# Unbelievable Pot Arrest

LITTLE ROCK (AP) - "I'll tell you, it was unbelievable," said Roger Glasgow, 32, of Little Rock, an assistant attorney general, in reference to 29.5 pounds of marijuana being found under the backseat of his car.

Glasgow and his wife were returning from a four-day trip to Mexico when he was arrested at the Gateway International Bridge at Brownsville, Tex., Friday and charged with smuggling marijuana. Mrs. Glasgow was not charged.

Glasgow, an unsuccessful Democratic candidate for prosecuting attorney of Pulaski and Perry counties in the summer primaries, was released on his own recognizance under \$5,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is set for Tuesday.

"I immediately inquired about a polygraph lie detector test," Glasgow said of the incident. "I expressed not only a willingness but a desire, which finally turned into an insistence that both my wife and I be administered polygraph tests." Authorities refused, he said, explaining they

did not have facilities for such tests.

Asked about the package of marijuana, Glasgow said, "We don't know who put it there. We didn't know it was there until the customs officials discovered it."

# **Cuba May Soon Find Niche**

Cuba under Fidel Castro has yet to find its niche in the world, except its very narrow one as the farthest flung of Soviet satellites. There are signs, however, that the Caribbean nation may soon carve out a place among other nations.

The Cuban government is represented at present at the "nonaligned" conference of nations in Guyana. That is a misnomer for the group, obviously. Most states attending are as committed as Cuba to anti-Western politics.

And Cuba's case is getting a more sympathetic ear in many Latin-American capitals. Apparently Cuban dreams of importing revolution to other lands are fading, making normal relations with other Latin states more nearly possible.

Cuba remains a disturbing force in our hemisphere, no doubt of that. As a beachhead for communism, Soviet style, its presence is a constant irritation and a cause for some defense concern. But it has proven to be a rather shoddy showplace for the glories of Marxism, constantly

plagued by unsolved economic problems that only massive Soviet aid has been able to ease. That fact, and Castro's unpredictability, make Cuba something of an embarrassment to Moscow, too.

Moscow might be more comfortable with a leader more closely to the Kremlin line. There is some evidence to suggest Castro's brother Raul might fit that description; trained as a Moscow-line Communist, Raul Castro might bring Cuba more firmly into the Russian sphere, and be a much more dependable tool.

The Oriental mind at work is a wondrous and fascinating sight to behold. The official attitude of the People's Republic of China toward those who escape from the mainland to seek refuge in Hong Kong is an instructive example. The Chinese are concerned over the number

## **Counts On Help**

**WASHINGTON** — With the national conventions of the two major parties now over, the campaign of 1972 will get started with a far more intensive drive for votes than has been witnessed in many a presidential contest heretofore.

THE DEMOCRATIC party has had some dissension in its ranks, and the wounds have not been healed. The Republican party is united, and Richard Nixon will get not only more votes that he didn't obtain four years ago from Republicans but is counting upon help from Democrats who will cross over to vote for him.

The fact that Gov. George Wallace of Alabama is not running on a thirdparty ticket is pleasing to the administration because in 1968 this took a substantial vote from the Republicans and Democrats. The Republicans are hopeful that they will get a huge share of the Wallace supporters this year.

The concern of the strategists is the youth vote. With a new constitutional amendment reducing the voting age to 18 years, both parties will be concentrating on the young people. They will be well aware, however, that the older citizens will also have to be canvassed much more than ever before. In fact, the election on Nov.

1972, may provide the largest turnout in history. These factors are having a considerable influence on the planning in state and local elections. As a consequence, candidates for Congress may feel the results of the canvassing done to reach the voters between the ages of 18 to 25 who have not previously gone to the polls. The question for the campaign directors is: "What issues will they really want to know about?" bronchiectasis. I understand this is a fungus disease. I asked if a drier climate would be beneficial, and our doctor said he really didn't know, perhaps a moist climate would be better. I should think fungus would be less active in dry air. - B.M.M. There's a bit of confusion. Bronchiectasis is not a fungus disease, but rather is a struc-

tural change in the bronchi, resulting in dilation and the formation of sacs. These sacs or bulges become infected, resulting in cough and production of foul and sometimes bloody sputum. But of course fungi can be present

along with the other germs. You are right that, in general, fungi thrive in moist rather than dry climates, but there are exceptions to this. Really, climate changes are not likely to have much effect one way or the other on bronchiectasis. One or both lungs may be affected.

Treatment involves getting rid of those infected secretions. One part of this is by "postural drainage," which should be done twice a day. This means the patient lies down, as across a bed with head and shoulders lower than the rest of the body. These help remove the secretions by drainage.

In addition, antibiotics usually are necessary to suppress the infection. Usually it is necessary to take them periodically, and for long enough to be effective - not the familiar few days.


Bronchograms ( a form of lung X-ray)can map the exact extent and location of the trouble.

In some cases, removal of segments of the lung can bring about a cure. That's not the usual decision, however.

DEAR Dr. Thosteson: How soon after a vasectomy is the use of birth control unnecessary? My operation was perfomed over seven months ago and I have had four sperm counts since. The latest revealed a 90,000 sperm count. What exactly does this mean? B.E.S.

It exactly means that the operation wasn't a success. The 90,000 count, although low. means you are still fertile, and birth control measures are still necessary until the count goes to zero.

There are several possibilities to account for this. Having a double instead of single vas, or sperm duct, is one of them.






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
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
