Disaster In High Plains

Cops, Snipers Trade Shots; **Student Dies**

SANTA BARBARA. Colif. (AP) — A college senior was of and killed Saturday as police and snipers exchanged gunfire during renewed violence at the University of California campus in Santa Barbara.

Kevin Moran, 22, of Saratoga, Calif. was fatally wounded in the side, witnesses said, after extinguishing a fizzling firebomb in a Bank of America branch, a temporary structure erected after rioters burned the original building to the ground

Deputies said a sniper's bullet killed Moran.

The shooting occurred about 1:30 a.m. after a second night of violence in Isla Vista, a student community of about 13,000 adjacent to the campus.

Despite a curfew, the disturbance began-as it had the night before-with youths pelting the bank with rocks.

About 200 deputies and highway patrolmen, wearing helmets and flack jackets and carrying carbines, lobbed tear gas grenades into milling crowds of up to 700 persons. The youths cut off electrical power to the bank, smashed the glass door with rocks and threw gasoline hombs inside

Stephen Goodspeed, campus nesses said Moran was shot as he left the bank after extinguishing one firebomb. The other firebombs did not catch fire.

The witnesses said Moran "My God, My God, help Friends bandaged his wound. He was dead on arrival at a hospital.

Some 2,500 spectators gathered at sunny Honolulu International Airport to welcome them

"I hereby declare that this was a successful mission," the President said.

"I think I can truthfully say that never before in the history of man have more people watched together, prayed together or rejoiced together," he

In a crowd well laced with children and military uniforms, the astronauts in their blue flight suits and caps heard the President say it was "the individual that counts, that in the crisis the character of a man or men will make the difference.'

SHAKY SITUATION 'You cannot describe the barrenness and ruggedness of the moon. Some day I hope you all get there yourselves," he said.

Although Apollo 13 missed its appointment with the moon, the flight was "extremely valuable," Swigert said.

"What it taught us was that perhaps sometimes we get a little complacent when flights go exactly as they are supposed to. We need to take a look at our systems and our training. Perhaps we need to review some things we haven't thought about

Tornadoes skipped along two der were swept away. 175-mile corridors of Texas' vast homes was destroyed in the vi-Panhandle-Plains country Friday night and Saturday killing PULLED GRASS 23 persons, injuring more than 100 and damaging millions of dollars in property.

At Least 23 Die,

At least 16 persons died and 50 to 60 were injured as one tornado battered a trailer camp and lakeshore village near this Panhandle town. Most of the residents, including many elderly retired persons, were caught in their sleep.

MORE BODIES

The death toll climbed slowly late Saturday as more bodies were found at scattered points. The Texas Department of Public Safety said that identifications were proving difficult to establish in the general chaos of the great area stricken by the

Many died in isolated farm houses, or what was left of them. At Plainview, another hard-hit city, a sheriff's deputy said, "There's a line of demolished houses for 8 to 10 miles northeast of us."

Meanwhile, widespread sections of the state were under tornado watch and severe thunderstorm alert Saturday night.

Thunderstorms struck late in the afternoon in the Crystal City area of Southwest Texas and moved eastward. At dusk big storms were centered in the San Antonio area and spread 40 and 50 miles around the city.

BROKEN LINES A massive section of turbulence stretched from 30 miles northwest of Austin to Dallas-Fort Worth to Denison and Sherman and into Oklahoma.

Scattered thunderstorms wracked the area from northeast of Junction to Wichita Falls and moved to the northeast. Small hail accompanied the heaviest storms, some striking downtown Fort Worth.

Broken lines of storms stretched from Lake Buchanan in Central Texas to Adamsville to Evant to Hamilton to Cranfills Gap, Walnut Springs, Cleburne and into the outskirts of Fort Worth.

A funnel cloud was reported 15 miles southwest of Fort Worth but apparently dissipated without touching the ground.

BIG STORMS The big thunderstorms were to continue late into the night, the Weather Bureau said, as a cold front pushed in East Texas and Central Texas.

The South Plains area from Plainview to Lubbock, harried by twisters Friday night, caught more light thundershowers during the late afternoon.

visor Lonnie Nine at Amarillo said the tornadoes spun out of freak double tracks.

Nine said the tracks were 40 miles apart and were parallel. They ran in straight paths from the southwest to the northwest instead of curving as do most tornado patterns. The tornadoes skipped along paths 175 miles

The tornadoes destroyed or severely damaged homes, business buildings and other structures. They left streets filled with uprooted trees and tangled. broken power and telephone lines. Cattle died.




Seminar On Alcoholism

If those Texans who rate themwant to send a man to the U.S. Senate who shares their views on most vexing problems of government, they have an opportunity to do in the Democratic primary of May 2.

For the line is sharply drawn as Lloyd Bentsen challenges Ralph Yar-

Bentsen, a 49-year-old successful businessman, presents himself as a man who can express the wishes of Texans in the '70's. He served as a congressman from the Rio Grande Valley area 1948-54, and thus is no stranger to Washington.

The issues in the campaign basically have been those of differing political philosophy, but some things have emerged that people who want to establish a more restrained team in Washington should give heed to.

It should be noted that Senator Yarborough voted against the Supreme Court nominations of both Judge Haynsworth and Judge Carswell. To have been against one might have involved a feeling of qualification, but to be against both is to underline a philosophical reason for rejection, namely to be against a change in the complex of the court. This also may reflect a beholden stance to certain groups, including the activists. Support of the Vietnam war moratorium would lead to this assumption,

although under pressure of the selves as moderates or conservatives campaign the senator softened his stand in support of the moratorium which touched off violent and destructive demonstrations.

Another serious question is that of the advocacy of almost every program of free government spending that comes along. On the record, the senator has not been one to foster economy or changes to promote efficiency; on the contrary, the answer seems always to propose more of your money as an answer to every

But the merits of a man rather than the demerits of another should be a compelling reason for support, and it is on this basis that we believe Mr. Bentsen is better equipped to represent all of Texas. Unshackled by old scars, recriminations and bitterness, he would have far greater latitude of support and confidence of all components of the state's makeups. His service would be an investment in the future rather than in twilight of a career. His experience not only in public service but in the hard necessities of the business world would provide a better balance between our wants and our abilities to

World's Biggest Advertising Flop

There are many more of us who campaign for highway safety; and in so doing offer every procedure you can think of to stop the slaughter

stay with me. I have just been reading an article which tells about the "world's biggest advertising flop."

IN 1968 an advertising effort of more than \$51 million (that's right) was put forth to convince people to use seat belts in their cars. The campaign has had no effect. Seat belt usage has remained at the same low level for the past 18 or more months.

The total failure of the seat belt campaign eclipses the Edsel debacle which, after all, sold some Edsels. It also confirms Detroit's privately held conviction that safety is not what prompts people to buy automobiles. And forget, for the moment, Ralph

THE STARTLING story of the massive advertising flop came to light with a study of seat belt usage conducted by a reputable marketing research firm. The findings were based on a certain number of household interviews, and projected to the U.S. population, the way those survey people do it.

THE FIRST STUDY, in November, 1967, showed that 63 per cent of auto owners had seat belts in their cars. In July of 1969 this had increased

Some of us stand on the ramparts slightly to 65 per cent. Despite this minor gain, the use of seat belts declined. The 1967 study found that among people with the equipment, 35 per cent used them all or most of the time. In July of 1969, and \$51 million ad dollars later, only 34 per cent said they used the belts all or most of the time. Moreover, in the last census 43 per cent of the seat belt owners said they use their seat belts hardly ever or not at all, compared with 39 per cent in 1967.

> THE SEAT BELT drive was conducted by the National Safety Council through the Advertising Council, which coordinates public service campaigns. Expert advertising knowledge went into the campaign in devising newspaper and magazine ads. TV and radio productions. They dwelt on what one small device could do to help reduce the ruin of life and limb. The advertisements were used by practically all publications and by all the electronic media.

> THE \$51 MILLION figure was arrived at by computing the cost of producing the messages, and the cost (if it had been charged) of putting these messages into the mass media.

Most people in the trade would say that \$51 million spent in advertising would yield terrific results.

What went wrong? Well, as indicated, wrecks are to be blamed on everybody and everything except the nut behind the wheel. You know, "this would never happen to me," regardless of how many advertising messages are offered.

Marquis Childs Sparring At The SALT Table

VIENNA — Some 500 newspaper correspondents and at least 300 television commentators and technicians are here from all over the world to report on the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT). With the exception of the 10 Russian correspondents, in effect part of the official delegation from Moscow, the view of what may or may not — be about to happen is as opaque as though seen through a thick London fog.

THE PROSPECT is for weeks of sparring as Washington and Moscow As expected, the over-all reported this past week that each seek to pry loose the other side's negotiating position. The mystery is deep and dark. There is even doubt as to whether either side has a fully formulated negotiating position.

Behind this cautious sparring are two cautious men, neither of whom is really a free agent. One is Leonid I. Brezhnev, the 64-year-old General Secretary of the Communist Party in the Soviet Union.

AS NEARLY as a cautious Communist leader could, Brezhnev, the other day put his country's economic troubles on the line. In a major speech, much of it carried on television, he spoke of the shortages in food and consumer goods that are reported to have stirred widespread discontent within the Soviet Union. He went so far as to talk about the failures of the bureaucracy and the need for more efficient management

and technical innovation. Without putting it in just that way, this cautious man was saying that the cost of the arms race is depriving the Soviet people of the goods and services they have so long been

promised. His position is curiously like that of the second cautious man sitting behind the players at the conference table in Vienna.

PRESIDENT NIXON and Brezhnev seem to be poles apart in almost every respect. Yet in their respective spheres they have come to positions of power conditioned in such a way that taking bold initiatives is difficult, if not impossible. Each has had to make compromises along the way. On both sides a powerful military bloc enforces caution and inveighs against taking any risk that might endanger what must seem in the objective view a wholly mythical security.

They are alike, too, in that each has the strongest possible motivation to get an agreement that would mean a pause and prevent a new and probably irreversible escalation in the arms race. If the Kremlin faces serious economic problems, the Nixon Administration in Washington can hardly conceal the depth of America's troubles, both economic and political.

WHATEVER THE actual military superiority in missiles and submarines, the United States can hardly be said to be negotiating in Vienna from a position of strength. The troubles on the home front — the war in Vietnam, crime, organized

violence and nihilism — are too great. That is the reason to hold out some hope for this beginning of a serious effort to go beyond mere appraisal of the vast stores of nuclear annihilation on each side of the divide. Plain, common sense would seem to dictate terms that each side could live with. (Copyright, 1970, United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)

WASHINGTON — The dismissal of Rory Edelweiss from the Internal Revenue Service has been upheld by Bureau 1040 as well as 1040A of the IRS and has been confirmed by Clark Mollenhoff, the White House assistant in charge of income tax returns. Eldelweiss has become a cause

celebre in taxpayer circles because he tried to simplify the federal tax form, much to the horror of everyone in the Department of the Treasury. His supervisor, Glenndenning Hindsight, said that the IRS was perfectly

"HE WAS A troublemaker," Hindsight said, "and could have destroyed the entire tax-collection system in this country.

"What did Edelweiss try to do?" "He tried to write a tax form that the average taxpayer could under-'What on earth for?" I asked.

"Who knows what goes on in a mind like that? Some think he was working under too much pressure. Others say if he had been given a test when he was 6 years old, we would never have hired him.

"IN ANY CASE, Edelweiss came to us eight months ago with a simple tax form which anyone could have filled out. He had eliminated references to forms 2440, 3903, 2106 and 2950 SE, and such phrases as 'see tax rate schedule III on T-1 and tax table B on T-2"

"What did you do?" "We thought he was joking at first. But Edelweiss said he was dead serious. He had worked on the return for over a year and felt that the implementation of it could cut down the taxpayer's work to three hours."

"I HOPE YOU told Edelweiss

where to get off," I said. "As his immediate superior, I tried to talk sense into him. I told him that if we simplified the present federal tax form so people could understand it, they might decide not to pay their taxes. The real purpose of a complicated tax return form was to wear the taxpayer down, so by the time he finished making out the return, he was so exhausted he would be willing to pay whatever he had just to get the return out of his

"THEY MUST have been upset when they heard Edelweiss was trying to make a tax return that anyone could understand.'

"Absolutely furious. The IRS has a staff of 1,400 people who do nothing but complicate the income tax forms. Whenever they discover that an item is comprehensible, they immediately take it out and replace it with something so vague and confusing that no one will get it. When they heard one of their own was trying to simplify the life of the taxpayer, they considered it treachery of the first order."

"So he was fired?"

"WE MADE AN example of him. After what we did to Edelweiss, it's going to be a long time before anybody comes up with any bright ideas on how to save the taxpayer his sanity and time." (Copyright, 1970 The Washington Post Co.)

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




