BEFORE THE SENATE ratifies the Salt II treaty, there are a few probing questions that it should ask. Hopefully, since we're nearing national election time, the senate will explore the matter from all angles.

Perhaps the biggest problem with the Salt II treaty is the verification angle.

Can we really trust the Russians? This question, even if put to an elementary school child, should bring a quick, and direct answer.

The Russians have broken or cheated on every treaty they ever signed, including Salt I. Their breaking of the Salt I pact was documented by former Defense Secretary Melvin Laird in the December issue of Reader's Digest.

The Soviets also have blatantly ignored the Kennedy-Khrushchev agreement of 1962, in which they promised not to supply Cuba with offensive weapons. According to one source, who has authored five books on nuclear strategy, the only rule the Soviets can be trusted to keep is Lenin's maxim: "Promises are like pie crusts—made to be broken."

The Carter administration is attempting to gloss over the problem of verification. They are attempting to play down the fact that the recent loss of our on-ground monitoring stations in Iran was a big blow to our country's efforts in checking on Russia's compliance in the nuclear weapons testing field.

Clouding the issue of verification is the fact that a news release by the New York Times points out that the Carter administration suppressed some facts connected with the conviction of two spies charged with selling U.S. secrets to Russia.

The newspaper story says that Russia found out all about our top secret projects, and the administration kept this hushed up, for fear the American people would not swallow the Salt II treaty.

Why is Carter so set on giving our nation, piece by piece, to the Soviets? First it was the Panama Canal that we handed over on a platter. Russia's boast that they will take over without a shot being fired seems to be slowly coming to pass.

According to experts, the new Salt II treaty does not prohibit the Soviets from building anything they need to control the world. They can keep all of their "heavy" equipment, by which they outstrip the U.S., ten to one at the present time.

Many people also have the mistaken notion that a nuclear war would be a "no win" situation, and that such a conflict would be "unthinkable." But our specialist on the nuclear situation indicates that Russia does not necessarily share this thought.

It has been estimated that in a nuclear exchange, between 140 and 150 million Americans could be killed, as opposed to 15 to 20 million Russians. The Soviets have proved that they will always sacrifice human life to Communist goals, so the thought of losing 15 million people to defeat America probably does not even make them flinch.

The experts also warn that Russia could use the Salt II treaty for blackmail. They could push the Arabs into another oil embargo, or another doubling of oil prices. Our failure to protect our sources in Iran left us open to such aggression, so that the immediate danger of Salt II, according to one source, is no gasoline at the pumps.

We have confidence that the senate will give the matter a good hearing. Salt II needs to be viewed in light of the Carter administration's overall record. In fact, we need to be asking, "Where are they taking us?"

Friona was a rest stop on Tuesday for a 17-year-old youth who's going after a new world's record.

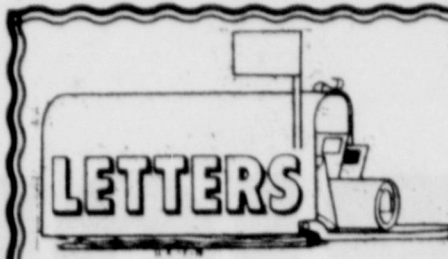

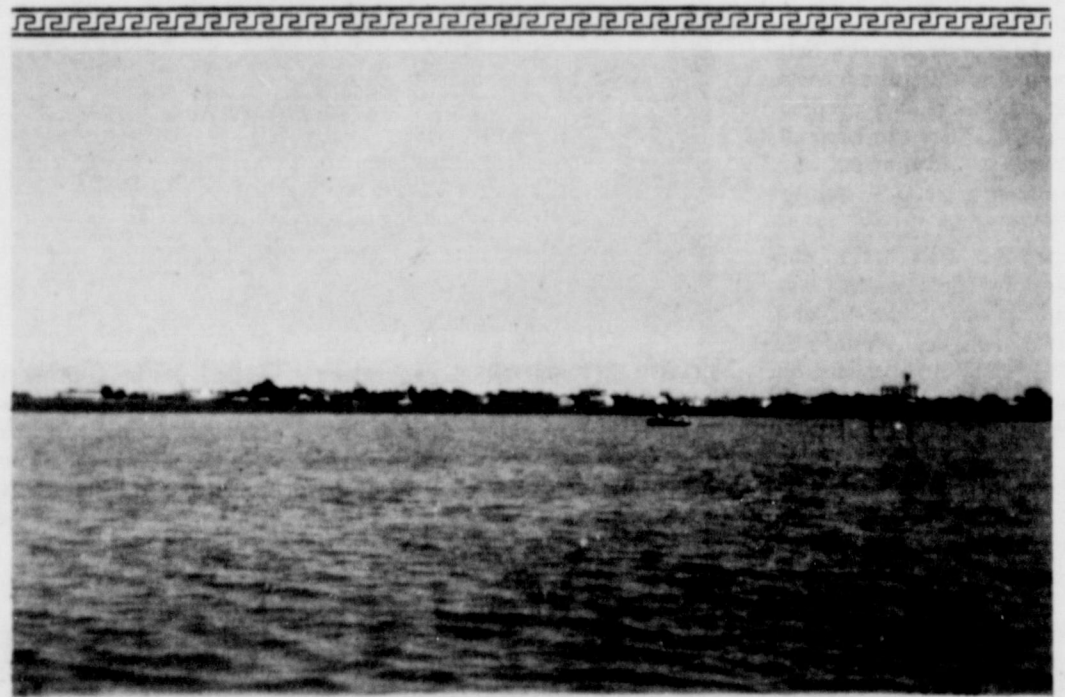

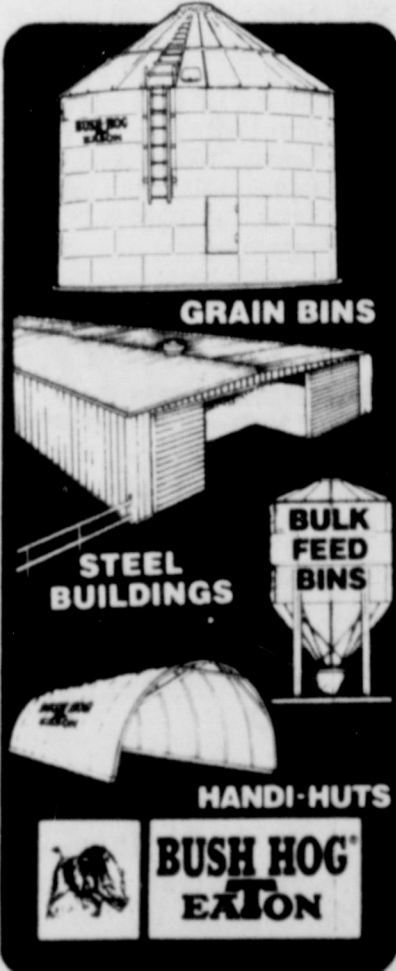
It's A Girl For Fryes





"You can't tell a book by its cover." Despite the popularity of this adage the publishers of "paperbacks" claim that the more lurid the better the sales. The truth is that some plain looking covers contain first class reading—don't be fooled!

A case in point is "Great Women Reporters" by John Jakes, a former newspaper man. Mr. Jakes has turned out 30 books and over 150 short stories. Like some other people I know—one taste of printer's ink and they are hooked.

He knows whereof he speaks and the ten women he writes about were really heroines in the battles for recognition in a male province. He makes a strong point for female intelligence without being a wild-eyed radical. Girls and young ladies will find this book inspiring.

"The Walls Came Tumbling Down" and the "Crystal Mouse" both by Babs Deal are worth a word or two.

The first is a fast moving, entertaining story about a group of women—all life-long friends—until something comes along to rock the boat. Good modern fiction.

The "Crystal Mouse" is an example of how an experienced author can build and hold suspense throughout an entire book.

A little weird for my taste, but, that's just one man's opinion.

Ladies, especially widows, will enjoy this book.
