Bennett received his engineering degree from Texas Tech, but also has become a writer of some distinction. He has published a book on his family, entitled "The Bennetts of Texas." He sent us a copy of the book, which we appreciate very much.

Bennett also has published a booklet entitled "Waiting Room Reading." One of the items concerns his visit to the Black community, 30 years after he left. We quote it herewith for your enjoyment:

AFTER 30 YEARS
By Vernon E. Bennett

During my vacation, my family and I went to the community where I was "raised" to see the old farm, schoolhouse and the places that have lived so long in my memory.

In the Spring of 1938, having a new high school diploma, I heard destiny calling me loud and clear.

Realizing the limitations of the future if I stayed, I set forth into the world to make my mark. Now, after 30 years upon returning, I was a stranger.

The old schoolhouse had been deserted a long time, victim of the consolidated school, but was still standing. The walls were leaning and the doors were padlocked. A sign above the door read "Community House."

The old basketball goals were leaning toward each other as if seeking mutual support. Everything had an abandoned look. The old flagpole, on which we used to demonstrate our strength by shinnying to the top, was rusty now instead of polished by climbing hands.

Things had changed so much that even the old familiar landmarks were hard to find. The old swimming hole was gone, only a muddy ditch flowed where we used to swim.

The railroad crossing by the school where as a first grader I had placed an ear of corn on the rail and watched the railroad motor car spill the crew, was still the same.

On going into town very few of the old crowd was found to be around. One or two had made good and gave me a suspicious eye as if they wondered what I wanted. Two or three fellows still there were complaining about opportunity having passed them by.

The shapely blond with the soft blue eyes, was now fat with a double chin, and was taking care of three grandchildren.

Most of my old friends had gone off into the world seeking their fortune. Those who had been successful won't have time to come back, failures won't want to come back and still others talk about what might have been.

And of course, I didn't find what I was seeking. For while I was away the dreams, the hopes, the emotional security, the confidence and the anticipation of youth they, too, had got up and gone.

Local Ag Show Slated

Friona FFA and 4-H Club youngsters will hold a local junior livestock show Saturday, February 2, at the Community Center-Showbarn, beginning at 9 a.m.

Judging will be held for barrows, lambs and steers. Ronnie Dennis, vocational agriculture instructor at Kress, will judge the show.

This is the first time for the young showmen of Friona to hold their own show. "We have thought about this for years, but due to the work involved in putting on the county show locally, we never have done it until this year. We hope it can become an annual affair," said Benny Pryor, local vo-ag instructor and organizer of the show.

Pryor said that parents and friends will be more than welcome to attend the show.

There will be no ribbons or prizes for the winners—just the experience of showing their animals. "We may add ribbons in the future," Pryor said.

Following the lamb show, a "Pee Wee Class" will be held, for youngsters at the show who would like to "show" a lamb already at the show. Friona youngsters are invited to take part.

Some 120 animals are anticipated for the local show.

McCathern In Senate Race

Gerald McCathern, who announced his intentions to run for State Senator from District 31, on September 19, has now made it official by sending in his filing fee to the state Democratic headquarters.

McCathern, farmer and rancher from Hereford, has been traveling extensively through the district since September, talking with people in all makes of life. "I am convinced," he said, "that the people of our district are as concerned as I am that our state government has not been responsible to the needs of our district and the needs of our people. Large special interest groups have been far too influential in securing legislation which is beneficial to those groups at the expense of small businesses, ranchers, farmers, and other working people. "I can relate to these problems of our people," McCathern said, "because I grew up in the eastern part of our district during the depression years of the thirties. I have worked in the oil fields as a rough-neck, roustabout, and welder. After service in the Aviation Engineers during World War II, I attended Texas Tech under the G.I. Bill and graduated with a

The 31st District includes Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and

Wheeler Counties.

In making his announcement, Price said, "It has been a distinct honor serving the people of this district for the past several years."

Price serves on three committees: Economic Development, Human Resources and Natural Resources.

"In serving as Texas senator for the 31st District, I have worked to serve the needs of the people of the 26 counties by maintaining my

Registration Begins For Beferendum

Registration is underway to vote in the February 19-22 Beferendum.

Registration will take place through February 6 at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Farwell.

Voting will also take place at ASCS offices.

Anyone who owned cattle during the calendar year 1979 is eligible to vote in the referendum.

If a majority of bona-fide cattlemen favor the measure, a national beef program will be created for beef promotion, research, consumer education and market development programs.

A 60-member national beef board would decide how to spend money from the program. Two-tenths of one percent of the sale price on each cattle transaction will be deducted for the board's use. That's 20 cents from each \$100.

Texas would have at least six members on the board.

At least 50 percent of those registering to vote must return and vote or the referendum will not be valid.

A refund of the check-off monies could be obtained by contacting the beef board.

Jerry Poarch introduced the retiring directors. Wade Wright, the new chamber president, introduced the new directors, and then presented Poarch a past president's plaque.

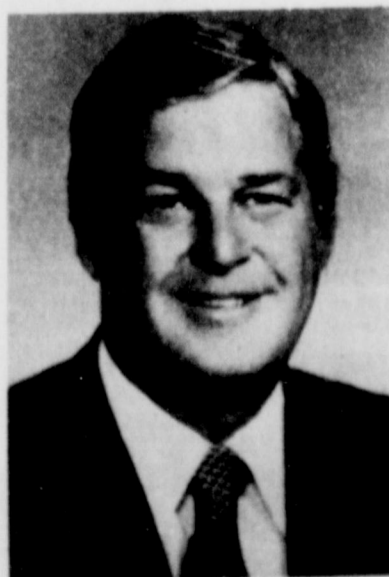

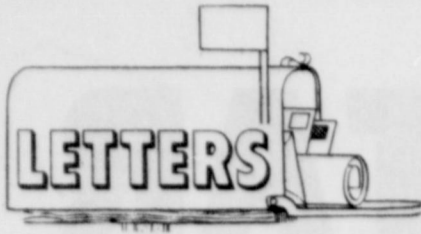

Dear Editor:

At this time of year, schools are looking for coaches for the coming year. It seems that quality coaches are harder to find than in former years. So many have left coaching for better paying jobs in other fields. The really good ones that are left have stayed with it because they are dedicated to their profession and enjoy working with young people. To the others it is just a job. Most of our coaches and teachers in the Friona school system are really fine, dedicated men and women and we should remember to show them our appreciation.

Teachers have a great influence on children and teenagers, but coaches are even more in a position to really do a lot to mold their character. A good athletic program can teach good sportsmanship, self restraint, and the ability to work with others. The ability to take the wins and the losses in a ball season will help them later to take the ups and downs in life. To have the tenacity to come back after a defeat and build and hope for the next victory will, later in life, help them when the going gets rough to have what it takes to bounce back and work for future goals. I had rather

my children learned these important lessons in life than to ever win a state championship.

On the other hand, a wrong selection in a coach can teach bad character. If they curse the referees; if they lose their cool and show a display of anger and bad language in working with their students, they teach them to act likewise if things do not go to suit them. Later, when they enter the business world, instead of having been taught propriety, they may show that same impatience, crudeness, and a display of anger in dealing with others. If they are repeatedly told they are stupid, they will grow up with a bad self image.

I believe that girls, if they are to achieve as athletes, cannot be pampered and should be expected to work out hard to be in top physical condition. They cannot be expected, however, to achieve merely on command, and abusive language cannot make up for good workouts and skill. In spite of today's women's lib movement, I feel that girls should be treated with some measure of respect and decorum. All athletes need to be occasionally told they are doing a good job by their coach, and not just yelled down at every bad move.

A few years ago, profanity was prohibited from T.V., and now it is

quite common. Have we become so conditioned to it that we will allow our young people to be talked to that way by their coach? A coach cannot justify his behavior by telling his students they have been too sheltered, and need to get used to the way it is out there in the world. Perhaps in other sections of the country this is allowed, but let us keep Friona a community with a Christian majority who are not afraid to speak out against abusive language. Let us try to secure quality personnel for our school system who will show an example of good character.

Quarterly Tax Report Is Given

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said 1979 third quarter gross sales in Texas passed the \$52.5 billion mark.

Bullock said an analysis of gross sales for July, August and September reveals that gross sales climbed nearly \$3 billion more than during the year's second quarter.

The gross sales figures were gathered from 266,746 reporting outlets across the state.

Out-of-state gross sales received from 4,896 reporting outlets for the third quarter show sales of \$4.8 billion.

Bullock also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales tax analysis broken down by the state's Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Parmer County reported gross taxable sales of \$21,664,068 for the period, from 189 sales outlets.

Third quarter sales for Harris County were \$14.1 billion, as recorded by 43,790 outlets, compared to \$13.2 billion reported in the year's second quarter.

Gross sales reported in the state's other major urban areas included:
--Dallas County, \$8.6 billion, up from \$8.4 billion in the second quarter.

--Bexar County, \$2.5 billion, up from \$2.3 billion in the previous quarter.

--Tarrant County, \$3.5 billion, down from \$3.7 billion in the third quarter.

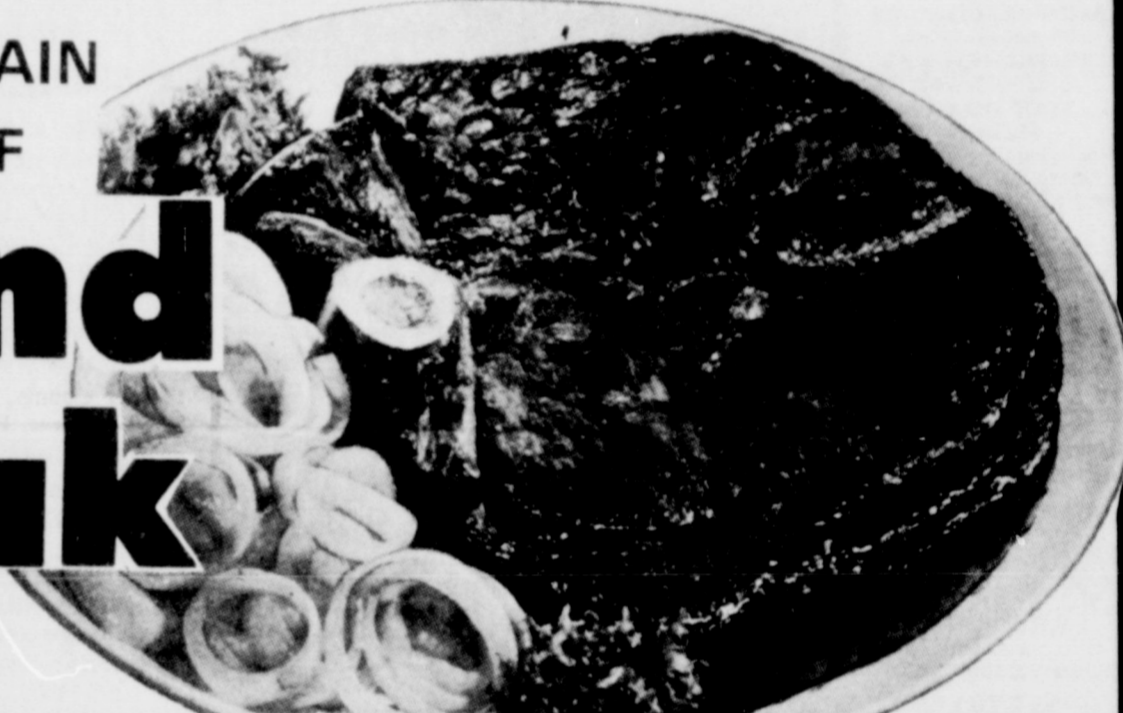

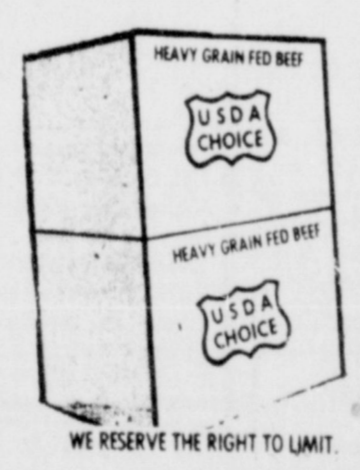

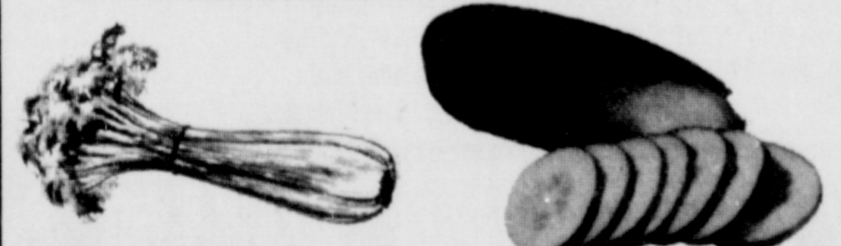

Farmer's stock tanks currently under study

People don't normally expect to find Ph.D.s out digging post-holes and stock tanks.

But that's exactly what Texas A&M University biologist Norman Dronen has done, and it's all part of an unusual study of lifeforms.

Dronen is conducting what is probably the most detailed examination ever of the small aquatic universe most ranchers and farmers in Texas have come to depend on—the stock tank. In time, the information gained may help producers, even shrimp and fish farmers, manage their herds and watering holes more efficiently.

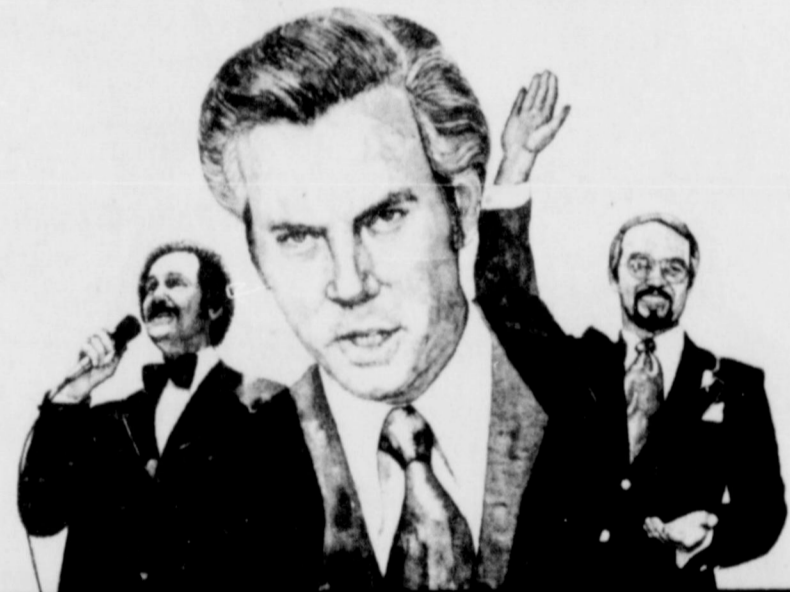

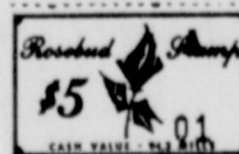

cleared his bench of the starters, and Dimmitt left their first team in to run up a 25-point lead before sending in their second team.

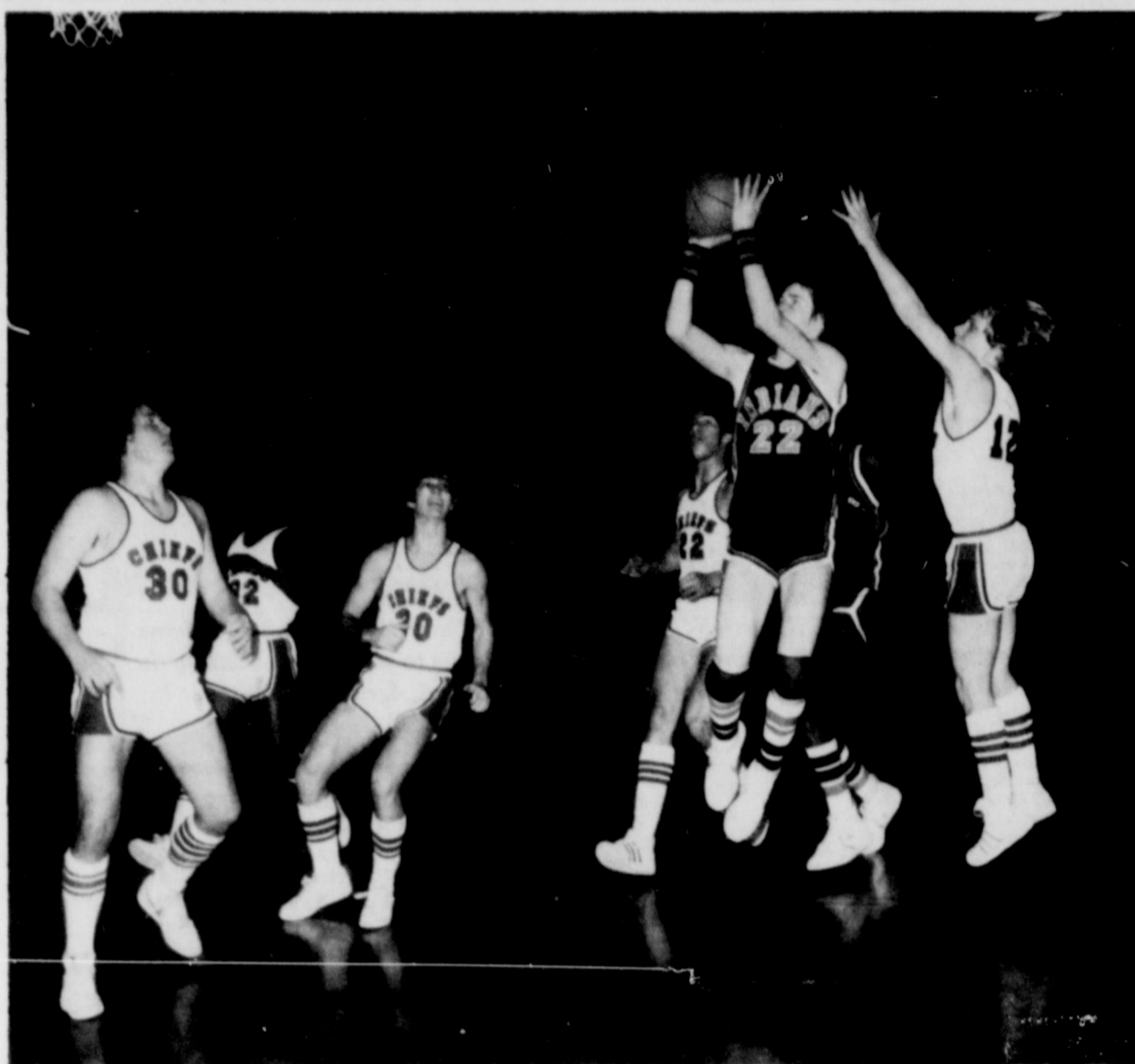

However, no one else was in double figure scoring for Friona.

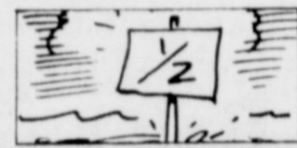

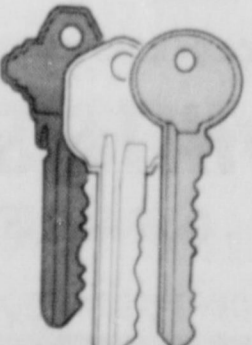

Bill Clayton, state representative, 74th district, has filed for re-election, and Bob Price, state senator, 31st district, likewise has filed.

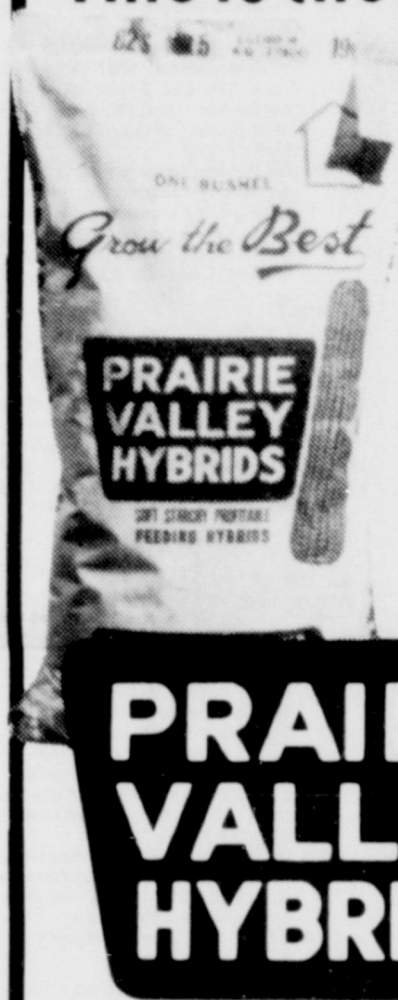
Opposing Price are two candidates in the Democratic primary, Bill Sarpalius and Gerald McCathern.

Albert Smith has filed for the unexpired term of justice of the peace in the Farwell precinct.

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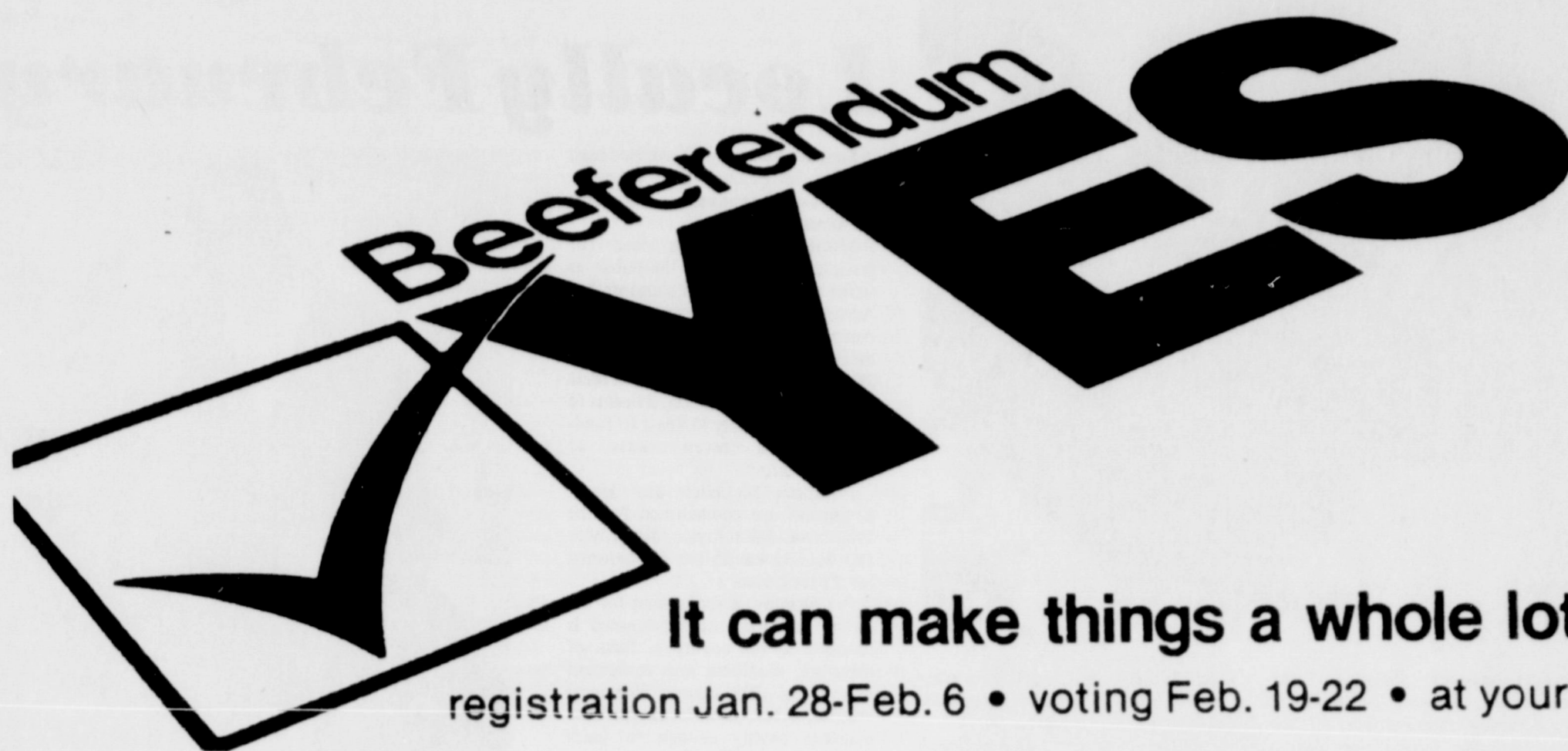

Bovina Area Farmers Sweep Beet Awards

Harold Jones of Bovina was recognized as the top sugarbeet producer for the 1979 crop year during the annual Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association banquet held in Hereford January 19.

The awards presentations came as the high point of the banquet, which drew a crowd of approximately 200.

Grower association secretary James Witherspoon of Hereford announced the top grower awards and presented checks to the three winners.

Jones received a check for \$500 for his first place finish, after producing 33.5 tons of beets per acre with a sugar content of 15.93 percent.

That translated into sugar production of 10,662 pounds per acre.

It was an all Bovina affair so far as the winners were concerned.

Troy Christian of Bovina was awarded \$300 for his second place finish. Christian produced 32.6 tons

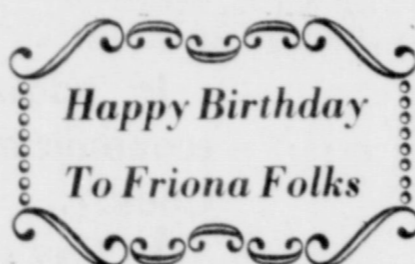
of beets per acre with a sugar content of 15.20 percent for total sugar production of 9,906 pounds per acre.

Melborn Jones of Bovina received the third place check for \$200. He produced 32.43 tons of beets per acre with a sugar content of 13.64 percent for overall sugar production of 8,846 pounds per acre.

The Hereford State Bank, the First National Bank of Hereford and the First National Bank of Canyon donated funds for the cash presentations.

In a surprise awards ceremony, Dr. Steve Winter of the USDA research station at Bushland was honored by the SBGA for his services on the behalf of area beet growers.

Association president Bill Cleavinger of Wildorado cited Dr. Winter's efforts in sugar beet irrigation research as crucial to creating a new school of thought among beet growers who had long felt beets were a water intensive crop.

Heart Sunday Slated Locally February 10

Sunday, February 10 will be Heart Sunday in Friona, and volunteer workers will be canvassing Friona for the annual drive.

Money collected is used for research and educating the public as to the risk of heart attack and stroke. According to a spokesman for the American Heart Assn., 28 cents of every dollar donated goes to research, 23 cents to public education, ten cents to professional education, 21 cents to community service, 11 cents to fund-raising and seven cents to management.

Elizabeth McLellan and Hazel Kothmann are co-chairmen for the 1980 drive. John Taylor, Jim Taylor and Joe Buchanan are co-chairmen for the rural area.

Pat Fleming, a spokesman for the AHA, said that money donated is returned to the county in form of literature, manikens and equipment in teaching CPR classes. The local chapter, AHA now lacks just one manikin having enough to teach basic CPR at all of the high schools in Parmer County.

"Heart attack can happen to anyone, and there is a 50-50 chance that it will at some time," Mrs Fleming said. "Sudden death from heart disease is the most important medical emergency today," she said.

Figures show that 55.8 per cent of the deaths in Parmer County for a specific period were as a result of heart attack, stroke or related diseases.

However, heart attack deaths have seen a noticeable decrease across the state and nation, due somewhat to the publicity given by the AHA.

A community-wide CPR clinic is tentatively scheduled for March in Friona, it was pointed out. Memorials can be made anytime to the Heart Assn., at Friona State Bank.

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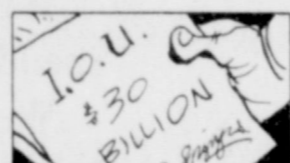

degree in Petroleum Geology. I worked as a geologist in the Permian Basin before moving to Hereford and beginning business as a farmer and rancher.

The people of our district are well aware of the need for a senator who, first of all, is willing to devote 100 per cent of his time to represent them, and secondly, that he should be well versed in all aspects of our districts' economy. I am well pleased with the reception and the support I have received in my travels, consequently today, I officially filed as a candidate.

Concerning his platform, McCathern said, "As a taxpayer and a businessman, I understand that profit is not a 'four letter word.' Our business people must be allowed to make a fair profit in order to generate the jobs needed by our laboring people. In the same sense, our working people must be allowed to receive a fair days' wage for a fair days' labor if they are to be able to carry their fair share of the tax burden and to buy back the goods and services offered by our business community."

"I believe that it is time to start seeking new methods of securing finances to support our educational system. We must maintain the best educational system possible for our youth, and to do so, we must be able

to compete with other states and industries with equal salaries, equal facilities, and the latest teaching aids. However, we can't afford to bankrupt our property owners by continually increasing property taxes to finance our educational system. There are other means of financing available, and I feel we should immediately begin looking for answers to this grave problem, whether it would be some form of sales tax where everyone would share in the burden of responsibility, or perhaps diverting more of the oil and gas royalties received by the state from wells on state-owned property to our primary and secondary educational program."

"I certainly feel that water will be one of the major problems for our district in the 1980's. Ground water is fast depleting, and if we are to keep our municipal needs supplied, our industrial areas growing, and our agricultural industry prospering, we are going to have to start a crash program to build water storage facilities in the form of small surface dams all over our district. We must pursue with greater effort our water importation program, and I am committed to this effort."

"Much can be done on a state level to encourage and expedite alternate energy production facilities, including alcohol, wind, and solar. I am committed to take a leadership

role in seeing that the state of Texas would offer tax incentives, research programs, and less red tape to make these energy sources a reality."

"The most important aspect of my platform will be that I pledge to be an extension of the wishes of the people of our district. In order to stay close to the people and close to the problems, I will incorporate town hall meetings on a regular basis as well as to establish scheduled conference telephone calls with our county and city commissioners during the legislative session to keep them informed about pending legislation and to seek their advice concerning this legislation."

McCathern has worked extensively in his community, district, and state. He is past chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, voted outstanding farmer in Deaf Smith County in 1968 by the Lions Club, served as Vice-President of the Texas State National Farmers Organization, Secretary of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, a Director of the U.S. Feed Grains Council, and past delegate of the American Agriculture Movement.

McCathern is a member of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, the Khiva Shrine, Masons, Farmers Union, American Agriculture Movement of Texas, Texas Corn Growers Association, and Texas Wheat Growers Association. He is a charter member and director of the National Organization of Raw Materials (N.O.R.M.).

He is the author of "From the White House to the Hoosgow," the only book written about the American Agriculture Movement.

McCathern is married to the former Bonnie Traweek of Lubbock. They have three children: Mike, 27; Kathleen, 23; and Kolleen, 14. He and his family are members of the First Baptist Church of Hereford.

Electric Company Asks Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company announced Monday that it needs to increase its retail rates by 14.78 per cent to the customers in Texas served by the electric company.

Information outlining Southwestern's needs is being presented to city officials in this area today. Formal

filing with all regulatory bodies is pending.

Bert Ballengee, executive vice president of SPS, said the increase is needed for three primary reasons: inflation, the high cost of money and the cost of switching from gas to coal.

"Every one of us is affected by inflation including SPS," Ballengee said. "As our costs for making and delivering electricity continue to go up, the price must also go up."

"Every one of us is also affected by high money costs, including SPS. When we borrow money at today's record high interest rates, or sell stock, people are actually letting us use their savings to build new power plants and lines and to build new equipment. If we do not give them a reasonable return on their investment, the people will stop letting us use their money and our ability to deliver electricity to our customers will be limited."

And every one of us is affected by the change in the way we make electricity. We must build coal-fired plants instead of the conventional gas-fired plants because of cost, supply and government regulation. Coal-fired plants cost almost twice as much but the electricity would still cost less than continuing to burn higher priced natural gas," Ballengee said.

The 14.78 per cent increase is an average for all types or classes of customers. The increase will vary from one rate class to another. For example, a customer that uses 500 units of electrical energy per month would have an increase of \$5.43 per month.

also helped provide tax relief for homeowners and agricultural property based on productivity. I have tried to provide an economic climate that will attract new industry and business to Texas so there will be more job opportunities and better wages. Also, during the last session, I was pleased that a majority of the citizens of Texas approved the legislation that I introduced which amended the Constitution and provided for the guarantee of loans for the purchase of farm and ranch land by young people who want to pursue a profession in agriculture."

The Senate passed three Price bills dealing with gasohol development, as well as legislation which would exempt solar and wind-powered devices from ad valorem taxes.

"Regarding water legislation, we were able to ratify the Red River Compact between Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas as well as pass legislation for the creation of an Import Water Authority for our area," Price said. "I will continue to push for methods by which we can import water into the state from outside sources to meet the needs of our area in the future."

Price said he will continue to support legislation providing financial security for the elderly as well as medical care and housing.

"It is also important," he said, "to help the young people have adequate

financing to buy homes."

Price stated that he intends to continue his efforts to support strong law and order, a reduction of taxes, and incentives for all phases of energy production, including gasohol.

"I will strive to continue the reevaluation of education to include bilingual education, vocational training, teacher salaries and other needs to meet the challenge of generations to come," he said.

In the field of agriculture, Price said that he would work to see that the Family Farm Security Act is funded and put into operation as soon as possible.

"I will introduce legislation that will provide a program of producer agricultural sales teams to promote and sell Texas and US farm products overseas," he added. "We can no longer depend on government to sell our agricultural products."

He also intends to work toward gasohol production; removal of the five-cent fuel tax on gasohol; tax breaks for senior citizens on medical care and housing; programs for the handicapped and for alcoholics, battered wives, child-abuse victims and day care centers; tax incentives for businesses; protection of states' rights; lower interest rates for housing, education, agriculture and business loans; and strengthening of public school and vocational education.

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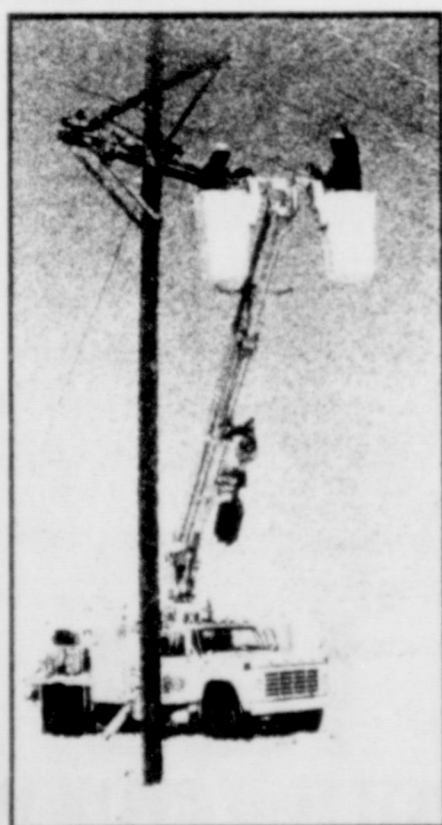

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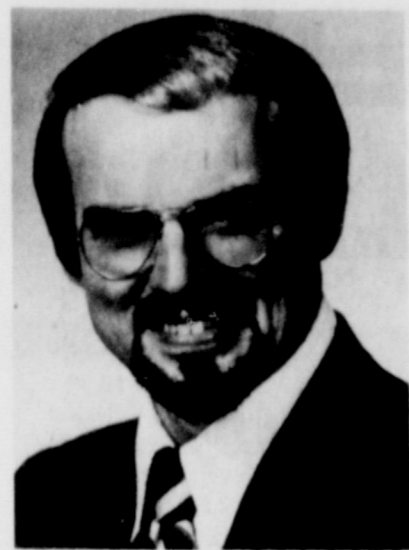
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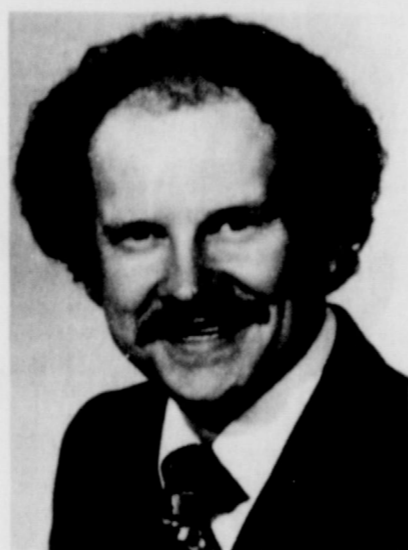
Geese keep down weeds in cotton fields, strawberry and blueberry gardens, nurseries and orchards, but they never touch the crops.
