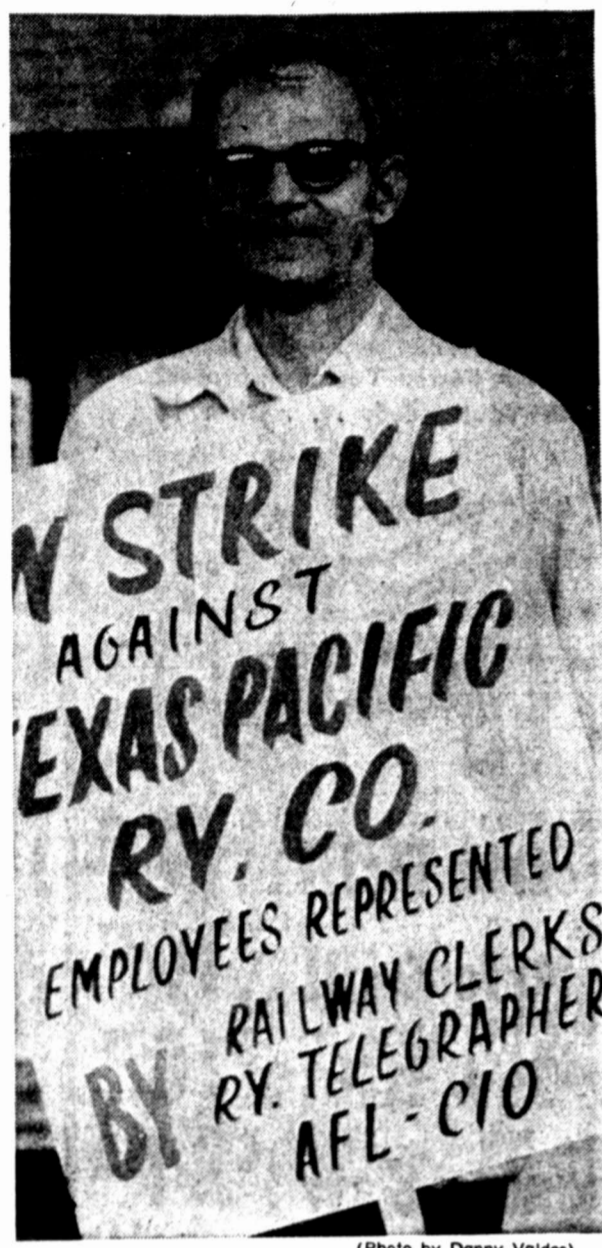

AWAITING WORD Railroaders Man Picket Lines Locally

Big Spring employees of the Texas & Pacific Railway reacted calmly to a nationwide railroad walkout. Some appeared to be bored with waiting word from district union officials as messages came through that workers in other parts of the country were returning to work.

"I've only been here about a half-hour and already I'm tired of walking this picket line," one picket said as he paced in front of the T&P Freight Office on First Street.

At the Settles Hotel, local union leaders had established a makeshift headquarters and were simply waiting for word from higher union officials.

"We aren't going to go back to work until we hear something definite from the district union leaders," R. L. Baber, local union leader, said.

"At this point we plan to man a picket line, but take no other action against the railroad," he said.

Baber said the pickets would work one-hour shifts on the picket line for the duration of the strike.

About 20 employees of the railroad were in the headquarters office, relaxing, drinking coffee, and waiting for word.

At the railroad office, Superintendent J. W. Ritter was manning an empty office. "At midnight last night the men simply dropped what they were doing and left when the pickets arrived," he said.

"Three of the supervisors have just left and they are going to man a train and move it to Fort Worth. Since Big Spring is a key location and switching point between the East and Southwest we will try to keep as many trains moving for as long as we can.

"I think that the consumer here will be the last to feel anything from the rail strike, because most of the city's food comes in by truck. First and hardest hit will be the industry because we transport the raw materials they need in manufacturing," Ritter said.

An official in the railway express agency office said he didn't expect the rail strike to slow down his delivery of packages unless the strike continues for several days.

"Most of the REA packages coming to Big Spring come by truck, so I won't be affected. Usually, over great distances railroads are involved so if the strike continues there won't be anything for the trucks to bring," he said.

Bank Employees Receive Bonus

Directors of the State National Bank have continued their long-standing custom of a Christmas bonus of one month's salary to all employees. For the 10th straight year, they also contributed to the employees pension and retirement trust fund.

Directors also voted a \$4 per share dividend to all stockholders, a sharp increase from last year's total of \$3.

'Rich' Hughes Out Of Sight, Rumors Grow

PARADISE ISLAND, The Bahamas (AP) — While feuding executives battled in court over control of Howard Hughes' \$300 million Nevada empire, the billionaire recluse remained silent and out of sight in the Bahamas. With lack of any official word on his activities, rumors multiplied.

An unexplained meeting of executives of Paradise Island resort Wednesday revived speculation that Hughes may be negotiating to buy its hotels and gambling casino.

The executives met for several hours in Nassau, across a narrow waterway from Paradise Island.

Efforts to catch any sign of Hughes in the Britannia Beach Hotel on Paradise Island continued to be futile.

Four ninth-floor suites were guarded and inaccessible to the public. Most speculation places Hughes there.

Paradise Island was the object of a \$25 million offer from a New York group last March.

The offer, for only the two hotels and not the casino, was turned down by Resorts International, owner of Paradise Island.

Another site which Hughes may be interested in is Andros Island, largest in the Bahamas chain. Ninety miles long and as much as 25 wide, Andros Island is sparsely populated with most of the land owned by an heir to the Reynolds aluminum fortune.

While officials refused any confirmation, reports persisted that Hughes' discussions so far have been primarily with Bahamian government officials.

Meanwhile, U.S. Consul-General Moncrieff J. Spear, who assumed his post only four weeks ago, said he has had no word of Hughes' activities.

RAIL STRIKE CRUMBLING

AFTER 500,000 WORKERS WALK OFF JOB

Two Of Unions Backing Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nationwide rail strike began crumbling today hours after it was called, with two of the unions in the 500,000-man walkout returning to work.

Still, the effect of the strike, called at one minute after midnight despite a congressional ban backed by President Nixon, could be seen through reports of idle passenger and freights across the country.

BROTHERHOOD MUM
From Cleveland the United Transportation Union cancelled and was quickly followed by the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees, at Detroit headquarters.

Still unheard from was the 200,000-man strong Brotherhood of Railway Clerks and its president and prime strike figure, C. L. Dennis. Spokesmen at union headquarters had no immediate statement but were telling newsmen there could be developments later in the day.

United's president, Charles Luna, has been acting as spokesman as well for the maintenance workers and the Hotel and Restaurant Employees union.

Whether the restaurant union, which represents dining car employees mostly, would follow

Luna's lead again was not known, but this union's headquarters was promising a statement soon.

The workers were returning to work in the face of congressional and court actions taken a few minutes after the 11th hour to stop the strike.

RETURNING TO WORK
The UTU withdrawal was announced by W.W. Carson, assistant to Luna.

In telegrams to all general chairmen and international officers, Carson advised that because Congress passed—and President Nixon signed—legislation prohibiting a strike and guaranteeing a wage increase that UTU was canceling its part in the strike.

The strike, which began at 12:01 a.m. was the nation's third in the last 50 years.

ANGRY MEN
The emergency law passed by Congress early today ordered the strikers back to work with a partial pay increase.

"They are increasingly angry and bitter," said strike leader C. L. Dennis of the nearly 500,000 workers who walked out at 12:01 a.m. and showed no immediate inclination to return in compliance with the new law, a plea from President Nixon and a federal court order.

Mail Embargo Effect Limited

Although Postmaster General Winton M. Blount ordered an embargo Wednesday on second, third and fourth class mail traveling more than 300 miles because of the nationwide railroad strike, the Big Spring post office will still distribute all classes of mail in 14 states.

"We are going to be able to distribute mail further than the embargo limit because of the post office's massive truck network," Postmaster Frank Hardesty said.

"We will be able to distribute all first class mail and air mail anywhere in the country, and be able to deliver all classes of mail anywhere in Texas, Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Wyoming, and Utah," he said.

Hardesty said that persons who have not mailed Christmas packages to friends living in states other than the 14 states the post office can service will have to send them by first class mail to insure delivery by Christmas.

"Of course, if the item is heavy and expensive it may be better to keep it yourself and send a money order as a gift," he said.

'BIG BROTHER' LISTENING 52 Federal Agencies Use 'Snooper Buttons'

WASHINGTON (AP) — When you telephone any of 52 federal agencies, someone may be eavesdropping and at least nine agencies may not tell you about it, a House report says.

The nine agencies range from the supersecret Central Intelligence Agency to the Peace Corps, but not the FBI, the government's domestic investigation unit.

A report of the House government information subcommittee said the FBI and seven other

agencies told the panel they prohibit monitoring citizens' telephone calls.

DON'T LIKE IT

The 52 agencies have 4790 "snooper buttons," the report said, only they don't like to call them that anymore.

The report said the buttons which cut out breathing and other noise for the person "listening" are now called push-to-talk switches.

The agencies also use 168 telephone conversation recording machines, 92 of them permanently wired into telephone circuits, the report said, and 147 attachments on phones to record or eavesdrop on conversations.

The listeners are usually secretaries, callers are usually told someone else is on the line and the avowed purpose of the widespread practice is simply to get straight the caller's request for information, said subcommittee Chairman John E. Moss, D-Calif.

TRUE OR FALSE?
"It remains a fact," Moss said, "that until the practice of monitoring is abolished, a citizen will never be able to know for sure to what extent or for what underlying motive he is unwittingly sharing his tele-

No Innocent People Killed At My Lai?

FT. BENNING, Ga. (AP) — William Calley's lawyer said today no innocent people were killed at My Lai.

Maj. Kenneth Raby, defending Calley on charges that he killed at least 102 Vietnamese, made the statement as the defense went over sworn statements taken in Vietnam.

"Will you defend on the basis there were no people killed at My Lai?" Judge Reid W. Kennedy asked.

"That no innocent people were killed at My Lai," Raby said.

WASTING TIME
As the judge and the lawyers went over the depositions of Sgt. Nguyen Dinh Phu, an interpreter for Calley's Charley Co., they came to questioning about an incident the night before that fateful March 16, 1968.

In his deposition, Phu related having talked to an unnamed GI.

"He talked like tomorrow we should go out in field and we kill everything in village—you know, women and children and animals, too," Phu related the conversation.

The prosecution said this was purely hearsay and should not be admitted.

During the argument, Judge Kennedy told the defense: "If this is the only evidence you've got, that any kind of order was given to Lt. Calley, we're wasting a lot of time."

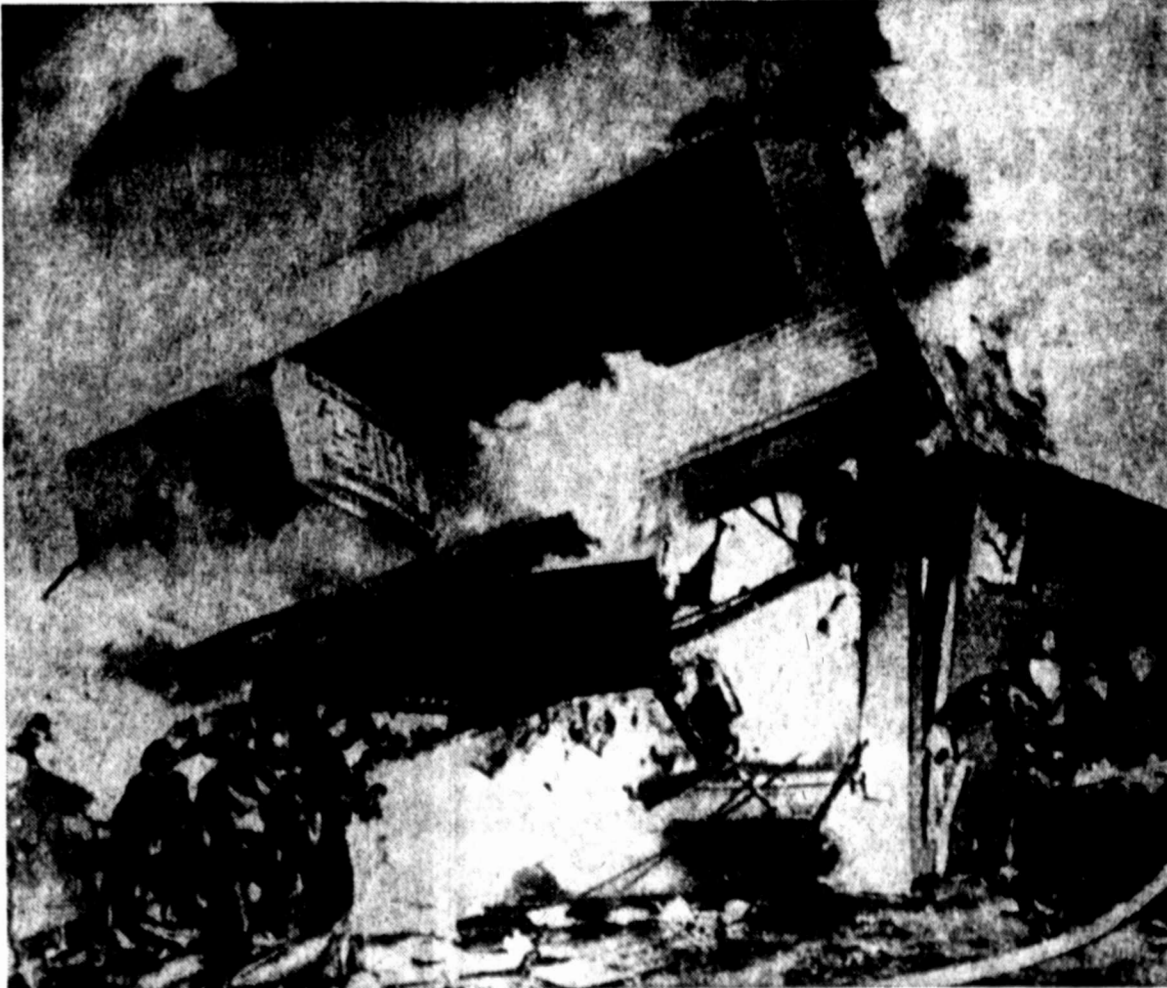
The judge ordered the conversation stricken.

Judge Kennedy has given the defense wide latitude in the events of My Lai, including what happened after the soldiers swept through My Lai.

In the deposition, Phu said he heard this conversation between another interpreter and Capt. Ernest Medina, who was commanding Calley's company.

"How come you let your soldiers kill people? Capt. Medina say that is orders, don't ask any questions."

Medina is currently undergoing what amounts to a grand jury investigation at Ft. McPherson in Atlanta to determine whether he should face charges at My Lai.

Christmas Appeal Gets Under Way

Letters of appeal from the Salvation Army for help with its Christmas program have gone into the mail, and Lt. Joseph Saint, in charge of the work here, urged prompt response.

"Whatever your heart and means will let you do, we hope you will do it as soon as possible," he said.

The Christmas program stands entirely on its own, yet a few letters have been returned saying "we gave to the United Fund."

So far 40 families have ap-

plied for Christmas baskets, and the deadline is not until Dec. 15. But the Salvation Army, taking it solely on faith, has had to place orders for food this far in advance.

"We hope there are enough warm-hearted people to justify this faith," said Lt. Saint, "else we are out on a limb."

A second phase of the Christmas program goes into action Friday when the traditional Kettles go up downtown and in the shopping centers. On Saturdays, a kettle will be operated at a center on the Lamesa Highway in northern Big Spring.

Webb AFB organizations have volunteered to operate the kettles the first four days, and after that service clubs will take over so 100 per cent of the gifts can go to the Christmas activities. The NCO Association will open the appeal Friday, the Junior Officers' Conference Saturday, the Top Three Committee on Monday, and Student Officers Tuesday. After service clubs carry it through Dec. 19, the Boy Scouts will take over Dec. 21 and other volunteers the rest of the way.

Named Delegate

AUSTIN (AP) — State Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon has been named by Gov. Preston Smith as an official delegate from Texas to the White House Conference on Children Dec. 13-18 in Washington.

Hightower received his official invitation from President Nixon.

The Texas delegation will include 19 people under 25.

Spry Octogenarian Shinned Up Tree Once Too Often

CLEVELAND, Tex. (AP) — William Taylor, 81, a retired carpenter, climbed a tree in his yard once too often — and it cost him his life.

The spry octogenarian shinned up Wednesday morning and was sawing a limb briskly until he slipped and nearly fell. He clung tight until a nephew came to his rescue.

After lunch Taylor climbed back to finish the job. This time he fell all the way to the ground, suffering injuries which caused his death Wednesday night at a hospital in neighboring Dayton.

Doctors said Taylor had the body of a man 30 years younger, apparently the result of his active life.

Chafin Foresees Problems In Sanitation Department

Asked about the failure of the garbage container plan to win city commission approval, Public Works Director Nolen Chafin said, "To say I am disappointed would be the understatement of the week."

Chafin seemed to be less concerned about the time he has put in making the preliminary studies for the plan than about labor problems he feels will eventually arise in the sanitation department.

"There is a turnover in the department, although it is not nearly as great as in other cities," Chafin said. "It is not a job that is easy to find replacement for. I can envision the Monday when we will wake up to find that the men have all quit on Friday."

The prediction is based to some extent on trends in other cities, which have led manufacturers to design a wide variety of mechanized collection systems and waste disposal aids, Chafin added.

The 325 containers Chafin had

planned for the first phase of containerization would have cost about \$49,112, which he said he thought was a "reasonable price for progress."

"We were not forced to buy the containers this time," Chafin said, "but I think it is good planning to work these

things out ahead of time, before we are faced with the necessity of making an abrupt change."

Chafin said he will continue to keep an eye on the possibility of containerization, and will make a report on the situation during next year's budget work sessions.

When Dennis Fenn of the HEW Bureau of Solid Wastes came to Big Spring recently to check on the sanitary landfill, Chafin asked him about the possibility of a federal grant for containerization.

Fenn mentioned Scottsdale, Ariz., where the government picked up part of the tab on a revolutionary project involving cylindrical shaped plastic containers for each individual home. The housewife wheels the container to the front yard on each collection day, and a monster machine (with "Son of Godzilla" painted on the side) picks up each container with a hydraulic lift arm and empties it without the driver ever stepping out of his air-conditioned control compartment.

Fenn did not indicate that the government would buy in a system that is already tried and on the market.



On Right Track For Fun Trails

BELLEVILLE, Ill. (AP) — The Belleville Junior Women's Club is in a campaign to convert nearby railroad rights of way into hiking and recreation trails.

Mrs. Terrell R. McLemore, conservation chairman of the club, has made a survey of trails in existence and those that could be developed.

Water Pours Over Lamps In Corinth

AUSTIN (AP) — Water is slowly covering the Fountain of the Lamps found in ancient Corinth, but that does not dampen the interest of University of Texas archaeologists.

Dr. James Wiseman, professor of classics at UT-Austin, is director of the excavations. Digging began in 1965.

Water makes work more difficult, but the team—armed with pumps—hopes to complete excavation of the area next fall.

Tunnels which supplied water for the city's inhabitants in ancient Greek and Roman times led archaeologists to the underground area adjoining the gymnasium, where they discovered the fountain named for the thousands of terra-cotta votive lamps unearthed there.

During the 1970 summer dig, sponsored by the University of Texas for the American School of classical studies at Athens, workers moved out of the subterranean bath into an adjacent open courtyard with a swimming pool.

Marble steps led into the pool, and marble benches, bench supports and basins were found in the area. The lavish decoration was done in colorful marbles—green, blue, bluish-black, red and white.

A perfectly preserved glass beaker dating to about 1 A.D. was unearthed along with numerous statue fragments.

Also in the pool was a herm, an image in the form of a stone pillar, with a long inscription including the name of a well-known official at athletic events in Corinth—Gnaeus Babbius Italicus.

'Blue Laws' Trial Today

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — A group of defendants accused of being in breach of the Texas blue laws appear in Dist. Judge Dee Walker Brown's court today to show why they should not be cited for contempt of court.

Attorney Joe Matthews filed an affidavit Tuesday claiming they violated an injunction made last Saturday by opening

Cook stores in Dallas and Richardson for business on Sunday. The defendants are Clark's Texas Inc., Clark's Arlington Inc., Cook United of Texas Inc., Cook United Inc., M.N. Landau Stores Inc., Sundaco Inc., Jay Fichter, Gary Levitz, Homer Hyde, Philip Hilliard and "J.C. or A.T. Miller."

The Sundaco organization buys the stock of Cook's stores on Saturday so as to do business Sundays, then sells the stock back to the previous owners on Mondays, thus apparently circumventing the Sunday closing laws which forbid stores opening both Saturday and Sunday in the same week.

Teachers' President Labels Wage Freeze Ideal 'Absurd'

AUSTIN (AP) — The widely circulated "Henderson Plan" to head off a major state tax bill was labeled "absurd" Wednesday by the president of the Texas State Teachers Association. Mrs. Jewell Harris of Abilene blasted proposals to freeze teacher salaries and require local school districts to pay a larger share of basic educational costs.

"These ideas are so absurd that I am confident the legislature will not take them seriously. But the public is entitled to know what is involved," Mrs. Harris said. Mrs. Harris referred to a proposal by James B. Henderson, president of Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Corp. and chairman of the "Citizens Group for Economy in State Government."

The proposal—which reportedly traces back to some "talking papers" of the Texas Research League—includes reduction of the state's share of the minimum foundation school program from 80 to 75 per cent. It also advocates suspending teacher salary raises approved by the 1969 Legislature. Mrs. Harris said the plan would "simply shift more finan-

cial burden back to the local property ad valorem tax. That's the only place local school districts have to obtain revenue. The total cost would not be affected."

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — An elderly liquor store operator was fatally slashed Wednesday night when robbers took the cash register from his business, police reported.

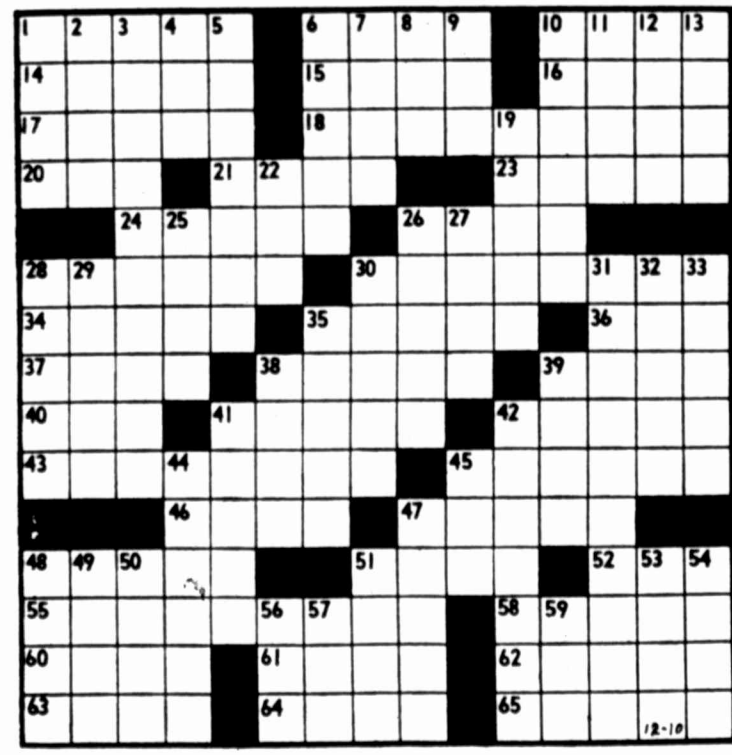

Insurance Execs Propose 'File And Use' System

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas' present system of uniform rates for car and house insurance should be changed to a "file and use" system of competitive rates, two insurance executives said Wednesday.

They testified before the House Interim Committee investigating the current shortage of home and automobile coverage.

Higher rates, or more deductibles, would help increase the availability of policies, but "would not be a total solution," said Richard L. Urban, secretary of Home Insurance Co., New York.

"SKEPTICAL" He said he liked the "file and use system" employed by a number of states, including California, Illinois and New York.

Under file and use, a company submits proposed rates to the State Insurance Commission. If the commission does not disapprove them within so many days, the rates take effect.

"If you can price your product as General Motors does, rates would go up initially, but it would not be long before they would come down and seek their own level," Urban said.

He said he was "skeptical" whether Texas' system of uniform rates would "do the job in the future."

Wallace Williams, a regional manager for Travelers, also said rates are a problem in providing adequate coverage for Texans' homes and cars.

In file and use states, he said, Travelers has "a lot more flexible" market because it can increase the number of driver classifications and derive enough income from penalties against bad drivers to lower the premiums of good drivers.

Rep. Ray Lemmon of Houston asked whether "file and use" might result in insolvencies resulting from competitive pressures on some companies to keep their rates down.

"I don't see how file and rate would bear on the procedures the insurance board uses in determining the solvency of companies," Williams said.

Hundreds Of Texans Join Nationwide Rail Strike

Hundreds of Texas workers joined in the nationwide railroad strike today, and effects of the walkout were noticeable in the state almost at once.

Pickets appeared promptly at 12:01 a.m. outside depots and other facilities.

At least two passenger trains were halted by the walkout, but railroad spokesmen said supervisory employees were taking others to their destinations in most cases. They reported freight trains generally stopped at the next terminals on their routes.

A postal system embargo on all but first class mail to 36 other states went into effect even before the strike began. Looking ahead to avert a logjam, officials imposed the ban at 4 p.m. Wednesday.

POSTAL EMBARGO

Industry spokesmen said the work stoppage—unless it ended soon—promised to curtail numerous business operations, particularly automobile and other plants receiving parts and shipping finished products by rail, dealers in perishable foods, and the like.

One of the passenger trains brought to a stop was the Southern Pacific's eastbound Sunset Limited, which ended its Los Angeles-to-New Orleans run at El Paso. Passengers continued their journeys by bus.

Similar arrangements were made for a westbound Southern Pacific train at San Antonio.

PICKETS POSTED

An unusual situation developed in El Paso, where pickets were posted outside the Greyhound bus depot—which also is the city's old and now little-used union rail terminal.

Greyhound buses operate through that point while the company is building a 15-story hotel and office building in El Paso. Bus workers said the picketing would have no effect on their operations.

Probably more railroad workers were idled in Houston than in any other Texas city because of the multiplicity of lines serving that busy Gulf Coast port. A spokesman estimated about 2,400 employees of Southern Pacific alone joined in the strike.

Houston's two switching operations—the Houston Belt & Terminal Railway Co. and the Port Terminal Railroad Association—were shut down along with the other rail firms.

A Port Terminal official said special arrangements were made to assure that no shipments in refrigerator cars were damaged. He added, however, that in event of a long railroad strike refrigerated cargoes in ships might be affected.

Union sources said the walkout took about 750 railroad workers off the job in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

Southern Pacific Transportation Co. in Dallas said a strike by 180 members of the United Transportation Union was forcing it to lay off about 350 truck drivers and clerical workers.

Management employees were assigned to keep Texas & Pacific and Missouri Pacific trains rolling through Texarkana for at least 24 hours.

KEEP ROLLING

An official said, "Texarkana is a major freight terminal. We have to keep the cars rolling. . . We can take care of the movement of trains out of Texarkana for 24 hours, but after that we're going to be mighty tired—and we hope the strike will be over by that time."

A network of truck transportation enabled the post offices to continue handling all classes of mail in 14 states, William L. Crawford, postal director for the Texas-Louisiana region, said.

The 14 states are Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Utah and Wyoming.

Crawford said Christmas packages bound for points outside those states would have to go first class at six cents per ounce instead of the cheaper fourth class rate. Parcel post limits packages to 40 pounds weight, 36 inches in length and 60 inches in length and girth combined.

Assembly of new cars by General Motors at its Arlington plant can continue little more than three days, a spokesman said, unless there are rail shipments of parts. He estimated 70 per cent of the 800 cars turned out each day are shipped to dealers by rail.

DRASTIC EFFECTS

Even more drastic effects were foreseen in other quarters.

Food industry spokesmen in Dallas, for example, said perishable foods which are shipped in refrigerated cars would become scarce if the strike lasted more than a day. One large produce and vegetable firm reported it receives 80 per cent of its frozen and canned items by rail.

Also expected to feel the pinch were such major industries as lumber, steel, sand and gravel, petroleum products, cement, grain, feed and flour.

Suspend Negro Student Group After Shootings

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas Southern University suspended the Organization for Black Student Unity Wednesday following two shooting incidents on campus this week.

The latest incident was a shootout between campus police and students.

Floyd Henry Carr, 25, a non-student, and Russell Julius Jones, both black, were charged with inciting to riot, assault to murder and carrying guns on a state supported college campus. Two other gunmen escaped.

"The apprehension of Russell Jones, a known member of OBSU, has focused two shooting incidents as possibly being terrorist activities of that group," a university statement read.

The other incident involved the wounding of Melvin Baker, 19, a Texas Southern football player. He was slightly wounded early Tuesday when three shotgun blasts were fired into an athletic dormitory.

Shortly thereafter campus security forces searched the regular meeting place of the OBSU. They found a 12-gauge pump shotgun, a .38 cal. revolver, ammunition, a large hunting knife, and keys to university buildings.

Jones and Russell were arrested after shots were fired from a passing automobile toward a residence hall for freshmen men.

"Because of known constructive contributions of the organi-

zation, such as the breakfast program for underprivileged children and strong support of drug abuse programs, every effort will be made to determine whether a few members of the organization are resorting to these possible terrorists actions, or if the several incidents represent their organizational philosophy and attitude," the administration said.

Findings by a student-faculty administration panel and other groups will determine if the organization will be re-instated or permanently banned.

TSU has been affected with other outbreaks within a week.

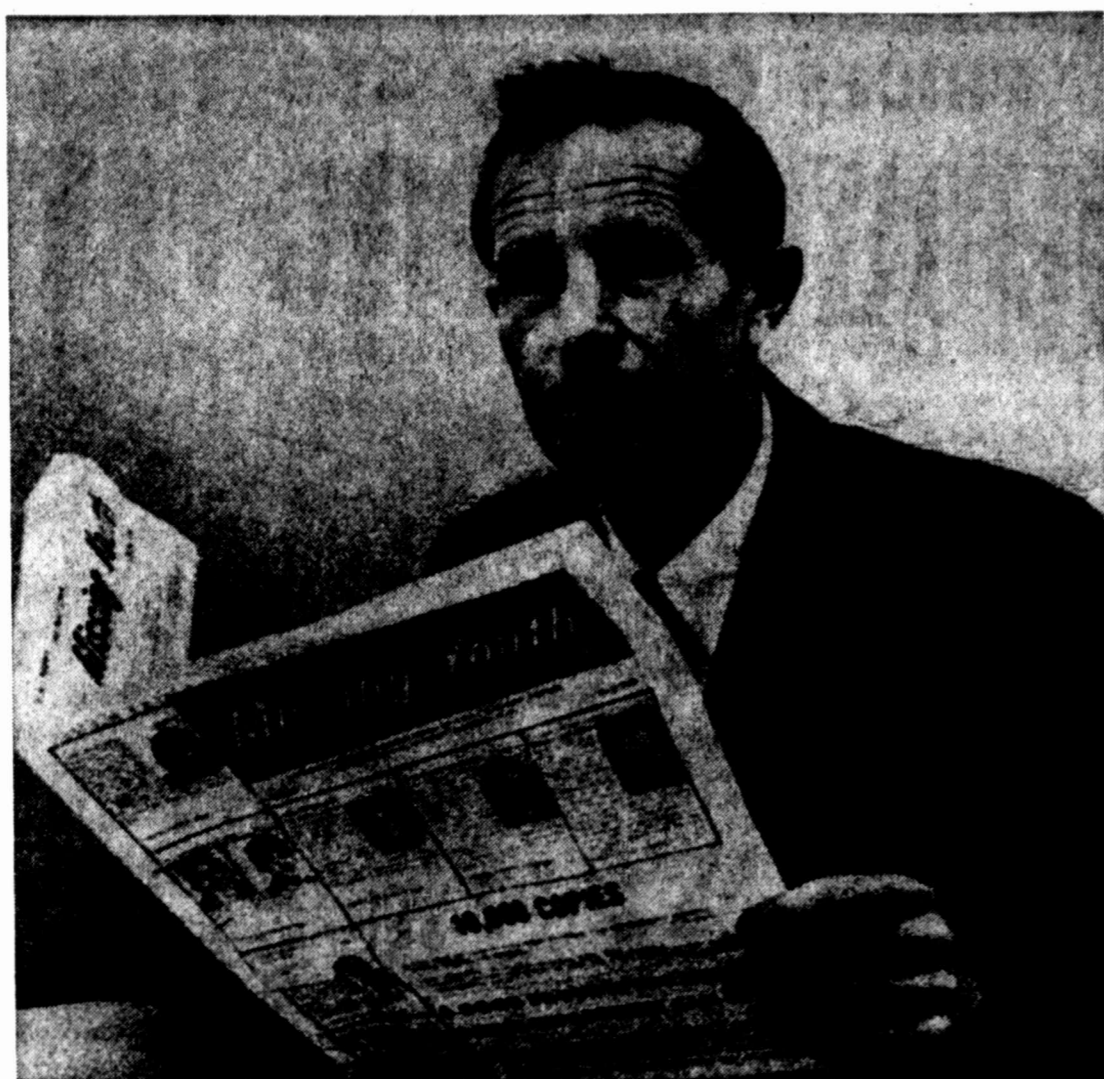

State Urban Agency Urged

AUSTIN (AP) — Creation of a Texas Department of Community Affairs has been urged by the Texas Urban Development Commission in an interim report.

An official "Urban action policy" should be adopted by the legislature to guide decisions on how to combat urban problems, the commission said that 73 per cent of the state's population lives in the 23 metropolitan areas.

The division of state-local relations in Gov. Preston Smith's office should be elevated by law to a separate state department dealing with community affairs, it said.

Little Has Changed Since Revolution At Desert Door

MELCHOR OCAMPO, Mexico (AP) — "Welcome Mr. President to the door to the desert." The banner was strung across

Ocampo's unpaved main street. Faces of peasant farmers reflected surprise as they watched their president and his party stir up clouds of white dust in walking through the streets of this outpost in the northern state of Coahuila.

Ocampo is indeed a "door to the desert." The surfaced road from the outside world ends at the city's limits. Beyond, there is nothing but desert spotted with 26 ejidos — the communal farms that grew out of Mexico's land revolution a half century ago.

\$28 A MONTH
For the people who live on those farms little has changed since the days of the revolution. They still try to force a living from the desert with primitive methods, managing only a marginal existence far from the current of this country's flourishing economy.

The average income for a head of a household in this area is \$28.32 a month. President Luis Echeverria, 48, promised in his inaugural address Dec. 1 to do something about the problems of the "campesinos" and their poverty. He called this the most serious problem Mexico faces. His visit to the northern desert was his way of showing he means business. He has created a national Arid Lands Commission "to promote development of the arid zones of the country."

SELF-HELP PLANS
About half of Mexico's land area is considered Arid, land on which no cereal crops will grow without irrigation or land where crops fail at least half the time because rainfall is scarce.

Echeverria is telling the farmers not to expect spectacular overnight results, and is urging them to help him help them. He inaugurated here one of the self-help plans.

This area's main product is candelia wax, a substance with several uses, the most important as an ingredient in the hard white covering of some kinds of chewing gum. The Ocampo area produces one-fourth of Mexico's national candelia wax production and exports large quantities to the United States. But overproduction has forced down the price and built enormous stocks in Coahuila warehouses.

Echeverria wants to stop production for a while and put the farmers to work building desert roads. They will be paid the minimum wage of \$2 a day and their own contractors for 400 miles of dirt roads. Machines will be used sparingly so the construction will take longer.

That wage is more than double the average daily income from the land here, so the government hopes this will stimulate the region's economy while

federal and state authorities look for new ways to provide steady employment for the 13,960 ejido farmers in the Ocampo area.

AVOIDS POLITICIANS
The government will also spend about \$6.4 million over the next four years on irrigation projects, schools and sanitation. This will include help for construction or rebuilding of 1,600 farm houses, two health centers and three schools. One school will teach new agriculture techniques. Eleven states or territories in Mexico contain arid lands. Echeverria plans 5,000 miles of rural roads in the next six years at a cost of about \$20 million, plus 665 irrigation projects costing \$52 million.

Next year he expects to spend at least \$11.3 million for farm, cattle and reforestation projects. Much of this spending will be aimed at agriculture diversification.

Echeverria flew north on an executive jet that seats only eight people, thus avoiding the flock of politicians who usually want to go along. He was accompanied only by his closest advisers and the secretaries of agriculture, of public works and of hydraulic resources.

Three Faculty Members 'Hams'

EDINBURG, Tex. (AP) — Three members of the faculty of Pan American College, in-

cluding the college's president, are licensed amateur radio operators.

Other staff members who are amateur radio operators are Dr. Fred Ellis, associate professor of physical science, and Dr. J. Lell Elliott, professor and head of the chemistry department.

There Ain't No Such Thing

HOUSTON (AP) — Machines will never be developed that can clean up litter along the highways as fast as motorists throw it out.

That's the prediction of Archie J. Sherrod, chief engineer of maintenance operations for the Texas Highway Department.

"The only way this can be done is by education and a desire on the part of our customers, the traveling public, to keep litter off the roads," he said.

There are presently five machines which clean up the state's highways. Each machine is designed to perform three times as much work as a four-man crew with a dump truck, he said.

Each will clean a path 8.5 feet wide and six to eight miles long in an hour.

But Sherrod said improvements are needed because each mile of primary and interstate highway has a cubic yard of litter dumped on it monthly. "We see litter control as a permanent item of our maintenance job," he said.

Social Security Pay May Jack

CHICAGO (AP) — Social security benefits of around \$1,000 a month or more are possible if legislation pending in Congress is approved.

Commerce Clearing House, a tax authority service, said there have been many liberalizations in benefits since 1935 when the Social Security Act was first passed. Then the minimum old-age benefit was \$10 and the maximum was \$85.

Now it is expected that the benefit table will show a maximum primary insurance amount of \$660 by 1993, so that the combined benefit of a worker and his spouse would be just under \$1,000.

In today's social security, the wage-benefit base is \$7,800 and the maximum tax on that base is \$374.40, employer or employee share.

Projections indicate the wage-benefit base under the new bill will be in excess of \$20,000 by the 1990s and likely will go higher.

Directors Hope To Imitate 1963 'Six Months Miracle'

In an effort to have 24 million gallons additional water available for daily use by West Texas cities in the summer of 1971, the Colorado River Municipal Water District is all set to duplicate its "six-months miracle" of 1963. In that year, the district delivered water over a new 51.5-mile pipeline system within less than six months from the time the idea was approved.

Now the target date for delivering a new water supply to the district's terminal storage at Odessa from a Ward County lease is June 1, 1971, according to Charles Perry, Odessa, president of CRMWD.

To meet this rigid schedule, the district set Dec. 22 as the date for opening bids for pumps, valves, motors and controls, pipe and the drilling of a number of water wells. In January other proposals will be received for laying 47 miles of 33-in. pipeline from the well field to Odessa, and for constructing pump stations.

The CRMWD board also authorized Thursday the sale of \$6,750,000 in revenue bonds at 5.145 per cent to Eastman Dillon, Union Securities Co. of New York City. The issue will be retired within 11 years.

Also to expedite the work, a test well and six test holes have been drilled in the well field area being acquired from Duval Oil Corp. which originally had executed a water lease with the University of Texas. Options have been obtained on most of the pipeline right of way, said O. H. Ivie, general manager.

He said water is of good quality with chlorides of only about 150 ppm.

South—despite the fact that he did not have a single face card in his hand became the declarer at a slam contract after the opponents had opened the bidding.

North held the equivalent of a demand bid and when West opened ahead of him with one spade in third position, the only way that North could announce his strength was by overcalling in his opponent's suit. The cue bid of two spades forces partner to keep the bidding open until game is reached.

East had nothing in the way of defensive values and since he was loaded in West's suit, he decided to make it difficult for the opposition to get together by jumping to four spades. Our objection to his strategy was that vul-

nerability conditions were not favorable for a sacrifice should the opponents stop to double. Had North, in fact, doubled four spades—he could have administered an 1,100 point sting—taking two hearts, two clubs, two diamonds and a diamond ruff.

South was gratified at being relieved of the obligation to bid, however, his partner was unwilling to abandon the contest and he repeated his cue bid—this time at the five level. Despite his powerful holding, North's action was not warranted since he was forcing his partner to respond at the six level without knowing a thing about South's hand. When South dutifully responded with six hearts, the auction subsided.

West opened the king of spades, ruffed in dummy and cashed the ace and king of trumps. When both opponents followed, the queen was permitted to remain at large.

The ace and king of diamonds were played followed by a small diamond which declarer ruffed with the nine of hearts, and when the suit divided evenly, North's long diamonds were established. A club was led and the jack was finessed. When this play succeeded and the clubs responded favorably, declarer claimed his contract—announcing that he would lead high diamonds and clubs until the defense ruffed with the queen of hearts. The trump trick was his only loser.

Freese, Nichols and Endress, consulting engineers of Fort Worth, to plan the system, and with Ed L. Reed, Midland hydrologist, to supervise the development of the wells.

Rush projects are not new for the district, as witness the 1963 program to supply Sun Oil with water which then was being pumped from Lake J. B. Thomas. The project was approved Jan. 29 of that year, and water was delivered over the 51.5-mile pipeline to Sun's unit in Coke County on June 26.

On July 30 of this year, the district approved \$800,000 in revenue bonds to develop a salt water well system to help bridge a critical gap for the SACROC repressuring unit in southwestern Scurry County. Water was pumped to the operator by Nov. 4.

The new bonds will bring to \$61,500,000 the amount of bonds issued by the district since its initial \$11,750,000 program in 1951. All have been revenue bonds which are retired entirely out of revenues the system generates.

Other actions by the board included extension of a lease on its headquarters building at

1318 E. 4th in Big Spring; the authorizing of a hearing in connection with pipeline right of way; and the routine year-end transfer of funds from the Reserve and Contingency Funds into the Interest and Sinking Fund. Ivie and James Rosser, attorney, will deliver the bonds Dec. 16 and obtain the money in New York.

Christmas is nearing and Mrs. Doug Cutsforth, 1906 Goliad, is pulling holiday recipes for nut breads and sweets from her files and beginning to bake. Her daughter, Julie, 5, lends a helping hand, making cookies for brother Dale, 7.

"I usually make apple and pumpkin breads," Mrs. Cutsforth said. "I like to bake and do a lot of it during the holidays. The kids like chocolate cookies, fudge, toffee, cakes and berry pie. Doug's favorite is boysenberry."

During the holidays Mrs. Cutsforth likes trying new recipes for candies and sweets. She also is sewing for her daughter and herself.

"I go gungho sewing for a while, then get tired of it," she said, "but I do sew quite a bit. I just finished draperies for Dale's room. We are re-doing the rooms one by one, wallpapering and painting. We're amateurs, but its fun to take our time and putter in decorating."

"The kitchen is the center of our family life, with the adjoining TV area. We all like to watch TV in the evening with a big bowl of popcorn. Julie and I are big soap opera fans."

One afternoon Mrs. Cutsforth relates, she and Julie were watching a slow soap opera, when Julie got up declaring to her mother, "I'm so bored, I'll have to go out and find a job." Julie probably picked up the

RECOMMENDED RECIPES

Used By Mrs. Doug Cutsforth

COQ AU VIN
3 to 3½ lb. chicken
¼ cup flour
½ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. pepper
6 slices bacon
6 small onions
½ lb. mushrooms, sliced
4 carrots, halved
1 cup chicken broth
1 cup red burgundy
1 clove garlic, crushed
Mix flour, salt and pepper. Fry bacon until crisp and drain on paper towels. Dust chicken with flour and fry in bacon grease until browned. Put chicken aside. Put mushrooms, and onions in grease and cook until tender. Drain off grease. Crumble and add bacon. Stir in remaining ingredients, including chicken. Simmer 1 hour and 15 minutes until chicken is tender.

For Bouquet Garni, tie in cheesecloth ½ tsp. crushed thyme, 1 bay leaf and 2 large sprigs parsley and place with cooking chicken.

VEGETABLE DIP
½ cup mayonnaise
½ cup sour cream
1 tsp. Beau Monde liqueur
1 tsp. dill weed
1 tsp. fresh parsley
1 tsp. dry minced onion
Combine ingredients and serve as dip for carrots, celery, cauliflower, turnip slices, etc.

Garlic Bread

When you make garlic bread, you may wrap the loaf in foil — but be sure to leave the foil open at the top so the bread will be crusty.

BEEF BOURGUIGNONNE
5 med. onions
½ lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced
2 tbsps. shortening
2 lbs. round steak, cut in 1-inch cubes
1 tsp. salt
¼ tsp. crushed thyme
¼ tsp. pepper
½ tbsps. flour
¾ cup beef bouillon
½ cups red burgundy
French bread
Cook onions and mushrooms in oil and drain on paper towel. Brown meat in same skillet and sprinkle on seasonings. Mix flour and bouillon and pour into skillet. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil one minute and stir in burgundy. Cover and simmer meat 1½ to 2 hours. Liquid should just cover the meat. If necessary, add more bouillon and burgundy, mixed 1 part bouillon, 2 parts burgundy. Gently stir in onions and mushrooms, and cook uncovered for 15 minutes.

CHICKEN-IN-A-BEERPOT
5 to 6 lb. whole chicken
Lemon juice
Salt
Pepper
2 cups beer
2 large onions, chopped
2 tbsps. salt
1 cup sliced celery
1 clove garlic, chopped
¼ cup chopped parsley
8 carrots
16 small new potatoes
16 small white onions
10 oz. pkg. frozen peas
Paprika.
Peel new potatoes, scrape carrots and cut into 2-inch pieces, and peel small onions. Rub chicken inside and outside with lemon juice. Sprinkle in-

side and out with salt and pepper. Tie legs together and put chicken in large kettle or Dutch oven. Add beer, onions, salt, celery, garlic and parsley. Cover tightly and simmer for 1½ to 2 hours, or until chicken is tender. Add more beer if necessary, to maintain level of liquid. When chicken is tender, add carrots, potatoes and onions and simmer until vegetables are tender. Add mushrooms and peas, cover and cook additional 5 minutes. Sprinkle chicken with paprika. To serve, carve chicken and place in bowls with broth and vegetables. Yields 6 to 8 servings.

APPLE BREAD
½ cup butter
¾ cup brown sugar
2 eggs
2 tbsps. buttermilk or sour cream
1 cup chopped apples
2 cups flour
2 tbsps. baking powder
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 cup chopped nuts
¼ tsp. nutmeg
¼ tsp. ginger
½ tsp. salt
Cream butter and sugar, add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add buttermilk or sour cream and apples and mix well. Add remaining ingredients. Let stand 20 minutes, then bake in loaf pan at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

Seasonal Tip: Try The Beautiful Buffet

Here come winter buffet suppers. Friends are back from vacations, children are in school. It's time for get-togethers. But what to serve?

How about a clove-studded, glazed canned ham that is easy to carve? Then as a change from the usual ham partners — scalloped potatoes or macaroni and cheese — we suggest a rice casserole. To prepare, use cooked firm-grain rice mixed with cream sauce plus lots of diced pimiento and top with grated cheese.

No cooked vegetable is necessary with the ham and rice. Instead, you might like to serve a molded salad made with the new mixed vegetable flavored gelatin. Such a pretty offering! When turned out of its mold, the top is creamy, the bottom a pretty clear color studded with the orange of shredded carrot and the gold of pineapple. If you use a ring mold for the salad, fill the center with salad greens; otherwise, surround with greens.

French bread or hot biscuits will be needed as an accompaniment to the main course. For dessert, what could be better than your best cookies and coffee?

TWO-LAYER

BUFFET SALAD
2 pkgs (3 ounces each) mixed vegetable flavored salad

gelatin
½ tsp. salt
2 cups boiling water
1 tbsps. lemon juice
½ cup commercial sour cream

cream
¾ cup cold water
1 cup shredded carrots
1 can (8½ ounces) pineapple tidbits

In a mixing bowl, stir together the gelatin, salt, boiling water and lemon juice until gelatin dissolves.

Remove ½ cup of the mixture

to a small mixing bowl; gently beat in the sour cream and ¼ cup of the cold water just until blended. Pour into a 1½-quart mold. Chill until set, but not firm.

Tips On Baking Holiday Turkey

Turkey will be tops on menus in many households at Christmas. If the bird isn't to be stuffed, sprinkle salt inside.

If the turkey is going to be stuffed, plan on about a cup of dressing per pound of bird. Use a light touch in stuffing the turkey as it will expand during cooking. Extra filling can be baked separately.

Use a meat thermometer for best results in judging when the poultry is done. If you don't have a thermometer, test by pressing drumstick meat and moving the leg joints.

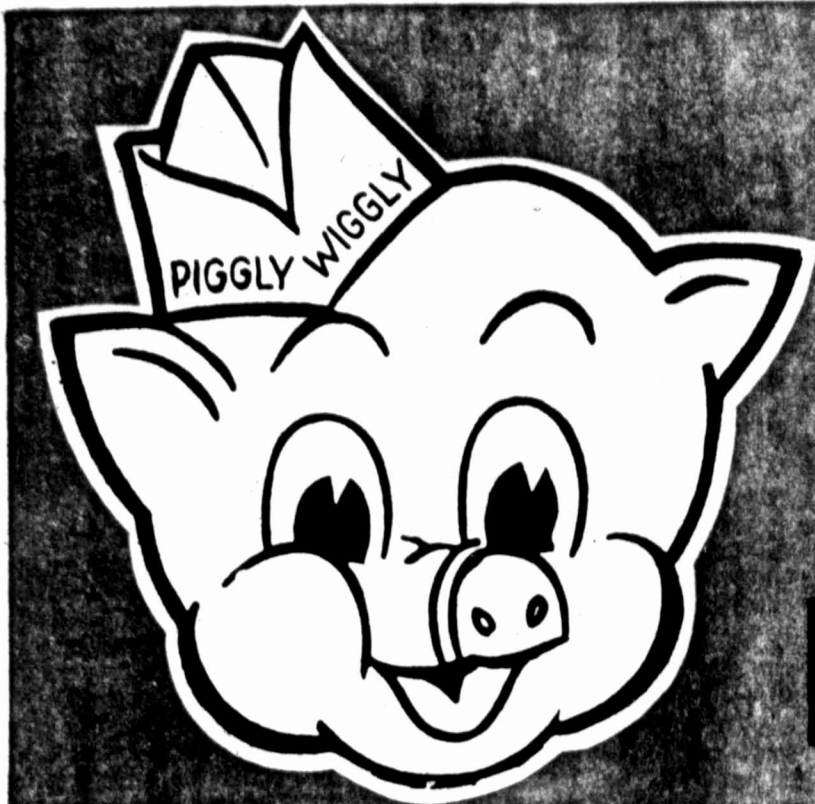

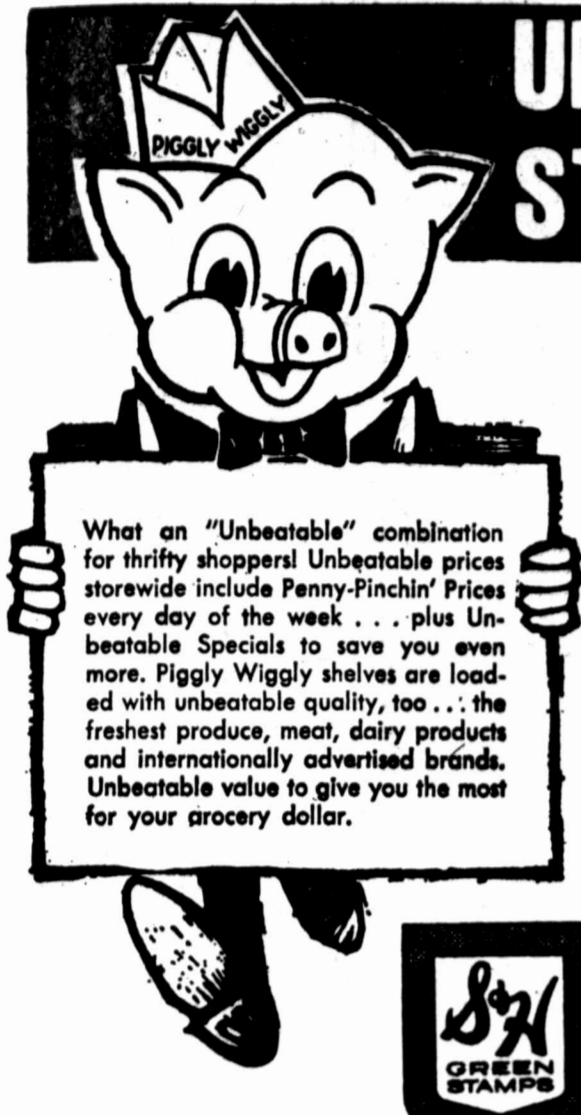

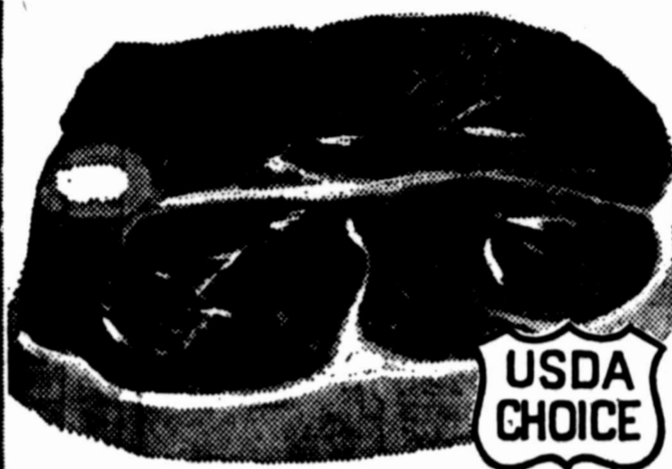
