





# Convention, Media Pact Worked Out

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Miami Beach City Manager Clifford O'Key says a compromise agreement has been worked out allowing the three major television networks to pay a total of \$180,000 in rent for leaving their equipment in the convention hall between the Democratic and Republican national conventions.

O'Key said Friday that NBC, CBS and ABC had agreed to pay between \$61,000 and \$62,000 each in rent—about one-third of the original demand of \$180,000 each.

Previously, O'Key said, he planned to charge 35 cents a square foot in rent for the 36 days between the conventions. But he said the networks had agreed to a charge of 30 cents a square foot for 16 days.

O'Key said he would extend the offer to the 72 news organizations and communications firms which were told a week ago they would have to remove their equipment from the hall by July 28—two weeks after the end of the July 16-13 Democratic convention. The Republicans are scheduled to begin their gathering Aug. 21.

The Associated Press, United Press International, major newspapers and radio networks, Western Union, the RCA Corp., International Telephone & Telegraph Co., Xerox, Eastman Kodak and other companies were told the hall would be needed Aug. 9-15 for the Florida Furniture Mart.

However, O'Key said Friday that the space would not be needed for the furniture show and that he would ask the City Council on Wednesday to approve the rental agreement with the networks.

# Presto! Change-o! Odor Extracted From Sludge

A laboratory demonstration Friday deodorized the solid residue from the city's sewage plant in a matter of minutes.

The process shown by representatives from BIF Purifax, Inc., Dallas, turned the pungent sample of supernate or sludge — what's left after treatment of sewage influent — into an odorless product.

This reporter sniffed the plant's present sludge, then a sample of the treated product. Gone was the odor.

City Manager Harry Nagel, James Campbell, director of public works, Bill Brown, utilities director, and Commissioners Harold Hall and Frog Koger also had opportunity to apply the sniff test.

The sample of untreated sewage sludge was mixed under high pressure in the machine with a high concentration of chlorine gas. Lewis Johnson, technical director of BIF, explained that this causes the suspended solids to separate from the water.

**FAST ACTION**  
In effect, the machine can do in two minutes what the present sewage digesters take months to accomplish, according to Johnson.

Johnson explained in the process of the machine, the chlorine gas is injected into the sludge under high pressures. At the same time the PH or acidity of the compound is dropped while the pressure is decreased.

Under the high pressure, minute gas bubbles are formed and the suspended solids attach to the bubbles, floating to the top of the mixture, while the water stays on the bottom.

**ESTIMATED COST**  
In the chemical reaction the odor is completely removed from the sludge, the water is treated further and may be turned back into the system. The sludge may be laid on a sand bed for faster drying action.

For the city to purchase the amount of equipment necessary to handle the system's present gallonage per day, an outlay of \$75,000 must be made, Johnson estimated.

According to police reports, Massey's vehicle went out of control and struck a parked vehicle owned by Bobby Clark, 3205 Auburn.

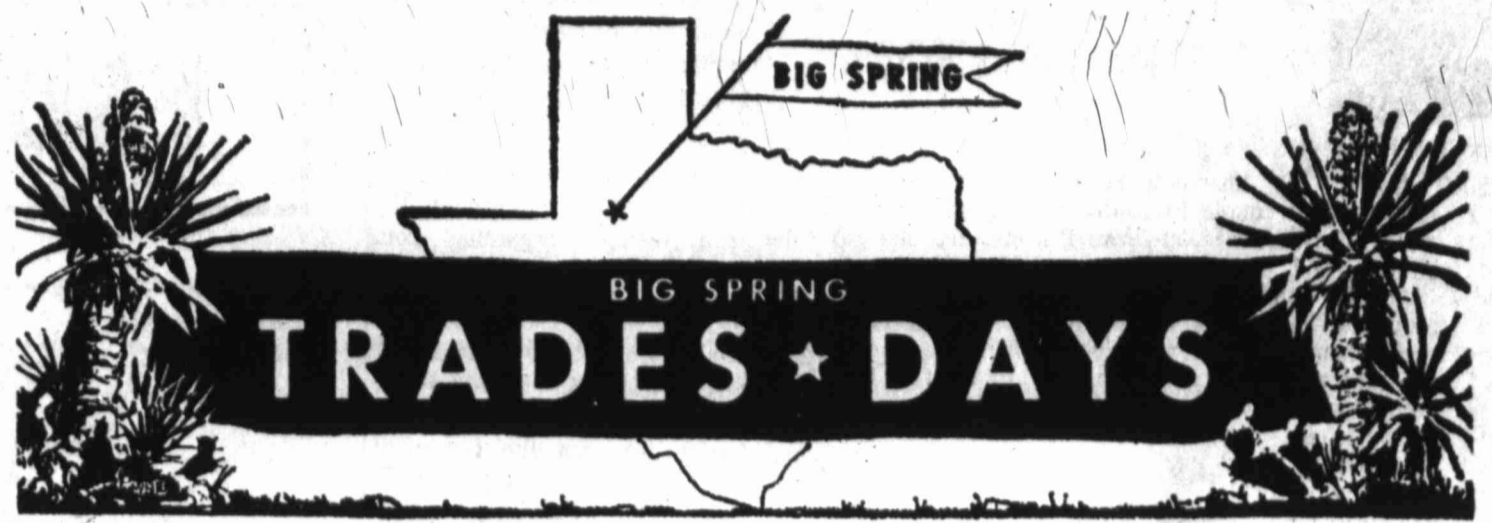
The accident occurred at 8:18 p.m. and made the second collision last week where a moving vehicle collided with parked cars.

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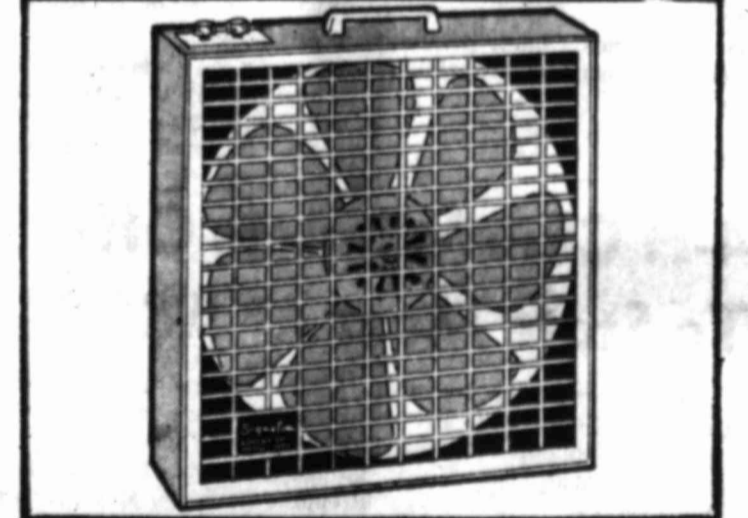


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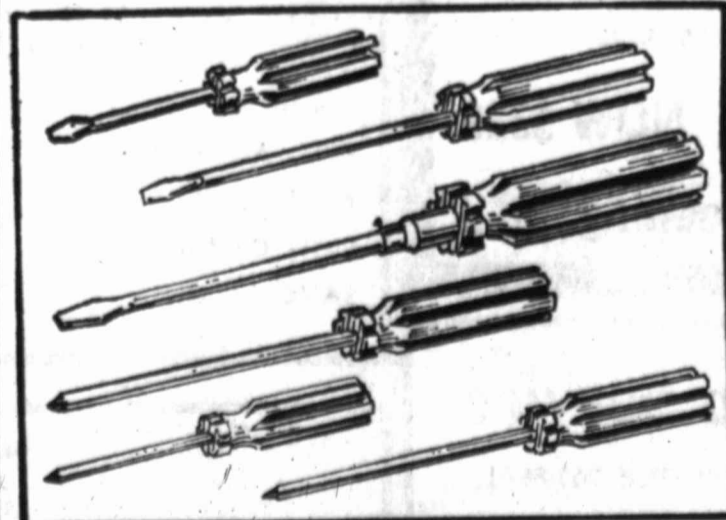


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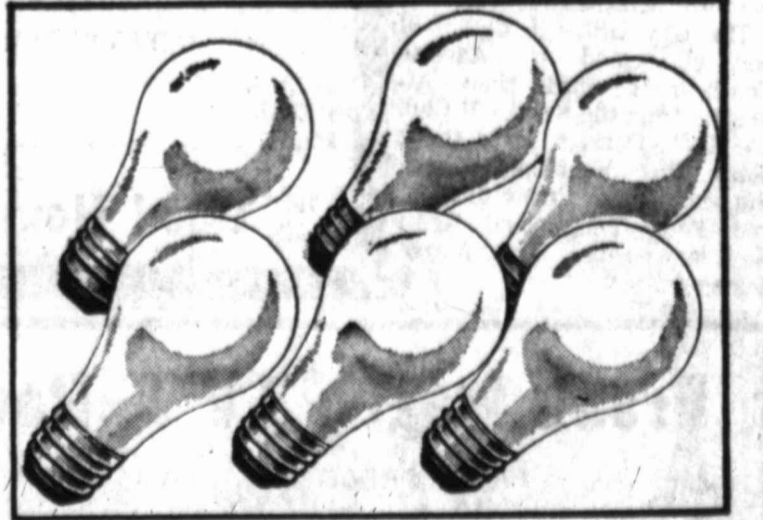

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**Most Dogs Beach Bums, So Make Pet Welcome**

It is a freaky Fido that isn't at home. Not all beaches allow dogs to run free. And anyway, you will want to walk him to and from the sand. If he is a well-trained dog, he will be just as welcome at surfside as you.

If you are planning to introduce your dog to the beach this summer, advise the experts, there are a few things to keep in mind that will make both your stay and Fido's a more pleasant one. To say nothing of your neighbors under the umbrellas.

Which brings up the first important point: Be sure to bring along a beach umbrella for Fido if not for yourselves. No matter how pleasant the sunshine is, it can get very hot for your pup. Dogs suffer heat prostration very easily. Be sure to provide some shade.

He doesn't need suntan oil, but he definitely does require fresh water. This is especially true at the seaside where the only thing that is wet is also salty. Besides the thermos bottle, don't forget a water dish. If you are staying long enough for him to be hungry, a can of his favorite dog food and a can opener should be packed along with the ham, sandwiches and pickles.

A good-sized bath towel is also a good idea. If Fido is going to be splashing in sea water, his feet should be dried off to avoid salt water irritation. He may also pick up some tar. A towel just for him comes in very handy.

Of course you have brought along a couple of balls for him to chase (an extra one in case he loses the first), and perhaps another toy or two.

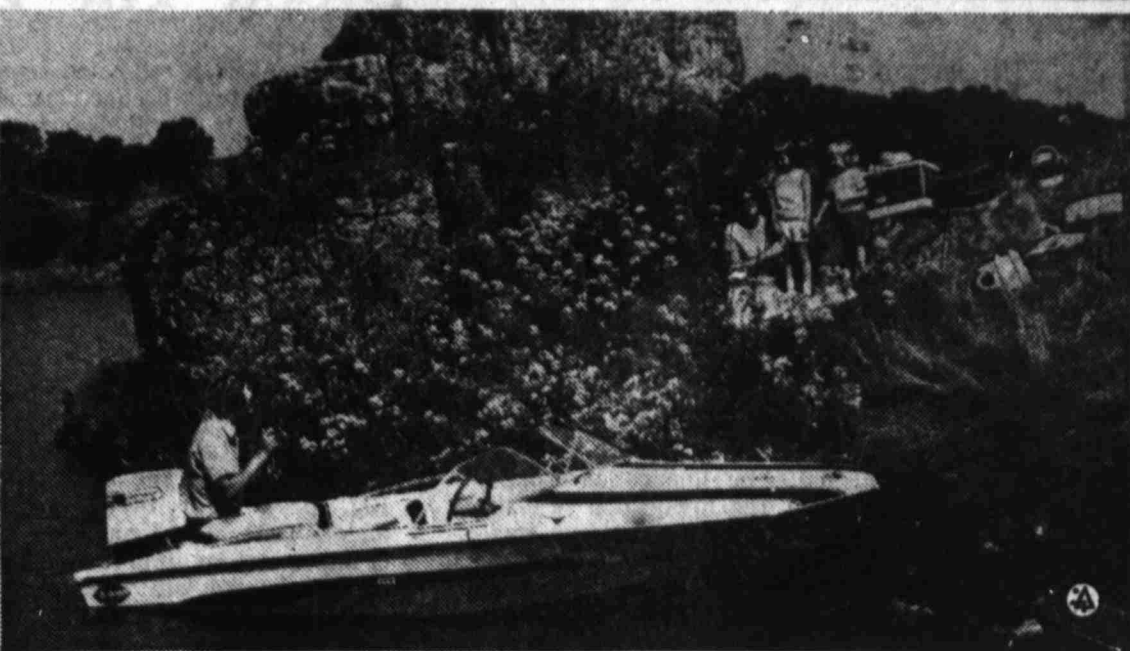
Council members have complained that groups opposed to the war in Vietnam have wasted the council's time by speaking against the war at sessions.

**Cargo Decline Drops Profits**

HOUSTON (AP) — A drop in cargo movement and spiraling costs have slashed the Port of Houston's 1972 profits through April to \$37,000, less than one-tenth of the \$460,000 net income in the same period last year, port executive director George Altwater said Friday.

Altwater said the main drop came in steel imports which went from 256,000 tons to the first four months of 1971 to 173,000 tons through April of this year.

At the same time, he said, more than \$600,000 has been set aside to meet retroactive longshoremen's pay when the shipping industry and the federal Pay Board agree on a new contract.

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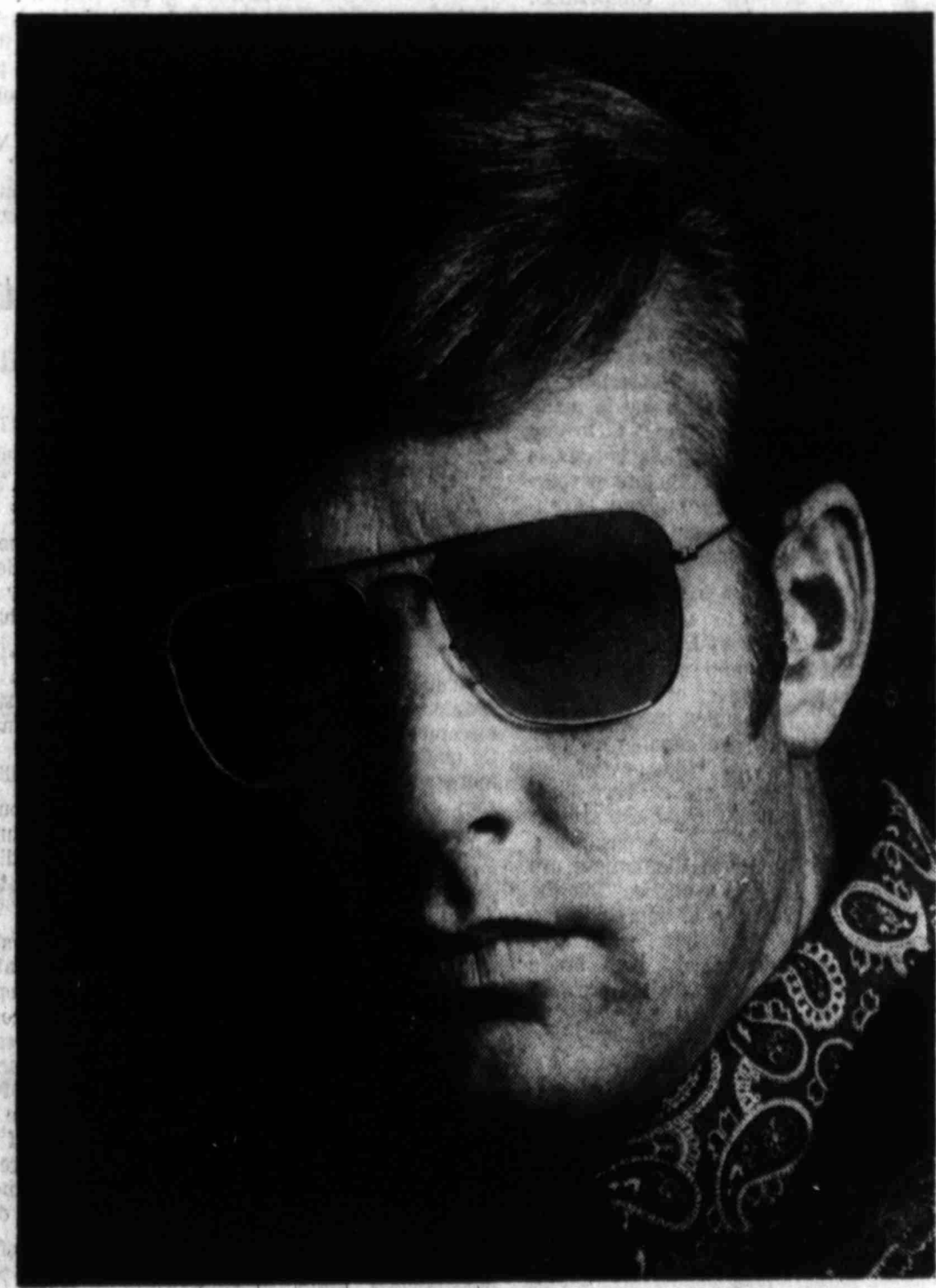

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### U.S. Pilots Lead 8 To 1 In Dogfights

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. fighter pilots have scored better than 8 to 1 over North Vietnamese fliers in air combat this year.

Pentagon charts list 34 North Vietnamese MIG jet fighters downed in air duels since Jan. 1. Four U.S. planes have been shot down by MIGs.

Most of these kills have come since the United States resumed heavy bombing of North Vietnam in April.

This record is a turnabout from the late stages of the 1965-68 air war against the North when the fighter score was nearly even and, for a time, North Vietnamese MIGs out-killed American jets.

Many of the U.S. planes that attacked North Vietnam in the late 1960s were Air Force F105 Thunderchiefs, so awkward to maneuver when bomb-loaded that they were derided with the nickname "Thud."

Veterans of the air war said the F105s often flew northward without escort in those days, and MIGs caught some of them in a virtually helpless position before the F105s could pull out of their bomb runs.

Now, however, the F105 is out of the air war except for a small number of Thunderchiefs specially equipped with electronic-warfare gear for use against North Vietnamese surface-to-air missile sites and radar.

In the current air campaign against the North, much of the work is being done by agile F4 Phantom jets. U.S. Air Force and Navy planes on bombing missions over North Vietnam are escorted by fighters virtually all the time, officials said.

Over-all, the United States has lost about 35 planes over North Vietnam this year, mostly from antiaircraft-artillery fire. This compares with 44 to 46 MIGs lost, counting two dropped by naval antiaircraft weapons and 8 to 10 destroyed on the ground.

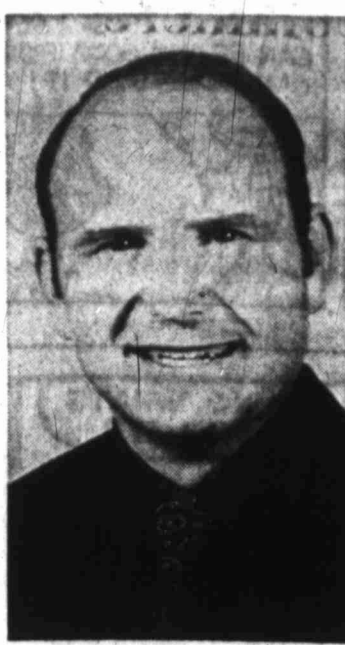
### RAPE CASE DATE BOOKED

### \$10,000 Bail Frees Lee Otis At Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Black activist Lee Otis Johnson, convicted in 1968 of giving a marijuana cigarette to an under-

cover police agent and sentenced to 30 years in prison, was ordered freed on \$10,000 bond Friday.

U.S. District Court Judge Carl O. Bue, who earlier ordered the state to free Johnson or retry him within 90 days, ordered Johnson's release pending the state's appeal of that ruling.

Johnson is confined at the Diagnostic Unit of the state prison at Huntsville.

Johnson's lawyer, William F. Walsh of Houston, said he will try to get Johnson out of prison

late Friday, "it humanly possible."

"I feel good about getting out," Johnson told the Houston Chronicle by telephone from Huntsville. He declined further comment.

Bue ordered Johnson's release after the state offered no evidence that Johnson's freedom would pose a threat to the community.

In asking that bond be set, Walsh cited testimony by Houston Mayor Louie Welch at the time he and his staff

considered Johnson to be vocal but not dangerous.

The bond hearing held Friday was ordered by Judge Homer Thornberry of the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans. Earlier, Bue had denied without comment Johnson's plea for appeal bond.

Johnson's lawyers then appealed to Thornberry.

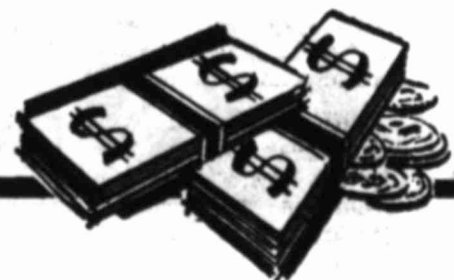

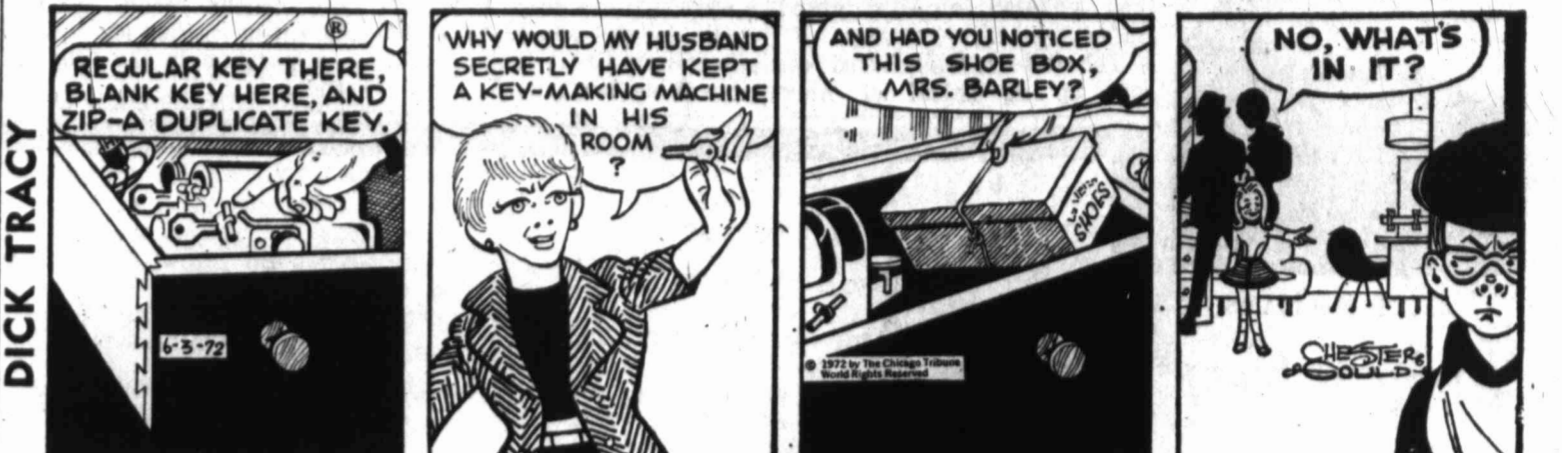
