More Berrigan Case Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government today announced a new indictment in the alleged plot to kidnap presidential adviser Henry Kissinger. It added two defendants to the six originally charged last January and alleged additional conspiracies to damage draft files in five U.S. cities.


Named as additional defendants in what has come to be known as the Berrigan case were Mary Cain Scoblick, a former nun and the wife of the original defendants; and John Theodore Glick, 21, an inmate of the Federal Correctional Institution at Ashland, Ky.

The Justice Department said the indictment is returned by a federal grand jury in Harrisburg, Pa. It said the defendants conspired to commit "a series of acts of antiwar vandalism leading up to the kidnaping of presidential adviser Henry Kissinger and the blowing up of the underground heating systems of federal buildings in the nation's capital.

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) -An 18-year old college freshman who has been building his own computer as a hobby has been booked for investigation of murdering three teen-aged girls in savage knife attacks.

Karl F. Wernewas arrested here Thursday morning at his rooming house. After a day of questioning by sheriff's detectives, including visits to the scenes of the killings, he was booked for investigation of the three murders.

The victims were Deborah Furlong, 14, and Kathy Snoozy, 15, found stabbed to death in a picnic area near here on Aug. 3, 1969, and Kathy Bilek, 18, found dead April 11 of the same type of multiple stab wounds in Villa Montalvo County Park. Officers said none of the three.

MARCHERS TO HALT GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON (AP) - While hinting that release of American prisoners might hasten complete U.S. pullout from Vietnam, President Nixon says he and others in government will not be intimidated by demonstrators' cries of "withdraw now."

Holding his first television-radio news conference in eight weeks, Nixon argued anew Thursday night that his gradual withdrawal policy will prove wisest in the long run.

But he did not dismiss the multiple antiwar protests that have become a daily fact of life here: He said:



LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - A final decree has been signed ending the 14-year marriage of former Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller and Jeanette Edris Rockefeller.

The suit, filed March 26 by Mrs. Rockefeller, was uncontested. Grounds were general indignities: Chancellor John T. Jernigan signed the decree Thursday.

HONOLULU (AP) - Jorgy the ostrich cut a fine figure as a strutting male bird in the Honolulu zoo until it laid an egg.

"We couldn't have been more surprised," zoo director Jack Throp said Thursday.

Throp said Jorgy started his life at the zoo as the female of a pair, but six years ago, at the age of three, turned into what Throp described as "a quasi-male."

"It's a thing which happens to some birds." he said.

Green Light For Amtrak

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal judge refused today to delay the start of America's new Amtrak network of railway passenger trains.

The new system is due to go into effect at midnight tonight.

U. S. District Judge Howard F. Corcoran said so far as he was aware "there is no indication in the legislative history that Congress intended' the secretary of labor's certification of the Rail Passenger Service Act to be reviewable by the court on its merits.

The railroad unions had sought to block the start of Amtrak on grounds that Secretary of Labor James D. Hodgson's certification violated the act in permitting unfair rules for workers affected by the discontinuance of trains not in Amtrak.

Judge Corcoran said in another case before him in the matter that he "feels" that the contracts for discontinuing trains not in Amtrak are valid. Thus he rejected a plea by unions and other citizen groups that the 30-day notice requirement before discontinuance had not been met.

The ace of hearts was played at trick one and a small heart was ruffed with the ace of spades. The king of snades was cashed on which West discarded a club. 



New Terms For Foreign Trade

It's time in Washington to take up the option to extend foreign aid another year and the President is plugging for it. The case for extension will face critical examination, as it should, and there's a new element involved

Treasury Secretary John B. Connally declared last week that this country should set new terms for extending an economic and military "umbrella" over much of the rest of the world. He spoke specifically of our country's absorbing a trade beating by allowing violations of tariff treaties and by accepting unfavorable trade restrictions against ourselves.

In foreign trade as in all foreign affairs, the national interest ought to be clearly defined. Foreign trade ought to be mutually advantageous among partners. We ought to trade fairly and competitively where it is in our national interest to do so.

Our national interest is not necessarily selfish, either. Indeed, it cannot be so and have trade continue. Our national interest may be no more than our willingness to help another country

WASHINGTON - For anyone who has to pay big prices for little pills it is no laughing matter. Yet, in the behind-the-scenes legal maneuvering in the merger of two of the nation's largest drug companies there is a certain grim humor.

The Warner-Lambert Co. moved six months ago to acquire Parke, Davis & Co. This might have seemed merely another instance of the big fish swallowing the smaller fish, as has happened with the epidemic of mergers and conglomerates. But a special circumstance gave this corporate merger involving close to \$2 billion in annual sales a very special character.

WARNER-LAMBERT is controlled by Elmer Bobst, one of President Nixon's closest friends. The President's daughters, Tricia and Julie, call him Uncle Elmer. More important is the fact that Warner-Lambert was one of the biggest accounts in the law firm Mr. Nixon organized when he came to New York after his defeat for the California governorship in 1962.

The Assistant Attorney General for Anti-trust, Richard W. McLaren, was eager to act when he learned of the proposed merger. He believed it would reduce competition in up to 52 product lines, many in the prescription field. McLaren recommended action to enjoin the merger before it could take place.

Before he took over direction of the Nixon Presidential campaign in 1968 Mitchell had been a partner in the Nixon law firm.



But Deputy Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst stepped in for him. He overruled the McLaren recommendation. It was reported at the time that McLaren threatened to resign unless the matter was referred to the Federal Trade Commission for action there. While this was an unusual step, it was finally taken.

IN THE intervening months repeated pressure has been applied, although no one at the FTC will admit it on the record, to have the whole matter dropped. After a delay of nearly six months the commission filed suit to compel Warner-Lambert to undo the merger with Parke, Davis.

there is a 30-day interval in which the company can move to negotiate a settlement. This would presumably involve untangling all the steps taken thus far to join the operations of the two companies.

THE TRADE commission charged that Warner-Lambert's acquisition of Parke, Davis "at one stroke raised the former's rank above all American drug manufacturers serving the hospitals-drug stores market from twelfth to third place." Concentration in this field, a \$4.7 billion annual market, went from 40 to 42 per cent as a result of the merger. While this may seem a slight increase in what was already a heavy concentration, the FTC charged the merge would eliminate Parke, Davis as an independent competitor. 



AND WITH good reason - although no President can escape the knowledge that the buck stops with him. Today's troubles can be directly traced to the administration's decision to demand both lower-court and Supreme Court approval of its ban on the encampment and, having got it, hastily concluding that it was all a mistake, fellows.

Obviously, the Nixon administration acted without careful and prudent forethought in demanding the ban on veterans' bedrolls. Incredibly, no one seemed to realize that the vets almost surely would defy the prohibition, leaving the administration a choice between herding into paddy wagons men who had fought for their country or beating an ignominious retreat.

TO THE outraged dismay of U.S. District Court Judge George L. Hart Jr., the Justice Department predictably requested that Hart lift the ban. Hart did so. He also lambasted the Nixon administration for "degrading" the judiciary by taking the case all the way to the Supreme Court and then refusing to enforce the law.

I find the administration's explanation for its goof preposterous. Richard Nixon's government said the ban on the veterans' campout was decreed because it didn't want to set





Attacks On The U.S. David Lawrence



IT IS DURING next week, however, when the crisis will come, as there have been threats to block traffic in the District of Columbia and close down the Pentagon and other government buildings by mass sit-ins. Such interruption of government services can hardly be tolerated by federal authorities. Already some National Guard troops have been ordered into camp Sunday to be available if an emergency arises.

CLEARLY THERE is a responsibility on the government here to preserve order. The majority of the people of the United States would not look with favor on indifference to acts of violence or disturbances which really do interfere with the operations of the governmental departments. The administration is well aware that there is a limit to "demonstrations" and that, when the time comes, it will have to arrest all those who create disorder and put them in jail with bonds of a sizable amount.

IT IS CLEAR that the "demonstrations" have been well organized and that various persons have worked toegther to plan exactly what will be done to intimidate the federal authorities. Law-enforcement agencies obviously haven't been able to uncover the plots and conspiracies that



THE MAJORITY of the American people have reached a point where they will wish to see stern measures applied against such "demonstrations" for two reasons: First, to let the North Vietnamese know that the United States government is not going to be coerced into surrendering, and second, that this country is determined that the Vietnam war must be ended on a basis that will ensure the peace of Southeast Asia, For otherwise a new conflict might arise which could embrace several countries in Asia and inevitably entangle the United States in a major war.
