With all of that sloshing through its system, the populace probably would be short of breath even if it had not smoked 8.7 billion cigars and nearly 600 billion cigarettes.

**The principal killers of Americans are heart disease, stroke and cancer, all of which are often closely related to the victims' habits.**

Fifty-five per cent of all deaths involve diseases of the heart and blood vessels, diseases frequently associated with obesity and lack of exercise. According to National Cancer Institute statistics, 70,000 of the 80,000 lung cancer deaths each year result from smoking.

Women and teenagers are smoking more, and the lung cancer death rate among women has tripled in the last 14 years.

Everyone will agree that life is priceless, but 75 per cent of Americans do not use their car's safety belts, and only four per cent use the shoulder harness.

The National Jogging Association says that exercise is among the best investments people can make in their health, and it doesn't cost a dime of the taxpayers' money.

Although Americans are not nearly as healthy as they could be, this could be improved through a systematic exercise program by individuals, according to the N.J.A.

So, although it's too late for us to cut down on the amount of food we eat during the holidays, it's an ideal time to make a resolution to exercise more during 1979—if nothing more than pushing away from the dinner table, and vigorously snuffing out cigarettes.

## 1979: Beginning Of The Ice Age?

From what Friona area residents have seen of the year 1979, most would just as soon trade it in for a warmer model.

The new year began on a frigid note in the area, with the mercury plunging to below zero on the mornings of January 2 and 3. The high temperature on Monday, New Year's Day, reached only eight degrees in Friona.

Tuesday morning's reading was the coldest, with the official reading in Friona pegged at ten degrees below zero. This is the second time this season for sub-zero temperatures, as it had reached this level the morning of December 9.

The early week blast also brought two and one-half inches of snow to the local area, although the moisture content of the snow was minimal.

In fact, drivers on Tuesday noted that the grainy snow was blowing across roadways just as if it were dust.

Total precipitation for the calendar year 1978 came to 19.30 inches, according to weather recorder Jake Outland. This was the highest yearly total since 1969, when the measurement was 22.59 inches.

Just when it appeared that things were about to approach a warming trend, with temperatures reaching

40 degrees on Thursday, a new front invaded the area that night, and new snow was falling Friday morning, with more in the forecast.

Highway Patrol DPS officer Royce Keck said Tuesday that his office had worked about eight accidents last Saturday in the eastern portion of the county.

The worst one was just east of Friona, where a Clovis woman, Josephina Rodriguez, was hospitalized after her 1974 Monte Carlo was demolished when it skidded backward and collided with a van driven by Juan Rodriguez of Hereford.

An Amarillo man, Roy Axton, escaped serious injury Tuesday when his 18-wheel cattle truck caught fire and burned east of Bovina on Highway 60, in the vicinity of Parmerton Hill.

## City Woman Injured In Wreck Near Anton

Mrs. Larry (Rose) Mabry of Friona was critically injured last Saturday, December 30 in an automobile mishap near Anton. Mrs. Mabry has been hospitalized in intensive care this week at the Texas Tech Medical Center in Lubbock.

Also injured, and in intensive care, is the Mabrys' eight-year-old daughter Cayla, although a spokesman said the daughter was able to walk some on Thursday.

A son, Chris, suffered only slight injuries, and was scheduled to return to Friona on Friday.

A spokesman for the family said that Rose suffered what was described as "a massive bruise" to her brain, which caused swelling. The report on Thursday was that the swelling had subsided, and the patient's color had improved.

Although Mrs. Mabry had not regained consciousness at the Star's press time, the spokesman relayed the doctor's opinion that the

extended time indicates that Rose is "rallying."

The accident occurred at approximately 2 p.m. last Saturday, about three miles east of Anton, on a curve near a large gin. The family's pickup, driven by Mrs. Mabry, hit an icy spot in the highway, then a dry spot, and overturned, throwing Mrs. Mabry and her daughter out of the vehicle. Chris was not thrown out of the pickup.

Mrs. Mabry and her children were first taken to a Littlefield hospital, and then transferred to the Tech Medical Center.

It was reported that two other accidents, one of which was fatal, happened at the same icy spot in the four-lane highway.

Mrs. Mabry and the children were reportedly enroute to Lubbock to join the husband and father, as the family was making preparations to move to Lubbock from their home near Friona.

## Arrests Clear Up FFA Hog Thefts

Parmer County Sheriff's officers arrested two Clovis, N.M. men December 31, and the arrests are expected to clear up a number of thefts of hogs in Parmer County, including the theft of 40 hogs from the Larry Scott farm, and two different thefts from Friona FFA boys.

In custody at Farwell are Wendell Davenport, 33, and Teofilo Olivarez, 28, both of whom live 2 1/2 miles south of Clovis. Bond was set at \$10,000 each.

The two men were jailed in Portales on Saturday, and then on Tuesday they were taken before Dist. Judge Fred Hensley of Clovis, where they signed papers waiving extradition to Parmer County, Texas.

County Sheriff Charles Lovelace said the pair had signed confessions admitting to a number of burglaries in Parmer and Bailey Counties in Texas, as well as Curry County, N.M.

Their latest theft of 40 hogs from the Larry Scott place near Bovina on December 24-25 led to the couple's arrest and apprehension.

Scott attended the weekly hog sale on Saturday, December 31 at the Portales Livestock Auction Company, where he saw a group of hogs that he recognized as his. He notified

Portales authorities who arrested the pair.

Authorities also took charge of a pickup belonging to the pair, which figured as evidence in the thefts. During the heist at the Scott place, it was noticed that a green vehicle had hit a pump next to the hog pens. Lovelace said the couple's green pickup had a large "scrape" on one side.

The men admitted to the theft at the Scott place, and to two different thefts at the Friona FFA pens during November and December, during which 18 hogs and one steer were taken.

The thefts from the Friona FFA pens came about a month apart, and some of the young students' project pigs, replaced after the first heist, were taken for a second time.

They also confessed to a similar theft involving Muleshoe FFA animals in which ten hogs were taken, to the theft of a pig belonging to Jake Perea at Black, to stealing a 250-pound calf belonging to Isidro Ortega at Lariat, and to burglarizing two trailer houses at the J&J Trailer Sales of Texico, N.M.

The pair also admitted taking two self-feeders from the Friona FFA pens, and the self-feeders have been recovered.

Sheriff Lovelace said that the men

had two trailer houses at their place south of Clovis on the Portales highway, and were well-equipped with corrals and pig pens. He said the pair admitted the thefts soon after they were confronted at the sale ring at Portales.

Scott recovered 18 head of swine from the auction facilities on Saturday, and then found 14 more of his pigs at the headquarters south of Clovis.

Sheriff Lovelace said the animals stolen earlier had apparently already been sold. "We might run them down, but it will be a hard job," he admitted.

"I never had looked so long without finding any clues. We knew the lost animals would have to go through a sale ring somewhere but had not been able to make a connection until this large number was taken from the Scott farm," Lovelace said this week.

The hogs taken from the Scott place were valued at from \$40 to \$50 each, being feeder size.

The culprits had also admittedly taken furniture from the J&J Trailer Sales Company at Texico, N.M.

Davenport and Olivarez have been bound over to action by the Parmer County Grand Jury.

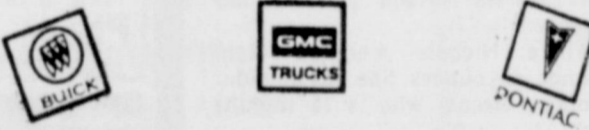

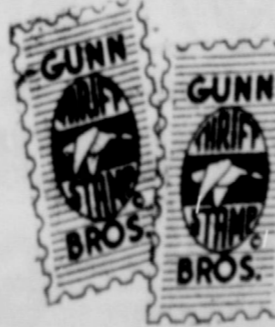

## Income Tax

### Installments

Due Jan. 15

Taxpayers making estimated tax payments on their 1978 income must pay the fourth installment by Monday, January 15. The tax installment should be paid using declaration-voucher 4 from the Form 1040-ES package, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Taxpayers whose anticipated income during 1978 has changed may have to file an amended declaration. Space appears in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate, the IRS said.

For more detailed information, taxpayers can obtain IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," available free from local IRS offices. Supplies of the Form 1040-ES package are also available from these offices.

## AAM Gearing For D.C. Tractorcade

The American Agriculture Movement is looking forward to the national tractorcade to Washington, D.C. early this year, in hopes of making giant strides for agriculture. "We have been told by some key people in Washington, D.C. that this is the year for agriculture, but that congress is not going to give us anything unless we come back to Washington with force, as we did last year," says Ralph Roming, local AAM leader. "In analyzing our accomplishments of last year, we felt the tractors were responsible for almost everything we got. They are a symbol of our trade—different from every other trade. The tractors are the way to carry the most graphic protest to Washington, D.C. that the nation has ever seen," Roming continued. Roming said that money would prove to be the biggest problem of the current endeavor. "This will be the most costly endeavor that we have tried to date, and with no formal organization to collect funds, it must be done on a voluntary basis," he said. The local AAM leader said that farmers were planning to take

mobile homes and camp trailers this year, for cooking and sleeping. "As near as we could calculate, we left \$23 million in Washington, D.C. last year, at motels and restaurants. We won't do this again this year, and we won't have to use taxicabs, since we'll have our tractors," Roming said. The American Agriculture Movement of Bovina, Friona, Lazbuddie and Rhea are sponsoring a fish fry that is free to the public Thursday night, January 4 at the Community Center in Friona, beginning at 6:30 p.m. "We urge everyone, especially farmers, businessmen and civic leaders, to be at this meeting," Roming says. Also, the AAM is sponsoring an antique and farm auction in Amarillo at the fair grounds this Saturday, January 6. Proceeds from the auction will go to the state office, and to help send tractors to Washington, D.C. Anyone with items they would like to donate to the auction is urged to call a local member of the AAM, who also say they will be happy to take to Amarillo, or help load, any large or outside item which is donated.
