This should just about be "report card" week at Baird schools — now you'll know for sure just how the youngsters are getting along with this business of the three R's. Grades, as a whole, are very satisfactory, and teachers are very pleased with the progress their students are making.

Miss Sybil Myers' first grade, twenty-three students strong, have all been issued pre-primer books, which they can read fluently. Some three-fourths of the children have completed these first books, and are well into the second reader. Number work progresses in the first grade, too, and little folks can count orally to fifty and write the numerals through the "teens." Prescribed work for the average six year old for the first six weeks of school is to learn to count to five and to complete a study in reading readiness, so you can readily see these youngsters are well advanced.

Mrs. Hubert Ross' first grade is also setting a fast pace. These children have also completed their first reading books and are into the second. Parents and faculty alike are extremely proud of this year's "bumper crop" of first graders who are doing so splendidly in their school work.

Mrs. John Bowlus' second grade, with emphasis on personal health and hygiene, have made and illustrated very attractive booklets "How Healthy Can You Be?" These books are on

display in the class room for discussion.

Mrs. Nodge's third grade has begun work on a western unit in art and soon boots, spurs, saddles, and lassos will decorate their wall boards. Geography and science classes are interesting here, too, and young pupils are learning how to read compasses and make weather charts. Mrs. Nodge's "Junior Dramatics" are coming in for a great deal of praise, too, and children love dramatizing favorite fairy tales, such as "Jack and the Beanstalk" and "Snow-White."

Six weeks exams have taken most of the time of students in the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. Miss Grimes' fourth grade is working hard on the rules of penmanship and how to apply them. Children here are looking forward to lessons in block-printing, which they will soon receive.

Highlight news of the week comes from the office of Mr. Shrader, principal of the school, for he reports that our Junior football squad, the Baird Cubs played their first real game of the season with Carbon Juniors in Carbon, and brought home the bacon in the form of a 14-0 score. The teams were very evenly matched, and with the exception of a two-point safety in the first quarter, the game was scoreless until the last quarter when two touchdowns were scored by Darryl Harris for the Cubs. The game was a close one and a good one — one that the Cubs and their coach, Earl Ellis, can be proud of. Several cars of Bairdites made the trip to Carbon to see the fabulous Cubs in action, and none were disappointed. Mr. Shrader also reports that our youngsters were exceedingly well-behaved, on the grounds, and on the trip, and that he congratulates all of them on their conduct and sportsmanship. The children were accompanied by parents and teachers, including Mrs. Lee Ivey, Mrs. Nodge, Mr. Shrader and Coach Ellis. THE TEN PERCENT pay hike for more than a million federal employees, two speeches by President Truman — one ripping into attacks on the loyalty and efficiency of government workers and the other comparing Russia's slavery and American freedom — promised political fireworks over the President's nominations of U.S. delegates to the United Nations, passage of the giant defense funds bill, and long drawn-out conferences over final pattern of the new tax bill were highlights of the Washington scene.

Already charges are being made that the tax bill, as passed by the senate, is a boon for the wealthier of both individuals and corporations and adds, instead of closes, tax loopholes with no changes in excess profits provisions this year. Fight over tax on co-ops was eased off when the senate reversed itself and moderated its tax plan by making only unallocated dividends taxable.

So as the bill emerged with reference to co-ops, it provides only for taxation of the annual earnings of co-ops which are neither paid to members nor allocated to them as capital credits or revolving funds. This was a victory for the farm organizations, although the issue of withholding a certain percent of patronage dividends remains to be decided in the conference.

The senate, during the week, approved a postal rate increase which would add something like \$403,000,000 to the postal department revenue over a three year period. However, pay hike of postal employees, which will amount to about \$200,000,000 annually, will more than offset the annual increase in rates, so that instead of alleviating the half-a-billion dollar deficit in the department, the net result will be a bigger deficit next year.

The defense bill approved in the senate by a 79 to 0 roll call would provide almost 60 billion dollars for defense spending during the next two years. Included in the total is five billion for air power

expansion which was over and above the budget asked by the President, but, after cutting in some other sectors, the net of the bill is almost two billion above budget requests.

Senator Paul Douglas of Illinois again conducted a single-handed and losing fight to slash the funds. However, the only major reduction came on a voice vote on the motion by Senator Alexander Smith of New Jersey reducing total appropriations by 2.5 percent. Douglas did finally gain some amendments which would apply restrictive language to some appropriations rather than cause actual reductions in expenditures.

More fireworks were expected on the political griddle as the senate elections subcommittee was scheduled to take up the hearings on Senator William Benton's resolution calling for the ouster from the senate of Senator Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin as a "character assassin."

In the meantime Democratic National chairman William M. Boyle faces the same kind of a probe and the same charges which were made against Guy Gabrielson, Republican national chairman, just about a year ago. Boyle is charged with having used influence to obtain a loan from the RFC for a St. Louis firm for which he had been counsel. Boyle denied it.

Gabrielson was charged with having used his influence to obtain a loan for a Texas Company for which he was counsel and president and with having accepted a huge fee for having done so. Gabrielson also denied any wrong doing, saying only he had nothing to do with getting the loan from the RFC and only drew \$15,000 salary as president and \$10,000 as fees for his law firm for his services.

There were many political indications of some significance — the national Republican roundup committee, organized in 1948, announced that Senator Taft is the top choice among GOP party officials for the party's 1952 presidential nomination.

**Notice of Election for the Re-Allocation of County Taxes**

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF CALLAHAN To the Resident Qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Callahan County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 13 day of November, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners

Court on the 8 day of October, 1951, which is as follows: On this the 8 day of October, 1951, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, Texas, convened in Regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Baird, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

- J. L. Farmer, County Judge,
- J. W. Patton, Commissioner Precinct No. 1,
- Clyde T. Floyd, Commissioner Precinct No. 2,
- I. G. Mobley, Commissioner Precinct No. 3,
- Claude Foster, Commissioner Precinct No. 4,

being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following: Commissioner Mobley introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Floyd. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners J. W. Patton, Clyde T. Floyd, I. G. Mobley, Claude Foster.  
NOES: None.

The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided:

Therefore, be it ordered by the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, Texas:

That a special election be held in said County on the 13 day of November, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Forty cents (40c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding Fifteen Cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding Twenty Cents (20c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."
