Sappers Blast Copters Valued At \$1.5 Million

SAIGON (AP) — Viet Cong sappers slipped into a major allied base 30 miles north of Saigon early today, blew up four American helicopters valued at more than \$1.5 million dollars and damaged a fifth chopper.

The sergeant said two American sappers were slightly wounded. There were no South Vietnamese casualties, the government said.

Field reports said two AH1 Cobra gunships and two OH6 light observation helicopters were destroyed and a Cobra gunship was damaged.

No one on the big base even saw the sappers, according to one enlisted man. They hurled satchel charges into the helicopters. The Lal Khe camp was turned over to the South Vietnamese 5th Infantry Division last year when the U.S. 1st Infantry Division was withdrawn from combat.

It was the third attack in less than two weeks on a U.S. helicopter compound.

SABOTEURS
Viet Cong saboteurs also were active on the central coast. The U.S. Command reported that three empty storage barges were sunk in Qui Nhon harbor by three explosions believed to be mines planted by Viet Cong frogmen.

Elsewhere in South Vietnam, only small and scattered skirmishes were reported.

In Cambodia, more than 5,000 Cambodian troops backed by gunboats and dive bombers launched a rainy season drive to cut one of the Communists' most important infiltration and

Vaccination Of Texas Horses Reported 85 Per Cent Complete

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Vaccination of horses against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) is 85 per cent complete in Texas and virtually finished in Oklahoma, the Federal Emergency Headquarters here said Monday.

Vaccination also continues today in Louisiana, New Mexico and Arkansas, and should start within a week in California, Arizona, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Florida.

Meanwhile, the Texas Animal Health Commission said the disease which swept into Texas June 29 from Mexico had killed 1,315 horses and sickened another 1,674.

The Texas Health Department said one new case in humans was confirmed over the weekend, bringing the total human cases in Texas to 23. The department said there are 120 other suspected cases in human beings.

One case of VEE had been reported outside of Texas, in an unidentified 33-year-old employee of the U.S. Public Health Service Laboratory in Fort Collins, Colo. Health Department officials said the man apparently caught the disease while working in Texas earlier this month in connection with the VEE outbreak.

So far, confirmed cases in horses have been confined to 11 Texas counties, a Federal Emergency Center spokesman said. Airplanes from Lake Charles, La., Ellington AFB, Houston, Victoria, Corpus Christi and Brownsville, Tex., continued to spray coastal areas Monday to kill the mosquitoes which carry the disease. They will spray more than 8 million acres before the project is completed in early August, a federal official said.

The Federal Emergency Center spokesman here estimated Monday that 940,950 horses have been vaccinated in Texas since the drive started, along with 138,932 in Oklahoma, 101,898 in Louisiana, 15,904 in Arkansas and 14,743 in New Mexico.

BLANKET COVERAGE
Health officials in Arkansas said the more than 15,000 horses represent a third of the horse population in that state. Dr. Richard Thomas, state veterinarian, said it will take about three weeks to complete the program.

In Louisiana, Dr. Ray Cowart, operation officer of the USDA Animal Health Division at Baton Rouge, said the next four or five days should determine if the vaccination program will stop the spread of the disease.

The new vaccination program in six more states will give blanket vaccination coverage of 11 states with a horse population estimated at 2.23 million, federal officials said.

Sex Prefix War Declared By Lawmaker
WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Bella Abzug is asking Congress to declare war on the sex prefix.

The New York Democrat, wife of a stockbroker, is doing her thing for women's liberation by preceding her signature with "Ms." She figures that can be taken for Mrs. or Miss if reference must be made at all.

But women, she said, should be considered as "individuals and not as wives of individuals." "Women are harassed daily by government interrogations as to their marital status," she told the House. "Thus, the thousands of government forms which make up red tape require women to designate Miss or Mrs., while men, apparently, are sufficiently described by the term Mr."

Each time a woman is required to designate either Mrs. or Miss, "she is reminded that her identity is perceived not only by her sex but also by her marital status," Mrs. Abzug said, but such "governmental curiosity does not apparently extend to the private lives of men."

She said there is no justification "for such idle curiosity about women. In view of the vast number of forms which must be completed by anyone associated with the United States, its elimination will do much to enhance the personal respect for the individual."

Thus, she prepared for introduction today a bill to prohibit any "instrumentality of the United States from using as a prefix to the name of any person any title which indicates marital status," as well as a resolution designating Aug. 26 as Women's Equality Day to commemorate the day in 1920 when women first won the right to vote.

Discrimination against women in employment, she said, permits supervisors to rationalize extensively — "usually on the basis that a married woman is apt to get pregnant, or she is a 'second breadwinner,' or some other unsubstantiated myth."

Under her bill, Congress, courts or any federal agency would be blocked from indicating anyone's marital status in correspondence, records, certificates or written documents.

Western Union Workers Win 19 Per Cent Pay Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — members of the AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America, they are bargaining separately with Western Union.

E.L. Hageman, president of the AFL-CIO United Telegraph Workers, said the contract, still subject to worker ratification, provides for a 19-per-cent boost in wages, plus benefits totaling another 4 per cent.

"We consider it a good contract," Hageman said Monday night. "The negotiating committee is recommending ratification."

Pickets were called off and employees will start back to work at midnight tonight, Hageman said.

In addition to the across-the-board wage increase, Hageman said, additional increases were worked out for certain classifications.

Fringe benefit improvements, which the company said were worth 2 per cent, but Hageman maintained were worth 4 per cent, are in hospitalization, daily expense allowances, group life insurance and vehicle allowances for auto messengers.

Severance pay would increase 50 per cent for employees displaced because of work or office relocations, a stumbling block in early negotiations.

Also provided for, said Hageman, is a form of job security for persons with five or more years' seniority who are bumped to lesser positions by more veteran employees. Those moved down will remain at their highest pay.

Should it be approved, the new pact will be retroactive to the time strikers returned to work.

In the New York metropolitan area, 3,100 Western Union workers remain on strike. As

sonnel continued to operate Telex and leased-wire operations.

The telegraph workers initially sought a 32-per-cent raise over two years plus job security provisions. Western

Union's last offer before the walkout was for a 16-per-cent pay increase over two years,

plus another 4 per cent to be added whenever the federal government approved higher telegraph rates.

Doesn't Overeat?

Your Good Health

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am 22, 5 feet 8 1/2 inches tall, and weigh 165. My problem of course, is that I'm overweight. I've asked my doctor for a diet and he just tells me to stop eating so much. That's fine, except I really don't eat excessively now, or ever did. The thing which puzzles me is that on occasion I will weigh six pounds lighter than the day before, but then get the pounds back overnight. I know you have a booklet on the right way to diet. Will you list it again so I can send for it?

I also try walking around the block with my child two times a day, plus exercising. -- Mrs. S.A.J.

You say you've never eaten excessively -- but you have the weight to prove that you must have.

One of the great fallacies among overweight people is that so many of them believe just as you do -- that they don't overeat. Well, it isn't necessary for some people to overeat very greatly in order to get fat. Get out paper and pencil and prove it for yourself. Suppose you overeat only by a few ounces -- enough, let's say, to gain an ounce a day. Work it out and see how many pounds that means in a year!

Thus it needn't take very much change in your diet to keep from gaining any further. But it means some cutting down to get rid of a few pounds.

A couple of times around the block won't use up many calories, though, of course, every little bit helps. More vigorous exercising will be more helpful -- but you've got to cut down your food intake to make any real progress.

Study my booklet. You'll find that one of the most bothersome factors for many overweight people is that they have developed a taste for high-calorie foods. Many folks just don't realize how many calories are represented in a little dab of this and a little dab of that -- if they are fattening foods. The booklet is called "Lost Secrets of Reducing." Send 35 cents and a long self-addressed, stamped envelope for a copy. Remember to include your zip code.

The booklet also will give you the answer to your sudden losses and gains in weight: loss (and gain) of water. This affects women more than men, because of the effects of menstruation and hormone levels.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Some years ago I bought a water distiller. Now I have been scared out of using it by what I have heard and read lately about the "dangers" of drinking distilled water.

It doesn't seem logical to me that distilled water could harm anyone. Can it? -- H. E.

Nor can I see how it can harm you. Distilled water is just water with stray minerals and other impurities removed from it by the distillation process. You get ample minerals from the food you eat.

On the other hand, I see relatively little need for using distilled water. It's useful in some areas where the odor or taste of available water is disagreeable, or where there is any question as to whether the water contains harmful bacteria.

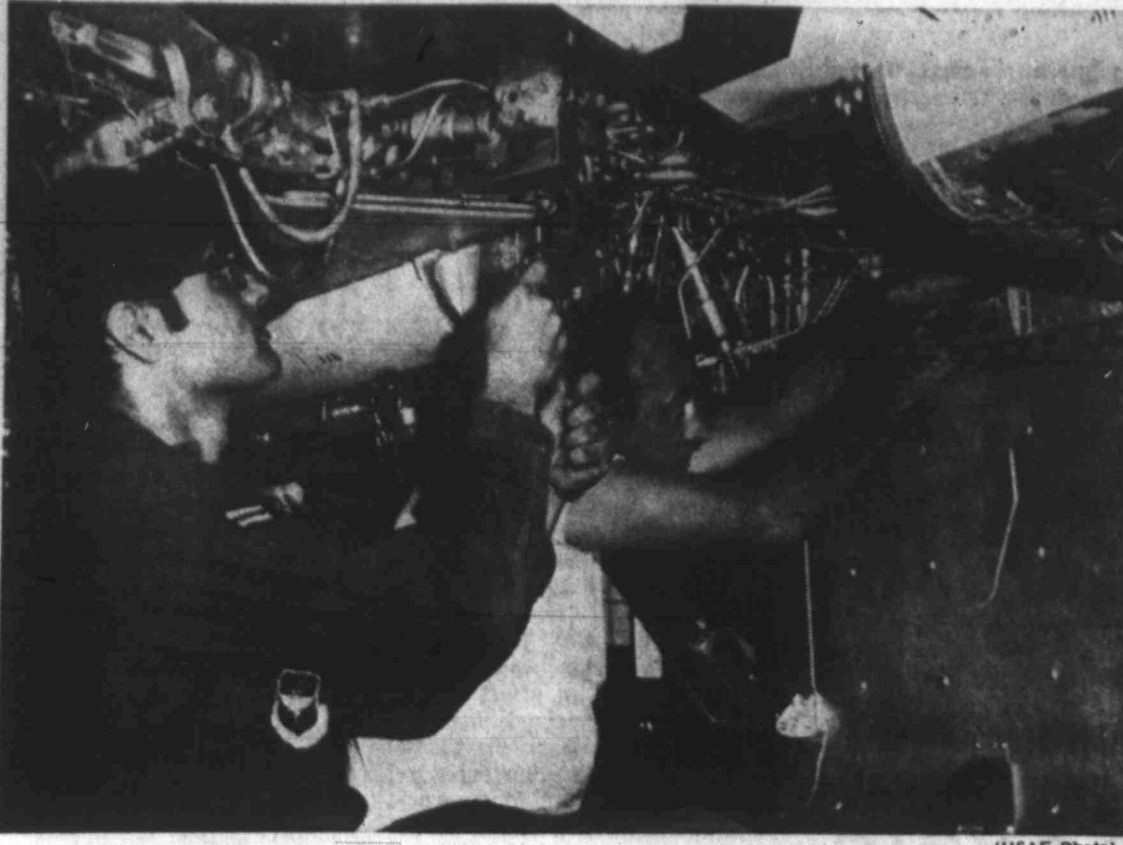
Some folks don't like distilled water because they say it tastes "flat." But drink it if you feel like it.

Burleson Pushes Healthcare Bill

FORT WORTH — Congressman Omar Burleson said his proposed National Healthcare Act of 1971 will provide more innovative solutions to solving the nation's health crisis and do so without imposing heavy tax burdens on middle income persons.

Rep. Burleson, a member of the House Ways and Means Committee which will take up the question of national health insurance, told the Texas Life Underwriters Association that solving the national health crisis "is not a simple problem that can be treated with a single prescription."

But he said his bill will provide a comprehensive approach to solving the health dilemma at a first year cost of \$3.2 billion in additional federal taxes, compared to \$77 billion for the proposed Kennedy-Griffiths bill.

His bill won't destroy the system of health insurance which now covers 164 million Americans under age 65, he said, but will improve it so that all Americans can have equal access to quality health care, regardless of income.

He cited these innovations in his bill:

1. A program to encourage training and distribution of medical personnel in areas of critical manpower shortage — rural communities, small towns, urban ghettos.
2. A program to develop ambulatory treatment centers, which will encourage early disease detection, boost preventive medicine and reduce

hospital occupancy.

3. Development of comprehensive planning for health programs which would extend from the local and state to the federal levels.
4. Establishment of cost controls aimed at holding down medical and hospital charges.
5. Use of state pool plans to guarantee health insurance coverage for the poor, near-poor and otherwise uninsurable, plus use of tax incentives to stimulate comprehensive coverage of employed individuals.
6. Development of federal standards for health benefits and creation of a national health policy board to conduct ongoing research in this field.

Burleson noted that his bill includes coverage for catastrophic illness, but said that America's health needs encompass far more than just covering this kind of emergency, or paying for the high cost of hospitalization.

Similarly, he said, a national health care plan which simply dumps federal dollars into the health delivery system without improving it will aggravate problems, not solve them. He said that this was one of the unforeseen consequences of the Medicare program.

New Rule To Aid Farmers

LAMESA — Local cotton farmers who have been hard hit by drought and other natural disasters this year are being offered greater income protection by the manner in which their cotton yields will be computed for program payment purposes in 1972.

Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of agriculture, announced several additional changes in program provision which will offer greater relief to drought-affected farmers.

The action on cotton is expected to improve income in 1972 and subsequent years for cotton farmers in the drought areas of the Southwest. An adjustment in the farmers' actual 1971 cotton yield to 90 per cent of his payment yield — instead of the previous level of 80 per cent — will be permitted where this year's yield is reduced by adverse natural conditions.

Local agricultural officials had hoped for a 100 per cent level on the 1971 payment yield.

Plant Nears Completion

The Eagle Homes plant will be complete in about three weeks, according to Leo Koestler, plant manager.

"We will begin production as soon as the plant is up," said Koestler, "and we expect to have the first mobile home out about two weeks after that."

Initially, the Big Spring plant will turn out 14 x 60 foot front and rear-bedroom models, Koestler said. The plant will be hiring 30-40 people in two to three weeks. "We plan to work up to about 150 workers when we get into full production," Koestler said.

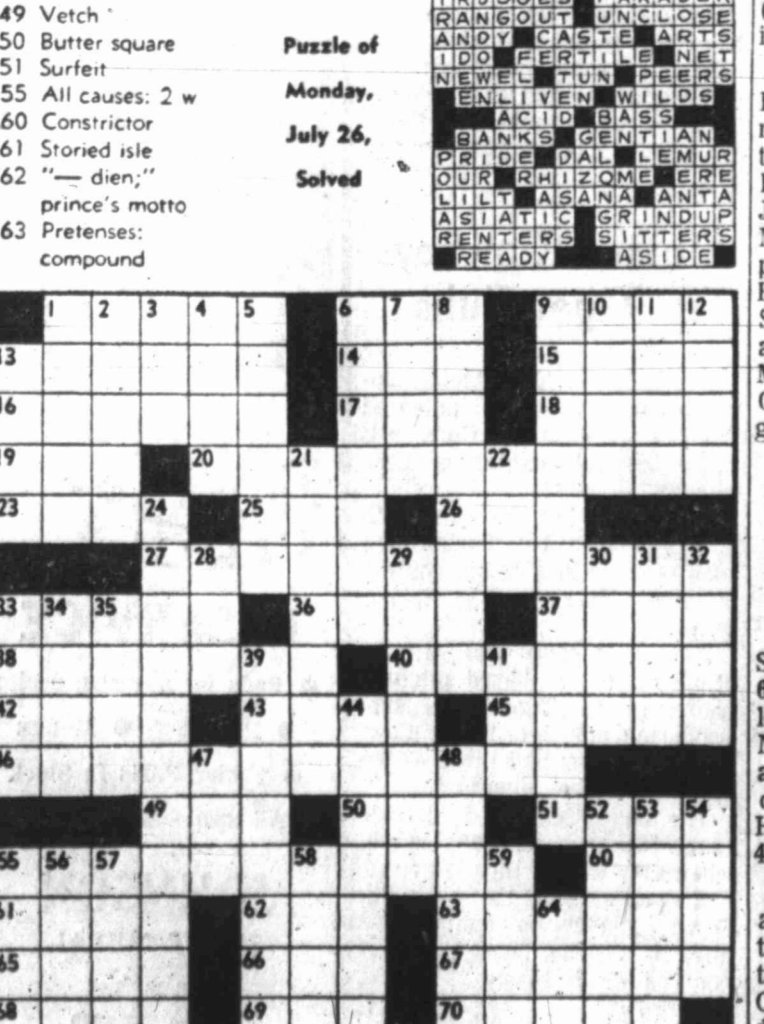

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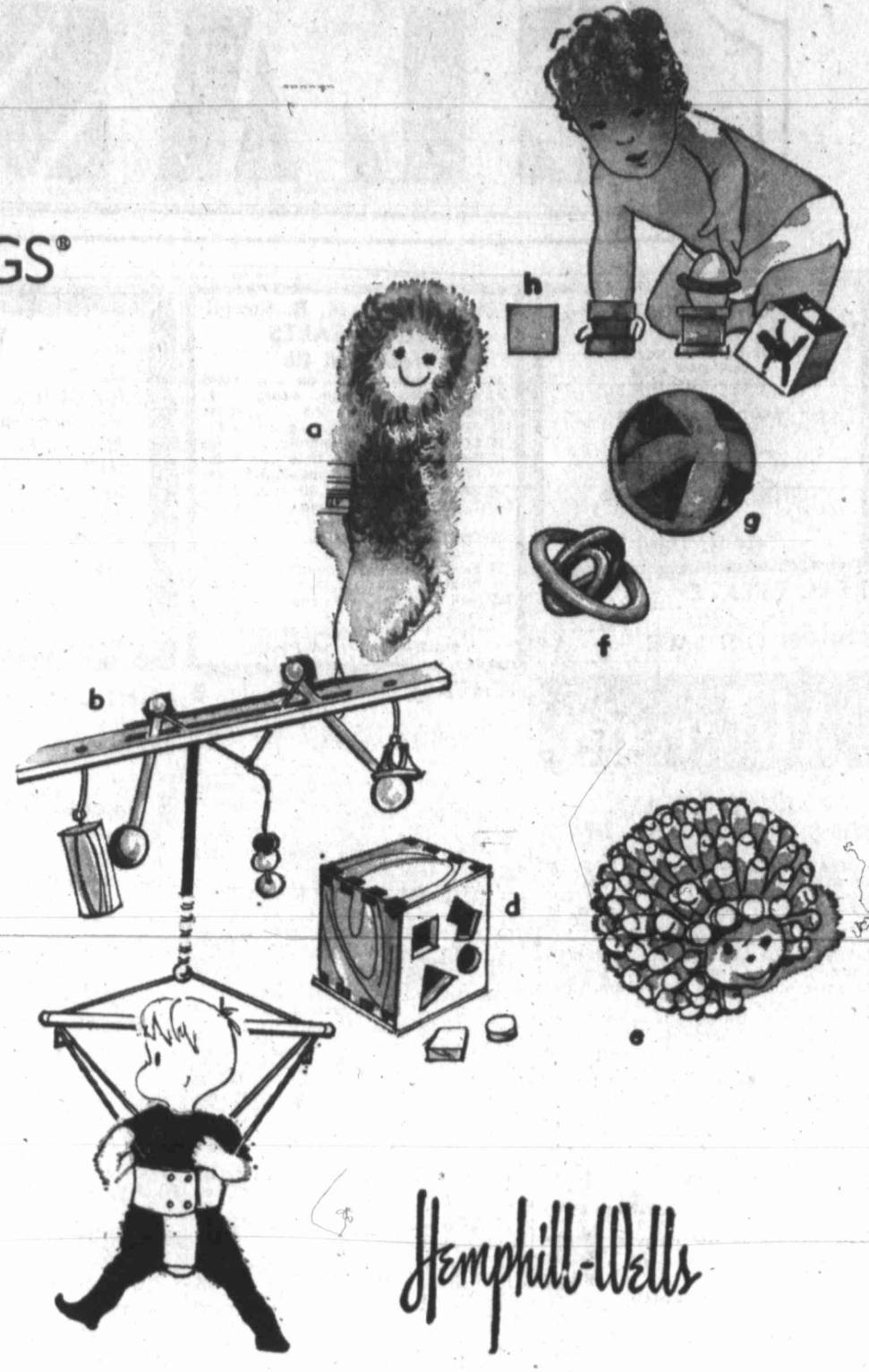

A tendency to "hog the bidding" led to a series of minus scores when most of the players seated North and South were dealt today's hand during a recent tournament. North usually opened the bidding as dealer with a preemptive call of three spades, inasmuch as he could reasonably expect to win six tricks. In other words, not being vulnerable, it appeared that the limit of his loss would be 500 points if he were doubled and partner failed to produce a trick.
South made a forcing response of four diamonds [the bid of a new suit below the game level is forcing for one round] and North rebid four spades. Rules State Grand Juries May Quiz Sharp About Deals

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — State grand juries investigating the affairs growing out of a stock scandal that rocked Texas will get a chance to question the central figure in the case, Frank W. Sharp, after Aug. 17, a federal judge said Monday.

U. S. Dist. Judge John V. Singleton amended his original order giving Sharp immunity from prosecution and from civil process and said Sharp may appear before state grand juries after the August date.

Sharp had been talking to a federal grand jury here about the collapse of the National Bankers Life Insurance Co. and his Sharpstown State Bank after the Securities and Exchange

Commission filed a civil suit last January against them charging stock manipulation.

NEXT TO IMPOSSIBLE
U. S. Atty. Anthony J. P. Farris said Singleton's order will disrupt the government's investigation.

"It will be next to impossible to finish our probe by that date," Farris said.

The judge's action came at the request of Texas Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and Travis County Dist. Atty. Robert Smith. Smith convened a grand jury in Austin to look into possible bribery charges in connection with the passage in a special session of two banking bills favored by Sharp which would have allowed him to get state insurance backing for deposits at his bank and escape the scrutiny of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Other state grand juries in Houston and Dallas may be called to investigate charges growing out of the collapse of the insurance company. State Insurance Commissioner Clay

Cotten sent information to the district attorneys in the three cities last week and invited them to convene grand juries to investigate.

Sharp won immunity June 14 from any civil process during the federal grand jury probe into the failure of the Sharpstown State Bank. He had pleaded guilty the same day to two violations of federal banking and securities laws and received a three-year probated sentence and the immunity grant after he agreed to testify for the government.

SHIELD REMOVED
The federal grand jury will still be able to question Sharp after Aug. 17, but they will have to also take time to let state grand juries question him.

In granting the state's request Monday, Singleton told government investigators to "get on with the matter. Others might want to question Mr. Sharp."
"I cannot and will not continue this shield that you asked me to put around Mr. Sharp," Singleton said. "There is just so much information that any human and that information can be obtained within a reasonable amount of time," Singleton added.

Farris said the federal grand jury will resume its probe today and will continue to meet daily until the Aug. 17 deadline. After that, he said, he will seek to get Sharp back before the federal grand jury if additional testimony is needed.

"It will be next to impossible for us to proceed in an orderly fashion now," Farris said. "We just have to do the best we can under the court order."

Martin said the state probe actually was started late last year but that it was not made public.

Veteran Mill Manager To Retire Post At Lamesa

LAMESA (SC) — R. G. Fleming, manager of the Lamesa Cotton Oil Mill until Feb. 1, will retire Aug. 1, it was announced this week. Fleming, who became manager in 1953, stepped down in February due to ill health.

Allen Herzer was named to succeed him as manager, and Fleming was retained as a consultant until his retirement Aug. 1.

The active Lamesa civic leader began his oil mill career in 1926 when he was employed as a scale clerk by Rule-Jayton Cotton Oil Mill Company at their Stamford plant.

He worked as scale clerk, bookkeeper and laboratory operator until 1934 when he was named cashier of the Stamford mill.

Fleming was named manager of the Jayton mill in 1940 and managed it until it shut down in 1945. Upon returning to Stamford, he functioned as an aide to the general manager of

In 1949 he was named seed buyer for the Vernon Oil Mill and came to Lamesa in 1953 as manager. The two mills were under the ownership of Kimbell-Norris group.

Fleming has been active as a member of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce since his arrival in Lamesa. He served as a director of the first board of directors of the Lamesa Industrial Foundation and has maintained a keen interest in the industrial community for many years.

The veteran oil mill executive also has served as a member of the advanced gifts committee of the Dawson County United Fund on several occasions and has been active in the Lamesa Rotary Club. He is a member of the Methodist Church.
