SHAH TALKS Nixon Arrives In Iran

TEHRAN (AP) — President Nixon arrived in Iran's capital today for an overnight visit and talks with the Shah on regional and world matters.

The President and Mrs. Nixon were greeted at Tehran's Mehrabad Airport by the 52-year-old monarch and Empress Farah after a flight from Kiev, the Nixons' last stop in the Soviet Union following a week of summit talks between the President and Kremlin leaders.

Massive security precautions were taken against attacks by urban guerrillas and other dissident Iranians who were told by Baghdad broadcasts to disrupt the visit.

OIL TALK
Among the topics expected to be discussed during the five hours of talks between the two leaders were the future of the Indian Ocean and the Persian Gulf area, which holds 80 per cent of the world's known oil reserves.

INMATES GRAB FOUR HOSTAGES

PATERSON, N.J. (AP) — Prisoners seized control of a second-floor cell block today at Passaic County Jail and took four hostages, among them the warden, prison officials reported.

Officials said the inmates took over the 110-man wing following a melee in which guard Joseph Bozzoli was stabbed in the stomach. He was listed in fair condition at St. Joseph's Hospital.

A jail spokesman said Warden Jack DeYoung, an unidentified nurse and two guards who were involved in the scuffle in which Bozzoli was stabbed were being held as hostages.

The trouble erupted, the spokesman said, when Bozzoli and the two guards were escorting three prisoners to an elevator to take them to another section of the three-story jail. As the group was entering an elevator, Bozzoli was stabbed.

The prisoners then fled back to the cell block, forcing the two other guards to accompany them. Bozzoli escaped by managing to get into the elevator.

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Police say Sen. B. Everett Jordan apparently was not the target of a young gunman who killed three persons and wounded eight others before taking his own life at a shopping center where the senator was campaigning.

The gunman "just broke out his gun and started shooting, first one way and then another," Police Chief Robert Goodwin said. "We don't know why he was there." A witness, Bruce Bland of Raleigh, said the gunman was "aiming at anything that moved."

Police Capt. C. H. Haswell said he doubted Jordan was the target because so many people were shot.

Jordan, a Democrat on an unannounced handshaking tour, was rushed into an optometrist's office when the rifle shots rang out Monday among hundreds of holiday shoppers at North Hills Shopping Center.

Jordan was not hurt, but his news secretary, Wes Hayden, was shot in the back. Hayden was reported in serious condition at a hospital.

Jordan, 75, said, "I have no reason to believe anyone would try to kill me." He and his opponent in the Democratic primary runoff, U.S. Rep. Nick Galifianakis of Durham, had declined protection offered by state authorities after the shooting of Gov. George C. Wallace in Maryland two weeks ago.

Death Penalty Plea Rejected

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today rejected an appeal by California to revive a state supreme court decision outlawing the death penalty.

The high court currently is considering whether to abolish capital punishment across the land as being in violation of the federal Constitution. The Justices gave no reason for declining unanimously to add California's appeal to its docket.

Still before the court for an expected ruling next month are other appeals testing the constitutionality of the death penalty.

The California court held 6-1 Feb. 13 that the death penalty "may no longer be exacted" in that state because it violates the state Constitution. The action spared the lives of the 102 men and 5 women who make up the nation's largest death row population. They include Sirhan Sirhan, the assassin of former U.S. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, and mass murderer Charles Manson.

California's petition for review, filed March 31 by Evelle J. Younger, the state attorney general, called the decision "an unseemly rush to judgment" while the death penalty issue was pending before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Younger contended that the "state ground" asserted by the California court, a provision in the California Constitution, was

"palpably transparent" and that the ruling consequently should be reviewed by the U.S. court.

The California Constitution prohibits "cruel or unusual punishment" while the federal Constitution prohibits "cruel and unusual punishments." Since the California court found the death penalty both cruel and unusual, Younger argued, it was really interpreting the Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Proponents of capital punishment, including Gov. Ronald Reagan, followed up the decision by backing an amendment to the state Constitution specifically authorizing the death penalty. The move failed in the California Senate in early May. However, there is a drive to reinstate the death penalty in California through an initiative measure.

The California case directly involved Robert P. Anderson, 34, who was under death sentence for the 1965 murder of a San Diego shopkeeper.

Texas Welfare Cut Plan Upheld By Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today approved the method used by Texas and 18 other states to reduce assistance to needy families with some outside income.

The vote was 5-4 with the four Nixon administration appointees and Justice Byron R. White in the majority. The four dissenters said the cut system violated federal welfare law.

At the same time, the court rejected claims Texas was discriminating against blacks and chicanos and that states should not apply larger percentage cuts to families with dependent children than to the blind and the aged.

The vote on these points was 6-3.

Said Justice William Rehnquist for the majority, "It is not irrational for the state to believe that the young are more adaptable than the sick and the elderly, especially because the latter have less hope of improving their situation in the years remaining to them."

Justice William O. Douglas

dissenting, said Texas had engaged in "rank discrimination" against blacks and chicanos and had violated the intent of Congress by denying nearly 2,500 needy families relief.

In other actions today, the court:

—Agreed to rule on the power of grand juries to force witnesses to give samples of their voices.

—Rejected an appeal by California to review the state supreme court decision outlawing the death penalty.

—Upheld New York's loyalty oath for public school teachers against claims of a discharged teacher that it infringes on the religious beliefs of Quakers.

—Turned aside an appeal by Philadelphia officials and declined to review a ruling that the Nixon administration has drastically and illegally reduced the role of slum residents in guiding Model Cities programs.

—Dismissed challenges to taxes imposed by Pennsylvania and Philadelphia on the wages of New Jersey residents.

FORT WORTH Crash Kills Inspector, Three Pilots

FORT WORTH (AP) — Three pilots and an inspector from the Federal Aviation Agency were killed Tuesday morning when a Delta Airlines DC-9 plane crashed and burst into flames at Greater Southwest airport here while on a training flight. Names of the victims were not released immediately.

Tarrant County Medical examiner Feliks Cwozdz confirmed that the pilots and the FAA inspector, the only persons aboard, were killed inside the burning plane.

The crash occurred shortly after 7 a.m. A Department of Public Safety officer who witnessed the crash said the plane hit the ground tail first and then skidded about half a mile as it burst into flames.

"The wings were tipping to one side and then the other," said officer David McNatt. "Its nose pointed upward as it hit the ground."

Delta Airlines officials said the plane was on a routine check flight.

A long column of smoke boiled up from the plane as fire consumed the aircraft hampering rescue efforts.

300 BID GOODBYE TO OKIE TOWN

UNCAS, Okla. (AP) — About 300 persons gathered Monday in Uncas to bid the 70-year-old town goodbye.

It dies officially Dec. 31 and will be covered by water from the \$116 million Kaw Reservoir within a few years.

The town (pop. 14) once had a general store, grocery store, feed store, welding shop, beauty shop, bank, post office, and four service stations.

The only remaining business is a service station run by Mrs. Pearl Stanley who opened it in 1938.

"The memories here are good ones," she said. "We had nice neighbors and good times. We enjoyed life here."

PLANE EXPLODES INTO FLAMES

CLEVELAND (AP) — A plane with five men aboard crashed into Lake Erie off Burke Lakefront Airport here Monday as the pilot veered to the left to avoid another plane.

One man was killed, two are missing and two were rescued.

The plane exploded into flames and quickly disappeared beneath the murky water when it hit nose down 200 yards off shore.

Occupants of the Cessna 310 were pilots returning to their homes in the Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minn., area from the Transpo 72 convention in Washington. They were trying to land to refuel.

Killed was Lawrence Nilsson, 49, of St. Paul. Richard Aplikowski, 50, of New Brighton and Edward T. Kolar, 50, of St. Paul were reported in fair condition in Cleveland hospitals.

Divers were unable to find the other two men, identified as Robert Hildebrandt and David Phelps, the pilot, both of St. Paul.

SHOOTING SPREE IN BIG D

DALLAS (AP) — A 21-year-old Vietnam veteran surrendered to police early Tuesday after standing off 25 officers in a 15-minute shooting spree at an Oak Cliff apartment complex.

No one was injured.

Neighbors told officers the man appeared intoxicated. He was drinking beer from a can and packing a shotgun when they called in police.

Patrolman J. P. Pruett said the man fired two shots at him but missed.

Nineteen police units, a helicopter and a dog unit were sent to the scene, but the man meekly surrendered after police fired several shots through his apartment window.

He is being held for investigation of assault to murder.

Rains Heavier Toward South

The southeast quarter of the county was virtually inundated by rains Monday, with general rains of more than an inch reported.

The remainder of the county was less fortunate, with most areas reporting no rain or only a light mist. Big Spring reported .19 inch at the experiment station.

Forsan had 1 1/4 inches of rain and one report said as much as two inches had fallen at some points. The Moss Creek Lake area reported one inch and Coahoma about .4 inch.

The CRMWD pump station north of town soaked up .3 inch. Boyce Hale on the south edge of town reported .70 inch, .55 inch was reported in the Western Hills and 1.3 inches in southeast Big Spring.

Colorado City reported .85 inch and .10 inch was reported on the Snyder highway three miles northeast of town. Lake Spence reported .5 inch, and points between Big Spring and the lake were at the same level.

A 20 per cent chance of rain is predicted through tonight.

Humphrey Slapping Welfare Proposals

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sens. Hubert H. Humphrey and George McGovern are heading into their second campaign confrontation in pivotal California still debating the issues of the first—welfare and the war.

Humphrey slapped at McGovern welfare proposals, McGovern at Humphrey's record on Vietnam policy as the two Democratic senators prepared to face each other in a nationally televised appearance tonight.

And Minnesota's Humphrey sought to revive and take over a familiar issue by challenging McGovern to disclose how much money he is spending on the California presidential primary campaign.

TUBE TIME

There was irony in that, since it was McGovern who first made public his over-all campaign finances, and turned the topic into a major issue at the start of the primary season. That was in New Hampshire, when he was rated at best a long shot in the race.

Now it is McGovern versus Humphrey, head to head, for 271 Democratic presidential nominating votes in the California primary a week away.

Their campaign tone since Sunday night, when they appeared together in a national television interview, indicated the dispute might become even more heated as they met again.

The television appearances, billed as debates but actually joint interviews broadcast by the national television networks, have become centerpiece in the California campaign.

Humphrey planned two campaign appearances in Los Angeles today, then set aside time to prepare for the television appearance. McGovern scheduled a news conference on conversion of the economy to a peacetime basis and cleared his schedule to rest and get ready for the second round.

It will be broadcast on the National Broadcasting Co. program "Meet the Press," for an hour beginning at 9:30 p.m. EDT. The final McGovern-Humphrey matchup is scheduled Sunday, on the American Broadcasting Co.

SELLING PRESIDENT
Humphrey raised the finance question in Sacramento Monday, saying that "the selling of a president ought not to become a habit in this country."

The former vice president said his California primary campaign had cost \$299,000 through May 22. That partial accounting did not cover the period after costly radio and television commercials began.

A McGovern spokesman, Kirby Jones, said the primary campaign budget for the South Dakota senator is \$1.25 million. Humphrey is known to be facing a financial squeeze in his California campaign, and McGovern is certain to outspend him by a wide margin.

In San Diego Monday, McGovern said Humphrey is a former defender of U.S. war policy in Vietnam who "now

He goes across this land posing as a convert to peace, and I don't intend to let him get away with it."

Humphrey, in Fresno, renewed his critique of McGovern's position on welfare. He said he favors a public service job program that would cost \$6 billion and put one million unemployed people to work within a month.

WELFARE CITED
"I'd rather put a million people to work at a cost of \$6

billion than put 104 million people on welfare at a cost of \$27 billion," Humphrey said.

As Humphrey addressed about 2,000 people in Citrus Heights, a Sacramento suburb, a man carrying a rifle was arrested nearby. The sheriff's office said the incident was not related to the Humphrey appearance, and that the man was questioned and released, although the rifle was held "for safekeeping."

Drownings Help Swell Violent Toll In Texas

Hot weather sent more swimmers than ever into the water and drownings helped swell the violent death toll in Texas during the Memorial Day weekend. In the holiday period from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Monday, The Associated Press gathered reports of 42 fatalities—24 in traffic accidents, 13 by drowning and five shootings.

BELOW THE DAM
These were among the victims:
Terry Cyrus, 25, of Houston drowned Monday below the Lake Livingston Dam on the Trinity River. Authorities said he slipped into deep water while trying to retrieve a hat that blew into the water.
A Ft. Hood soldier, Mark D. Zilliken, drowned Sunday while swimming with two companions in Stillhouse Hollow Lake.

TOTAL ROLL
Mrs. Winona Varner Powell, 39, and her daughters Idzie, 15, and Allie, 12, all of Denton, died late Saturday when their car was struck by a freight train south of Rhomene near U.S. 287. Patrolman Jerry Hopkins said the car was dragged about 1,600 feet.
Larry Cockrill, 21, a Southern Methodist University student from Dallas, died Sunday when a car in which he was a passenger overturned on Interstate 45 about a mile north of Buffalo. Sara Ellen Grary, also of Dallas and the driver of the vehicle, suffered injuries.

James Moore, 58, of Beaumont was killed Saturday night in a two-car collision on U.S. 69 about 2 miles south of Beaumont. Robert Murray and his 5-year-old daughter Shelly and his 6-year-old son, Paul, were injured. The little girl was reported in critical condition.

Heywood Moore, 45, of Houston was shot to death Saturday night in front of a lunge. Police said the shooting climaxed an argument with another man over a woman.

Tooth Transplant Goes To Sister

NEW YORK (AP) — Dental surgeons at Brookdale Medical Center have removed an impacted tooth from the jaw of a 16-year-old youth and implanted it in his twin sister's mouth.
Dr. Norman Cranin, director of dental and oral surgery at the Brooklyn hospital, said "we won't know for four or five years" whether the tooth, a molar, will take root or be rejected by the recipient, Janet Ramsay.

Nixon Gives Cadillac To Brezhnev

DETROIT (AP) — Cadillac says practically every optional item it offers was included on the car that President Nixon presented to Soviet Communist

party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev. Extras on the black, front-wheel-drive Eldorado included an AM-FM stereo radio, tape deck, tinted glass and a special air horn.
"About the only item added specifically for overseas was a kilo speedometer, rather than the regular-type speedometer found in American cars," a Cadillac spokesman said.
He said the car came off the assembly line May 16 and had no special safety equipment such as bullet-proof glass or armor plate.
Cadillac, a division of General Motors, confirmed Monday that it donated the \$9,600 car for presentation to Brezhnev.
The Russian leader, a car buff, has in his personal collection such Western autos as a Rolls Royce limousine, a Citroen-Maserati and a Renault 16.
The GM delivery of the Cadillac to Brezhnev was a well kept secret. First word of it came Monday as Nixon was leaving Moscow.

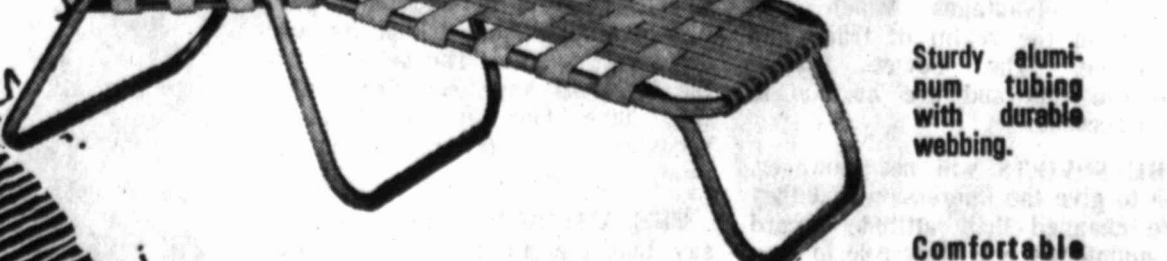

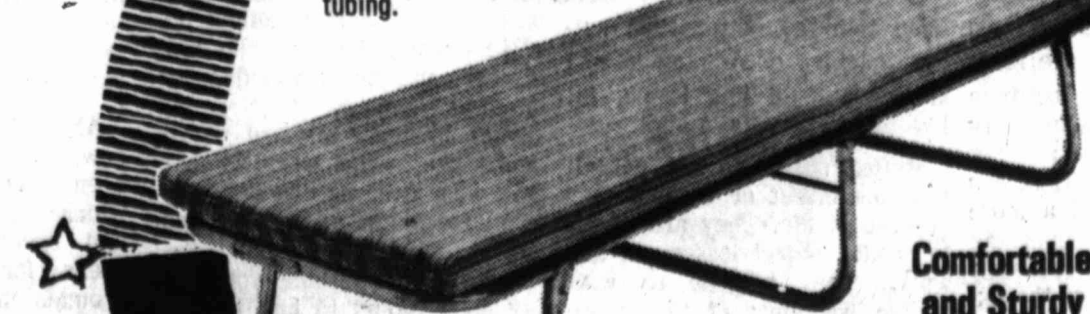

Dam Doomed From Start, Engineers Report Reveals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Corps of Engineers says the West Virginia dam that collapsed last February, killing at least 118 persons, was doomed from the start. A Senate subcommittee opens hearings today on the disaster.

The Engineers released a report Monday saying the dam "should never have been built."

The report spread the blame for the disaster among the U.S. Bureau of Mines, the State of West Virginia, and the Buffalo Coal Co. which built the structure. All three, the report said, appear to have legal responsibilities over the safe construction and inspection of a dam.

Said the Corps report: "The consequent 'let-George-do-it' attitude resulted in tragedy."

The Senate subcommittee scheduled two days of testimony by Bureau, state and company officials, along with law-enforcement and National Guard spokesmen, and survivors of the tragedy.

On the eve of the hearings, the subcommittee released the Corps report on the collapse of the Buffalo Mining Co. Dam No. 3, on the Middle Fork of Buffalo Creek.

The Corps is preparing a second report surveying similar waste-pile dams in West Virginia.

When Dam No. 3 collapsed last Feb. 26 after three days of rain it sent a 20-foot wall of water through the Buffalo Valley, wiping out the towns of Saunders and Lorado and spreading havoc for 17 miles downstream.

Government and company officials called it an act of God. But the Corps report said the

dam was so basically unsafe that only a "happy accident" of nature could have prevented its collapse.

In fact, the Corps said, water seepage had been steadily undermining the dam's already-poor foundation and there was visible evidence of this steady weakening for a year before the final breakdown.

The Corps said adequate inspection would have disclosed this deterioration.

Acupuncture Used In U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — Physicians at Albert Einstein College of Medicine used acupuncture needles to anesthetize a patient's legs for a skin graft last Friday, the college hospital reported Monday.

It was the first reported use of acupuncture on a patient in a U.S. hospital. Interest among American anesthetists in the ancient Chinese therapy had mounted since President Nixon's trip to China in February.

The 65-year-old patient, a Manhattan bank employe who was not identified, was said to be recovering comfortably after the relatively minor operation. A surgeon grafted skin from his right thigh to the bottom of his left foot.

Thieu Braves Kontum Fire

KONTUM, Vietnam (AP) — President Nguyen Van Thieu flew into Kontum under fire today to pin a star on the field commander defending the provincial capital in the central highlands.

Thieu came in a light observation helicopter that flew in at rooftop level and put down at the 23rd Division headquarters a few hundred yards from North Vietnamese positions.

Several rounds of artillery landed in the compound just before the president arrived and during his 25-minute stay.

Thieu came to promote Col. Ly Tong Ba to brigadier general. He commands the 23rd Division, which has been fighting inside Kontum since the city's defenses were breached last Thursday.

It was understood that one reason for Thieu's visit was to encourage Ba to take more aggressive action to rout the enemy forces holding on in the northern and southeastern sectors of the city. One source said the promotion would also make clear Ba's authority over other colonels working with him.

Ba was surprised by Thieu's arrival and by his spot promotion. Aides had to hurry around to find him as the helicopter approached.

Aching Arm

Your Good Health

Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I suffered a heart attack a year and a half ago, was in the hospital under oxygen for a week, and on complete bed rest at home for six weeks.

Recently my left arm has been aching a lot and the arm and hand appear swollen. Now my doctor says I had a myocardial infarction, and that the swelling is the same syndrome which very often accompanies this.

Will you explain just what a myocardial infarction is, and what is this syndrome he is talking about? — Mrs. T.L.

A myocardial infarction is a heart attack, just a different term for the same thing. A branch of the artery serving the heart muscle became plugged (usually due to hardening of the arteries) and a portion of the heart muscle was deprived of its blood supply.

"Myocardial" refers to the heart muscle. "Infarction" means that part of the muscle was damaged.

A "syndrome" is a pattern of symptoms — in this case the aching of your arm. You doubtless have what is commonly referred to as the "shoulder-arm syndrome," which is not unusual following a heart attack, although it isn't happens.

It apparently is a nerve reflex problem. The damage to the heart muscle is reflected as discomfort in the left shoulder and arm.

Often simple aspirin helps this. That, of course, has nothing to do with such other medication as the doctor prescribes for your heart.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am being treated for high blood pressure, but have been planning a trip which would be by air, and wonder if I should cancel it. — Mrs. L.R.

Your blood pressure would not be a reason for avoiding travel in commercial planes. The cabins are pressurized, so you are as comfortable as you would be on the ground.

If you are nervous about flying — and nervous tension can affect your blood pressure — your doctor could give you a mild tranquilizer or sedative before the flight to keep you calm.

You may well be interested in my newest booklet, "Con-

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My granddaughter, 3, has fungus under her toenails, and in between her toes she has dry skin. We have been putting different foot powders on, changing her socks every day, bathing her every day, and she goes barefoot around the house. Would you please answer this? — Mrs. L.B.

How do you know it's fungus? Maybe it's some other skin disorder. And if it IS fungus, using different foot powders won't always be the answer. The sooner you get the youngster to a doctor, perhaps to a skin specialist, the better the chances of clearing up whatever it is.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Our 11-year-old daughter seems to have frequent nosebleeds without any special reason. They happen at all hours, three or four times a week. Otherwise she seems in good health. Could she be low in vitamin C? — C.T.D.

Possibly — but it would seem more to the point to have the doctor see whether she has an ulcer in the nose, in which case simple cautery would be the ticket.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: "Bad Breath Can be Corrected" is the title of Dr. Thosteson's booklet explaining the causes and cure of bad breath. Goldwater, 63, is expected to be released from the hospital in a week or 10 days.

Gretchen Given New PHT Degree

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Because she knows her way around, Gretchen was awarded a special degree by the University of San Diego Law School.

Her diploma was smaller than the other 173 conferred at the weekend ceremonies, but that doesn't mean she didn't work as hard as anyone else.

It's just that Gretchen is a doberman pinscher guide dog who did such a good job for her master, Robert D. Deens, 40, that it was decided she deserved a PHT degree.

The letters stand for "putting him through" a variation of the "putting hubby through" mock degree sometimes given to wives of graduates.

"She certainly deserves it," Deens said. "She has seen me through four years at San-

Diego State and three years at USD."

Deens, blinded by glaucoma, is a widower who said he plans to be a general practice lawyer.

Miners Nominate Black Lung Victim

WHEELING, W. Va. (AP) — Black lung sufferer Arnold Miller of West Virginia's southern coalfields has been nominated by the Miners for Democracy as candidate for presidency of the United Mine Workers union.

The weekend convention by the dissident inter-union group followed a federal court order May 1 overturning the union's 1969 election and ordering a new one.

UMW President W. A. "Tony" Boyle won the 1968 election over reformer Joseph "Jock" Yablonski; Yablonski and his wife and daughter were murdered three weeks later.

The MFD is composed of miners who supported Yablonski's candidacy.

Hell's Angels Leader Faces Death Charge

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Hell's Angels leader Ralph "Sonny" Barger, 33, and three others from the motorcycle club faced arraignment today in the slaying of a man found dead in a burning house last week.

Barger's wife, Sharon, 22, was arrested along with the other four in a raid last Saturday and was booked for investigation of possessing narcotics.

Another woman arrested with Mrs. Barger was first identified by police as Marcia Tracy, but officers said Monday they were

mistaken and Miss Tracy had not been arrested.

The charges against the Angels, police said, involve the death of Severo Winston Agero, 29, of McAllen, Tex. His body was found in a bath tub. The house in Oakland had been sprinkled with gasoline and was on fire when authorities arrived.
