"I want a pilot," he shouted to police and FBI agents who surrounded the plane as it stood at a terminal gate. A group of FBI agents and

police gathered near a ramp to the plane, using a baggage cart as a barricade. A man and woman took turns

using a bullhorn to call up to

Smith. The woman, identified by an FBI agent as Smith's mother, walked part way up the ramp at one point, talked with Smith, then returned.

Smith and the girl were visible just inside the plane.

Scores of airline passengers passed through the terminal as usual. Many seemed unaware of what was happening at the American gate

From the upper level of the airport terminal, newsmen could see Smith holding the girl in his arms. At times he and the girl could be seen sitting in

a front seat. Now and then he would carry the girl to the rear and then return to the front. Outside, on the ground, FBI agents talked to him using a bull horn. Reporters were kept

away and could not hear whether he made any reply. Earlier, he had shouted that

he did not want to see newsmen, cameras, or tape recorders. All available Cheektowaga

police, FBI agents and Buffalo homicide detectives rushed to the airport and surrounded the plane at Gate Seven.

Police said that, after the stabbing, Smith grabbed the girl and drove to the airport. There, they said, he created a commotion at the post office and threatened to harm the girl. He then dragged the girl along as he climbed aboard the

Police said Smith had left a note at his mother's home. They said it read:

"I love you. I love myself. I love everybody. I love God, but if I have to do away with myself I will.



# **Congress' Job, Says Court**

The Supreme Court has delivered itself of a dmark decision in a case involving Army surveillance of civilians.

It stemmed from a suit brought by four individuals and nine groups, some of them war protesters, challenging Army surveillance of civilians conducted by some 1,000 agents beginning in 1965

The U. S. Circuit Court for the District of Columbia had ruled for the plaintiffs. It had ordered a full dress court inquiry into Army surveillance.

This, the Supreme Court said in a 5-4 ruling, was in error. Chief Justice Warren E. Burger said it was up to Congress, not the courts, to sit "as virtually continuing monitors of the wisdom and soundness of executive action."

(It is significant to note that the five-man majority was made up of the four Nixon appointees to the court plus Justice Byron White.)

The court majority's ruling did not rule on the propriety of the disputed Army surveillance, but only on whose business it was to probe it -

the judiciary, or Congress. **Burger wrote:** 

"We, of course, intimate no view with respect to the propriety or desirability, from a policy standpoint, of the challenged activities of the Department of the Army.

"Our conclusion is a narrow one, namely, that on this record the respondents have not presented a case for resolution by the courts."

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., North Carolina Democrat who argued the case in the court, said the decison was "unwise and wrong." But he said he would introduce a bill in the Senate to hold military surveillance to strict limits. It can be hoped that the Supreme Court in

the future may confine itself more strictly to interpretation of the law and the intent of the Constitution, rather than making new law by judicial decree

### **Time For Thanksgiving**

It's time for another doxology for the rains of Tuesday.

They hardly could have been more timely, for most of the late cotton - which is the preponderance of this year's crop. Some of it, where there had been relatively light rains, was just barely hanging on. That, along with the sectors where the crop was up to a vigorous stand, were not only given a reprieve but in many instances

WASHINGTON - When Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien of the **Democratic National Committee went** to Miami Beach to take a thorough look at convention arrangements he was given a detailed briefing on security. He was to admit later that it all seemed a bit superfluous in light of his long experience with conventions which, however turbulent, never seemed to threaten life and limb.

THEN CAME the famous break-inbugging incident at Democratic headquarters here and O'Brien understood the very real need for the security precautions being taken at Miami Beach. It will be the most securityconscious national convention ever held, with routines bound to cause friction and resentment.

Farcical though it seemed at first, the bugging episode was serious enough in itself. Here was this insidious snooping business carried out by five men with connections if not with the White House, as has been repeatedly denied, then with the Committee to Re-elect President Nixon.

WHAT GIVES the episode a more ominous look and ties it in with the tight security at the convention is the connection of the men caught in the bugging act with the Cuban exile movement in Florida. Three of the five men were born in Cuba.



Years later, the band donned uniforms and mounted to the platform of the bandshell on the courthouse square and mixed in a few waltzes and overtures with the martial music.

OCCASIONALLY, there was speaking with silver-tongued tributes to the glories of the nation and the founding fathers, tributes to those who died to preserve the republic, and a tingling appeal to renewed dedication to the fatherland. This was embellished by flag-draped stands dispensing sandwiches and lemonade, and later red soda pop.

Occasionally, the celebration centered around the old ball park. Long pits were dug, filled with mesquite and fired. Then poultry wire was stretched over the coals and loaded with chunks of beef for the noon barbecue the next day.

FOLLOWING THIS there was a home-made rodeo with tough cowhands chewing on the ear of a bronc while riders got a good grip and yelled "let 'er go!" There was some

# Foster Parents: They Share Huge Wealth Of Family Life

#### By CAROLYN COIL Copley News Service

LOS ANGELES - Home is love and security to a child. It's where he is nourished physically and emotionally. Yet, there are children, who through no fault of theirs, suddenly find the door marked home is closed to them. If the situation is permanent, the child may be adopted.

But, what about the child whose parents are hospitalized or imprisoned? What about the youngster whose mother and father neglect or abuse him? What about the boy or girl who must wait for someone to assume guardianship after the parents' death!

#### DEPRIVED

Where do these children, temporarily deprived of a home. go to get the continuing support family life provides? If there is a vacancy, they

may go directly to a foster home in the same general area where they lived with their parents. Otherwise, they go to a detention home

"No matter how nice an institution is, it's not home. There is no way a home can be compared with an institution," says Mrs. Muriel Skoff, consultant to Community

Assistance to Homeless Youngsters (CATHY), a volunteer program of the Department of Public Social Service, Los Angeles.

ABUSE

One goal of CATHY is to recruit foster homes for the temporary care of homeless children who for some reason cannot remain with their natural parents.

The majority of children in need of placement are victims of neglect and abuse. Others may be deserted, or their parents have a physical or mental condition which prevents them caring for the child. The ultimate goal, in most

cases, is to rehabilitate all members of the natural family so they may be reunited. These children seldom

become available for adoption, but for the parent with lots of love to share, foster child care may be a practical way a family can increase its size, at least temporarily.

There are fewer babies being placed for adoption now than in the past. And it is taking much longer to adopt a baby. Foster care can be an alternative for the family that wants to share its home and family life with a child

Placement of a foster child is not permanent. He usually returns to live with his natural parents when the home situation changes

#### NEED LOVE

But, once there is a vacancy in a foster home, usually it is not too long before there is another child to fill it. "These children really need

love. They need to be surrounded by it and they won't get it in an institution," says Mrs. Skoff.

Mrs. Rene Burger is one foster mother. As she talks about her foster children, Mrs. Burger keeps an eye on Cookie, her adopted daughter, and Mickey, her foster son, who will start school in the fall.

"Mickey was 17 months old when he came to us and he didn't know how to kiss. He just sat in the corner for hours,' she says. "He came to me at 11 p.m. from a burning building in scorched pajamas. He's not afraid of fire now, but was for a couple years.

"It's been time-consuming work, but the satisfaction is great," says Mrs. Burger, who also has a 19-year-old daughter and a 12-year-old son. She has been a foster mother for six vears

Korean government warned its people today not to expect speedy results from its agreement with North Korea to work for improved relations and reunification of the Korean peninsula.

Premier Kim Jong-pil urged the nation to maintain its vigilance, asserting that a piece of paper from the Communists containing promises does not mean anything unless the pledges are implemented.

Kim told the National Assembly that Park Sung-chul, North Korea's second vice premier. used "undescribably abusive" words in attacking the South on the same day the North-South agreement was disclosed.

He said nobody should be lieve that territorial reunification is around the corner.

"Our political ideology cannot agree with that of the Communists," he said. "and although our dialogue opened as a result of the joint communique, we cannot change overnight our ideas, systems and life.

South and North Korea an nounced Tuesday that they had held secret, high-level talks in Pyongyang and Seoul in Mar and had agreed to set up a joint committee to negotiate exchanges in a number of fields and to promote reunification by peaceful means.



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# Entries Coming In Slowly For **BS** Invitational

Entries have been coming in slowly for the 41st annual Big Spring Invitational Golf Tournament; however, club professional C. G. Griffin expects the rate of entries to accelerate within the next few days.

Through Tuesday morning, only eight people, including defending champion Mike Weaver, had entered the tournament. Griffin said he expected 120-140 golfers to play. He expected many entrants Tuesday, but said the rains that fell on the area Tuesday morning may have been a hindrance.

Griffin added that he felt the rains will improve the course which would aid the tournament. Deadline for entering the tournament is 6 p.m. Thursday.

Griffin said there will be a championship flight and as many other flights as are necessary. The championship flight can be entered by anybody who wants to play in it. Pat Weaver is leading the qualifying at the Country Club with a round total of 205.

# JAIL, DRUDGERY, SLAVERY **Presidency** - - That Splendid Misery

(EDITOR'S NOTE: As the time of roll, think: Would you really roll, think: Would you really b be president? Others have the office, "prison," "slavery," arudgery," Thomas Jefferson s summed it op best— "A splen-

Despite the testimony of the exquisite drawbacks of the job, men still passionately seek to be president.

"The four most miserable years of my life were my four vears in the presidency," said John Quincy Adams.

A man who seeks the presidency for anything that it will bring to him is an audacious fool," said Woodrow Wilson.

Abraham Lincoln's friend, Ward Lamon, said Lincoln once cried out ... "from my boyhood my ambition was to be president. I am president of one part of this divided country, at least, but look at me! I wish I had never been born.

Chief executives have described the office as "prison, "jail," "drudgery," "slavery, "a splendid misery." Theodore Roosevelt, who

probably enjoyed the office

more than any other president, said "a president has a great chance; his position is almost that of a king and prime minister rolled into one.

William Howard Taft thought of posterity. "... When taken into consideration that I go into history as a president," he said, "and my children and children's children are the better placed on account of that fact, I am inclined to think that to be president well compensates for all the trials and criticism he has to bear." The same threads of thought about the "trials and criti-

cisms" run through the observations of many presidents. The most common are: 1—The perennial struggle

with Congress. "It better be known at the outset." said James A. Gar-

field, "Whether the president is the head of government or the registered clerk of the Senate." "Presidents cannot always kick evil-minded persons out of the front door," said Herbert Hoover. "Such persons are often selected by the electors to represent them." 2. Friends, office-seekers and talking.

"One of the difficulties of the office . . . is that it is very difficult to think while so many people are talking. ....'' said Wilson Warren G. Harding said: "In

this job, I'm not worried about my enemies. I can take care of them. It's my friends who are giving me trouble.' "The presidency," said John F. Kennedy, "is not a very

place to make new good friends. Said Grover Cleveland: "Gentlemen, I will not go into

the White House pledged to you or anyone else. I will make no secret promises. I'll be damned if I will." 3. Presidential loneliness.

"This is the loneliest place in the world," said Taft. "The naked emptiness of a

battlefield, when the soldier is all alone in the smoke and clamor and terror of war, is comparable to the loneliness at times of the president," said Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Kennedy called the presidency "a high and lonely office." 4. The weight of decision making.

"No one can make the decisions for him," said Harry S. Truman. "No one can know all the processes and stages of his thinking in making important decisions. Even those closest to him, even members of his immediate family, never know all the reasons why he comes to certain conclusions.'

Calvin Coolidge said, "The president gets the best advice he can, uses the best judgment at his command, and leaves the event in the hands of providence.

Kennedy was deeply interested in the decision-making process. One of his many observations was, "It is much easier to make the speeches than it is finally to make the judgments, because, unfortunately, your advisers are frequently divided. If you take the wrong course---and on occasion, I have-the president bears the responsibility, quite rightly. The advisers may move on to new ad-

5. Feeling of inadequacy. "Five more weeks will relieve me of a drudgery to which I am no longer equal," said Thomas Jefferson. Also, "I'm tired of an office where I can do no more good than many others who would be glad to be employed in it."

And yet, for all the disadvantages of the presidency, the office had its compensations for some of its occupants.

Lyndon B. Johnson had sometimes referred to the White House as "lonely acres," and complained about being "locked up behind that big black iron fence.'

But he also said the presidency offers the best working conditions in the world-good pay, expert help and fringe benefits that would be the envy of a maharajah.

"Don't feel sorry for me," he once remarked to a group of newsmen who were trailing him around the White House yard. "You should feel sorry for yourselves."
