THE BIGGEST PROBLEM facing Americans today is the threat of double-digit inflation, which continues to eat up our constantly-shrinking dollars.

Inflation, which causes virtually everything that we need and use to increase in price, has been eating at our pocketbooks for the past 20 years. After each cycle, which sees the economy take brief dips and jumps, the nation's economy has been pushed to a higher basic price level.

Inflation does some funny things to the economy, and in recent years it actually spurred the longest business expansion in postwar history. Faced with the prospect of higher and higher prices, consumers changed their buying plans, spending money on items they had planned to buy later, hoping to avoid the inflationary depreciation of their dollars.

This caused the nation's savings rate to hit a new low, and the consumer debt figure to hit an all-time high.

Most families have been able to ride the tide of the new rise in inflation by virtue of both husbands and wives working, but even multiple-income families have seen their buying power lessened to a large extent.

In the midst of these economic troubles, financial experts have been expecting President Carter to encourage Congress to cut spending, and to instigate tax cuts as a means of helping the situation.

It seems that the liberals in Congress are bent on spending more tax money, for new or expanded federal programs. This would be popular with many voters, with an election year coming up, but it should not endear them to the working class.

One threat, which we were discussing with a local businessman this week, is that government programs, including welfare and all of its spin-offs, will someday have more people getting the "dole" than there are those of us taxpayers who are working to provide their living as well as ours.

When this happens, it will be virtually impossible--and it apparently isn't too far away--to oust the money-spenders in Congress in favor of more conservative-minded representation. There are pockets of the country already, where this might not be possible to achieve, even today.

We may be somewhat more fortunate in this section of the country, pertaining to the economic situation, in that the price we pay for our energy resources is still somewhat below that of other sections.

And, we are less likely to have the bitter cold winter weather that may cause residents in the north and east not only to pay substantial amounts of their paychecks for heating oil, but face the possibility of a fuel shortage.

Surely there is an answer to the economic woes of our nation, and we would hope that those who have the solutions to the problems will be heard, and that the course which is better for all of our people will be adopted, rather than one which is politically more expedient for either a president or members of congress who are running for re-election.

Leaders should not play politics with a situation which could put our country in real fiscal trouble. If not treated properly, it could make the Cuban troop situation look like two children arguing over toys.

EDDY NICHOLSON says, in reference to President Carter, "You know, it's just hard to trust a guy who gets up and jogs five miles every morning and then announces "I feel great!"

But, Nicholson adds, you have to hand it to Carter. "He's doing the work of two men--Abbott and Costello," the humorist jibes.

Club Sponsors Circus Here Saturday, Oct. 6

Circus Genoa, America's second-largest three-ring circus, will give two performances in Friona on Saturday, October 6, under the sponsorship of the Friona Booster Club.

Performances on Saturday are scheduled for 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. The big circus tent will be pitched adjacent to the Friona Community Center.

Advance tickets are on sale at several locations, and from members of the Booster Club, at \$3.00 for adults and \$1.50 for children.

Tickets at the door will be \$4.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children. But circus officials emphasize that folks in the Friona area are invited and urged to watch the erection of the huge canvas tent, with the show's trained elephants providing "elephant power" to hoist the tent more than 35 feet into the air.

The high temperature reached only 69 degrees on Wednesday, after a high of 89 the previous day. However, Thursday was back up to 78, and Friday was headed for a high of 85, so harvest conditions could continue good.

Officers Investigate As Body Discovered

The body of a dead man, presumed to be that of a Bovina man missing since last May was found late on the afternoon of September 25 by a group of Bovina youngsters near the Santa Fe railroad bridge east of town.

The body was discovered in a ditch by three youngsters, notably Bobby Robledo, who reported it to his father who in turn notified Henry Minter.

Early on the morning of September 26, Sheriff Charles Lovelace, along with deputies Bill Morgan and Minter, Bovina Marshal Jerry Atchley and Justice of the Peace Wayne Spears went to the scene to investigate.

The officers found a grisly scene.

The body was lying face down in plain view, clothes intact except for the shoes and stockings. The skull was not attached to the body. The feet and right arm were missing. There was very little body tissue remaining.

In one of the pockets was found an ignition key, which upon checking fit a pickup belonging to Kent

Glasscock, which had been driven by Gilbert Rocha, and had been discovered near the scene on May 20, 1979. Rocha had been missing since that time.

A belt buckle found on the body also proved to belong to Rocha.

Officers also found two red stockings and some human bones in a ravine approximately 100 yards from the body. Also found were a pair of brown Western boots in a trail next to the highway.

Clothing on the body consisted of a pair of blue Levis, shorts, and a short-sleeve red striped shirt.

Officers sacked the findings into plastic bags, and contacted Pat Johnson, DPS lab technician in Lubbock, who agreed to check the remains.

Rocha had been missing since about May 20, when his house was found open by Deputy Minter. It was assumed that he might have gone to South Texas. A missing persons report on Rocha was filed on June 25 after no trace of Rocha was found.

"We felt that the defense played a tremendous game, because Farwell has a good offense. Offensively, we're still looking for balance. We need the passing to go with the rushing we had against Farwell, before we'll be ready for district play," said Coach Lonnie Phillips this week.

Although the Chiefs ran almost all night against the Steers, they were unable to complete any of seven passing tries, as all of their yardage came on the ground.

Paced by the running of Rod Owen, the team drove from its own 20 to the Farwell three in a sustained drive in the first quarter, but came up

a yard short on fourth and two from the Farwell four.

Undaunted, the team hung in, and a few minutes later got a great defensive play by Mike Hubbard, who made a great interception of a Farwell pass, tipping the ball away from the receiver, and after controlling it, running from the Farwell 40 all the way to the 15.

Six plays later, Hubbard got a touchdown for the Chiefs, sweeping right end for three yards. Mark Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead with 8:51 left in the half.

It might have been 7-0 at the half, except that Bobby Thompson intercepted a Farwell pass for the Chiefs at the Steers' 25-yard line with just 2:12 remaining on the clock.

Woman's Study Club Celebrates 70th Anniversary October 14

The Friona Women's Club will observe their seventieth anniversary with an open house on Sunday, October 14, 1979 at the Federated Club House from 2:30 to 5:00 p.m. Everyone is invited.

Friona in 1909 was in its infancy; a small village set down on the rolling plains of West Texas. The pioneer settlers were all representatives of an older and more developed section of the United States.

They had come, with their families, to build a new home in the promising, untouched country. The wives of these settlers were women of education and culture and felt the need of an outlet for their dreams and ambitions.

At the invitation of Mrs. Rohrabough, wife of the local druggist, a group of these pioneer women met on the drug store front porch early in September of 1909 and there made plans for the first organized club.

Suitable program topics were discussed, officers elected and a program committee appointed. Mrs. J.H. Todd, who had recently moved

from Mansfield, Ohio, was chosen as president. Mrs. J.H. Letton was appointed as chairman of a program committee.

While they talked together, a dream within each was fulfilled—that of having a club at which they could meet, visit, and work for the improvement of the new country. Many plans made at that first meeting are still in effect. One, the name chosen—Friona Woman's Club, the decision was made to meet on the second and fourth Wednesday afternoons each month. Only for one year has this been interrupted—in 1918 the club disbanded for one year and the women helped with the war effort by doing Red Cross work.

Such was the dedication of these few members that by October, 1909 programs had been selected and a yearbook printed, and all was set for the first regular meeting which was held on October 13, 1909.

A copy of that first yearbook and every one since then is on file, and will be on display at the open house on October 14 of this year. The club's motto is "The best we can do for one another is to exchange our thoughts

freely"; the emblem—the yellow rose; and the colors of yellow and green have been printed in every yearbook made. The course of study for the first year was "Vital Questions."

As in most enterprising clubs, self-teaching and entertainment soon were not enough for the energetic ladies. They took on other projects. Among these were the placing of pictures in the Friona school rooms, sending books to the Girl's Training School at Gainesville, and contributing books to the Friona School Library.

For thirteen years the club continued "Vital Questions," "America Today," "Citizenship" and kindred topics.

Then in the fall of 1922 a big step, as far as members were concerned, was accomplished. The Friona Woman's Club was accepted for State Federation. This meant a broadening of horizons for the club as they learned of projects and achievements of other clubs across the state and nation.

For their 20th birthday, the club celebrated with a huge cake complete with 20 candles. This was followed 5 years later with a Silver Anniversary Tea, and 25 years after that with a Golden Anniversary Tea.

For their 30th birthday they entertained the Friona Junior Study Club and clubs from Muleshoe, Lazbuddie, Farwell and Black. At this meeting, Pearl Kinsley, a charter member, gave the club history; then Mrs. J.W. Rutherford, president of the 7th District of Woman's Clubs, gave an eloquent speech on clubs of other lands.

During the early years, the club members were constantly busy with projects to improve and beautify their town.

Some of these projects were: the planting of trees in the city park, drilling a well and erecting a storage tank in the park. They also planted the first trees at Friona Cemetery. They sponsored the building of the "Hut," home of the Cactus Troop of Friona Girl Scouts, located among the trees in the park. Remnants of this hut may still be seen in the park's stone fireplace.

Much later—in January 1961—Mrs. Kinsley, a charter member of the club, donated land in West Friona on which to build a Girl Scout building. In giving this land Mrs. Kinsley said, "If, by giving this land for your Girl Scouts' Home it will keep one girl from going astray, I will be richly repaid." A beautiful building stands there today as a tribute to that lovely pioneer woman.

There have been many more projects, some of which were, fencing the Congregational Church yard, helping organize the Junior Study Club now known as the Modern Study Club, feeding the Lions Club twice a month, and participating in most civic programs.

From the very beginning the members had one outstanding dream for the future—that of having a Club House all their own. From the beginning the meetings had been in the homes of members and in the churches. Money was hard to come by, but the members were able to save a little each year to go into the Club House Building Fund. Many money-making events were held: a cookbook printed and copies sold; lunch served at farm sales; flags made for the school, city and some of the merchants; quilts were made and sold; magazine subscriptions sold; bake sales held; also pie suppers; baby contests; in fact any way to raise a few dollars.

About 1930 a Mrs. Margaret Henschel, then an honorary member of the club, donated lots on the corner of Ninth and Pierce on which to build the Club House. The Friona Woman's Club now had over \$1000.00 on deposit, and with the help of the Modern Study Club secured a loan from Friona State Bank to build a rock home for the club. The rock was hauled from the San Jon, New Mexico area. It was "fun, work, plans, dreams, elbow grease, and lots of sweat" that went into the finished product.

In the fall of 1940, the Club House was built. On January 8, 1941 Katie Osborn, president, conducted the first meeting in the building. It is not only for the convenience of club members. A number of other organizations have held meetings there. It has been used for showers, conventions, receptions, family gatherings and other events. The building has been the regular meeting place for the Friona Evening Lions Club. With few repairs and modernizations, the building stands today as a worthwhile addition to the community.

Friona has not had a major community project since 1909 that has not been supported by the Friona Woman's Club. Its members have rallied to the support of the Parmer County Community Hospital. They furnished a room at the hospital as a memorial to Fayola Hardesty, a long time member. They donated money toward paving the road to the cemetery, have donated books and

money to the Public Library, the Opportunity Plan, Girl Scouts, Prairie Acres Nursing Home, History of Parmer County Volumes I and II and many other phases of community life. When many city blocks were paved the club paid the final installment for their share in 1954.

The last several years they have sent many supplies and much money to Girlstown, U.S.A. One member Bessie Boatman, who joined the club in 1934, has made 618 garments for the girls since her retirement. The club furnishes many dozens of homemade cookies each year for the Girl's Christmas party. They also take a program and refreshments once a year to Prairie Acres. In 1956 when the annual Maize Days celebration began, the club assisted in every way possible. A float was entered in the parade depicting the existence of the organization for 47 years. The last few years they have donated to the Fine Arts Council.

In 1909 the yearbook listed seventeen members. This gradually increased to 47 members in 1930. By-laws were adopted about that time limiting the membership to 40. Over 300 different women have been members. Also 30 different members have served as president, several of them for more than one term.

The present membership is fourteen. Officers are: Mrs. Ellis Tatum, president; Mrs. Claude Osborn, vice president; Mrs. T.E. Wood, secretary; Mrs. Joe Moyer, treasurer; Mrs. John Bengert, reporter; Mrs. Mary Dixon, parliamentarian. Course of study is Federation Achievements.

Although they now meet in the Club House in modern comfort, they are essentially the same women who met long ago on a drug store front porch. Their ideas and ideals are the same. They are to be congratulated for their assistance in making their town into the praiseworthy town it is today.
