Renewed Flood Alert In San Saba County

By The Associated Press

Fresh deluges drenched parts of Texas today, mounting a threat of floods in at least one section where nearly a foot of rain has poured down already this week.

Killeen-drenched with nearly 7.05 inches of rain in a 24-hour period—began mopping up after creek waters spilled into at least 25 homes and forced more than

a dozen families to evacuate. The downpours persisted along and about 100 miles each side of a cool front which stalled across the state, generating at least one destructive tornado and a rash of wild thunderstorms late Monday.

The National Weather Service, reported 11 inches of rain in two days around Brady in West Central Texas, put out a renewed flood warning for areas in San Saba County along the San Saba's watershed.

crust on the moon's backside is 2.5 miles thicker than the frontside crust. The theory is used to explain why the moon's far side is devoid of the vast mares or seas that characterize the frontside and why one side of the moon always aces earth.

After the moon was formed by the gathering together of cosmic dust and gas, the theory goes, the mass cooled, forming a crust with a molten core.

Meteorites then bombarded the crust, carving out great basins. On the frontside where the crust was thinner, holes were punched through the crust and hot lava welled up, filling the basins and forming the mares.

But on the backside, the crust was too thick and the basins never filled with lava.

Showers Don't Add To Lakes

Spotted showers Monday afternoon failed to produce runoff into any of the Colorado River Municipal Water District reservoirs.

Those over the weekend had added about 4,700 acre-feet to Lake Thomas and Lake Spence. The district also pumped about 60 million gallons from the low flow of the Colorado River at its diversion works and boosted the low-quality water into the side storage above Colorado City.

The channel dam across the river at the point where water in Lake Spence is boosted in a canal that takes it to the Big Spring pump pool was restored, but little pumping was necessary Tuesday because the river was nearly supplying enough to maintain the pumping pool level. Alcoholism **Guidelines**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Alcoholism among federal employes will be treated like any other illness under guidelines issued today by the Civil Service Commission.

Sick leave will be granted for treatment or rehabilitation under the new rules. And personnel folders will not mention alcoholic problems unless the employe is disciplined for failing to improve

In addition, the commission said, "the employing agency is not concerned with an employe's use of alcohol except as it may affect his job performance or the efficiency of the service."

A law passed by the last Congress ordered the commission to set up alcoholic treatment and rehabilitation programs among civilian employes.

The commission circulated proposed guidelines in April, took suggestions and issued the new rules today. They go into effect Dec. 1.

w WASHINGTON — Last week the most unbelievable event in American journalism took place. William F. Buckley Jr., the distinguished conservative columnist, television star lecturer and selfless defender of the rich, pulled a hoax on the American public.

In his National Review magazine Mr. Buckley published what were purported to be "top secret" documents on the Vietnamese war. The documents, which were cooked up by his staff, read like the real thing and all the wire services, the major newspapers and NBC and CBS reported them as legitimate news.

MR. BUCKLEY revealed the next day in a press conference that the reason for the hoax was to demonstrate that forged documents would be widely accepted as genuine, provided their content was plausible.

Now for those of us who, up to this time, have believed every word Mr. Buckley has written and every pearl that has dropped from his lips, the news that he would be part of a hoax on the American people came as a shocker.

THE DANGER of someone getting away with a hoax in this country is that other people can perpetrate hoaxes, too, and their motives may ncere as Mr. Buckley's.

Japan's Example

Marguis Childs



WASHINGTON - The president of New York bank, who is also a director of the Japanese Sony cor-

poration, recently visited Japan. Escorted through one of Sony's big plants manufacturing electronic equipment, he noted that on two assembly lines workers were wearing red arm bands.

He asked the reason. They are on strike, the plant manager said. Observing how they were working with the same antlike industry of those without arm bands, the banker exclaimed in astonishment. But naturally they're working, the manager said, and when the strike is settled and if there is a grant of higher wages they will get their increased

THE BANKER, who once took on the whole a liberal view of the American trade union movement, tells this as another piece of evidence of how Japan is able to forge ahead of the rest of the world, including the United States. The current wave of strikes here, threatening another upward swing of the inflationary spiral and a slowdown in production, underscores a deep-seated fear both in government and in business. The United States is pricing itself out of world markets.

A STUDY not yet released by the Labor Department shows that during the five years 1965-70 Japan's output per man-hour increased at the rate of 14 per cent a year. The U.S. rate was two per cent a year. European countries - Belgium, Switzerland, the Netherlands — were closer to Japan with rates between six and eight per cent. Productivity per man-hour is, of course, the key to industrial output.

T H E CENTERPIECE at the moment is steel. The choice is between a strike, with its serious impact on production, and a price increase at least equal to that granted aluminum workers. President Nixon has on his desk an order extending the agreement with Japan limiting imports of Japanese steel to six million tons a year. The agreement was reached when Japanese steel began flooding the American market. Steel is the cardinal example of what is happening to American industry in the world-wide cost-price squeeze.

REBUILDING their steel plant shattered in World War II, t Japanese increasingly bought Am can technology. Today 80 per c of their basic steel is the oxygen proess, a notable advance. In contrast, only 48 per cent of American steel is produced with the advanced tech-

Older plants have been kept in operation as American companies followed a conservative policy of capital investment. So in price and volume the Japanese began to outpace American producers. Add to this the wage differential, perhaps as great as 80 per cent, and you have the explanation of why the demand for a limit on imports was irresistible.

FROM BOTH the State Department and the White House come ominous rumbles of a trade deficit with Japan up to \$2 billion for 1971. And that will be reflected in the over-all grade surplus, which is nearing the vanishing point. So the word is get tough. But it is hard to argue with the grim facts of the troubled American econo-
