

Santa has returned to the North Pole and is busy packing his sleigh for tonight's gift deliveries, and most area residents will be able to spend Christmas Day at home relaxing with their

All county and city offices will be closed Christmas Day. Webb AFB will be closed to transients on Christmas Day, and holiday leaves were encouraged. All area schools closed this week and will resume classes in January.

All area clinics will be closed, but the doctors will be on call in case of emergency. Telephone and utility company offices will be closed, but emergency repair crews will be on call.



Officials at Texas International Airways said it has been difficult to get a seat on any of its flights for the last several days and the busiest day of the year will be

"Right after Christmas the traffic will slow down but it looks like it will pick up again at the beginning of 1971," H. D. Berry, manager of the local airline office, said.

Jim Owens, manager at the Grevhound Bus Terminal, said that the buses have been full

for the past several days and that Christmas packages have been coming in at about the maximum since the beginning

"We expect the buses to be crowded until about the middle of January when servicemen and students have to report back to their jobs. But we have about 60 buses leaving Big Spring each day and we've never been out of seats. When one bus gets full we bring in another bus to accommodate the passengers unable to get a seat on the first one."

James Worden, new manager of the Continental Trailways Terminal, said that the only problem created by holiday season travel was the tremendous volume of Christ-

mas packages.

"We have noticed a large increase in the number of Christmas packages from the last couple of years and are working around the clock to clear them out before a logjam

Some persons, however, won't be traveling this holiday season, because they will have to work Christmas to meet emergency medical and utility needs.

All medical clinics will be closed on Christmas Day and the hospitals say they plan to operate on their regular Sunday schedules on Christmas Day.

Cowper Clinic and Hospital physicians will make morning rounds for about an hour and then will be on call for the remainder of the day.

The Hall-Bennett Memorial Hospital will remain open with a skeleton staff and physicians and technicians on call. The clinic will close at noon Christmas Eve day and re-open

Medical Center Memorial Hospital will operate with practically a full staff because of the heavy patient load.

Medical Arts Hospital will be manned by a skeleton staff on Christmas Day and the clinic will close at noon Thursday for the holiday.

The staff of the Veterans Administration Hospital, except those necessary for patient care, will be off at noon

Thursday and Christmas Day. Most utility company employes will have Christmas Day off, however, emergency repair

crews will be on call. Texas Electric Service Co. says that personnel at the switching station will be working and that emergency crews will take emergency calls on the regular telephone

number. Pioneer Natural Gas Co. will be closed, with emergency crews on call.

Southwestern Bell Telephone business office will be closed, but 33 operators will be on duty to handle long-distance calls. and repair crews will be on call. The operators are expecting about 3,500 operator-handled calls Christmas Day, and the automatic direct distance dialing equipment is expected to handle about 4,000 calls.

Law enforcement and fire department officials said they hope to give as many of their employes the day off but everyone will be on call if needed.

Texas A&M University, announcing the study Wednesday said it has been granted \$30,000 for the investigation.

The project for the South Texas Regional Export Expansion Council will be financed by Texas A&M's Sea Grant Program and the ports of Galveston, Freeport and Port Arthur. DEEP CHANNELS

Need for the research was brought about by the increasing use of supertankers in international oil trade, said an A&M spokesman. These large carriers require deeper channel depths. with none of the existing Texas ports capable of handling them. said a council spokesman.

"Due to their immense size supertankers dictate immediate economic benefits to shippers and consumers," said Ray Brimble chairman of the South Texas Export Expansion Council "One supertanker may replace four or five smaller tankers and the resulting economies of scale are self-evident."

The study, requiring about five months, will include a literature search for information applicable to an offshore port facility and an evaluation of what studies will be needed in the areas of ecology, economics, legal and jurisdictional aspects, site selection, engineering, traf-fic and transportation and other considerations.

It also will include estimated cost figures for the individual studies and recommendations for possible sources of funds.



eighth graders. They will come from the upper one per cent or so of pupils

"We hope to bring 100 gifted kids from all over the United States for a six-week program on the SMU campus," said Dr. E. R. Simmons

"These academically gifted children are among the nation's most valuable resources and should be encouraged," said

He declared, "Gifted children are neglected in the schools. By the time they get to college they are disenchanted. I hope to bring them together for a social-recreational - educational program where they can relate to others like themselves.

There are similar programs but not for such youthful pupils. Most of the other projects are restricted to math and science. SMU is cooperating and the pupils will be housed in the school's dormitories

"This country needs persons skilled in other field (in addition to math and the sciences),' said Simmons. "This summer program will stress philosophizing about a wide range of dis-

Cost per pupil will be \$1,200. Sponsors are expected to foot the bill.

#### Marquis Childs Oil Fires The Algerian Economy

HASSI MESSAOUD, Algeria — Against the desert sky the flares of burning gas are like gaint candles lighted for some mysterious ritual. The long plumes of black smoke from the refinery and the separation plants are quickly lost in the thin, dry air.

It is a version of Bayonne, N. J., or Baton Rouge, La., set down in the Sahara. The landscape all around might be on the moon - the sand twisted into weird shapes, undisturbed for long millenia until the start of the Hassi Messaoud oil production center with one well 14 years ago.

NOW THE pumps, spread over an area of abut 30 square miles, have an annual production of 20 million tons of petroleum virtually free of sulphur. This is the heart of the oil and gas complex administered by Sonatrach, the government corporation that is taking over formerly foreign-owned producing and distribution facilities.

a series of dramatically lighted displays how the oil is produced, with gas pumped back into the wells to build up pressure and increase production. The hope is to bring the total to 35 million tons by 1973. Bursting with pride, escorting officials want the visitor to see every last unit in a complex stretching for miles across the desert.

In the geologic level above the oil is what is said to be almost literally a sea of brackish water. Pumped out

and desalinized, it supplies a community of 6,000. Date palms and banks of flowers make the recreation area seem poles away from the barren Sahara.

HASSI MESSAOUD is a French-Algerian project, but virtually every nation, East and West, is represented in the gas and oil development in one part of the country or another. An American firm that played a large part in giving Sonatrach its start and now has a variety of service contracts employs nationals of 27 different countries, including Russia and

TAKE POLAND as an example Riots, followed by looting and burning, began last week in different parts of the country. Foreign ships had to be ordered out of the seaports. Telephone communication was cut off. and curfews were imposed in several cities. It was reported that nearly 20 persons had been killed and several hundred injured, including many policemen. Thousands of people took part in the disorders, and the Communist party headquarters was badly damaged by fire in one city.

WHAT CAUSED it all? The Polish government had ordered a 20 per cent increase in food prices. The Poles were unhappy even before this. The average worker makes about \$125 a month and needs approximately twice as much to support a family. More than a third of Polish women have to work. Economic reforms have been neglected.

In the Western countries of Europe there have been uprisings, too. In Spain, for instance, demonstrations by terrorists have increased. The country is in deep trouble and General Franco's rule is in peril.

"The custom of hanging stockings at Christmas, we are told, comes from England. whereas the putting up of Christmas trees originated in Germany. This is borne out by the practices of Borden County families. Two of the families interviewed - the Orsons and the Pratts — came to Borden County soon after they left England. They brought with them the custom of hanging stockings. At the Pratt home on the edge of the Caprock, long black stockings were hung on the chimney. (In homes where there was no fireplace, the stockings were hung on the bedposts or on the backs of

cane-bottom chairs.) "The few gifts were ordered from Sears-Roebuck, or were homemade, and the fruit and nuts were once-a-year treats. Popcorn balls made of homegrown corn, and dried peaches from the Pratt peach orchard were a big part of the Christmas goodies. Others were fresh coconut cake as white and light and beautiful as a snowdrift and the Jeff Davis pies.

"Other cutoms brought from England were observed at the Orson home. There was always the traditional plum pudding made with suet and raisins and steamed for hours. Then there was Mother Orson's version of lemon cheese cake. (Would you like the recipe? 6 eggs, 2 cups sugar, the juice of three lemons and the grated rind of two lemons, 1 cup butter. Stir and cook all together until the consistency of honey. Cool.) This was kept in the milk cooler, and, to serve, was poured over very thin layers of

cake or pie crust and stacked. "There was always hog-killing time before the holidays so there would be fresh pork and sausage. All the neighbors came in to help.

"The Von Roeder family lived at the other end of the county. They had left Germany for Texas — then a part of Mexico - in 1831, bringing with them memories of evergreen trees trimmed with apples and oranges, strings of popcorn, and animal cookies decorated with different forms were used, and 140 years later the Von Roeder decendents still spend several days baking the same cookies to trim their Christmas trees.

# Hanukkah Is Observed In Joy, Gaiety

By PAUL CORCORAN One of the most joyous holidays observed by those of the Jewish faith usually coincides in time with the Christmas

Hanukkah is in no way related to the Christian observance of the birth of Jesus Christ. But "Happy Hanukkah," with its gaiety and exchange of gifts, helps bring Jews and Christians together for a short period of time of celebration and commemoration of significent religious events. It will be observed this year Dec. 23-30.

In the case of Hanukkah, the most significant feature of which is the lighting of the Hanukkah candle, the eight-day event commemorates a miracle related in the Book of Mac-

Twenty-one centuries ago, according to the test, a Syrian king, Antiochus, hated the Jews with such intensity that the temples were defiled and Greek idols were substituted for the symbols of Jewish faith. Holy books were burned.

Men whose identities were confirmed as Jewish by circumcision were killed.

One king, Mattathias, stood up to Antiochus and refused to enter the temples to pay homage to what to him were false gods. He was joined by his five sons in resisting Antiochus and his forces, and killed Christmas Customs chus and his forces, and killed many of the enemy before an exodus to regroup forces.

during the year. The use of mistletoe as a symbol of love, peacemaking and goodwill survives from the pre-Christian days of the ancient god, Balder, whose palace stood in the Milky Way.

The beloved Balder, according to myth, was slain by a mistletoe arrow but was restored to life through the inter-

cession of the other gods. Custody of the mistletoe plant hen was entrusted to the goddess of love who ordained that henceforth anyone passing beneath its bough should receive a kiss in token of love, not vengeance. As long as the mistletoe was held high it never could be used as a power for evil.

Throughout the Middle Ages men believed that mistletoe possessed all kinds of magical powers to protect them from witches, unhealed wounds and ail-

In some German villages the yuletide green still is called gut hyl, or "all heal." In Brittany its berries still are crushed to produce oil for treating fever. In America, the bulk of the holiday decoration comes from the Carolinas, Tennessee and the Southwest.

The white-berried plant also serves as a winter food supply for mockingbirds, robins and waxwings. These birds are responsible for spreading the seeds of the tree-damaging par-



Next year, all you'll have to do is open the carton and trim the new tree by starting with the items on the top of the box working down. What's more, everything will be shining clean and ready to use.

Put a sheet on the floor and lay the old tree in it for carrying through the house without leaving a trail of dry needles. And if you find your carpet littered with tiny bits of fluff from the cotton batting at the tree base, vacuum up as much as you can, then take up the last bits with one of the little rough rubber sponges used on suede

Carry another carton or basket to the living room to gather other bits of greenery from the mantel, doorway, and mirror without scattering needles or dried holly berries on the floor.

Remove the ribbon from artificial wreaths and dip quickly in warm soap or detergent suds, rinse, then dry thoroughly before storing for next Christmas. The ribbon can be pressed face down under a piece of waxed paper to regain its original rispness.

# Dickens' Tale **Holds Spirit** Of Christmas

Few stories so completely express the true spirit of Christmas as does the classic tale of 'A Christmas Carol' by Charles

The story tells of the spiritual rebirth of a miserly, mean old man and the eventual happiness he helped bring to others.

The familiar telling of the story of Scrooge, the three ghosts, Tiny Tim and the others - has become a veritable class-

Its reception was spontaneous and great; soon its fame spread around the world and it was printed in many languages. None of the other Christmas essays that Dickens wrote caught the public's fancy as did this one of Old Scrooge and

Tiny Tim. Not only is this story read at Christmas time within family groups, in school rooms and at religious gatherings but Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" has been recorded by famous act-tors; the "Carol" has also become an annual presentation on radio and television.

"A Christmas Carol in Prose, Being a Ghost Story of Christmas" was first published at Christmas 1843, and since that ime its popularity has never waned.

Generation after generation has laughed and cried over the story of the miserly Scrooge, who through the revelations of three spirits — Christmas Past, Present and Yet to Come — became a man who "knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man alive possessed the knowledge.' Charles Dickens, creator of

the "Carol," loved it as well as, or perhaps even better than, its many readers did. He told of crying and laughing again and again as, captivated by his story, he wrote the 30,000-word book in six weeks.

When Dickens gave readings from his works in England and America, the story of Scrooge was always the prime favorite with his audiences.


# Yule Found In Postal Guide





Moore, an amateur poet, stopped for a minute to savor the magic of the moonlight on the frozen Hudson and the dancing shadows it made of the chimney pots on the crisp white

Did a line come to him then? "The moon on the breast of the new-fallen snow gave the lustre of midday to objects be-

At the bottom of the hill, where the road from town led up to his estate, Moore met his caretaker, Jan Duychinck, a bearded, jovial Dutchman with a round dimpled face, a short stub of a pipe and an endless fund of stories and legends about little old New York, when it really was little but hardly

They enatted about Christmas and old Dutch customs and, ultimately, St. Nicholas, the fourthcentury bishop of Myra, who rose through the sky in a horse and wagon each Dec. 4, his feast day, bringing gifts for good little Dutch children and birch rods for those who had

It was a familiar legend. Washington Irving had written about it several years before and children of English stock in the city had borrowed portions of it for their own Christmas

But on that cold Christmas Eve in 1822, with the moon and the stars weaving magic in the night sky, the gentle professor of Greek and Hebrew conjured up a totally different picture of the gift-bringing saint. In Moore's imagination, St. Nick was fat and jolly - like Jan Duychinck — and he rode down the stairways in a wonderful miniature sleigh drawn by eight tiny reindeer.

Upstairs in his study, Moore took quill in hand and began to write the story he had promised his children and the whimsical lines that would make him fam-

But it was 15 years before it appeared in print under Moore's name and, after years of ardu ous scholarship, brought him lasting fame with the trifle of an hour's work.

Moore's word picture of St. Nicholas as a "right Jolly old elf" caught the imagination of children of all ages and estab lished the prototype of the mod-

OBERNDORF, Austria (UPI)

– As two muffled figures trudged through this Alpine Village two nights before Christ-mas in the year 1818 one murmured to the other: "silent night, holy night."

This is how, with the aid of a family of church mice, the world's most familiar Christmas carol came into being 144 years

Father Josef Mohr, 26, and his companion, schoolmaster Franz Xavier Gruber were in despair because of what they had discovered in Father Mohr's parish church. Mice had chewed through the

pellows of the church organ, throwing to the winds the planned parish annual Christmas musicale. Each push down on the organ pipes emitted only

It was bitter cold. A blizzard had raged all day but had sub-sided by this time. Father Mohr looked all around and continued, "all is calm, all is bright."


