SKYJACK NIGHTMARE ENDS

Plane Passengers En Route Home

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) - For most, the nightmare was over. They danced about, they murmured private prayers of thanksgiving. They had been under a constant threat of death by explosion, and they congratulated each other on surviving the ordeal of three to six days in the Jordan desert.

These were the women and children-more than 100 of them -who were let off the three hijacked airliners Saturday and brought to Amman, shortly before the planes were blown up.

"We are so relieved to be out of the wilderness and back to civilization," said Miriam Lesser of Brooklyn. "We shall be the luckiest people alive when we set foot on Kennedy Airport again. We have no complaints, we were all treated pretty

Sara Raab of Trenton, N.J. said her son, David, 18, had been taken away by the guerrillas and she did not know where

"I'm very upset about David. He is only a child," she said.

Another group of 66 freed hostages, including 38 Americans, arrived in Zurich on a chartered jet after spending the night in Nicosia, Cyprus. They had been flown to Nicosia from Amman Friday night in a Jordanian Airlines plane.

Greta Husser of New York said it had been a "nightmare." "When we were in Amman there was shooting every day. Some of the rooms were hit by gunfire. So we were sleeping in

the basement and hallways.' But all was quiet in Amman as the new group arrived at the hotel. The women agreed that the guerrillas had not mistreated

The hotel lobby was pandemonium, with hostages, armed guerrillas, reporters milling about. A young guerrilla was singing through a bullhorn as the convoy arrived. He hoisted a Jewish boy in his arms and exchanged the boy's skullcap for his own crimson beret. Then he rumpled the boy's hair and gave him back his cap.

The hostages appeared pastyfaced after their long confinement on the hot planes. They had been allowed out only for brief walks.

Mrs. Lev Kahn, New Rochelle, N.Y., traveling with her daughter, Judy, 10, and son, Danny, 8, described their captivity as "being in a big cage."

Sylvia Jacobson, Tallahassee, Fla., said she saw no torture but that it wasn't pleasant "to be cooped up with 100 other people in a narrow space in the middle of the desert, and threatened with being blown up."

Viola Horowitz, wife of a Brooklyn rabbi, repeatedly kissed and hugged her 9-monthold son, Mordechai.

"Mordechai is a wonderful little boy," she said.

She said there had been a problem of sanitary conditions on the plane and the heat had bothered the baby.

"But I must say we were treated very well and no different from the non-Jewish passengers. There was no kosher food, of course, but we made do with fruit and eggs. I also ate Arab bread. It doesn't taste so good but it's better than nothing," Mrs. Horowitz said.

SMASHED-UP HELICOPTER — A rescue helicopter from Webb AFB which was on a mission supporting investigation of the past week's mid-air collision of two T-38s was forced to an emergency landing about 5:30 p.m. Saturday near the intersection of US 87 South and the Forsan road some 14 miles south of Big Spring. The craft was extensively damaged. Three crew members received minor injuries and were treated at the Base hospital. They are Lt. Col. Roland E. Speck-Capt. Allan Fox and T.Sgt. Greene A. Campbell. The helicopter (called Pedro I) is assigned to Det. 18 of the 42nd Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron, attached to Webb.

Quake Shakes Texas Beauty Is Golden State

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A rolling earthquake jolted a wide area of quake-prone Southern California on Saturday, swaying tall buildings and shattering windows but causing no major

injuring four aerospace plant workers. No other injuries were Worried residents, many of them jarred awake, flooded po-

lice departments with telephone calls throughout an area of more than 10,000 square miles. The quake, one of the strongest in Southern California in recent years, was preceded by a much smaller temblor at 7:14

a.m. and was followed by a light aftershock at 7:35 a.m. Scientists at the California Institute of Technology in nearby Pasadena said the quake was centered about 50 miles east of Los Angeles, along a branch of

the San Andreas Fault. Caltech scientists said the main quake registered between 4.5 and 5.0 on the Richter scale and scientists at the University of California at Berkeley, about 400 miles north, recorded it at 6.0, indicating a potentially

damaging earthquake. A jump of a whole number on the scale represents a 10-fold increase of intensity at the quake's point of origin. The 1906 San Francisco quake registered 8.3 and the 1964 Alaska quake

Kaiders Lip Green Wave

LUBBOCK (AP) - Quarterback Charles Napper jolted 13 yards for a touchdown with four minutes to play and rallied Texas Tech to a 21-14 victory over Tulane Saturday night in the college foot-

ball opener for both teams. Napper engineered the Raiders 47 yards in five plays for the winning touchdown to erase two defensive gems by Tulane defensive halfback Joe Bullard that enabled the Green Wave to take a 14-7 lead into the fourth quarter.

But Tech defensive back Ken Perkins got the Raiders back into the running early in the fourth period when he picked off a pass by Tulane quarterback Greg Gleason and raced 46 yards for a touchdown to tie the score 14-14.

That set the stage for Napper's clutch performance. Napper kept the drive going with a 2-yard keeper on a big third down play to the Green Wave 36-yard line. He then made a great fake to running back Danny Hardaway and bolted 23 yards to the 13. On the next play he scooted into the end zone

Tulane took the kickoff and went to the air in an attempt to get on the scoreboard once again, but Gleason fumbled and Tech defensive end Bruce Dowdy pounced on it to quelch the drive and the Raiders ran out the clock. It was a quick change of events for the Green

Wave, who capitalized on a pair of defensive plays by Bullard for a 14-7 lead as the last quarter

Bullard set up Tulane's first touchdown with a thrilling 45-yard punt return to the Tech 18 to start the second quarter. Five plays later Gleason ran over from the two.

Late in the third quarter Bullard grabbed a pass from Napper and raced 50 yards with the interception for Tulane's other touchdown.

Tech's first touchdown came on the second play after Tulane fullback Bob Marshall fumbled and Tech's Wayne McDermond recovered at the Green Wave 14. Tech running back Miles Langerennig ran off tackle 13 yards for the touchdown.

Tech's offensive line, described by Tech coach Jim Carlen as a Raider weak spot, came through when it counted, opening up large holes to support the Raider rushing game which ground out 182 yards against the defensively tough Green Wave.

The game was marked by surprisingly few penalties for a season opener. One of the Raiders penalties stalled a drive that could have given them

a lead at half time. Late in the second quarter, assisted by an 18yard pass from Napper, tight end Robbie Best, the Raiders drove to the Tulane 45. Napper apparently had completed a first down pass to running back Doug McCutchen at the Tulane 35. But an offensive holding penalty cost the Raiders the ball.

Tech finished with three penalties for 28 yards and Tulane had one for five yards. David Abercrombie carried the brunt of Tu-

Tulane had 141 yards rushing and 36 passing to Tech's 182 yards on the ground and 77 passing.

Making Moss Creek Lake Bigger

One of these days, Moss Creek Lake will be presenting a different appearance. For one thing, it will have a capacity of more than half again as it does now under state permit. Considering the reservoir when it might be full, this would change shorelines and a lot of other things.

This lake, now about 30 years old and once considered an important city supply when Big Spring's needs were not so great, is now used as a part of the interlocking system of the Colorado River Municipal Water Dis-

The state has granted a permit to boost the capacity by 1,550 acre-feet (it now is 2,447 acre-feet). Actually, this is not to impound more water for consumption, but is to make Moss Creek Lake a larger storage reservoir

for waters that might be coming in from other CRMWD lakes (Thomas, Spence, Powell). This procedure has been followed to reduce pipeline transportation costs as well as to maintain reserves during off-peak water use periods.

It really means putting to more practical use a facility that has been important in the local scheme of water provision. It fits into the CRMWD's long range planning.

Preparation is commendable, and one of these days all the CRMWD program will enure to vast benefit of all this section of West Texas. Meanwhile, those of us who are not experts in the water business continue to hope for heavy rainfall. Full lakes make a lot of difference.

A Law For Immunization

What should be regarded as a commonsense public health step would be law requiring immunization against several diseases for children before they enter school.

Governor Preston Smith has announced advocacy of legislation to cover such precautions against diphtheria, polio, measles, whooping cough and tetanus. We see no immediate reason why this program should not have legislative attention.

As of now, Texas requires only a smallpox vaccination. Some cities and schools urge further immunization steps, but when most of such a program is on a voluntary basis, the

vulnerable to spread of diseases are those who do not respond to public appeal. The San Antonio diphtheria situation has brought the problem into focus, and there is no assurance that other communities could not be plagued as has been San Antonio.

The governor reported that as of 1968, last year comparative data is available, Texas had the highest incidence in the nation for measles and polio, the second highest for diphtheria and the fourth highest for whooping cough.

This is not a creditable status. Surely the safeguard of our children's very people who seem to be more health calls for some direct action.

Marquis Childs No Complete Answer To Hijacking

WASHINGTON - The overgrown, chaotic system of handling international passenger traffic in the airports of the world is due for a drastic overhaul as a first step in checking danger. Only seconds after the last the anarchy of aerial hijacking. of the captives dropped down the Computerizing has, if anything, made the mess messier in overcrowded air-

The steps to be taken, if anyone is serious about stopping the barbarous piracy of the air, will be both costly and difficult to enforce. They come at a time when America's international carriers are hard pressed by competition from foreign lines heavily subsidized by their various governments.

THE FIRST STEP, in the view of those convinced that tentative halfway measures will no longer suffice, is to cease all flights to capitals where known hijackers are harbored or where clearly civil control has broken down. At the top of this list would be Beirut. Two flagrant examples make abundantly plain that control over international flights arriving and departing at the Beirut airport no longer exists.

WHILE THE Pan Am 747 hijacked with 169 passengers and crew was on the ground at Beirut it was invaded by collaborators of the

Many people who have studied the Bible and who believe in God, do not believe the Bible can be the word of God. Would you tell us what your belief is regarding the Bible being the Word of God.

B.J.R.

Actually, I shouldn't have to answer this question in this column, for I have answered it over and over in my writings, and have never changed my position. I believe the Bible is the Word of God. If I did not, I would get out of the ministry immediately for I would have no authentic basis for the truths which the Bible outlines as basic and im-

portant. Like other theological students, there came a moment in my development where I entertained some real doubts about the Bible being the word of God. I knew that if I continued in the ministry, I would have to resolve these questions. If they were not resolved, I knew in my heart I would have to seek some other line of work. So, in the mountains of California, I went out into the woods all alone, and made up my mind that before that day was over, I would settle it one way or the other. I read the Bible, I meditated, and I prayed. It was one of the most crucial experiences of my life - for so much depended upon it. As the sun sank over the Western slope of the mountain, and the air began to cool, I picked up my Bible, looked to heaven and said: "God, I am going to take all of your Word that I understand as the authoritative word of God - and I'll take the parts I do not understand by faith." Since that hour I have never once questioned that the Bible is the Word of God.

THE SECOND instance is an even more glaring example of the anarchy that prevails. As the British VC-10 put down at Beirut, having been hijacked over the Persian Gulf, the guerrillas took over the control tower and ordered the plane off to an unknown destination. Here were 113 persons in imminent danger either from the plane exploding or from a precarious landing on the desert strip where the TWA and the Swissair jets

WHAT WILL HAPPEN to the hijackers in Cairo who captured the Pan Am plane should say something about whether international carriers continue to serve the Egyptian capital. One American carrier, TWA, has had flights into Cairo as have British and Australian lines. Far greater surveillance of passengers embarking on international flights is a prime requisite. Metal detectors at each gangway to pick up concealed weapons are a minimum. Place of origin, documents submitted by the passenger, passport, etc., should get more consideration than in the past. A computer cannot perform this function.

THE QUESTION of armed guards stationed on each international flight is touchier. Both for courage and resolve the crew of the El Al plane hijacked out of Amsterdam gets high marks. But there was also an element of luck. An armed struggle in a pressurized cabin at 35,000 feet in the air will not always have such a safe

Organized terror with the instruments of mass destruction is a threat to all order and civility here at home and abroad. It is the ultimate weapon of this age of violence, and how to counter it no one has yet discovered. (Copyright, 1970, United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)

And it is the season when four (or maybe five or six) men in special uniforms take their places on field to see that all the rules are observed.

I HAVE NEVER quite mastered all the wig-wagging signals the referees give, although some of them in the pro area have gotten to be real actors during their moment in the spotlight.

I do know that when the official starts stepping off yardage against our side, it has become commonplace to let out with boos and jeers. AS ONE who just goes along with

SOCCER GAMES lead to mass riots, and most every other sport has developed into such frenzy that it's a brave man who dons the uniform of an official.

There was a time when tennis, for instance, was a gentleman's game, and the referee's decisions were accepted without murmur. Nowadays we are treated to racket throwing and tantrum throwing after close calls on the courts. Sportsmanship gets shakier by the year.

ABOUT THE ONLY sport left that I immediatly recall in which irate fans do not descend upon officialdom is golf. Nobody — as yet — has started throwing folding chairs when a golfer is penalized a stroke for infraction of the rules.

David Lawrence Challenge To International Law

WASHINGTON — The biggest challenge under international law to the right of citizens to travel peacefully in other lands has been presented to the world. It is a problem of how nations must deal firmly with irresponsible elements in their midst which have seized airplanes and held passengers as hostages. Failing this, what outside force can be brought to bear?

HIJACKING INCIDENTS have begun to occur frequently, and there is a danger to air travel that has not existed before. The International Pilots Association is urging that planes are landed should not be stopping points any more and that intercourse by air should be shut off to those nations until there is a method of assuring punishment of the hijackers when they reach their destination

The situation is even more complicated by the latest episodes in the Middle East, where Palestinian guerrillas seized and held as hostages more than 300 passengers and two airplanes. This followed the hijacking and destruction of a third big airliner and the attempted seizure of a fourth. The Palestinian guerrillas have certainly not helped their cause with the outside world by these tactics.

FOR A LONG TIME under international law a nation could demand respect for the lives and property of its citizens on foreign soil. If their rights were violated, the usual recourse after repeated instances was to land troops and take possession of a seaport. The purpose was to demonstrate disapproval and to warn the country which was guilty of the

affront that further violations would not be tolerated.

LATELY, HOWEVER, the rights of citizens of many countries have been repeatedly transgressed and little has been done to protect them. Only a half century ago, an administration in power in Washington would have insisted on the immediate release of the passengers in Jordan and would not have vielded to any demands for ransom. Troops would have been made ready for a landing, and naval vessels would have been ordered to

THE PROBLEM in the current case is complicated by the fact that Jordan doesn't have control over Palestinian commandoes who carried out the hijacking operation, and a foreign government would have to go in with troops to punish those guilty of the seizure of the planes.

The United Nations, of course, should really deal with these questions. It could authorize an international force of Sea Power and Air Power to move in close to any country where the rights of foreign citizens have been violated. Unfortunately, the United Nations has not been operating in such a manner, and this is why the major powers would have to take the responsibility for protecting international rights.

HIJACKINGS such as happened over the past week involve a clear violation of rights under international law. It is the duty of governments to take collective action - which is permissible under the charter of the United Nations — to punish rebellious elements in any country that impair the rights of citizens who are engaged in peaceful visits to other lands.

WASHINGTON - It has been reported that the president of the Toyota Motor Co. has had a halfmillion dollar shrine constructed in Japan for the repose of the souls of people killed in Toyota cars.

The question that immediately comes to mind is, "Will the American automobile companies follow suit?" A gesture such as this, while not contributing significantly to auto safety, would certainly show the American public that the auto companies care.

THE AMERICAN automobile companies have two choices: One is to build an individual shrine for each make of car: "Our Lady of the Corvair," "The Latter Day Mustang Tabernacle," "Temple Oldsmobile in the Vale," "The Little Chrysler Around the Corner" and "The Valiant Sisters of Mercy," or one large shrine which would take in all the automobiles manufactured in the United States

I would opt for one shrine with as many chapels as there are makes of cars produced in this country. It would probably have to take up hundreds of acres of land, but built in a convenient location, the shrine would eventually pay for itself in parking fees alone.

SO THAT ONE company wouldn't benefit more than another, the shrine would be named "Saint Ralph's in the Square" after Ralph Nader, the patron saint of safety in the United

A large statue of Nader being followed by a detective from General Motors would be erected in the front of the shrine. The best American artists would be commissioned to paint frescoes on the ceiling, showing great moments in car crashes, and the aisles of the shrine would be payed in asphalt.

ON EACH ALTAR, in gold, would be the latest model of a car or bus produced by the manufacturer, and seats with safety belts would be provided for those who wish to meditate on the future of the automobile.

There would be services held twice a day for people who died from pollution, and others who expired while waiting for their warranties to be

Music would be provided by the tire companies, and candles could be purchased with gasoline trading

SAINT RALPH'S in the Square would hold high holy services on the day the new car models came out, where anyone contemplating buying one would receive a special blessing.

A special chapel would be set aside for those people who wanted to pray that their automobile insurance would not be canceled, and a traffic commissioner would be on duty at all times to give absolution to those who have sinned on the highway.

SINCE IT WILL be difficult for everyone in the United States to visit the shrine, it will be suggested that those people caught in traffic jams take a rug out of their car each morning and each evening, and bow in the direction of St. Ralph's in the Les Angeles Times Syndicate

Lake Pollution

CHICAGO (AP) - When H. W. Poston, Chicago environmental control commissioner, took a boat out into Lake Michigan, boarded a Great Lakes freighter and personally issued a ticket to the ship for spewing smoke from its stacks, he was declaring war on all lake pollution.

Smaller craft also are being policed to control the disposal of waste materials into the lake.

He said the diversion valve on a craft must be sealed at all times when a boat is in Chicago's waterways and harbors.

Poston said no mooring permits will be issued to any boats in 1971 if they are equipped with retention tanks and diversion valves. Diversion valves must be removed and then through the hull opening sealed with a metal plate or other approved device.
