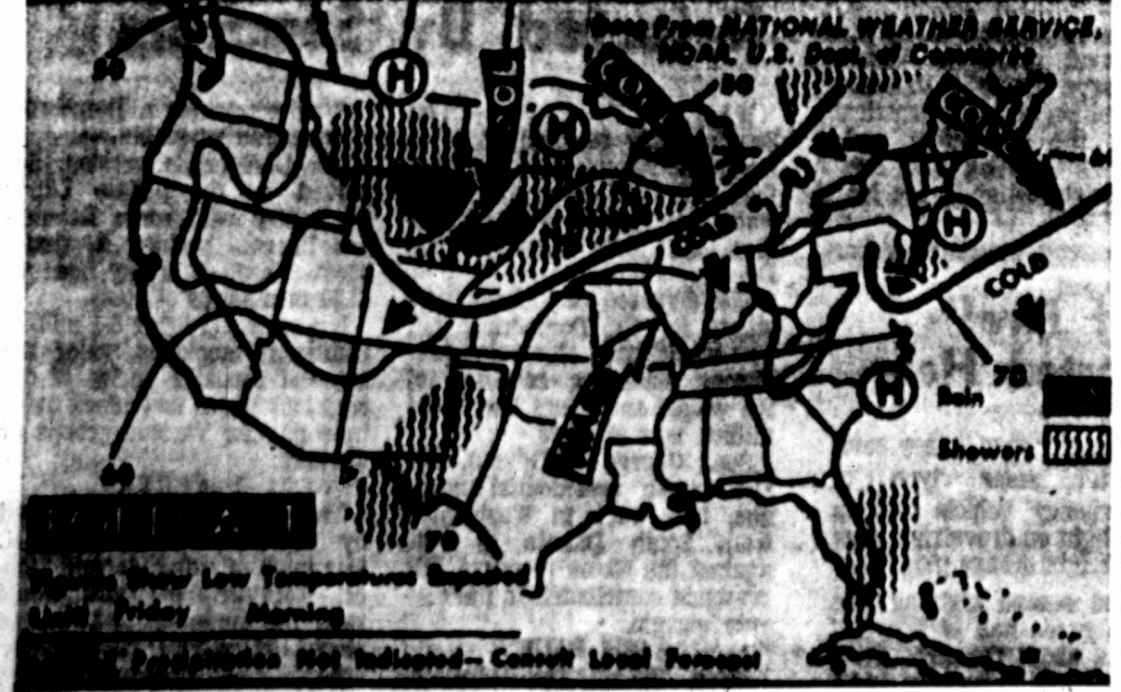

Guerrillas, Troops Duel Through Night

BELFAST, North Ireland, (AP) — Guerrillas of the Irish Republican Army and British troops duelled through the night in Belfast and Londonderry, reinforcing reports that IRA chiefs in Belfast strongly oppose peace moves by their headquarters in Dublin. Troops claimed they hit eight gunmen.

The army said at least four guerrillas armed with automatic weapons exchanged more than 500 shots with a handful of soldiers manning an observation post at a Belfast hospital. The gun battle began shortly after midnight and continued after dawn.

SHOOTOUT
During another shootout in a Catholic district of Belfast, stray shots peppered the home of Paddy Devlin, a leader of the pro-Catholic Social Democratic Labor party. Devlin was in Dublin for the Muhammad Ali fight, but his wife and daughter hugged the floor. Neither was hurt.

Another sharp gunfight broke out around an army post in Londonderry, and bombs blasted an auto showroom, a golf club and an electricity transformer in Lurgan, 20 miles southwest of Belfast.

Amid reports that commanders of the IRA's militant Provisional wing are willing to reactivate the cease-fire shattered 11 days ago, Provisional battalion commanders in Belfast said they planned to continue their campaign of violence. They claimed other Provisional units were backing them.

BETRAYED
Northern Ireland's Protestants, who have repeatedly accused the British of betraying them by concessions to the IRA, got a boost Wednesday night from British Prime Minister Edward Heath and his administrator in Northern Ireland, William Whitelaw.

Heath pledged that the Protestant majority would not be sold out, and Whitelaw declared in London that the British government would not surrender to the terrorists and would not pull out of Northern Ireland.

Eight Yanks Die In Action

SAIGON (AP) — American casualties in the Vietnam war last week included eight killed in action, five dead from non-hostile causes, 14 missing or captured and 26 wounded, the U.S. Command announced in its weekly summary today.

This compares to four killed the previous week, five missing and 18 wounded. But officers said the increase was not necessarily significant because the totals included delayed reports from previous weeks and changes in status from missing to dead.

South Vietnamese losses were put at 837 killed, compared to 661 for the previous week, and 2,367 wounded, compared to 2,585. The number of North Vietnamese and Viet Cong killed dropped from 3,320 to 2,871.

The allied commands now have reported these total casualties for the war:

American—45,818 killed in action, 10,239 dead from non-hostile causes, 1,775 missing or captured, 303,234 wounded.

South Vietnamese—150,363 killed, 386,765 wounded.

North Vietnamese and Viet Cong—864,201 killed.

'Political Boss' Parr Target Of Grand Jury?

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — A federal grand jury that was empaneled in May will go behind closed doors again next month to resume an apparent probe in connection with George B. Parr, once the political kingpin of four South Texas counties.

The longtime Duval County political boss apparently has not appeared before the panel, which heard testimony from at least eight witnesses Tuesday and Wednesday.

Two bank officials and a school board president from San Diego, Tex., in Duval County were among those testifying Wednesday before the grand jury was released.

The panel was instructed to return here Aug. 8.

One witness scheduled to appear at the August session is D. C. Chapa, president of both the Benavides, Tex., School Board and the Duval County Conservation and Reclamation District.

Although grand jury proceedings are secret, court records indicate the probe involves Parr, long known as the "Duke of Duval," and other persons.

The investigation evidently began in the spring.

One of the witnesses appearing Tuesday was granted immunity. She was Laura Taylor, identified as a sister of Bryan Taylor, school superintendent at San Diego.

The grand jury called at least four witnesses Wednesday, including B. O. Goldthorn, an officer of the First State Bank of San Diego, and Karl Williams, an official of the bank.

Also testifying were Dan Tobin, identified as president of the San Diego School Board, and Leo Sepulveda of San Diego, office manager of the Duval County Conservation and Reclamation District. Both also testified Tuesday.

Last week, the government won court permission to examine fully the records of the San Diego Bank in connection with the San Diego and Benavides school districts and the Duval County Conservation District for 1966-69.

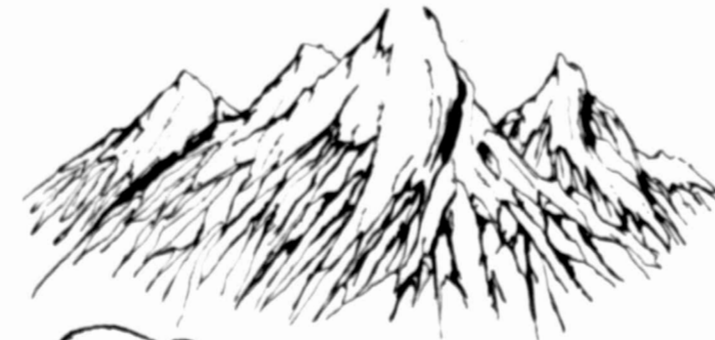

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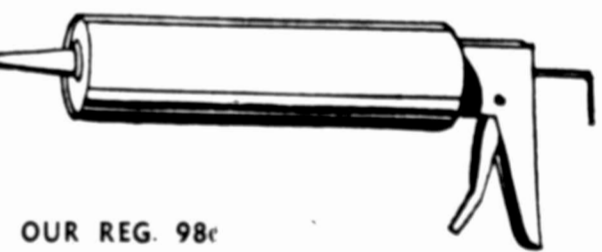

Illogical: Find Out

Your Good Health
Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I hope you will not wait too long to answer this.

Both of my parents are diabetics. I intend to get a checkup when I get my vacation this summer. I think I am also diabetic.

What damage would be caused if I continue eating anything I want, because I am not sure yet if I am a diabetic? Would it injure my eyes? Would it cause heart trouble?

I do drink a lot of water and my mouth is dry most of the time. Is this one of the symptoms? — D. B.

You want me to answer in a hurry — so you can keep on procrastinating? I don't think I follow your logic.

However, with your history and your symptoms, you ought to cut out sweets (candy, cake, all other sugary foods) at once.

(Of course you ought to get your checkup right away, too. Why wait for your vacation? One office visit to your doctor will probably give you a clear enough answer.)

When both parents are diabetic, your chances of being diabetic are about as high as they can get. And thirst is one of the early symptoms.

Diabetes (except in childhood) is a slow but steadily damaging disease. The longer you wait before starting treatment to control it, the greater the damage will be to your system in the long run.

If you continue to hide from the truth, you won't lose your eyesight overnight, nor develop heart trouble tomorrow — but you may have to pay for that delay in the long run. Eye and heart conditions occur with diabetes, and the longer the case remains uncontrolled, the worse the damage continues silently but inexorably throughout the body.

Stop putting things off. People with diabetes can live essentially normal lives — IF. If they start controlling it as soon as they detect it.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is it harmful to cross your eyes? I do it just as a joke, and my mother says it's a dangerous habit and they'll "stick" that way. — A.M.R.

No harm. It means you have control of certain eye muscles. Your eyes won't stick that way. (Frankly, though, I never thought a girl made herself look any prettier by crossing her eyes.)

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Recently I went to the dentist and had one injection of Novocain to have a tooth filled. Next day I was covered from neck to buttocks with hives.

I have had many shots of Novocain over the years but never experienced this. Should I forget it and continue to use it when necessary, or is this forewarning of perhaps a more serious reaction next time? — Mrs. D. M.

Sounds as though you had finally become sensitized after having had a number of injections. That's the conclusion I would draw — unless you can think of anything else that might have caused the hives.

My advice is to warn your dentist or doctor of this experience. The risk of a more severe reaction next time is not to be ignored. There are other medications that can be used for the same purpose.

Hidalgo County Dist. Atty. Oscar McInnis said today in Edinburg that an overlooked provision in Texas law can be used in certain cases to hold a repeater felon for 60 days without bond.

The prosecutor said that statute provides for the holding of a person for 60 days without bond if he has been convicted earlier on two separate felonies.

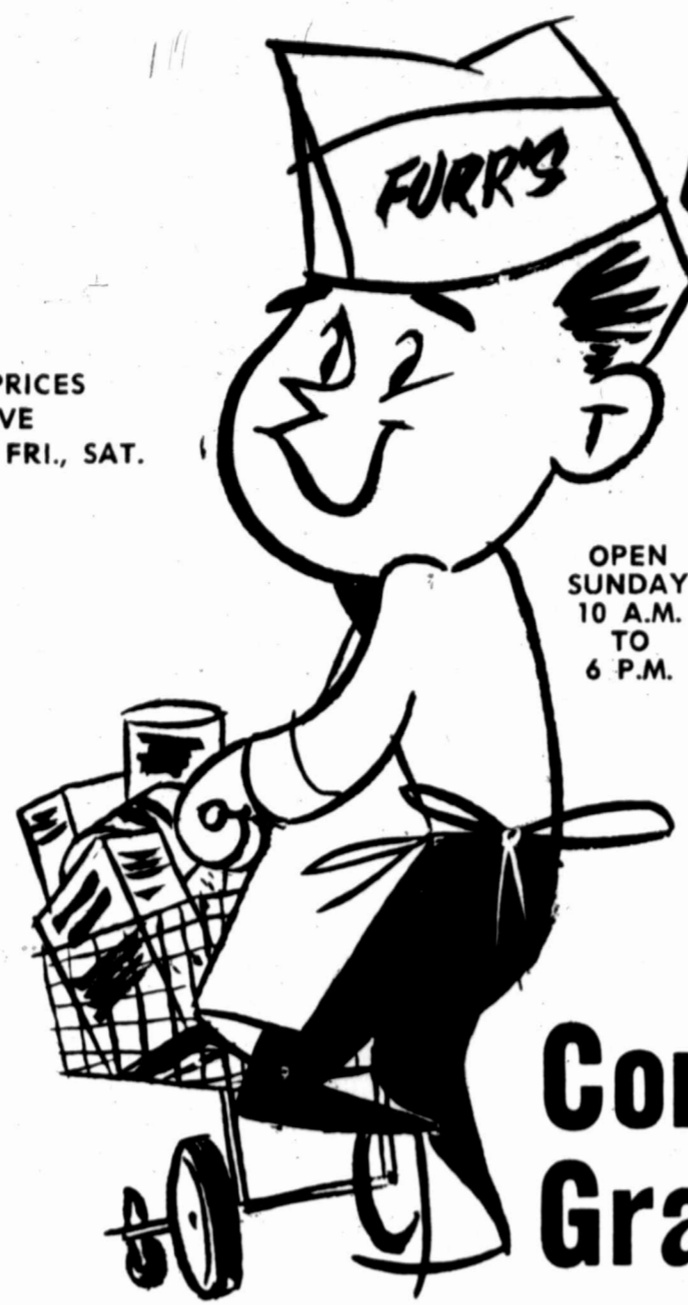
In such a case, McInnis said, a hearing must be held to determine that the person is probably guilty of the third felony. Then the person must be tried within 60 days or he can be released on bond.

Pointing out that he has never used the statute or heard of it being used, McInnis said, "Perhaps it's about time we started using it on some of these repeaters."

"It's one we should use in dealing with habitual criminals," he added.

She's Living In World Of Animals

MESQUITE, Tex. (AP) — For six weeks Jill Stoecker is living in a tent on the outskirts of Dallas just like she was in deepest Africa. She awakens to the rumbling roar of a lion and spends all day among baboons.

The 25-year-old anthropology student from Boulder, Colo., is living on the World of Animals reserve here to gain six hours of credit in place of writing a thesis for her master's degree at the university of Colorado.

After emerging from her tent by the creek, she spends the day studying the social behavior and reactions of baboons according to different sex and age groups. Each morning sees her in her lawn chair at the fence before 6:30 a.m. She's there until 9 p.m.

"I earn a new individual every day," she said of the animals. "I name them all. I didn't know what to expect at first, but the adult baboons don't bite and they don't stick their hands through the fence. The juveniles, however, will let you pet them or rub their stomachs."

Jill's stay at the wild animal reserve is partly in preparation for a six-month to Kenya or Tanzania, which she will make with her zoologist husband, Dr. Bob Stoecker, later.

While Bob studies hyenas and wild hunting dogs, Jill will continue looking at baboons.

Jill was surprised by Texas on this, her first visit.

"I didn't think there would be hills and trees," she said.

She heard about World of Animals from a professor who announced in class that the animal park would allow students to do research there.

After Africa, she will return to Colorado, write paper on her findings and start on her doctoral degrees.

Suicide By Ethiopian

DALLAS (AP) — A young Ethiopian was found hanged to a tree Tuesday.

Just a day earlier, the young man had been seen sleeping under the tree on the vacant lot.

Medical examiners said the man, Kesette Gebre Kiriam, 24, committed suicide.

Police were seeking today to untangle the young man's life to find out something about him. Officers said they were having difficulty finding his friends.

Miriam had an Ethiopian passport showing a 1969 entry date into the United States, a watch and six cents on his body.

Two boys found the body. Officers said they have been able to determine Miriam had been in Dallas for two weeks, moving here from Detroit, where he had lived 11 months.

The judge is 67, and it's his first marriage. "I never married before," he said, "because at first I felt I was too young. And before I knew it I was middle-aged."

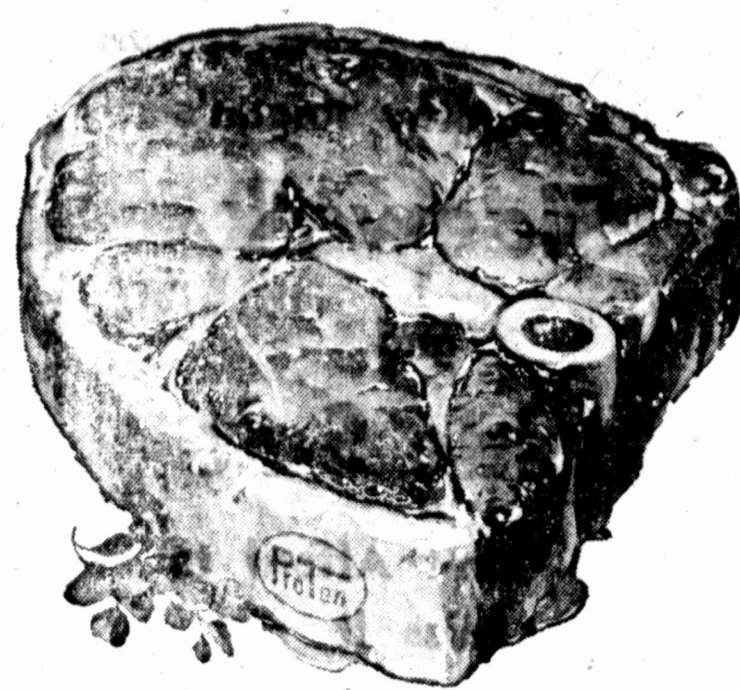
"We'd known each other for about 10 days when I said to her, 'You look after old people. I'm an old person — how about looking after me?'"

LIED AND CHEATED; NO PLACE TO BE ALONE Mental 'Patient' Treated Like An Animal

ELGIN, Ill. (AP) — "Just because I was sick," the young woman asked, "did this mean I had to be treated like an animal?"

The woman, Christine Ruiz, is a mental health worker. She posed her question after spending a weekend recently as a "patient" at Eglin State Hospital. The weekend was an ex-

periment to show mental hospital employees what it is like to be one of their charges.

"So many times I was ignored just as if I didn't exist," Miss Ruiz said. "The lost identity and dehumanizing, inferior feeling is all felt by the patients and so forgotten by the staff."

Twenty-nine employees were selected at random to be "patients" in a mock ward

Another 21 were selected to staff the ward. Observers took notes and filmed the proceedings.

FRIGHTENING
The "patients" went through regular admitting procedures and were given showers and issued ill-fitted clothing. They were searched and all personal belongings were confiscated.

They ate in a dining room with actual mental patients.

The "staff" treated the "patients" just as they would treat patients in their wards. They gave tokens as rewards and took away tokens as punishment.

Interviews afterward showed the experience was realistic and often frightening. A questionnaire filled out by participants also demonstrated its realism.

"It was scary to me," said

Nancy Klein, a DePaul University sociologist who was an advisor to the experiment. She said she feared the employees who became "patients" would regress in their behavior.

The patients were anxious, angry and restless. Dr. Donahue Tremaine, a Roosevelt University psychology professor who was an advisor, said the experiment also showed mental hospitals can cause people to

react in ways which are considered abnormal.

"HORRIBLE SOAP"
The observers said the "patients": A — Sat together but did not react to each other. — Lied and cheated to get what they needed. — Complained of having no place to be alone. — Moved about constantly to reassure themselves that "everything is OK because I can

feel something happening."

Tom Richardson, a hospital psychologist who helped design the experiment, said "It has gotten people to see ways to change some things."

One "patient," who complained about the "horrible soap," lack of privacy and noise in the ward, said after the experiment:

"My God, my God. If it's that bad on our own wards we ought to run back right now and fix it."

"I don't think I've screamed at a patient since I got back," one woman said. And now, no matter how ridiculous the patient's request, he said, he has tried to honor it.

Steve Piser, a "patient" who escaped several times during the experiment, told an interviewer he did it because "things just got a little intense." For him, "the atmosphere changed from hospital to jail."

including administrators, would benefit from having to be "patients." Training programs for mental health workers should include a program patterned after the experiment, he said.

A questionnaire answered by the "patients" after the experiment showed that 75 per cent did not feel they were being treated as real people.

All said they especially felt a lack of freedom, 89 per cent said they felt at times that they were being deprived of their identity and 93 per cent said they felt as though they were in prison.

Arms Cost Overruns

"LOSS OF ENERGY"
Sandra Kinser, a worker who as a "patient" became "extremely depressed and upset," said one of the first things she noticed was a "fantastic loss of energy."

"It took a great deal of effort just to walk to lunch," she said. "A lot of things I used to attribute to paranoid problems in patients are real. I now understand why people don't have feelings."

Steve Wendorf, a "staff" member in the experiment, said all mental health workers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional auditors say costs of 77 major weapons systems have now overrun by \$28.7 billion and say much of that "is directly attributed to unrealistic early cost estimates."

The General Accounting Office, an arm of Congress, said in a report today it analyzed 73 major weapons but did not include one—the proposed ultrasonic Trident long range missile-firing submarine—because it has not been given a final go-ahead.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., blamed the overrun on "the military's pie-in-the-sky promises about cheap weapons."

The GAO report on the Pentagon's latest quarterly figures on weapons cost overruns says the \$28.7 billion is a 31 per cent overrun and thus is down from the previous year's 40 per cent.

The GAO said it found two overriding reasons for unrealistic cost estimates that have turned out to be billions of dollars too low: lack of complete and precise weapon plans when the estimates were made, and lack of adequate documentation on which estimators could rely to make precise cost judgments.

Top Crew Chief

Dennis Portman earned high enough praise to be awarded the June T-38 crew chief of the month honor from his peers and pilots of the 3560th Pilot Training Squadron. WASHINGTON (AP) — Two women, one a former nun, took their oaths of office here to become the FBI's first female agents.

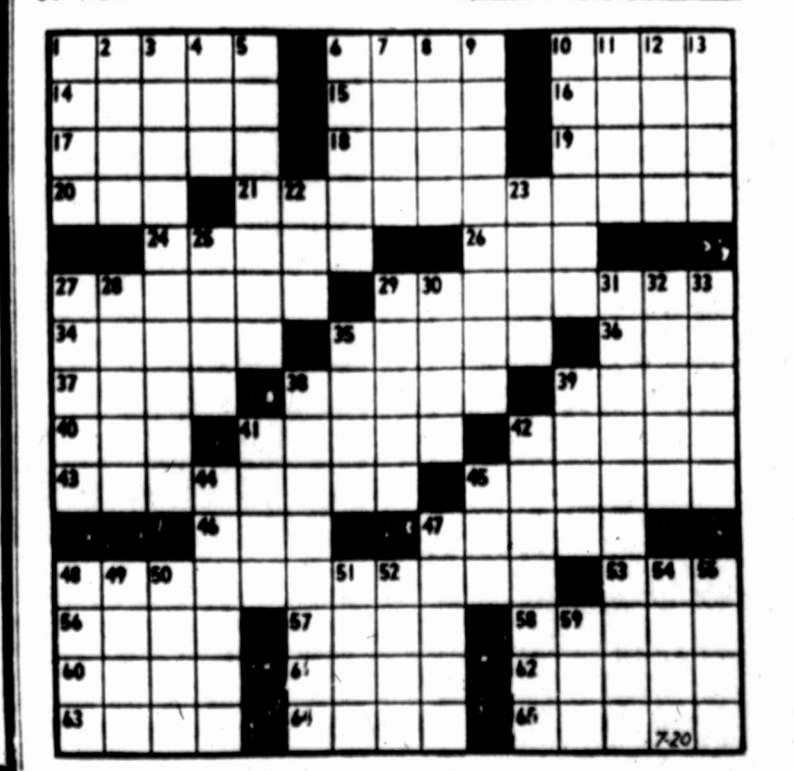

They became eligible to apply for the positions after L. Patrick Gary III, the acting director, announced May 12 a change in the Agency's male-only policy.

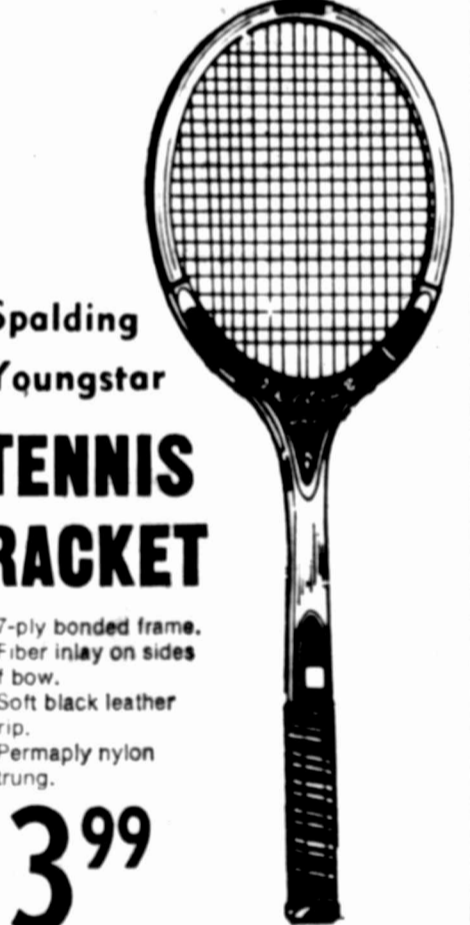

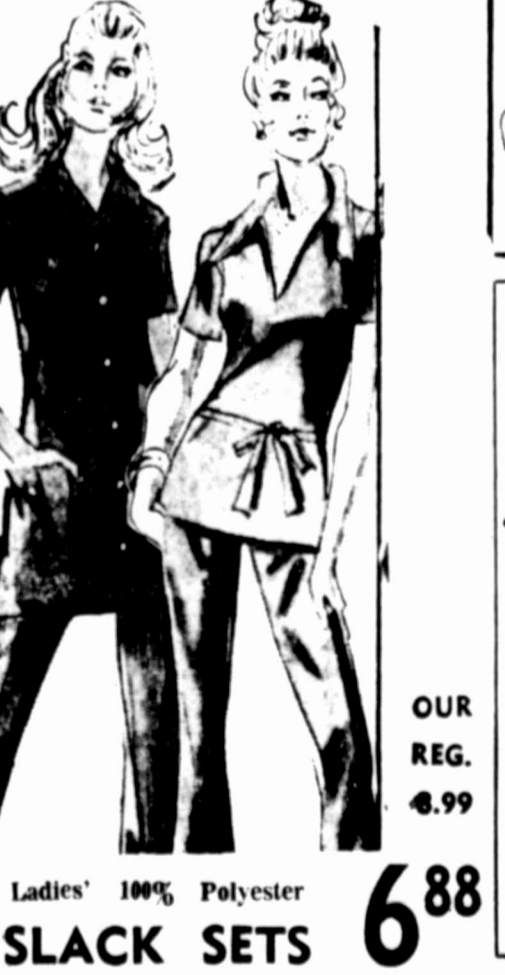

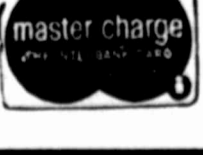

ERWIN NOT GUILTY OF DWI CHARGE

Jury Acquits Texas Regent

BELTON, Tex. (AP) — A Bell County Court at Law jury found Frank C. Erwin Jr. of Austin not guilty of driving while intoxicated after deliberating about 30 minutes Wednesday afternoon.

Erwin sat at the defense table for a moment, then rushed to the other side of the courtroom to shake hands with the three-man, three-woman panel.

Then, smiling broadly, the University of Texas regent sought defense attorneys, prosecutors and Judge Stan Pemberton to shake their hands.

The three-day trial went to the jury at 4:25 p.m. The panel sent word that they had a verdict shortly before 5 p.m.

The defense had ended testimony by bringing seven character witnesses to the stand after Erwin testified in his own

behalf Wednesday morning. All seven witnesses said they would not hesitate to believe Erwin, either under oath or not under oath.

SUN BOWL GAME

Erwin recounted events beginning with an early morning flight from Austin to El Paso Dec. 17, 1971. He said he conferred with UT-El Paso officials about campus student disturbances and attended the Sun Bowl game Dec. 18.

Erwin recalled catching a flight returning to Austin about 6:10 p.m. El Paso time and arriving in Austin shortly after 8 p.m. Austin time Dec. 18.

The former UT regents chairman said he drove from the Austin airport across town to the apartment of Jimmy Crouch on North Red River Avenue. He arrived at Crouch's apartment about 8:45, he said, and the two then went to the

Headliners Club in downtown Austin with Erwin driving.

Erwin said he instructed the head waiter to serve Crouch and his date, who had not yet arrived, "anything they ordered" and left about 9:15 for the Tarry House.

CHRISTMAS PARTY

Erwin said he arrived at the West Austin club at about 9:30 and talked with several friends at the club's annual Christmas party, had one scotch and soda and left about 11 or 11:15 p.m.

From the Tarry House, Erwin said, he drove to the 40 Acres Club at 25th Street and Guadalupe Avenue. He estimated his arrival at 11:30 p.m.

Erwin then told the jury that he and Dr. Gerald Center talked at the club until after midnight and left after he was unable to persuade Center to accompany him for a late dinner.

90-Years In Prison Sentence

WACO, Tex. (AP) — A Waco jury has assessed a 90 year prison sentence against Willard G. Christopher, who pleaded guilty to the slaying of Malone City Marshal Milton Boortz.

According to police, Christopher admitted he was the one who shot Boortz, 32, after a car containing three men was curbed by the marshal following a liquor store holdup.

Boortz and Fred Beall of the Department of Public Safety followed the car after one man emerged from a liquor store. The officers did not know that the Little Herman's Package Store had been robbed of \$600.

Christopher once escaped from the Hillsboro jail but was recaptured in Houston.

Gulf Freeway Funds Available

HOUSTON (AP) — The new manager of Houston's freeway design and construction says the Texas Highway Department has received informal word that almost \$25 million in federal funds will be available for a major facelifting of the Gulf Freeway.

Bill Ward said the project approval came after many years of convincing the Federal Highway Administration that renovation is needed.

The \$27 million project would be 90 per cent funded through the Highway Trust Fund.

'WE LOVE HIM' Villagers Give Kola Nuts As A Token Of Respect

ENUGU, Nigeria (AP) — At the crack of dawn each day, Nigeria's first resident white "chief" plays host to his African subjects.

Villagers from around the nearby leper settlement town of Uzuakoli, in Nigeria's East-Central state, bring him plates of bitter kola nuts as a token of traditional homage and respect.

His chieftaincy title, "Atakata Agbua", a symbol of his enthusiasm and devotion to the community, entitles him to wear the full regalia, carry a staff of office and participate fully in all traditional affairs of the five Ibo clans which installed him one year ago.

AFFECTION

Frank Hathaway, 51, is a draftsman by profession and a master builder, but most of the past 26 years have been spent away from his native Bristol Englnid, in humanitarian work among Nigeria's Ibo people and other African countries.

"If you really want to know all about me, ask the people around me," says the burly Englishman, his face radiating the warmth of affection and care with which he regards the people among whom he works.

Hathaway first set foot in Nigeria in 1946 when the British Leprosy Association recruited him to help set up two leper settlements in Uzuakoli and neighboring Oji River. The Ibos have nicknamed him "Oku Namirin", meaning the fire that burns even inside water.

Hathaway has won an MBE (Member of the British Empire) from Britain's Queen Elizabeth.

WAR REFUGES

Hathaway also worked in Nyasaland, now Malawi, as well as in Dahomey and Togo,

but during these times, he always longed to return to Nigeria.

Then in 1967 came Nigeria's civil war and the British Methodist Association recruited him for a year in the West African state of Ivory Coast to which many Ibo war refugees were taken from then secessionist Biafra.

Hathaway's dedication won for him a Knight of the National Order of the Ivory Coast from President Felix Houphouet-Boigny.

The Nigerian civil war ended in 1970, Hathaway returned to work for the Christian Council of Nigeria where he became works manager of the council's rehabilitation operations in the war-ravaged East-Central state, heartland of former Biafra.

NEW 'CHIEF'

"I was only too happy to return to Nigeria, particularly the Ibos", he says.

"Villagers like their new 'chief' the more because, they say, he has spent much of his personal income in establishing health centers in the hinterland and in granting high school scholarships to deserving youngsters.

One villager, a twinkle in his eye, said, "People he has trained are too many to count," showing how many by counting his 10 fingers over and over again. "We love him and do not want him to go away," he added.

Hathaway, who speaks fluent Ibo, has no immediate plans to return to his native Bristol. "I have no legal family," he says. "I have one of the largest families in Nigeria"—a reference to the 8 million Ibos.

3 jalapeno peppers, chopped fine
1 cup grated cheese
Sift cornmeal, flour, baking powder, sugar and salt together twice. Add oil, eggs, corn, sour cream and peppers, and mix well. Pour half of batter into greased baking pan, and sprinkle half the grated cheese on top. Pour remaining batter over cheese, and top with remaining cheese. Bake at 425 degrees at 20 minutes, or until done.

Country Living Appeals To Young Homemaker

The sounds of silence, interspersed with the occasional chirping of horses, chirping of birds, breezes blowing through the trees, and her children's laughter as they enjoy the wide open spaces — that's the kind of life Mrs. Ronny Moser dreams about. The Mosers are selling their lovely home at 709 W. 17th, and plan to move to their property on Gail Road.

"We don't have a house built yet," said Mrs. Moser. "We may end up living in a tent for awhile, but we're anxious to get to the country."

The Mosers already spend a lot of their time at their country property, where they pasture their horses. They raise quarter-horses. Altogether, they own about 13 horses; some are raced at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, some are kept for breeding and others are just pets.

Moser is a laboratory technician in the polystyrene lab at Cosden. The Mosers have two daughters, Shawn Leigh 8 and Kasi Shea, 5 weeks.

"I've always had a baby of one form or another," said Mrs. Moser as she discussed the colts she has raised. "Now I've got a n o t h e r honest-to-goodness human baby and I love spoiling her."

Mrs. Moser is happiest when she is outdoors. Yardwork and horseback riding used to take a lot of her leisure time, but both activities had to be sacrificed before and for a while after Kasi's birth.

"I do my share of cooking, washing, ironing and cleaning house, too," said Mrs. Moser. "I enjoy the indoors work, but if I can be outside it's even better."

Mrs. Moser is well versed in all phases of homemaking, from interior decorating to preparing

everyday meals. The family always starts the day with a good breakfast. Depending on Moser's shift, Mrs. Moser sometimes also prepares lunch for the family.

"Our evening meal is just whenever we come back home," said Mrs. Moser. "We're usually out with the horses until dark, so during daylight saving time we eat pretty late."

Young Kasi is getting indoctrinated early to country living and erratic schedules. She goes with her mother almost everywhere. Her naps and meals may be taken in the open air or in the comfort of her own bed, and either one seems to suit her fine.

"I decided she was going to

adjust to me rather than me adjust to her," said Mrs. Moser. "She's a wonderful baby, and already sleeps through the whole night."

When Mrs. Moser isn't out working with the horses, she has a multitude of activities that keep her time occupied around the house. She taught herself to sew about two years ago and now makes many of her own clothes. In addition, she paints, makes plaster plaques and is always working on some little improvement in their home. All of the jobs and hobbies were worked around a full-time working schedule of her own until March, when she retired after eight years as a secretary with First National Bank.

Prepare cake mix as package directs; turn into 16 x 4½ x 4-inch angel food loaf pan. Bake in 375 degree (moderately hot) oven 30 minutes. Invert pan and cool cake thoroughly. (Raise pan by resting corners on inverted custard cups if it has no legs to lift it up from table surface.) To remove from pan, loosen edges of cold cake with thin spatula. Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt in saucepan; blend in water. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and clear. Remove from heat; stir in butter, lemon juice and food color. Slice nectarines. Split cake lengthwise into 2 layers. Arrange half of nectarine slices on bottom layer; spoon half the lemon glaze over slices. Cover with top layer. Cut into 2 loaf cakes, each 8 inches long. Spoon remaining glaze over 1 loaf; arrange half of remaining nectarine slices on top. Frost top and sides other loaf with whipped cream; arrange remaining nectarine slices on top. Chill until served. Makes 12 to 14 servings.

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Think Of Medical Miracles When You Get A Doctor Bill

In these days of image making, the doctors aren't coming out so well, especially since they have quarreled at times with the government over how the various medical insurance programs should be run.

The physicians especially have been criticized for what their detractors call a growing lack of the personal touch with patients and fatter bills for their services.

All that is rather dismal news, but there is an encouraging side to this issue, too. It is that doctors, while they haven't always been able to cope with a growing population and consequently an increased demand for their services, nonetheless have come up with medical breakthroughs that keep many people out of their offices and out of the hospital.

CANCER CURE

Perhaps Dr. James Carlisle, at 84 still a practicing physician in Palm Beach, Fla., can explain it better.

"Since I first started practicing," he recalls, "doctors have found a way to control diabetes, tuberculosis has become almost a thing of the past, and polio virtually has been wiped out."

"For the future, lots of things are ahead of us. I expect to see leukemia (blood cancer) controlled, the life-span of man lengthened and, of course, a cure for cancer will be found."

Dr. Carlisle, who worked in a cotton mill and as a cook and bank messenger before he became a doctor, rejects the charge that the new generation of physicians and surgeons is more impersonal than those of the horse-and-buggy and house-call days.

BLINDNESS

A study of modern medical history shows that doctors have teamed up with each other or with electronics engineers to relieve thousands of people afflicted from pain, blindness and organic disorders.

In a faraway Glasgow, Scotland, for example, 43-year-old Mathew Love has been

blind since birth. Then surgeons performed a complex and risky operation, gave Love his sight and a first look at his wife, Agnes, and their five children.

You could say it was Love at first sight, couldn't you?

Andrew Peter Lundin, of Los Altos, Calif., wanted to be a doctor. But the failure of one kidney made such a career doubtful. Then he went on a hemodialysis machine three times a week to cleanse his blood of poisonous wastes.

Even then some medical schools rejected him, but not Downstate Medical Center of the State University of New York. Its directors had faith in the artificial kidney machine and in Lundin.

Today he is a graduate, with summa cum laude scholastic honors and serving his intern-series of operations, traction,

in Brooklyn. Lundin plans to work with a kidney transplant team at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston.

STIMULATOR

Without the hemodialysis machine he would have been a semi-invalid, unable to pursue any full-time career, much less that of a practicing physician.

In the field of medical-electronic teamwork, a tiny device called a dorsal column stimulator is helping patients to relieve the intense pain of spinal disorders. It took doctors and electronic engineers to come up with the stimulator—a small radio transmitter which sends pain-jamming electrical signals to a tiny plate hooked to the patient's spinal cord.

So next time you get a doctor bill, think of Love at first sight, or Mrs. McCaughy and her spine. Maybe then it won't be so hard to swallow.

to medication, physiotherapy, intraspinal injections, exercises, even braces.

Nothing relieved the pain until she tried the stimulator. She describes it as a tingling sensation "like the slight vibration you feel when you hold a purring kitten."

Dr. Don M. Long, associate professor of neurosurgery at University of Minnesota Hospitals, Minneapolis, where Mrs. McCaughy was fitted with the stimulator, emphasizes the treatment won't halt all spine-related pain. But it will do so whenever the device can jam the pain signals and keep them from reaching the brain, he adds.

Space Test Postponed At Houston

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — A 56-day space mission simulation scheduled to start Wednesday has been postponed until next Wednesday, officials at the Manned Spacecraft Center announced.

The Skylab Medical Experiments Altitude Test (SMEAT), an eight-week project to test equipment planned for the Skylab space missions next year, was postponed because of instrumentation problems, officials said.

The delay gives astronauts Robert L. Crippen, William E. Thornton and Karol J. Bobko another week to prepare for 56 days of confinement in a pressure tank.

Crippen, Thornton and Bobko will live and work in an altitude chamber outfitted with the equipment to be used next year on Skylab.

As the burglar was rifling through drawers, Cohen said, "my heart started pounding and my wife told him I was coming to have a heart attack. He said, 'Where are your pills?' My wife told him and he brought the little bottle of pills and a glass of water."

Cohen, who described the intruder as "very soft-spoken and very cool," said the burglar then walked into the living room. Cohen said he called police after waiting a minute, but the burglar had disappeared by the time they arrived.

Lt. Cataldo said the burglar escaped with more than \$5,000 in jewelry and cash from four apartments.

Dirt, Dust, Rubble Abound After Flood

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. (AP) — The dust, the dirt, the filth are still everywhere.

Walk in any low-lying area of this hilly city of 60,000, and you get a choice — depending on whether it's dry or raining — between becoming engulfed with dust that mixes with sweat and pastes clothing to skin, or being stopped with mud.

A full month after one-third of this eastern Pennsylvania city was inundated by floodwaters from tropical storm Agnes, the community retains the appearance of a disaster area.

Lawns, sidewalks, shrubs, walls and just about anything else left standing are blanketed with a coat of tannish grime, the residue of 20-foot flooding by the Susquehanna River.

In the city's well-to-do residential section along Riverside Drive, homes lie scattered. One house sits in the middle of a street, swept there by the waters. Others tilt precariously, their foundations and plumbing innards exposed.

The hub of downtown, a grassy diagonal known as Public Square, is filled with information trailers and Salvation Army food trucks. Of some 50 retail establishments that surround the square, just two — a newsstand and a drug store — have reopened. Heaps of boards, rubble and slime adorn the curbsides.

No doubt about it, Wilkes-Barre looks awful.

And yet... amidst all this, a bustling spirit of renewal is undeniable in evidence.

A lot of the city's dirt, for example, is encrusted on the arms and faces of people who have determinedly shoveled four to six inches of mud from their floors.

You see the spirit of renewal in the eyes of people like 81-year-old William Jayne, hosing down an old American flag that was defaced when three feet of water lapped into his second floor bedroom on the flood night of June 23.

HOMELESS—The biggest problem. Temporary Red Cross shelters are accommodating about 2,300 persons, with perhaps double that number staying with relatives.

ELECTRICITY—Restored to about 25 per cent of flooded homes.

TELEPHONES—About 75 per cent back.

WATER—Some reports of low pressure, but otherwise not a major problem.

SEWAGE TREATMENT—Still completely out. Sewage is going straight into the river. But tons of mud have been removed from the city's treatment plant, and it should be operable in another 30 days.

Flash Flooding Warnings Issued Around El Paso

Menacing summer storms gave Texans still another uneasy night over broad areas of the state before starting to die down this morning.

Most of the thunderstorms dotting huge patches of showery hammered at the southern half of the state and areas near the western border.

Rain fell at a rate of one inch per hour as some of the fiercest storms surged through Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange in the so-called Golden Triangle of Southeast Texas, also pounding at a number of other counties.

Warnings against possible flash flooding went up for a time around El Paso, where the thundershowers appeared heaviest in the mountains.

And at Abilene, in West Central Texas, winds gusting up to 50 miles per hour were clocked after a severe storm warning was issued.

Beef Prices Discussed By Connally

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Former Treasury Secretary John Connally talked beef while he sold cattle here Wednesday, predicting Americans can expect high beef prices for the next two years.

The former Texas governor said he foresees high prices because there is a demand for beef, wages are high and people are putting their money in savings.

"The same thing is happening in the rest of the world," said Connally, who completed a 15-nation tour at President Nixon's request last week.

Visiting San Antonio's Union Stock Yards to sell cattle for the second time this week, Connally told a newsman that "from what I hear, there is a world wide shortage of beef caused by increased demand."

He said the decision to lift import quotas on beef entering the United States probably will not result in any significant increase in the amount of imports because foreign beef is not available, for one reason.

Also, he said, the European Common Market and the United Kingdom offer markets that are as attractive or even better.

On another subject, Connally said he does not expect any firm price controls over farm products in the near future. However, he pointed out that anything was possible in that respect.

The only Democrat in President Nixon's Cabinet until he resigned recently, Connally visited the stock yards to watch the sale of 182 cattle from his ranch at nearby Floresville. He also came to the yards Monday to sell cattle.

Connally said he believes there will be some fluctuations in beef prices, but added: "I believe we're looking at strong prices for the next two years."

On the world shortage of beef, Connally said Argentina—traditionally a great beef producer—has imposed meatless days for the first 15 days of every month so its people can increase beef exports.

Because of some political instability, Argentina probably has not kept up with the demands of the international market, Connally said.

"Brazil has had a tremendous increase in beef production," he said, "and unless Argentina turns around in its production and marketing concepts, (Brazil) will pass Argentina in the next few years."

Another indication of the shortage of beef in South America was Uruguay's move to ban domestic consumption of beef for four months, Connally said.

No City Tax Hike Seen In Prospect

No property tax increases are in prospect for the City of Big Spring — not if City Manager Harry Nagel's recommendation carries any weight.

"I've never been associated with a city (as administrator) that had to raise taxes, and I don't intend to be," he told the Downtown Lions Club at its Wednesday luncheon in the Settles.

Nagel spoke briefly concerning city problems and the preparation of the proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, then fielded questions.

This year the city has just been holding on, stymied in improvement efforts by necessity of absorbing a \$155,000 deficit. This doesn't mean that the same amount will be available for spending on plus items in the new year, he said. About \$50,000 of that will have to go to debt service, which had its surplus reduced in this year's austerity program. Most of the remaining funds will go to replacement of worn-out equipment, he predicted.

As for capital expenditures, the necessity of overhauling the sanitary sewer system will claim priority under pressure from the Texas Water Quality Control Board. He made a horseback estimate of \$400,000 as cost of relining the main central sewer outfall so as to eliminate a critical salt water intrusion.

Nagel hoped that some sort of pay increase could be passed along to city employees whose loyalty he praised. In terms of purchasing power, most are working today for substantially less than two years ago, he added.

The manager reiterated his opposition to the federal revenue sharing plan, which it may have forced upon it to the tune of \$270,000 per annum. This would be available for improvements having to do with

ecology, for streets, parks, etc. His objection was that only about 60 cents of every federal tax dollar would get back to the city, also the spectre of outside control in spending.

YMCA Summer Activity Popular

Upwards of one thousand individuals, mostly boys and girls, have been involved in the YMCA's summer program.

Nearly half the total has participated in the aquatic activities. This total comes out to 460, of 281 were in the minnow (learn-to-swim) effort. Another 214 were in gymnasium programs, 122 in arts and crafts, and another 126 in special interest groups.

Not included in the grand total of 922, which is comparable to a year ago, are such things as recreational swimming, family recreation, handball, checker and chess tournaments, etc.

The supervised programs will continue through July 28, according to Curtis Mullins, executive director.

From July 31-19, the Y activities will be largely on a drop-in basis and with recreational swimming in the mornings for elementary school age children, and in the afternoon, for junior high and above. The family swims from 7 p.m.-8:45 p.m. will continue through this period as will other unscheduled activities.

In the swimming program, said Mullins, there have been 71 tiny-tots in supervised activities to get accustomed to water. There were 72 in the advanced classes, and 15 in life saving courses. Interestingly, 21 adults (13 women and eight men) learned to swim.

The 205 in gym activities were in volleyball, badminton, trampolines, boys and girls tumbling and gymnastics. Breakdown on special interests groups showed: 13 guitar, 16 baton twirling, 16 judo, 15 karate, 10 girls softball, 40 tap and ballet, 16 boys and girls in Camp Flaming Arrow.

Wash day and the day of rest help figure in peaks and valleys of city water consumption.

In this case, Wash day is Wednesday — the day the city's water plant filters are back-washed.

An average of daily pumpage for the past 11 Wednesdays was 6,740,000 gallons. The low day of five and a half million gallons proved Sunday indeed to be the day of rest.

As commercial water usage begins on Monday, the average daily demand moves up to 6.29 million gallons, and on Tuesday to 6.50 gallons, which may be a popular wash day for housewives.

The reason for the peak day toward the middle of the week is unknown, however. Water department employees failed to speculate, except to confirm the obvious — that on warmer days more water is pumped.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday see almost the same average water pumpage: Friday and Saturday, 6.17 million gallons; Thursday, 6.15 million gallons.

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Former Envoy Clark Supports Tower, Nixon

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Former ambassador to Australia Ed Clark, who refers to himself as a "Lyndon Johnson Democrat," says he is supporting the re-election campaigns of Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., and President Richard Nixon.

Clark, who says he has voted solidly Democratic since 1928 and has been friends with Johnson since 1934, told a news conference Wednesday he will vote for Democrats this year—except in the Senate and presidential races.

An Austin lawyer, Clark said, "the whole McGovern fringe which has taken over the national party has left most sincere Texas Democrats no other place to go in the national elections."

He said he had known Tower putting together a statewide group of Democrats for Tower at the senator's request.

Clark was ambassador to Australia from 1965 to 1968 on appointment of Johnson. He later was executive director of the Inter-American Development Bank in Washington, D.C.
