The mass-transit feature of the legislation would furnish federal subsidies to pay deficits of subways, bus lines and commuter trains.

Police said the boy dragged his mother outside and called police, but she was dead when they arrived. They have listed the death as ac-



Ballard Must Die In Electric Chair

ALPINE, Tex. (AP) — Convicted murderer Witmer Jean Ballard must die in the electric chair as punishment for the shotgun slaying of Glasscock County rancher Stephen Currie, a jury said Friday.

Appeal in such cases is auto-

The jury conferred for nearly three hours before deciding on the punishment, twice the time they took to decide their ver-

"It is now therefore the judgment of the court that you are guilty of murder with malice aforethought and your punishment is death," Dist. Court Judge Charles E. Sherrill told the accused

Ballard was ordered removed from Brewster County jail here and transferred to the city jail in Midland.

The 46-year-old defendant received the punishment decree with little visible emotion and then rose and told the jury he wanted to thank them for the time and consideration they extended in his case. "I am not guilty of this

crime," he added. The eight men and four wom-

en comprised the jury delivered their guilty verdict Wednesday night after an eight-day trial and testimony from 31 wit-

ALPINE — A jury comprised of four women and eight men Thursday evening convicted Whitmer Jean Ballard of murder with malice in the shotgun slaying of Stephen Currie, Glasscock County rancher.

One hour and 35 minutes after receiving the case, the jury returned its verdict. Thursday evening, after retiring to deliberate his punishment, the panel retired for the night. The state had asked the death

penalty.

CHARGE LEVELED Ballard, who the state contended was the trigger man in the murder-robbery at the Currie home east of Garden City Dec. 2, 1970, was found guilty 14 months to the day after Currie was killed resisting an intruder into his home.

The defense, led by Bobby Bearden, Midland, contended that Ballard was the victim of a cruel frame to protest kin of state witnesses. This, countered Guilford Jones. special prosecutor, was the product of "Bobby Bearden's

BECAME IMPATIENT

As workers sank a 30-foot rescue shaft adjacent to the hole in which Anthony was trapped, Dr. William Baker of El Monte talked with him through a stethescope extended on plastic tubing. Oxygen was pumped to within inches of Anthony's face.

At one point, authorities said, Anthony apparently became impatient and said he would dig himself out if workers didn't hurry.

Attempts to lower volunteers, including a 4-foot jockey, into the hole to Anthony proved unsuccessful. One volunteer was able to touch the boy but couldn't pry him loose because he was too tightly wedged.

The boy fell backwards into the opening, landing with one foot down and the other up. His head was jammed against the knee of the upright leg.

The boy was pulled to safety after workers drilled the rescue shaft about eight feet from the hole in which he was trapped. Then they dug under the hole. Anthony dropped into the arms of workman Frank Dill, who handed him up to a sheriff's

Anthony tumbled into the hole at about 5:20 p.m. A worker at the site said he saw the youth fall and rescue efforts began immediately. Huge bits ripped into the

sandy soil as other rescue workers rigged a crane over the hole. At nightfall the area was flooded with lights from several portable generating plants.

Officials said the hole was one of several being drilled for concrete bridge pilings. The road project is to make way for a Southern California Rapid Transit busline on the San Bernardino freeway.

'UNDERSTANDING'

Sharp Gave His 'Blessing' To Bank Loans

ABILENE, Tex. (AP) - "I smiled and be smiled," Houston promoter Frank Sharp told a jury today in recounting a meeting in a Houston hotel at which he said House Speaker Gus Mutscher at which he said House Speaker Gus Mutscher said he might buy stock in a company controlled

Sharp said Mutscher told him of reversals in the stock market and then asked about stock in the Sharp-controlled firm, National Bankers Life Insurance Co.

STRONG HANDS

Sharp said he told Mutscher he was "very enthusiastic" about it and that the management of the firm was trying to get the stock "into strong hands, people of wealth who would keep it."

Sharp said he gave his "blessing" to loans by his bank to Mutscher and others to buy the stock. He said Mutscher called him six weeks later, Sept. 12, 1969, and said he wanted to sell

Sharp testified that Mutscher said he was 'pleased" to report that banking bills sought by Sharp had won a large majority of votes in the Texas legislature. Sharp, 65, a tall, grandfatherly man with a

slightly pained expression, strummed his fingers as he vainly sought to remember exact dates. He wears a copper bracelet on his left wrist and told a newsman, "I have not had rheumatism in that hand since I put it on a year ago."

Sharp testified before the House General Investigating Committee last year that he reached the "understanding" with Mutscher in early July

According to Sharp's former testimony, Mutscher told him in the Rice Hotel that Mutscher had lost heavily on stock market investments that Sharp had tipped him on.

OLD SUBJECT Sharp says he then brought up an eld subject between the two: banking legislation that Sharp wanted. And he mentioned another stock - an insurance company he controlled - that Mutscher

Mutscher, Rep. Rommy Shannon of Fort Worth and Mutscher's aide Rush McGinty all bought stock on July 28, 1969, with money borrowed from Sharp's bank. They sold most of the stock at huge profits on Sept. 11 that year, two days after the banking bills Sharp wanted won approval in the

The state says Mutscher, Shannon and McGinty conspired to accept a bribe from Sharp in exchange for their influence on the Texas Legislature.

BRILLIANT LAWYER The state opened its case Thursday with testimony from another Mutscher aide, F. C. "Sonny" Schulte, who also bought and sold the stock on the same day the defendants did. Schulte said he made a profit of \$17,362 on the month-anda-half investment. "At any time was anything sought to be hidden or anything not open and aboveboard?" asked a defense lawyer.

"Absolutely not," Schulte said. The defense frequently objected to the prosecution's questions of Sharp which the defense said assumed facts not yet in evidence.

"I know this man, and he's a brilliant lawyer," protested Frank Maloney, pointing to Travis Austin County District Attorney Bob Smith. "There's no sense in his being coy. He knows how to ask the



PROSTITUTES' PHOTOS DISPLAY DRAWS PICKETS

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) - The University of California Art Museum agreed to close for one day a display of prostitutes' photographs after the exhibit was picketed by women's liberationists.

Ellen Sandor, national secretary of the National Organization of Women, and about a dozen other women marched outside the museum Wednesday where the E. J. Bellocq photographs, showing prostitutes of 1912 in various stages of dress and undress, are on display. Museum official Bonnie Baskin said, "They are beautiful-

some of them appear the way your grandmother would have as a young girl.

"These pictures are about as lascivious as a dog food ad," she added. Bellocq, of French origin and believed to have died in 1938, photographed the girls in New Orleans brothels.

Most are fully clothed, naturally posed with flowers and pets, but some are nudes. The demonstrators said they perpetuated the degregation and exploitation of women.

"Why don't you have any photos of the male buyers?" yelled one of the demonstrators. Miss Baskin consulted with other museum officials and agreed to post the demonstrators' letter of protest next to the display, and to close it on March 8, which is In-

'New Morality': Tax Break For Singles?

Whatever else marriage is, it's no longer a guaranteed tax

In fact, at most income levels it's cheaper for two working people who earn about the same income to stay single than to get married and file joint returns. New changes in the tax law, which were adopted to relieve the long-time burden of single taxpayers, are unwittingly favoring the "new morality" of living together or the old morality of only one working partner.

Fro instance, an unmarried man and woman each earned \$12,500 in 1971. Taking the standard deduction and one exemption each, each will pay \$2,177.75 in tax this April—for a combined total of \$4,355.50. If they were married and filed a joint return, they would pay \$5,068—or \$712.50 more.

Of course, it's only a bargain when the earnings of two singles equal the total earnings of one married couple. An unattached bachelor earning that \$25,000 all by himself, for instance, will pay \$6,320 in federal taxes this April.

The situation isn't a drastic change from years past-just a general levelling off of payments which makes the single pay a little less than before. As a result, married couples pay slightly more in relation to two singles with approximately equal earnings.

It's all due to the government's effort to give a break to singles—like that \$25,000-a-year bachelor-who have long paid the highest tax rates in the na-

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 reduced the rates for singles, who used to pay as much as 40 per cent more than marrieds, so they now pay only up to 20 per cent more. These changes, taken with the raise in the standard deduction to \$1,500, all finally effective over a threeyear period, are making it look as if the government favors a pair of unwed workers over those who are married.

It is a surprise even to the government which was merely responding to years of pressure from the nation's divorced, bachelor and widowed taxpayers.





Heath's Big Burden

The British miners surrounded issues being decided in England Westminster recently chanting "We today. want a yacht," to the tune of "Farmer in the Dell," and it is at this level that the fight goes on in England; a titanic fight, the implications of which are to say the least far-reaching. Concerning which, a few observations:

1. "THE PEOPLE" are mad at Edward Heath, the Prime Minister. Mad at him because, taking the measure of the European situation, he called for the entry of Great Britain into the Common Market. It was overwhelmingly the judgment of after, was most consipcuously the nation's leaders that that was what England ought to do. It was what Harold Wilson had recommended that England should do.

But after de Gaulle's rejection of England, which damaged national pride; and after the scare-stories the little-island Englanders circulated, which frightened the general public, the polls began to show an overshelming majority of the British people opposed to the Common Market. Even so, Edward Heath prevailed. And in doing so, brought with him a huge bloc of Labour M.P.'s, nothwithstanding the teriversation of Harold Wilson who, smelling political advantage, reversed

himself and opposed the Market. 2. EDWARD HEATH is a quite unusual political leader. He is not given to public coziness. When he delivers a speech, one has the impression that he hires ghost-writers to remove from it every hint of grace, humor, or eloquence. He is utterly straightforward - indeed rather shabbily eloquent, the way a voice can be in a cavernous airport announcing ho-hummily the imminent departure of the next flight. The English are not much used to such matter-of-factness in a Prime Minister. Edward Heath's departure from a style of government which demands of the chief executive theatrical patronage, is among the

3. THE ISSUE INVOLVED is a 25 per cent raise. That is what the miners want. And their demands are made on the basis, with which it is hard to be less than sympathetic, that theirs is a tough, grubby, dangerous occupation. There comes to mind, instantly, "How Green Was My Valley"; and, indeed, it is principally around the coal miners that the whole mystique of British unionism grows; it was the coal miners whose condition, in the last century and even

4. CLEARLY, EDWARD Heath has waited for public sentiment to turn his way. Cold is a physical pain, and it is cold that the whole of England has now experienced, several hours a day. The impalpable factor is the demoralization of an economy that has been fast abuilding in the past couple of years, accumulating healthy dollar surpluses, attracting investments: a quite convincing recuperation

But Edward Heath and every responsible Englishman realize that the power of labor unions to cause work stoppages, to impose secondary boycotts, to frustrate efficiency, has got to be checked once and for all. To this end, a piece of legislation has been painstakingly crafted, but is not yet on the books. The special despair comes from the suspicion that even if it were, it would prove unenforceable, like all those antistrike laws in New York State, which militant labor union leaders eat for

AND IF HEATH goes down on this one, and England returns to inflation, work-strikes, bureaucratic unionism, demagogic leadership, then not even the relative strength of her fellow members in the European Market

To avoid any seeming violation of the regulations of the International Whaling Commission, the Japanese, according to the testimony of Roger Payne, a marine biologist who is an authority on whales, are putting their whaling ships under flags of other nations that are not members of the com-

I am a woman, and have been asked to teach a Sunday School class, but I read in the Bible that the Apostle Paul told women to "keep silent in the church." Do you think it is wrong for a woman to take a place of leadership in the church?

The Apostle Paul was speaking to a group of women who were lacking in good judgment and humility, the women of Corinth. This exhortation was written to them specifically, and not to women in general. There were women prophets in the Old Testament, and many women were active in the church in the New Testament. Paul wrote in Romans: "Greet Priscilla and Aquila, my helpers in Jesus Christ." Romans 16:3. He also wrote: "I commend unto you Phebe

our sister, which is a servant of the church . . ." Romans 16:1. He also said: "There is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ." Galatians 3:28. Eve was equally responsible with

Adam for the first sin, and women should be allowed to fight sin just like men. They, along with men, have "sinned and come short of the glory of God", and there is no reason why they cannot witness to the saving power of Christ, and help in the ministries of the church.
