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### WILL FACE CHARGE OF ATTEMPTED HIJACKING

## Buffalo Man Gives Up Hostage

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A man surrendered to an FBI agent early today after holding his 17-month-old daughter hostage at a terminal gate and threatening to kill her in an abortive attempt to hijack an American Airlines jet, police said.

The FBI said the man, identified as Charles Smith, 23, of Buffalo, agreed to give up after being assured that police would not harm him.

According to the FBI and local police, the entire episode began with a stabbing incident in Buffalo's inner city during

the early morning hours. Richard Ash, special agent in charge of the FBI office here, said Smith boarded the unoccupied jetliner as it stood near a terminal gate about 5 a.m. at Buffalo International Airport.

He demanded that the airline provide a pilot for the craft and said he would kill the child if his demands were not met.

"He apparently decided he was not going to get out of the airport," Ash said, describing how Smith put down the knife he was carrying and walked down the ramp of the plane 2 1/2

hours later, carrying his daughter. He was accompanied by an unidentified FBI agent who had sneaked aboard the plane.

The child, identified as Jetuan Smith, was not injured, Ash said. Ash said blood on the infant's clothing was Smith's from a wound he suffered earlier.

Ash said Smith would face a charge of attempted hijacking. Police said Smith had allegedly stabbed the girl's mother and a man earlier in Buffalo. The woman was reported in critical condition, the man in

fair condition, at Deaconess Hospital.

Police said Smith apparently slipped aboard the unoccupied jet about 5 a.m. and demanded that American Airlines provide a pilot for the craft.

"I want a pilot," he shouted to police and FBI agents who surrounded the plane as it stood at a terminal gate.

A group of FBI agents and police gathered near a ramp to the plane, using a baggage cart as a barricade.

A man and woman took turns using a bullhorn to call up to

Smith. The woman, identified by an FBI agent as Smith's mother, walked part way up the ramp at one point, talked with Smith, then returned.

Smith and the girl were visible just inside the plane.

Scores of airline passengers passed through the terminal as usual. Many seemed unaware of what was happening at the American gate.

From the upper level of the airport terminal, newsmen could see Smith holding the girl in his arms. At times he and the girl could be seen sitting in

a front seat. Now and then he would carry the girl to the rear and then return to the front.

Outside, on the ground, FBI agents talked to him using a bull horn. Reporters were kept away and could not hear whether he made any reply.

Earlier, he had shouted that he did not want to see newsmen, cameras, or tape recorders.

All available Cheektowaga police, FBI agents and Buffalo homicide detectives rushed to the airport and surrounded the plane at Gate Seven.

Police said that, after the stabbing, Smith grabbed the girl and drove to the airport. There, they said, he created a commotion at the post office and threatened to harm the girl. He then dragged the girl along as he climbed aboard the jet.

Police said Smith had left a note at his mother's home.

They said it read:

"I love you. I love myself. I love everybody. I love God, but if I have to do away with myself I will.

### Heavy Traffic Is Noted Downtown

Downtown Big Spring was crowded today and parking spaces were scarce as after-holiday sales by several downtown stores lured shoppers from their homes despite rain-threatening skies.

Getting across Main Street at its intersections with Fourth and Third Streets was a challenge today as traffic backed up into the intersections while shoppers vied for parking spaces or tried to catch a glimpse of sale goods in store windows.

Some stores followed the window shoppers by covering their facades to the lookers-on to come inside to browse and possibly buy.

Largest crowds were apparently drawn by the stores advertising sales in women's apparel.

### Datamate Stock May Be Sold

George A. McAlister Jr., president of DataMate Computer Systems, Inc. of Big Spring, said today that he and eight other DataMate stockholders have agreed in principle to sell 2.7 million presently outstanding shares of DataMate's common stock.

The purchaser of the privately arranged sale is Jeff Steel Fabricators, Inc. of Denver, Colo.

All the terms of the transaction have not been finalized, and certain aspects remain to be negotiated. The selling group will retain ownership of an aggregate of approximately 300,000 DataMate shares out of 4.9 million outstanding.

Jeffco is a privately-owned company fabricating heavy steel items to customers' specifications, primarily air pollution control devices for heavy industry.

McAlister said that he had been advised by Jeffco that if the sale is consummated, Jeffco and DataMate will be consolidated. It is contemplated that the computer manufacturing stores advertising sales in women's apparel.

### Kind Deed Fatal

SCURRY, Tex. (AP) — A kind deed during a July 4 holiday visit resulted in death for two people here Tuesday.

The victims were Curtis Henry Schoemacher, 55, of Ennis, and his aunt, Mrs. Buck Howard, 60, of Scurry, whom he was visiting.

Kaufman County sheriff's officers said the couple saw a little girl, Barbara Taylor, limping in the street after she had been bitten by a dog. They drove her home and told her father what had happened.

The father, muttering that "something needed to be done about that dog," went into the house and came out again with a shotgun, the officers said. A moment later Schoemacher and his aunt fell to the ground, mortally wounded. Their kind act had cost them their lives — and it wasn't even their dog that bit the girl.

A spokesman for the sheriff said they were holding Gilbert H. Taylor, 52, but had not yet brought charges against him. They said Taylor did not know the other two.

## Mayor Daley Given Setback By U.S. Court Of Appeals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals here today handed a victory to the forces of Sen. George McGovern in their battle with the Democratic Credentials Committee for California delegates.

At the same time, forces of Chicago Mayor Richard J. Da-

ley were given a setback by the court in the second half of the dual attack on the committee's hotly disputed decisions.

The appeals court reversed a District Court decision which had upheld the committee's action of stripping 151 delegates from California. The Circuit Court ordered the district bench to rewrite its decision in the California case in accordance with an opinion not yet filed.

#### BRIEF ORDER

The Circuit Court rejected the appeal of Daley's forces in one case and in two others directed that state court action be prohibited insofar as the delegates from Illinois which were rejected by the committee are concerned.

The brief order of the appeals court carried no reasons for the action. The judges were expected to file opinions later in the day. The District Court ruled Monday that the federal judiciary had no place in the debate over delegates from the two states.

The Credentials Committee had issued decisions that stripped Sen. George S. McGovern of 151 California delegates and told Mayor Richard J. Daley and 58 other uncommitted Chicago delegates to stay home.

The committee decisions were likened to a "self-destruct button" by the party's lawyer Tuesday even as he fought to uphold them before the appeals court.

Party counsel Joseph A. Califano told the three judges that federal courts have no business in the party's business. His argument echoed the decision of a U.S. District Court which prompted the Fourth of July appeal.

#### 13 CONTESTS

McGovern and Daley forces appealed in their fight to overturn committee decisions which ousted 59 Illinois delegates, including Daley, and ripped the winner-take-all prize of the California presidential primary from McGovern to award the state's 271 delegates proportionately among candidates, based on their percentage of the vote.

Meanwhile, the Credentials Committee completed its pre-convention agenda and passed on to the convention the job of settling 13 contests over the seating of hundreds of delegates.

Many of the dissents concern issues raised by the mandate from the reform commission originally headed by McGovern that women, young people and minorities be represented at the convention in proportion to their population.

In the court fight over the Illinois and California challenges, Califano argued that the party may do as it wishes. To illustrate, he said some believe that seating Daley and letting McGovern have the delegates he won would be the shrewd political move.

But, he said of the party, "if it wants to push the self-de-

struct button on these issues, that's its 1st Amendment right."

#### PARTY REFORMS

Arguing for McGovern forces in the California case, attorney Joseph L. Kauh Jr. said the party reforms recently instituted specifically do not bar winner-take-all primaries. He claimed the committee had acted arbitrarily and unconstitutionally in changing the rules on McGovern after the primary.

Successors to the ousted Illinois delegates were selected in meetings in the state's congressional districts. Original selection was by popular vote of Illinois Democrats.

### Old Vehicles Get Attention

Captain Leo Hull, Big Spring Police Department, reported today the results of enforcement for the city ordinance recently approved to allow removal of abandoned cars from city property.

Voluntary disposal of the vehicles is encouraged, Hull said. The owners are allowed 72 hours to take action after notification.

After three weeks of surveying Section One (the area east of Goliad St.), 50 abandoned vehicles were traced to owners, the owners were notified and 47 of the vehicles were removed from city property on voluntary compliance with the ordinance. The remaining cars were removed by salvage yards through contract with the city. Two were removed from private property, one from city property.

The city has been divided into five sections, Hull explained, to better organize the campaign. Each section will be thoroughly worked before survey of another section begins.

### FIRST AT FIDDLERS' CONVENTION 'Turkey In The Straw'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Walt Koken — somber-faced and gap-toothed with the wide-open look of a country boy — adjusted a sweat-rimmed black felt hat, tucked a fiddle under his chin and cut loose.

#### BARE FEET

Hundreds of bare feet beat the mud, calloused hands pounded one another and shrill yelps of approval rent the air as he sawed out a raucous, rambunctious "Turkey in the Straw."

It was enough to win him first prize as the best old-time fiddler in the First Annual Fiddlers' Convention Tuesday at the Smithsonian Institution's Festival of American Folklife.

For five hours fiddlers from across the country spelled one

another on a wooden platform in the middle of a muddy Mall jammed with fiddling enthusiasts.

The program noted that "fiddlers' conventions and contests have been an American folk institution since the early part of the 18th century and probably even earlier."

But they obviously have caught on with the young. Koken and most of the other contestants looked to be in their 20s and 30s and so was many of the audience.

"SAIL AWAY, LADY" The tunes they played have been around a lot longer. Besides "Turkey in the Straw," special favorites were "Arkansas Traveler" and the old church tune, "Are You Washed

in the Blood of the Lamb?"

Walt also won first prize for the most unusual tune—a Scotch-sounding "Sail Away, Lady" which, he told the crowd, "you can't hear on a record; you have to hear a fiddler play it."

In the old days, said the Smithsonian's program, "hats, handkerchiefs, socks, shoestrings, hams, flour, sugar, pocket knives, razor blades and even false teeth sometimes showed up as awards."

Walt got \$100 for his fiddling and \$50 for his tune. The toe-tapping sound of the fiddle wasn't the only nostalgic note on the Mall as the folk festival finished its five-day stand.

### Pompidou Fires France's Premier

PARIS (AP) — President Georges Pompidou fired Jacques Chaban-Delmas as France's premier today and named Pierre Messmer to succeed him.

Chaban-Delmas has recently been under fire because of personal tax dealings.

Shortly after the announcement that Chaban-Delmas and his government had stepped down, Pompidou summoned Messmer, like Chaban-Delmas one of the earliest followers of Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

An exchange of letters between the president and Chaban-Delmas noted that Pompidou had asked the premier to leave the post he had held for a little more than three years.

Messmer, 56, who had been De Gaulle's defense minister, had a long record as a soldier and administrator of France's overseas possessions. He fought in the French-Indochina war and was taken prisoner by the Viet Minh.

The dismissal of Chaban-Delmas came quickly on the heels of his return with Pompidou

from a summit conference in West Germany.

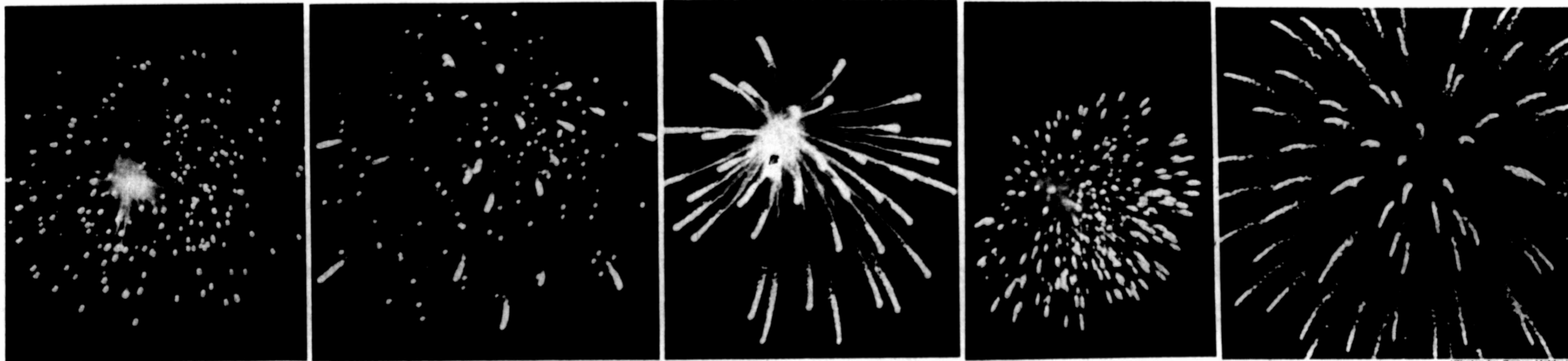
Although there was no announcement as to the reasons for the firing, all immediate signs pointed to Chaban-Delmas' dismissal because of domestic issues.

### Holiday Traffic Takes 749 Lives

By The Associated Press Traffic accidents across the nation claimed 749 lives during the Independence Day weekend.

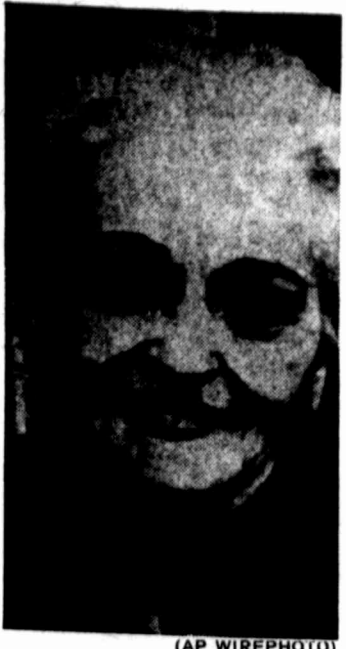
The National Safety Council had estimated in advance that 800 to 900 persons might be killed on streets and highways between 6 p.m. local time Friday and midnight Tuesday.

The record toll for any Independence Day weekend was 732 in 1967 when the holiday also ran four days. The count last year, a three-day weekend, was 638.

### Vega Recall Announced

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp. has announced its third major recall in three months for its subcompact Vega, notifying owners of about 500,000 Vegas to return them to dealers for replacement of possibly defective rear axles which could separate from the car.

The recall announced by GM's Chevrolet Division said 59 complaints had been received from owners of 1971 and 1972 models and 15 of these concerned incidents in which an axle and one rear wheel had dropped off.

"Two of these cases involved minor body damages to the vehicles," a GM spokesman said. However, he added, "No injuries have been reported."

The 500,000 Vegas represent virtually the entire production of the Chevrolet subcompact.

Dealers will inspect and replace without charge the rear axle shafts that may be defective, GM said.

The first Vega recall, announced in April, involved 130,000 of the 1972 models which were called back over a carburetor defect that GM said could cause the cars to catch fire.

In May, GM recalled 350,000 Vegas, both 1971 and 1972 models, because of a faulty carburetor bracket that GM said might cause the throttle to stick open.

The problem of reflections and sighting the ball against a transparent surface were solved by etching vertical, parallel lines into the inner, or court, surface of the lowest 2 1/2 feet of the glass. Most times, the ball hits the back wall below this level, the manufacturer found.

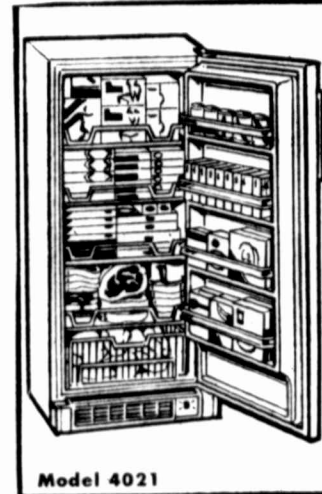

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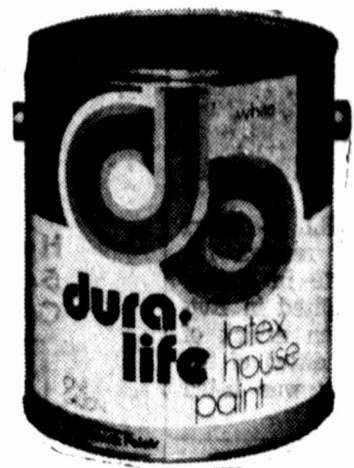

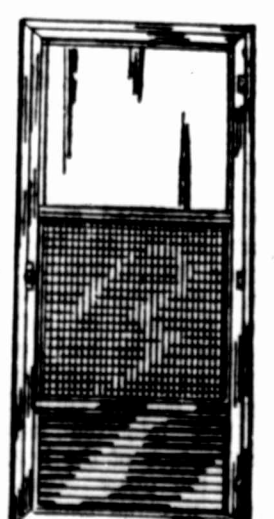

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JETS WRECK THREE DEPOTS

# Accidental Air Attack

SAIGON (AP) — American jets wrecked three major depots on the edges of Hanoi Tuesday in the heaviest raids on North Vietnam in weeks, and a 7th Fleet task force sank or damaged 12 supply barges off the North Vietnamese coast, the U.S. Command announced today.

In South Vietnam there was heavy fighting on the northern front and Hue was shelled for the fourth day. But no progress was reported from the paratroopers who reached the outskirts of Quang Tri City on Tuesday.

**CIVILIAN TARGETS**  
North Vietnam claimed that U.S. planes bombed and strafed residential areas of Hanoi, "killing or injuring many persons, and destroying or damaging hundreds of dwelling houses."

The U.S. Command denied ordering any attacks on civilian targets and said it had no information "indicating other than military targets were hit." But spokesmen acknowledged there may have been people working in the three supply and vehicle depots that were attacked during more than 320 strikes in North Vietnam Tuesday.

North Vietnam also claimed that two F4 Phantoms were shot down during the raids. The U.S. Command said it had no plane losses Tuesday to report yet. But it did announce that MIG21 interceptors shot down a pair of Phantoms southwest of Hanoi on June 27 and a surface-to-air missile brought down a third Phantom 40 miles

northeast of Hanoi July 1. Two of the fliers were rescued, and four are missing, the command said.

**PLANES LOST**

During the last two weeks, the U.S. Command has reported nine planes lost over North Vietnam and 16 fliers missing, raising the toll since the resumption of full-scale bombing on April 6 to 54 aircraft downed and 61 airmen missing.

In a delayed report which apparently had to be cleared by the Pentagon because of its political sensitivity, the command said that a naval task force last Saturday caught a flotilla of barges transporting supplies from offshore freighters presumed to be from the Communist bloc.

Navy spokesmen said the destroyers Berkeley, Everett F. Larson and Gurke waited until the barges were clear of the freighters, then blasted them with their five-inch guns. The spokesmen said the destroyers' radarmen observed that 12 bar-

ges were sunk or damaged, but the ships were unable to identify the nationality of either the freighters or the barges because of darkness.

**WAR SUPPLIES**

Radio Hanoi claimed today that North Vietnam is getting war supplies by sea through 12 coastal points which the United States had not been able to close by mines or offshore pa-

Police in Wauconda, Ill., said Edward G. Bulger, 24, was killed when some kind of fireworks device exploded in a crowd of spectators observing a display at Bangs Lake, 40 miles northwest of Chicago.

Eight other persons were treated and three of them were hospitalized following the explosion Tuesday night. All three were reported in satisfactory condition early today.

In Seattle, an errant skyrocket exploded in a crowd gathered near a fountain at the Seattle Center. Up to a dozen persons were injured and three of them were hospitalized. None was believed in serious condition.

Witnesses said the skyrocket started upward but appeared to "break off" and exploded in the crowd.

The fireworks display in Elsinore, Calif., went off all at once when a spark from a skyrocket touched off \$3,900 worth of starbursts, fire balls, aerial bombs and rockets.

trots. The broadcast did not locate any of the points.

In South Vietnam, the U.S. Command said, American planes accidentally attacked South Vietnamese marines five miles southeast of Quang Tri City. The command said 11 marines were killed and 30 were wounded. Spokesmen said the attack is under investigation.

Small clashes were reported east of Quang Tri City, and South Vietnamese forces were reported still on the outskirts of the provincial capital that is the first major objective of the 20,000-man counteroffensive launched last week.

**HEAVIER FIGHTING**

Heavier fighting broke out to the rear of the offensive. Spokesmen said North Vietnamese forces shelled and assaulted South Vietnamese positions about 10 miles southwest of Hue but were driven back with air and artillery strikes.

The Saigon command claimed 37 of the attackers killed and said South Vietnamese casualties were two killed and 12 wounded.

Hue was shelled Tuesday for the third night. Five 122mm rounds landed, wounding one soldier.

On the southern front, four fights raged along the Cambodian border 50 miles west of Saigon, and the Saigon command claimed 132 North Vietnamese troops were killed. It said South Vietnamese losses were six men killed and 27 wounded.

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**Cyclist Killed**

WICHITA FALLS (AP) — Airman Roger L. Jackson, 19, who was stationed here at Sheppard Air Force Base, was killed Monday night when his motorcycle and a car collided at a Wichita Falls intersection. His wife Donna, also 19, who was riding with him, suffered serious injuries.

Designers take our fashions and add colors or add trimmings. They mix a fabric design from one tribe with jewelry from another tribe. When they put a costume together it doesn't resemble any Indian tribe, and to us it looks funny because we know it is incorrect.

(A.) Indian designs, like those of other peoples, are copied or adapted because they have an authentic charm and beauty. The copying is a compliment, not an insult.

## New Owner Of Jax Brew

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The Jackson Brewing Co., which markets Jax of Fabacher beer, has been purchased by Ben U. Sisson of New Orleans in the second change of ownership for the firm in less than two years.

In announcing the transaction Sisson would not disclose the purchase price. When the brewery changed hands in December 1970, the price was about \$12 million.

Sisson has been operating the brewery for its former owner, JBC, Inc., a holding company which purchased Jax in 1970 from the Fabacher family, the original owners.

Sisson said the facility will be transferred from its French quarter location, but probably will remain in the metropolitan New Orleans area. The plant site stretches four blocks along the edge of the Mississippi River.

He said traffic congestion in the Quarter made it difficult to move materials in and out of the brewery, making the change necessary.

Sisson also noted that modern advances in a new plant could enable the brewers to produce beer more economically, although he didn't foresee a cut in the work force. The firm now employs about 500 persons.

The company markets beer under its own and private labels in eight states, including Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Texas. It has an annual capacity of 1.3 million barrels of beer.

## Policemen Safe After Lie Tests

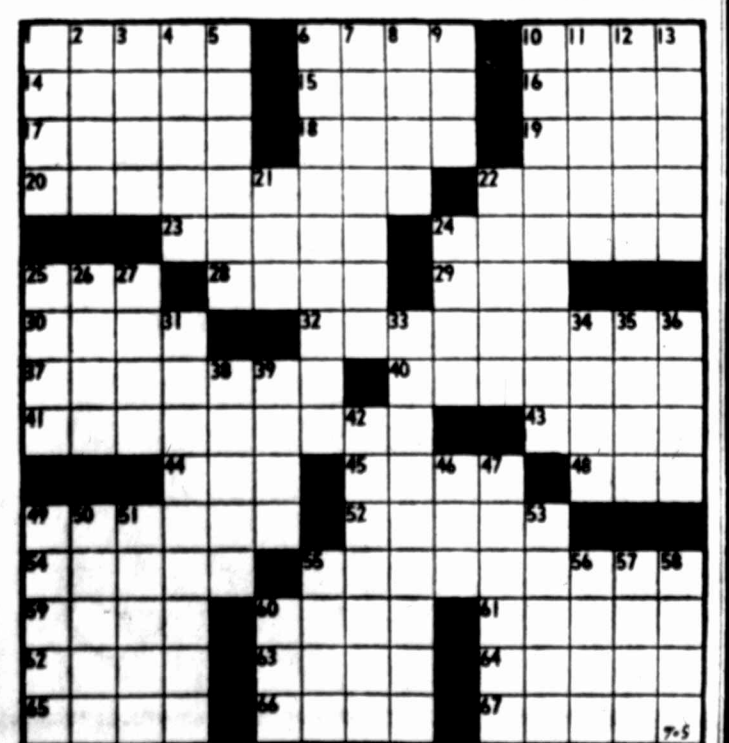

### Caused By Germ

Your Good Health  
Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: In a recent article (on "physical effects of heroin") you said an addict could contract syphilis by using a borrowed needle.

Could you explain more fully? I had always been taught that syphilis could be caught in only one way, by sexual contact.

Also could you write about a false positive reaction to the Wasserman test? My doctor took the test in the third month of my last pregnancy. I had a severe cold and possible ear infection at the time.

The test was positive, but a subsequent, more complicated test was negative. I assume the positive Wasserman was caused by my illness. Is this correct? Is such a reaction very frequent? — N.D.S.

Yes, syphilis can be transmitted by a contaminated needle — one recently used by someone with the disease.

The point is — and I've been trying to emphasize it — that syphilis (other venereal diseases, too) is caused by a germ, and not by some hard-to-understand cause.

In spite of all the efforts to educate people to this fact, I keep getting inquiries whether V.D. is caused by unusual sex practices, by uncleanness, by sex relations at the wrong time of the month, by all sorts of other theories.

All wrong. Syphilis is caused by a germ! The germ can be transmitted by a dirty needle, if the germ has recently contaminated the needle. It can, at times, be transmitted by kissing if the person with the disease has an open syphilitic sore and the other person has an open cut or break in the skin, so the germs can get in. But for the majority of cases, sexual contact transmits the disease. The germs, you see, do not survive except in condi-

tions that suit it. Thus it is transferred by "skin-to-skin contact." It is not transmitted "by a toilet seat," or such means.

As to your false positive, this is not too uncommon. So when it occurs under suspicious circumstances, another test is called for. By "suspicious circumstances," I mean a situation in which it seems unlikely that the patient really has syphilis.

Such false positives can result from various illnesses, chiefly virus infections which would fit with your bad cold.

The usual practice, when checking a suspected false positive, is to switch to one of the more specific tests, such as one called the DRL. Such tests are less likely to be affected by some disease other than syphilis.

Opening lead: Queen of ♦ Impatience in the face of adversity frequently induces a defeatist attitude in the less seasoned campaigner. Instead of merely throwing up his hands in despair, declarer should attempt to determine if something can be done to retrieve a seemingly hopeless situation. Had South taken the time to reflect in today's four heart contract when he ran into an unfavorable trump division, he might have worked out a successful solution to his problem.

West opened the queen of diamonds. East played the ace and shifted to a club. South put up the ace and without even a moment's consideration, he led a small heart from his hand and when West followed with the three, he played the king from dummy. When East showed out, it came as a distinct shock to South and with a gesture of disgust and an impatience to get on to the next deal, he led a heart back to the ace, cashed the king of diamonds and ruffed a third round in dummy. He then conceded the opponents two heart tricks and one club which, along with the

ace of diamonds already in, added up to a one trick setback.

South had available a simple safety play that would have cinched his contract. When he leads a small heart at trick three and West follows suit, declarer has merely to cover with North's seven to protect himself against his left hand opponent holding all four trumps. If East tops dummy's seven with an honor, then the remaining two hearts must fall under the king and ace.

Even after he went up with North's king and East showed out, declarer was still in position to make his contract as the cards were distributed, had he bothered to work the situation out.

Suppose that he leads a small club at trick four. East will presumably play the king and then continue the suit which South ruffs with the five of trumps. The three high spades are cashed and then a diamond is led to the king and a third round is ruffed with the seven of hearts. West has been stripped of every side suit and this is the position at trick 11 with the lead in the North hand.

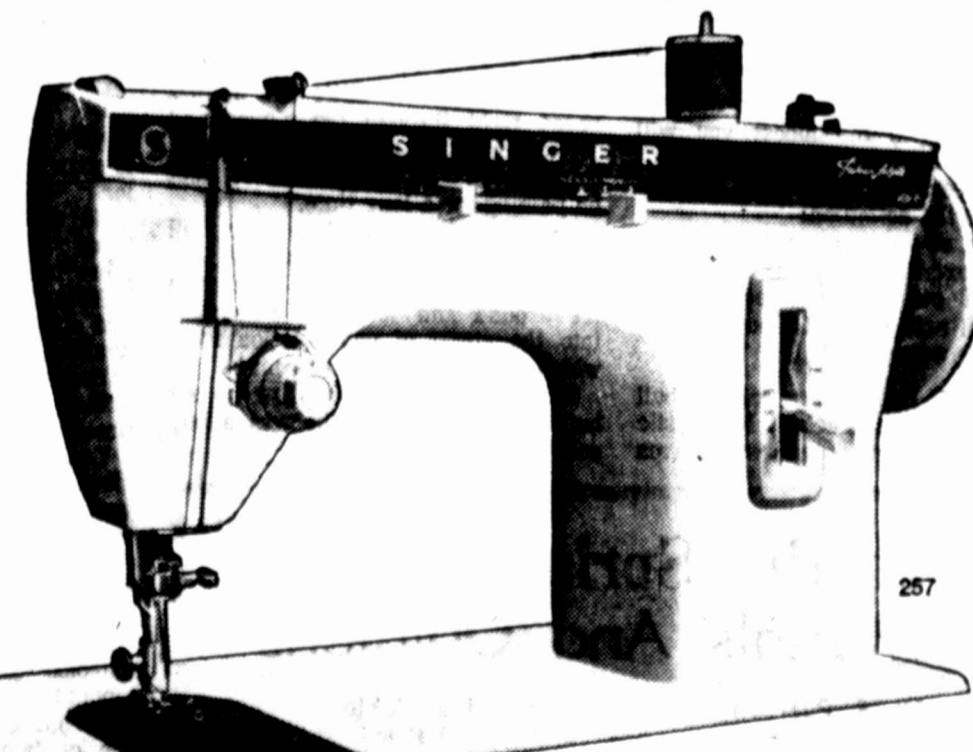

Instead, she attended Sul Ross classes offered for full residence credit in Midland and Odessa through the Graduate Center — described by some as an ad hoc university because it imports top professors from several universities to present courses in the area.

When Mrs. Blair did go to Alpine to participate in recent graduation ceremonies, it was to pick up her Sul Ross bachelor of science degree.

An elementary education major with English minor, she was graduated "with honors."

She also completed requirements for her elementary teaching certificate.

She did it all through two years of study at Odessa College, then two years of Sul Ross courses through the Graduate Center.

Mrs. Blair, who hopes to become a public school teacher in Goldsmith or Odessa this fall, became the first person to complete the entire final two years toward a bachelor's degree through the Graduate Center.

Over half of the 4,000 persons who have enrolled in PBGC courses during the past six years have done so to complete or supplement education received earlier on university campuses.

But, because of her family, Mrs. Blair desired a close-to-home means for continuing her education after graduation from Odessa College.

Her husband, R. L. Blair, is service manager at Goldsmith for Oil Transport Company, while their 15-year-old son, Kim, will be a sophomore next fall at Odessa High School.

Mrs. Blair had expected to take some courses on campus in Alpine, but it developed that during a two-year period the PBGC offered all of the courses she needed to complete her degree requirements on schedule.

Patricia M. Beck, executive director for the Graduate Center, said that Mrs. Blair's help in lining up students needed to justify offering certain courses here, helped make the scheduling of the full degree plan possible.

Convenience turned out not to be the only drawing card to the PBGC-Sul Ross program for Mrs. Blair.

"I felt there were superior classes and instructors," Mrs. Blair said.

"It seemed that the top professors were instructing the classes.

"Since most of the 'students' in the classes were adults, many of them already teachers themselves (who were there to extend their certification), the class discussions always were

stimulating," she continued.

"I hope to come back for the graduate level courses."

"I certainly would recommend that anyone contact the Graduate Center about continuing his education," she added.

"Until I started, I had no idea what was available through the Graduate Center. I know many people have been very surprised to learn that I was able to find all of the courses I needed."

Mrs. Beck emphasized that the Graduate Center makes no attempt to offer a full college program, "but we are interested in trying to offer any course for which there is an unmet local need."

It operates on a \$50,000 per year budget, financed by course charges to students and by contributions from companies and other organizations who see value in having the PBGC's courses and seminars available to their employees and other residents of the area.

Headquartered in a small office suite on the ground floor of the Gulf Building in Downtown Midland, the PBGC has no campus.

Classes are scheduled in borrowed or rented spaces in Midland, Terminal or Odessa, and sometimes in other area towns, as participation suggests.

More than 500 persons have enrolled in various courses for school teachers, earth scientists and others so far this year.

Possibility of adding an undergraduate level program for business administration courses, which would operate similarly to the education series from Sul Ross, currently is being explored, Mrs. Beck said.

## Foster Parents: They Share Huge Wealth Of Family Life

LOS ANGELES — Home is love and security to a child. It's where he is nourished physically and emotionally.

Yet, there are children, who through no fault of theirs, suddenly find the door marked home is closed to them.

If the situation is permanent, the child may be adopted.

But, what about the child whose parents are hospitalized or imprisoned? What about the youngster whose mother and father neglect or abuse him? What about the boy or girl who must wait for someone to assume guardianship after the parents' death?

### DEPRIVED

Where do these children, temporarily deprived of a home, go to get the continuing support family life provides?

If there is a vacancy, they may go directly to a foster home in the same general area where they lived with their parents. Otherwise, they go to a detention home.

"No matter how nice an institution is, it's not home. There is no way a home can be compared with an institution," says Mrs. Muriel Skoff, consultant to Community

Assistance to Homeless Youngsters (CATHY), a volunteer program of the Department of Public Social Service, Los Angeles.

### ABUSE

One goal of CATHY is to recruit foster homes for the temporary care of homeless children who for some reason cannot remain with their natural parents.

The majority of children in need of placement are victims of neglect and abuse. Others may be deserted, or their parents have a physical or mental condition which prevents them caring for the child.

The ultimate goal, in most cases, is to rehabilitate all members of the natural family so they may be reunited.

These children seldom become available for adoption, but for the parent with lots of love to share, foster child care may be a practical way a family can increase its size, at least temporarily.

There are fewer babies being placed for adoption now than in the past. And it is taking much longer to adopt a baby.

Foster care can be an alternative for the family that wants to share its home and family life with a child.

Placement of a foster child is not permanent. He usually returns to live with his natural parents when the home situation changes.

### NEED LOVE

But, once there is a vacancy in a foster home, usually it is not too long before there is another child to fill it.

"These children really need love. They need to be surrounded by it and they won't get it in an institution," says Mrs. Skoff.

Mrs. Rene Burger is one foster mother. As she talks about her foster children, Mrs. Burger keeps an eye on Cookie, her adopted daughter, and Mickey, her foster son, who will start school in the fall.

"Mickey was 17 months old when he came to us and he didn't know how to kiss. He just sat in the corner for hours," she says. "He came to me at 11 p.m. from a burning building in scorched pajamas. He's not afraid of fire now, but was for a couple years."

"It's been a time-consuming work, but the satisfaction is great," says Mrs. Burger, who also has a 19-year-old daughter and a 12-year-old son. She has been a foster mother for six years.

## Nine Perish In Accident Near Abilene

ABILENE, Tex. (AP) — The death toll mounted to nine today in the crash of two cars Tuesday on the edge of Abilene.

Eight persons died instantly or shortly thereafter at Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

Succumbing today was Michael Renfro, 16, brother of the youth whom police identified as the driver of one of the cars.

All the six teen-agers in one car were victims. Three persons died in the other car while one in that car survived.

All the victims were Abilene residents.

State patrolmen said the automobile carrying the six persons tried to pass another vehicle, skidded and collided head on with the vehicle carrying four persons. Both automobiles were demolished.

Investigators blamed high speed and the rain-caused slickness of the pavement for the collision that happened on Farm Road 600 about 300 yards beyond Abilene's north city limits.

The others killed in the car bearing the Renfros were Curtis L. Renfro, 18; Herman Suiters, 16; Brenda Joy Walker, 16; Debra Bell, 14, and Kathy Livingston, 14.

Those killed in the other vehicle were Teresina C. Sherman, 54; her daughter, Linda, 18, just graduated from high school; and her son, Jeffery, 13.

### Tell Koreans Don't Expect Fast Results

SEOUL (AP) — The South Korean government warned its people today not to expect speedy results from its agreement with North Korea to work for improved relations and reunification of the Korean peninsula.

Premier Kim Jong-pil urged the nation to maintain its vigilance, asserting that a piece of paper from the Communists containing promises does not mean anything unless the pledges are implemented.

Kim told the National Assembly that Park Sung-chul, North Korea's second vice premier, used "undescribably abusive" words in attacking the South on the same day the North-South agreement was disclosed.

He said nobody should believe that territorial reunification is around the corner.

"Our political ideology cannot agree with that of the Communists," he said, "and although our dialogue opened as a result of the joint communique, we cannot change overnight our ideas, systems and life."

South and North Korea announced Tuesday that they had held secret, high-level talks in Pyongyang and Seoul in May and had agreed to set up a joint committee to negotiate exchanges in a number of fields and to promote reunification by peaceful means.

They also agreed to refrain from armed provocations and from slandering and defaming each other. As a first step, they opened a telephone hot line between the two capitals Tuesday.

## 30 Patients In Hospital Fire Victims

SHERBORNE, England (AP) — Fire swept through a wing of the Cold Harbor Mental Hospital early today, killing 30 of the 36 male patients sleeping in a ward.

The nursing staff rescued seven of the men, but one died later. The other six suffered minor injuries.

One of the dead patients was 16 years old and the rest were described as middle-aged. Most died in their beds, but the main doors were said to have been blocked at the time of the blaze.

About 325 patients were in other buildings of the hospital. The fire occurred in the Winfrith Villa, a wing which opened nine months ago. Dr. Peter Johnson, chairman of the hospital management committee, said the most severely handicapped of the male patients were kept there.

## Civil Service Plan Deferred

PASADENA, Tex. (AP) — A proposed civil service system for 365 of the City of Pasadena's 575 employees was deferred by the city council at a Tuesday meeting.

Councilman Don LaFitte asked the ordinance authorizing Personnel Director B.B. Storey

to begin working on the proposed system be deferred until a hearing in which city employees could state their views.

The proposed system would set standards for equal opportunity employment, promotion, job tests, job security and wages and salary administration.

Storey has said that if the system is not adopted, federal grants to the city may be affected.

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## WENDY THE WALRUS

### With Gigi Gone, Bud Has New Love

SAN DIEGO — Bud Donahoo has a new love. Wendy, a 600-pound walrus, is his new favorite. She weighs 600 pounds and has whiskers as stiff as bristles on a nylon hairbrush, only longer.

Wendy is a walrus at Sea World. Bud is her keeper. He has but to call her name and she'll heave herself out of the pool, flop on the ledge to nuzzle up beside him, reaching up with a watery-eyed gaze for a kiss.

#### DAILY CONTACT

It's not just cupboard love. Wendy likes food, naturally, and will gulp down all the clams you care to give her. But with Bud the affection goes deeper. It has ripened over months of daily contact and communication.

Communication? "Sure we communicate," Bud says. "We may not always know exactly what we're saying to each other, but when you spend hour after hour with an animal you build up a certain rapport. It's a language of hand pats, stroking, whistles, grunts and snorts."

It was the same with Bud's last love — Gigi, the famous gray whale which was returned to the sea recently after spending year at Sea World and yielding much valuable scientific data. At seven tons she was the largest mammal in captivity in the world.

#### THREE SLAPS

Donahoo established communications with her, too. Three soft taps signaled approval, three sharp slaps disapproval. Gigi responded accordingly, would even answer with the same number of grunts and let him know by different sounds whether she was pleased or angry. She would let him ride on her back. He only had to tap her head and rub his hand along her lip for her to open her mouth for food.

Gigi, with a radio transmitter fixed to her back for further scientific tracking, was turned loose in the Pacific. With a farewell pat from Bud, she swam into the open sea and out of his life.

Now Wendy has taken Gigi's place. She is one of four walrus enjoying the comforts of an arctic-style home in the moderate climate of San Diego. The others are Wanda, Wally and Willie.

#### PLAYFUL

"Wendy is my favorite," Bud said. "She's affectionate and playful. Walrus love to play, and they're not so easy to train. They like to do their own things. They can be rough in the water. Not that they would purposely hurt you. They are just playing in their own way."

"Until recently it was almost impossible to raise walrus in captivity. Now the mortality rate is down to zero. We have not lost any walrus in the last few years."

Viewing of the walrus, both above and below water, is featured in Sea World's new 10,000-gallon "aquarium" home. The specially designed simulated iceberg backdrop and sunning areas for the animals depict the natural arctic environment of the walrus. There are two separate tanks, one for underwater viewing of the larger animals, and a special tank to accommodate the baby walrus. The exhibit brings the friendly animals into close petting and feeding proximity for visitors.

#### TWO WORLDS

Sea World actually consists of two worlds — the one the visitors see, with its walrus and sea lions, stunting seals and dolphins, water-skiing chimp, roller-skating penguin and a variety of marine exhibits; the other a behind-the-scenes, scientific world of behavioral, biological and other research.

Scientists hope to use the information gathered from the

extensive study of Gigi, for instance, to help protect other members of this endangered species.

Similarly, the experimental shark tank, although it functions as a public exhibit, also provides the oceanarium staff valuable new information on the habits of these savage fish. Researchers are attempting to determine the psychological requirements of the large predators and the reasons that no aquarium has yet been able to maintain them over a long time.

Public aquariums in the past have by necessity been confined to displays of native fish, easily acquired from local waters. It was not cost or distance alone that limited efforts to bring back rare and exotic specimens. As well as the technical difficulty of transport, there was the problem of how to treat the "shock" a fish or other animal experiences on being transferred from its native habitat to an artificial environment.

#### KILLER

A decade ago, not a single killer whale had ever been captured anywhere in the world, much less transferred far from the point of capture. No aquarium had been able to maintain for any length of time any of the pelagic sharks, the deep-sea roaming species. Sea World developed the techniques necessary to successfully transport the first killer whale by air (Seattle to San Diego) in 1965.

Another service that visitors hear little about is the saving of beached seals. Many young ones are found stranded along the California coast during the mating season. Most of them now are brought to Sea World, where considerable success has been achieved in overcoming the "shock" and reducing the mortality rate among such animals.

This also is one of Donahoo's projects.

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# Entries Coming In Slowly For BS Invitational

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# Bannister Captures Decathlon Trials

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — They call it a "little club of ours" and they refer to the members as they would loved ones.

It's the rugged, grueling, two-day-ten-event test known as the decathlon—the event Jeff Bannister calls his own today.

Bannister, a graduate of New Hampshire who stands 6 feet 3

and weighs 10 pounds less than his normal 200 today, captured the U.S. Olympic Trials decathlon Tuesday with 8,120 points, the top total in the world this year. He conquered 97-degree heat as well as little Jeff Bennett of the Army.

Bennett, with 8,076, and Bruce Jenner, a longshot from Iowa, with 7,846, also made the U.S. team which goes to Munich this summer for the 20th Olympic Games.

"I just wanted to get on the team. It's been a long wait," said a champagne-drenched Bannister on the track, moments after completing the final event, the 1,500-meter run.

Bannister was asked about his own performance but preferred to speak in glowing terms of his competitors.

"I was so happy to see Jeff do so well in the pole vault, and Bruce make the team. I love all these guys. We compete against each other so often."

# 'OUT LOOKING FOR SOMEONE TO KILL' Child Slaying 'Wrapped Up'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The mother of a 4-year-old girl slain by a shotgun blast from a passing car said sheriff's deputies told her husband the three men arrested in the case "were just out looking for someone to kill."

Sheriff's deputies said the case "is pretty well wrapped up." They planned to seek a formal complaint from the district attorney against three men arrested Tuesday and booked for investigation of murder.

Joyce Ann Huff was fatally

injured by the shotgun blast while playing in a neighbor's yard Sunday in suburban Hawaiian Gardens.

"Sheriff's deputies have told my husband that the three men were just out looking for someone to kill," Bernice Huff said Tuesday. "It takes awful brutish men to do that kind of thing to have fun."

Sheriff's Deputy David Watter said today that as far as a motive for the crime, "There simply is none."

Deputy Robert Wood said earlier that investigation indicated "it must be a blatant case of murder... a joy killing."

**ALL UNEMPLOYED**  
The three men in custody were identified as Donald Paul Antel, 21; Michael Ramirez, 18;

and Oscar Hernandez, 22, all from suburban Norwalk. Police said all were unemployed.

Mrs. Huff said she did not know any of the men.

It was not immediately revealed what evidence led to the arrests.

Sources said officers showed neighbors a composite drawing of a man resembling Antel.

"You can't stop cars from driving down the street," Mrs. Huff said. "The child was right in front by the kitchen. We never let her run around unsupervised. There was nothing we could have done."

"Everyone asks what they can do to help. There's nothing. No one can bring our girl back to us."

Funeral services for Joyce were scheduled for Thursday.

## Boggs, Ford In Hong Kong

HONG KONG (AP) — U.S. Reps. Hale Boggs and Gerald Ford arrived in Hong Kong today after a 10-day visit to China which Ford said he hoped would "help expand the growing relations between the People's Republic of China and the United States."

Neither would comment on their discussions with Premier Chou En-lai and other Chinese leaders. Ford said they would disclose nothing about the substance of the talks until after he and Boggs report to President Nixon.

Boggs, of Louisiana, is Democratic leader in the House. Ford, of Michigan, is the GOP leader.

Boggs said Chinese authorities had been helpful and polite and that the visit had been most informative.

## \$1.1 BILLION Mail Subsidy Checks To 955,000 Farmers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government subsidy checks totaling \$1.1 billion are being mailed to 955,000 farmers as part payment for cooperating in acreage set-aside programs for feed grain, wheat, cotton this year.

Officials said most eligible farmers should have their checks by the end of July. Eventually, including final settlements later on, the payments will total a record \$3.7 billion in compensation to farmers, wheat, cotton this year.

The payments are made to farmers who agree to take a percentage of their land from production. For doing that, they receive the payment plus government price supports on commodities produced on the remainder of their eligible land.

## Tourist Leaders Will Go South

AUSTIN — The Republic of Mexico — Texas' fastest growing tourist market — will be the target of Texas tourist leaders during a Sept. 24-30 travel mission, the first state-sponsored and statewide undertaking of this type.

T T D A and supporting organizations began concentrating on Mexico two years ago with the result that the volume of tourists coming to Texas from Mexico rose by 45 per cent in 1971. Some 650,000 Mexican tourists annually are now visiting Texas, Horan noted.

Reservations for the mission will be limited and currently are being accepted at TTDA's Austin office on a first-come, first-served basis. Deadline for reservations is July 21.

## New Outbreak Of VEE Reported In Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A new outbreak of equine encephalitis, the disease that killed hundreds of horses in Texas last year, is reported to have killed 1,248 horses in western and northern Mexico.

Medical authorities also said that at least 83 persons have been reported ill, affected by the disease.

The largest incidence was reported in the Pacific Coast state of Nayarit where 643 animals died and in Durango, in north central Mexico, where 278 died.

Last year the disease first appeared in north central and north east Mexico and then spread north into South Texas.

Officials said that more than 97,000 vaccinations, most of them free, have been administered since the disease appeared.

On June 16, agriculture officials reported 205 animals had died from the current outbreak.

Last summer, an equine encephalitis epidemic in Northern and Central Mexico killed an estimated 10,000 horses and five persons.

A health ministry spokesman said 64 persons now have confirmed cases of the disease in Nayarit, 14 in Guerrero, two in Morelos and three in the state of Mexico. It was the suspected cause of illness in another 560 persons.

The statistics were only for current cases of the disease, which the spokesman said lasts from three to five days in human beings.

It rarely is fatal in humans, but causes high fever, vomiting, aches and diarrhea, he said. The spokesman added that the symptoms are common to several diseases and make positive diagnosis difficult.

The number of confirmed cases in persons rose from a report of 72 cases Friday, while the number of suspected cases declined from 850 in the previous report.

## Total Of Violent Deaths Zips To Even 100 Mark

It was a bloody July 4 weekend in Texas despite preventive steps by state police.

The total of violent deaths reached an even 100 in the state between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight Tuesday when the extended holiday ended.

There were 60 traffic fatalities, eclipsing the predicted figure of 58. There were 20 shootings and 13 drownings.

State police had estimated in advance that 58 persons would die on streets and highways, a total which proved too small.

Among those killed elsewhere were: Effie Mae Williams, 36, and Everline Dykes, 91, both of Hobbs, N.M., died in a one-car accident on Texas 214 south of Morton near the New Mexico line.

Police said a service station operator shot and killed Isaac Colton, 17, in Houston after he and a companion held up the gas station Tuesday night and there was a struggle over the station man's pistol.

Marco Ybanez, 35, of Corpus Christi died Tuesday night in a collision 12 miles north of Corpus Christi at the intersection of U.S. 181 and Texas 35.

Willie Caffrey, 29, died in a Houston hospital of gunshot wounds early today. Police said he was wounded during an argument with another man at his home. The man was being sought.

**Night Operator Guns Down Bandit**  
HOUSTON (AP)—Police said Isaac Colton, 17, was shot and killed Tuesday night after he and a companion robbed a service station.

Officers said the station's night operator told them he shot Colton as they struggled over the employee's .38 caliber pistol.

The other man escaped.

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Construction of oil pipelines in the United States is booming after an extremely slow start this year, the Oil and Gas Journal reported today.

About \$1 billion in pipeline work is either under way or planned, the Journal said. It is divided almost equally between onshore and offshore projects. More than 1,000 miles of big-inch construction onshore is assured, much of it is from four major jobs: The Lone Star Gas Co., 385 miles; Oasis Pipe Line Co., 333 miles; Great Lakes Gas Transmission Co., 169 miles; and Lakehead Pipeline Co., 44 miles.

Another 800 miles of big-inch construction is awaiting Federal Power Commission Clearance.
