UNTIL EGYPT PULLS BACK MISSILES IN SUEZ CANAL ZONE

Israel Drops Out Of Peace Talks

By The Associated Press

Israel says it will not return to peace talks at the United Nations in New York until Egypt pulls back the antiaircraft missiles it has placed in the Suez Canal cease-fire zone since the truce took effect Aug. 7.

"Apparently this will mean some delay," President Nixon's press secretary, Ronald Ziegler, told newsmen in Washington. "We are hopeful that the talks will start soon. The United States will continue to make every effort to work out this prob-

TELL THE TRUTH Sources close to the Egyptian government in Cairo charged that the breakdown of the peace

talks is a result of the State Department's confirmation of Israel's "false allegations" of Egyptian cease-fire violations. They said the SAM missiles had been placed along the canal before the truce started and they could not be pulled back. In a dramatic development in

the Middle East, Palestinian

commandos hijacked three jetliners over Europe and forced them to fly to Arab countries.

One, a Pan American World Airways Boeing 747 jumbo jet, was destroyed with a dynamite bomb minutes after it landed at Cairo. The 188 persons aboard -passengers, hijackers, crew and 18 Palestinians picked up during a refueling stop at Beirut —had left the plane moments before it burst into flame.

The other two hijacked planes were under guerrilla control at Zerqua, 15 miles northwest of

Amman, Jordan. Guerrillas there threatened to blow up the planes unless three demands were met.

RETURN OF WOMAN

The first demand was for the safe return of a woman commando who was arrested after an attempt to hijack a fourth plane failed and it landed safely at London. The plane, an Israeli El Al jet with 157 aboard, was diverted after it took off from Amsterdam on a flight to New

About 6,000 people, most young and about 35 per cent white, shot clenched fists into the air and shouted "right on" and "power to the people" as each demand was read inside the Temple University gymnasium that served as a convention hall.

Most demonstrated a concern that "the people" must directly control everything ranging from what they do with their own bodies to education, police, court justice and the actions of

the military One workshop demanded that national minorities be guaranteed the right to integrate, segregate, federate, amalgamate, congregate, secede, or do whatever they wish, provided that no group oppresses any oth-

er group.
FREE HOUSING

Other demands included: -Guaranteed representation for all ethnic groups in whatever government structure is formed in proportion to their numbers at the local level.

-Free housing, health care, education, and day care centers for children, all paid for by the government -The right, and the duty, for

everyone to bear arms, perhaps in the form of a justice-dispensing "people's militia" that would include women. -People judged only by their

-Free abortion sterilization, and contraceptive devices for men and women.

-Drastic changes in the present family structure, with more emphasis on communal living and men sharing house work equally with women.

-Both education and art to serve "the people," and assist in teaching revolutionary ideas.

CHILD SLAIN

Found slain in two separate cabins in this community of 3,000 in the pre-dawn hours Saturday were Mrs. Shirley Wasyk, 30, Tracy Wasyk, 7; Raymond John Phipps, 42; his wife, Isabelle, 26; and three of their children, Paul, 10, Bryan, 7, and Kenneth, 18 months.

A fourth Phipps child, Cathy, 8, was found dead Sunday near a ditched car which the Royal Canadian Mounted Police said had been driven by the killer. Also found near the car was the body of Tracy Wasyk, which was taken from the cabin after officers found her and her mother dead and left to check nearby homes. BODIES SLASHED

The RCMP said Cathy Phipps had been taken hostage by the killer after her parents and the others were shot to death and their bodies were mutilated with a knife. Cathy later was stabbed

Fifty officers using helicopters and tracker dogs searched 41 hours for the killer near where the car was found abandoned on a country road. Nelson was spotted Sunday five miles away at a shack in which he had lived for a week, near the homes of the victims.

At Airport In Cairo Skyjackings To

CAIRO (AP) - Arab guerrillas blew up a hijacked Pan American World Airways 747 jumbo jet here early today eight minutes after the plane landed. A spokesman for the airline said all 188 persons aboard had disembarked safely.

One Of Three

Middle East

A Pan American Boeing 707 relief plane landed later at Cairo airport to pick up the passengers stranded by the hijackers. It was one of four planes involved in hijacking plots Sunday all apparently by Arab commandos.

BLOWN UP

An earlier report that 15 persons aboard the 747 were missing was labeled erroneous by a Pan American spokesman.

The relief plane, flown here from London, was expected to fly out most of the passengers of the destroyed 747.

The jumbo jet was engulfed in flames after the passengers and crew had been removed.

Witnesses said four persons were injured fleeing the plane through its emergency exits. They said one appeared to have a broken leg and two others had back injuries. A pregnant woman just barely escaped with an injured ankle, the witnesses

The Egyptian government announced all the passengers would be released as soon as Pan Am sends another plane to pick them up. The airline said in Lebanon that a Boeing 707 was dispatched from London to get the stranded passengers. Cairo's Middle East News Agency said 85 Americans were among them.

CREW SAFE

In Beirut, the guerrillas said they would blow up the other two hijacked planes unless a set of demands were met. The Swiss Red Cross said a representative had been allowed to see the planes at Zerqa, 15 miles northwest of Amman, Jordan, and had reported the passengers and crew were safe.

The lives of more than 640 persons hung in the balance during the three hijackings and a fourth attempt that was foiled in a gun battle over England.

The U.S. Command said in a newly issued summary that American troop strength in Vietnam as of last Thursday was 399,500, a decrease of 2,800 over the previous week and the lowest since Jan. 14, 1967, when the strength was 398,400.

NEW CUTBACKS

The top authorized U.S. strength in Vietnam was set in 1968 by former President Lyndon B. Johnson at 549,500 but that was never reached. Actual American strength in Vietnam reached its peak at 543,400 in April, 1969, a few months before President Nixon announced the Air Force with an eye toward first round of withdrawals.

It's Playtime At Amistad Lake

DEL RIO, Tex. (AP) - Amistad Lake stretches for miles across two countries near this border city. It's an international playground, and playtime has just begun

In a hot, dry, rocky land of cactus and scrub brush on the Mexican border, the lake has attracted nearly a half million visitors this year more than the entire total for 1969.

The National Park Service, which administers the lake area, say two million sportsmen and tourists may eventually visit it each year. **BEST KIND**

The tourist business, as one phrased it is "The best kind of industry you could have. It's practically pollution free.

Houseboats, yachts and fishing boats now roam where sheep and goats grazed. A businessman says boat and motor sales have easily doubled in the Del Rio area.

Sailboats — a rarity here a few years ago — skimmed across the lake in a recent regatta that drew competitors from as far away as Houston. Plans are being made for motorboat races as a tourist attraction.

Residents are a little surprised when they see a boat heading for the lake.

"I never dreamed that in this dry, arid land I would ever see so many boats," chuckled Mayor Alfredo Gutierrez Jr.

Two marinas for docking private boats are in their second year of operation. The Park Service says about six more will be built.

BIG CATFISH The clear blue lake is full of bass and catfish. It's not at all unusual, anglers say, to catch catfish weighing 30 pounds or more.

About 7,000 acres along the lake is open for dove and quail hunting. The sheer size of Amistad Lake, described as North America's 10th largest reservoir, offers a haven for solitude.

"The lake is so large," said concessionaire Tom Taylor, "that it's hard to realize so many boats are out there. You may go 50 miles and see

only 10 or 15 boats, but there may be 50 or 60 on the water."

The lake dates back to 1965, when construction began on Amistad Friendship dam a joint U.S.-Mexico project to tame the Rio Grande.

CHEERING CROWD

A year ago, on Sept. 8, 1969, the presidents of the United States and Mexico dedicated the \$80 million structure before a sweltering, cheering crowd of 10,000

Standing atop the dam, Presidents *Richard Nixon and Gustavo Diaz Ordaz saw a vast expanse of water covering their countries' border - the Rio Grande — and spreading like a deep blue carpet into both Texas and Mexico.

The lake now has backed up the Rio Grande for more than 80 miles. Two other presidents, Dwight

Eisenhower and Adolfo Lopez Mateos, met on the border here 10 years ago and pledged to build Amistad Dam. Their visit has been observed every year since then. The local Good Neighbor Council, an organization of

community leaders from both sides of the border, plans to celebrate the 10th anniversary of their meeting with an elaborate fiesta Oct. 22-25.

PERKS ECONOMY Local businessmen say the lake, 12 miles north of here, has boosted the economy of both Del Rio and Ciudad

Acuna in Mexico. Neither city has yet been struck with boom town fever.

Bill Cauthorn, 32, a bank president, said there was a slight economic slowdown when engineers and workmen left after completing the dam.

"It opened people's eyes to the fact that we're not going to have a real boom here," Cauthorn said. "I think we're going to have a real healthy, steady, continual growth. I think that's better than the boom that a

lot of people expected." Jim Long, president of the Del Rio Board of Realtors, said development around the lake has come to a "screeching halt." He attributed it to the status of the national economy rather than local factors.

NO DOUBT ABOUT IT "Right now we're biding our time, more or less waiting, because it's going to happen," he said. "There's no doubt about it.

Business in Del Rio is by no means at a standstill. Bank deposits increased nearly \$500,000 over the past year. Convention activity has grown an estimated 20 per cent since Amistad Dam was completed.

City officials said the dip in the local economy may have been partly a result of Operation Intercept, the U.S. crackdown on drug traffic that created long lines of cars last fall at ports of entry along the border. TOURIST TRADE

Businessmen and others say they expect Amistad Lake to become one of the greatest resorts in the Southwest, and a prime attraction during the winter for visitors from the North. City Manager Jim Hester envisions a steadily increasing tourist trade and a growing retirement community

Some say 100 or so businesses have opened here since construction began on Amistad Dam in 1965. Many are named for the lake and directly related to it, such as trailer camps, bait shops and boat storage houses.

One of the newest establishments is a 40-room motel with a sweeping view of the lake and quick access to the water.

Owner Bill Stewart, a former Odessa auto dealer, predicts a bright future. "I think it's going to be great," he said. "I sold a business making \$100,000 a year to move down

Amistad Lake, he said, has done a great deal for Del Rio "more than an airplane factory.

There has been little development to date on the Mexican side of the lake, but there is talk of building a grand resort city on a 2,000-acre site near the dam.

Jorge Masso director of tourism for the Mexican state of Coahuila, said plans on Mexico's side call for a scenic road around the lake, a country club, golf course and other attrac-

Chicago Stockyards have closed, but its world-famous market will continue to handle cattle.



Left unsaid in the suit but obviously in the minds of Texas, Louisiana and federal officials is the extension of the boundary into the Gulf.

Although Texas' suit does not touch on where in the Gulf the boundary will be, Texas could gain half the width of the rialong the boundary line extending into the Gulf.

Since Texas' offshore rights stretch out 10-1/2 miles, or 7-1/2 miles farther than Louisiana, a Texas victory means a federal loss of that 800-foot stretch of submerged Gulf land for that extra 7-1/2 miles.

The suit deals only with the inland boundary, and unless the states agree voluntarily to what the boundary into the Gulf is -whether it slants east or west -a second suit to determine it will follow the current case, say federal officials.

"INTEREST"

George Swarth of the Justice Department described the department's role as one of 'watchful interest.'

During the dispute, three separate boundaries into the Gulf are being observed by Texas, Louisiana and the federal government, which also deals in offshore mineral leases.

The disputed area involves 35.1 square miles of the Gulf and 61 square miles inland on the river and lake. Texas has temporarily suspended leasing of submerged tracts until the boundary cleared up.

BIG MONEY

As an example of the potential wealth of the area, the Texas General Land Office recently withdrew a tract on which Superior Oil Co. had bid more than \$500,000. Oil and gas companies usually expect 20 times from production of what they bid on a lease—in his case \$10 million. The state would get 1-6 of the production royalties, making its total estimated gain from lease of this single tract almost \$2.2 million.

A special master, retired federal judge Robert van Pelt of Nebraska, has been appointed to make recommendations to the Supreme Court, which would make the final decision.

TIDELANDS VETERANS Lawyers' in the suit include Louisiana Atty. Gen. Jack Gremillion and former Texas Gov. Price Daniel, both veterans of the 1960 tidelands decision in which the Supreme Court set the limits on how much of the Gulf the states owned.

Most offshore drilling at that time was off Louisiana. The Supreme Court ruling that Louisiana owned only to the threemile limit in the Gulf cost the state esimated \$300 million in lease money which went to the

federal government. Texas was granted the 10mile limitation but, at that time, only 18 wells which had brought



Hazard Of Mercury Pollution

become one of the most pressing ecological problems of modern times. Men may soon discover that they cannot safely eat fish from most rivers and lakes in the United States. Oysters, fish and shrimp from coastal waters may be the next source of mercury poisoning.

The United States came late to the realization of the potential danger. which was publicly acknowledged only early this year. But in March, 1968. Swedish health officials warned their people not to eat fish from most fresh or coastal waters more than once a week because of mercury contamination. Sweden sets the danger from mercury in fish at one part per million, twice the limit set in the United States.

Industries particularly paper mills, have been singled out as the culprits in the United States. But there is a possible, much more pervasive source: Mercury used to treat seeds against fungus. About 6 million pounds of mercury a year are used in the treatment of seed. Health officials say there is strong evidence that this mercury is entering the human food cycle.

Until recently mercury was not considered a problem. It was believed

Mercury poisoning has suddenly that the mercury was inert, that it remained harmlessly in the ground or dropped to the bottom of waters. But is has been discovered that micro-organism convert mercury into methylmercury, a lighter organic compound that can be absorbed by fish, animals and human beings.

> The Swedes found mercury far above natural traces in beef, pork and eggs. The levels dropped when most mercury seed-treating was halted. In the United States, mercury has been found in hen's eggs, but not at danger levels. This has prompted an urgent search for mercury in other foods, especially pork and beef.

The danger of mercury to man was emphasized by the World Health Organization, which recommends that the "safe" level be set at one-half that set in the United States, of .25 parts per million. Mercury kills brain and nerve cells. Swedish researchers suggest that methylmercry produces a series of daughter chemicals that "must be extremely injurious to protein-synthesis" and may eventually lead to live cancer.

Immediate, drastic curbs on the use of mercury for treating seed and total control against the release of mercury by industrial processes will be required.

Who Controls The Oceans?

Who owns the oceans and who is ther and further as undersea going to exploit them? technology develops.

There could be a result of highly divided national domains under the sea. There should be a worldwide agreement on sovereignty and an international agency to regulate explitation of the seas.

So far, no such agreement has been spelled out. But highly skilled uses of the ocean - mining, fishing, farming - are just ahead of us. Offshore drilling already accounts for 16 per cent of the world's petroleum. Other resources will be coming into the picture. An agreement must be

Terrorism Threatens Police System

WASHINGTON — Many a country in the world - not merely the United States - is feeling the sting of a new terrorism. Scarcely a day goes by that there isn't a news report of a bombing involving an embassy or public building or the kidnapping of prominent officials.

The movement seems to spread from country to country. Athens, Greece for instance, which has its radical "anti-establishment" element, too, has lately been the scene of disorders. So has The Hague in the Netherlands.

LAW-ENFORCEMENT officers here in Washington attribute the terrorism to organized planning by groups of radical revolutionaries in different lands. Manuals of instruction on how to make explosives and use them effectively, together with books on waging guirrilla warfare, have been circulated in many countries. One of the first works of this kind to come to the United States was written in Cuba, and the same book has been distributed in Canada. Articles in "underground" newspapers go into details of how to make such deadly devices as Molotov cocktails, and include maps showing the location of police stations, other law-enforcement agencies and National Guard Head-

IN THE UNITED States, explosives are readily available. In many states, it isn't necessary even to give one's name when buying dynamite. It is almost as easy to get explosives as to obtain a gun. When the dynamiting or blowing up of one place is reported, the tactic has an infectious effect on criminal minds, and there is a temptation by the militant elements to try the same maneuver in order to create as much havoc as possible.

The planting of explosives in cars in parking lots, the bombing or burning of buildings, the shooting of police officers, and the incitement of riots and other disorders have caused concern in America as to what is

THE DEMOLITION of the Army Mathematics Research Center at the University of Wisconsin not only caused property damage of six million dollars, but one man was killed and four others injured. An untold amount of research by graduate students and professors, involving the life work of some scholars, was destroyed in the blast. This was all supposed to be justified by the radicals because some of the research was being done for the United States Army.

THERE IS, of course, a public sentiment arising that lawmakers must crack down on those who are responsible for the violence in the United States and particularly the terrorist campaign against the police. Senator James O. Eastland, Democrat, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, has just pointed out that attacks against 13 policemen in two cities last weekend may have been "the opening shots of a new is clearly "an undisguised attack on law and order, an assault aimed at the heart of our nation — this is guerrilla warfare in our cities.'

MR. EASTLAND is preparing legislation to give the federal government - particularly the FBI - more authority to intervene because he contends, the revolutionaries are operating across state lines. Undoubtedly if the terrorism continues, an era of "repression" could ensue. For the feeling is growing that the whole police system will be threatened unless those who are assaulting policemen are punished severely for their crimes.

THE NEW terrorism undoubtedly is the work of radicals and revolutionaries in many countries, and governments are striving to find ways to deal with it. In the United States. however, with federal, state and local governments plainly supported by public opinion, it is quite likely that stern measures will be taken to cope with the problem. Certainly, unless the morale of the police of the cities and the state troopers is strengthened, the terrorism could grow to disastrous proportions in America. have paid the freight for building the most advanced society in the history of civilization. THIS FRINGE rebellion has now

passed into a stage of confusion, frustration and lack of trust in political leadership of any color or stripe.

They may still be silent, but they are struggling for a voice. And the articulating process is not only interesting to watch, but full of foreboding for the course of events during the coming decade. Let us trace briefly the cause of

the current alienation

SINCE WORLD WAR II, real income (after taxes and inflation) for the lower one-fifth of the spectrum, that is the very poor, has increased

Real income for the top fifth of the spectrum has increased over 40 per cent.

Real income for the middle threethe wage earners of America, who have been sold "progress" for 25 years as the way to patroitic self-fulfillment, worse off than they were

AS THE ALIENATION movement among middle Americans matures, more and more common denominators are found between this alienation movement and frustrations of both the black and the young Americans.

Perceiving a political structure that appears to care more for its own perpetuation than for any real service on behalf of constituents, the wage earning taxpayer views a panorama of contradiction.

We are told that unemployment is in the national interest. We are assured that we can get out of Vietnam by getting into Cambodia. Our most educated young people sometimes show their learning the least.

WE FACE BOTH depression and inflation simultaneously. We watch our national wealth and our national debt increase at the same time.

Our majorities think the minorities are running the country. Our minorities think the country is running

AMID THIS disarray we hear the cry for better and more assertive public leadership. But this approach to the problem again treats only surface issues. Americans have never had a problem resurrecting leaders to articulate a well-defined and persuasive public position.
