PHEASANT HEARING

Farmers Object To 30-Day Event

AHH, SPRINGTIME! The favorite season of the year, at least in most parts of the world, but in the Panhandle of Texas, it is perhaps the strangest season of the year.

For instance, this week we have encountered one of our old time "dusters," with winds blowing up to 60 miles per hour on one day, and then the next day was no doubt as nice from a weather standpoint as was enjoyed anywhere in our nation.

Then again, we sometimes have, and could yet this year experience, a late blizzard, complete with driving snow, howling wind, etc.

Of course, there are the early spring thunderstorms, which can even produce a tornado threat...we wouldn't want to leave this type of weather out of our inventory of usual spring meteorology on the High Plains.

You have to admit, the weather isn't monotonous in West Texas this time of year. Someone once said regarding our weather in these parts "If you don't like the weather, just stay awhile: it's bound to change before long." And that statement is never truer than during the spring.

We have often thought that the high school track teams should schedule their various meets for the "Week of March 16," for example, rather than picking out a definite date. Then, on the morning during the week which dawns bright and sunny, with no wind stirring, get on the phone and "firm up" the meet, and just have it that day. Otherwise, you're looking at anything from blizzard to dust storms, and sometimes, "all of the above" in one day.

But...we wouldn't trade it for Paris in the spring. We don't have to worry about hurricanes in this part of the country. And floods rarely ever happen. You can seek shelter when you get a storm warning, but what do you do to avoid an earthquake? We'll just keep what we have.

A large crowd attended the hearing sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Farwell Monday, dealing with the proposed season for pheasants for 1980.

The season is scheduled at present to be the same as it was for last year, a month in duration.

Speaking on the subject, County Commissioner and Parmer County Game Assn. official Jack Patterson said "I don't know who recommended this, or what the purpose of the longer season was, but most of our people are opposed to it."

"We first began with a two-day season, and this was later increased to a seven-day season, and later to a nine-day season, and from that to a 16-day season, until last year it was increased to a 30-day season."

"I think this is getting too long. The bag limit has remained at two per day."

"We feel that our season should have remained short, and our bag limit increased. We have friends who come in from Central Texas,

Houston, Georgia, etc., and those hunters would rather have an increased bag limit than a longer season."

"We're farmers, and we graze a lot of our stubble. So far, there has been good relations between our farmers and the hunters, until this 30-day season came along. Our cattle are going to be harassed during this longer season. It is getting to be a sore spot."

"I plan to do everything in my power as a commissioner, if they continue to put this 30-day pheasant season on us, to have this county pulled out of the regulatory commission. I feel that the other commissioners feel this way, too," he said.

Patterson explained how the pheasants were introduced into Parmer County, purchased by landowners and nurtured. "They did not migrate out of Kansas and Nebraska, as one of the biologists has said. Why, one of their bunch told us when we first started that pheasants would not live in this area," Patterson said.

Others speaking included Leroy Johnson of the Hub area. "I'm a hunter. I like to hunt as well as anyone. But I think the people who bought the pheasants and put them in this county ought to have some say as to the length of the season. Thirty days is too long to be harassed by hunters. I would like to see it changed back to two weeks, or 16 days, and two birds limit," Johnson said.

One who testified explained that it was unfair to farmers to expect them to keep their land undisturbed for the 30 day period, in case they needed to work it.

Another speaker brought out the increased cost to the state by having to enforce the game laws for the extended season, as there are extra game officials in the area during that time.

No one who testified at the hearing spoke in favor of the 30-day season.

There was no indication as to whether or not the extended season might be changed. The hearings are to be held throughout the area, in each county in the regulatory commission.

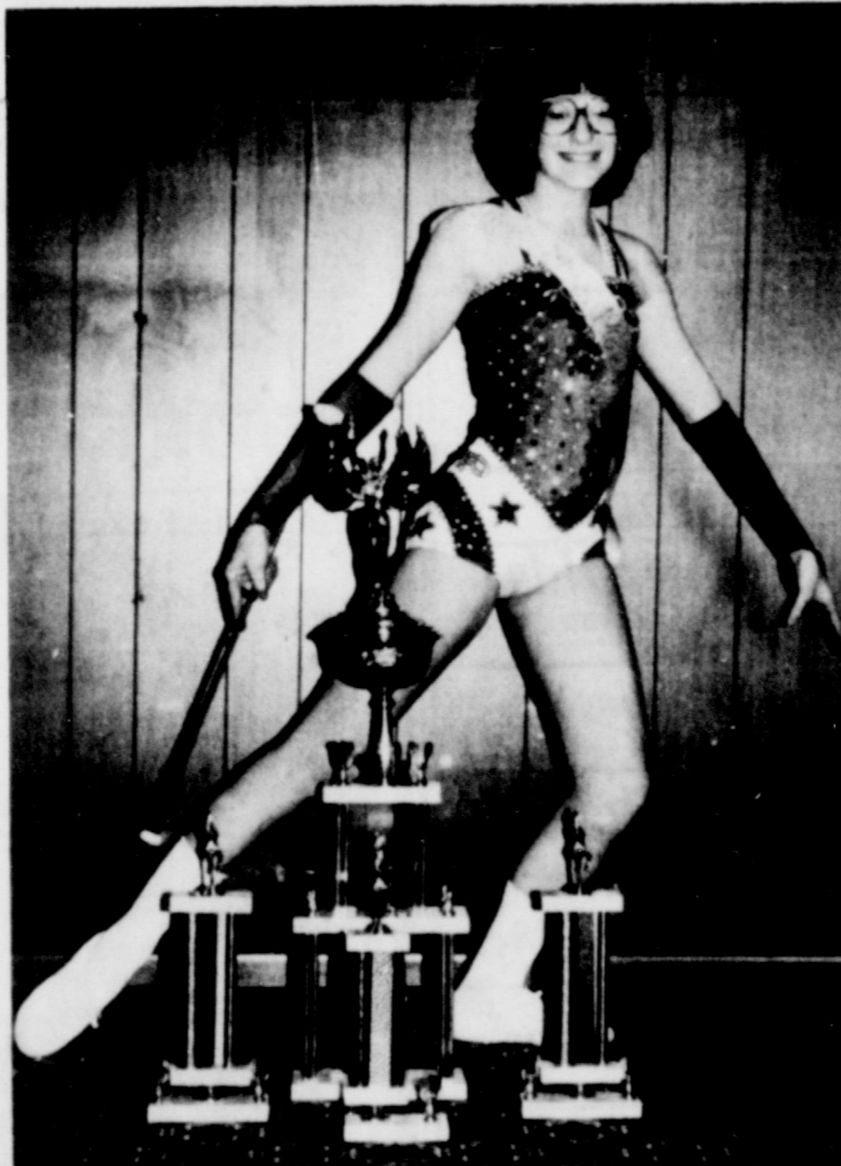
Admission is free, and the public is invited.

Meeting Charts Hwy 60 Work

A planning meeting was held Monday in Friona by interested parties involved in the Highway 60 resurfacing project, which is scheduled to begin soon.

Demo Committee Meets Here Mon.

The Parmer County Democratic Committee will meet at 2 p.m. Monday at the Community Room of the Friona State Bank.

Purpose of the meeting is to draw for position on the Democratic Primary ballot. The public is invited to attend, says H.H. Horton, Jr., County Democratic chairman.

The work will involve removing the medians from the streets in the cities of Friona and Bovina, and resurfacing the highway from Farwell to Summerfield.

The removal of the medians is expected to begin in Bovina around May 1. The same work will be done in Friona around mid-May.

All work on the highway will be done in "half widths," with traffic routed through the construction area using half of the existing road.

For the resurfacing of the highway, Bert Borsberry, contractor, said there would be three types of underseal used. From Summerfield to Friona the project will use the new fabric underseal by Monsanto. From Friona

City Tables SPS Rate Hike Matter

Discussion of the proposed rate increase by Southwestern Public Service Company for residents of Friona was the main item of business at the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night.

Mayor B.K. Buske went over the increase proposal in a line by line manner with SPS' Friona manager, Bill Wilshire, who also answered questions from members of the council.

Wilshire stated that the increased cost of material, labor and capital were the main reason for the rate increase request.

Following the discussion, a motion was passed to suspend the rate increase for 120 days, to give the council to further study the matter.

A request by T.W. Dunaway, to site a mobile home behind the Kerr-McGee service station was approved. Dunaway is the manager of the station.

Ordinance 539, which would continue to list private automobiles for taxation on the 1980 tax roll, was approved.

The council also discussed at length the proposed increase of rates by General Telephone Company, in which both residential and commercial rates would increase by at least 100 per cent. It was approved to pay the city's share, or \$534.75 to the Texas Municipal League's steering committee, to fight the proposed increase.

A bid of \$5,250.00 was approved from Herring Implement Company for the purchase of a new tractor-mower for the city's park department. It was explained that the city's old tractor and mower were approximately ten years old.

A proposal to increase the trash collection rates for grocery stores was discussed. The matter was deferred for the time being, with the city attorney instructed to draw up an amendment to the city's trash ordinance to provide for additional charge for grocery stores.

City Manager Jake Outland

explained that the stores have been receiving daily trash pickup, and their charge has been \$20 per month in the past. Additional pickups have been necessary in some instances.

Discussion was held on the possibilities of improvements at the municipal swimming pool, relative to the dressing room facility. Action was postponed until members of the council can personally inspect the pool.

Teachers contracts were the main topic on the agenda at the regular meeting of the Friona School Board this past Monday night.

Jimmy Pope, head basketball coach at FHS who had a year left on a two-year contract, resigned his position and plans to go into private business. Assistant Coach Robert Mears also requested not to be considered for a new contract.

Earlier, head football coach Lonnie Phillips had resigned, and high school principal Raymond Cook indicated to the board that he would retire at the end of the term after 31 years with the local system.

Other than these, all teachers in the system were offered new contracts for the 1980-81 school term.

50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 21, 1930
Mr. Scovell, local manager of the West Texas Gas Company at Hereford, was in town Thursday afternoon and paid the Star office a brief visit. He stated that the company was then unloading three carloads of gas pipes here for use in the Friona mains, and expects that work of laying it will be started within a very short time.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 22, 1940
Earl Prather of Friona showed the grand champion fat pig in the sixth annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show in Friona Saturday of last week. Other winners included: sow and litter--Burl Beene, Friona; bred or open sow--Edwin Foster, Oklahoma Lane; bred gilt--Keith Blackburn, Friona; fat calves--Stacy Queen, Bovina; junior heifer--Charles D. Julian, Lazbuddie.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1945
Funeral services for E.B. Black, pioneer businessman for the area, were conducted in Hereford Tuesday. Black, 78, was a pioneer of this area, and he is the one for which the Black Community is named.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 17, 1950
Ground-breaking ceremonies for Friona's newest building were held Sunday. Mrs. J.N. Messenger,

charter member of the First Baptist Church, turned the first shovel full of dirt to mark the beginning of the construction of the \$70,000 auditorium of the church. D.H. Meade, Amarillo, and Clyde Hayes also participated. Meade is also a charter member. Hayes is chairman of the board of deacons. Special music was provided. Some 150 persons enjoyed "dinner on the ground."

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 18, 1955
Announcement of several transactions and building plans for Main Street were made in Friona this week. James Mabry negotiated for two lots across from Piggly Wiggly, and plans to begin construction within two weeks of an ultra-modern office building on the property.

The Carl Maurer property on the corner north of the Marcum-Claborn Funeral Home this week was contracted to Kenneth Williams, who is planning a small retail business, probably of the drive-in eating type establishment.

Wright Williams, owner of the property between Gib's Cleaners and Plains Hardware on the east side of Main Street yesterday disclosed intention of beginning construction of a 50x100 retail building, to be rented to a department store. No tenant has been announced.

20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 17, 1960
Hot-shooting Buna killed the hopes of the Friona Squaws for a state basketball championship last Friday in Austin, as the Squaws fell, 66-63 in the finals of the state tournament. Hitting a phenomenal 84 per cent of their shots, the Buna team went into the final quarter leading, 57-40. Ball-hawking by Lawana Houlette and shooting by Jacquelyn Magness turned a 66-51 score into 66-63 within three minutes' time, but the final whistle sounded before the Squaws were able to pull victory out of the bag. The Squaws had downed Bowie, 60-54 in an overtime game to reach the finals.

15 YEARS AGO--MARCH 18, 1965
For the third year in a row, the Friona High School Squaws placed two members of their team on the girls' class AA all-state team. The Squaws, seeking to repeat as state champions, battled to the finals, where they fell to unbeaten Edna, 60-57.

10 YEARS AGO--MARCH 19, 1970
It was strictly a family affair at the record-breaking sale of the Houston Livestock Show's grand champion barrow Friday afternoon. W.M. (Billy) Mitchell wound up the winner in the hot and heavy bidding--but only after he outbid his wife and son with the world's record price for a hog, \$6,550. 5 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1975
Grant Teaff, the young coaching genius who guided the Baylor Bears to their first Southwest Conference football title in 50 years and first-ever appearance in the Cotton Bowl, will be the speaker at Friona's All-Sports Banquet.

All told, there were eight nominees.

The 35-year-old Texas native enlisted in the Navy in July, 1962, and has completed 12 years of sea duty. He also has been awarded four good conduct awards, the meritorious unit commendation, the Vietnam service medal, two letters of commendation, two letters of appreciation, and numerous outstanding evaluation awards.

Senior Chief Duke, along with the "Junior Officer of the Year" for 1980, Lieutenant William E. Barnett, an instructor at the basic course at the Surface Warfare Officers School Command, and the yet-to-be-named "Junior Enlisted Member of the Year" and "Coast Guardsman of the Year" will be honored at a special dinner during Armed Forces Week in May.

The dinner, which will be held Monday, May 12, will be co-sponsored by the Naval Affairs

Council of the Newport County Chamber of Commerce and the Aquidneck Island service clubs.

As an assistant company officer at NAPS, Senior Chief Duke is responsible for the military training, discipline, and well being of approximately 100 midshipman candidates. He was largely responsible for a complete review and updating of the military training syllabus for NAPS indoctrination period.

In addition to his duties as assistant company officer, Senior Chief Duke volunteered to organize and run the weight training program at NAPS. He also is the sponsor of a weight lifting team, which competes in AAU competition.

Senior Chief Duke is working towards an associate degree in business administration at Roger Williams College. He is a member of the Parent Teachers Association at Newport's Coggeshall School.

Senior Chief Duke is married to the former Janice Snipes of Greencove Springs, Florida. They have one child, Regina, 7, and reside in Navy housing at 16 Reliance Row, Newport. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Duke of Friona.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That, pursuant to the authority given this City Council as the governing body of the City of Friona, Texas, by Article 5, Section 1, of House Bill No. 1060, passed by the 1979 Texas Legislature (Article 7150.3 Section 2 (b) Revised Civil Statutes of Texas), automobiles within the taxing jurisdiction of this city shall not be exempted from taxation by this City, but shall be TAXED by this City; and

SECTION 2: The Tax-Assessor Collector of the City of Friona, Texas, is hereby ordered and directed to continue to assess, levy and collect taxes on automobiles within the taxing jurisdiction of this City.

SECTION 3: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the newspaper, The Friona Star, of Friona, Texas.

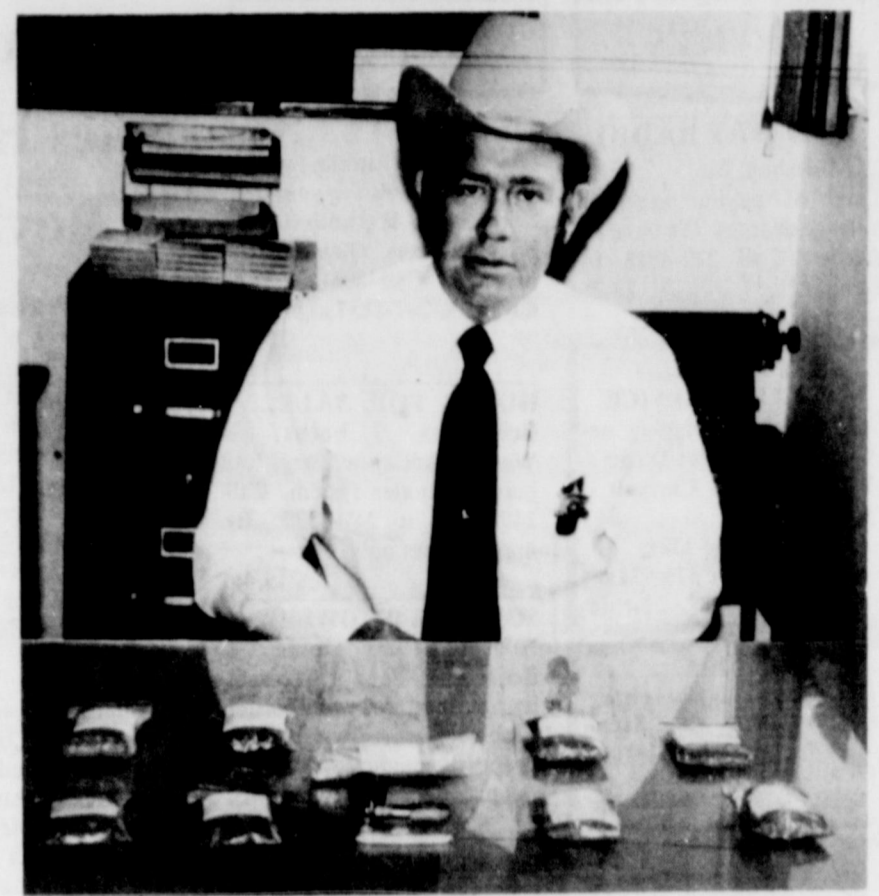
Church Sets Gospel Series

Kidney Drive Set Here March 16-31

Robert Neely today announced that the Gift of Life Campaign will be held March 16 through March 31 to distribute educational material and organ donor information and receive contributions for the Kidney Foundation of the Texas Panhandle.

Neely stated that 14 million Americans suffer from kidney disease and 54,000 people die each year from kidney and kidney related diseases despite major advances in medical science. At present, over 200 persons have kidney failure and must sustain life by the use of a kidney machine in West Texas.

Much can be done to treat kidney patients through drugs, diet, therapy and the artificial kidney machine, but the hope of life for thousands is a chance for a transplant of a healthy kidney. Over 4,000 people in Texas need a transplant, but only one out of ten dialysis patients have a related donor. With the many advances science has made in blood

testing, tissue typing and organ preservation kidneys can be successfully transplanted from non-related donors or a cadaver donor. The organ donor program is a top priority of the Kidney Foundation because it is estimated that if just ten per cent of all Americans would make arrangements to donate their kidneys, there would be enough to meet the patient needs.

The Kidney Foundation of the Texas Panhandle is an affiliate of the National Kidney Foundation. The Foundation is a voluntary health agency and services all cities from Lubbock to the top of the Panhandle of Texas.

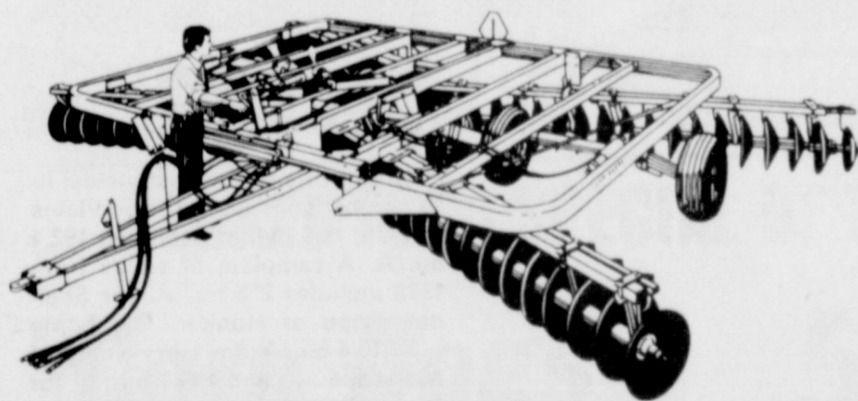
