HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP) - Actor Peter Duel, co-star of the western television series "Alias Smith and Jones," was found shot to death on the living room floor of his Hollywood Hills home

today, police said. Lt. John Konstanturos of the Hollywood detective division said there was a bullet wound in

the head caused by a hand-gun. 'It could either be suicide or homicide. We're not definitely sure which at this time," Kon-

Police said they were questioning several persons including a girlfriend of the 31-year-old actor who told officers she was asleep in another room of the modest house and heard a gunshot.

Detectives were dispatched to the residence about 1:30 a.m. in response to an anonymous telephone call, Konstanturos said.

Duel, whose real name was Deuel, played the role of Hannibal Hayes while co-starring with actor Ben Murphy in the ABC television network series about two western outlaws trying to reform them-

Duel was born in Rochester, N.Y., and attended St. Lawrence University, majoring in English drama and psychology. He toured with Family Service Group and studied at the American Theater Wing before arriving in Hollywood.

The actor had appeared in other past and present television series, including "The Fugitive," 'The Bold Ones," "Combat" and "Name of the

Mulling Proposals To Ease 'Reform' Rules In House

WASHINGTON (AP) - Proposals to ease up on some of the House's year-old "reform" rules and tighten up others are being considered by a special committee that will present its recommendations to the Democratic leadership next month.

If approved by the leaders, the proposals will be presented to the Democratic caucus at the start of the 1972 session and then to the House itself.

One of the most far-reaching rules that went into effect last January provides for publication of how members voted on teller votes, which are used to dispose of many major amend-

PUBLICATION

Formerly, members simply walked down an aisle and were counted but not listed by name. The new rule provides for publication of the names of those voting and how they voted if 20 members demand it.

The publication provision has resulted in better attendance when key proposals are voted

Food Stamps Plea Voiced

SINTON, Tex. (AP) - Gov. Preston Smith has been asked by the San Patricio County Commissioners to urge legislation to provide state aid to counties who administer federal food stamp programs.

Payment of the \$50,000 by W. D. Haden II of Houston, the son-in-law, caused the opposing attorneys to withdraw their motions asking the pair to show cause why they should not be ordered to reveal their personal income tax returns and financial records

U.S. Dist. Court Judge William M. Taylor Jr. cancelled the show cause hearing, scheduled for Thursday morning, after attorneys Frank G. Newman

Newman and Moore represented four disgruntled stockholders of Olympic Life Insurance Co. of Fort Worth, which has been under a state conservatorship since last spring in connection with the stock fraud suit filed by the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC)

The stockholders filed a suit in federal court here in February, 1970, alleging Haden was working for Sharp family interests when he gained "complete control of Olympic with the use of its own funds.

The SEC has called the 1968 acquisition of Olympic by to manipulate the market in stock of Olympic and National Bankers Life Insurance Co. of Dallas.

SEC records reveal that Will Wilson, who resigned recently as chief of the U.S. Justice Department's criminal division, assisted Haden in acquiring 54 per cent ownership of Olympic while Wilson was sharp's attor-





Needs More Latitude

The city council has adopted an amendment which will result in the assessment of a \$1 charge added to water bills which are delinquent 15 days beyond the due date.

The due date, as explained at the meeting, is approximately 15 days after the date of billing - or mailing.

Some sort of charge for a delinquent handling is in order, although the \$1 fee seems to us to be punitive, not compensatory. In other words, the city reaps a profit out of a late payment. And it will be at the expense largely of those who are least able to afford it - those with limited means, the elderly without transportation, etc.

Recognizing that the city does incur some costs in late payments, we nevertheless cannot endorse the principle of basing charges upon a due date which issues from a cycle or rotation system of billing. The big majority of people, by custom or by accepted business practice, pay on or before the 10th of the month following the month in which the cost was incurred. Now if your account comes up under the rotation system and is billed the 10th of the month, you have to hot foot it to city hall to pay that bill by the 25th. Then you can wait and pay all your others by the following

Rotation billing is a logical procedure for the convelence of the city, but the people who support the city are entitled to their convenience, too including waiting until the 10th to pay without

WASHINGTON - Neither Europe nor most of Asia appears to be unconcerned about the power and influence being exerted nowadays by the Soviet Union outside its own borders. But, although the Russian support of the intrusion by India into East Pakistan without regard to the pleas of the United Nations General Assembly surprised some diplomats, European governments accepted this as one of the risks taken by Moscow to enhance its position in South Asia and the Indian Ocean area.

MORE WAR is not expected, but significantly China has been outspoken in disapproval of what the Soviet Union has done. The net effect, of course, will be that Peking will be watchful and might assist Pakistan if another crisis occurs. It is considered unlikely that Russia will precipitate such a perilous situation, as this could lead to a major war.

If it were not for the rumblings about the Mideast conflict and the possibility of new hostilities there, the world walld be relatively free from the three- of further war. But nobody can tell Then violence and unrest anywhere in South Asia could break out and spread into more extensive mili-

THE SOVIET Union evidently is not planning to make wars nowdays. It is more concerned with building up trade not only for itself but for satellite states. This is a policy which will bring in more money throughout the Soviet-controlled empire and give the Kremlin a chance to meet the heavy expenses that have been incurred in buying arms or giving military assistance to various countries.

The enthusiasm of the world for monetary stability is indeed shared by the Russians. They want to expand their commerce and get a bigger share of international trade. They have a vast population to care for

THE UNITED STATES also is eager to build up trade relations everywhere. It is trying, by removal of the 10 per cent import surcharge, to increase trade, particularly with countries that have been hurt by the levy. Commerce between nations today is more important than any other factor in producing a peaceful world. For as economic conditions improve in each country, there will be less and less desire to start a war or to encourage military conflicts.

THE UNITED States, of course, hopes not only to increase its exports but also to open up channels of trade with several countries. This is a new stage in the commercial experience of the United States. Although monetary reform is a complex matter, the general feeling is that the steps taken by the recent conferences will be stimulating and will help to widen markets throughout the world.

It is significant that the United States is reluctant to spend as much money as in the past for maintaining troops abroad and also expects the United Nations, for instance, to pay more of the expenses. The government here is certainly examining carefully the contributions being made by other U.N. members to sustain the work of that organization, in the hope of persuading all of them to assume a bigger proportion of the expenditures. The United States has too long borne more than its share

Self-Regulation Fails

WASHINGTON - The incredible way in which the administration's stand on the India-Pakistan war was bungled is seen in all its needless risk against the background of a report out of the Brussels NATO meeting. This was shortly before the confusion of voices on and off the record that left the United States alone among the Western allies in taking sides in a war that was certain to be a horror for all concerned.

INSIDERS at Brussels reported that Secretary of State William P. Rogers gave an optimistic report on the progress of the SALT

Rogers, according to reports out of the small group that heard him, went so far as to say that an agreement covering defensive missiles and perhaps with some restrictions on offensive missiles as well would be ready by May. It would be in shape for President Nixon to sign along with Premier Alexei Kosygin when he goes to Moscow in May.

THE IMPACT of television in the Great Hall of St. George in the Kremlin under the television lights is the reality of that promise in 1968 in Miami Beach of the end of the era of confrontation and the beginnings of the era of negotiation. And this for a president seeking re-election in

was sent into the Bay of Bengal. The People's Republic of China seems to have been America's only ally in a propaganda barrage.

Cotton Pickin' Memory

Associated Press Writer Push your bucket of bolts along the highway through Sinton in South Texas and you parallel the railroad for a ways. Not long ago, five of the most

beautiful objects created by man were sitting there on a flat car on a siding. OH, THE GREAT architect Frank Lloyd Wright wouldn't have thought

But Frank Lloyd Wright never picked cotton or pulled bolls on a West Texas farm, as far as we know.

them remarkably aesthetic. For these five marvels mechanical cotton pickers.

As far as we are concerned, there is no labor in the world more horrendous than picking cotton by hand, although the job of chaff boy for the now-forgotten grain thrashers came a close second.

The cotton picker - human, not mechanical - started with a sack that seemed 20 feet long and three feet across.

THE OBJECT was to crawl down the rows of cotton, yanking the fiber out of the boll and stuffing it in the

When you filled the sack, which in this column's case was seldom,

you dragged it or carried it to the Someone there would weigh it,

record how much the picker had plucked, and climb into the wagon

and empty the sack. The reason the picker wasn't allowed to empty his own sack was

because of a little trickery some workers tried to get away with. This strategem was to pick up a

lot of stones and drop them in the sack. They weighed a lot. And they were easier to find than the cotton bolls on some farms. ONE ROCK in the sack was an

understandable accident. Two and you got fired. It was a fraud of sorts although not nearly as profitable as bank embezzlement.

The pickers started work as soon

as there was enough light to see the plants. Within minutes their fingers were sore from the sharp ends of

Halfway down the row, all the skin was gone from the knees. You could buy leather knee pads at the hardware store for \$1.49. But that was a week's pay for an inept cotton picker and couldn't even be dreamed

the bolls which were like knives.

When the skin left the knees, the picker would stand up and bend down to the plants. Shortly the worker's back felt like it was broken.

one ever really decided which hurt worst - the skinless knees or the broken back.

And that West Texas sun is like

a furnace. Pickers were paid by the "hundred" meaning pounds picked. This varied in our day from 25 cents in the Depression to \$1 in better times perhaps \$1.50 if the farmer was desperate to find workers.

There were stories of \$3 a hundred, but that was in the post-World War I days when pickers made so much money they wore hand-made boots and silk shirts to the cotton patch.

Cotton brought a high price. There also were stories of giants of the fields who could pick 1,000 pounds a day. But for a youngster a poor worker and reluctant

anyway - a hundred pounds in 12 or 16 hours was an impossible goal. THE FIRST mechanical cotton

pickers were called "sleds," and that's what they were. They were homemade centrivances

on runners. At the front was a "V" connected to a small bin in the rear. With such dirty cotton, the gins had to be improved so that they could clean it.

This gin improvement allowed workers to "pull bolls," in later times because the gins now could clean cotton that dirty. The picker simply broke off the boll and put it and its lint into his sack. This was slightly easier work -

but only fractionally less murderous and farmers paid less per hundred.
