SYRIAN, JORDANIAN TANKS CONTINUE TO SLUG IT OUT

10,000 Lives Lost In Conflict?

Jordanian and Palestine guerrilla forces battled in Amman and in northern Jordan today in the sixth day of a conflict that Cairo radio declared had cost 10.000 lives.

Syrian and Jordanian tanks slugged it out on the rocky stretches of northern Jordan in the area where Jordan has charged—and Damascus denied —that Syria had intervened. Syria says the tanks are manned by Palestinian guerril-

While the summit conference opening was ostensibly set for noon EDT, it more or less began at 4 a.m., EDT, with a series of private informal discussions among the leaders of Egypt, Sudan, Libya and Kuwait, followed by a joint meeting with Syrian President Neureddin Atassi.

Egypt warned against any American intervention in Jor-

dan as a "hostile action against the whole Arab people." Information Minister Mohammed Hassanein Heikal told

a news conference in Cairo that U.S. action in the midst of the Jordanian strife would have repercussions far beyond the Mid-

dle East. WARNS U.S.

Warning against any American action in Jordan, Heikal said this could not rescue the 54 hostages-38 of them U.S. citizens-held by Palestinian guerrillas since multiple plane hijackings Sept. 6 and Sept. 9.

"Instead," he said, "it would only threaten their lives. It would push those holding these hostages into desperate action and nobody will be able to pro-

The Soviet Union formally advised Britain it opposes foreign intervention in the Jordanian conflict, informed diplomats reported in London.

Cairo radio quoted Heikal as saying at least 10,000 persons were dead in Jordan, including 7,000 in refugee-crowded Wahdat camp southeast of Amman. CAMP DESTROYED

Heikal said guerrilla leader Yasir Arafat reported the camp was 80 per cent destroyed. Its population was believed to be about 31,000.

The United States continued to reinforce its military power in the eastern Mediterranean, but officials in Washington said President Nixon was still searching for a diplomatic solution to the crisis and that U.S. warships were standing by only in case they were needed to evacuate the 400 or so Americans in Jordan.

The U.S. ships were stationed less than 100 miles off the Israeli coast, within short fighter range of Jordan, and the Pentagon alerted troops in the United

States and Germany to prepare "to support an evacuation operation for Americans in Jordan should that be necessary."

FRESH FEARS

However, there were fears in Arab and other quarters that President Nixon was considering using troops to protect Jordan's monarchy if it became apparent that the guerrillas and Syrian tank forces would succeed in toppling it.

King Hussein accused Damascus of sending in two tank battalions during the weekend, and U.S. Secretary of State William P. Rogers demanded that they

be removed. The Syrians contend the tanks are from units of the Palestine Liberation Army stationed in Syria and not units of the regular Syrian forces.

The alleged Syrian intervention was certain to be a major topic at today's Arab summit meeting. President Nureddin Atassi of Syria arrived in Cairo late Monday and met for more than two hours with Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser to discuss "means of halting the current atrocities against the Palestinian guerrillas in Jordan," according to Damascus

Nixon Wants To Hire More FBI Agents

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon urged Congress today to authorize immediate federal intervention in cases of bombings or arson on virtually any college campus and recommended the hiring of an additional 1,000 FBI agents to

Nixon's new move was announced at a White House briefing by Republican congressional leaders after they had met for nearly three hours with the President Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and Director J. Edgar Hoover of the Federal Bureau

of Investigation. INSTANT INTERVENTION

As described the newsmen, the legislation proposed to Congress would trigger instant federal intervention when bombings, arson and terrorist acts affect a college or university receiving federal assistance. That includes virtually all institutions of higher learning.

Nixon proposed that the FBI add 1.000 agents to deal with campus outbreaks of the sort involved and to assist in programs aimed at thwarting aerial hijacking. The FBI now has about 7,000

House GOP Leader Gerald Ford of Michigan quoted Hoover as reporting that the organization Students for a Democratic Society was directly involved in 247 arson cases and 462 personal injury incidents in the past academic year. He said these were in addition to about 300 other episodes of destruction of other facilities or property.

Ford, predicting congressional enactment of the legislation, declared, "I think it will have a beneficial effect."

Kermit Mom Still Missing

KERMIT, Tex. (AP) — Officers in this Southwest Texas town said today they are without leads in the case of Mrs. Nancy Mitchell, 27, who vanished from her home last week.

Mrs. Mitchell's husband, Gene, told authorities he found his wife missing when he returned home from his job at a pipeline company at 12:45 a.m. Wednesday.

Searchers found clothing belonging to Mrs. Mitchell, mother of two, scattered north of Texas 302 from three to five miles east of Kermit. "There are no new leads," a sheriff's depart-

ment employe said. "We have stopped the concentrated search, but officers are still looking for Texas Rangers, highway patrolmen, sheriff's

officers and police fanned out in jeeps and on horseback in the area where the clothing was spotted. Kermit residents also assisted in the search.

Mitchell said their two children, aged 6 and 7, were asleep in bed when he arrived home. He said the youngsters were unaware their mother

was missing. Officers said there was no sign of a struggle in the Mitchell residence.

Rats Boom **Under Way** In America

WASHINGTON (AP) - Officials of the two-year-old federal rat control program point to marked successes in some cities but believe a nationwide rodent population boom is under way, even in the suburbs.

"My impression, based on scattered and fragmented reports, is that the rat population is on the rise," said Robert E. Novick, head of the Bureau of Community Environmental Manage- ment.

"And this means not only in central cities but in the suburbs would remain head of the Com-

Paradoxically, the small \$15 million-a-year control program has reduced rat incidence an average of 25 per cent in target areas of 17 cities surveyed so far, Novick said in an interview. The reduction since 1969 is as high as 80 per cent in such cities as Buffalo, N.Y., and Charlotte,

N.C. But two cities, Atlanta and New York, registered increased. rat populations despite the progovernment estimates there are 14,000 cases of rat bite a year in the nation; many thousand cases of infectious disease

spread by rats; and innumerble electrical fires caused by rats chewing through wires. In saying the rodent danger appears to be spreading to onceimmune suburbs officials gave

these examples: Some homeowners in affluent Montgomery County, Md., near Washington, say they have heard rats in the walls; the New York City suburb of Nassau County reports a tripling of rat complaints recently; 41 suburbs in Pennsylvania applied last year for antirat money.





Toward Fewer Accidents

In some mysterious way, traffic experts are able to determine — to their satisfaction, at least — the approximate number of miles traveled by America's motor vehicles within a given time. Whatever means they use, they have come up with the conclusion that last July the total of motor vehicle travel in the United States exceeded 100 billion miles for the first time in history.

Even give or take a few million, that is a stunning amount of mileage. It did not, as one might have expected, bring a corresponding rise in the number of traffic deaths. On the contrary, there were 3 per cent fewer than in July, 1969.

July, indeed, was the fifth consecutive month with a lower traffic death figure than in the previous year. As for the year thus far, there is a reduction of 2 per cent from the seven-month total in 1969.

This begins to provide solid reason for concluding that a downward trend in the toll is under way. We have no quarrel with this statement by Howard Pyle, president of the National Safety Council: "There can be little doubt that this lower traffic death toll is more than jus a momentary phenomenon." If that is accepted, then the

question is: How can we best continue and speed up the momentum of this downward traffic death trend? Though no pat remedy comes to mind, much can be done.

The pressure must be kept up pressure on legislatures and Congress —for steady improvement of safety standards with regard to roads and traffic control systems and vehicle design. Better laws as to who may drive and how also are needed. Beyond that, one comes to the individual's role. It is a role involving responsibility and opportunity - responsibility to drive with care, opportunity to further reduce the traffic accident and death toll. Each of us who drives can play a significant part in this concerted effort.

When Democrary Falters—

The democratic nations of the world being misrepresented. were troubled recently when Dr. Salvador Allende won a plurality in

Chile's presidential election. He is the first Marxist candidate in any nation to be chosen chief of state through free elections. However, he is not yet officially the presidentelect. Chile requires a majority vote for direct election of its president, and Allende polled only 36.3 per cent of the ballots cast for the three major candidates.

So the Chilean congress will vote Oct. 24 to officially choose the country's next chief of state.

The congress has always endorsed the first-place finisher in popular elections in the past, but it may be feeling pressures now to break precedent and turn down Allende's plurality victory. If such pressures are brought to bear in the name of democracy, they are

Democracy demands that the will of the voters should be endorsed by the congress. It is a difficult turn of events for democratic nations to accept, but under the precepts of democracy it must be so.

Now the democratic peoples of the world should look within themselves and their governments and ask whether something is wrong with their systems - something that eventually might lead to situations such as the one that has developed in Chile. The concepts of democracy still constitute the best political theory in the world, but if they are perverted in practice they are worthless.

Marquis Childs Two Men Working For The Have-Nots

WASHINGTON — With the gloom the United States, greatly to increase and the cynicism in the current atmosphere equal to a smog red alert, it is news — under the man-bites-dog definition — to find two leaders denying the counsels of despair. Knowing all the dire facts and figures, they are nevertheless working for constructive action to remedy ills at home and abroad.

ROBERT S. McNAMARA, president of the World Bank, and John W. Gardner of Common Cause have the courage of their conviction that people will respond to the challenge of a time of troubles compounded as rarely before. They are both in a sense talking about a common cause - McNamara for the developed nations, Gardner for Americans who in ever larger numbers feel themselves frustrated and disenfranchised in a system that no longer responds to elemental needs.

IN A SPEECH cutting right to the bone McNamara in Copenhagen confronted the bank's board of governors with a twofold call for action. One was the need for the developed countries, and particularly

We respect too much people's feelings, and emotions, to run these questions through the mill in a haphazard way. We spend hours every week preparing the columns. We are grateful for the thousands who seem to be helped by

their share of aid to the developing countries. This country, he observed, is eleventh among the 16 contributing nations, with the aid program reduced to less than 0.3 per cent of the gross national product.

BUT IT WAS on the population explosion that McNamara spoke out with brutal frankness. Short of a tremendously accelerated program in the whole field - family planning, research into human creativity, education - the world will be overwhelmed in the next decades with millions upon millions of people reduced to a level of living hardly better than animals.

He promised that, in response to appeals from many members, the bank would organize to provide advice and financial help on a greatly expanded scale. This accords with his policy during his two years as president to make the bank more than merely a lending institution.

GARDNER, as he goes about the country, talks of many of the same things but in the context of the peoples' lobby which he launched three years ago as the Urban Coalition Action Council. With many quiet successes to its credit, Gardner decided to broaden the scope with Common Cause. Since word first got out, prior to the formal announcement, the response has been extraordinary.

Thousands of letters have come from all over the country. Many citizens, young and old, wrote that they had been waiting for an organization that would try to get action above and beyond the constricted reach of the two old parties.

GARDNER'S CONCEPT is broader than that of a citizens' lobby. He believes that the structure of government from city hall on up needs, as he put it recently in a speech in San Francisco, a major work of repair and redesign. Many Americans seem resigned to the fact that most state governments are incompetent that most state legislatures are tragically inadequate, that most city governing is so designed as to make governing impossible, that the Congress of the United States needs a thorough overhaul, and that the political parties are unresponsive to the concerns of their own members.

THIS IS A familiar indictment a system that really serves no one whether rich or poor, black or white, the great middle class, the silent majority or anyone else. But Gardner believes that the disease is curable, that human institutions can be overhauled and reformed. WASHINGTON - A new book will deal with any situation without soon appear on the market which will cause a sensation in scientific circles. It is titled "The Naked Man" and it was written by Frederick the III, a chimpanzee attached to the Rockefeller Institute. Frederick III was involved in some enzyme experiments at the institute which took up only a few hours of his day. Because he was restless, the directors gave him a typewriter to play with. You can imagine their surprise when instead of just messing around, Frederick wrote a book.

FREDERICK'S BOOK, and this is the shocker, claims that all chimpanzees, monkeys and apes evolved from man. He says that man was the first primate before there were apes of any kind.

Frederick is not certain when man first appeared on earth, though he suspects it was at least 30 million years ago. As time went on and man went through many stages, he started to develop many apelike qualities until today it is easy for apes to identify with man and realize how

much they have in common.

MANY APES and chimpanzees are horrified to think they resemble man in any way and a chimpanzee named Treetop, with the National Institute of Mental Health, has written a paper denouncing Frederick III's thesis. Treetop maintains that although in some respects men are looking more and more like apes, the ape could not have possibly evolved from man.

FREDERICK SAYS in his book that the similarities between apes and man are greater than one might think. Man today is behaving like apes used to behave before they were civilized. Man puts great emphasis on territory and seems to be willing to kill to protect his turf. As a lower form of ape, a man is unable to screaming and shouting. Frederick cites examples where men have been placed in large apartment buildings for lengths of time and have gone

Treetop says that man's behavior is more similar to rats than to apes. and while man behaves irrationally in almost any situation and may resort to extreme measures when endangered, it does not follow that just because men beat their chests and growl that they belong in the ape

FREDERICK THINKS that the primitive personality traits of man have been adapted by apes. Having studied man under laboratory conditions, Frederick has discovered that the eating habits and sex life of homo sapiens follow a pattern similar to those practiced by modern apes. Survival seems to be the basic principle in man's jungle, and while apes do not resort to violence unless provoked, man has not yet evolved to a point in his development where he can tell why he behaves the way he does.

Treetop disagrees. He maintains that man has gone as far as he'll ever go, and hasn't changed from the day he was born. The instinct in men to destroy is so strong that it is slander to class them in any way with apes.

IN ANY CASE, when the book comes out there will be a continuing controversy on it. On one side will be the apes who would hate to acknowledge they have inherited any characteristics from man. On the other side will be those monkeys, chimpanzees and gorillas who will admit that some of their traits are possibly man-evolved, and will now try to deal with the problem in an ape-like way.

Andrew Tully More On Women's Rights

WASHINGTON — In the matter of equal rights for women Prof. Leo Kanowitz of the University of New Mexico Law School is a dreamer.

The good pedagogue favors a constitutional amendment before the Senate which would ban discrimination based on sex. In pushing his advocacy before a Senate committee, however. Kanowitz seemed to come from another world in which national and state legislatures have achieved perfection.

OPPONENTS OF the amendment argue that the rights law would hurt some working women by wiping off the books state laws that set maximum daily and weekly hours for women, but none for men. Some women, the argument goes, need more protection than men from demands of employers that they work overtime, because when their day's work is done they have to go home and cook and clean the house and take care of children and husbands.

But ha! says Kanowitz, kindly do not worry. He assures that the risk to "working class" women is not that great because states probably would not invalidate the maximum hours laws for women but would, instead, extend them to men.

HA! YOURSELF, Kanowitz. Such an eventuality wouldn't occur in 17 zillion light years. It would not happen because no woman in her right eminine mind would permit any legislature to tinker with man's right to work as much overtime as he could squeeze into a 24-hour day.

If there is one thing a woman doesn't want around the house, except at odd. bill-paying hours, it is a man. No matter how much she loves her husband or male friend, a woman desires that he spend most of his time at the factory or office or even the local hashish hell. Except at night, a man gets in the way.

MOREOVER, MOST women have discovered that being married to a man who frequently works overtime is a delicious financial bonus.

I DO NOT ARGUE that therefore public schools should be segregated by race or ethnic origin or that a citizen may not choose his own living surroundings. But there is more than a pinch of hypocrisy in the mix that makes up these politicians, and a good prosecutor would argue that some of the Women's Lib crowd are more interested in their own opportunistic goals than they are in uplifting females generally.




