AWAITING WORD Railroaders **Lines Locally**

By STEPHEN R. VORHIS

Big Spring employes of the Texas & Pacific Railway reacted calmly to a nationwide railroad walkout. Some appeared to be bored with waiting word from district union officials as messages came through that workers in other parts of the country were returning to work.

"I've only been here about a half-hour and already I'm tired of walking this picket line," one picket said as he paced in front of the T&P Freight Office on First Street.

At the Settles Hotel, local union leaders had established a makeshift headquarters and were simply waiting for word from higher union of-

"We aren't going to go back to work until we hear something definite from the district union leaders," R. L. Baber, local union leader, said. "At this point we plan to man a picket line, but take no other action against the railroad,"

Baber said the pickets would work one-hour shifts on the picket line for the duration of the

About 20 employes of the railroad were in the headquarters office, relaxing, drinking coffee, and waiting for word.

At the railroad office, Superintendent J. W. Ritter was manning an empty office. "At midnight last night the men simply dropped what they were doing and left when the pickets arrived," he said.

"Three of the supervisors have just left and they are going to man a train and move it to Fort Worth. Since Big Spring is a key location and switching point between the East and Southwest we will try to keep as many trains moving for as long as we can.

"I think that the consumer here will be the last to feel anything from the rail strike, because most of the city's food comes in by truck. First and hardest hit will be the industry because we transport the raw materials they need in manufacturing," Ritter said.

An official in the railway express agency office said he didn't expect the rail strike to slow down his delivery of packages unless the strike continues for several days.

"Most of the REA packages coming to Big Spring come by truck, so I won't be affected. Usually, over great distances railroads are involved so if the strike continues there won't be anything for the trucks to bring," he said.

'Rich' Hughes Out Of Sight, **Rumors Grow**

PARADISE ISLAND, The Bahamas (AP) - While feuding executives battled in court over control of Howard Hughes' \$300 million Nevada empire, the billionaire recluse remained silent and out of sight in the Bahamas. With lack of any official word on his activites, rumors multi-

An unexplained meeting of executives of Paradise Island resort Wednesday revived speculation that Hughes may be negotiating to buy its hotels and

gambling casino. The executives met for several hours in Nassau, across a narrow waterway from Para-

Efforts to catch any sign of Hughes in the Britannia Beach Hotel on Paradise Island contin-

ued to be futile. Four ninth-floor suites were guarded and inaccessible to the public. Most speculation places Hughes there.

Paradise Island was the object of a \$25 million offer from a New York group last March. The offer, for only the two hotels and not the casino, was turned down by Resorts International, owner of Paradise Is-

Another site which Hughes may be interested in is Andros Island, largest in the Bahamas chain. Ninety miles long and as much as 25 wide, Andros Island is sparsely populated with most of the land owned by an heir to the Reynolds aluminum fortune.

While officials refused any confirmation, reports persisted that Hughes' discussions so far have been primarily with Bahamian government officials. General Moncrieff J. Spear,

RETURNING TO WORK

The UTU withdrawal was announced by W.W. Carson, assist-

ant to Luna. In telegrams to all general chairmen and international officers, Carson advised that because Congress passed—and President Nixon signed—legislation prohibiting a strike and guaranteeing a wage increase that UTU was canceling its part in the strike.

The strike, which began at 12:01 a.m. was the nation's third in the last 50 years.

ANGRY MEN

The emergency law passed by Congress early today ordered the strikers back to work with a partial pay increase.

"They are increasingly angry and bitter." said strike leader C. L. Dennis of the nearly 500,000 workers who walked out at 12:01 a.m. and showed no immediate inclination to return in compliance with the new law,

Mail Embargo Effect Limited

Although Postmaster General Winton M. Blount ordered an embargo Wednesday on second, third and fourth class mail traveling more than 300 miles because of the nationwide railroad strike, the Big Spring post office will still distribute all classes of mail in 14 states.

"We are going to be able to distribute mail further than the embargo limit because of the post office's massive truck network," Postmaster Frank Hardesty said

"We will be able to distribute all first class mail and air mail anywhere in the country, and be able to deliver all classes of mail anywhere in Texas, Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Wyoming, and Utah." he said.

Hardesty said that persons who have not mailed Christmas packages to friends living in states other than the 14 states the post office can service will have to send them by first class mail to insure delivery by Christmas.

"Of course, if the item is heavy and inexpensive it may be better to keep it yourself and send a money order as a gift," he said.

How About More Time On Job?

Everyone familiar with the problems ahead for the 62nd Texas Legislature convening in January are aware it has a burdensome and time consuming agenda of crises to solve. Already there are suggestions from competent observers that it can't all be finished in a regular session, and that one or more special sessions are in prospect.

But Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes is quoted as urging the legislature to finish its business in its regular 140-day session. He reportedly plans, if possible, to keep the senators working five days

a week to accomplish that goal. Three and four-day work weeks are common for the legislature early in the session, and even well into it. The pattern often is to work Monday through Thursday and then recess for a long weekend.

After the session is geared up and committee hearings are underway, this is not always the short week

it appears to be, however, for many hearings are held at night and wear on into the late hours.

Still, it would contribute to efficiency and would expedite business if both the House and Senate were to keep a five-day week after session's early preliminaries are out

This would require agreement of Barnes, House Speaker Gus Mutscher, and other decision makers of both

After graduating from high school I took a job in a retail store. I can't stand the lying. backbiting and treachery that goes on in the business world. What can I do?

There are two lessons we can learn in the business world. I know, because the first job I ever had was as a brush salesman. The first is: that there are some people in the business world who are unscrupulous, greedy and crafty. This came as a shock to me, as it has to you. But I learned something else of a positive nature which is this: one need not use such tactics to succeed. I never pulled a shady deal in business, and yet I made good. The public responds to kindness, honesty and forthrightness. I know many businessmen who have refused to join the rat-race, and yet have been phenomenal successes in business. For example, a friend, who took over a business where unscrupulous tactics had been the rule of thumb, laid down four rules for his employes 1. Is it the truth? 2. Is it fair to all concerned? 3. Will it build goodwill and better friendships?? 4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?) With those four principles he became fabulously successful. Try these principles in your situation, and I dare say that you will sell more than those who are greedy and dishonest. Don't be discouraged. People still respond to kindness, patience and

WASHINGTON - President Nixon and lower interest rates indicate that there will be a further decline of the rate of inflation during the year

> The President points out that businessmen and investors, large and small, have felt a profit squeeze, as corporate profits are down 8 per cent from 1969. He emphasized, therefore, what has to be done to "restimulate the economy." He reviews the several steps that have already been taken, such as the growing money supply and easier credit policies. He believes that the stage is set for new expansion of housing and of state and local government construction.

MR. NIXON frankly says that the federal budget will not be balanced until there is full employment. This is why the emphasis is on stimulating the economy in order to increase revenue collections. He adds:

"As the economy rises toward full employment, more money will be required to do the nation's business. The amount of business to be done will rise steadily, and we shall need a rate of expansion of the supply of money and credit to do the job properly. I have been assured by Dr. Arthur Burns that the independent Federal Reserve System will provide fully for the increasing monetary needs of the economy. I am confident that this commitment will be kept."

THIS IS A definite pledge of lower interest rates, and it will affect the borrowing and lending mechanism of the whole country.

But the biggest unsettled factor is the wage-and-price problem. While productivity is being stressed and the President is calling for restraint at the bargaining table, it is hard for the union leaders to convince the rank-and-file members that they should not seek such advances as were given recently in wages in the auto and construction trades.

THE VALUE OF a President's speech at a critical time in the condition of the economy lies in what it can do to foster public confidence. Mr. Nixon's appeal is to all groups to assume responsibility for sound policy-making in the matter of wages and prices. He says it is time to end the "buck-passing" because, as he declares, "fighting inflation is everybody's business.'



I suppose all over town, people stopped for a minute to think where they were when they heard the news of Pearl Harbor. I didn't have to stop and think, I wasn't even born yet. The day, however, does hold a special significance. My father was stationed near Manila when the bombing began. In fact, he was on guard duty when the news came through that Pearl Harbor was under attack. Dad says he tried to wake his comrades when he went back to the barracks, but no one would believe him. The bombing of Pearl Harbor was about as far from their imagination as it could be.

The Liberal Who Stayed Away

WASHINGTON — Rep. Richard Bolling, D-Mo., who for years has made the pit of the House noisy with his exhortations on behalf of "the people," may have provided a definition for what might be called the

It is, by a recent non-action on Bolling's part, a liberal who is for "the people" except when he is living it up in the Caribbean.

COMMENT ON Bollings' passive role in defeating legislation to establish an independent consumer protection agency by the House Rules Committee is mandatory in this age of blatant social awareness. Although Bolling has been about as blatant on this issue as a body can get, he declined to interrupt his French West Indies vacation to fly to Washington and cast the vote that would have cleared the bill.

THE BILL was defeated on a 7-7 tie. Bolling favored the legislation and therefore his vote would have sent the bill to the House floor, where passage was considered certain. But - no go. "I can't leave. . .I wouldn't do any good anyway," Bolling was quoted as telling a House staffer who pleaded with him by phone to fly to Washington for a few minutes work

Bolling, 54, has been in the House since 1948 and has long been one of the leaders of the Young Turks who would reform that body's procedures on the ground that all that horsing around thwarts the people's will and welfare.

BUT I HAVE learned, over the years, to be suspicious of the pro-

fessional, all-out liberal of the Richard Bolling and Sen. Jack Javits type. I have discovered they frequently cut the same corners the reactionaries do, although of course for reasons they claim are pure. New York's Javits, for example, votes exclusively the Jack Javits Party line, and the back of his hand to the Republican Party he allegedly repre sents. Bolling is one of those legislators who like to be thought well of in the Georgetown drawing rooms populated by limousine liberals whose only contact with the peasantry is

as employer to employe. THUS I WAS not surprised to learn that Bolling found it "impossible" to make it for that vote on the consumer bill. It was, obviously, too ruddy inconvenient for the man. Such an attitude may be okay for citizens in private life who make no claim to a role in national leadership. We'd all like to be lolling on a Caribbean beach right now. But I accept no excuses from a Richard Bolling who for so many years has pictured himself as a self-sacrificing public servant determined to democratize

AS FOR THE bill itself, passed 74 to 4 by the Senate, it has its warts, notably in that it would add one more expensive government agency to the pile instead of assigning consumer protection to any one of a number of existing bodies. But there is no reason why this fault and others could not be ironed out in a House-Senate conference.







scalloped potatoes or macaroni and cheese — we suggest a rice casserole. To prepare, use cooked firm-grain rice mixed with cream sauce plus lots of diced pimiento and op with grated cheese. No cooked vegetable is neces-

sary with the ham and rice. Instead, you might like to serve molded salad made with the new mixed vegetable flavored gelatin. Such a pretty offering! When turned out of its mold, the top is creamy, the bottom pretty clear color studded with the orange of shredded carrot and the gold of pineapple. If you use a ring mold for the salad, fill the center with salad greens; otherwise, surround with greens.







oin the Navy. Holmes is a member of what the Navy calls the minority officer recruiting effort program.

The days when a Negro or a member of any minority were stuck with a menial job in the

Navy as a cook or steward are over, Holmes says. The Navy is looking for officers and enlisted personnel from minorities to bring up its num-ber of minorities to the level in

other services.

Traditionally the Navy has given little opportunity for advancement to minorities.

In 1867, the Navy set out to change this by setting up the special recruitment program, he At that time, it had the lowest

number of minority personnel of any branch of the service. Even today only 0.67 per cent of its officers and 5.5 per cent of its enlisted men are from minority

The number of minority offieers has increased from 350 in 1967 to 539 in 1970, he said. "The way we do it is to make courtesy calls on various minority leaders and on campuses
