Holding three stewardesses and two pilots hostage, he shifted to another UAL 727 when told the first plane was low on fuel and had a bad en-

Minutes after the second plane took off, the hijacker jumped in darkness into remote sagebrush-covered hills near Lake Washoe, about 25 miles south of Reno.

Loetterle said Reno police officers nabbed Heady five hours later when he walked into an area near the lake where they had "staked out a suspect car." He said a parachute, gun and clothing similar to what witnesses said the hijacker was wearing were found nearby.

Sure Bremer **Acted Alone**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The FBI has closed is investigation of the travels of Arthur H. Bremer, charged with shooting Gov. George C. Wallace, and concluded that Bremer acted alone with no accomplices, the Washington Post reports.

In its Saturday editions, the Post quoted federal sources as saying that hundreds of federal agents have traced Bremer's movements across the United States and Canada prior to the May 15 shooting.

Fay Captures Howard County

Albert Fay defeated Henry Grover by a margin of over 2-1 in the Howard County Republican balloting for governor.

Fay polled a total of 95 votes to only 44 for Grover. The GOPs rallied only eight votes in ab-sentee balloting and the two split those votes right down the line.

The Republicans had only one voting box in Saturday's balloting. That was set up in Goliad Junior High School.

The Fay-Grover race was the only contested election on the Republican ballot in the second primary.

The winner, of course, will be pitted against the Democratic standard-bearer in the November general election.

Revenue Bonds Will Be Issued By HCHA

Directors of the Howard County Hospital Authority are to meet in special session at noon Monday in the conference room of the Medical Center Memorial Hospital to issue first mortgage revenue bonds to finance proposed improvements at Medical Center Memorial Hospital.

According to the description of the bonds in the announcement posted by the authority direc-tors, the total value of the bonds to be issued cannot exceed \$1,700,000. The non-taxable bonds do not reach maturity until June 1, 2012.

Funds obtained through the sale of bonds are to be used to increase the bed-patient capacities of Medical Center and to provide a new care service center for a \$2,500,000 building program,





I decided to gamble and take the daring route to the green.

To do it right, I needed a long, fair-ly high tee shot. I had a short, fairly low tee shot right into one of the trees. The ball bounced off the tree into the badlands and nestled against a rock.

Playing it where it lay, I drove directly into the same tree and ended up an awesome two feet nearer the green. But at least the ball was clear of rocks, although it was in deep grass. Or so I thought.

Keeping my elbow straight and my eye on the ball, I smashed a three-wood into a rock shattering the clubhead.

I eventually arrived at the green and put on a demonstration of putting. I putted four times.

The ninth hole story was very similar; only this time I bent the head of a fiveiron.

Luckily for my self-control and the few remaining clubs that I had in my bag, it rained out the final nine holes of the tournament.

Incidentally, as I mentioned before, this was only the third time I've played this year. The first time I played, Arkadelphia, Ark., had its only snowfall of the winter the next day. The second time I played, I had to quit after 12 holes because of hail. Monday, it rained.

But at any rate, I didn't leave the tournament empty-handed. I did get the Bonehead Award for highest score. The prize was a trophy with a golfer with a wrecked club. Probably a three-wood.

Like I said, my welcome to Big Spring was rough.

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

Fishing Has Been Slow

By DOUG SIMPSON

Fishing on area lakes has been slow for several weeks now, with few large fish being taken. Speculation among area fishermen seem to attribute the cause to the fish being in the midst of the spawn.

Although bass feed heavily before and after the spawn, they will practically quit feeding during the spawning process. They will, however, protect their nest from any intruder, including fishing lures

Information gathered by Texas Parks & Wildlife biologists from Amistad Reservoir gives some insight as to where to fish during the spawn. T.P.&W. biologists donned underwater diving tanks to observe the bass in their own territory last spring. They observed nine bass nests for six hours per day for 15 days in the midst of the hatching effort.

They found the bass nests to range from 4 to 14 feet in depth and were 12 to 27 inches in diameter. The nests were observed on a variety of bottom surfaces, including sand, rock, gravel, and dirt. The nest sites were always swept clean and usually were found near cover such as rock outcroppings, brush, or boulders.

The bass were extremely pugnacious, charging when divers approached too close to the nests. One biologist whose observation brought him too close had a three-pound bass grab his hand bulldog fashion - and twist vigorously enough to cause bleeding.

A lure crossing a nest is likely to have one of several things happen to it. The bass may attack it with a show of anger, or simply push it away. Bass may also pick up the lure simply to move it away from the nest.

When spawning the fish will usually not inhale the entire lure as he will when feeding. He simply gets enough hold on the lure to remove it from the vicinity of the nest. Therefore, when fishing over spawning areas, fish the lure slowly and at the slightest hint of a pickup, set the hook, as you probably won't get a chance on that fish again.

The smaller and younger bass, not yet driven to spawn, will usually be in the same type habitat in which you have found them before and will hit a lure about the same as always.

Whether you are after the big ones or just after fish in general, if speculation is correct, fishing will soon break loose with the end of the spawn so keep a hook in the water, a hand on your fishing rod, and . . . Bass Wishes.

The second debate between Sen. McGovern and Sen. Humphrey, it seems to me, confirms this: that George McGovern is going to get the Democratic nomination. I cannot imagine that Mr. Humphrey knows less well than other political analysts what the fates have decided. That no doubt is why, on television, George McGovern looked so cool and confident, and Hubert Humphrey sounded so raspy and edgy. And no doubt Mr. Humphrey's desperation was in part responsible for his disastrous performance. This isn't to say that McGovern came out of it with the marbles, but for all of his vagueness, his non-sequiturs, his banalities, there was an air of assurance which is the smell of the victory.

MR. HUMPHREY began with an apology. In his prime, he'd have known that it would probably emerge in the headlines. It sounded unnecessary even as Mr. Humphrey spoke it. Political exchanges are not lapidary models of the syllogistic art. Granted, in the classroom it goes this way: 1) People who believe in confiscatory taxation are fools. 2) George McGovern believes in confiscatory taxation. Therefore 3) George McGovern is a fool. It was rather painful hearing Mr. Humphrey explain that "if" people took what he said as being "personal" against George McGovern, then he wanted to "apologize" to Sen. McGovern, who is a "fine" man.

THEN THE SENATORS began exchanging statistics, dealing in the billions of dollars, and the craft began to show. Hubert Humphrey was out to suggest that the calculations of George McGovern were irresponsible, and of course they are irresponsible, but it doesn't sound very convincing when Hubert Humphrey suddenly puts on the toga of guardian of the exchequer. Hubert Humphrey, like Elenor Roosevelt, in the fleeted phrase of James Burnham, treats the whole world as his own personal slum project.



since the United States resumed heavy bombing of North Vietnam in April. This record is a turnabout from the late stages of the 1965-68 air war against the North when the fighter score was nearly even and, for a time,

North Vietnamese MIGs outkilled American jets. Many of the U.S. planes that attacked North Vietnam in the late 1960s were Air Force F105 Thunderchiefs, so awkward to maneuver when bomb-loaded that they were derided with the nickname "Thud."

Veterans of the air war said the F105s often flew northwar without escort in those day and MIGs caught some of ther in a virtually helpless positio before the F105s could pull ou of their bomb runs. Now, however, the F105 is ou

This compares with 44 t 46 MIGs lost, counting two dropped by naval antiaircraf weapons and 8 to 10 destroyed


