# Texans Switch To New Leaders

By The Associated Press

Broadening a trend which developed early in the counting of Texas primary election votes, the latest returns today indicated an almost complete turnover in the state's top offi-

Voters already had demonstrated their resolve, which some voiced to pollsters in advance of Saturday's balloting, to put newcomers in the final running for governor.

Uvalde rancher-banker Dolph Briscoe and State Rep. Frances

Farenthold of Corpus Christi surged into a runoff for the Democratic nomination for governor while Lt. Gov. Barnes ran a trailing third and Gov. Preston Smith finished a poor fourth in his bid for a

JUNE 5 RUNOFF The winner in a June 5 runoff will vie with either State Sen. Hank Grover or veteran GOP leader Albert Fay, who advanced to a showdown at that time for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

And the latest tabulation by the Texas Election Bureau pointed to a possible victory for challenger John Hill in his effort to unseat Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, also in the Democratic primary.

There seemed no doubt that the results of these and other contests reflected the determination of Texans to switch to new leaders in state government because of the Sharpstown bank loans and stock insurance scandals, plus late disclosures about elected officials

dealing financially with the state and reports of nepotism in the legislature. RETURNS

With returns tabulated from all 254 counties in the state and 212 of those complete, Robert Johnson, chief of the Texas Election Bureau, estimated that votes from no more than 40 to 50 precincts remained to be counted.

The agency's latest tabulation for the first time gave Hill slightly more than half the total counted for attorney general.

### **Navy Planes** Hit Targets Near Hanoi

SAIGON (AP) - U. S. warplanes returned to the Hanoi area today for the first time in three weeks and bombed storage depots, barracks and training facilities supporting the North Vietnamese invasion of South Vietnam, the U.S. Command

The command said waves of carrier-based Navy planes hit targets about 15 miles west of Hanoi and that all the jets returned safely.

The command made no meantion of any enemy MIGs being shot down, but other sources had reported earlier that several were sighted and

The command made no mention of any enemy bombers took part in the raids and that there were no B52 strategic bombers used. It did not say how many planes were involved, but it was learned that at least two carriers are in the Tonkin Gulf, with about 150 planes available.

The announcement of the attacks came as President Nixon met with his National Security

"Tactical strike aircraft hit military targets which included storage facilities, barracks and training facilities, which are helping to support the Communist invasion across the DMZ," the U.S. Command said in a statement. DMZ means the demilitarized zone dividing North and South



### Fields Ready For Plow Discs; Lakes Are Up two-day totals included Morgan

Weekend rains left hundreds of farmers itching to get into the fields for planting, and gave prospect of adding some 8,000 acre-feet to surface water supplies.

Much of Howard County received too little to warrant widespread planting, although there were exceptions. Martin County also generally was short on planting moisture.

But in Dawson County, one of the major cotton producers of the state, the picture generally was bright to glittering. Most of the county, with the possible exception of a small sector in the southwest part near Patricia, reported two or more inches. There already was good subsoil seasoning, and all farmers reported that "the moisture had met."

The picture was generally favorable in Scurry County, which had a series of showers, some extremely heavy, and Mitchell County appeared fixed for planting.

While the rains in Howard County amounted generally to less than an inch (the U.S. Experiment Station reported .96 of an inch Friday night and Saturday), there were some spotted sectors which received an inch or more.

Pastures were brightened and ranchers hoped there would be followup rain. The northern. part of Glasscock County had received a series of showers which considerably improved the outlook there. Borden County came in for rains of 1.50 to 2.0 over most of the county, and ranges were put in good condition for spring and summer grazing. Moreover, most





The fledgling party, which plans to field statewide candidates in November, began circulating petitions last Thursday after a federal judge's temporary order cleared the way. It must collect 22,358 signatures by June 30 to win a place

on the official ballot. But Mario Compean, the party's state executive committee chairman, says the party will try to obtain 40,000 to cover any disqualifications.

Raza Unida was near the 5,-000 mark late Sunday, Compean said, predicting that 22,000 would be collected by next weekend and 40,000 by the end of the month from points throughout the state—ranging from the Dallas-Fort Worth area to the Rio Grande Valley.

The Party plans to hold its state convention to formally ratify its announced candidates on June 10 in Austin or possibly San Antonio. It took the first official steps toward that conclave in widespread counties on Saturday, holding precinct con-ventions while the major parties held primary elections as well as precinct conventions.

It plans to hold a rally in Austin on May 27 to focus attention on the petition drive, Compean said. "We're very confident that it will be a victory rally," he said Sunday night.
"We'll be celebrating the fact that we have enough signa-

primary race. She pulled a strong 80 per cent of the approximate 50,000 votes cast in the Democratic primary while her Republican opposition put together only 1,100 votes in the newly formed 18th Congressional District

Mrs. John Dowdy tried to pick up her husband's post in the U.S. House but she took a sound beating by state Sen. Charles Wilson of Lufkin. Dowdy, who has represented the deep East Texas 2nd Congressional District for years, was convicted recently in Baltimore of bribery conspiracy. Citing ill health, Dowdy was the only one of 23 Texas congressmen not seeking a new term. He had been in office since 1952.

All other incumbents took victories in Saturday's ballot-2-1 MARGIN

Dallas' Jim Collins retained his post by defeating challenger Doug Crouch in the Republican primary. Crouch, formerly the Dallas County GOP chairman, lost to Collins by a 2-1 margin in District 3.

A runoff shaped up for Dale Milford, a former television weatherman, and state Sen. Mike McKool, both seeking election in the new 24th Congressional District. The area covers the mid-cities area between Dallas and Fort Worth, and Denton County.

Republican Bob Price of Pampa and Democrat Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls had no opposition but will face each other in November's general

#### **Those Rising Prices**

WASHINGTON - The passing of J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the last 48 years, should not mean any lessening of the authority given the bureau or a change in its functions.

BACK IN 1924, when Mr. Hoover was made head of the FBI by President Coolidge upon the recommendation of Attorney General Harlan F. Stone, the investigative arm of the Department of Justice had fallen into disrepute. There were widespread charges of corruption.

J. Edgar Hoover took over the job of reorganization and soon developed an effective unit that served not only the department of justice and the President but other executive agencies as well. He had a deep sense of loyalty to the government and was in no sense a political partisan. He has maintained the same cooperation with both Republican and Democratic administrations.

OVER THE years the FBI has worked with local police and lawenforcement bodies, and it has operated efficiently to collect information that has often been used to solve crimes promptly. Much of the data obtained by the FBI have been made available to other departments of the government and transmitted to the Central Intelligence Agency. This has been of help in dealing with plots of an international nature which have been hatched to hurt this country and friendly nations

J. EDGAR HOOVER'S chief skill was his ability to engender a spirit of fidelity among his men not to any political party but to the government of the United States. His associates know a great deal about criminal activities and underground warfare, but Mr. Hoover himself has been the one to direct what should be done with the information gathered and how far investigations should be pressed. His judgment has been followed throughout the years. His colleagues may have at times disagreed with him, but they have not always known all the circumstances that have required the government to refrain from taking action at a particular time and to await further developments or to transmit the information to a state or city and depend upon them to move in the case. Sometimes an FBI message has been responsible for an important step being taken by a foreign government because it has been made aware of something which has been happening that threatened its own

ON THE whole, the Hoover administration of the FBI has been constructive and useful. The critics, of course, have concentrated on the usual assumptions that the FBI has prejudices against certain types of organizations or has overstepped its authority. They do not take into account the facts about persons who are responsible for certain activities. many of whom are actually engaged in conspiracies to damage their own

J. Edgar Hoover has always deferred to the wishes of the President and the attorney general after submitting the information that has been gathered. The duty of the FBI, Mr. Hoover felt, is to furnish the data and let the Department of Justice determine whether there shall be a prosecution.

OVER THE years, some of the exposures have covered instances in which individuals either have betrayed their own government or have stolen documents or otherwise sought to embarrass it. The FBI has played the part merely of providing information, leaving it to the administration to decide what shall be done with it. But again and again, the critics have attacked the FBI.

Over-all, the FBI has done a constructive job in defense of its government, and J. Edgar Hoover's record has been appreciated by every President during the 48 years the director has been in charge of the organiza-



WASHINGTON, D. C. - Many 18, other States have likewise completed legislative action in this regard with Vermont, Michigan and Tennessee legalizing the sale of liquor to 18-year olds and older. Iowa made 19 the age for buying hard liquor. Several other states have lowered the age

of majority, but not across the board. WHAT HAS BEEN special about the age of 21 goes back over 700 years of English common law. The distinction was originally made in the common law between being "an infant" and being "of full age." In this reference "infant" meant "minor" rather than baby. In medieval times a merchant's son, or "burgess," was of full age when he could count money and measure cloth. But the "military tenant," which simply meant one subject to the draft, became of full age at 21. Why? Because it was assumed he would not be strong enough to wear heavy armor at a younger age. Gradually, the "knightly majority" became the standard in the common law.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR voting are a two-way street. First there appears a lack of communication between government and the people it purports represent. There is need for greater emphasis on what federal, state and local governments are actually doing. #### Rules In 'Fingering' Suspect Harriet, victim of a mugging, was

summoned to police headquarters to view a lineup. One of the men looked vaguely familiar, but she felt too doubtful to pick him out.

A WEEK LATER, she was called to a second lineup. All the men were different except one - the same one who had semed familiar the first time. With her confidence bolstered, Harriet pointed an accusing finger at him and said: "He's the man."

BUT AT THE trial, her identification was ruled out of court. The judge said placing the man into both lineups was an unfair way of singling him out and making him look guilty.

Witnesses to a crime are often asked to select the culprit out of a police lineup. As a means of identification, the lineup - usually consisting of prisoners or plain-clothes policemen - is widely approved.

HOWEVER, to be constitutional, the procedure must be carried out with basic fairness. Police must not "stack" the lineup so as to draw special attention to the man they suspect.

On the other hand, the participants need not be perfect look-alikes.

In another case, the suspect was the only one in the lineup wearing a black jacket. Admittedly, this made him conspicuous to some degree. But a court upheld the procedure anyhow, since the jacket happened to be the man's regular attire.

FURTHERMORE, even if the suspect is conspicuous in one respect, the witness may have other legitimate reasons for making the identification. For example: A burglary suspect was placed in

lineup while wearing distinctive clothing. But the witness who picked him out did not rely just on his apparel. He said he recognized the man mainly by his height, his weight, his voice, and his posture.

THE COURT decided that, with so much to support it, the identification by the witness was indeed worthy the jury's consideration.
