PEOPLE 'BRUISED TOO MUCH' TO CARE

Cites 'Corruption, Wide And Deep'

Sen. George McGovern took the lead role today among Democrats accusing President Nixon's administration of corruption.

Renewing his demand that Nixon meet him in public debate, McGovern told United Press International editors the United States has never "witnessed official corruption as wide or as deep as the mess in Washington right now."

McGovern's wife, Eleanor, and vice presidential candidate Sargent Shriver had opened the latest offensive on the issue of alleged corruption Sunday. But

Shriver said most people have been "bruised too much" to care.

ABORTION ISSUE

McGovern said evidence of corruption include "a campaign contribution buying a billion-dollar antitrust settlement," leaks on the Soviet wheat deal to grain exporters and the \$10-million Nixon campaign fund whose donors have not been disclosed.

Shriver told labor union leaders in Minneapolis today that McGovern is "radical on amnesty and abortion."

He said if Nixon remains in office all wage settlements will

be dictated in Washington as the Wage Board reviews contracts.

Meanwhile the White House contended today that the Democratic-controlled Congress, when it acts on Nixon's proposed \$250 billion spending ceiling, will in effect be voting on whether there will be higher taxes next year.

The legislation for the ceiling has run into delays and opposition because of the sweeping power it would give the President to hold back funds appropriated by Congress for various programs.

After Nixon met with Re-

publican congressional leaders this morning, his assistant for domestic policy, John D. Ehrlichmann, told newsmen the President sees the spending ceiling vote as "critically important."

As Democrats continued to bring the Watergate affair into their speeches on corruption, Rep. Henry S. Reuss, D-Wis., said the administration is working hard to prevent former Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans from having to testify about the alleged electronic bugging of Democratic national headquarters. Stans now heads Nixon's principal campaign fi-

nance group.

The House Banking Committee is scheduled to discuss Tuesday whether to authorize subpoenas to require witnesses to appear at an open investigation. Reuss said administration operatives are combing the committee for votes against the authorization.

Meanwhile, Clark MacGregor, President Nixon's campaign director, said Nixon "cannot lose the election." He warned, however, against costly mistakes by the campaign organization.

PEACE PLAN

Nixon, Democratic presiden-

tial nominee George McGovern and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew did not campaign Sunday.

Sen. McGovern's wife was on national television where she called the Nixon administration "the most corrupt regime that we have had in recent American history," citing the break-in and alleged bugging at the Democratic party headquarters building as an example.

Mrs. McGovern appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press" Sunday, the first time the wife of a presidential candidate has done so.

She also said that her husband will soon announce a

specific plan for ending the Vietnam war.

Shriver, the Democratic vice presidential candidate, was in Minneapolis where he acknowledged that the Watergate case and alleged Republican campaign fund irregularities had not become major issues in the minds of most voters.

"We sort of have an emerging royalty of top bureaucrats and the people at the bottom feel incapable of changing what's going on at the top," he said. "So they're apathetic. They're very skeptical. They've been bruised too much," he added.

Midland Bill Voted

AUSTIN (AP) — Senators approved without debate today a proposal which Midland residents say is necessary to save its two-year junior college.

The bill, approved 25-1, would allow Midland College to split off from the Permian Junior College system. The lone dissenter was Sen. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock.

Midland residents told a Senate committee last week people living in Odessa had been reluctant to vote bonds to upgrade the Midland school college, which uses high school facilities on a part-time basis.

Quadruple Killings

BRANDON, Fla. (AP) — A young divorcee and her two children watched helplessly as a gunman killed four persons including her parents and brother in a Brandon farmhouse, police say.

Police said the assailant fired one shot through a screen window early Sunday, killing one person, and then burst into the farmhouse and shot three others.

Evelyn Sanders Johnson and her two children were spared.

The victims were identified as John T. Sanders, 50; his wife, Catherine, 37; their 15-year-old son, Earl, and a friend of the family, James Richmond Bridges, 28, who was shot as he lay in bed, police said.

Police said they arrested Thomas Turner Chambers, 32, of Gadsden, Ala., and 21-year-old Robert Harris of Largo, after a high speed car chase.

Both men were charged with first degree murder.

A neighbor, Mrs. Mary Davis, said Mrs. Johnson came running from the house, crying hysterically and yelling, "They're all dead. They're all dead."

Police said she told the Davis family the gunman spared her, saying "I'm not going to kill you, just the ones you love most."

Hillsborough County sheriff's officials said the young divorcee had been seeing Chambers for three years but left him about three weeks ago in Texas.

Hurls Infant From Roof

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A 19-year-old woman who police said threw her infant daughter from a second story roof has been booked for attempted murder.

The baby, 2-month-old Nannie Littles, was caught unhurt by a neighbor who stood below. She is being cared for at a Department of Public Social Services home.

Police said the woman, Joyce Denise Flood, told the manager of her apartment house that neither the baby's father nor she wanted the child.

The manager, Harold Bragg, told officers he took the child to his first-floor apartment where he was having a party early Saturday because he heard the baby scream and found the mother trying to suffocate the child with a pillow.

Officers said the woman followed him, snatched the child back and ran to the roof. As Bragg's guests stood below, the young mother shouted, "If you want the baby, you can have her," and then threw her off the roof, police said. The child was caught by a man identified as James Holden.

Investigators said another guest pulled the woman to safety as she tried to jump after her baby.

Northwest Airlines Strike Ends

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate vote on a liberalized welfare reform plan was assured today as Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., called up his proposal for debate.

The roll call, however, will not come until Tuesday or Wednesday.

Ribicoff offered his proposal as a substitute for a pending amendment which would provide for a test of all the various reform plans to deal with problems of welfare families.

This procedure guaranteed that his substitute would get the first vote.

In the end, however, the Senate is expected to resolve the controversy by deciding for a two-year test of the plans before anything substantive is done.

The test amendment first was offered Saturday by Sen. Harry F. Byrd Jr., Ind.-Va.

However, today Byrd withdrew his proposal in favor of a slightly different test amendment sponsored by Sen. William V. Roth Jr., R-Del.

Ribicoff's substitute is a liberalized version of President Nixon's Family Assistance Plan which passed the House last year.

It provides for a guaranteed annual income for welfare families on a national basis but fixes the payment level at \$2,400 for a family of four, \$200 more than the Nixon proposal.

It would provide subsidies for the working poor, as does the President's plan, but would give more fiscal relief to the states than Nixon offers.

"This is the moment of truth for welfare reform," said Ribicoff as he called up his substitute. "But I sense there is very little interest in the Senate or in the administration any longer in this issue."

McGovern Inching Up On President

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — The latest Gallup Poll shows Democratic presidential candidate George McGovern inching up on President Nixon, but still 28 percentage points behind.

The survey released Sunday showed an improvement of six points for McGovern over the previous survey.

Taken Sept. 22-25, the new survey said 61 per cent of the respondents favored Nixon and 33 per cent McGovern. One per cent preferred other candidates and 5 per cent were undecided.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) — Settlement of the 95-day strike by pilots of Northwest Airlines was announced today by Roy Erickson, vice president of Northwest.

Erickson said the agreement came shortly after 8 a.m., capping a negotiation session which began at 7 p.m. Sunday under the auspices of Asst. Secretary of Labor William Usery Jr.

Erickson said the company would not announce details at this time, but he added the basic economic improvement represents an average increase of 29.5 per cent over the period from July.

The agreement will be submitted to the Pay Board for review and approval, Erickson said.

Erickson said he expects that normal service will be restored within five to seven days to the more than 50 cities served by Northwest.

The session Sunday night and today followed a 16-hour meeting which began Saturday and continued until 2 a.m. Sunday.

Tentative agreement on a new contract had been reached about a month ago but a deadlock developed on a back-to-work agreement for the pilots, who struck the Minneapolis-based airline on June 30, one year after the expiration of their previous three-year contract.

UW Is Given Hefty Boost

Monday morning reports gave the United Way campaign its most vigorous boost today with receipt of approximately \$6,000.

This pushed the total to \$51,380, on the basis of an unaudited check. Still other reports were coming in to buoy hopes that the campaign will push past the midway mark by the middle of the week. The campaign goal is \$113,000.

Monday's report brought the first 100 per cent giving a fair share (one hour's pay per month) of the current drive. All professional personnel and other employees signed up.

Three more firms were added to the list of 100 per cent giving the United Way. They were Mrs. Baird's Bread, and the employees of Hall-Bennett Hospital, and Texas Electric Service Company.

Jones Is Quitting Effective Nov. 30

Jones, who is returning to work for the Guymon Police Department, said he decided to resign primarily to further his academic education.

Lawyer In Mass Murder Trial May Ask Mistrial

FAIRFIELD, Calif. (AP) — Richard E. Hawk, defense lawyer in the mass murder trial of Juan Corona, says he will seek "sanctions" against the prosecution and might ask for a mistrial.

Hawk said Sunday the prosecution has not furnished the defense with certain evidence required by court orders. When these items are introduced, he said, he will seek to have them suppressed or a mistrial declared. He didn't elaborate.

Prosecutor Bart Williams continues when court resumes today to outline the state's case against the 38-year-old farm labor contractor who is charged with killing and burying 25 men in shallow graves near Yuba City in the spring of 1971.

Williams has told the jury of 10 men and two women he will present some 200 witnesses and introduce hundreds of pieces of evidence.

The prosecution has said it will attempt to weave a fabric of circumstantial evidence to convict Corona. Williams has conceded that he has no eye-

witnesses to the slayings and will not attempt to prove any motive for the biggest mass murder ever to reach an American court.

The prosecutors said the testimony against Corona will include:

—Witnesses who will place Corona near some of the burial sites along the Feather River before the bodies were dug up in May and June 1971.

—Sutter County Sheriff's deputies who will recount finding a machete in Corona's van and two knives in a cooking shack used by the defendant. Most of the victims were hacked and stabbed.

A WHOPPING SHARE Funds Dictate Improvements

The annual portion of revenue-sharing funds for the Big Spring will be \$378,804, according to the Texas Municipal League, in a report received today by City Manager Harry Nagel.

According to Nagel, the funds are issued retroactive to January 1. Including the portion due from the first of the year and a quarterly proration due for the last quarter of the City's new fiscal year, Nagel calculates that Big Spring will receive a total of \$661,500 for its 1972-73 fiscal year.

A five-year program of capital improvements for the City is now in the final planning stage, announcements of which will be available as an amended budget is devised.

Capital improvements were excluded from the City's fiscal budget approved last week, in anticipation of the federal monies.

The Howard County government will receive annually \$238,405, according to the League report. Coahoma is scheduled for a \$18,300 check yearly.

Other area counties and cities, according to the League, are scheduled for the following annual receipts:

Borden Co., \$18,749; Glasscock Co., \$24,386; Dawson Co., \$195,744; Lamesa, \$120,467; Martin Co., \$78,975; Stanton, \$21,822; Mitchell Co., \$120,043; Lorraine, \$11,468; Colorado City, \$60,055; Sterling Co., \$20,193; Sterling City, \$2,103.

Revenue-sharing will mean more than \$80 million annually to the State government of Texas, quite an increase over the \$46 million originally anticipated by the Texas Municipal League.

The League had formerly expected a total of \$202 million to be dispersed to Texas cities and counties; but as the bill moved through the various committees of Congress, the portion was cut to \$163 million, the League stated.

According to Nagel, the League informed him in September that the City of Big Spring could expect annually \$270,000 from the share plan.

Evidently, although the entire Texas portion was reduced, a combination of House and Senate amendments and proposals formed a compromise leaving Big Spring with a healthy \$108,000 increase in its share.

Seize 'Horse' Worth \$2 Million

HOUSTON (AP) — Customs officials announced today the seizure of five pounds of brown Mexican heroin and the arrest of four persons at Corpus Christi.

Robert A. Stevenson, special agent in charge of the Houston district, placed the retail value of the heroin at \$2,190,000.

Three automobiles were seized.

Stevenson said the heroin was alleged smuggled into the United States on Friday night but that the case had been under investigation about one year.

The four men were to appear before U.S. Magistrate J. C. Martin today in Corpus Christi.

Missing Patrolman

HILLSIDE, Ill. (AP) — Hillside Patrolman Anthony Raymond, 24, was abducted late Sunday night and may be the hostage of two men who robbed a restaurant a few minutes earlier, Hillside police said today.

Hillside Police Chief Robert L. Huffman said Raymond, a two-year veteran of the police force, disappeared less than two minutes after he stopped a car on an expressway in the western Chicago suburb.

Chief Huffman said the FBI has been called in and all state units alerted.

Seconds after the restaurant owner reported the robbery, Raymond radioed that he was stopping a car with two occupants who were "acting suspiciously," Huffman said.

As Raymond began transmitting the license number, he was drowned out by another radio report, he said.

Another officer coming to Raymond's assistance arrived at the location 90 seconds after the original broadcast and found Raymond's empty squad car with its red light still flashing, Huffman said.

Fiery Highway Crashes Add To Toll Of Deaths

Multiple deaths in two flaming highway crashes helped to swell the violent death toll in Texas during the weekend. There were at least 20 fatalities between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight Sunday, including 15 in traffic accidents.

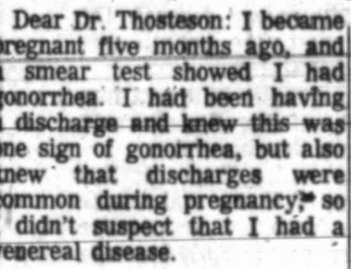

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I became pregnant five months ago, and a smear test showed I had gonorrhea. I had been having a discharge and knew this was a sign of gonorrhea, but also knew that discharges were common during pregnancy so I didn't suspect that I had a venereal disease.

which is not unusual late in pregnancy. Anyway, report the discharge to your doctor and have another test to make sure what it is. Gonorrhea is not passed from mother to child in the same sense that syphilis is, but it can affect the baby's eyes, which is why, for many years, infants' eyes have been treated with silver nitrate. Without this treatment, blindness can result.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Three of my friends are taking garlic pills for hypertension. They want me to take them, too. I don't want to without a doctor's approval and am afraid my own doctor would laugh at me. How beneficial are they? — M.G.

Dear Sir: My old-fashioned parents taught me to chew each mouthful of food 30 times. This was to break up the food particles to digestible size, provide enough saliva for the quantity of food, and mix food sufficiently with the saliva. My wife says this is ridiculous although she admits that some chewing is necessary for proper digestion. What do you say? — C.L.E.

WASHINGTON (AP) — "For some reason," says George McGovern's oldest child, "Dad hasn't caught on, if that's the right word."

But is there worry in the McGovern household over recent public-opinion polls that show Democrat McGovern far behind President Nixon in this year's presidential race?

Polis are absurd, says Mary McGovern, at 17 the youngest of the South Dakota Democrat's five children. "I don't know much about polls, but they've never been right about my father before."

Ann has had a different reaction. "A lot of good things for me," she said. "In a way, I'm doing things I never thought I could do, like speaking and campaigning alone."

Both said their parents have put no pressure on them to participate in the campaign. And at first, they were hesitant.

"I had a lot of anxiety about campaigning," said Ann who has spent three to four days a week canvassing and speaking for her father since the Democratic convention in Miami Beach, Fla., last July. "But now it's a good feeling that we're all working together toward a specific goal."

"It's really intensified the family's feelings about each other. We're probably closer than we've ever been although we're spending less time together."

Ann is married to Wilbur Mead, a college student at Augustana College in South Dakota, and a Marine veteran who served in Vietnam. They have two children.

Mary, a recent convert to Roman Catholicism, is a high school senior.

That made it fourth and one with 3:25 left. Dallas coach Tom Landry first sent his field goal unit onto the field, then called it back and directed a run by Walt Garrison.

Troy, Sooners Escape Upsets Over Weekend

Top-ranked Southern California and runner-up Oklahoma survived the rash of upsets over the weekend and if they both continue their winning ways it appears that the question of who's No. 1 will have to be settled in a poll rather than a bowl.

The problem is that Southern Cal plays in the Pacific-8 Conference, whose champion goes to the Rose Bowl, while Oklahoma is in the Big Eight and up for grabs by any bowl... except the Rose.

"I suppose they'll be No. 1 next week," said Michigan State's Duffy Daugherty after Southern Cal blasted his team 51-6 Saturday night. "I don't know who is No. 1, but I imagine USC is as good as any other team. It would be great if USC and Oklahoma could play."

STAKE CLAIMS... While Southern Cal and Oklahoma, a 52-3 winner over Clemson, were rolling along, six other members of the Associated Press Top Ten—Ohio State, Alabama, Michigan, Louisiana State, Notre Dame and even once-beaten defending champion Nebraska—were ready and willing to stake their claim to No. 1 should the leaders falter, a fate that befell third-ranked Colorado and fourth-rated Tennessee.

Colorado dropped a 31-6 shocker to Oklahoma State while Auburn stayed off Tennessee 10-6 in the weekend's major upsets, along with Wyoming's wild 45-43 triumph over No. 11 Arizona State.

Ohio State, ranked fifth, turned freshman tailback Archie Griffin loose for the first time and he romped for a school record 239 yards in a 29-14 victory over North Carolina. Why did Woody Hayes forsake his pet play, the fullback smash?

"They give you eight men up front," he said, "and to run on it you must use that fullback to block."

Sixth-rated Alabama crushed Vanderbilt 48-21 with a crunching ground game, although Coach Bear Bryant said he "didn't think they could score 21 points on us."

Flashy Johnny Rodgers set a Big Eight career pass-catching record—2,070 yards—and a school scoring mark with his 34th and 35th touchdowns in seventh-ranked Nebraska's 49-0 rout of Minnesota.

Michigan, No. 8, put down upset-minded and 18th-ranked Tulane 41-7 as Ed Shultsworth bulldozed for 151 yards and three scores. Ninth-rated Louisiana State beat Wisconsin 27-7, breaking open a close game with two field goals in the third period—including a school record 52-yarder by Juan Roca—and two touchdowns in the fourth.

Donohue's time for the 80 laps around the 2.53-mile circuit was 1:50:26.901 for an average speed of 109.87 miles per hour in a Porsche. Hulme was second in a McLaren 20.

George Follmer of Arcadia, Calif., Donohue's teammate in the Roger Penske racing organization, was third.

Gullett Flashes His Old Form

Southpaw Don Gullett is willing and able. On the other hand, Steve Blass may be willing—but not able.

Gullett, the Cincinnati left-hander who had hepatitis earlier this season, proved Sunday that he's fit to start the National League playoffs by beating the Los Angeles Dodgers 1-0.

Blass, the obvious choice to start next Saturday for the Pittsburgh Pirates, was possibly knocked out of the assignment when struck by a line drive on his right elbow in a 7-3 loss to the New York Mets.

"The doctor told me to keep moving it so that it wouldn't tighten up," said Blass after catching John Milner's drive on his pitching arm in the first inning Sunday. "I really don't know whether I'll be ready, I have no idea. But I have pretty good movement and I can still grip the ball."

Blass' 19-game-winning arm was x-rayed at a hospital and the examination proved negative.

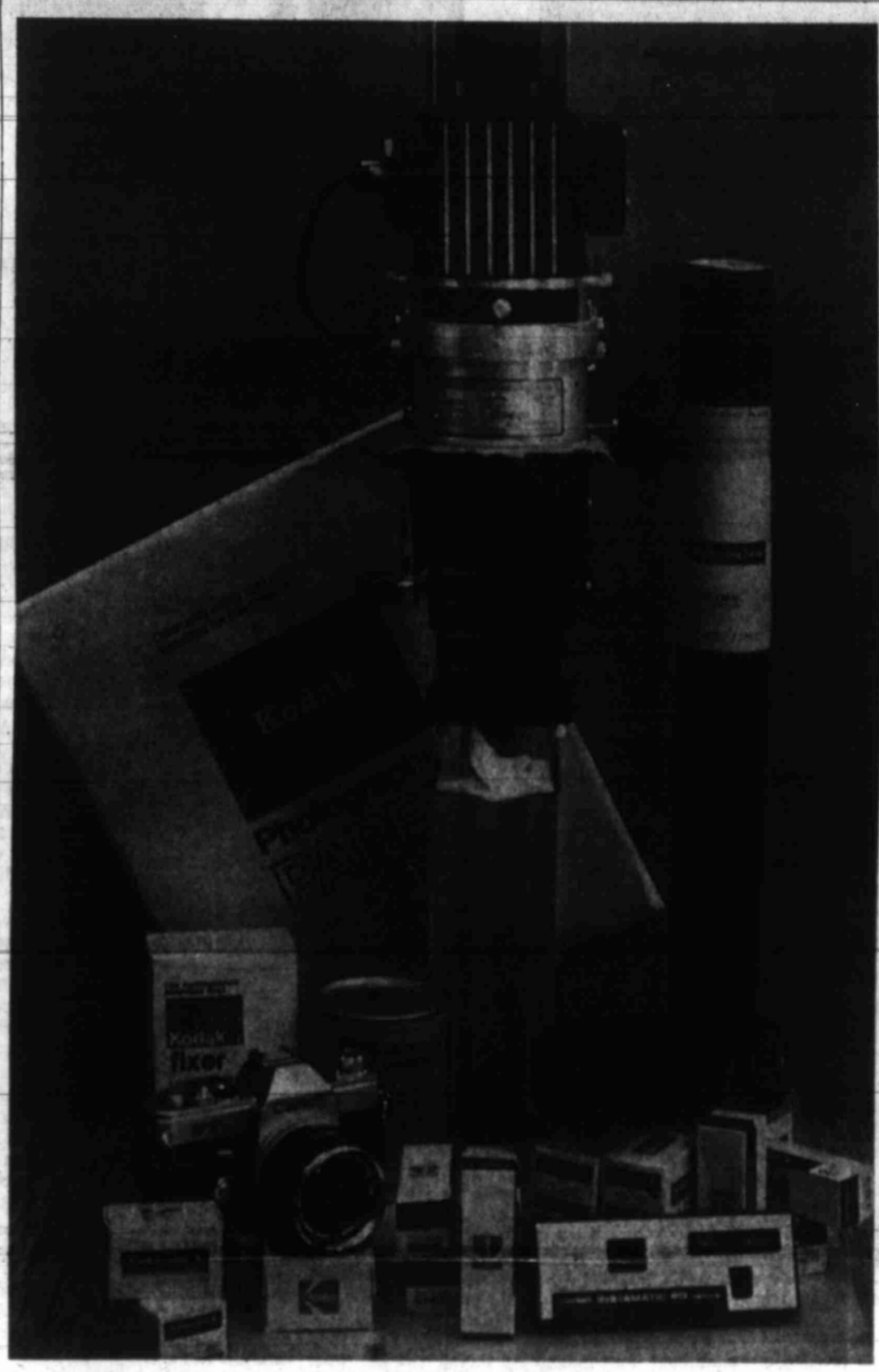

The Easy Out

The government apparently has been taking the easy way out when it wants to get rid of a highly paid military or civilian official.

When these officials have for some reason been demoted, or found in ill repute, rather than take the demotion and cut in pay they are allowed to retire at their highest pay level.

Now this may all be perfectly legal in bureaucratic circles, but it smacks of favoritism and unfairness to the taxpaying public.

A glaring example of this practice came to light last week when Wesley G. Grapp, the former head of the Los Angeles office of the FBI, twice censured for violating bureau rules, was granted such a privilege.

Grapp's retirement came after he was ordered reduced in grade from GS-18 to GS-13, reduced in pay by some \$12,000 a year, suspended from duty for 30 days without pay, demoted to special agent and transferred. The salary reduction,

suspension and transfer were withdrawn when he requested retirement.

The same type of procedure has been used recently when high military officers have come under fire and consequently been demoted. Instead of either requiring these men to accept the demotion or retire at the demoted pay level, the government apparently has found it more expedient to let them retire at their old pay level.

It is obvious that people in public and military service should have retirement benefits, and perhaps these earned benefits should extend to those who are being demoted. But a person who opts for retirement after he has been demoted should do so at his new pay level. If by chance his demotion is unjustified, there are legal provisions to protect his position. Otherwise the taxpayer, not the demoted one, draws the penalty.

Through the years, comedy teams have appeared to experience the heights of popularity only to split up or just vanish. Probably the most popular comedy team today is the "Laugh-In" combination of Rowan and Martin.

OTHER, COMEDY teams that are experiencing great popularity today are the husband-wife combo of Stiller and Meara, the "hard-rock comedy team" Cheech and Chong and Pat and Pata.

Two popular teams in the 1960s were Nichols and May and Allen and Rossi.

In the 1940s and '50s, we had Martin and Lewis, Abbott and Costello and Burns and Allen.

Earlier teams were the Marx Brothers, the Ritz Brothers, Thelma Todd and Zazu Pitts, the "Hellzapoppin'" duo of Olsen and Johnson and the Three Stooges.

My personal favorites were the lovable dimwits — Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy — Laurel and Hardy just looked like a comedy team — the tall, thin Laurel played off against the shorter, fat Hardy.

Today, Laurel and Hardy are re-achieving great popularity. Although both men have been dead for several years, "Sons of the Desert" fan clubs, television and film festivals keep their slapstick antics before the public.

Perhaps one of the things that made L&H so popular — and their films so funny was the punctured dignity. Hardy was always extremely pompous — only to have things happen which neatly punctured his dignified balloon.

THE TWO were believable. Although stupid, Laurel and Hardy were never moronic. L&H could contrive to get themselves into ridiculous situations through their stupidity; however, every day businesses go bankrupt through someone's stupidity. So, the L&H problems could happen to anyone — the two merely exaggerated the problems.

One of the common tactics of Laurel and Hardy films was the reciprocal destruction. In this, the boys engaged in tit-for-tat action. Perhaps this is best illustrated in a short entitled "Big Business."

In this film, the two were Christmas tree salesmen in California in mid-summer. After being turned down several times, L&H reached the house of James Finlayson, who figured prominently in several of the pair's films. Finlayson also refused to buy a tree.

Suddenly, Laurel had an idea and he returned to Finlayson's door and asked him if he cared to order his tree for the NEXT Christmas.

An argument started between Laurel and Finlayson which drew in Hardy. Finlayson smashed Hardy's watch. Hardy calmly watched as his watch was smashed and when Finlayson looked at him triumphantly, Hardy carved up part of Finlayson's door.

Hardy stood calmly as Finlayson then cut off his tie.

Then, Laurel pried the numbers off Finlayson's door.

When Hardy broke a window in Finlayson's house, Fin smashed a window in L&H's car. Laurel and Hardy then smashed the door to the house, so Finlayson ripped the door off their car and hurled it to the ground.

THE RECIPROCAL destruction continued until the house was a shambles and L&H were busily destroying the contents — Laurel pitches the glassware to Hardy who smashes them with a baseball bat. Meanwhile, Finlayson exploded the pair's car and is attempting to destroy all of the parts that are left.

Finally, a cop intervened. Laurel started to whimper. Then Hardy and Finlayson start to cry. Then the three shake hands and make up.

Laurel handed Finlayson a cigar as a peace-offering. Then L&H smiled slyly at each other and took off running as the cigar blew up in Finlayson's face.

The film was hilarious. The reciprocal destruction was used time and time again in L&H routines as was the pie fight. In "Battle of the Century," the pair trigger a pie fight that ends up drawing 20-30 other people into the fight.

One of the things which made the Laurel and Hardy slapstick routines so funny was the lack of any physical pain involved. Unlike the Three Stooges hitting each other on the head with hammers or slapping each other in the face, the Laurel and Hardy's cream pie in the face didn't cause pain.

Laurel and Hardy humbled their way into and out of messes for 20 years. Although every film was not a side-splitting, nearly every L&H film was amusing.

Although both Laurel and Hardy are dead, they remain alive as long as they are bringing laughter into the lives of others. An L&H film draws laughs in Berlin, Germany; Barcelona, Spain; or Paris, France, as well as in Paris, Tex., or Big Spring.

Muffler Applied

WASHINGTON — At last a committee of Congress has taken a step to stop Americans from dealing with the enemies of the United States in the midst of a war. The House Internal Security Committee has approved a bill which would prohibit any citizen of this country from traveling to nations engaged in armed conflict with the United States unless authorized by the President after he had determined whether the trip was in the national interest. Violators would be subject to 10 years in prison, a \$10,000 fine, or both.

THE ACTION by the committee, which could be followed soon by passage in the House and Senate, is aimed at those who have been in communication with officials in North Vietnam and who have been told by their friends or misguided advisors that it is proper to go there. Unquestionably, North Vietnam has used innocent persons as instruments for its propaganda and has confined some members of the families of prisoners of war that there was nothing improper about their trips.

Richard H. Ichord (D-Mo.), who is chairman of the House committee, has expressed the hope that passage of the bill would "stem the venomous flow of statements emanating from the mouths of American citizens on the soil of the enemy." While the measure is aimed at the activists in the antiwar groups, it could be an obstacle to further traveling to North Vietnam by relatives of prisoners of war. Visits of this kind might be made by citizens of neutral nations and by such organizations as the International Red Cross which have long had humanitarian missions as their objective.

of the prisoners. The communists, however, through their new agency, spread the comments throughout the world and quote Americans as criticizing their own government.

THE PROPAGANDA machine of the Communists, moreover, has had opportunities to use the names of prominent Americans who have visited there and openly condemned their own country. The effort to divide American public opinion by the use of propaganda has been going on for some time.

To denounce the United States while a prisoner under compulsion in Hanoi would be one thing. But some visitors have returned to America and continued their defense of North Vietnam with critical arguments. It is surprising that Congress has not moved on this issue before.

IT IS questionable whether all this will help the release of the prisoners when the negotiations at Paris are resumed in earnest. Hanoi has mistakenly assumed that the American people were swinging away from the administration and would not be willing to continue the war.

THERE IS confidence here that, once the election is over in this country, there will be a clearer view of America's position in support of south Vietnam than there is today. This, it is believed, will bring the influence of Peking and Moscow into the picture and during 1973 will force North Vietnam to end the war.

Lionel Hannah, the quarry owner, said: "So far we have uncovered the tail, spine and rib-cage and two leg joints."

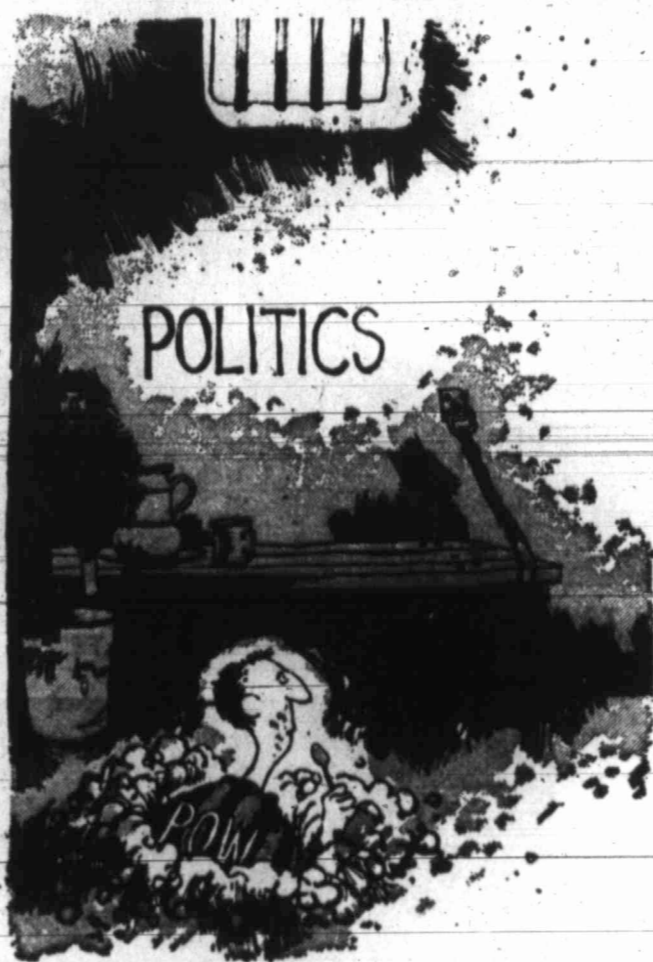

Vicious Competition

NEW YORK (AP) — The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. released its quarterly statement a few days ago. While the results weren't what a food shopper might have guessed, they were exactly what competitors had forecast: A big loss.

This isn't the only food chain casualty either. The red ink is showing on the hides of a few other retailers also, as they too become caught up in the consumer-business-government battle to restrain rising food prices.

Few shoppers are aware of the vicious price competition that has now enveloped many food retailers and, furthermore, they hardly care except when it means a bargain to them. Most shoppers feel the bargains are too few.

This may be so, but the fact is that most chains now make less than one-cent on each dollar of sales, and some earn less than one-half cent. A&P last year made one-quarter cent on each dollar.

The poor showing of A&P didn't develop overnight. For several years it has been caught in a sales-profit bind that it couldn't break. Outdated and poorly situated outlets, combined with hidebound ways, contributed.

The annual reports tell the story. In the fiscal year ended Feb. 28, 1970 the 4,200-store chain reported sales of \$5.75 billion. A year later the figure was \$90 million lower. And on Feb. 28 this year it fell to \$5.51 billion.

Profits went the same way, from \$53.3 million in 1970 to \$50.1 million in 1971 to \$44.6 million this year. Since February it has lost \$41.6 million.

Not all chains have had the same poor fortune, and this fact has much to do with the fierce competition. Safeway Stores, Inc. pushed its profits up to \$80.2 million in 1971 from \$68.9 million a year earlier.

Safeway's sales volume probably is even more significant. In 1970 it reported sales of \$4.9 billion. Last year the figure jumped to \$5.36 billion. Volume this year is soaring, and Safeway has already made tentative claims to being America's No. 1 food retailer.

Thus goaded nationally and locally, A&P is counter-attacking. While its profits are down, it sales have turned. In the six months through August they rose 12.3 per cent to \$3.1 billion, largely because of WEOS.

In May 1971 A&P opened an outlet in Pennsauken, N.J., that it called a Warehouse Economy Outlet, otherwise known by the acronym WEO. It was designed to sell fast-moving items at a low markup.

The lessons learned there were quickly applied to many other stores. The acronym was borrowed too, although it is now applied to the label "Where Economy Originates." Sometime this year all A&P stores will be WEOS.

In effect, A&P seems to believe it has magically derived wisdom from the absurd — that you can lose on every sale but make it up in volume. It is losing heavily, and doing so with enthusiasm, vigor and an unswerving dedication.

Clearly, it feels that immediate losses will be insignificant in comparison to long-term gains. If stores are made more efficient, if they accommodate critical consumers, if they offer real bargains, then customers should flock back. And they are.

A&P can afford to wage such a battle because, despite its troubles in recent years, its debt structure and cash position are extremely healthy. Quite likely it can absorb losses that would destroy smaller companies.

It is that latter possibility that could spring some repercussions for A&P even before it can completely carry out its plans. Some competitors are all but claiming A&P's practice constitutes unfair, maybe illegal, competition.

One, the Bohack Corp., based in New York, has called the big chain's moves desperate and at placed blame for its own losses on the larger chain's "cut-throat" practices.

Restrict Travel

WASHINGTON — In this space of Sept. 14, reference was made to visits to North Vietnam by Jane Fonda and others whose radio broadcasts have no doubt given comfort and encouragement to the communists — we are fighting in South Vietnam.

THOSE OF US here in the Congress who are incensed and deeply concerned with these actions are introducing legislation for the purpose of preventing unauthorized travel by United States citizens to any country engaged in armed conflict with our military forces.

There are existing prohibitions on U.S. citizens receiving a United States passport to travel in countries considered enemies but they have been interpreted as not effective. Jane Fonda and others used a special travel permit issued by the government of North Vietnam to travel to that country without the necessity of being issued a United States passport.

THERE APPEARS reluctance on the part of the Justice Department to seek an indictment against her and others for alleged sedition and treason for their broadcasts to U.S. servicemen over Radio Hanoi. The Justice Department may be right in view of the fact that evidentiary requirements for successful prosecution are no doubt difficult.

Other U.S. citizens, including Ramsey Clark, who charged U.S. bombers had broken dikes, engaged in activities in North Vietnam which are inimical to the interest of our Nation.

IN VIEW OF this situation, it seems the only way to prevent such future excursions is to prohibit travel to any nation with which the United States is engaged in armed conflict.

The bill being introduced, which amends the Internal Security Act, simply says "The President may restrict travel by citizens and nationals of the United States to, in,

or through any country or area whose military forces are engaged in armed conflict with the military forces of the United States. Such restriction shall be announced by public notice which shall be published in the Federal Register. Travel to such restricted country or area by any person, may be authorized by the President when he deems such travel to be in the national interest. It shall be unlawful for any citizen or national of the United States willfully and without such authorization to travel to, in, or through any country or area to which travel is restricted pursuant to this subsection."

Robert Hotz, editor of "Aviation Week magazine, noted in August 1971 that there were broken dikes where there had been no bombing in more than three years, and that "the easiest explanation for the population that will die and suffer in the ensuing floods which occur in September and October is that the disaster is caused by American bombing." He ended his article by saying, "This is another enormous lie."

Invited To Tour

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland Orchestra has been invited to tour Australia and New Zealand in September and October 1973.

It will be the second American orchestra to play this part of the world. The Boston Symphony toured Australia in 1960. The visit is sponsored by the Australian Broadcasting Commission, as part of the three-month celebration marking the opening of the new Opera House in Sydney, and by the New Zealand Broadcasting Corp.

The tour will be conducted by music director Lorin Maazel, former music director Erich Leinsdorf and a third still to be named.

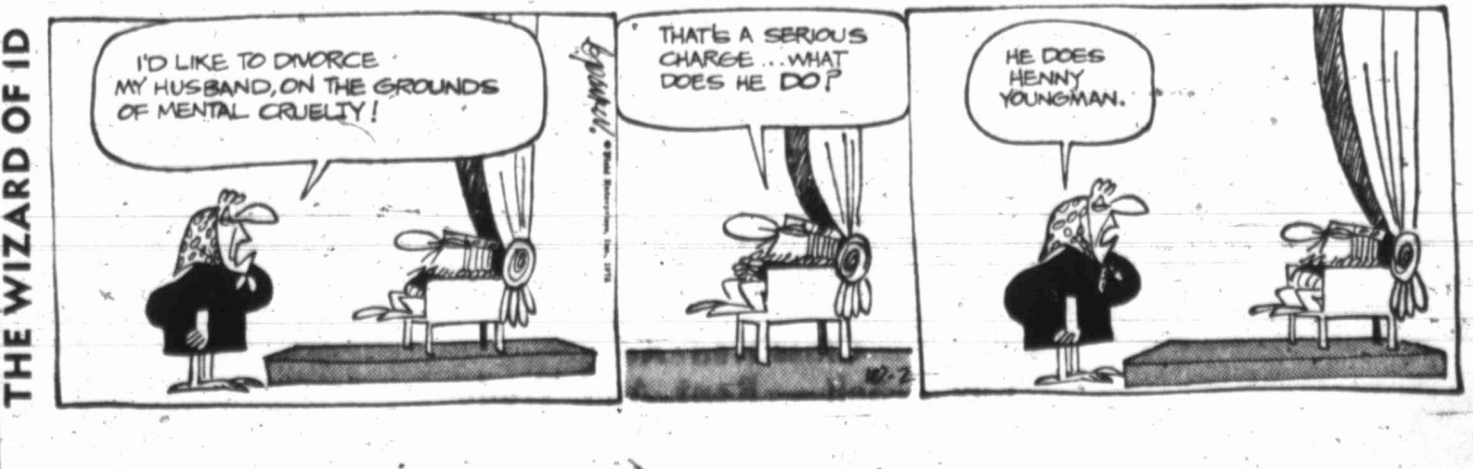

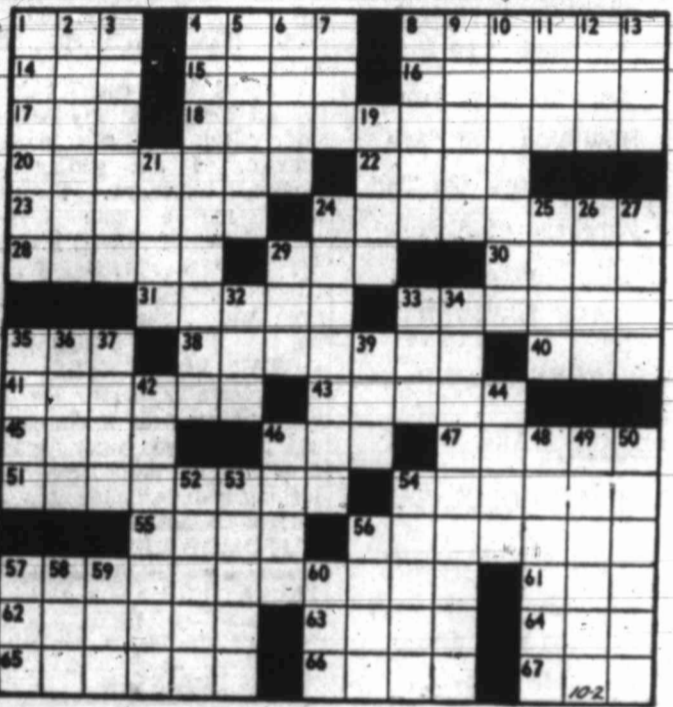

GOREN © 1972 by The Chess Tribune BRIDGE QUIZ ANSWERS Q. 1—As South, vulnerable, you hold: ♠3 ♠Q1072 ♠Q4 ♣AK983 The bidding has proceeded: West North East South Pass 1 ♦ 1 ♣ 2 ♣ Pass 2 ♦ Pass ? What do you bid now? A.—Three diamonds. Raising with only a doubleton honor may seem a little risky, but is acceptable after partner has rebid his suit, when no convenient call is available. Partner may now be in position to try three no trump. Q. 2—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠A1054 ♠AKQ105 ♣K964 The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1 ♦ Pass 1 ♣ Pass ? What do you bid now? A.—Two clubs. Although you are in possession of a fine hand, caution should be the byword, since no fit has as yet been established. A rebid of two clubs is best calculated to offer encouragement to partner to continue without crowding the auction. Q. 3—Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠A10 ♠AQ105 ♠K106 ♠AJ62 The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1 ♣ Dble. Pass 1 ♦ ? What do you bid now? A.—One no trump. The tens made this hand a shade too strong to open with one no trump. When the bid is employed at this juncture in single-handed competition with the opposition, partner should play you for a very good hand. Q. 4—As South, vulnerable, you hold: ♠AK9 ♠74 ♠KQ2 ♠AQ975 The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass ? What do you bid now? A.—Four diamonds. Your main concern is the heart situation (partner could have a sound opening bid without either top heart honor) and Blackwood will not help you to the answer. The best procedure is to make a false cue bid of four diamonds and follow it up by overbidding the game in spades. If partner can stop the opponents from winning two heart tricks, he will be able to proceed to a slam on even the "odds" of ostentation. Q. 5—As South, vulnerable, you hold: ♠63 ♠72 ♠1063 ♠AK10854 Your partner opens with one no trump. What is your response? A.—Three no trump. True, you can't count up to the required 26 points, but the compensating feature of a six card suit headed by the two top honors makes the bid a reasonable speculation. Since partner must not make a one no trump opening without at least Qx or xx in clubs, chances of running the entire suit are good. Q. 6—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠K1074 ♠63 ♠QKJ93 ♣43 The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1 ♣ Pass 1 ♦ Pass 1 ♣ Pass 1 ♣ Pass 1 ♣ Pass ? What do you bid now? A.—Pass. Partner has shown a minimum type opening and opposite your nine points no game can be in contemplation. Q. 7—Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ♠76 ♠KQ105 ♠AJ42 ♣AJ10 The bidding has proceeded: East South West North Pass 1 ♥ 2 ♣ Pass ? What do you bid now? A.—Two diamonds. Although chances for game are just about nil "since partner was unable" to make a free bid, some further competition should be offered to prevent the opponents from making off with a cheap part score. You may succeed in driving them one level higher than they can afford to go. Q. 8—As South, vulnerable, you hold: ♠42 ♠AQJ52 ♠QJ2 ♣97 The bidding has proceeded: West North East South 2 ♦ Pass Pass ? What do you bid? A.—Three hearts. West has announced a very weak hand and East did not have enough to go on so your partner is definitely marked with some values. If he has a good fit, there may even be a game in the offing.

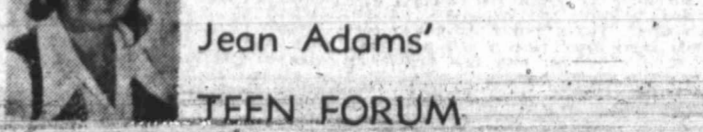
Y Plan Will Get Public Hearing
