JOBS TRAINING

Nixon Accused Of Bad Faith After Veto

WASHINGTON (AP) - The provision most criticized by President Nixon in vetoing a job training bill is little different from a program the administration helped draft shortly before the 1970 elections, the measure's chief House sponsor

Rep. James G. O'Hara, D-Mich., accused President Nixon of bad faith in rejecting Wednesday the \$9.5 billion manpower training bill, which included a public service job provision.

It was this provision, which would have created 300,000 jobs for the unemployed, that the President found most objectionable, yet, O'Hara said, administration officials fully backed the program when the House passed the bill in October.

The vetoed bill was a compromise between House and Senate versions which, Nixon said in his veto message, abandoned the House position on public service employment.

But O'Hara, at a news conference Thursday, said only two changes were made in the House provision and neither made a substantial change in the program the administration had approved

O'Hara challenged the President's charge that the compromise bill failed to link the proposed public service jobs with training that would lead to private employment.

O'Hara had spurred the administration into helping draft a public service program by putting a broader bill of his own through the Education and Labor Committee just before election.

Rather than be forced to oppose a bill creating jobs during a political campaign where unemployment was an important issue, O'Hara said the administration sent emissaries to work with him on a comprehensive manpower bill that included a trimmed version of his job bill.

Smith made Ramsey's appointment effective Jan. 1 and said he will serve until the next general election "and until his successor shall be duly elected and qualified."

The govenor also appointed Robert C. Wright of Lubbock 137th District judge effective Jan. 1. He will replace Judge James Ellis who was appointed to the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals.

Hijacker Must Face Piracy, **Mutiny Raps**

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (P) - Alvin L. Glatowski, who helped hijack a Vietnam-bound American ammunition ship nine months ago, flew out of Phnom Penh today to face charges in th United States for mutiny and piracy.

Glatowski, 21, of Long Beach, Calif., surrendered voluntarily to U.S. Embassy officials Tuesday. Last March, he and Clyde W. McKay, 25, of Escondido, Calif., hijacked the 10,000-ton freighter Columbia Eagle by seizing the bridge and threatening to blow up the vessel. They ordered Capt. Donald Swann to sail the ship into the Cambodian port of Kompong Som.

The two hijackers asked for political asylum from the regime of Cambodian Prince Norodom Sihanouk, who was ousted only a few days later. McKay disappeared from Phnom Penh in late October when he and an American deserter from Thailand escaped from guards.

STRICT CURFEW

A Western diplomat who returned from the Baltic port of Gdansk, where the major violence broke out Monday, said tanks were positioned every 100 yards along the main street. Warsaw radio reported that life in Gdansk was "fully normal."

Radio Szczecin appealed for observance of the nightly curfew and for "calm, prudence and work" and said the port had begun a normal working day.

The nightly curfew also continued in force in the tri-cities of Gdansk, Gdynia and Sopot, on the Bay of Danzig 180 miles east of Szczecin. Passenger train service from Warsaw to Gdansk resumed today after a four-day suspension, but plane and telephone service were still sus-

Warsaw Radio reported that all shops in Gdansk were open this morning and fully stocked, "people were queuing to get morning newspapers; city transport is operating on a fullscale basis and so is the intertri-city electric train line."

The broadcast said all workers went to their jobs in all three cities.

'GANGS OF HOOLIGANS'

Radio Gdansk had reported a new flareup in the city Thursday night, with "gangs of hooligans" attacking food trucks.

The government meanwhile declared the equivalent of a state of emergency throughout the country and warned that demonstrators resorting to violence would be shot on sight.

Premier Jozef Cyrankiewicz told the nation by television Thursday night that 10 to 20 persons had been killed and hundreds wounded in the rioting, which started Monday in Gdansk when shipyard workers demonstrated against increases averaging 20 per cent in the price of food, fuel, clothing and

mittee drop the idea when published reports said he was in line to become the chamber's first assistant sergeant-at-arms. Friedel, 72, told that some of his colleagues were looking for still another post he might fill, said, "If something else comes up, I'll take a look at it.'

A subcommittee had approved the job recommendation for Friedel, defeated for renomination after 18 years in the House.

Social Security Boost Appears Dead In '70

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate's conglomerate bill on Social Security, trade, welfare and a variety of other subjects appears dead despite a demand from President Nixon that action be taken by Congress before it adjourns.

Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., powerful chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said Thursday he sees no chance of rescuing the legislation in a conference, even if the Senate passes it.

And key senators, after a parliamentary go-round lasting for hours, said all the maneuvering leaves almost no chance for the legislation in the Senate.

Light Snow Interruption

Thursday over the South Plains in West Texas, lowering visibility to four miles around Lubbock. Dust blew to a somewhat lesser extent in parts of South

Jurors Indict Rentzel For Indecent Exposure

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas County grand jury indicted professional football player Lance Rentzel of the Dallas Cowboys today on a charge of indecent exposure to a juvenile.

Dist. Atty. Henry Wade said Rentzel's trial probably would be held in February. Rentzel, 27, a wide receiver

for the National Football League team, was charged in November in connection with an alleged incident involving a 10-year-old girl in suburban University Park.

Rentzel was placed on the Cowboys' inactive list at his own request after the charge

The football player appeared voluntarily at the University Park police station Nov. 20 and posted a \$1,500 appearance bond. The grand jury took up consideration of the case earlier

The maximum sentence is 15 years on conviction for indecent exposure in Texas.

Rentzel has been with the

Cowboys since 1967. He married television star Joey Heatherton April 12, 1969, in New York. On Oct. 4, 1966, Rentzel pleaded guilty in St. Paul, Minn., to a formal complaint charging him with "making noise, disturbance and improper diversion," and with committing "improper conduct to the disturbance of the citizens." The police report said several resineighborhood in St. Paul complained that Rentzel had exposed himself in the presence of small children on three different occasions. Rentzel was not sentenced in

Smith Says He'll Reject **Park Grant**

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Preston Smith said Thursday he would veto a \$2.1 million federal grant for a Mustang Island State Park and suggested two parks and wildlife commissioners who obtained the funds should resign.

The governor fired off angry telegrams to President Nixon, acting Interior Secretary Fred Russell and the acting Chief of the U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, officially protesting the grant.

And he mailed hot letters to Texas Parks and Wildlife Commissioners Harry Jersig of San Antonio and L. P. Gilvin of Amarillo, complaining they were circumventing the law in seeking the Mustang Island

Smith told them he would not approve state expenditure of the grant, to be matched 50-50 with state park bond funds, to buy 3,965 acres of the Gulf Coast island for a park.

He complained to Nixon and the Interior Department officials that Jersig and Gilvin Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., to Outdoor Recreation into ignorng its own rules.

In an exchange with Rep. Jonathan Bingham, Rep. Mills defended highway-use tax funds solely for highway purposes. Rep. Bingham pressed for some promise that there would be a diversion from the Trust Fund to mass transportation developments.

"We know there is not sufficient money (in this five-year period) to carry forward the completion of the Interstate System, plus the maintenance of the apportionment to the states for primary and secondary roads normally referred to as ABC roads," replied Rep. Mills. The money here involved ... will be needed in its entirety for this one purpose

"I am not a advocate . . . of using highway user tax funds for some other purpose than the construction of highways . . . I cannot see the relationship between taxing a person for highway use and the construction

At present, Great Britain, Australia and New Zealand are in the process of transition to the metric system of weights and measurements. Within a few years, their transitions will be complete. And when that day comes, the United States will stand along → and lonely — outside the metric system. We will be left with our present familiar but hodge-podge system, and it will be totally unlike that of any other country.

When that day comes, the news will be bad for business in this country. The question really is when the United States will adopt the metric system, not whether.

During 1971, a special Commerce Department committee ordered by Congress is to report on U.S. transition to the metric system. Then the prospect is for a 10-20 year transition period. But you may as well learn those meters and such now. Could it be that the ruler will suffer the same fate as the Dodo bird?

Those Shifts In The Cabinet

WASHINGTON — What may seem to the average observer who reads about "changes in the cabinet" as just a shift in personnel due to trouble in policy-making is really the same old story — a President of the United States is trying to transfer individuals who can function effectively somewhere else in the complex machinery of the biggest government in the

CABINET OFFICERS take their jobs with relatively little previous knowledge of what their departments do. Secretary of the Treasury David Kennedy, who is resigning to become ambassador-at-large in matters of international finance, is an experienced man generally in his field. But it would take anyone a long time to learn how to be the administrative officer of the Treasury Department, which includes the Internal Revenue Service, the Bureau of Customs, the office of Comptroller General, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing,

I think that ministers are greatly overpaid. Shouldn't all ministers be willing to be poor so that they might understand and sympathize with the poor? K.A. In my opinion most ministers are underpaid! The Bible teaches that,

"The laborer is worthy of his hire."

In a recent study of salaries for men engaged in professional work, minister's salaries were appreciably lower than any of the others. I know a great many ministers, and I believe that few of them (if any) were motivated by the prospect of a big salary and comfortable living. For the most part, the ones I know are giving their lives to God's service, and the financial consideration is secondary

At the same time, ministers tend to have larger families than other professional men. Therefore, their financial obligations are greater. A minister may be self-effacing as far as money is concerned, but still he has his family to clothe, feed and

While many congregations seem to agree with you, that a minister should subsist on less than other professional men, I can't say that I agree. It costs him just as much to buy a car, to clothe his family, and to educate his children as any of the others. While he, himself, perhaps could subsist on a very little, and might be willing to, he has an obligathe United States Mint, and the Secret

ROBERT FINCH, who was secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and resigned to become a counsellor to the President, presided over a huge department. It includes not only the Social Security Administration, but the Office of Education, the Food and Drug Administration, the National Institutes of Health, the Health Services and Mental Health Administrathe Environmental Control Administration, and the National Air Pollution Control Administration.

SECRETARY OF LABOR George Shultz, who resigned from the Nixon cabinet in June, was in charge of a department which embraces the Manpower Administration, the Labor-Management Services Administration, the Bureau of Wage and Labor Standards, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics. After his resignation, he became director of a new Office of Management and the Budget in the White House.

Elliott Richardson, now secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, had previously served as assistant secretary of HEW and as Under Secretary of State, so he has had training in administrative jobs.

JAMES D. HODGSON moved up to become Secretary of Labor after holding the post of under secretary for 18 months, so he was familiar with the functioning of the department.

Mr. Nixon's choice of former Gov. Connally of Texas enables him to put into the Treasury someone who has served in the cabinet before - as Secretary of the Navy under President Kennedy - and knows the background of the job of running a department. This often isn't possible for a new administration.

THE PRESENT SYSTEM has many faults. Probably the answer lies in putting the management of each executive department in the hands of a general manager. He would be a carer public servant. Cabinet officers would be appointed as advisers to the President with supervisory power over the departments, particularly in the formation of public policy.

THE APPOINTMENT of Mr. Connally, who is a Democrat, gives the Nixon cabinet a bipartisan aspect. While it has some political advantages to the administration, the probability is that the appointment was made largely because he is a versatile individual and can assist the President

The gas would be liquefied in a complex liquefaction plant and shipped in methane tankers to the United States where it would be converted back to gas and fed into pipe lines on the Eastern seaboard.

THE WIDE foreign policy differences are over the Vietnam war and America's position in the Middle East. Because of these differences, Boumedienne sees little possibility that formal diplomatic relations between the two countries will be resumed in the near future. > "AFTER OUR long struggle for independence with France, in which we suffered more than a million casualties — rivers of blood," Boumedienne said, "we believe we must fight for a just cause and stand with the Vietnamese people. The real issue is selfdetermination for Vietnam.

"This also applies to the Middle East. The United States has entirely ignored the interests of the Palestinian people. These two problems have arisen and they are the cause of the deterioration in our formal relations.

"But the Algerian people have nothing against the American people. The divergencies are between the two governments. We have great admiration for the dynamism and the constructive skills of your people."

THE PRESENCE of the Soviet naval force and the American Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean is a danger, Boumedienne recognizes. But he expressed confidence that with a nuclear standoff between the two super-powers there will be no war.

"We do not wish to see either fleet in the Mediterranean," Boumedienne said. "We would like to see only fishing boats and pleasure boats there. But, as long as the two powers dominate the world, it is hopeless. As a small country we are against the great powers partitioning the rest

Andrew Tully The Case Of Justice Douglas

surrounding the case of Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, an aura of the kind of sadness with which the ancient Greek playwrights concerned themselves. It is the Limbo in which he has been placed by a Congressional investigation, a Limbo in which he may well be forced to live the rest of his judicial life.

The initial attempt to impeach Douglas has failed. The likelihood is that his case, involving charges of conduct unbecoming a Supreme Court Justice, will never be settled to the satisfaction of either side.

A FIVE-MAN special subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee has concluded in a split decision that there are no grounds to impeach Douglas and remove him from the Court. Probably further attempts will be made in the next session of Congress to bring impeachment proceedings against him. There is considerable dissatisfaction among House members with the investigation of Douglas' connection with the Parvin foundation, whose benefactor, Albert Parvin, had business connections with Las Vegas gambling hells.

BUT I SUSPECT any new probe will come to nothing. New evidence is unlikely to come to light at this late date. The subcommittee's findings suggest, if they do not say outright, that Douglas lacks the sensijustice would have resigned upon Court justice to be. pondering these findings. But

WASHINGTON - There is tragedy Douglas, of course, has the right to

judge himself. WITHOUT INDICTING the man, it surely can be said that some of his activities, as reflected in the subcommittee's report, would be considered - let us say - unusual for any judge in any court. Put another way, these activities destroy the American picture of a Supreme Court Justice as purer than Calpurnia.

IT IS RATHER disconcerting, for example, to discover that Justice Douglas appeared to be less sensitive in financial matters than Albert Parvin, a hardboiled businessman who could hold his own with the tycoons of roulette. I refer to the report's deposition that Douglas tried to borrow money from Parvin and was turned down because Parvin thought it might cause Douglas embarrassment.

This was no "high crime or misdemeanor," and thus in my judgment no grounds for impeachment. Indeed, was one friend trying to borrow money from another. But it seems curious that a justice of the land's highest court apparently gave no thought to its possible impropriety.

THE SUBCOMMITTEE came up with other examples of Douglas' insensitivity, but this will do. Flogging a dead horse has always been a futile exercise. The point is made, to wit, that while the material is lacking to make a strong impeachment case against the justice, the available evidence does show Douglas as falling tivity expected from a Supreme Court far short of the kind of detached pub-Justice. in today's deal when South, the declarer at seven clubs, allowed himself to be victimized by adverse distribution. West opened the bidding in third position with one spade.

North, who was willing to play a game contract no matter what, announced his intentions by cue bidding his opponent's suit. The two spade bid forces partner to keep the proceedings going until game is reached. East held no defense and he

attempted to preempt opposition bidding space by jumping to four spades. South made an enterprising free bid of five clubs to tell partner that he had a good suit. This was all North was waiting to hear and he leaped to seven clubs with the expectation that trumps were solid and that South would be able to establish North's long suit for discards.

IT'S DOUBTFUL

West opened a trump and when the dummy was spread, South observed that if he established his partner's heart suit, the dummy would be high. He therefore drew trump in two rounds and then cashed the three top diamonds, discarding a heart from the closed hand.

The ace of hearts came next, followed by a small heart which declarer ruffed. When East showed out on the second round, South's campaign collapsed. Had hearts divided three-two which is the normal expectation, declarer intended to reenter dummy by trumping a spade, ruff out spade with North's fourth club and claim the balance with good hearts.

The four-one division proved to be declarer's undoing, for it left him one entry short and in the end, he was obliged to concede a spade trick. Altho South was somewhat

the victim of bad luck, he had actually overlooked a better line of play. If both opponents follow to three rounds of diamonds and one heart, then declarer can score 13 tricks on a straight crossruff.

After the opening trump lead is won, clubs are abandoned and the last trump is left outstanding. South plays the A-K-Q of diamonds and the ace of hearts. He now ruffs three hearts in his hand and three spades in dummy. Once declarer cashes his side winners, the rest is routine.


