Full De-Segregation Of Schools Scheduled

Muleshoe Independent School district will be completely de-segregated at the start of the 1966-67 school year, one year earlier than had originally been planned, it was announced Friday following a meeting of the board of trustees.

This means both pupils and teachers will be de-segregated at the start of schools Sept. 1, 1966, and Negro teachers will be absorbed into the system.

Originally the board had submitted a plan to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington for complete integration by the start of school in September, 1967. However, the plan was rejected by the Washington office, the U. S. Commissioner of Education pointing out that less than 5 percent of the total enrollment are Negroes and thus de-segregation should be completed sooner.

An amended petition was filed with the department during the summer months, offering to step up the desegregation program by one year. That plan was accepted.

The school board Friday, in turn, accepted the new proposal.

Muleshoe schools have been in the process of desegregating since 1963 when grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 were desegregated. The following year, grade 8 was de-segregated, and at the start of this year, grades 1, 6 and 7 are to be integrated. Under the new plan, grades 2, 3, 4 and 5 will be desegregated Sept. 1 next year.

Five points were outlined in the amended plan: No. 1 dealt with total desegregation outlined above. Point 2 said: "There will be no discrimination based upon race, color or national origin with respect to services, facilities, activities and programs sponsored by or affiliated with the schools of Muleshoe Independent School District."

Point 3: "No teachers, principal or other school personnel will be dismissed or demoted on the basis of race, color or national origin as a result of de-segregation of the schools..."

Point 4: "No student residing in the Muleshoe Independent School District will be furnished either tuition or transportation to a school in any other district."

Point 5: "When the Negro teachers are absorbed into the faculty, they will be assigned to the school without regard to race, color or national origin of their students."

The letter from Commissioner Frances Keppel, accepted the revised proposal, which read as follows:

"The plan submitted for the Muleshoe Independent school district for the desegregation of its school system in compliance with Title IV of the Civil Rights act of 1964 has been reviewed by this office. On the basis of our review of the plan, particularly of the provisions made for the school year 1965-66, I have determined that the plan is adequate to accomplish the purposes of the act and the regulation of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare."

"The plan therefore provides a basis for the approval of application and for payment of federal financial assistance at this time."

Muleshoe Economic Group Sets Meeting

Chief Of State Industrial Commission To Speak Here

Sponsors of Muleshoe Economic Development Group, an organization to bolster industrial expansion here, is bringing Texas' most outstanding industrial leader to Muleshoe for a public meeting Sept. 8, it was announced Saturday by Dr. Charles G. Lewis who heads the local group.

He is Harry Clark, Austin, Executive Director of the Texas Industrial Commission. "We are just extremely fortunate to secure a man of such prominence in the industrial field to conduct our first meeting here," Dr. Lewis summed up.

Place and time for the meeting are to be announced this week, but in all probability it will be in the form of a dinner.

Muleshoe Economic Development Group, still in the embryo stage, is looking for means to "channel new dollars into the community." The program is expected to follow the general pattern used successfully in Dallas, "The 100 Day" plan. A steering committee is to be named at the Sept. 8 meeting and initial plans launched for the program. A name also is to be chosen with "Muleshoe Un-

limited, Inc." as one of the suggested names.

While the Muleshoe group will seek new industries, it also will seek to expand its present industries and try to interest even small firms to consider Muleshoe as a location, it was explained.

Clark has had more than 25 years' experience in industrial development work and leads a program which has already received national recognition in the six years of its existence.

In 1963, the Texas Industrial Commissions Advertising program, which Clark heads, won top honors for the nation. The program sought to reach industrialists considering plant expansion or relocation.

Then in 1964, Texas was second among all states in number of new industries, exceeded only by New York, Lewis pointed out.

Clark has worked for railroads, utilities, the Regional Development Authority, and top consulting firms on plant locations in the nation.

"Few men in the nation know more about economic and industrial development than does Harry Clark," Dr. Lewis concluded. "We hope everyone who can will attend the meeting and learn new ways for expanding Muleshoe's economy."

"We don't know exactly what route the project will take," summed up the spokesman for the group, "but we do know that we have great possibilities here and we are eager to develop our possibilities to the fullest."

To-4 Closing Of Ave. G At High School Is Ordered

Closing of Ave. G between Fifth and Third streets during school hours was announced Friday after the school board and city council had given unanimous approval to the plan.

The two blocks will be closed each morning at 8 o'clock and opened again each afternoon at 4 o'clock — after school buses have picked up their loads.

The move is being made as a safety factor, Superintendent Neal Dillman explained.

"The area being closed lies between junior and senior high school where 1150 pupils are enrolled," Dillman said. "For years we have been worried about the safety of pupils who must cross the street. We believe that by closing the double-block area between the two schools we will eliminate the crossing hazard."

The superintendent said several groups must cross the street each day. Band, choir and physical education pupils all cross Ave. G from junior high to senior high for class sessions.

Junior high pupils also cross for assemblies, and the cafeteria at senior high serves both schools.

Pupils who park their automobiles on the senior high parking lot will still be permitted to do so before 8 o'clock, the superintendent explained. Pupils are not allowed to take their cars off the parking lot until the end of the school day except students who are enrolled in distributive education and

Lunch Speaker To Tell Teachers Of Soviet Tour

One of the nation's top school consultants, Dr. Floyd Dewey Golden, Amarillo, will be principal speaker next Tuesday noon when Muleshoe business and professional men entertain Muleshoe teachers at an appreciation luncheon. Place for the luncheon has not been determined; if installation of new equipment in the new senior-junior cafeteria is completed in time, the luncheon will be held there. Otherwise it will be held in Richland Hills cafeteria.

Dr. Golden, one-time superintendent of Friona schools, is educational consultant to Rittenberry & Rittenberry and associates, an architectural firm in Amarillo. He was one of 30 educational administrators to tour the Soviet Union a few years ago to study their educational system, and part of his address is expected to be devoted to his impressions of the Russian school system.

In addition to the Friona post, Dr. Golden also has served as superintendent of Friona, White Deer, Miami and Portales systems.

United Fund Board To Make Drive Plans

Full board of the Muleshoe Area United Fund will meet tomorrow night in Muleshoe State Bank community room to:

1. Approve the 1965 budget.
2. Lay preliminary plans for the 1965 campaign.

In the absence of the president, Marie White, the meeting will be conducted by Gil Lamb who is also 1965 campaign director, it was announced Saturday.

The board is expected to approve the budget drawing Aug. 19 and approved by the budget and admissions committee headed by Robert Hooten. That group, after several sessions held in August, set the overall budget at \$13,350, an increase of \$1350 over last year's budget.

The campaign for the past two years has been conducted during the third week in October, a whirlwind campaign that has been successful. It is expected this year's drive also will be staged at that time. This coincides with the national U.F. publicity program.

Nine agencies are to receive money from the United Fund this year if the full board approves the B&A committee's recommendations. The agencies are to receive \$11,775 the balance going for campaign expenses.

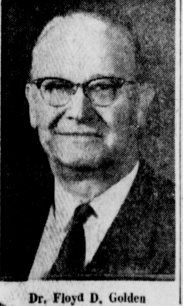
'Lots Of Kids, None To Spare'

Schools Select Truant Officers

Muleshoe schools have announced the hiring of two truant officers for the new school year. Named to the posts were Bobby Henderson, deputy sheriff, and Harold White, city patrolman.

Henderson will take care of rural areas and White will be in charge of truanties in the city area.

The officers, school officials said Friday, "have been instructed to give one warning to the parent and the students; then if they do not enroll in school and attend regularly, they will be filed on in county court."

All youngsters between the ages of 6 and 17 as of Sept. 1, 1965, are required by state law to attend school regularly, a minimum of 165 days each school year. The compulsory attendance age was raised from 16 years to 17 years by recent legislation.

The schools also pointed to rules governing excuses for absences. Listed as legitimate excuses were personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, severe storm, or "for unusual cause acceptable to the school."

All excuses must be signed by the parent or guardian,

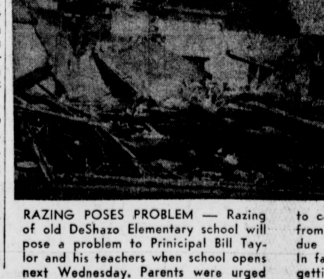

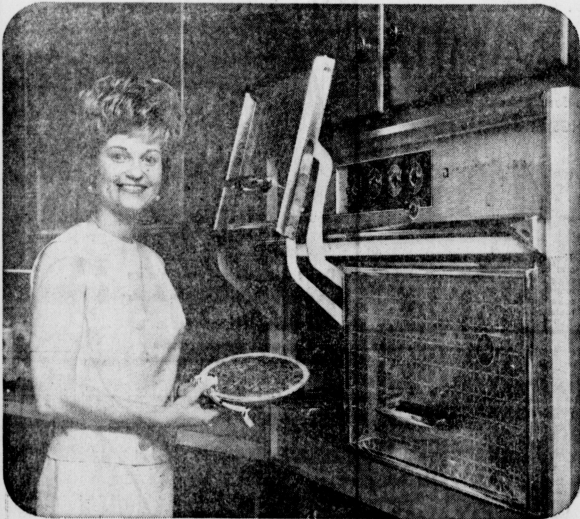

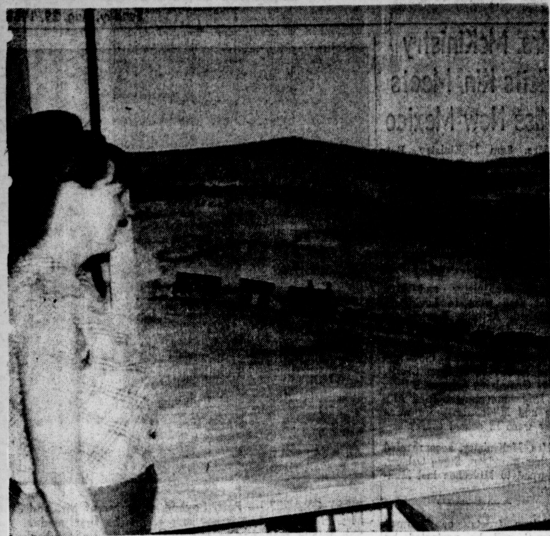

(Continued From Page One) The matter of desegregation has been under study here ever since the 1964 act was passed, and several plans were drawn before an agreement was reached. Several telephone calls were made to Washington in an effort to find a plan acceptable to the Department.

Approval of desegregation on a basis acceptable to the commissioner of education is essential if the school is to receive federal education funds, it was explained. All federal funds are cancelled if a school fails to comply with the federal department's rulings.

'Wetter' Season Aids Crop Prospects; Outlook Good

Crops Saturday were nearing the "made" stage and farmers were breathing a sigh of relief as virtually all threat of a repetition of 1964's production-cutting drought scampered into the blue.

All summer they have been looking at rain measurements and comparing them with last year when the badly needed precipitation failed to show. As a result, practically all sections of the county felt a pinch in the place where it hurt most—the pocket-book.

But this year, as August neared an end, the rain god had dumped 2.37 inches more rain here than during the first eight months of last year. At this same time last year, 7.88 inches of moisture had fallen, while this year the amount measured 10.25, and that 2 1/2-inch-plus boost meant the difference between good crops and mediocre crops.

Of course last year's rains failed to come at a time when they were most needed, none at all falling in April and less than an inch in May. June was "wet" by comparison, totaling

3.10 inches, but July saw only .73 inch in the rain gauge. While the entire area has not been blanketed by moisture, nevertheless the southern part of the county — the dryland area — has had more moisture than usual, and as of Saturday, most farmers in that part of the county were viewing their prospects with optimism.

Meantime, tomato harvest is under way, and cucumbers are nearing the end of their season. The elevators were making ready for their first arrivals of grain sorghum, and one operator here said he expected "to see the first load arrive this week." "I believe it's going to be a good year for grain." The pest, the midge which has caused havoc in some sections of West Texas for several years, has done little if any damage to grain sorghum in this area.

Cotton is making good progress and a number of farmers reported well-formed bolls. As with grain sorghum, insect damage to cotton has been light. In irrigated sections,

most farmers had stopped irrigating their cotton. "Now all we gotta do," said one farmer, "is coast to harvest time."

The wettest year on record at Weatherman R. J. Klump's official measuring station was 1941 when 43.02 inches were recorded with May setting an all-time record for this area, 11.96 inches.

Driest year ever reported here was in 1954 when only 6.75 inches were recorded. "Even the rain gauge almost dried up and blew away that year," chuckled the veteran weather reader.

Judge Klump has been keeping the weather reports here since 1930 when 16.57 inches were recorded.

With prospects for better crops, farmers still had one big worry — frost. If the frost holds off until its customary late October date, "it should be in the bag," one farm expert here said Saturday.
