Residents Oppose 30-Day Bird Season

THE RECENT EPISODE at Three Mile Island caused opponents of nuclear energy to pounce on the subject, like a cat on a mouse, virtually demanding an end to the use of nuclear power.

Never mind the fact that in more than 20 years of using nuclear energy, we have yet to have one single solitary death attributed to this field. This is quite a record, and one that no other industry can even begin to match.

Yet, the tremendous amount of publicity that the incident at Three Mile Island received, caused a big "scare" to be cast concerning nuclear energy, and the possibilities of radiation exposure posed by the presence of such power plants.

It has been said that the recent "leak" at the New Jersey plant caused those living near the complex very little in the way of radiation danger, although they may have been scared to death in the meantime.

Radiation absorption is measured by the "Rem," which is the biological effect produced by one roentgen of X-ray. Scientists measure low-level radiation in millirems (one thousandth of a rem).

These people living within a half mile of Three Mile Island, for example, received only an extra 83/millirems during the recent turmoil.

By comparison, a dental X-ray of your entire mouth would give you 910/millirems on your absorption chart. A barium enema would give you 8,000 millirems.

We are finding out that where low-level radiation is concerned, there is virtually no escaping it in our modern world. Many people are exposed to radiation on their jobs, and you can also be exposed by such simple acts as walking into a building made of granite.

In fact, a recent test made at the U.S. Senate subcommittee hearing room showed higher levels of radiation from that building than anything produced near Three Mile Island at the height of its recent excitement. But no one has suggested that we close down the Senate.

It is just that the opponents of nuclear energy have jumped on the subject, and would have us close every such power plant in the nation, without even so much as a hearing. Perhaps a more sensible approach would be in order.

Experts on the subject say that low-level doses of radiation do not present any significant threat of cancer or genetic malformation. In fact, one specialist on the subject, Dr. Edward Radford, chairman of the National Academy of Science, says: "The risks are very small. There is a risk, but it's not the end of the world."

This should be a comforting thought to the people who live in the vicinity of Three Mile Island, and it also should make the opponents of nuclear energy feel a little foolish, but we doubt that it does.

But experts do warn that one of the problems with radiation dangers is that when radium begins to decay, it gives off radon gas, one of the most serious low-level radiation threats.

There may be a problem with "radioactive sludge," the nuclear waste that has been piling up for the past 20 years. It is full of all kinds of deadly poisons that could remain dangerous for 25,000 years, the experts say.

And then there are the homeowners in Colorado, whose homes are built with material from a government uranium mill which was exposing them to unacceptable levels of radon gas.

In the case of the Colorado homeowners, the government paid to have the necessary changes made, and the corrective measures can cost up to \$5,500 per house.

Residents of Parmer County are learning, much to their dismay, that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has declared a 30-day season for pheasant hunting for 1979.

Spokesmen for the Parmer County Game Management Assn. expressed their opposition to the plan, stating that it "Would ruin the pheasant as a game bird in this area."

"They put in this extended season with no consideration of the residents of this area at all. I would bet that 99 per cent of the residents of Parmer County are opposed to a 30-day season," stated Jack Patterson, county commissioner and longtime game specialist.

The Parks and Wildlife Dept. apparently held a hearing on the proposed change earlier this year at Farwell, but the hearing was not advertised locally, and virtually no one knew about the hearing or the

proposal to lengthen the season until it was too late.

At a meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners this past Tuesday, the organization drafted a letter, signed by every county commissioner, opposing the change. The letter was sent to the Parks & Wildlife Department.

"I can't see why they had the meeting here in our area, apparently wanting local opinion, and then did not sufficiently advertise the hearing," Patterson said. "This will cause a lot of bad feelings between the farmers and hunters. Farmers just don't want to put up with a 30-day hunting season," he continued.

The local pheasant population was started back in 1962-63 when the area was stocked with pheasant hens and cocks. After a few years, a weekend hunting season was held, and later a

nine-day season, spanning two weekends, was instigated.

Under Parks & Wildlife influence, the season was stretched from nine days to 15 three years ago, making the season span three weekends in December.

"We tolerated the 15-day season, but this will just ruin the situation. As much as I like to hunt, I would almost rather drop the thing entirely as to have a 30-day hunting season every year," Patterson continued.

Local officials urge residents to contact Senator Bob Price and Representative Bill Clayton urging them to use their influence in reversing the decision by the Wildlife Department.

Maize Days Dates Set

The dates for Friona's 1979 Maize Days celebration was set officially as September 4-8 at the last meeting of the board of directors of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

The dates for the annual civic affair are set to coincide with the schedule for the company which furnishes rides in the park during the event.

The date for the 1980 Chamber banquet was also announced. The banquet will be held on Friday, January 26.

The next board meeting will be on Tuesday, June 12 at Carl's Parmer House Restaurant. Chamber members are urged to attend, and bring their ideas and suggestions.

Gun Club To Sponsor Trap Shoot

The Friona Gun Club will sponsor a Merchandise Shoot on Saturday and Sunday, June 2-3. Entry fees will be \$2.00 and everyone is invited to attend.

The shooting range is located one mile east of Friona, on Highway 60.

The shoot will start at 8 p.m. each day.

"Resolved that the Commissioners Court of Parmer County express its deep appreciation to those who served our country during the Vietnam Conflict.

"Understanding the necessity to stand by our county in times of need and honoring those who did so in the Vietnam Era;

"It is further resolved that all organizations be requested to recognize those members who served in the Vietnam Conflict; and, that all individuals of Parmer County be requested to call one or more Vietnam Era veteran and express appreciation to them for their service to our country.

This Court honors and respects the Vietnam Veteran, and requests all citizens of Parmer County give special recognition to them during this week.

Weather Turns Cold; Hail Hits Lazbuddie Area

The Friona area has had a week of unseasonably cool, wet weather, with some damage recorded Memorial Day evening from a hailstorm which slashed the southeastern part of the area.

With temperatures in the 50s and 60s most of the week, agriculture observers were wishing for warmer weather, which the plants need for a good start.

Some portions of the area received beneficial moisture during the week. Another system which came in on Wednesday triggered showers during the early morning hours on Thursday, and left the area dripping to a slow drizzle all day Thursday.

But the Lazbuddie area counted substantial damage from the Monday night storm, which wiped out young cotton and corn crops, and also ruined ready to harvest wheat and barley.

Bobby Broyles, who farms near

Lazbuddie, said his cotton was off to a good start, but was completely destroyed by the late-afternoon hail storm, which stacked up hail several inches deep in lister ridges and barrow ditches.

A neighbor of Broyles' Raymond McGeehee, also reported considerable hail damage, and it was thought that the hail affected a large percentage of the farmers in the southeastern part of the county.

The city of Friona received only a sprinkle from the cloud, but just three miles southeast, the Terry Copley residence measured two inches of rain in a short time on Monday.

The Lazbuddie area received another rain on Thursday, when most farmers in that vicinity were needing open weather so they might replant their crops.

'Phone Company Hits Milestone

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has over 1.5 million telephones in service, according to O.D. Hearn, Brownfield division manager.

General installed its one-millionth telephone in May 1973 at Texas A&M University. The one million milestone was reached after almost 47 years of operation, the company being incorporated in June 1926.

However, the trip to the next million appears to be much shorter as it has taken less than six years to install another half a million, and projections on company growth indicate the 2nd millionth telephone will be installed by late 1982.

General Telephone serves over 400 exchanges made up of over 990 communities with over 2.2 million in population in 59,000 square miles of area in Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 8, 1934

Mrs. A.H. Boatman was appointed to membership on the Texas Centennial Advisory Board as one of four members from Parmer County, according to a letter Mrs. Boatman received from Will H. Mayes, temporary secretary of the Texas Centennial Commission.

40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 9, 1939

The City of Friona is soon to have a new fire truck, which is now being built and nearing completion in the work shops of Reeve Chevrolet Company, with Charles Bainum, one of the firemen, doing and supervising the work of building.

35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 9, 1944

On Saturday afternoon, June 10, Friona will be featured on a historical broadcast over station KGNC by Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo.

Some time Monday afternoon, Mrs. Pearl Kinsley was uninjured when her car overturned while enroute to Friona. Mrs. Kinsley sustained only a few minor bruises, but the car was considerably damaged.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 10, 1949

On Monday of last week, Day Brothers, house movers of Hereford, arrived in Friona and began preparations for moving the home of Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, from its old location to make room for the proposed new auditorium to be built on the ground it formerly occupied.

The city has begun making street markers for Friona, a badly needed commodity to assist strangers in finding addresses. The Lions Club set up 64 of the markers on Wednesday, and still have 52 to place on the corners.

Thirty-four cars of a Santa Fe freight train were derailed Sunday

at the east switch at Summerfield. The cars were filled with perishable goods. Five or six carloads of fruit were taken to Hereford to reload on other cars.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 4, 1959

W.O. (Bill) Wright, 39, drowned sometime Friday night following an unexplained accident at Lake Conchas in New Mexico.

Hail cut a destructive swath through Parmer County, in the shape of a new moon from Rhea to east of Hub. Hail was stacked up a foot deep next to buildings on some farms following the storm.

15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 4, 1964

Peggy McNair, who is the reigning "Miss Wool of Texas," paid a visit to the Otho Whitefield sheep ranch this week. Whitefield is an official in both the Columbia Sheep Breeders of America and the Texas Columbia Breeders.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 5, 1969

Joe Bob Mann, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mann of Friona, was aboard the USS Frank E. Evans when it was cut in half by an Australian aircraft carrier in a pre-dawn collision early Tuesday morning.

Airman Kirk Matlock, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E.D. Matlock of Friona, is in a hospital in Japan after suffering a hand wound while in Vietnam, it was reported after the Matlocks talked with Kirk by telephone this week.

The facetious use of the word "ladies" is Mr. Drago's gentlemanly attempt to soften the stroke of doom. This writer's first impression--aside from historical appreciation--was that here again is a worthwhile record but one not to be read by young folks. Then I saw "Scared Straight." This book falls into the category of shock treatment. Risque subject, yes, but the warning is very plain; a life spent in ignoring moral standards is a downhill trip on greased skids. There is no glamour to be found in disease, poverty or inhuman treatment not to mention loneliness and loss of self-respect.

Mr. Drago does an excellent job of honest description without resorting to any semblance of bad language. Neither does he preach nor moralize, he simply tells it like it was.

Formby Named "Man Of Year"

The staff of Texas Tech University's yearbook, "La Ventana," has announced that Regent Clint Formby of Hereford had been named its "Man of the Year" for 1979. His picture will be on the cover of the "Texas Business Magazine" section of the yearbook.

Formby was presented the original art work of the cover at a meeting of the Texas Tech Board of Regents in regular session Friday, May 11. Presentation of the framed art work was made by co-editors Beverly Jones of Dallas and Elizabeth Edwin of El Paso.

Formby is the 21st person to receive the coveted honor bestowed by "La Ventana" and the first regent and non-member of the university faculty or staff to receive the recognition.

Campus student organizations nominate men or women for the distinction, and the honoree is selected by the yearbook staff of approximately 20 persons.

Selection is based on "outstanding contributions to Texas Tech and its students" and the honor is bestowed on a "person who has had unusually good relations with students." Formby was nominated by the Mass Communications Student Advisory Committee.

Serving his second six-year term as a regent, Formby is a past board chairman. He is a 1949 graduate of

the university with a major in government and minor in speech-journalism.

He is partner and managing director of radio stations KPAN-AM and-FM, Hereford; KLVY, Levelland; KTEM-AM and KPLE-FM, Temple; and KTBB, Tyler.

He is a member of the boards of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, National Associated Press and National Broadcast Education Association.

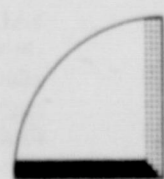

Around The Firehouse

Friona firemen were called out at 5 a.m. on Tuesday, May 29. The Budget Motel had a minor fire as the neon light had shorted and caught the roof overhang on fire. The fire was extinguished quickly with only minor damage.

The Fire Department personnel are busy working on the training field. The field is located just east of the City Barn on Eighth Street. This field will be used to train all firemen. The field will consist of a smoke house, a tower, a pit fire, a tank for drafting water and simulated butane fires when completed. The smoke house will be used to train firemen in the proper procedure of air packs and proper breathing techniques.

The smoke eating fireman is a thing of the past as a house fire today could contain several hundred toxic chemicals. The tower will be used to train in the correct use of ladders and the steps to be followed for a rescue from a two or three story building. The oil pit fire will give valuable training in case of an oil spill or tanker fire. The tank for drafting water is very valuable as this would be very likely at a fire in the country where the only water could very well be an irrigation ditch. Several butane tanks have been donated for the use of a simulated butane tank fire.

The new van is complete other than the "Jaws of Life." The department is proud of the van and if anyone would like to inspect it, just drop by the fire station. As the saying goes 'If you don't have a Jaws of Life-get one.' Deposit any amount in the firemen's special fund at Friona State Bank.

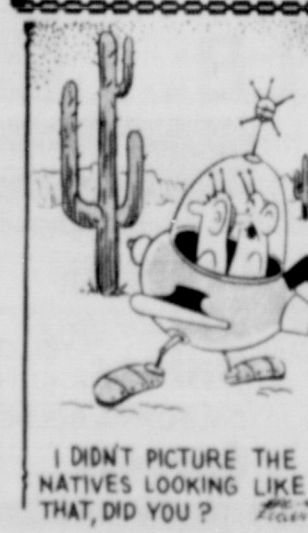

The total cost has been \$182,897. The work this year was a state project and the bid was \$46,650. The rest of the construction was financed through special gifts to the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation--including the idea for and gift of the entrance by the A.A. Bushes of Amarillo, and through funds from the "TEXAS" ticket sales.

The audience will be able to see the difference in the facilities when "TEXAS" has the Gala Opening on June 20, 1979. As usual the show will open at 8:30 p.m. The barbecue service will start at 6:30, and the season will run through August 25,

Bond Sales Released

March sales of Series E&H United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County were reported today by County Bond Chairman Charles E. Allen to be \$20,078. Sales for the three month period totaled \$30,897 for 36 percent of the 1979 sales goal of \$85,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$22,972,794, while sales for the first three months of 1979 totaled \$68,903,444.

"We worked primarily from original recordings arranging all the songs and cast members listened to tapes of the originals," said Hartin, vocalist and electric guitarist in the show. Hartin also is director of a two-year program in country and bluegrass music at SPC. "We are trying to come as close as we can to the original sound."

"We think every artist we recognize in the show has made a definite impact on the business," said Hartin, who also has been a professional guitarist for a number of years.

"Golden Years," along with the music has a story to tell.

"There's a story developing in the fact that country music has left the hills and is being recognized in metropolitan areas," said Hartin.

"Certain things were happening in

Kentucky with the bluegrass in the 30's and 40's; at the same time a completely different type of country music was followed in Texas by the Carter Family, who did a lot of recording and broadcasting down at Del Rio. They had a big 50,000 watt station that was heard all over the country," he added.

The show goes on to recognize people who stuck with country music at a difficult time.

"People who really deserve some recognition for their contributions are artists who stayed with country music in the 40's and 50's," said Hartin, "especially in the mid-50's when Presley and Ricky Vinson and these guys were getting popular. The country music thing, record sales just almost died. And guys like Ernest Tubb, Hank Snow and Roy Acuff kept the Grand Ole Opry movement alive...They were doing shows in schoolhouses, kind of keeping the interest alive," he said.

In the 60's, musicians like Johnny Cash and Merle Haggard made their play for fame. "They all had a completely unique style and were tremendously successful," said Hartin.

Willie Nelson and Waylon Jennings symbolize the outlaw movement, moving away from Nashville and bringing the music back to where it started, in Texas," he noted.

Golden Years will feature faculty and students from SPC's country and bluegrass music program and students from the speech and drama
