YOU CAN USUALLY tell for sure when graduation week comes around, because that is the week the area will get some rain.

We have said before that if it doesn't rain during the last week or so of school, then this may be a sign that farmers and others who depend on rainfall may be in for a long summer.

This year, the rainy weather arrived right on schedule. On Sunday evening, when many folks were thinking about attending the senior baccalaureate services, a cloud system was moving across the area.

Some places, such as the Rhea area, and across the state line in New Mexico, had a little too much weather, as severe hail was received in places. A probable small twister ripped out a number of utility poles southeast of Farwell the same evening.

The possibility of threatening weather also seems to be a trademark for this time of the year. If you'll recall, it was last May on graduation evening, that parts of this area were hit by damaging winds, and the Canyon area received a tremendous flood.

Ye editor recalls that on the occasion he was to graduate from the eighth grade, one of these spring storms came, and saturated the area with rain. It was necessary for us to ride one of our tractors a mile on the unpaved road, where we met a neighbor on the pavement, in order to get into Muleshoe for our graduation ceremonies. A number of the members of our class were not able to make it in for that particular service, due to the stormy conditions and wet weather.

No doubt you can recall similar incidents connected with the weather at this time of the year, if you are natives to this area.

Some parts of the country have a traditional "Easter storm" (every so often we share in this tradition, also). Perhaps we need to publicize our "Graduation rain." It's nice when we get it, especially if we miss out on the violent weather.

Rain, Hail Soak Area On Sunday

The Friona area received a good rain, and some sections to the north and west suffered hail damage in a late storm last Sunday, May 20.

The official rainfall measurement in Friona was just .46 inch Monday morning, with another .02 falling after 8 a.m. However, a large portion of the area measured considerably more. Hereford, as an example, had 1.34 inches, and Amarillo over 2.5 inches.

Most of the hail damage apparently was in the Rhea area, and also north of Friona near the Deaf Smith County line. Some farmers in those areas experienced considerable damage to wheat and barley crops.

From four to ten inches of hail covered the ground into the morning hours near Rhea on Monday, giving an appearance of winter.

The area most affected was from the Bellview and Broadview communities in New Mexico, eastward to the state line, and on across to the Rhea community and eastward north of Friona.

It was reported that the Cordie Potts farm in the Rhea community sustained considerable hail damage.

Jim Dixon, who also farms near Rhea, said he had about 400 acres of wheat that was considerably damaged. The east side of the wheat

field was termed a total loss, while the west side was hurt to a lesser degree.

However, Dixon said that he did receive 2.4 inches of rain during the period, brightening prospects for summer row crops. "The good may have outweighed the bad," Dixon said.

Dryland maize had not been planted in the Rhea community, due to a lack of moisture, but it can now be planted, and there should be adequate moisture to bring the crop up to a good start.

The Sunday weather factory came in at least two separate installments.

The first episode brought a good rain in the Rhea community, Dixon said, with some hail noted, and came between 3 and 4 p.m. The devastating hail storm occurred sometime around 3 a.m. Monday morning, an unusual hour for a bad hail storm.

Louis Welch, who farms just west of Friona, said that he received "just a good rain" from the weather system, and said the moisture should be a tremendous asset.

He told about checking a field of recently planted soybeans on Monday, and finding they had come up to a good stand. He drove around the area checking for weather damage, and when he returned to the original field, the soybeans were

Cattle Statistics Are Announced By SPS

Sam Thomas, manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company in Amarillo, has announced that 4,974,530 fat cattle were produced in 1978 in the 45,000 square mile area served by SPS. This is an increase of 600,680 or 13.7 per cent over the previous year and is the largest number ever produced in a 12-month period.

The survey, which has been conducted since 1963, is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to the

production of fat cattle in the Southern Great Plains area.

"During the 1978 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,728,400, which reflects a reduction of about 6,000 head from 1977. This also represents the consolidation of feedlots and the conversion to growing operations," Thomas said.

"The total impact of the feed yard industry on the business community exceeded eight billion dollars for the second year," Thomas said, "and the farm sale value exceeded two billion dollars. Profits on feedlots or fed cattle have ranged from a low of \$3.33 per head to a high of \$137.00 during the last 120 days."

The survey also showed that the packing plant annual slaughter capacity continues to exceed five million head.

"The only foreseeable limitations on the future of the fed cattle industry is the possibility and probability that the customer's ability to buy may be exceeded, however, this is not in sight," Thomas said.

The survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area.

Copies of the survey will be available at Southwestern Public Service Company offices in about 30 days.

Only a person of extreme wit and extensive training can produce a story that combines satire with adventure; the result is refreshing.

Although interesting, well written and fast moving its characters are given to very loose speech and serious drinking. Not a book one would give to members of the Women's Missionary Union or the Temperance Society. 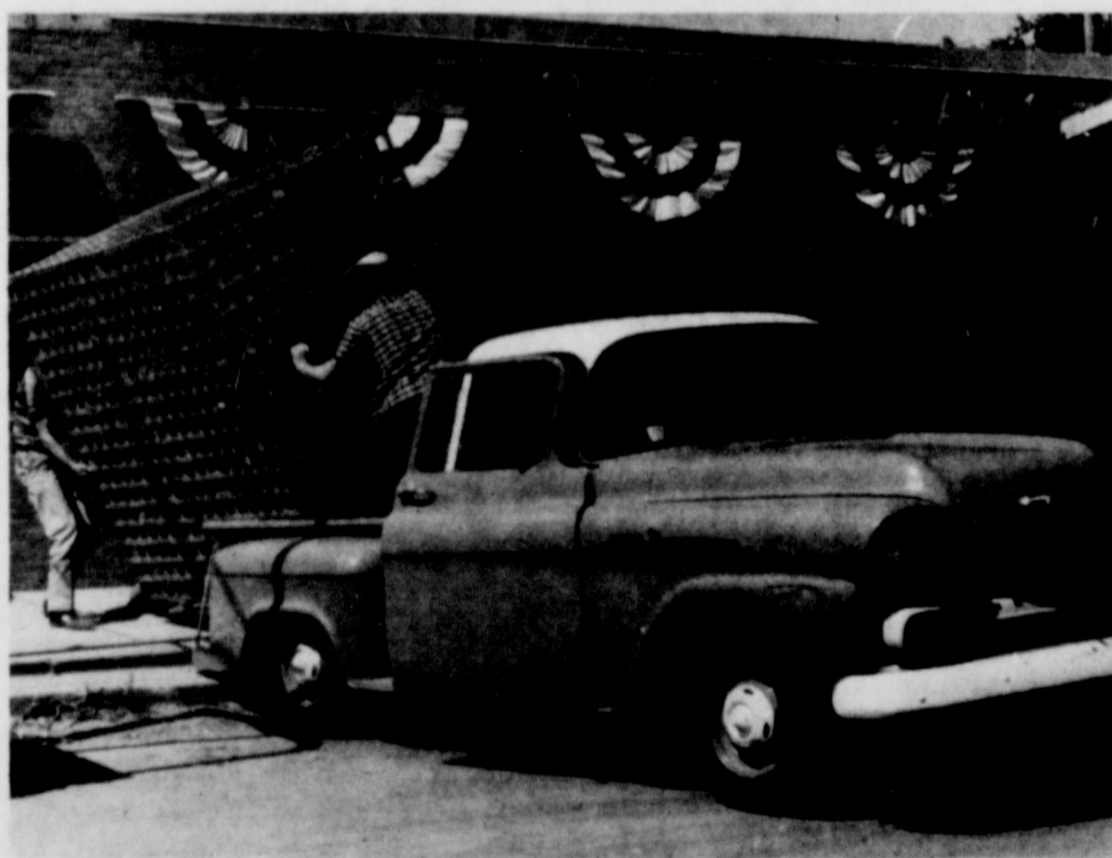

Friona Company Has Good Report

Higher prices for grain-fed cattle and increased feedyard occupancy when compared with the prior year helped boost Friona Industries, Inc. net income to \$878,000, or 56 cents per share, on revenues of \$20.6 million for its third fiscal year ended March 31, 1979.

In the same quarter of the previous fiscal year, the Company reported net income of \$594,000, or 38 cents per share, on revenues of \$15.7 million.

"The third quarter continued the trend of the first two quarters as all segments of our business achieved higher gross profits when compared to the same periods of the prior fiscal year," said Ron Davenport, president. "Total net income and revenues were also at record levels for the first nine months of our current fiscal year."

Net income of \$3.1 million, or \$2.00 per share, on revenues of \$72 million compared with net income of \$1.5 million, or 95 cents per share, on revenues of \$48.3 million in the first nine months of the prior fiscal year.

All per share earnings figures reflect the effect of a 5-for-4 stock split effected as a 25 per cent stock dividend with a record date of March 31, 1979, paid on April 13, 1979.

Company-owned cattle led all segments of business in revenues and gross profits during the nine months. Revenues of \$24.7 million were 48 per cent above those of the same period of last year while gross profit of \$3.3 million reflected a gain of 82 per cent. About 43,000 head of Company-owned cattle were marketed, an

increase of almost 15 per cent compared with the first three quarters of fiscal 1978.

Custom feeding during the first nine months accounted for \$22.3 million in revenues (up 64 per cent) and \$2.3 million in gross profit (up 75 per cent). Higher average feedyard occupancy—82 per cent versus 66 per cent—was the principal reason for the increases.

Sales of commercial feeds climbed 47 per cent to \$15.2 million as gross profit rose almost 89 per cent to \$1.5 million for the nine months. Efficiencies achieved because of more tonnage produced plus more cattle in area feed yards were the major contributing factors.

"Production and sales of range cubes were also better because livestock raisers are now more willing to supplement the feeding of range cattle due to increased feeder cattle prices," said Davenport.

The retail marketing of animal health supplies surged well ahead of the first nine months of fiscal 1978. Sales of \$7.4 million and gross profit of \$1.4 million were higher by 24 and 28 per cent, respectively.

Grain and other operations, including feed hauling and steel fabrication, also had significantly better gross profits than in the first three quarters of the prior fiscal year.

"There was a slight tightening of profit margins in the third quarter because of decreased availability of cattle for placement in feed yards and resultant price increases in feeder cattle," explained Davenport.

Farmer Owned Reserve Wheat Is Released

Wheat placed under loan in the farmer-owned reserve has been released for redemption. Farmers may sell their reserve wheat after repaying their CCC price support loans.

Release of the reserve wheat does NOT require farmers to redeem or sell their grain at this time.

The national average market price for wheat has reached \$3.31 per bushel. The price level at which wheat is released from the reserve is 140 per cent of the \$2.35 loan rate and this would be \$3.29 per bushel. More than 400 million bushels of wheat are in the reserve.

Farmers with wheat in the reserve receive storage payments annually in advance from the Department of Agriculture. Upon repayment of the loan, farmers can keep the storage payments earned through the date of repayment.

On June 30, the department will review the average price for wheat to

determine if the release authorization should remain in effect. If release continues, storage earnings will stop in those states where the price remains above the release level. This means that a farmer has until June 30, to redeem his wheat and make sure he loses no storage or pays no additional storage. Of course, the wheat may not be eligible for release after June 30.

Data used by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) in determining the release level include the five day average prices as reported by the Agricultural Marketing Service which show prices bid by buyers and a month end report of prices received by farmers as reported by the Economics, Statistics and Cooperative Services.

Wheat producers having wheat under loan in the farmer-owned reserve program should check with their ASCS office for details having to do with the redemption of their wheat.
