HAVE YOU EVER THOUGHT about the percentage of your daily conversation which is made up of "sayings," or expressions, many of which originated right here in the Panhandle-Plains region?

A columnist we know, Danny Andrews of the Plainview Daily Herald, recently told of the efforts of some residents of the Plainview area to compile a list of these sayings, to record them for posterity.

The group compiled a list of over 800 such expressions, and in a recent column, Andrews gave a sample of the results:

Taken alphabetically, a random sample includes: all in the same boat, as easy as fallin' off a log, barking up the wrong tree, beats anything I ever saw, bleeding like a stuck hog, blind as a bat, breathing down somebody's neck, butter you up, called on the carpet, can't cut the mustard, can't win for losing, catch my drift, clean as a whistle, cool as a cucumber, crazy as a bed bug.

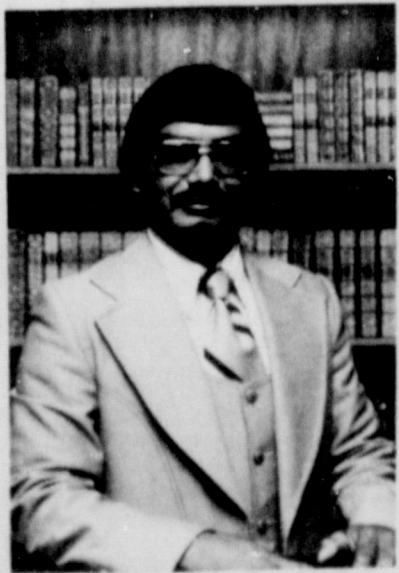
Also there are: dirt cheap, don't put all your eggs in one basket, down in the dumps, down to brass tracks, driving me up the wall, drunk as a skunk, eat crow, elbow grease, eyes bigger than his stomach, fair to middlin', fat as a pig, fixin' to fly off the handle, get it while the gettin's good, get the show on the road, going around in circles, gone to their head, got you over a barrel, grinning like a cat eating glue.

Also, hard as a rock, hard headed, have your cake and eat it too, high as a kite, hit the hay, hold your horses, hot under the collar, I don't give a flip, I'll be doggone, I mite as well, in a nutshell, I reckon, Jack of all trades, just worn to a frazzle, Katie bar the door, keep it under your hat, keep your britches on, kind of nosy, knocked out, the last straw, like a bull in a china cabinet (or china closet), like a chicken with its head cut off, like two peas in a pod, look down their nose, looks like they scraped the bottom of the barrel, love her to pieces.

Also there are: madder than a wet hen, made from scratch, making a mountain out of a molehill, mealy mouthed, miss the boat, naked as a jaybird, nervous as a cat, nitty-gritty, in nothing flat, not worth a plug nickel, nutty as a fruitcake, off the record, on cloud nine, on the up and up, out of snuff, pain in the neck, penny pincher, plum give out, pullin' my leg, put it in file 13, quick as lightning, raining cats and dogs, rat race, really going to have to knuckle down, red as a beet, rough as a cob, run it into the ground and running like a scared rabbit.

Or how about: scared stiff, shake a leg, sharp as a tack, sick as a dog, skinny as a rail, slow as the seven-year itch, warm as toast, wheeling and dealing, white as a sheet, wilder than a March hare, wishy washy, and you ain't just a woofin'.

When you consider all of these and many other type of expressions, it's no wonder that foreigners have trouble studying English, and trying to figure out what—especially those of us in Texas—are talking about.

Budget Hearing Tops City Council Slate

The budget for the fiscal year 1979-80 was the main topic of discussion at the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council September 10.

After reviewing the budget carefully, the council finally passed ordinance number 535, adopting the budget for fiscal year 1980.

In other business, the council appointed two members to the Board of Governors at Prairie Acres. Appointed were Jo Buchanan and Nelson Welch.

Ordinance 534, to annex five lots in Western Addition by the Frio Development Co. was read, but after much discussion, a motion was passed to table the question until further research can be made.

Another ordinance concerning annexing land was read, calling for the annexation of two lots in Western Addition, but this item of business also was tabled.

City Manager Jake Outland was given authority to enter into contract for the purchase of a Pak-Mor trash truck body, at an estimated cost of \$34,900, so that the city will have an alternate trash truck when needed.

Outland was also authorized to solicit bids for a new solid waste landfill cut. A motion was passed

naming Graham, Brown and Company to do the annual audit on the city's books.

Charles Hamilton was present, carrying a request for the city's assistance with the Men's Softball Assn. park, which has been completed this summer. The association was needing \$2,100 to complete the cost of lighting the field. A motion was passed to pay the remaining lighting costs for the association.

Motion was passed approving the increase of rent for the City Library, which rents from the American Legion. The requested increase, from \$150 to \$200 per month, was approved.

The council appointed D.C. Herring and David Grimsley as the city's representatives to a new county tax appraisal board.

Waymon Wilkins of Adams Drilling reported on repairs needed to city water well number seven, giving an estimate for lowering the well and other repairs, totalling \$8,233.50. Motion was carried to approve the cost of the repairs.

Miscellaneous items included the notation of the monthly gas rate adjustment for city residents from Pioneer Natural Gas Company.

African Plugs USA's Production Ability

H.D. van Zyl, South Africa's "farmer of the year," was in the Friona area recently, touring feeding and farming installations.

The John Deere Company sponsored van Zyl's tour in this country, and his host while in the Friona area was longtime John Deere dealer D.C. Herring.

The African agriculturist, who was making his second tour of America with his wife, said that America does not receive the recognition internationally that it should, for its accomplishments.

"America does not get the thanks of the world, especially the third world countries, for its efforts in feeding the masses. You can pick up a sack of produce in our country and read the label, and likely as not, it says, 'Produce of the U.S.A.'," van Zyl said.

The African visitor farms 9,000 acres of land and raises 7,000 cattle in his home state of Bophuthatswana. He was especially interested in seeing a feedlot, and was given a tour at Bovina Feeders by David George, manager.

As to the differences in cattle feeding in this country and his, van

Zyl said "Our cattle go to market a lot sooner than yours. Our people like their meat a little more on the lean side. Our cattle cost about twice as much as yours," he added.

van Zyl said he was impressed with the quality of the feed being used in the feedlots here, and the scientific approach used. He said that feeders in his country used basically the same ingredients as they do here.

While in Friona, Mr. and Mrs. van Zyl were guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. D.C. Herring for lunch, and also were given a tour of Hi-Pro Feeds by Jack Hamill.

He also toured the King Ranch while in Texas. He serves as an agricultural advisor to Homeland, an independent country in South Africa, having been appointed to the position by the black president of Bophuthatswana.

This was the African's second trip to this country on behalf of his agricultural interests abroad. Ten years earlier, he had toured the Corn Belt region.

Making the tour with the van Zyls was John Goldthorn of Dallas, general sales manager for the John Deere company.

Rev. Carrasco Tabbed For Statewide Post

Rev. Donnie Carrasco, who served as pastor of Templo Bautista in Friona for the past 13 years, has accepted a position at the Mexican Baptist Bible Institute in San Antonio.

With 13 years of service, Rev. Carrasco was the "dean" of ministers in Friona in terms of continuous service. He was an active member of the Friona Ministerial Alliance and the Friona Noon Lions Club. He also had served as a board member for the Friona Public Library, and was on the steering committee for self-evaluation for Friona High School.

In his new position, Carrasco will serve as assistant dean, and his main responsibility will be the organization's satellite program, which will deal with new churches and extension seminaries.

The goal of the institute is to become the first Mexican Baptist College.

While in Friona, Rev. Carrasco has held various leadership capacities with the Mexican Baptist Convention of Texas. He came to Friona in early 1967 and at that time, Templo

Bautista had less than 100 members. At the present time, there are 400 members of the church, with an average attendance of 230. The church completed a building program in 1974.

A native of San Marcos, Carrasco attended Lubbock schools. He received his BA in religion from Wayland Baptist College in 1973, and his master's in Spanish and psychology in 1977. He lacks nine hours having a second master's degree, in education, which he plans to finish in summer work. He has completed 34 hours of post-graduate work in psychology.

Prior to coming to Friona, Carrasco was pastor at a church in O'Donnell for seven years, and was at Crosbyton three years prior to that. Rev. Bill Burton, who was pastor of the First Baptist Church at the time, was instrumental in his move to Friona.

Rev. Carrasco and his wife Delia are parents of three children, Ann Carrasco Trevino, who lives here, Ruben, now a student at Wayland Baptist College, and Donnie Jay, 12.

Muleshoe Man Killed In Crash On Monday

A Muleshoe resident, Jaime Hernandez, 32, was killed in a two-vehicle accident at a dirt road intersection south of Friona on Monday, September 17.

Hernandez was the driver of an automobile, which was in collision with a large truck tractor driven by Noel Parvin. The accident occurred 5.3 miles south of Friona, at about 5:45 p.m.

Investigating officer Royce Keck of the Department of Public Safety said that a corn crop makes the intersection a dangerous one. Although the crop sets back from the corner somewhat, by the time a vehicle would come into view, it would be too late to stop, according to Keck.

Hernandez was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital by Friona Ambulance, but was dead on arrival. A passenger in his car, Victor Arzola, was admitted to the hospital with lacerations, cuts and bruises.

Parvin, 39, was treated for slight injuries.

Hernandez and Arzola had completed work at MBPXL, and were headed east on the dirt road, toward State Highway 214. Parvin, who is employed by Parmer County Pump Company, was southbound.

Both of the vehicles were completely destroyed. Both passengers of the car were thrown out into the barrow ditch. Keck said that

ordinarily there would have been four people in Hernandez' car, all employees of the packing plant who shared a ride, but due to a conflict, two usual passengers had come to work in another car on Monday.

Funeral services for Hernandez were conducted in Muleshoe Tuesday and his body was shipped to Durango, Mexico, for burial. Survivors include his wife, Rosalinda of the home, four children, Jaime, Jr., Mary Jane, Alma Angelica and Elizabeth, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Teodoro Hernandez of Durango, Mexico, and five brothers, Guillermo, Jesus, Arturo and Ubaldo, all of Durango, and Miguel of Lindsay, California.

Hernandez was a member of the Baptist Mission of Muleshoe.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 20, 1929
Dr. McElroy reports that he will be ready to begin the construction of the new building that will house the Friona laundry. There is good evidence that there are at least two new houses in prospect for Friona in the near future.

Mr. Phillips, assistant manager of the State Telephone Company, with offices at Lubbock, was a business visitor here late Friday and Saturday. The State now owns the local system that has been in Friona for a number of years.

45 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 21, 1934
F.N. Welch of the Parmer County wheat allotment committee said there has been another group of wheat checks received, as second payment for their 1973 allotment, and which are now available at the various banks of the county. Checks amounting to \$6,549.03 have been received. He also states that the wheat land allotment for 1934 will be only ten per cent of the average acreage instead of fifteen per cent as was the case last year.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 22, 1939
A head-on collision which occurred last Thursday afternoon on Highway 33-60, near Wilsey Switch, about six miles east of Farwell, came very near being one of the most disastrous affairs that has occurred in this county for many months. Two cars, one driven by Miss Margaret St. Clair, Home Demonstration Agent of Parmer County, and the other driven by three young men, two of this county and one from near Grady, New Mexico, were involved. The evident cause of the accident was a heavy smoke screen that lay across the highway from some burning weeds, where highway workers were cleaning the weeds from the right-of-way. Miss St. Clair was unable to tell on which side of the road she was driving. Coming out of the smoke she crashed into the other car. She received several severe cuts and bruises. The three young men were Robert Calloway of the Rhea Community, Melvin Wheeler of

Bovina, and Joe Hays of Grady. Joe Hays is in serious condition while the other boys received cuts and bruises.

35 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 22, 1944
Monday morning, when Mrs. Bill Flippin went to light the fire in the oven of her gas range and inserted the match, in the oven door, escaping gas caused an explosion and she was burned severely on the arms, face and lower limbs. The worst burn was on her right arm and hand, which was a second degree burn.

A business deal was completed here Tuesday morning when the Friona Cafe, formerly known as "Smiley's Cafe," was transferred from the ownership of Mrs. Henry Lewis, and is now owned and operated by C.L. Dunn, who comes here from Marlow, Oklahoma.

25 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 24, 1954
Two Friona youths were hospitalized and two were given emergency treatment Monday morning after a pickup in which they were riding overturned on the outskirts of Friona. Earl (Cotten) Renner, 16, driver of the '46 Chevrolet pickup, was hospitalized but later dismissed. Gaylon Rhodes, 18, was still hospitalized in the local hospital, with undetermined head injuries. Others in the wreck were Charles Kirk and Billy Parker.

20 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 24, 1959
Citizens of Friona will have the opportunity of deciding whether or not to approve a proposed \$330,000 in expansion and improvements of the present city services at an election slated for Saturday, September 26. The bond election which is the largest ever put before the residents of Friona, will go toward sealcoating streets, paving more blocks of dirt streets, construction of a new sewer plant, extension of present sewer and water lines and construction of a water tower if approved.

15 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 24, 1964
A group of Friona merchants, who

have been meeting monthly in an effort to promote business activities, organized as Friona Association of Retail Merchants ("FARM") at a meeting last Thursday morning. Wayne Clausen, manager of Hurst's Department Store, was named acting chairman of the group, with Porter Roberts being named acting secretary.

10 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 25, 1969
Bruegel & Sons Elevator, Inc. have purchased White's Elevator, 15 miles southeast of Friona. Fred Bruegel Jr. and Tulon White made the announcement, and added that the transaction does not involve White's Elevator in Dimmitt.

The Friona City Council approved the annual budget for 1969-70 in the amount of \$313,091 at its last meeting.

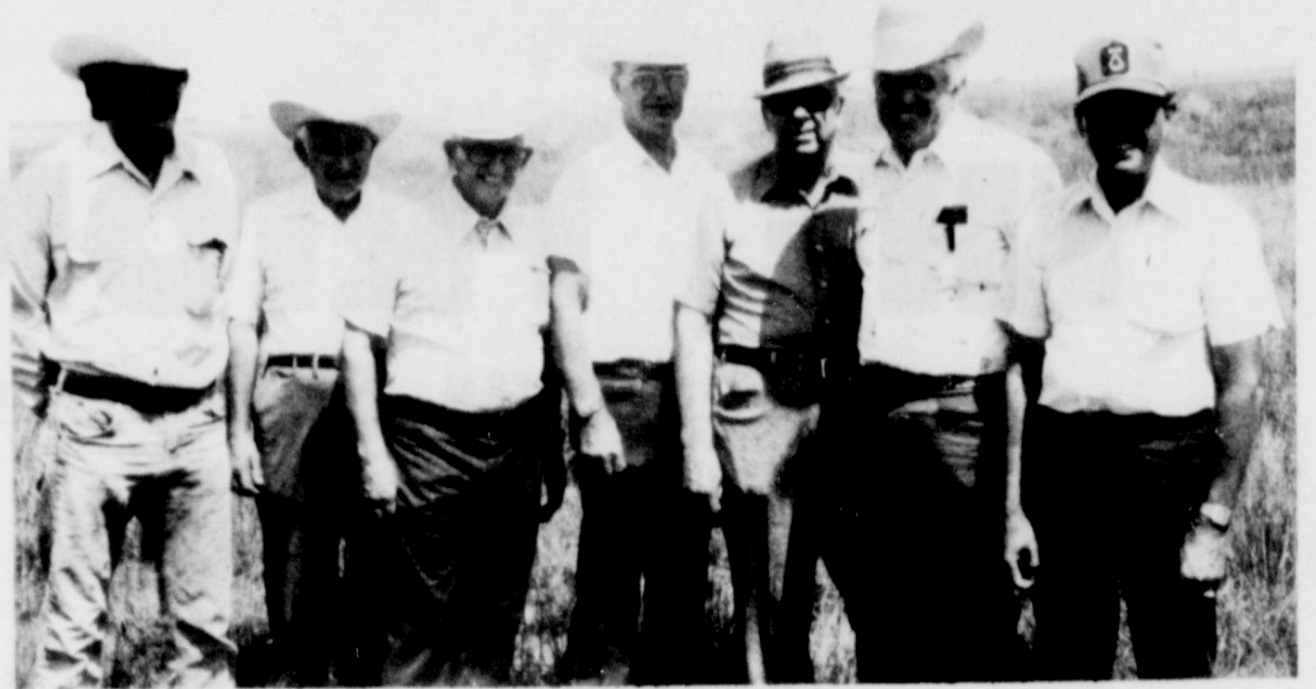
5 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 22, 1974

Officials Tour Bovina Dam Site

Officials of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court, Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service met on September 10 and toured the Bovina dam site on Catfish Draw, a part of the Running Water Draw Watershed project.

The grass made an excellent seed crop this year and all were pleased at the progress being made on establishing a permanent grass cover on the dam.

Although several good rains have fallen in the area in the past weeks, the dam does not have water in it. However, the playa lake behind the dam has some water in it and hopefully the lake will fill and hold water in the future.

The Parmer County Commissioner's Court and the Soil and Water Conservation District are the sponsoring organizations. The Bovina floodwater retention dam was completed and dedicated in 1973.

Construction on Parmer County's second dam, near Lazbuddie, is complete and will be seeded to grass next spring.

Other structures are scheduled to be built between Parmer County and the city of Plainview.

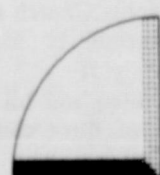

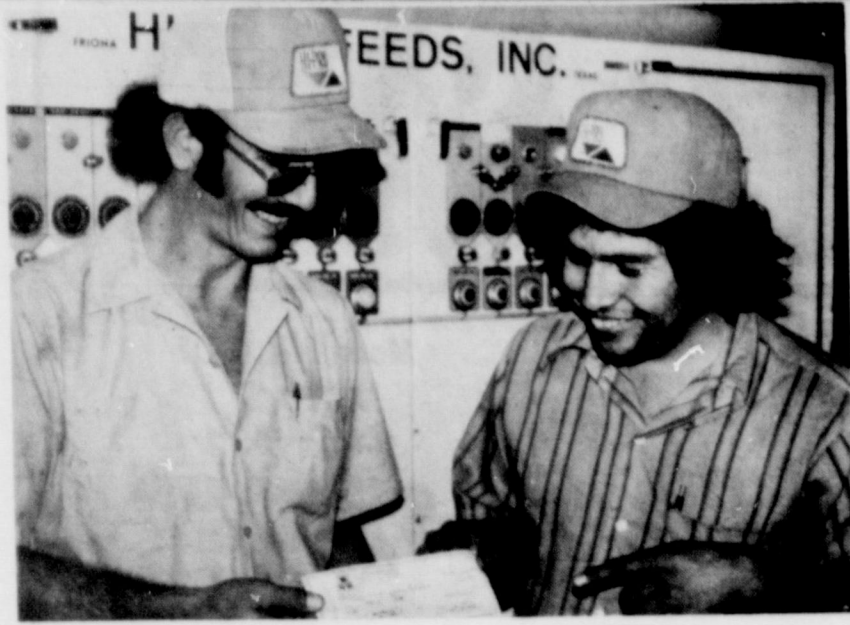

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

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Lockney Rallies To Tie Chiefs, 14-All

The Chieftains came close to scoring their first win for the 1979 season at Lockney last Friday, but had to settle for a 14-14 tie after dominating play virtually throughout the game.

The game produced some bright moments for the Chiefs, but several factors contributed to holding down Friona's point production.

Friona's offense seemed to jell, as the Chiefs ran for 267 yards. The defense had another good game, allowing just 88 yards rushing and 85 yards passing. And, if it had not been for two big plays by Lockney, the defense would have allowed just 63 yards. And, Friona would have won the game, 14-0.

Friona threatened to score in the opening minutes of the game. They took the opening kickoff and drove steadily downfield. The Chiefs reached the Lockney 12-yard line, but was set back by a clipping penalty, which ruined the scoring opportunity.

Neither team could cross the goal-line in the first half, which ended in a scoreless tie. It rained throughout the first quarter, and this contributed to making the football slippery throughout the game, plus making a problem with footing on the field.

In the third quarter, Friona hopped on a Lockney fumble at their 26, and drove down to the Longhorn three. A fourth down failed, and Lockney took over. However, they fumbled on their first play, and Friona was back in business.

Mike Hubbard skirted end for the three yards and a touchdown, and Mark Montoya's kick made it 7-0.

Lockney bounced back. Friona had held the 'Horns in check most of the game, but on the first play from scrimmage following the TD, Curtis Ford burst through the line and ran 65 yards for a score. Kirk Frye blocked the point attempt, and Friona held its lead at 7-6.

Friona also came back, to drive 73 yards for another touchdown. The Chieftains got some good gains on outside runs by Rod Owen and Mike Hubbard, and some good running from Chuck Nichols, who pounded the inside.

Hubbard covered the final seven yards on an end sweep, and Montoya kicked the PAT for a 14-6 Friona lead

with 3:01 left in the third quarter.

Lockney came up with another big play. Quarterback Steve Warren rifled a pass to Arnold Alaniz on a play which covered 45 yards. On the play, Friona defender Rod Owen slid down on the muddy field, and Alaniz had clear sailing to the goal.

"We had the play defended perfectly, but when Rod lost his footing, that was that," Coach Lonnie Phillips commented.

On the PAT try, Lockney went for two, and Warren flipped a pass to Kevin Evans, alone in the flat, for the conversion which knotted the game, 14-all.

There were nine minutes left in the game at this point, but neither team mounted a threat the rest of the way.

Friona had five penetrations for the night, and Lockney three. The Longhorns had recovered a Friona fumble inside the 20 early in the game, but Friona's defense stiffened and held.

On defense, Ben Landrum had seven unassisted and seven assisted tackles and recovered a fumble. Nichols had eight assists and seven unassisted tackles.

Others standing out were Bobby Thompson and James Clark, who

recovered a pair of fumbles each, Rondee Clark and Kirk Frye, one recovery each, and Jerry Harrelson, six tackles.

The quilt top bore the names of one of the school students in each block. Most of the blocks were embroidered by the sixth and seventh grade girls and then Miss Vestal sewed them together.

In addition to the names of the two teachers, the quilt bears the names of Clarence Veazey, Ray Ford, Dorothy Sue Cummings, Bill Buchanan, Reba June Harper, Bobbie Jean Barker, John Hand and Annie Sue Crow as seventh graders. Sixth graders were Lila Robason, J.C. Mears, Evelyn Ann Routh, B.C. Harper and Clifton Harper.

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
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WEEKEND TOURIST GUIDE

Canyon Women Author Book About Panhandle

Nine months and 24,000 miles later, the dream and work of two Canyon women is on Panhandle bookshelves. "Presenting the Texas Panhandle", a where-to-go, what-to-see and who-to-know guide to the upper 26 Texas counties, was published recently by Lana Barnett and Elizabeth Buhrkuhl.

The book developed, said Barnett, because she wanted to know what was interesting to see on weekend trips in the Panhandle.

"When we moved back out here from Ft. Worth, I was wanting something to take with me on weekend trips, something that listed what there is to see. I called the library, asking if there was a compilation and they checked and didn't have anything like that," she explained. "I just thought about it for a year. I didn't have the money then."

During that time, Barnett came to work for The Canyon News, helping prepare the county progress edition. She saw advertising as a way to finance the guidebook.

Barnett enlisted the aid of Buhrkuhl, a school teacher for 18 years, who has instructed from third grade through college level.

With the encouragement of Troy Martin, News publisher, they began work, gathering both advertisement and information. The result is a 198-page book with cover by Canyon artist Jim Ward and filled with

historical photographs from the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

Each county has a chapter devoted to it that includes a feature story of a current topic; a historical feature; a calendar of annual events; things to see and do; a list of interesting facts, both past and present; current and historical photographs.

"We didn't write the book," they add. "We published it but we had contributing authors and did some of the writing."

In traveling the Panhandle, the major feature has been change, said Buhrkuhl.

"We have not been in one county that there hasn't been a lot of changes, growth, industry, population, mostly for the better," she said.

"We've seen wildlife. We saw a herd of antelope between Perryton and Pampa," said Barnett.

"We've had a ball. We've met people in all walks of life, in all age groups. We've met people in all kinds of business situations."

"We've learned that the people are fantastic. And that the Panhandle is not all flat; there are a lot of canyons and hills in this Panhandle," she said.

They plan to update the book with a new edition every other year. In the meantime, they are working on other projects.

Rule Change To Assist Farmers

Farmers who grow corn and sorghum will no longer have to dry the grain to become eligible for government farm-stored loans under a program announced August 3, 1979, by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland. This is in response to requests initiated in 1977 by Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

In the original request for this provision, Elbert Harp, GSPA's Executive Director stated that drying

was an unnecessary and expensive procedure, both in money and fuel for farmers. Until this provision, farmers had to dry grain to acceptable levels in order to be eligible for government loans. Bergland said this decision would save farmers both energy and money.

Any producer in compliance with feed grain program provisions will be eligible to apply for such corn and sorghum loans. Loan applications and program details are available at county offices of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Under a pilot program begun last October, farmers in 28 counties in 10 states have been eligible for these loans. This action expands the program nationwide.

Farm-stored loans on high moisture corn and sorghum will be issued at the loan rate in effect for the county where the crop is stored. However, for every one per cent that the moisture level exceeds the department's "dry grain factor," loans will be reduced 1.2 per cent. The "dry grain factor" for corn is 15.5 per cent; for sorghum it is 14.0 per cent.

Drying grain with conventional fuels—liquid petroleum gas and natural gas—uses large amounts of energy. Since much of the corn and sorghum stored on farms is fed to livestock, drying of these grains is not essential as the moisture does not adversely affect the commodities for feed purposes. Making loans available on high-moisture or acid-treated corn and sorghum eliminates the drying requirement, resulting in a less energy-intensive alternate technology that still preserves the crop for the feed use intended.

The program is part of the department's overall effort, coordinated through the Office of Energy, to use existing agencies and authorities to encourage the conservation of fossil fuels by using renewable sources of energy or alternative energy-conserving technologies wherever possible.

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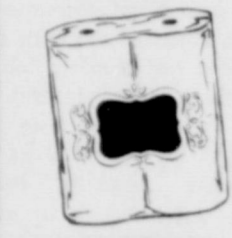
