





## Gov. Smith Casts Ballot

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. and Mrs. Preston Smith voted absentee in the Democratic primary Monday, and the governor said he almost committed an embarrassing error.

The couple voted at 8:15 a.m. at the Travis County courthouse, about two blocks from the Governor's Mansion, Smith said. "We voted, and then went over to put our ballots in the Republican box, but they caught us in time," the Democratic governor chuckled.

Smith has no opponent in the primary. He wouldn't say how he voted. The governor estimated about two million votes would be cast in more than the 1.7 million to 1.8 million predicted by the Texas Election Bureau.

He said he and Mrs. Smith have no plans to be out of town Saturday, but voted absentee because "you never know where you will be."

## New Science Agency Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — Creation of a new agency with an annual budget of about \$2.3 billion to coordinate federal science activities was suggested Monday by a House subcommittee.

"U.S. science is faltering at a time when the problems of the environment, national security, population control, urban unrest and worldwide education and development demand new ideas," said Chairman Emilio Q. Daddario, D-Conn., in announcing the proposal.

Daddario said existing policy resulted in a proliferation of single purpose agencies pursuing their research goals without regard to similar efforts elsewhere or over-all national needs.

The name suggested for the new agency was National Institute of Research and Advanced Studies. An administrator would be named by the President, subject to Senate confirmation.

The subcommittee said the existing National Science Foundation could be reconstituted as NIRAS, consolidating those scientific activities carried out in universities.

Specifically included would be graduate education programs of the Health, Education and Welfare and other departments, the National Foundations for the Arts and Humanities and new units called the National Institute of Ecology and the National Institute of Social Sciences.

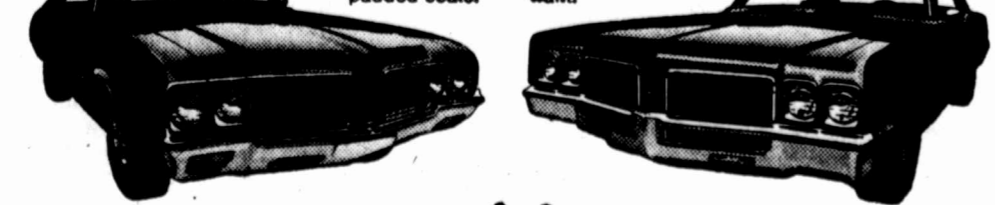

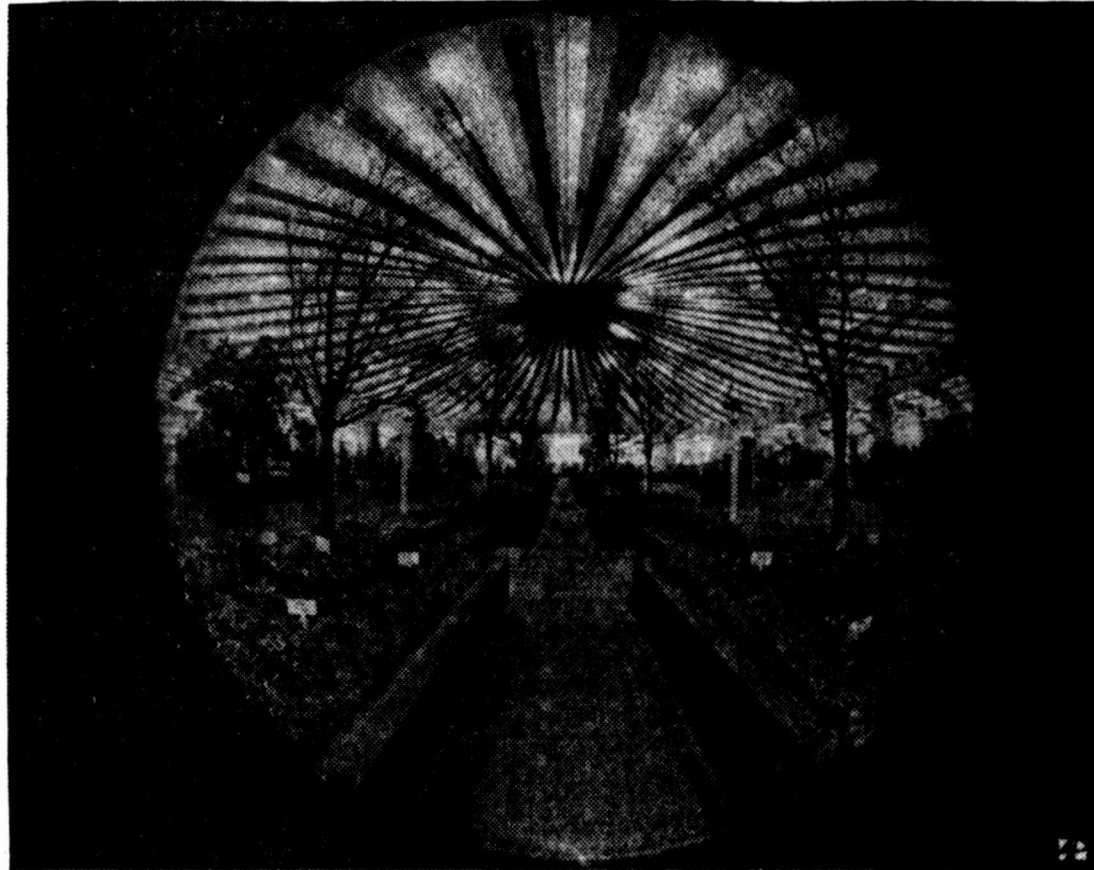

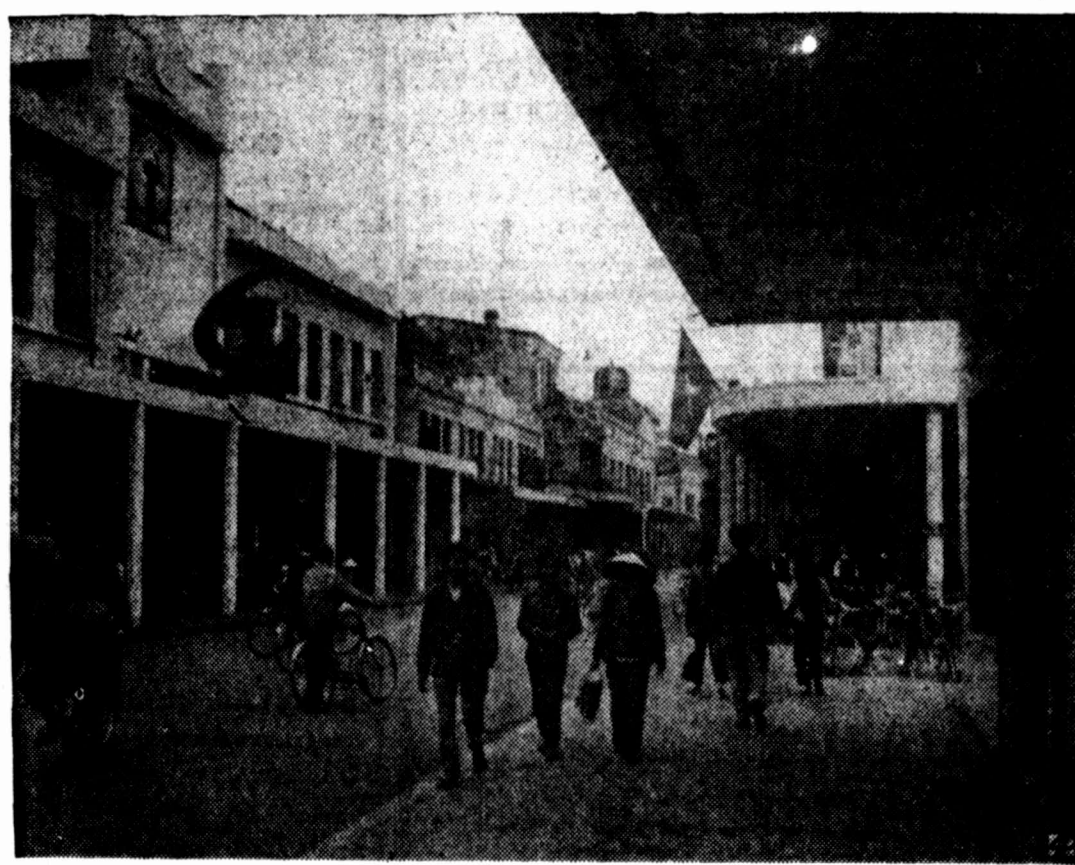

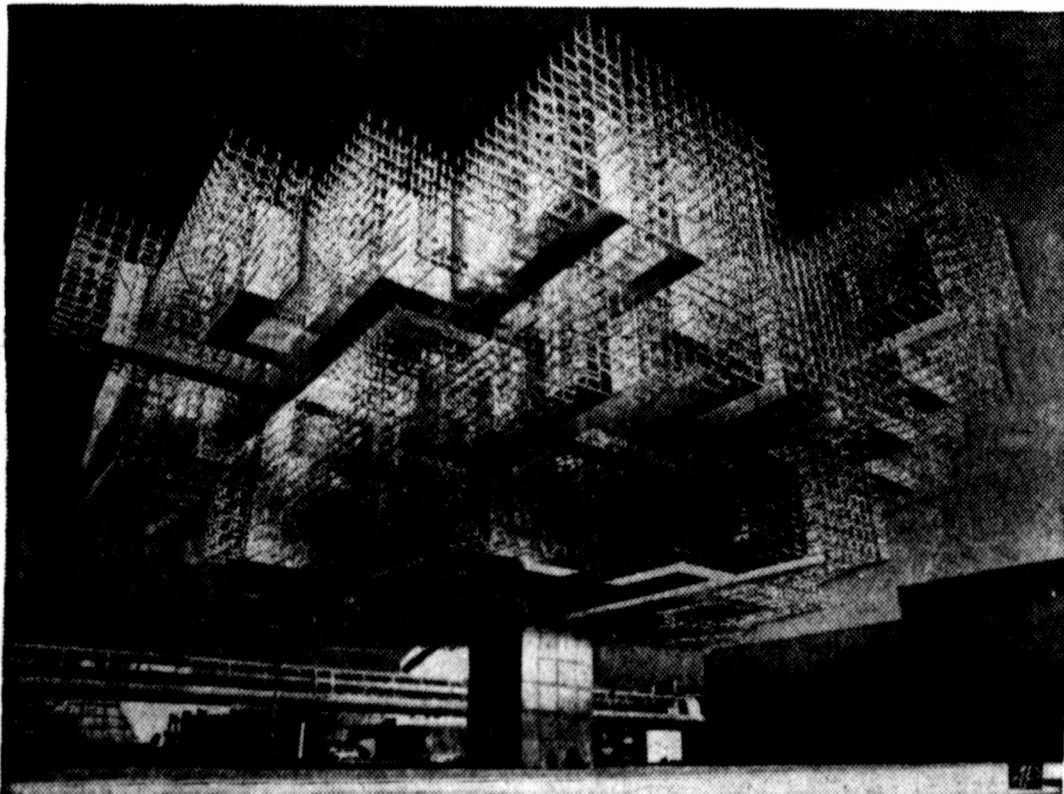

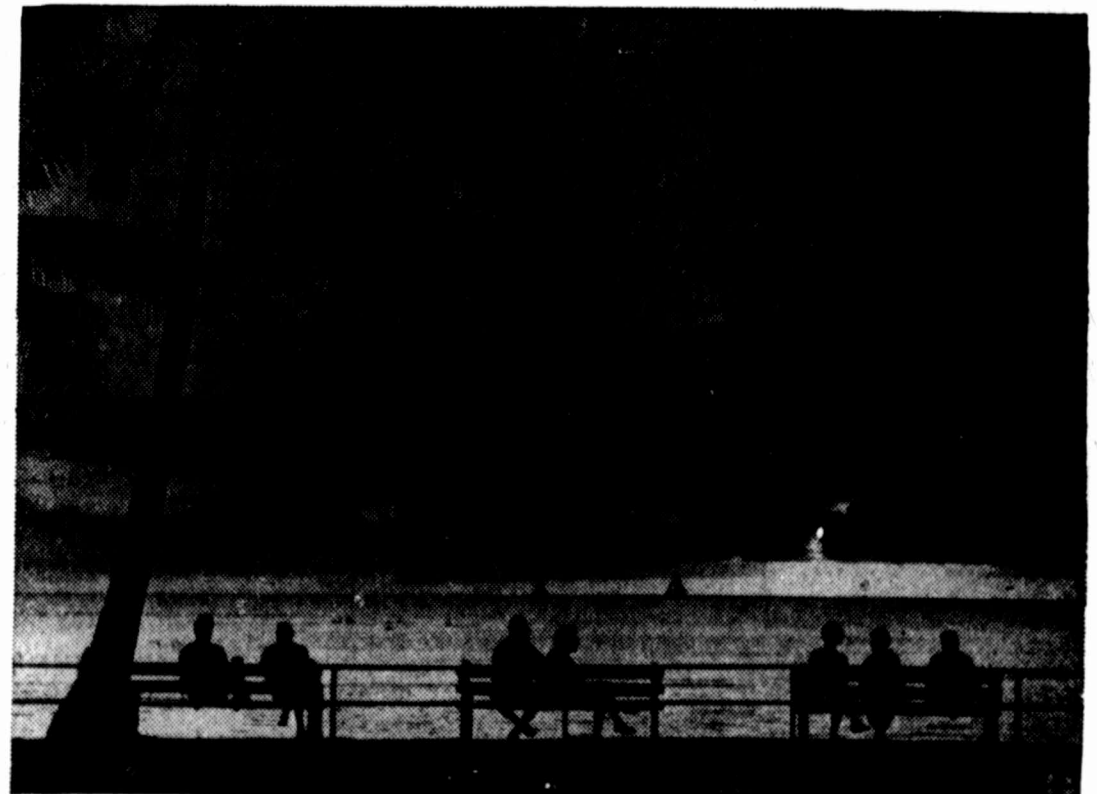

# Mistake Bombing By U.S. Planes Kill

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command announced today the loss of five more aircraft in which 15 Americans died and six were wounded, and an accidental bombing by U.S. planes that killed 10 Vietnamese militiamen and wounded 20 others.

Eight of the Americans were killed in an Army UH1 helicopter shot down Monday in the Central Highlands 21 miles southeast of Pleiku City. The only survivor was wounded.

Another six Americans were killed and two injured early today when a twin-engine AC119 gunship crashed and burned in a rice field just after taking off from Saigon's Tan Son Nhut Air Base. Spokesmen said the cause of the crash was under investigation, but it appeared that the plane developed mechanical trouble.

An OH6 observation helicopter crashed Monday while trying to evade enemy ground fire within a mile of the Cambodian border 67 miles northwest of Saigon. Two Americans were wounded, a spokesman said.

U.S. headquarters also made a delayed announcement of the loss of a medical evacuation helicopter last Thursday to enemy ground fire two miles northwest of the besieged Dak Seang Special Forces camp in the Central Highlands. No casualties were reported. But it was the 15th American aircraft lost at Dak Seang since the North Vietnamese laid siege to the camp on April 1.

The fifth American Loss was an Air Force fighter-bomber that was hit last Saturday on a

mission over Laos. The crew tried to get back to its base in Thailand but crashed southeast of Khon Kaen, in Thailand. The pilot was killed and the copilot injured.

The accidental bombing occurred Monday afternoon along the coastal lowlands 77 miles southeast of Da Nang.

"Two U.S. Marine A4 aircraft accidentally delivered bombs on civilian irregular defense group forces while on a bombing mission in response to a request from ground troops," a U.S. communique said. "The accident is under investigation."

The U.S. Command said there were 32 enemy rocket and mortar attacks from 8 a.m. Monday to 8 a.m. Tuesday, with one American killed and 17 wounded.

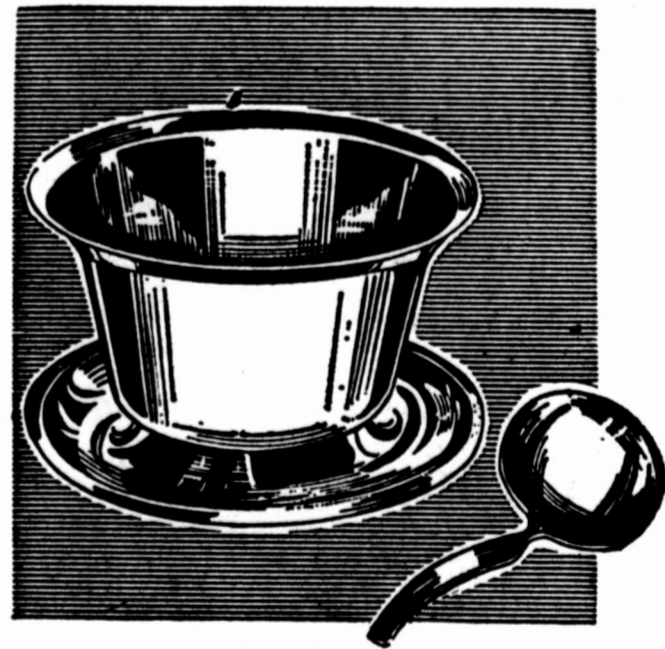

## Urges Congress To Grant Power To Protect Latins

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — The U.S. Civil Rights Commission urged Congress Monday to give federal officials more power to protect Mexican-Americans from police discrimination in the Southwest.

The commission said it found evidence of "widespread patterns of police misconduct" against Mexican-Americans, including "excessive police violence."

It recommended Congress pass laws authorizing civil actions by the U.S. Attorney General against law officers and agencies, "to enjoin patterns of discriminatory treatment" and interference with minorities' lawful organizational efforts.

The Department of Justice now has no authority to deal with patterns of police misconduct, the commission said.

The six-member commission also was critical of the FBI in its investigation of alleged civil rights violations, saying agents "have often failed to interview important witnesses ... or interviewed such witnesses in a perfunctory and hostile manner."

Mexican-Americans expressed fear of the Texas Rangers, the 135-page report stated. It

charged that the Rangers harassed organizers of a farm workers union effort in deep South Texas in 1966 and 1967. The Rangers have denied such claims.

Local remedies for police malpractice are inadequate, the commission found.

In most southwestern cities, the report said, "the only places where individuals can file complaints against the police are the police departments themselves."

East's eight of diamonds played a key role in defending against South's grand slam contract in no trump. Retention of that card by the defender averted a 2,300 point swing on the deal.

When North's three heart response to his partner's opening two no trump bid was raised to game, the former proceeded to check for controls via Blackwood. After his inquiry uncovered all the aces and kings, North reasoned that he could count 11 tricks—five hearts and two in each of the other suits. Since the Blackwood responses had revealed only 17 of South's points, he could be relied on for at least 5 more points—enough to assure a reasonable play for 13 tricks and North proceeded without further ado to seven no trump.

West opened the queen of diamonds which was won in the closed hand with the king. Twelve top tricks could be counted. Declarer tried first

to score his 13th in hearts where he needed only a three-two division in the suit. The ace of hearts was cashed followed by the queen on which West discarded a diamond.

South next turned his attention to clubs by playing the ace and queen—however he met disappointment once more when East showed out on the second round, parting with a spade. There was one more string to declarer's bow—a squeeze play. West was known to have the missing clubs, and from his opening lead, it appeared that he had the main burden of protecting the diamond suit.

In order to place some preliminary pressure on East, South cashed the king of clubs. Had East discarded one of his two remaining diamonds, he would have created a true squeeze position against his partner. South merely leads over to the king of hearts and then runs the spade suit. West can part with one club and one more diamond. When the fourth spade is led, however, West must give up his protection in either diamonds or clubs since North still has the ace-seven of diamonds left while South retains the eight of clubs.

When the king of clubs was led, East was alert to the possibility that his seemingly worthless diamond holding might provide some assistance to partner in the end position, and he discarded a spade. This broke up the squeeze, for after the king of hearts was played and the spades were run, West was able to give up his diamond protection. North's seven of diamonds lost the last trick to the eight which East had been careful to preserve to the hilt.

## Guardsmen To Aid Clean-Up Litter

The 30 local National Guardsmen will form ranks May 17 for a one-hour attack on the litter problem in Big Spring as part of the state guard's month-long "Operation Clean and Green."

The state's 20,000 "citizen soldiers" will participate in the clean-up operation with the blessing of Gov. Preston Smith, Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, Texas Adjutant General, announced from Austin.

First Sgt. Douglas C. Hedges, at the local armory, said Monday the officers of the Big Spring element of Battery C, 3rd Battalion, 133rd Artillery would meet with city officials sometime before the May 17 drill date to choose one of the city's most cluttered spots for the anti-litter campaign.

Sgt. Hedges said the guards will furnish its own vehicles to haul off the trash and that each guardsman is expected to pick

up a bushel of debris and devote one hour of regular drill time to the operation.

Gen. Ayers said, "It (the campaign) will emphasize the fact that Texas National Guardsmen are willing to give more than lip-service to community activities which improve living conditions for every citizen."

The clean-up will show that the local guard is ready to help in situations other than strict emergencies. Sgt. Hedges said, and that the guardsmen will help solve community problems

of any nature.

"I am confident the project will be a major success and serve as a guide to other groups for similar endeavors," Gov. Smith said, and indicated he would join the campaign in Austin if his schedule permits.

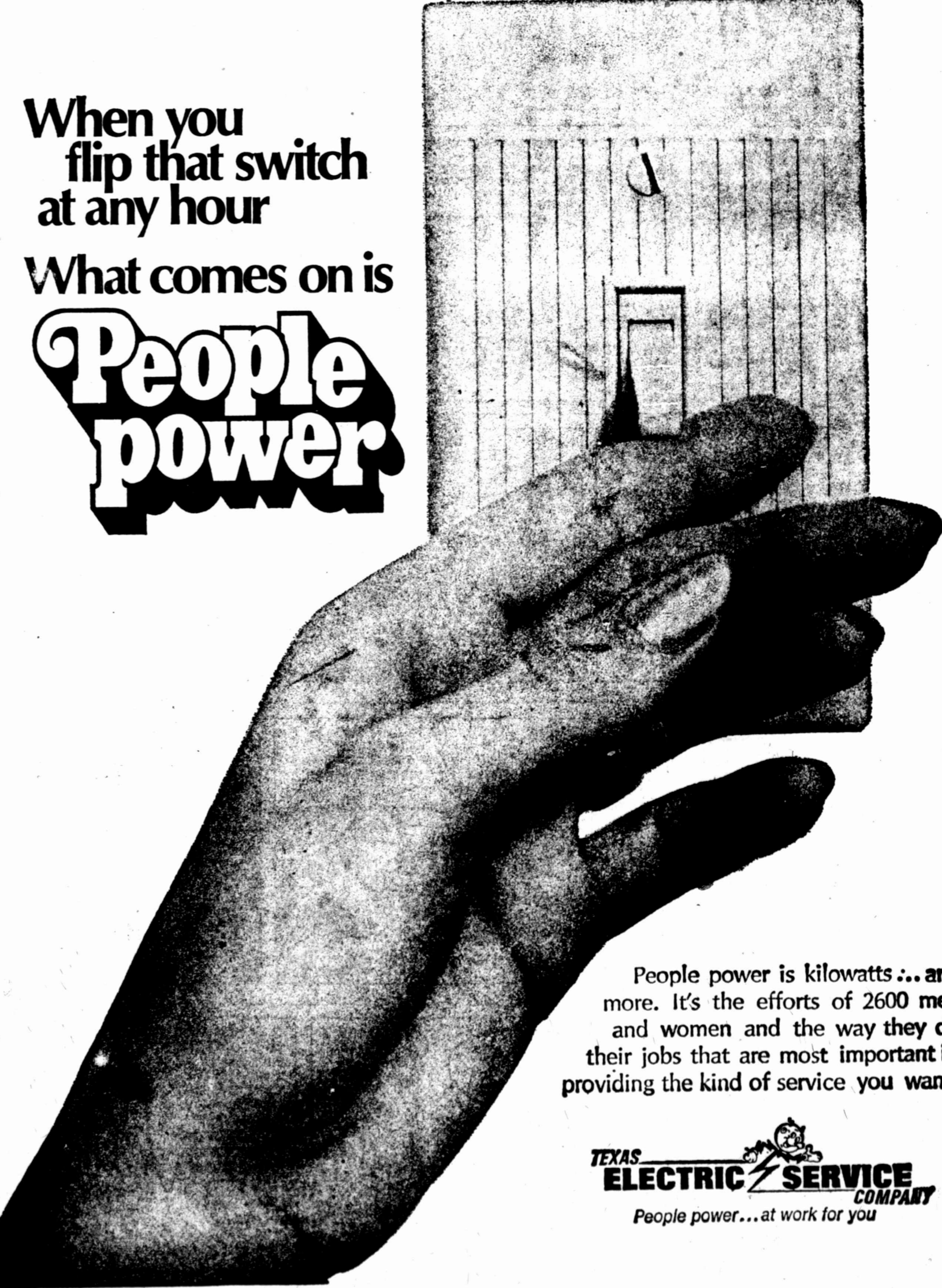

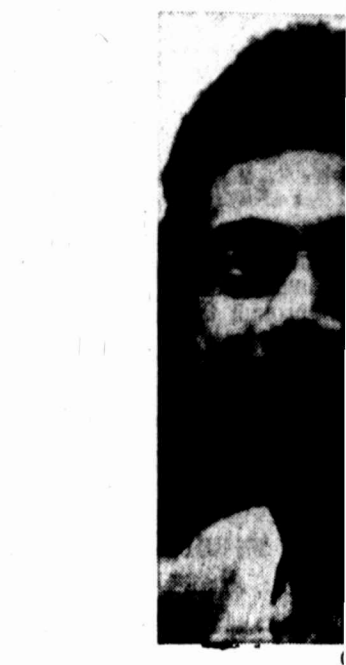

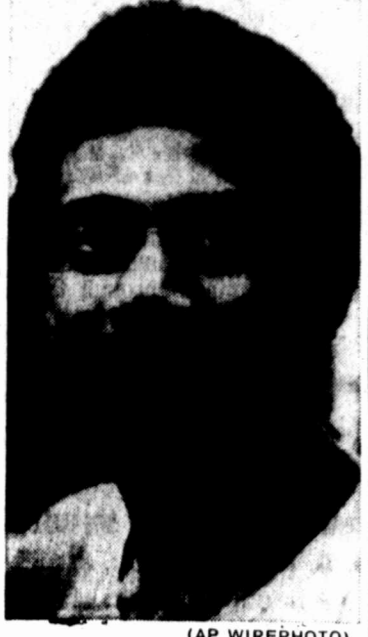

As they approach a midnight deadline for a strike by 80 percent of the force, New York City policemen have scheduled a meeting to decide their response to a city-requested court order prohibiting the strike. Elsewhere, Minneapolis teachers moved to end a three-week strike.

action," was called to back police demands for an additional \$2,700 in pay over their 27-month contract. Kiernan, conceded that the plan violates the state's Taylor Law, which forbids strikes, work stoppages or slowdowns by public employees. The city

used it as the basis for obtaining that calls for salaries of patrolmen to be maintained in a ratio of 3.0 to 3.5 to those of sergeants, who were given a pay hike in February. Current pay for a first-grade patrolman is \$10,950 a year.

In Minneapolis, the Minneapolis Federation of Teachers Local 59, AFL-CIO, scheduled a vote Tuesday on a tentative contract. Jubilation swept a meeting of the 1,800-member MFT Monday when word was received of the tentative agreement. Details of the settlement were not immediately available, but one union leader praised its provisions regarding class size and preparation time.

During most of the strike—the city has kept the schools closed to the system's 68,000 pupils. In another development, the Chicago Sun-Times reported that the top leadership of the Teamsters Union has been summoned to Washington for a final prebidding review on Thursday of a tentative national contract.

New York City obtained the temporary court restraint Monday after Mayor John V. Lindsay charged that the policemen's salary demands would "drive the city into bankruptcy." He added that the "unlawful action... could place in jeopardy the safety of the citizens."

Four Traffic Items Studied

The Big Spring Traffic Commission met briefly Monday morning in regular session to consider four items concerning traffic control in the city.

The commission requested a traffic count at the intersection of Eighteenth and Scurry after hearing a request from Mrs. Elma Alderson to consider replacing the traffic signal at that point.

After a traffic control study at Thirteenth and Young, the commission decided that the law regulating right of way at intersections should be sufficient to regulate traffic at that point. It had been suggested that other control measures might be required because of visual obstructions, but the commission found that no critical problem existed at the intersection.

In final action the commission requested a traffic count on North Eleventh, from US 87 to North Gregg, to determine what traffic controls might be required there.
