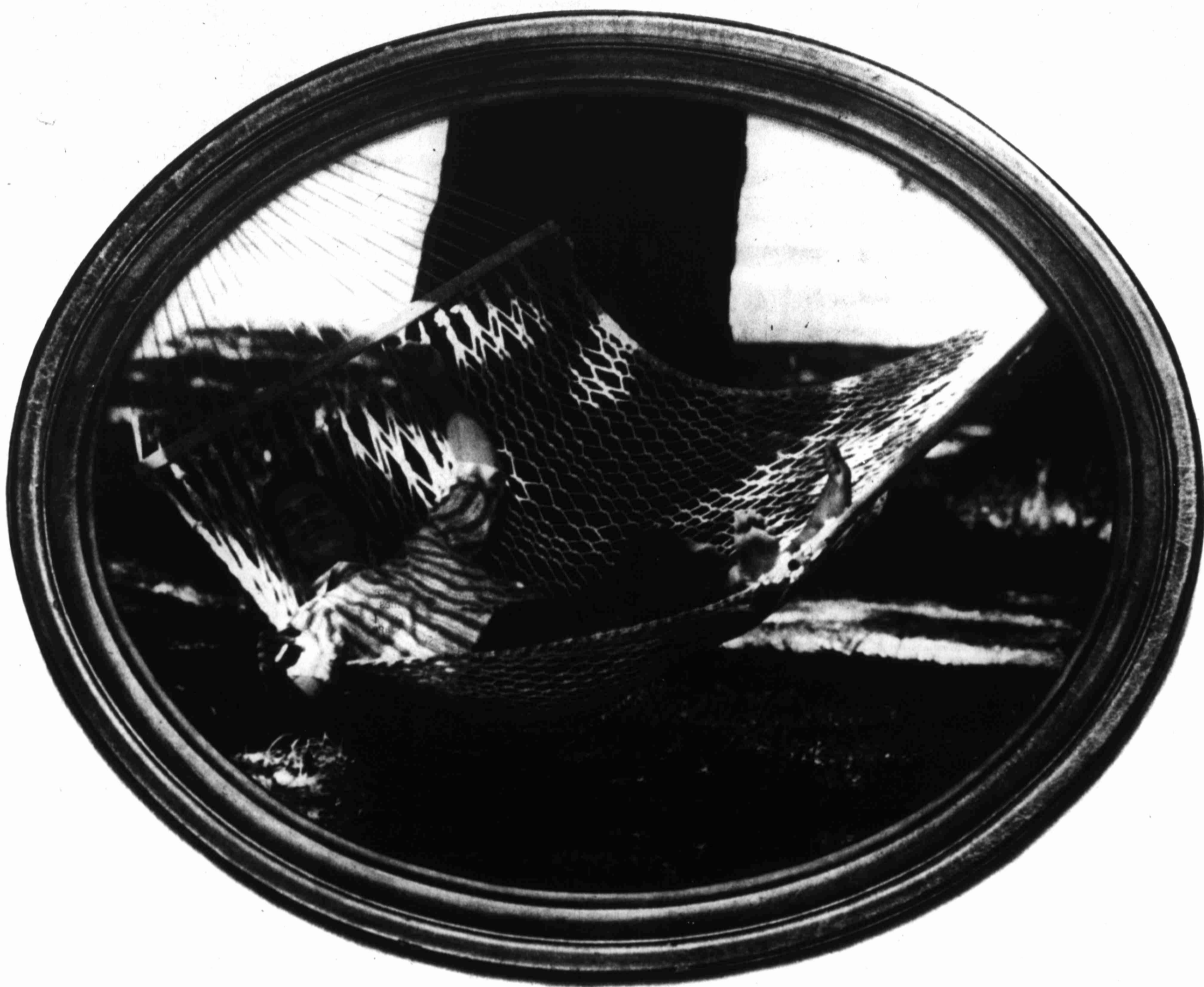

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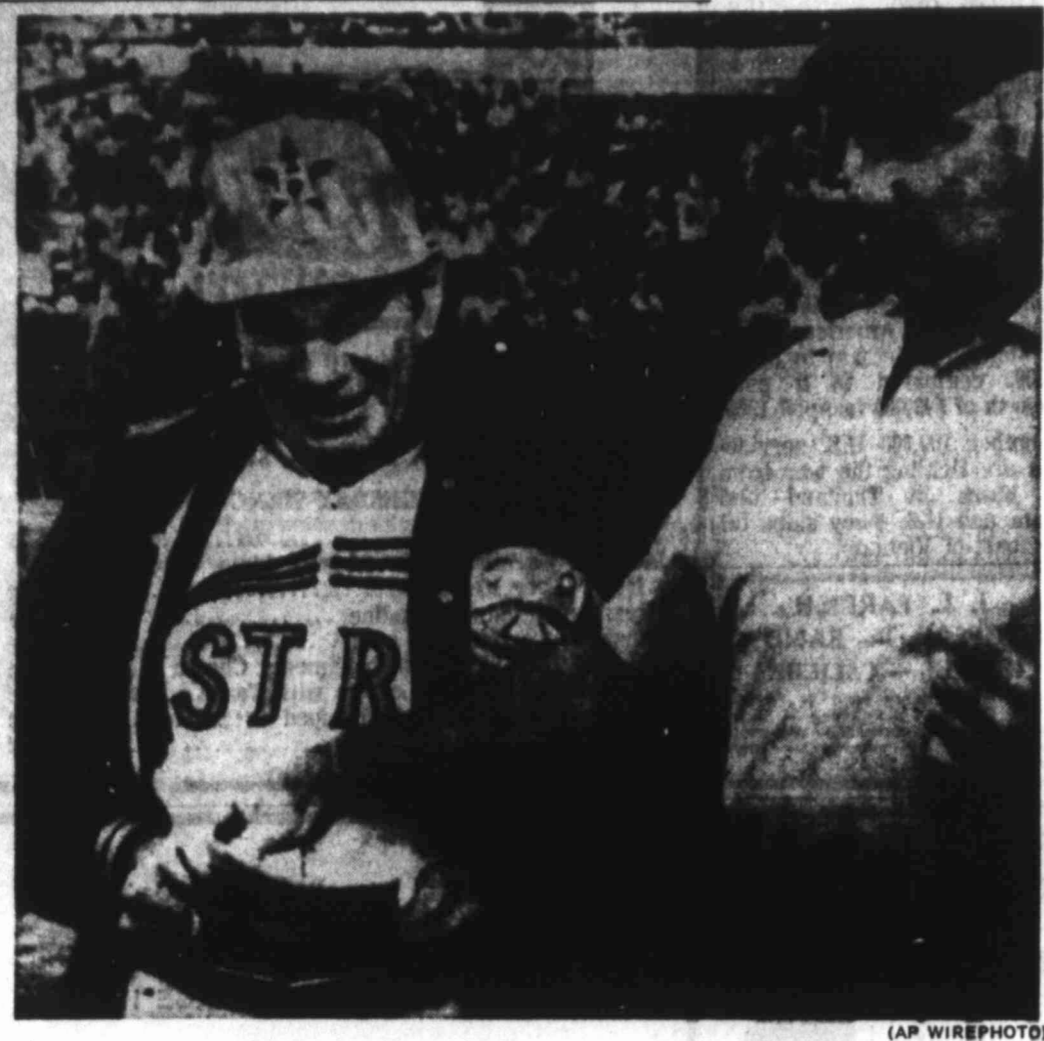

Total Of 568 Ducats Sold

Nicklaus Puts Gentle Knock On Tourney

PINEHURST, N.C. (AP) — Jack Nicklaus had just picked up his sixth title of the season, a personal high, and had pushed his year's earnings to new record proportions of \$280,482.16 but he wasn't about to put the stamp of greatness on the tournament that made it possible—the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship.

It is the fondest hope of the sponsors and founders to make the event one of pro golf's major tournaments, to elevate it to the status of the current Big Four—the U.S. and British Opens, the Masters and PGA. "It can't be a major tournament under this format," Nicklaus said Sunday after disposing of Frank Beard 2-and-1 in the final match and claiming the \$40,000 first-place prize. "We only have 16 players in the finals. The format was set up to accommodate television. It can't be a major tournament unless you have more players than that competing."

The new and complicated and confusing format was devised after all the game's great names—Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Gary Player—were eliminated prior to the televised weekend matches in last year's inaugural Match Play Championship.

So this season it was set up differently to assure that the top players would be playing on the weekend—when the matches are televised. Eight players were given exempt status. They included the defending champion and the seven leaders off last year's point list.

Eight more came out of the \$100,000 Liggett & Myers Open, a regular stroke-play event which was played Thursday through Sunday on the same 6,988 yard, par 72 Country Club of North Carolina course. The eight leaders after 36 holes in that tournament joined the eight exempt players in the match play.

Two rounds of match play were run off both Saturday and Sunday, sandwiched around the third and fourth rounds of the L & M.

TWIN BILL — It was billed as pro golf's first doubleheader, but the very heavy emphasis was on the match play. In fact, national television coverage broke away shortly after Nicklaus had beaten Beard and before Lou Graham, Hale Irwin, Larry Zeigler and Australian David Graham even began a four-man, three-hole sudden death playoff. A gallery of only about a dozen followed the four men in the playoff.

Lou Graham, a nine-year tour veteran and no relation to David, won it with a birdie three on the third extra hole, running in a 25-foot putt. Zeigler and David Graham had gone out on the first extra hole, each making bogey from a bunker. Irwin and Lou both made par on the next one, and Graham needed only a par to win it on the third hole after Irwin drove into the water.

Bobby Unser Is Clocked At 200 MPH

When you drive a race car at 200 miles per hour, says Bobby Unser, "You sort of put your heart in the seat of your pants, close your eyes, draw a deep breath and hope for the best."

Unser, 37, not only became only the third driver to officially circle a closed course in excess of 200 m.p.h., but Sunday he put four laps on the board above that figure in qualifying for the Sept. 3 California 500-mile Championship Auto race. His 10-mile average around the 2.5 mile Ontario, Calif.; Motor Speedway was 201.374 m.p.h.—faster by almost two m.p.h. than the 199.60 average teammate Jerry Grant posted Saturday to capture the pole position for the \$600,000 race.

Unser, who was stymied during pole day Saturday because of engine problems with his Olssonite Eagle, will start in 25th position in the 33-car field. Grant's top lap of 201.414 m.p.h. had erased the previous closed course mark of 201.104 established by Bobby Unser in a Dodge stock car at Talladega, Ala., in 1970. Unser had successive laps of 200.577, 201.432, 201.509, and 201.965 as he reached a peak speed of close to 220 m.p.h. down Ontario's long back straight.

"Knowing you're going over 200 is thrill enough," Unser said, "but it's so exquisite that you have those prickly little tingles running up and down your spine." In other weekend activity, George Folmer put the famed McLaren racers down again, driving Roger Penske's turbocharged Porsche to an easy triumph in a Can-Am road race at Elkhart Lake, Wis. It was Folmer's third victory of the season after taking over Mark Donohue's ride when Mark was injured. He won \$14,250. Folmer, who now leads the Can-Am standing 68 points to 59 for New Zealander Denis Hulme, started 13th in the field. However, by the 12th lap he had pulled up to within two seconds of pole sitter and leader Hulme. The perennial Can-Am champ's McLaren encountered ignition problems then and Folmer took over for good. Hulme's teammate, 1971 Can-Am champ Pete Revson, started 23rd and had gotten up to fourth place when a clutch failure put him out.

High-Protein Diet May Be Linked To Cancer In U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — A Cornell University scientist says the high-protein diet of Americans may be linked to the high incidence of cancer in the United States.

"One of the waste products of protein digestion is ammonia, a substance that is harmful to man and animals," said Dr. Willard J. Visek of the New York State College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell. His remarks were in a paper prepared for presentation today at the annual meeting of the American Chemical Society.

Ammonia increases virus infections, Visek said, and viruses are known to cause cancer in animals and are suspected of doing so in man. Visek said his cell-culture experiments have shown that ammonia slows the growth of normal cells more than of cancerous cells.

Ammonia destroys cells and thus increases cell turnover and the chances of cells becoming cancerous, Visek said. He added that ammonia also changes the character of ribonucleic acid (RNA), the material in cells that regulates protein manufacture.

\$250 Billion Spending Lid Backed By Nixon In Trouble

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic majority of the Senate-House Economic Committee has urged a \$250 billion spending ceiling advocated by President Nixon be rejected and that plans be made for future tax increases.

But the chairman of the committee—Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., says he disagrees with both recommendations.

"There is far too much waste in every phase of the federal government to justify tax increases," the Wisconsin senator said Sunday. And he said a \$240 billion ceiling would be sufficient.

The majority, in a mid-year review of the nation's economy, agreed there has been some recovery from the 1969-70 recession and that the rate of inflation has moderated. But the majority report said "At the end of this year unemployment will still be far too high and the economy will still be operating far below its potential."

It cautioned that "The recovery must not be choked off by premature moves toward monetary and fiscal restraint." The report said economic policies should point for a reduction of the unemployment rate, now 5.5 per cent, to 4 per cent before the end of next year and toward a long-run goal of no more than 3 per cent.

Rain Lingers In West Texas

Menacing thunderstorms and sometimes drenching rains surged across Texas from the Panhandle-Plains sector to the southeast part of the state and from the Mexican border into the eastern sections Sunday night.

Clouds and continuing rain lingered early today over West Texas and the Panhandle-Plains sector while skies turned clear to only partly cloudy over the rest of the state.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Sargent Shriver's vice presidential campaign became almost too efficient when local Democrats interested in publicizing the candidate asked a young man if he'd like to meet Shriver.

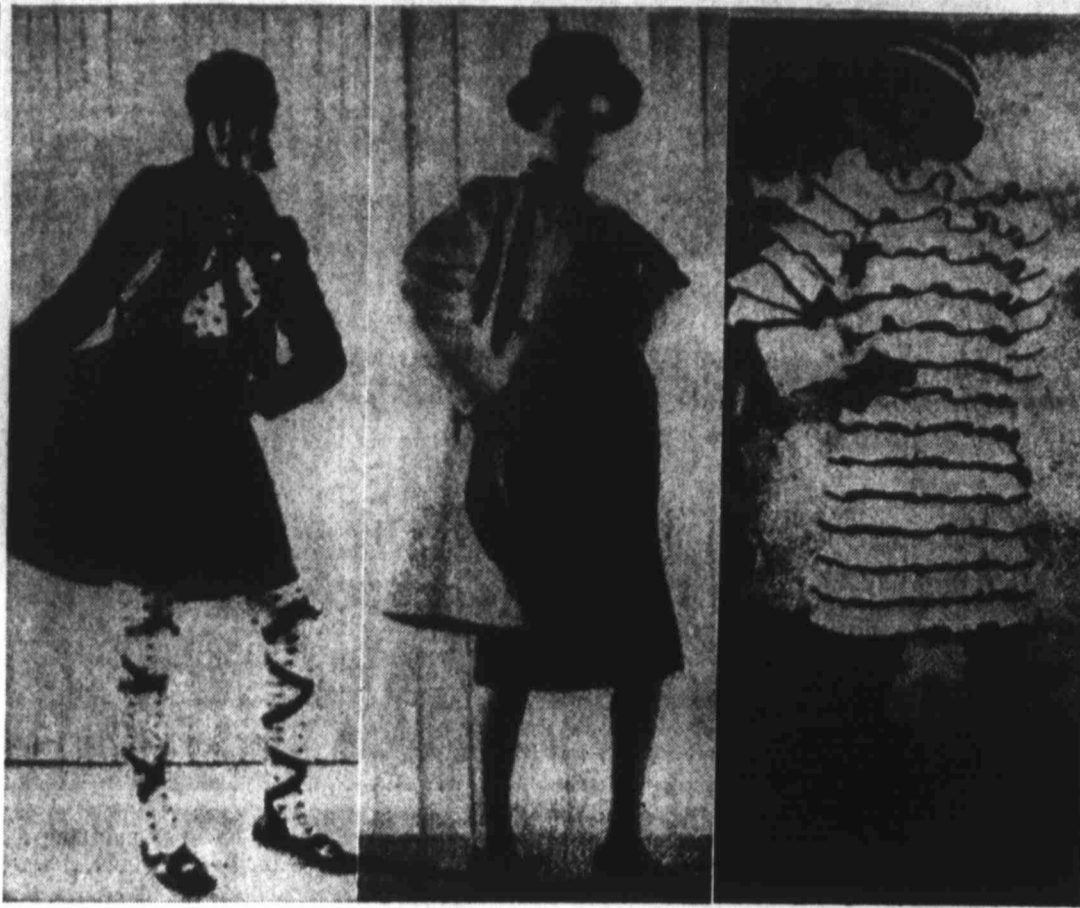
