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## DEMO REFORM Antipolitics **Of The Street** Warning

WASHINGTON (AP) - A party reform commission warned today the alternative to orderly change within the Democratic party is a turn to third and fourth parties or "the antipolitics of the street."

"We believe that popular control of the Democratic party is necessary for its survival," the commission headed by Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., said in a final report on proposals for reform delegate selection procedures.

The commission, created by the 1968 Democratic National Convention, had previously called for future convention delegations to be more representative than those of the past.

Future delegations should contain women, young people and members of minority groups "in reasonable relationships" to their proportion in the state's population, the commission said. Practices such as proxy voting, lack of rules, slate-making by committees and delegate fees should be eliminated, it added.

The commission made clear in its report the guidelines are subject only to review by the next national convention - not by the Democratic National Committee - but concludes "we believe that our guidelines place no unreasonable demands on state parties."

Recognizing the possibility that the proposals may lead to a considerable number of credential challenges in 1972, the commission recommended that the credentials committee "be guided by the principal that state parties must assume the burden of ensuring opportunities for full, meaningful and timely participation in the delegate selecting process for party members."

The report charged that, in contrast to the Democratic party's reform effort, "the Republican response to popular demands for more participation and open processes has been indifferent."

The report said that a failure to meet demands for change would not result in a defection to the Republican party.

"They will turn to third and fourth party politics or the antipolitics of the street," the commission said

In making this assessment in speeches to the United States Chamber of Commerce Monday, Walter W. Heller, former chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers under former President Johnson, and Beryle W. Sprinkel of Chicago supported Nixon administration contentions that the over-all price rise will slow sharply in the autumn.

But, as they spoke, other indications of a sagging economy caused concern in the business community.

In New York, the stock market's Dow Jones Industrial average fell 12.14 points to 735.15, the lowest point since Nov. 22, 1963, the day President John F. Kennedy was assassinated.

And, in Detroit, General Motors and Ford, the nation's largest automobile manufacturers, said that auto sales and profits were down in the opening quarter this year, although both still finished in the black.

Ford reported its consolidated sales in the opening three months down by 5 per cent, while GM's sales fell by 14 per cent during the same period.

At the White House, President Nixon conferred with his Council of Economic Advisers and five other economists called in for a special discussion of the nation's economic outlook

Administration officials denied the talks were directly connected to the stock market slump. One informant said the discussion was scheduled some time ago and was "a general bull session-a kind of educational process for the President. to let him hear what others in the economic field are thinking.' Meantime a large bank in California announced it was reducing its prime interest rate from 8 per cent to 71/2 per cent in a move it said was designed to boost the nation's economy. Robert F. Parker, whose Community National Bank at Bakersfield, Calif., operates 17 branches in that state, said he hoped its action will trigger another round of nationwide prime interest rate reductions. Six weeks ago the bank was the nation's second to drop its rate from 8½ per cent to 8 per cent. "New car sales are off more than 20 per cent in the first quarter and so it goes in all the industry by which the strength of our economy is measured," Parker told a news conference.

### **Press Rates** End Ordered

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Communications Commission today ordered an end to preferential telegraph and telephoto rates for the press.

The FCC ordered American Telephone and Telegraph Co. and Western Union to file any new rate schedules needed within 30 days and to eliminate the preferential rates within 50 days.

The decision applies, the FCC said, to "private line services for press associations, news agencies, radio networks, radio broadcasting stations, newspapers, periodicals, and other general circulation publications publishing general news for public information.

### Homesteads By May 1

### Smut Mail **Bill Okay**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A landmark bill cracking down on obscene mail sent to youngsters and to adults who don't want it should sail through Congress "like motherhood and the flag," says a chief sponsor.

The bill, up for House approval today, defines in explicit terms nudity, sexual conduct, sexual excitement and sadomasochistic abuse considered obscene to minors.

The American Civil Liberties Union opposed it as an unconstitutional restriction of free speech and said Congress should have waited for a report from the President's Commission on Pornography and Obscenity before acting.

## **Cambodian Troops Recapture** Pagoda

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia Som, the country's chief port, (AP) — The Cambodian government said today that its troops had driven the Viet Cong from the Buddhist pagoda in Angtassom and that cleanup operations were under way in the town. It said small groups of Viet Cong

were continuing to fight. The battle at Angtassom, 36 miles south of Phnom Penh, has been going on for six days. The army had said Monday that a Viet Cong unit was holed up in the Buddhist pagoda and that the Cambodians would not attack it because it was a sacred place. The army spokesman did bodians got the enemy soldiers out.

The spokesman said that during the night, the Viet Cong blew up another bridge-the second in the two days-on the road from Phnom Penh to Angtassom.

### Spreading The Population

George Romney, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, said recently he believes America's land problems stem not from scarcity, but from misuses.

Noting that 70 per cent of the U.S. population lives on two per cent of the nation's land and that the population is expected to grow by 100 million by the year 2000, Romney suggested that cities look to undiscovered possibilities for additional housing sites

The urban crisis is becoming more critical every passing day. Cities are choking on their own industrial pollutants, and their residents are doomed to constant congestion, largely because of job locations. Even the suburbs no longer offer wide expanses of open air and greenery. In many areas they have become mere extensions of the urban congestion - with lower skylines.

Federal housing programs, urban renewal and tighter city zoning practices may have slowed the quickening

pace of crisis in our cities. But these efforts have not halted the growth of the problem, nor have they often been successful in rectifying the existing situation.

If industry can be persuaded through local and federal action to spread itself more evenly over available land in this nation, we will have bought ourselves valuable time in the struggle against population concentration and pollution of the environment. We must attack the problem here, at its roots, rather than through attempts to patch up the existing urban

situation. Former Texas Gov. John Connally once suggested tax credits to industry willing to move plants from congested areas into less crowded locales. The details and ramifications of such a proposal require careful scrutiny in the interest of an equitable tax system.

Tax benefits for industry hold little appeal for the masses, but neither do the prospects of a worsening urban situation

WASHINGTON - The Republican Party, through its Southern strategy committee, has pulled off one of the most interesting political coups in modern history. They managed to make a practically unknown federal judge the leading candidate to win the senatorial race in Florida this year.

I can now reveal how they did it. The Republicans were very worried about winning a senatorial seat in Florida in 1970. None of their candidates had any glamour or charisma and Florida had been written off to

Florida they finally concluded that federal Judge Harrold Carswell of Tallahassee was their man.

A QUICK CHECK of the nation's law schools revealed that the majority of the deans were against him, which was encouraging as far as the Southern strategy committee was concerned. Judge Carswell would also be opposed by labor, liberal and black groups, a good sign - not only to keep him off the court, but also to be used later in the senatorial campaign.


But what the Southern strategy committee hadn't counted on was how close the Carswell vote would be. Many senators, who were not informed as to what the Republicans really wanted Carswell for, indicated they would vote for him for the court. THIS SCARED the pants off the Republican strategists, as they didn't want to lose Carswell for the Senate election. They also had assured the President, Carswell could never make it for the court, which was the only reason President Nixon had nominated him. In desperation they called up Bryce Harlow, the Uhite House lobbyist, and said, "Bryce, you've got to help Carswell lose. **REALIZING THE** implications of what was at stake, Harlow immediately started calling up senators saying Margaret Chase Smith was going to vote for Carswell. He had someone leak to her what he was doing, and predictably she voted against Carswell and saved the day for the Southern strategy. It was one of the smoothest operations Washington ever saw. Now the big question: Can the Republicans defeat Judge Blackmun so he'll get to run against Hubert Humphrey in the Senate race in Minnesota? (Copyright, 1970 The Washington Post Co.)

VIENNA — On the day after the treaty was signed in 1955 making Austria a neutral nation freed of occupation troops, Bruno Kreisky, then State Secretary for foreign affairs and one of the principal architects of the treaty, got a rude shock. He was told by a highly placed British official that Austria was economically not a viable country and therefore, short of a partnership of some kind with a neighbor, the future was dark indeed.

KREISKY, who has just become Chancellor heading a minority government of Social Democrats. pondered this a moment. Then he said: "You forget one important resource we have. What is that? Snow.'

In the 15 years that have intervened Austria has harnessed mountain rivers fed by melting snows to create large resources of electric power for Austrian industry.

**SNOW, KREISKY** ... might have added, supplies another form of revenue. Skiers from all over the world use Austria's superb slopes and thereby contribute to the flow of tourist dollars. On a per capita basis Austria's earnings from tourism are greater than those of any country in Europe, not excluding neighboring Italy and Switzerland. Kreisky puts tourist revenue at \$300 million and the returns from electric power at \$200 million.

With the musical arts in the United States struggling to stay alive the example of the relationship between government and the performing arts in this country of 7,400,000 population is instructive. The government today provides a subsidy of about \$20 million for opera, theater and such galas as the annual Salzburg music festivals.

IT HAS PRODUCED splendid rewards. An initial performance at the Vienna Opera the other evening of Verdi's "Macbeth" was of a standard that New York or London might envy. Voices, staging, chorus, the ensemble were superb and repeatedly the packed house stopped the opera with prolonged bravos and applause. Music is for the Austrians not merely a tourist attraction but a cherished heritage.

ALL THIS WOULD be impossible without the federal subsidy and, so far as the visitor can tell, no one questions the role of government in the performing arts. It has, of course, ancient lineage. But this meant that the money to sustain these cultural institutions, above and beyond revenue from the box office, came out of the public purse.




