considerably less than the 1,358 which voted in 1976, but bettered the 780 of 1974, the last non-presidential general election. For the county as a whole, 53 per cent of the qualified voters went to the polls.

Tower won every voting box in the county, his closest margin being at Oklahoma Lane, 69 to 60 for Krueger.

Clements won only four out of the nine county voting boxes, counting the absentee box, but his margin of victory at Friona put Parmer County into the Clements column.

Hill won at Black, 26-16, Bovina, 258-179, Lazbuddie, 167-162, Oklahoma Lane, 70-57 and the absentees, 32-29. One of the Clements boxes was at Rhea, by only one vote, 29-28.

In amendment voting, Parmer County voters went overwhelmingly in favor of the proposed tax reform amendment, but were not quite as kind to some of the others.

Voters did approve the first amendment (allowing changing reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum"), by 1224 to 756. The fourth amendment, authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices, was okayed, 1197 to 856.

JeDon Gallman has been named rural chairman for the 1978 drive.

Wilshire will head the drive for the

business district, and Smiley will head the residential drive.

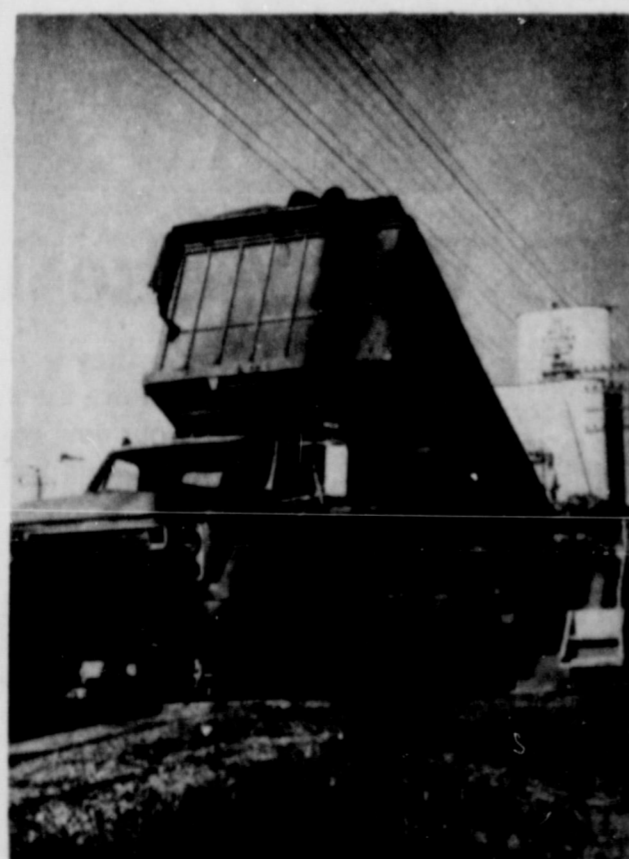

**WEEK'S WINNER....Bruce Patterson, eighth-grade Friona student, was the winner in the Friona Star's weekly football contest with a score**

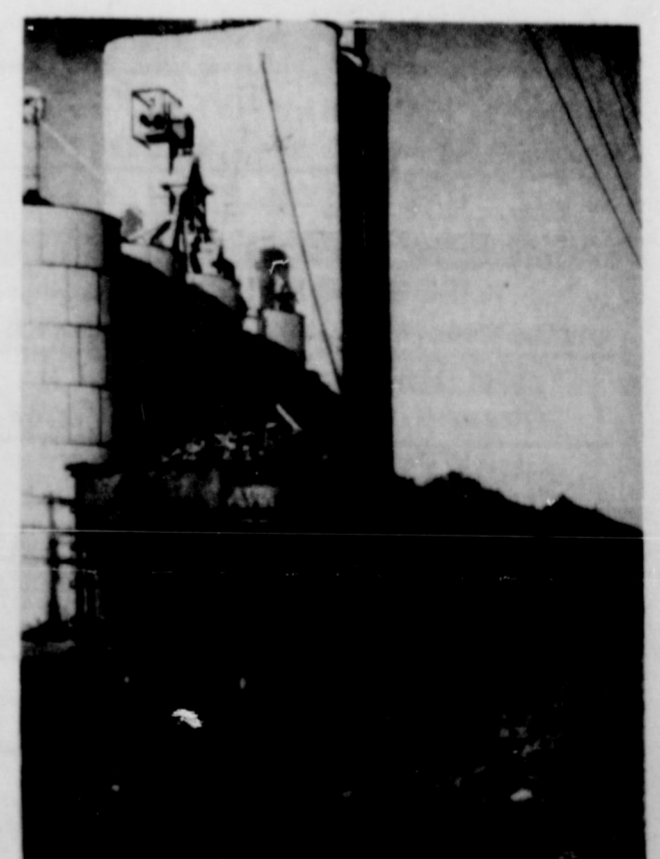

## At Home In Parmer County

Do you have an older adult at your house? If you do, then you know the special joys as well as special challenges of having them with you.

To better understand the older people with whom we have contact, we need to become more sensitive to some of the problems older people have as a result of advancing years.

Improved home lighting and convenient fixtures and switches aid older adults. Many older adults require about twice the level of illumination as do younger people with good vision. However, while more lighting is needed, the elderly are especially sensitive to glare. Minimize glare by using frosted or shaded bulbs.

Adapting to dark and light takes up to three times longer for older adults. Night lights in bedrooms, bathrooms and hallways can aid in this transition. Incandescent lighting is recommended because the flicker of fluorescent lighting is troublesome. Avoid exposed bulbs because after-image hinders vision.

Wall fixtures and ceiling lights that pull down make bulb changing easier for wheelchair users and remove the temptation to stand on a chair to change a ceiling light bulb. Three-way switches—with the first one at the front door—eliminate groping in the dark. Luminous switches are also helpful.

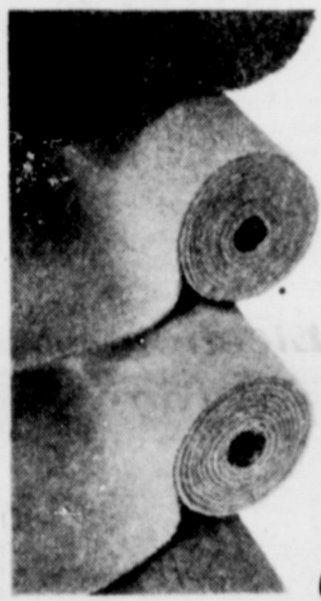

Center Norris Cole at 200 and tackle Leslie Heard, also a 200-pounder, give the Bobcats some good size, along with Roberts, who weighs 190.

## Local Agency Wins Honor

Friona Ford Sales was named tops in sales for dealerships their size (judging by volume categories) in the Phoenix district. It was announced this week. The competition was held in conjunction with Ford's 75th Jubilee Jamboree.

It was the fourth straight month for the Parmer County Ford dealership to win the honors.

"We were extremely pleased to win the sales competition. We appreciate the help of those who made it possible," said Roger Wilcox of the Friona agency.

To commemorate the showing, Ford Motor Company presented a gold watch to V.R. Wilcox, one of the co-owners.

Amendment number five, which would have extended the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases, was denied, 1072-937. Number six, which would have increased the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, was defeated here, 1027-941.

Proposal number seven, to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission, was denied, 1113-796.

# Friona Company Report Good

Friona Industries, Inc. today reported net income of almost \$1.2 million, or 92 cents per share, on revenues of approximately \$23.6 million for its first quarter ended September 30, 1978.

This compared with net income of \$330,000, or 27 cents per share, on revenues of \$15 million in the first quarter of the prior fiscal year.

"Continued favorable market conditions in the cattle industry helped the Company achieve its best first quarter financial results ever," Ron Davenport, president, told shareholders at their annual meeting in Friona today.

The Company Cattle and Custom Feeding segments of business produced the majority of the earnings. However, all segments,

including Commercial Feed, Animal Health and Grain, were substantially ahead of the first quarter of the previous fiscal year.

Gross profit of about \$378,000 from Commercial Feed was almost 3 times greater than in the same period of the prior year, mainly because of the considerable improvement in feedyard occupancy in the Company's operating area.

The sale of animal health supplies and other agricultural products such as insecticides increased about 43 per cent when compared with the same quarter of last year, and gross profit from this segment of business exceeded \$453,000, up 33 per cent.

Custom Feeding revenues more than doubled and gross profit of \$685,000 was 95 per cent higher when compared with the same quarter of fiscal 1978. This was chiefly the result of a major increase—57 per cent—in the number of cattle in the Company's three feedyards. Average occupancy for the quarter was more than 88 per cent.

Gross profit generated by the sale of approximately 16,600 head of Company-owned cattle was also the best for any quarter ever, and totaled more than \$1.6 million, or 3 times greater than in the same period of last year when about 15,000 head were marketed.

"Because of improved cattle prices on a year-to-year comparison basis, Company-owned cattle achieved a good margin of profitability. The number of cattle currently in feedyards indicates that our overall operations should continue at profitable levels. However, as is traditional in our industry, there will probably be fluctuations in the market price for fat cattle, which could from time to time decrease profit margins on the sale of Company-owned cattle," said Davenport.

Gross profit for Grain and other operations, including grain handling and steel fabrication, was approximately \$21,000, or an increase of 47 per cent.

The board of directors approved a quarterly cash dividend of 10 cents per share on the common stock. It is payable February 1, 1979, to share holders of record as of January 18, 1979.

During the annual meeting, shareholders approved a resolution to increase the authorized number of the Company's shares of common stock from 3 million to 5 million shares and to create a new class of 2 million shares of preferred stock. This was done for the purpose of providing the Company with alternatives and flexibility with respect to corporate financing and future acquisitions.

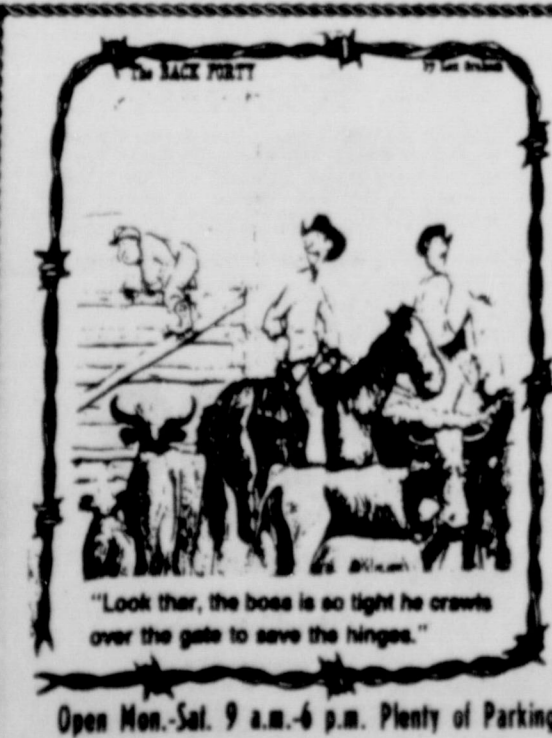

## Leaders Speak At Bovina's Rally

The American Agricultural Movement held a rally at the Bovina High School Auditorium Monday night. The purpose of the meeting was to reorganize the A.A.M. in this area, and to plan events for 1979.

Rev. Dick Richards opened the meeting with a prayer and followed with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Kent Hance, candidate for U.S. Representative, gave a short speech on the things he planned to do if elected and urged everyone to get out and vote.

The main speaker for the rally, Gene Schroder, gave a very interesting program on economics and the "Cheap Food Policy" that the government has been following. Schroder is one of the organizers of the A.A.M.

Gerald McCathern, author of "From the White House to the Hoosgow," a book about last year's A.A.M. activities, was another speaker at the rally. McCathern talked about activities and events planned for 1979.

The main topic of his talk was another proposed tractor-cade to Washington, D.C. Plans are for the largest tractor-cade ever to make the trip. Amarillo (starting point for this area) will be the scene of the kick-off of the tractor-cade. The tractors will be joined along the way by tractors from other areas. The event is scheduled to begin on the day that Congress opens in January.

Other speakers at the rally included Lori Schroder and Jerry Wright.

The meeting was adjourned and coffee and donuts, compliments of Agri-Sprayers and Ralph's Funk Seeds, were served.

On a late note...the Star was informed by Ralph Roming, spokesman for the A.A.M. in this area, that when he and his wife Donna took guest speakers Gene Schroder, Lori Schroder and Jerry Wright to the airport in Clovis, they found that their plane had been stolen.

The plane, a 1975 Cessna 206 owned by Lyndon Flying Service in Lamar, Colorado, was taken sometime during the rally in Bovina.

Authorities in Clovis and Curry County are still investigating the incident at this time.

The AAM leaders gave some quotes from a letter written by a leader in the farm movement:

"Trying to help a farmer is much like trying to save the life of a drowning man. If you approach him from the wrong position, you might be drowned yourself by his frantic thrashings, while you were only trying to help him to safety.

To some people, it is impossible to understand how anyone could sacrifice time and money in the service of his fellow farmers and his country, without any thought for personal gain or profit. Maybe they question and criticize other's motives so that they will have a good excuse not to participate in activities that might cost them some personal sacrifice. Perhaps they are admitting that in the same position, they would try for personal profit!

If this attitude had prevailed in 1776, the United States would still be an English colony. If the same attitude continues much longer, we will, in all likelihood, be someone else's colony in the near future. For when a society such as ours no longer has its rebels; men who are willing to take a chance or make a sacrifice for the betterment of that society, no matter what the personal cost, then we have lost our way of life!

## ASCS Gives Details For Loans

1978 crop corn may now be placed under CCC loan for a period of three years.

This is the loan program where producers may isolate their crop from the market for a period of three years—or, until the price reaches an acceptable level. Under this program, CCC pays the storage on the corn placed under loan. Storage payment is made (25 cents per bushel) at the time the three year agreement is entered into.

Of course, the producer agrees to

leave his corn under loan until the market reaches a certain level—or, refund some or all of the storage payments advanced to him. Also, interest stops on this type of loan after the reserve agreement has been in effect for one year.

This program was developed with the thought in mind that by isolating some of the grains from the market that prices would strengthen. It being thought that this program—plus the set-aside program would improve prices farmers receive for their crops.

It is not known just how much effect these programs have had on the price of corn—but, something has sure helped it lately. No doubt, these programs had some bearing on the more favorable prices.

Any corn producer who plans to hold his (her) corn off the market for a period of time might do well to look into the holding program offered thru this three-year reserve loan program.

Following the service there will be a time of fellowship in the Fellowship Hall of First Baptist Church. The ladies of the churches will bring cookies and other goodies, the ladies of First Baptist Church will furnish the drinks.

An offering will be taken at the

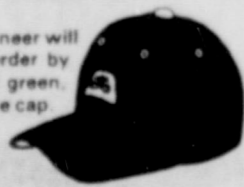

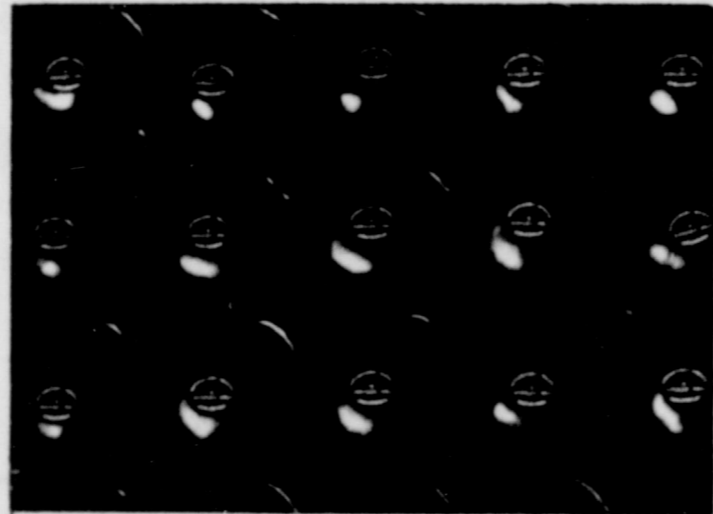

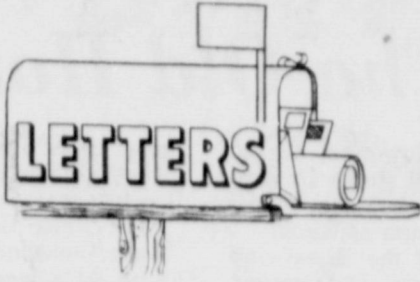

## To The Editor

It is natural for a farmer to find it hard to accept a leader. All farmers are leaders in their own right. Maybe the reason the American Agriculture Movement has been so successful is that anyone can be a leader. We are all going in the same direction at the same time, and whoever happens to get in front ends up as the leader.

Many people who would be leaders have been disappointed when no one in the movement would follow them. By the same token, others who would rather just be participants, have been called on to speak for the movement because of their unique ability to communicate, when the rest of us just stammer and stumble. Many times, statements are made by these spokesmen that some of us may not completely agree with. At the same time, you will still be critical of the very ones who fought your fight, and won your prices.

I would also say this; the news media and especially the politicians tell us that we farmers are very few in numbers. This is true, and figures are now showing that there are about 489,000 fewer of us this year

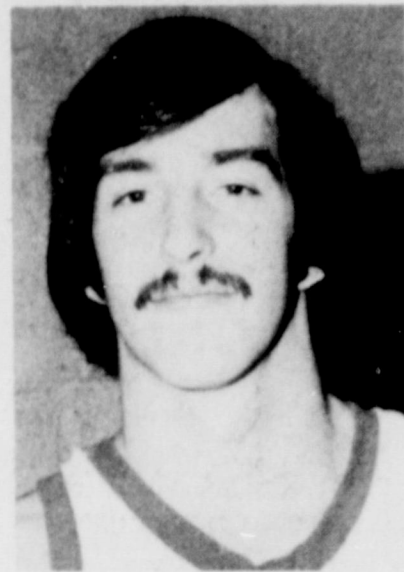
than last! If any of us are to survive, we cannot afford jealousies and egos that would divide us and keep us from working together. ## Local Residents Are Urged To Mail Early

It is not too early to remind everyone to SHOP EARLY and MAIL EARLY. In fact, all packages bound for overseas address must be mailed not later than Monday, November 13. Christmas is ONLY seven weeks away.

Regular surface transportation mail to friends, relatives and members of the Armed Force with foreign country addresses must be mailed by Monday, November 13 if the sender desires before Christmas delivery.

Air mailed parcels, including SAM and PAL to members of the Armed Force, must be mailed not later than November 30 for delivery by Christmas.

The Postmaster suggests a sheet of paper be included inside the parcel box indicating the same address information as on the outside, such as, TO-Name and Address and FROM information. Tips on mailing are—use a sturdy card-board box; sealed with fiber adhesive tape; plainly addressed;

with cushioning wrapped around each item; and all four sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

The Postmaster urges all to SHOP EARLY and MAIL EARLY, and

reminding that this year Christmas Day is on a Monday. "So please mail at least three days earlier this year to insure before Christmas delivery of all Christmas packages and cards," the Postmaster urged.

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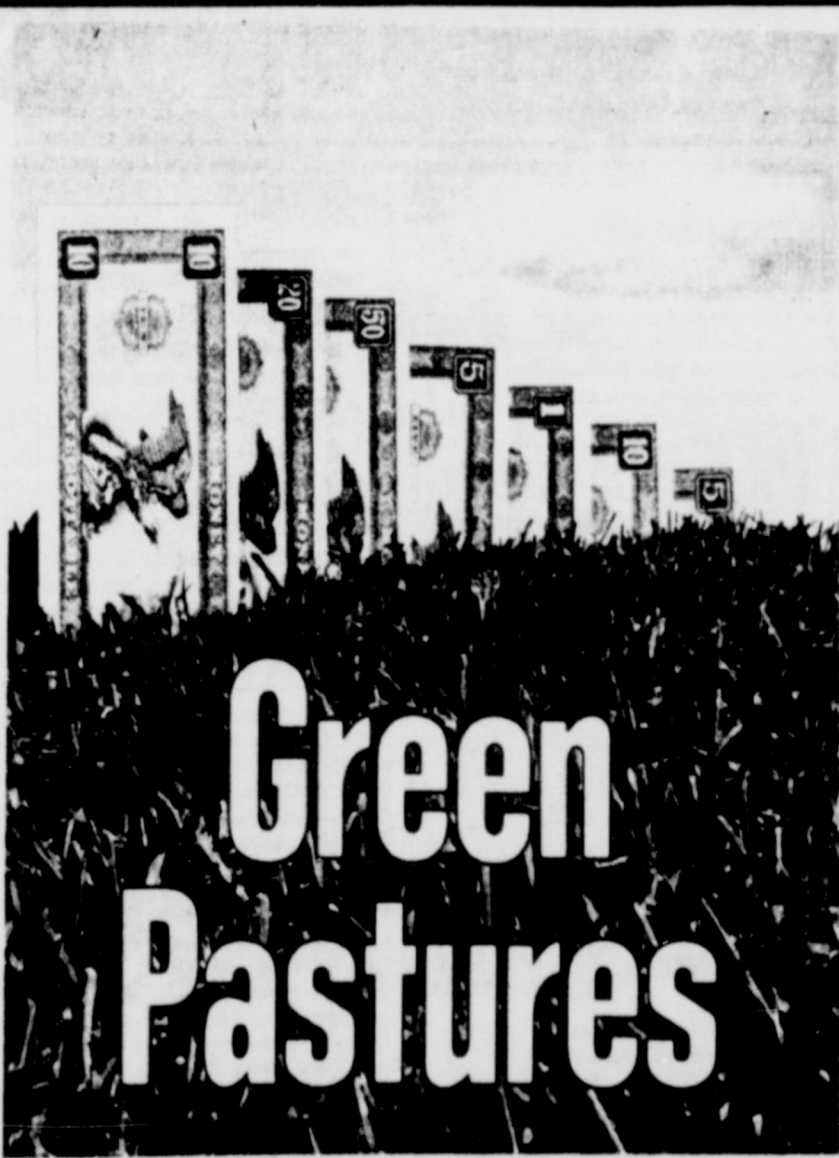

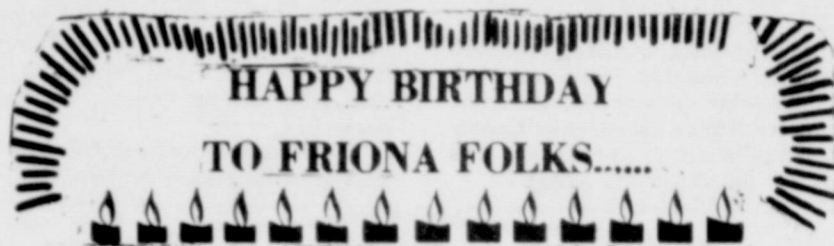
Laura Jacobs, County Extension Agent, presented a demonstration of making cheese balls, sausage balls, "hot n' tots," fondue and bacon pin

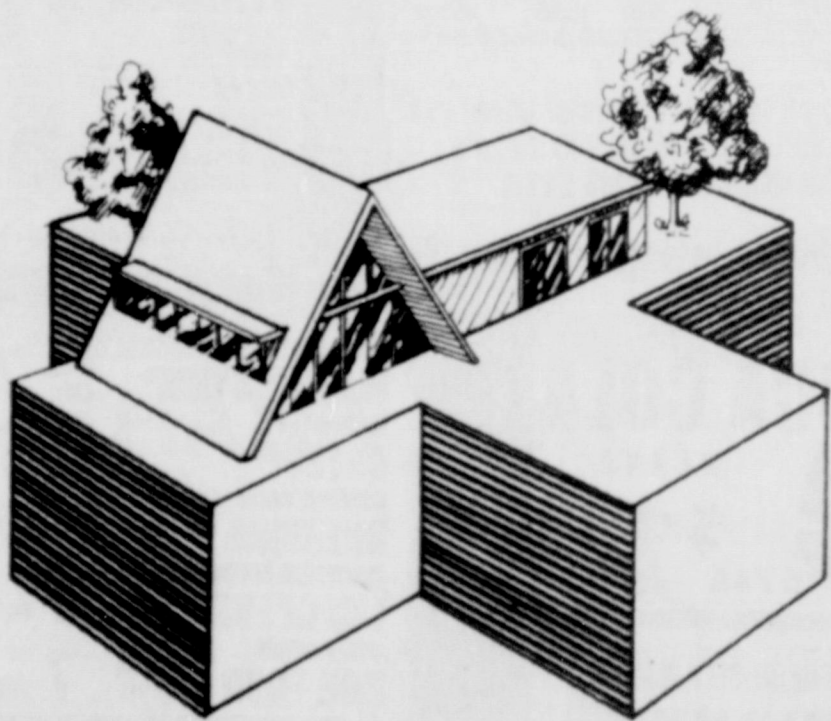
Twenty members of the Hospital Auxiliary met Tuesday at Farmer County Community Hospital for their monthly meeting.

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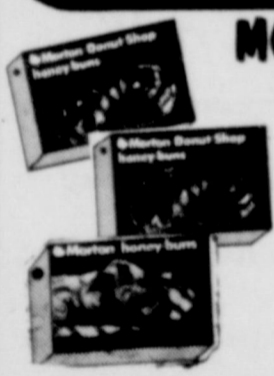
