## Friona Gets Third Set Of Triplets

Alice McDaniel, of 1300 North Walnut Street in Friona, was the mother of three daughters when she entered Lubbock's Health Sciences Center Hospital last Friday.

But in a 22-minute span, she doubled the size of her family, as triplet girls were born by natural childbirth to the 29-year-old Friona woman.

The triplets were born between 5:35 and 5:57 a.m. Friday. The smallest baby was taken to the neonatal intensive care unit for observation, but was released in fine health to the regular nursery a few hours later.

The new arrivals were named Lekisha Lafran, and weighed five pounds, 7 1/2 ounces; Kimberly Rochell, who weighed five pounds, 8 1/2 ounces; and Janita Demar, who weighed four pounds, three ounces.

The trio have older sisters aged two, seven and nine.

Early in her pregnancy, Mrs. McDaniel's doctor thought she would have one small baby. But she thought she would have twins "because I could feel one at the top and one at the bottom."

Soon the doctor agreed that twins were a possibility, and then in February he advised her that triplets were on the way.

The triplets are the third set to be born to Friona parents, which must be somewhat above average for a community this size.

## REPORT SHOWS

# Feasibility 'Good' For Gasohol Plant

"Gasohol production appears to be very profitable, and relatively risk-free."

So reads the opening statement of the feasibility study for a proposed gasohol plant in this area. The study was made by the A.D. Little Company.

Grady Sorley of Bovina, a member of the board of directors of the steering committee for the proposed plant, moderated a discussion here Tuesday of the groundwork which has been done so far in securing a plant for this area.

Sorley told those attending the meeting that he feels a plant which would produce 50 million gallons of fuel alcohol per year is a distinct possibility.

To finance construction of the

plant, the steering committee is securing contracts from farmers who will pay \$1,000 in cash and sign an \$8,000 note. The farmers, with such a pledge, agree to deliver 10,000 bushel units of grain to the plant each year.

A chart was distributed to those attending Tuesday's meeting showing that while the price of corn has gradually gone down during the past nine months, the price of fuel alcohol and gasoline has been constantly on the rise.

"I feel that if we are to continue with a profitable venture, we must somehow tie our products to an

energy source, and the gasohol plant gives us the opportunity to do just this," Sorley said.

The cooperative has set as May 1 the deadline for signing on as a member of the co-op. It was explained that only farmer members can deliver grain to the plant when it is in operation. It will be a "closed co-op" in that respect.

The proposed plant is expected to be designed where it can process corn, maize, wheat—virtually any grain.

## Census Followup Drive Underway

Four Friona residents were employed this week by the Bureau of the Census, to do the follow-up work on the 1980 census enumeration.

Those employed, according to Bill Soule, manager of the Amarillo district census office, were Josie Gomez, Sharlene Schafer, Martha Hamilton and Darla J. Irv.

The four women were trained by the Census Bureau on Monday and Tuesday, April 14-15, and were to have begun tracing down residents who did not mail back their census forms by the latter part of this week.

Soule said Thursday that the latest calculation placed the percentage of returned questionnaires for his district office at 86.1 per cent. This was a considerable jump for the district from a week earlier, when the percentage stood at 70, and made it tops in the state in that regard.

The followup portion of the drive is expected to continue until around the middle of May, according to Soule.

Residents who did not receive a census form in the mail may call, toll-free, 1-800-692-4061, and a form will be mailed.

## Court Session Is Routine

Mostly routine business was conducted by the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting this past Monday at the court house.

The commissioners voted to transfer some money from the county's Farm to Market Road Fund into certificates of deposit, as the money is not needed at the present. A total of \$20,000 was transferred from Precinct 1's F-M fund, and \$30,000 from Precinct 3. Ninety-day certificates were purchased.

Treasurer Benna Felts gave the

quarterly treasurer's report for the county.

Two bills were presented for Dora Fields, Parmer County foster child, \$186 for boarding care, and \$147 for medical expenses. Since the child has now qualified for Medicaid assistance, the future bills should be small, Judge Porter Roberts said.

The county's participation in the Texas Counties Association's unemployment fund was approved.

The county will advertise for bids to replace a 1975 Ford LTD belonging to the county.

Handbills are out announcing the formal opening of the Hail Hardware for Saturday, April 13.

### 35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1945

President Roosevelt died shortly after 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon, according to radio broadcasts. He died at Warm Springs, Georgia. Early details were brief and no immediate comments were made by military authorities. Elected in 1932, Mr. Roosevelt has since served this country continuously as president. He will be succeeded by Vice President Truman.

### 30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1950

Is it a bird? Is it a flying saucer? No, it is Ray Landrum's answer to the gasoline tax. Establishing a first for the Panhandle and probably the nation, Landrum sailed (yes, sailed) his gasless motorless "Windmobile" ahead of Thursday's not-so-gentle breezes down Highway 60, right through Canyon, up the Amarillo hill and finally lighting and hitching just south of Amarillo--a motorless trip of some 72 miles at a speed drawing gasps and odd looks from the morning's travelers along Route 60.

### 25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1955

Modern farming methods in Parmer County, with the self-guiding

tractor, scientific fertilization of the soil, crop dusting via plane and helicopter, etc., were joined this week by another modern practice--the extensive use of ladybugs in dealing with the greenbug problem on young wheat. G.H. Whittaker, Woodrow Whittaker and Frank Zinzer are the pioneers in the project, distributing some 21 gallons of ladybugs over some 500 acres.

### 20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1960

Incumbents won their seats back in both the city and school elections last Saturday and Tuesday. D.C. Herring, up for re-election, was returned to the board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District, and W.M. Massie was also elected. In the city race, Mayor R.L. Fleming unopposed, was re-elected, and aldermen Glenn Reeve Sr. and Eddie Meil were elected for another term.

### 15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1965

The Friona City Council officially annexed 24.03 acres of school property at the new high school building site, and agreed to enter into contract with the school for paving adjacent to the property at its regular monthly meeting.

### 5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1975

Open House for Parmer County Implement's new home on West Highway 60 has been announced for Thursday, April 17 by company officials. Attending a special ribbon-cutting ceremony will be J. Patrick Kaine of Chicago, president of the Agricultural Division of International Harvester Company.



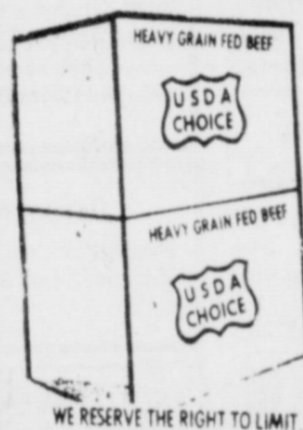

That's the advice from Friona Postmaster Richard Wilson who suggests you file change-of-address forms with your post office and send them to correspondents and publishers.

The Postal Service offers free

change-of-address kits to make it easier to notify everyone. Available in post offices and from letter carriers, the kits include convenient postcards to alert the postmaster and for mailing to department stores, friends and relatives, utility companies, banks, newspaper and magazine publishers and others who do business with the family planning a move.

"Too often people who are moving wait until the last minute to notify their correspondents," said Postmaster Wilson. "The result is they add up to several days to their First-Class Mail delivery because it must be forwarded to the new address," he added.

Those who fail to give publishers at least a month advance notice must either pay additional postage for forwarding, if desired, or wait several weeks before the publisher changes the address. This means customers may miss one or more issues of their favorite magazine.

"Customers should also remember to include their account number when notifying stores and banks and to send their old address labels to publishers," Postmaster Wilson advises. "And for all correspondence, remember to include their new ZIP Code."

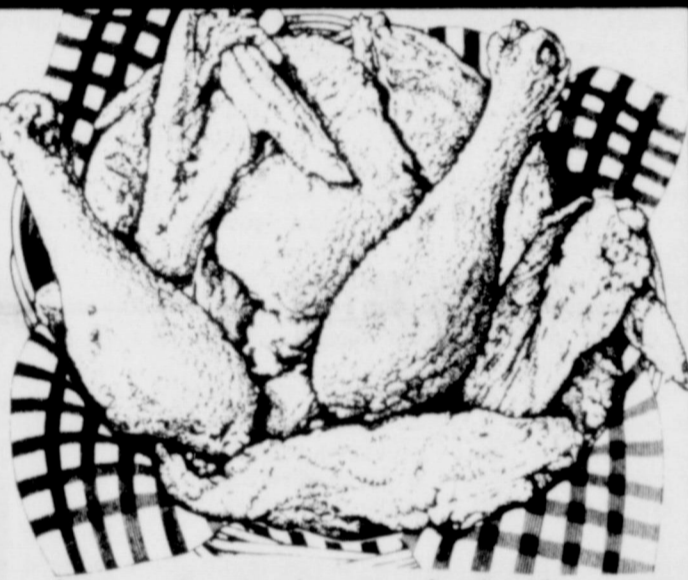

There were entries in track events, softball throw, and standing long jump. Each entrant received a T-shirt.

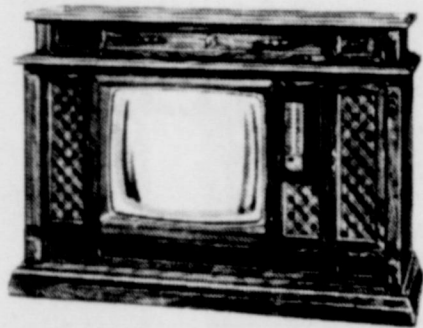

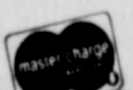

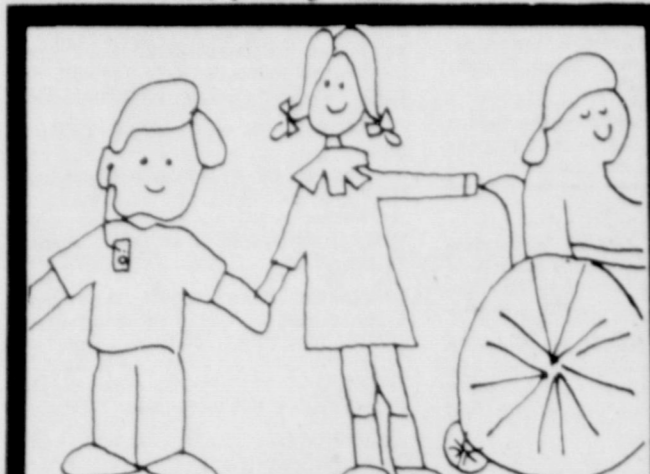

**Public Meet Slated On Buffalo Lake**

Area residents are urged to attend a public information meeting to be conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Tuesday, April 22 at 7 p.m. in Room 101 of the Science Building on the campus of WTSU in Canyon, concerning the future of Buffalo Lake National Wildlife Refuge near Umbarger. F&WS has given strong indications that the dam at Buffalo Lake may be breached and the refuge area done away with, despite its popularity as a recreation area for the Panhandle. F&WS officials will discuss alternatives concerning Buffalo Lake at Tuesday night's meeting. The Save Buffalo Lake committee, which is composed of Panhandle residents who are fighting to save the dam and refuge is urging a strong public turnout at the Tuesday meeting. Over 25,000 Panhandle residents have signed petitions calling for Buffalo Lake to be saved. A citizen panel from the Save Buffalo Lake Committee will be on hand Tuesday to present area views concerning the importance of the lake for water conservation, downstream flood protection, recreational uses and wildlife habitat. Representatives from the offices of Congressmen Kent Hance and Jack Hightower, plus a number of state officials are expected to attend the meeting.

**Notice To Homeowners And Farmers**

Deadline for filing homestead, over 65 or disabled and open space land exemptions. These exemptions must be filed with the school tax office by April 30, 1980.

**WHO SHOULD FILE:**

**General Homestead**--If you qualify for a residence homestead, you will be entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. The amount of an exemption which you receive cannot exceed the market value of your homestead.

The school homestead exemption is available to the general public as long as valid applications are filed with the school district before the end of the rendition period, April 30, 1980.

**ARE YOU OVER 65?** If you are 65 years of age or older, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only and you must apply for the exemption before the end of the rendition period, April 30.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and \$10,000 disability exemption (discussed later). If you are qualified for both, you must choose one or the other.

**ARE YOU DISABLED?** If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to receive an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

"Disabled" for purposes of this exemption means either that, because of physical or mental disability, you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work; or that you are 55 years of age or older and blind, and by reason of the blindness are unable to engage in your previous work.

If you are receiving disability benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify as long as you apply on time.

If you are receiving disability benefits under any other program, you will not automatically qualify. You must still meet the definition of disability stated above and apply before the end of the rendition period, April 30, 1980.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and a \$10,000 disability exemption. You must choose one or the other.

**Farm & Ranch Open Space Land Applications:** In addition to the exemption described above, qualified farmers and ranchers may enjoy another form of tax relief.

Two amendments of the Texas Constitution permit agricultural and open-space land to be taxed generally at its productivity value instead of market value. These provisions are effective only if applications are filed with the tax office in a timely manner.

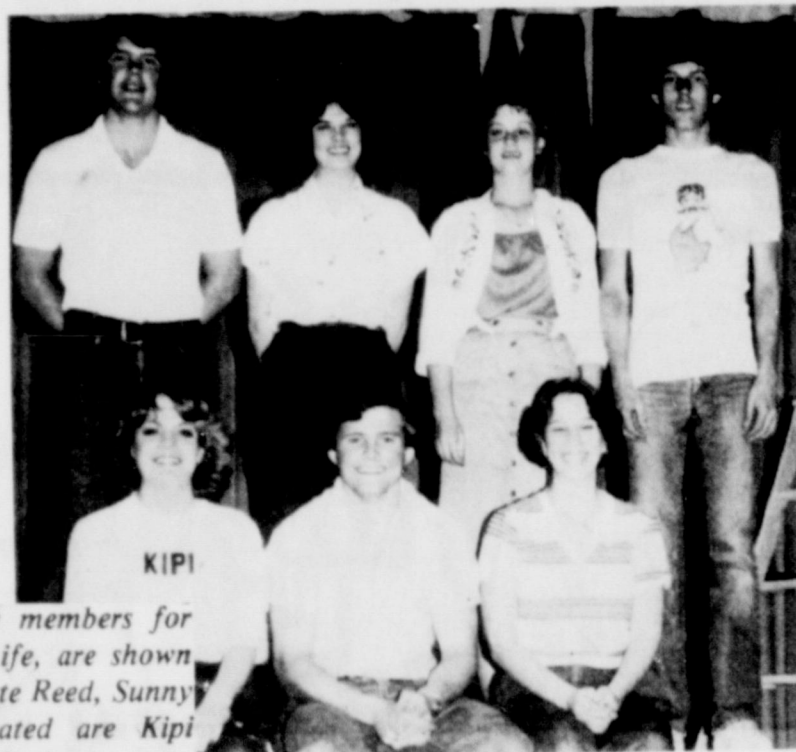

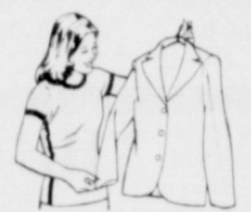

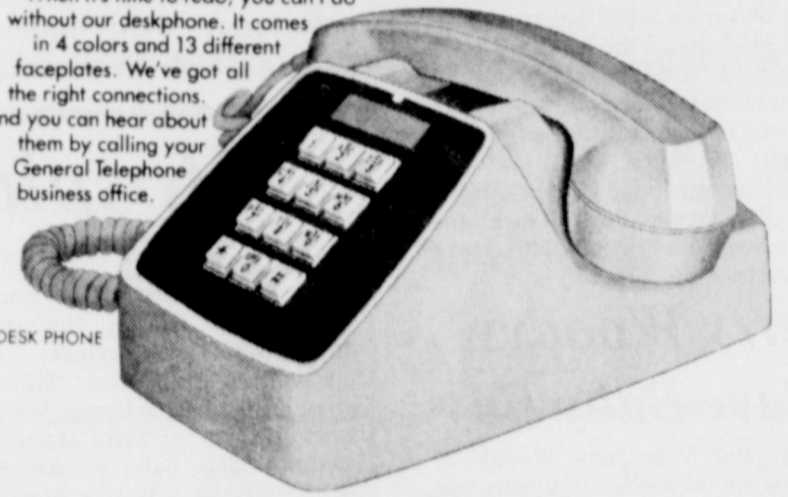
