Cosden Announces Big Addition To Its Plant

New Facility Will **Upgrade Products**

Big Spring, Texas (79720), Wednesday, February 2, 1972

Cosden Oil & Chemical Company took the wraps off plans for a major new addition to its Big Spring plant

Paul D. Meek, president, announced that the facility, will be a catalytic reformer and feed desulphurization unit which will be a major step toward reduction or removal of lead alkyls from motor gasoline.

He made the announcement at a luncheon Wednesday noon at Big Spring Country Club, and which was attended by top Cosden officials, representatives from

Fish Engineering & Construction, Inc. which will design and build the facility, and a number of community leaders.

No price tag was put on the addition, but Meek said it represented a substantial capital investment.

CONSTRUCTION FORCE Some idea of the scope came in remarks by Don Simecheck. president of Fish Engineering. He said that during peak construction around 250 to 300 people will be required on the The construction payroll alone will approximate a million dollars. The project is due to move into the field stage about the middle of April. The operational target is by the end of 1972. The new unit will be located

The reforming technology will be licensed from Engelhard Minerals & Chemicals Corporation. The facility will be erected on a site adjacent to Cosden's modern two-stage crude unit, and will replace the two existing reformers.

CHICAGO (AP) - Firemen removed the bodies of four children from the ruins of a day care center on the South Side early today, bringing the death toll of a fire there to six.

The center's operator Lillian Jones, 41, was injured slightly in the fire. Authorities said Mrs. Jones was licensed by the state to operate the center on the second floor of the building. but not in the basement where the bodies were found.

Quality studies on the entire Colorado River basin will be accelerated, O. H. Ivie, general manager of the Colorado River Water District, said on his return from a statewide meeting in Austin Tuesday.

The study must be completed by July 1, 1973, said Ivie, and have the stamp of approval of the Environmental Protection Agency upon it in order for cities in the basin to qualify for federal grants on sewage plant construction.

The immediate hurdle is to present information by Feb. 15 to the Federal Bureau of the Budget in order to free appropriations made for the study. Purpose of the study is to assemble information on quality of the flow in the Colorado River, and to make recommendations of how the flow (and that of streams into the river) can be controlled to bring the water up to EPA standards. The Texas Water Development board, the Texas Water Control Board and the Texas Water Rights Commission will have to approve the final

International Headache For **United States**

EL PASO, Tex .(AP) - A soldier from Nationalist China seeking political asylum declined Tuesday to return to Taiwan with 25 other members of his unit leaving Ft. Bliss and created an international headache for the United States.

Lt. San-Yen Lee conferred with immigration officials here and asked that his status be changed so he could enter this country and be considered outside the Chinese quota and take permanent residence.

Immigration officials told him it would be 45 days before a determination could be made. Other's in Lee's group left as scheduled. They have been at the El Paso Army post for guided missile instruction.

In Washington, Defense Department officials concerned with the matter and State Department representatives acknowledged that this created 'a very tough problem for us,' the El Paso Times reported.

During the next 45 days President Nixon will be making his heralded visit to the mainland Chinese Peoples Republic. Officials said that from the White House down, the attitude of this government is "of a general move toward rapprochement," the El Paso Newspaper

IRS Hoping More Taxpayers Will Fill Out Own Returns

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Internal Revenue Service is pushing a do-it-yourself movement among the nation's taxpayers in hopes that more will fill out their own returns this

IRS officials say they expect a decline in the number of taxpayers who use professional accounting services to fill out their returns for them. Commissioner Johnnie M. Walters said he hopes at least 30 million people can fill out their own returns this year. IRS says there is no reason a

taxpayer who earned under \$20,000 a year, most of it in salaries and wages, should pay a company to fill out his return. "We have stressed the fact

that it's simple enough," Walters said, "The instructions and the illustrated examples in the tax booklet make filling out a return simple."

In a number of cases, the commissioner said, taxpayers

who take the standard deduction have paid to get their return filed. He said the return is so simple that if a standard deduction is involved "your daughter in the fifth grade can

fill it out this year.' Walters cited the case of a Florida man who paid \$85 to get his return filled out last year when the simple one-page Form 1040 was involved and the man took the standard deduction.

The IRS has taken steps to eliminate abuses traced to errors by professional tax preparers. Walters said a number of sanctions are being considered against such companies, such as extending the negligence penalty to cover persons who prepared returns for money and requiring preparers to keep copies of all returns for at least three years.

The IRS has put into effect this year a system allowing an automatic two-month extension of the April 17 filing deadline for taxpayers.

Under this rule, a taxpayer must make a tentative estimate of the tax he owes, fill out an application for extension, and pay the estimated tax by the deadline. He can file his tax return two months later so long as he pays interest on any additional amounts due. If he has underestimated his tax bill by 10 per cent, he must pay an additional 6-per-cent penalty.

Composer Dies

HONOLULU (AP) - Ray Kinney, 71, who entertained Hawaii and the nation for more than a half-century with his songs about the islands, died Monday. Kinney composed his most popular song, "Across the Sea," as a 15-year-old vaudevillian. He later sang with bandleader Harry Owens, and made nearly 600 recordings.

Navy's New **Brain Storm**

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) - The navy has launched a study to determine whether electrical brain waves, as measured by electroencephalogram (EEG), can help predict the fu-

ture performance of recruits. Since such a system would not depend on language "it would help eliminate bias in evaluating Navy recruits who are drawn from a widely different cultural background," said a spokesman from the Office of Naval Research, founder of the program.

He said the Naval Personnel and Training Research Laboratory at San Diego, in cooperation with the Langley Porter Neuropsychiatric Institute in San Francisco, has started testing a sample group.


The members of this group, who have also been given conventional pen-and-paper aptitude tests, will then be monitored for the next several years to determine whether the EEG has been accurate in predicting success or failure, the spokesman said.

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

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Proceed With Caution

Our naval experts are watching with intense interest these days the construction of a Soviet ship in the Nikolayev shipyards on the Black Sea. Reconnaissance satellite pictures suggest it is a ship of around 30,000 tons, perhaps an aircraft carrier, or maybe a tanker.

This is the realization by other means of the "open skies" proposal made to an unsympathetic Russia by President Eisenhower. It suggests the spectacular advancement in the art of aerial photography and photo interpretation since World War II. Then, photographs taken from altitudes of less than 30,000 feet could reveal to a photo interpreter the exact stage of reconstruction or repair of a ship damaged in action.

Now from altitudes of 100 miles or more, cameras with lenses of almost incredible resolution can reveal the so-called secrets of any country. They betray the presence of a nuclear energy facility, railroads, pipelines (no matter how long they have been buried), power lines, power stations and other vital installations.

This new technology is not without its

problems, though. If, as some suspect (even hope), the ship is a carrier, then the arguments for building more carriers for our Navy will be bolstered. But before we embark on another carrier program we should be very sure what the role of the carrier in future warfare will be. Hopefully, the argument that is likely to arise in Congress will define that

It cannot really be said that the war in Vietnam has redefined the role of carriers in warfare. Our carriers have operated so efficiently in the waters off Vietnam only because we have had practically absolute mastery of the skies in that area. We should not pretend that we could operate with such impunity against a first-rate air power, such as the Soviet Union.


Has the missile age doomed the carrier, just as World War II doomed the battleship? The answer should be given before we proceed on any carrier building program.

Looking Ahead

Atomic power is coming to America. Europe has taken the lead in reactors generating power for civilian use. Debate in the U.S. has slowed construction of plants in America and now a pertinent point has been raised in federal district court in Washington to strip the Atomic Energy Commission of its regulatory authority.

It is important for appropriate regulation to be insured, of course, because atomic energy has become a hotly-controversial issue. Regulation has to be made on the basis of objective assessment of hazards as well as all the positive results of using the energy source for peaceful purposes.

There is some emotion involved in the debate, to be sure. But looking ahead is good business because our scientists seldom say "if," but



WASHINGTON - A movement has Geneva Accords developed in Congress to demonstrate to the world that the legislators and the people are behind President Nixon in his Vietnam negotiation policy. Efforts are being made to secure signatures to petitions which will tell the North Vietnamese that the administration does reflect the will of the country in its proposals for peace.

SECRETARY OF State William Rogers feels that the United States has shown a flexibility which ought to attract the Hanoi government to a settlement such as Mr. Nixon has outlined. America has promised that there will be a complete withdrawal of our troops within six months after an agreement has been reached with North Vietnam for a cease-fire, a release of prisoners and a free election in South Vietnam.

This, after all, is the "definite date" which North Vietnam has been calling for and which critics of the President's policies have been urging for a long time. Now that the details of the President's program have been set forth and the whole world knows that virtually every objection hitherto raised has been met, there is an optimistic feeling here that Hanoi, upon reflection, will find acceptance of the Nixon formula is the only way to move forward in the whole situa-

THE BELIEF prevails that North Vietnam, while seeming to reject the American plan, is actually seeking ways to bring about an international conference on Indo-China which could assure future stability. The conference idea was not included in the President's eight-point program but has been formally proposed to Hanoi's representatives on previous occasions. The setup would be a group of nations such as participated in the 1954

IT HAS been disclosed also that the United States is offering to contribute \$7.5 billion dollars over a fiveyear period toward the reconstruction and rehabilitation of war-torn Indochina, including \$2.5 billion for North Vietnam. Certainly that nation has suffered from the many years of war, and the people are in need of relief. The Hanoi government could hardly turn down a project which would bring help to the civilian population and start the country on a rebuilding process which it could not possibly do by itself.

The long war has left much devastation in the cities as well as in the rural districts throughout Indochina. Money is going to be needed for the people of the whole region to begin a new life. Humanitarian motives rather than military ambitions would be the dominant factors in the policies of the countries which render aid.

THERE IS everyindication that the people of South Vietnam do not want to be ruled by the Communists and that, in any election which may be held, they will so express themselves. But while America makes its attitude clear and shows that its objective is to assist the people of Indochina, it obably will be several months before a final decision is reached by the North Vietnamese.

If the members of Congress who have been critical of the Vietnam War were to cast aside their differences and unite in backing the President, this would have a telling effect on the rest of the world. It certainly would notify the Soviet Union, for example, that the United States remains committed to help small countries maintain their independence and especially to defend the principle of the right of self-determination. Comes a note from my fan (?) and admirer (??), "A Satisfied Subscriber and Ardent Reader of the Herald with an Honest Gripe, to wit:

"BEING A citizen of this community and a subscriber to the paper . . . I feel it is a duty to make known my disappointment in you as well as many others feel. I believe you should heed to a little bit of good advice to you as an editor of this community's paper, that in due fairness to all involved in the hospital controversy involving the project at hand — It would certainly seem only very fair to the Editor to keep his private opinion to himself, and not disclose what he personally might feel or believe, and certainly not publish anything that would favor any decisions that really should be made for the good of all citizens.

"YOU PROBABLY would reply that this is the freedom of the news media. But may I say this is one of our greatest problems at hand in this wonderful country of ours. The press and news media have gotten out of control. Countries that do not have such a great freedom of the press as here seem to have much less problems to disclose to the rest of the world . . . We as a nation would certainly be far better off, if some of the news was restricted.

"Why not wait until we can build a new community hospital if this is what all the citizens want and need — one that is not in connection with anyone of the present hospitals in operation . . . and not let just a few of the most prominent and wealthy ones make a decision for the whole

THERE YOU have it. I confess we have a fundamental difference. I contend that anyone - private citizen, Satisfied Reader, editor, official, housewife - has not only a right to an opinion but the right to express it. I certainly didn't take the veil because I took up the quill. There is one point of agreement - that countries which do not have "freedom of the press as here seem to have much less problems to disclose to the rest of the world." From

what I have observed and can learn, they have far deeper problems which literally kill the human spirit or life, yet which are never disclosed to the outside world. This is why many deluded souls think Russia may be an Utopia.

NO, I GIVE to every person the abundant right to disagree with me, to say so; I also reserve for myself the privilege of making up my own mind as others have a right to do for themselves.

I am flattered to be classed among the "most prominent and wealthy, since I shared in decisions regarding a new hospital. I wish my family and friends would take note of the former, and my creditors the latter. Yet, I happen to be one of those who believe that the time has come for someone to take the initiative to perpetuate what our doctors and our hospitals have established here in creating a tradition of fine medical service. I yield to no man in my respect and admiration for doctors of all clinics and hospitals, and I don't see any basic conflicts.

THE POINT IS, as I see it, that tomorrow's medicine is a different ball game, especially when it comes to hospitals. They will have to be big enough to justify and support the frightfully expensive core facilities and technical equipment which will be required in special if not ordinary treatments. I don't think a town can go beyond its medical facilities any more than it can go beyond its water

All I want is to see my town and county have the chance to have that hospital where all qualified doctors are welcome to serve their patients. To me, the price tag of yielded taxes (not even considering that such a hospital likely will generate more revenue than it is forgiven) seems small. Somewhere there may be an angel to supply it with a magic touch, but until that angel appears, I don't know any more practical (or economical) way to do it.

BUT THERE, I've gone and given my opinion, for which I hope my reader will indulge me.

HOUSTON (AP) - The manager of an industrial incinerator here said he will fight he scuttling by the Texas Air Control Board of an Air Force olan to burn 2.3 million gallons of a herbicide which has been inked to birth defects.

Herschel L. Scott, plant man ager for Rollns-Purle, Inc. said he will seek a meeting with Charles R. Barden, execu ive secretary of the air board. Over the weekend Barden

said that his staff, in a switch from an earlier position, had decided not to give the Air Force permission to contract to burn the herbicide, Agent Orange, in the incinerator on the Houston Ship Channel. The Air Force had used

Agent Orange to defoliate trees in South Vietnam to deny cover to Viet Cong troops. But they stopped using the chemical aft er it was discovered that the herbicide caused birth defects tests on laboratory animals. Scott said Monday, "We're

going to be arguing with that guy (Barden) because we think was a kind of haphazard statement for him to make. We still have hopes of getting involved in this if it is decided the herbicide has to be destroved.'

Barden said his staff believed the burning of the Agent Orange might further complicate Houston's not inconsiderable air pollution problems.

The Air Force said in an environmental statement that the chemical, when burned, would decompose into carbon dioxide and hydrogen chloride, which in turn would be converted into common salt and discharged into the ship channel.

Barden said Monday he is advising the Air Force that its environmental statement does not conclusively show it is feasible to burn such a large amount of herbicide.


