

Air Pirates Forced Men To Remove Their Pants

MIAMI (AP) — Their 28-hour, 3,800-mile flight of terror ended, passengers aboard a hijacked jetliner have returned from Cuba with bizarre tales of three "deranged" sky pirates.

They also had words of praise for the Southern Airways crew which landed the crippled DC9 on a foam-covered Havana runway.

Another Southern DC9 returned the 27 passengers and four crewmen to Miami and finally to their original destinations Sunday after an attempt by FBI sharpshooters to halt the hijacking failed Saturday night and forced the emergency landing in Cuba.

IN CUSTODY

All three hijackers were taken into custody by Cuban officials at Havana. Passengers

said Cuban authorities also confiscated ransom money demanded and collected by the hijackers from Southern.

"Everyone thought they would be dead in an hour," said passenger Gale Buchanan at a Miami hospital, recalling how FBI agents shot out four of the plane's tires as it prepared for takeoff after a refueling stop at Orlando, Fla.

Buchanan, 35, of Auburn, Ala., who suffered a sprained knee, was one of four persons injured during the hijacking. Copilot Billy Johnson, 37, mayor of College City, Ark., was shot in the shoulder by one of the hijackers.

HAVE SOME MONEY

Buchanan said the hijackers acted in a bizarre manner during the circuitous, three-nation

flight. He said they alternately handed out fistfuls of ransom money, forced male passengers to remove their pants and shot the copilot after threatening to "put a bullet in your head."

The hijackers, reportedly armed with guns and grenades, had demanded a \$10-million ransom for the plane and its passengers. An undisclosed amount of money was given to the sky pirates during a stop in Chattanooga, Tenn., Saturday.

Southern refused to say how much money had been given to them.

There also were several other unanswered points:

- Were the hijackers screened for weapons when they boarded the Southern jet at Birmingham shortly before they commandeered the plane Friday night?
- WHY OH WHY?
- Will Cuba return the ransom money and the hijackers to the United States?
- Why did the FBI order its marksmen to shoot the tires of the hijacked Southern DC9 and endanger the lives of the passengers and crew? An FBI spokesman declined to comment.

Police and family members identified the hijackers as Melvin Charles Cale, 21, of Oak Ridge, Tenn.; his half-brother, Lewis K. Moore, 27, of Detroit, and Henry D. Jackson, 25, also of Detroit.

The FBI here said the U.S. attorney's office in Birmingham, Ala., had been authorized to file air-piracy charges against the three.

Cale was described as an escapee from the Nashville Community Work Release Center.

Jackson and Moore were described as close friends who became embittered after losing a \$4-million lawsuit in which they accused Detroit police of brutality. They were freed on \$300 bond in a rape case last month.

PILOT COURAGEOUS

Buchanan said it was the hijacker called "Henry" who shot Johnson after FBI agents opened fire on the plane's tires in Orlando.

Johnson told newsmen in a Miami hospital that the FBI gunfire "really provoked the hijackers. They told me in front

of everyone to make an example out of me." Buchanan said the copilot ducked as the hijacker fired.

Buchanan said the pilot, Capt. Bill Haas of La Grange, Tenn., was "as courageous a person as I ever met. He instilled confidence."

When an ambulance returned Johnson to the Southern relief plane after hospital treatment in Miami, passengers waiting to be flown to their original destination gave him a standing ovation.

The flight out of Miami Sunday night, which retraced the hijacked plane's original course in reverse, marked the end of a hopsotch journey that started when the twin-engine jet was commandeered over Alabama Friday night.

During its commandeered flight, the plane landed at Jack-

son, Miss.; Cleveland, Ohio; Toronto, Canada; Lexington, Ky.; Chattanooga; Havana; Key West and Orlando, and Havana again for a final landing.

\$10 MILLION

Along the way, the three hijackers demanded \$10 million in ransom, threatened to crash the plane into a nuclear facility at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and asked to talk by radio with President Nixon while the plane circled above the Florida White House at Key Biscayne, Fla.

Nixon's deputy press secretary, Neal Ball, said presidential aides "decided that such a conversation would not be helpful."

After the first landing in Havana on Saturday, the hijackers ordered Haas to take off when Prime Minister Fidel Castro refused to meet personally with them.

URGE WAGE RAISES

For State Workers

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The Legislative Budget Board today recommended 3.4 per cent state employ pay raises for each of the next two fiscal years, plus extra funds for merit increases.

Cost of the raises would be \$56.5 million from the general revenue fund, the only state treasury account over which the legislature has significant control.

Another \$35.4 million would come from other funds.

"For all practical purposes, this is just a cost of living increase?" asked Sen. Tom Creighton, Mineral Wells.

"That's right," answered the board's staff director, Tom Keel. Keel had just explained that the national consumer price index—the measure of inflation—had risen 3.16 per cent from September 1971 to September 1972.

In addition to the across the board increases proposed by the board were funds to give

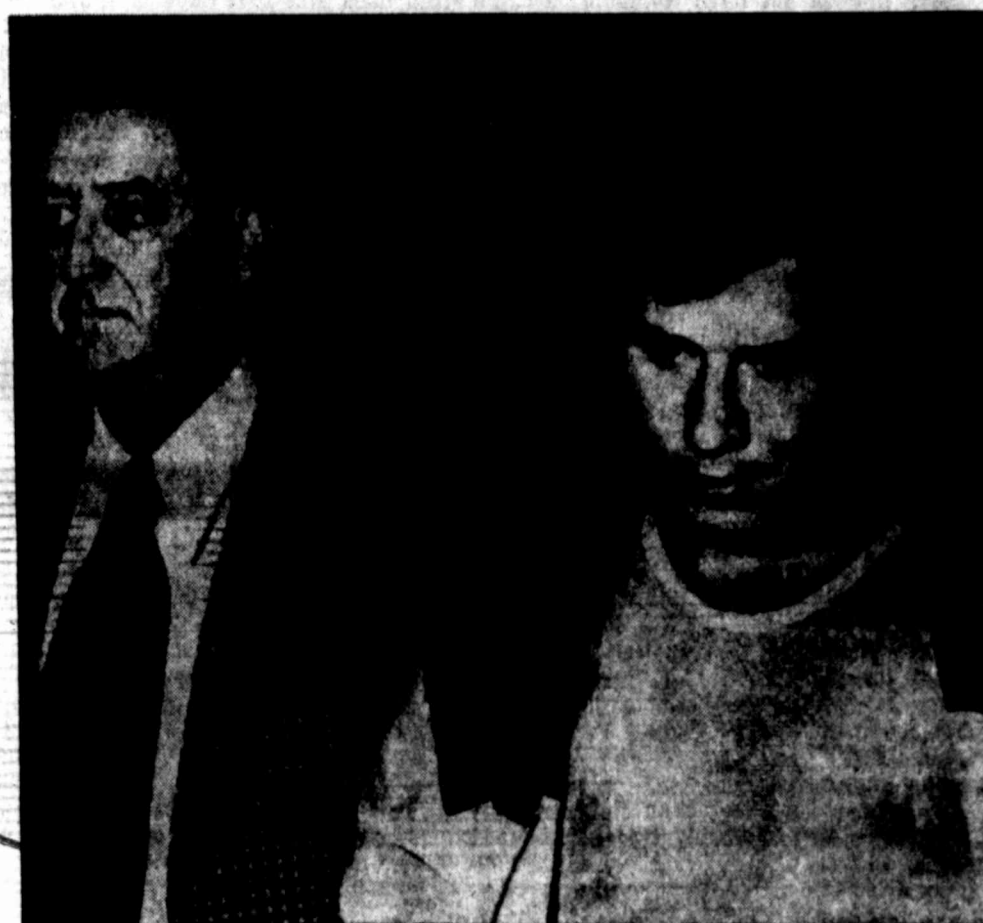
certain employees merit raises of up to 3.4 per cent in the fiscal year starting Sept. 1, 1974. Averaged over all employees—including those who won't get merit increases—the raises would amount to 1.7 per cent.

The pay raises will be included in the state budget that the board will recommend to the legislature, which meets Jan. 9.

The pay recommendations could be changed before the board makes its final budget decision.

The board consists of Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Speaker Raymond Price and eight House members and senators appointed by them. Lt. Gov-elect Bill Hobby attended today's meeting.

While recommending merit increases for rank and file employees, the board voted to eliminate 1.7 per cent merit raises for upper echelon employees—including the governor.

DANNY McCRARY
Arraign
Murder
Suspect

DALLAS (AP) — Danny McCrary, 19, youngest member of an itinerant family arrested in California and suspected of murders across the Southwest since 1971, was expected to be taken to state district court today for appointment of an attorney.

McCrary was returned to Dallas from Santa Barbara, Calif., Saturday for questioning in the robbery and murder of a young Mesquite, Tex., couple.

He was arraigned upon his arrival here for probation violation and for investigation of robbery and murder in connection with the slayings of Forrest Covey, 22, and his wife, Jena, 19, in October, 1971.

The couple disappeared from a Mesquite food store on Oct. 17, 1971. Their bullet-riddled bodies were found in an old barn in Hunt County a week later.

The suspects remained in Dallas County Jail Sunday in lieu of \$50,000 bond in the murder investigation and \$10,000 in the robbery investigation. The alleged parole violation is related to an unspecified felony committed in Dallas.

Officials said the McCrary family has been questioned about at least 11 slayings across the Southwest and may be quizzed in connection with as many as 22 unsolved murders in six states.

McCrary's parents, Sherman McCrary, 47, and his wife Carolyn, 45, reportedly lived at one time in Athens, Tex., in Henderson County. The other family members involved in the case are McCrary's sister, Ginger Taylor, 22, and her husband, Carl Raymond Taylor.

The older men are currently in prison in California. Both have been named in federal warrants for the kidnaping and slaying of a 17-year-old Salt Lake City, Utah, girl in August, 1971.

Mrs. McCrary is being held in Santa Barbara jail on charges of harboring a fugitive, and Mrs. Taylor waived extradition over the weekend to Lakewood, Colo., to face hot check charges.

BSSH Gains
\$50,000 Grant

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism announced its approval today of a \$50,000 federal grant to the Big Spring State Hospital for bilingual counseling for inpatient alcoholics and follow-up services in target cities: Lubbock and San Angelo.

The money was provided by a 1970 federal law, and Texas is the first state to get a grant under that legislation, said Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon.

WILL BE WALKING
FOR MS TONIGHT

More than 400 volunteers will be walking tonight for those who cannot or may not.

Don Worthan, chairman of the 1972 Multiple Sclerosis Chest appeal, urged Big Spring and area residents to welcome the solicitors. This is the only fund-raising appeal of the MS campaign, and is not to be confused with the muscular dystrophy effort, he said.

Tornadoes, Storms Sweep Across Texas, Killing Four

Tornadoes and severe thunderstorms swept across Texas Sunday night and this morning, killing four persons and causing widespread damage to power lines, plate glass windows and trailer homes.

Two persons were killed at Zavalla, near Lufkin in East Texas, when a tornado destroyed their mobile home. Authorities identified the victims as Mr. and Mrs. Cecil B. Jones.

Two more persons drowned when the high winds associated with the frontal system swamped their boats.

RECOVER BODY

Authorities recovered the body of Jerry Ellison, 30, from Lake Brownwood. Ellison drowned when his boat capsized Sunday afternoon. A companion managed to swim to shore.

San Angelo authorities this morning recovered the body of George Hrcir from Three Rivers lake. Hrcir's companion, Claude Johnson, was hospitalized after spending the night in the water supporting Hrcir's body.

Heavy damage and minor injuries were reported when the storm system hit Waco, College Station, the Oak Cliff section of Dallas, Fort Worth and Weatherford.

Harris County authorities confirmed that two twisters flattened guard railings, tore up fences and damaged trailer homes.

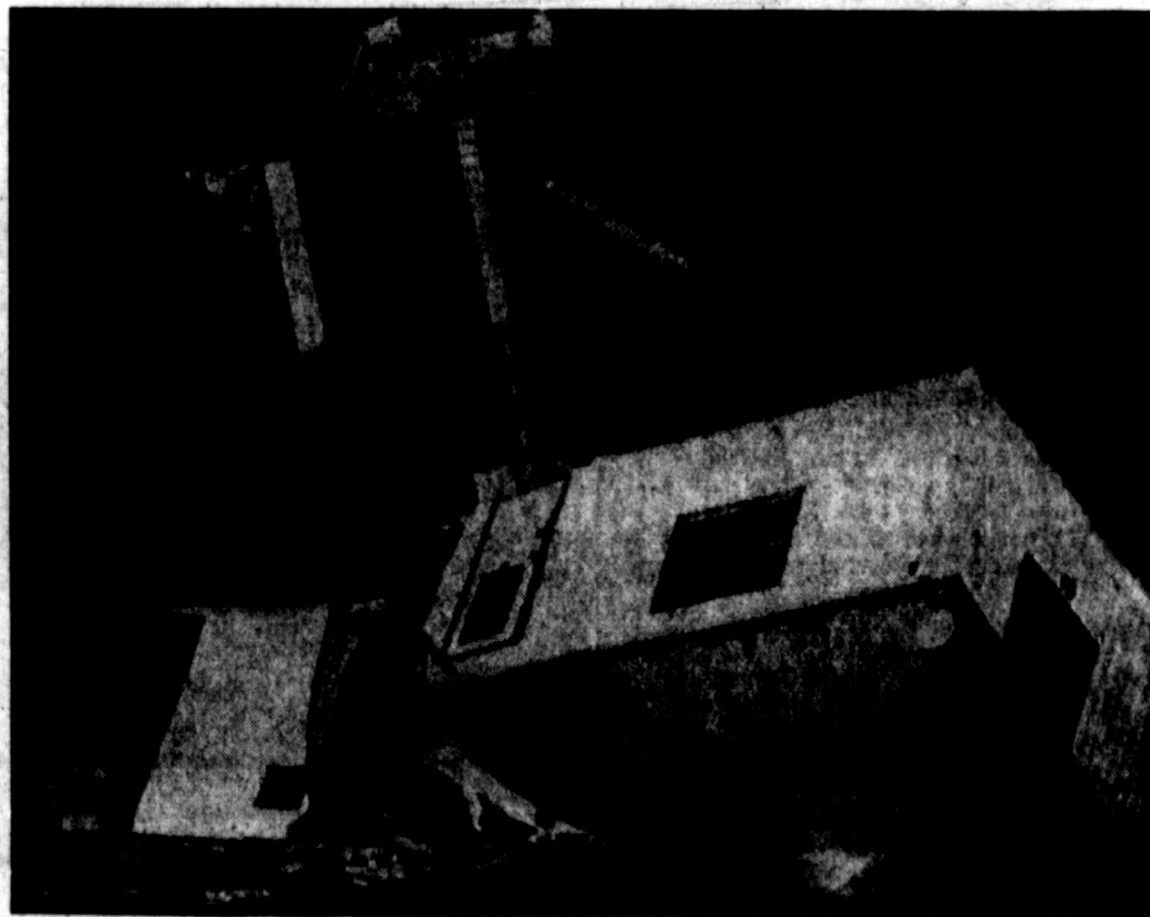
In Port Arthur, a violent thunderstorm caused widespread property damage and snapped powerlines in an area near the downtown section. Authorities reported a two-story house was moved from its foundations by the wind. No injuries were reported.

The winds also damaged a marina and a number of boats at Pleasure Island, near Port Arthur.

The storm that struck the Dallas area was labeled a tornado by the National Weather Service. The twister downed the Astro Drive-in theatre screen and damaged autos and fixtures extensively. In the tornado's wake were high water, downed power lines, smashed plate-glass windows and streets filled with debris.

A twister in south College Station after midnight destroyed eight trailer homes and damaged about 10 others at Oak Forest Trailer Park. Seven persons were treated for minor injuries. Two houses reportedly were unroofed and some damage was also seen at the Texas A&M campus, including a destroyed greenhouse.

In Waco, several house trailers were reported damaged after the tornado was sighted near the R.C. Cola plant. The J. C. Wood home at Spring Valley, near Waco, was unroofed and the garage demolished by the winds.

ELECTION OVER Will Close Bases, Fire Employees

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the election over, the Pentagon is preparing a new round of base-closings and reductions that will eliminate thousands of civilian defense jobs.

The cutbacks probably will not be announced until after Congress returns in January, defense sources said.

NOT NEEDED

The base cuts are being planned in response to President Nixon's orders to trim the rolls of civilian defense employees and Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird's promise to Congress to absorb \$1.5 billion in budget cuts this fiscal year.

Just before the 1972 election year began, David Packard left office as deputy secretary of defense with a parting complaint that the Pentagon could save \$1 billion a year by closing unneeded bases, were it not for political constraints.

The Army, Navy and Air Force long have wanted to shut down a number of bases they consider marginal. But, anticipating election year protests from congressmen and senators with large numbers of defense employees among their constituents, they waited.

"POLITICAL REALITIES"

Now the "political realities," as one Pentagon official termed them, are temporarily over though the list of bases most likely to be closed or cut back is being kept under wraps for the time being.

However, the Army is known to be planning a reorganization that, among other things, likely would merge the First Army headquarters at Ft. Meade, Md., and the Third Army headquarters in Atlanta, eliminating one of them. The Army also is expected to recommend retrenching helicopter training-and-maintenance bases now that American forces are virtually out of Vietnam.

Some sources indicate that possibly two naval shipyards, one on each coast, might be shut down. They were not named either.

NINE SHIPYARDS

The Navy has a total of nine shipyards on both coasts. On the Eastern Seaboard are yards at Boston, Portsmouth, N. H., Philadelphia, Norfolk, Va., and Charleston, S. C.

West Coast facilities are located at Bremerton, Wash., San Francisco, Long Beach, Calif., and at Mare Island, Vallejo, Calif.

Nixon gave a fresh indication of things to come last week when he said in a published interview that civilian defense employees "are getting in the way of each other over in the Pentagon and around the country" and that "they are going to have to take a thinning down."

There are reports that a 5 per cent slice in civilian employment may be applied throughout the government under Nixon's new policy, designed to reduce spending.

1.1 MILLION ON PAYROLL

There now are fewer than 1.1 million civilian workers on the payroll of the Defense Department and its agencies, compared with a payroll swollen to more than 1.3 million in 1969 before the beginning of the Vietnam withdrawal and corresponding reductions in the size of the military establishment.

A 5 per cent cutback in the present civil service force in the Defense Department would amount to about 55,000 people. Officials hope that much of this can be accomplished through normal attrition, — retirements, resignations and deaths.

STEP TOWARD NEW INDUSTRY

The Chamber of Commerce appealed again today for those who had received labor survey forms to return them as soon as possible. Several thousand more returns are needed in order to reflect a labor pool sufficient to assure the location of a garment-making plant here. Other details for the plant have been completed satisfactorily, and the decision to locate here depends on showing a pool of people wanting work now or, who may want work in the future.

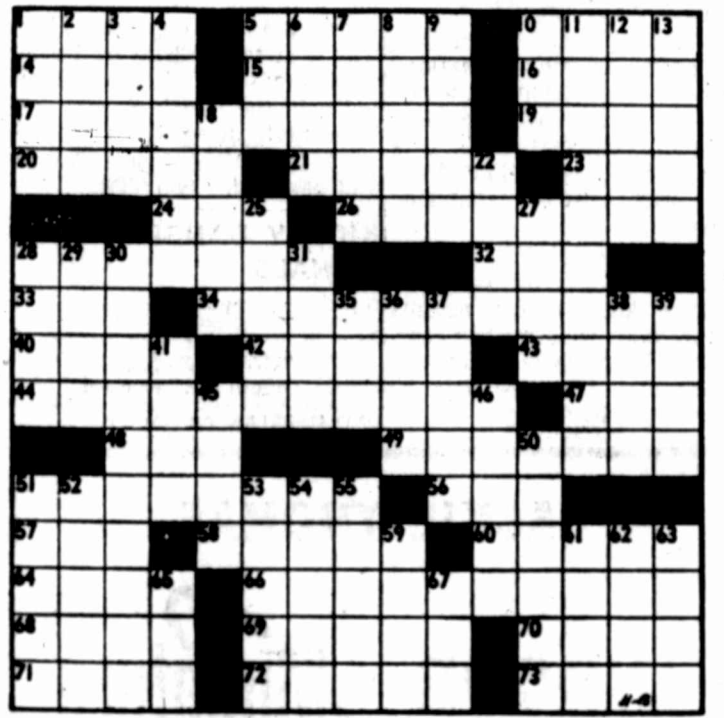

Allergic To Water



Your Good Health
 Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: For 15 years my husband has not been able to take a bath without stinging as if he had a terrible rash. Only there is no rash on his body.

This stinging lasts for about 45 minutes every time his body gets moist, even from perspiration or any contact with water. It is worse from his neck down to his waist. — Mrs. M.B.T.

This is a strange and rather uncommon condition probably caused by a sort of allergic reaction of body cells to water. It appears to result from the release of certain substances from the cells, either histamine or what is called serotonin, which bring on the stinging or itching sensation. Often there is a rash associated with it.

If the released substance is histamine, then treatment with an antihistamine can be effective. Antihistamines, though according to some studies, will not have an effect if the released substance is serotonin. However, other drugs (Periacin is one) can be effective.

The drugs are usually prescribed to be taken about an hour before a bath. The drugs should not be attempted without consultation with a physician.

Sometimes such conditions respond to simpler treatments. For example, brief exposures to water a few minutes at a time every 15 or 20 minutes may create a tolerance so that the individual can take a bath in relative comfort.

I would normally suspect some substance, say his particular bath soap or maybe a deodorant, as a possible cause of his reaction. But, since you say this has been going on for 15 years, I suspect you have tried your own detective work along these lines.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Everyone seems to have a different idea about the caffeine content of coffee, tea and cola drinks. Also what about the decaffeinated coffees which claim to be 97 per cent caffeine free? Is this really a significant reduction? — R.E.

A six-ounce cup of coffee runs about 18 milligrams of caffeine per ounce, or a bit over 100 milligrams per cup. (One milligram is 1/1000 of an ounce.)

Tea, depending on how strongly it is brewed, runs 12 to 15 mg. per ounce, or somewhat below coffee. And cola drinks run 3 to 4 mg. per ounce.

Decaffeinated coffee does just what it claims to do — 2 to 4 mg. per cup, which is about 3 per cent of the caffeine in

a regular cup of coffee.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have been told that bubble bath causes kidney infection and mostly in girls. Is this true? — H.F.

True only to the extent that it may (not necessarily will) cause irritation in the external genital area. That's not the same as a kidney infection, for which other causes are more likely.

Black Voters Veer To GOP.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The usually solid Democratic black voting bloc crumbled slightly in Tuesday's elections, a sample survey shows.

George McGovern, the Democratic presidential candidate, received 87 per cent of the vote in black precincts and wards in 22 major cities, the Joint Center for Political Studies said.

President Nixon, who swept 49 states in his landslide victory, received 13 per cent of the black vote, up 3 per cent from 1968. Four years ago, Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey won 90 per cent of the black vote.

The Center's survey was based on unofficial returns in heavily black election districts. The Center is a private, non-partisan organization which provides research, education and technical assistance to black and other minority group elected officials and others representing minority group interests.

Secrecy Suit Lost By IRS

SEATTLE (AP) — The federal government says it has given up its efforts to preserve the classified status of manuals and handbooks used by the Internal Revenue Service in auditing income tax returns.

U.S. Atty. Stan Pittkin said he would not appeal a ruling by U.S. District Court Judge William Beeks opening the manuals and handbooks for inspection by Susan and Philip Long of Bellevue, Wash.

A freedom of information suit seeking access to the classified material was filed by the Longs after the IRS called for an audit of Long's corporate and personal income tax returns for 1966 through 1968.

In his ruling in the case handed down earlier this year, Beeks declared "There is the propensity of governmental agencies to shield their activities and procedures from public scrutiny..."

The IRS still has a claim pending against Long. It says Long owes \$42,000—an amount the real estate developer chalked up to business expenses—including a subscription to the Wall Street Journal.

In games next week, West Texas State and Memphis State, with 3-1 records, and Louisville, 2-1, will have a chance to share the title with Drake.
Drake didn't have any trouble Saturday with Northeast Louisiana. Junior Jerry Heston scored two touchdowns for the 35-7 victory.
J. E. Willis led the defense with two intercepted passes, a blocked punt and recovered fumble. Vic Francious chimed in for 10 tackles and Ken Ferguson intercepted two passes.

Dempsey's Toe Beats Oilers, 18-17

HOUSTON (AP) — The Philadelphia Eagles haven't scored a touchdown in 14 quarters but the way Tom Dempsey is getting his kicks, who needs touchdowns.
Dempsey booted six field goals, one shy of the National Football League record, Sunday to provide all the scoring in the Eagles' 18-17 victory over the Houston Oilers. Dempsey's two field goals last week gave Philadelphia a 6-6 tie with St. Louis.
The victory gave the Eagles a 2-6-1 record and thus put them behind the Oilers, now 1-8, in the battle for the No. 1 draft choice.
Dempsey missed a 22-yard field goal in the third quarter that would have tied the NFL record for most field goals in one game.
Despite scoring all the points that provided his team with a victory, Dempsey still doesn't rate his six fielders over the 63-yarder he kicked in 1970 to set the NFL record.
"It's a thrill to win a game with six field goals, but it's still harder," said the paunchy 250-pound Dempsey, an all-conference defense end in his junior college days.
On the missed kick, Dempsey said "I just came across the ball and didn't hit it squarely."
The Eagles got the ball six times in the first half and Dempsey kicked field goals to cap five of the drives. His first four boots were for 33, 52, 22, and 12. Then with five seconds left in the half, he kicked a 38-yarder for a 15-3 lead at intermission.
Houston's Skip Butler, who missed a 43-yard attempted field goal with 16 seconds left in the game, booted a 38-yarder for Houston's only points in the first half.
Houston's rushing attack, the worst in the NFL, exploded for 236 yards for the game and ground out two touchdown drives in the second half. Dan Pastorini ran one yard for a touchdown and Paul Robinson zipped 30 yards for the other.
But an improved running game once gain was overcome by Oiler mistakes and poor ball handling by the receivers. Pastorini completed 15 of 25 passes

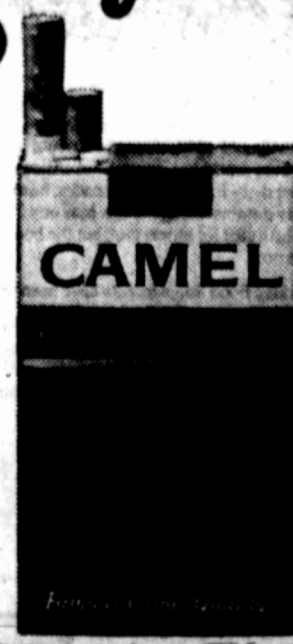

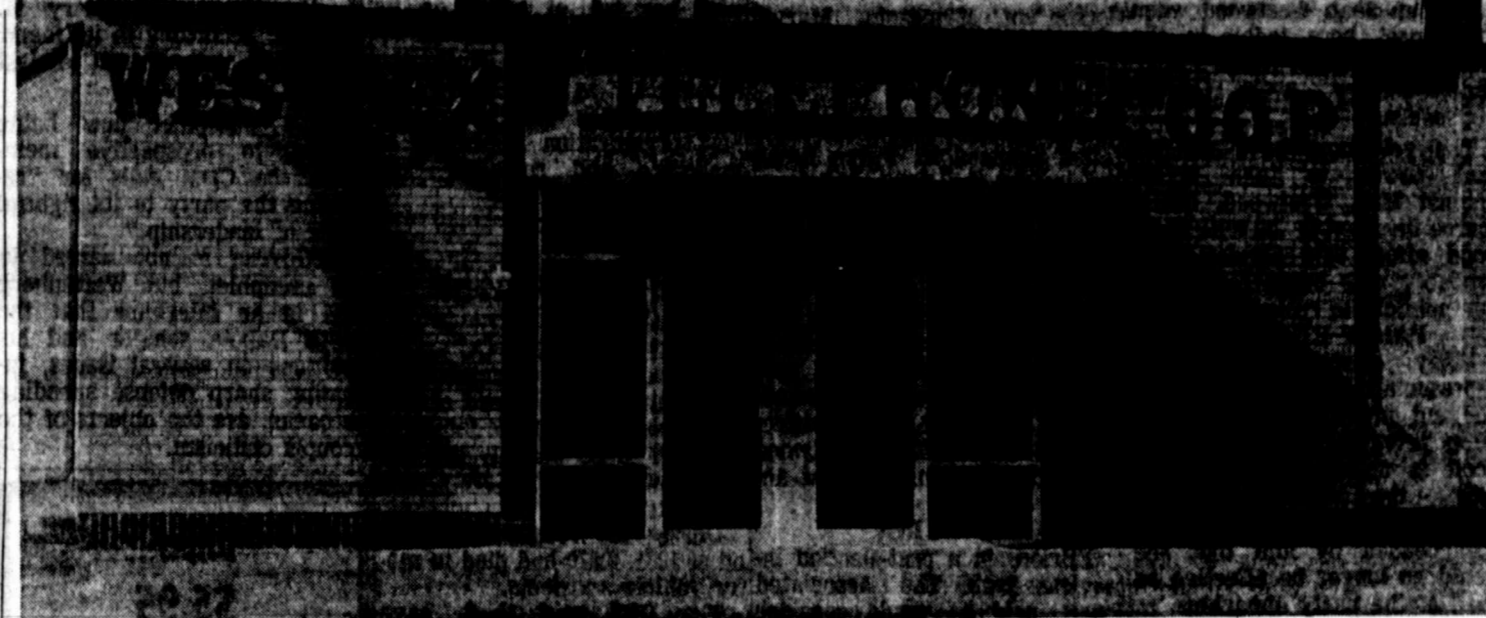

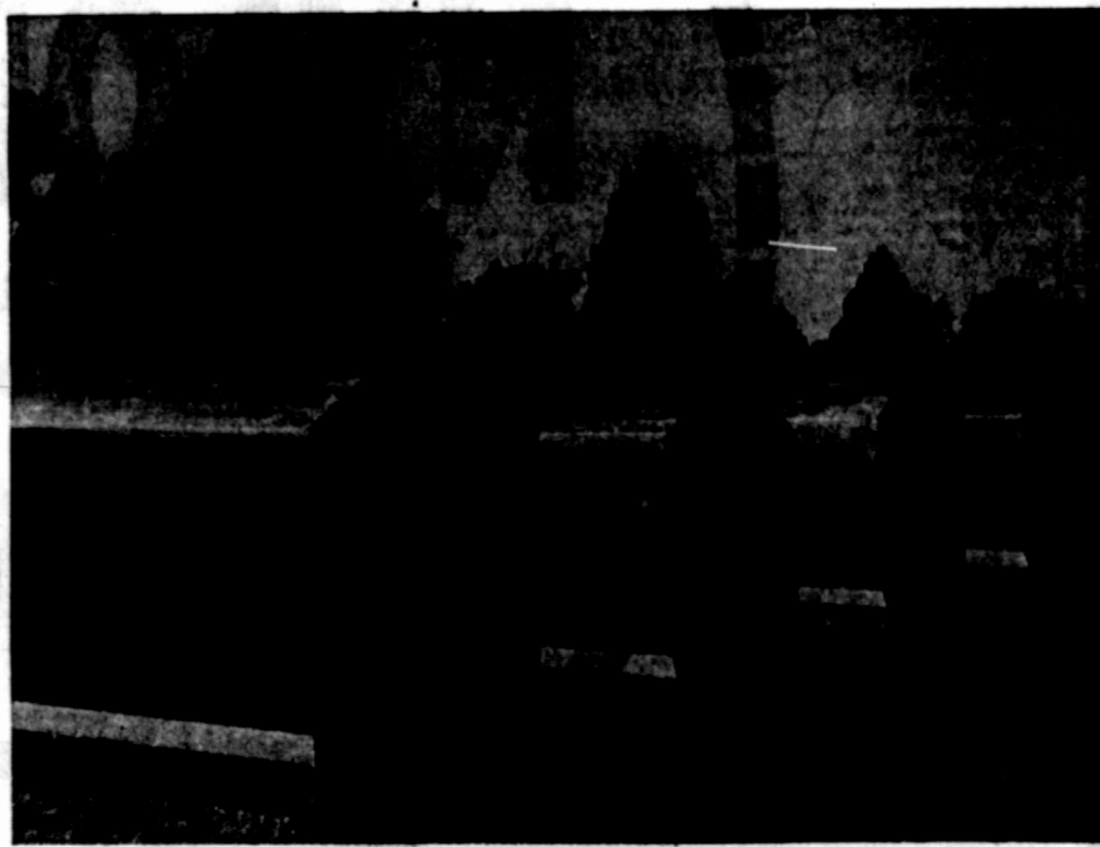

Bridge Test

BY CHARLES H. GOREN
BRIDGE QUIZ ANSWERS

Q. 1—With both sides vulnerable, your right hand opponent opens with one diamond and you hold:

♠A10 5 3 2 ♥6 3 2 ♦7 ♣AK 2

What action do you take?
A.—One spade. While this hand is slightly better than a normal opening bid, we nevertheless prefer a simple overcall to the takeout double. It is our belief on this hand that, unless partner is able to take voluntary action, there will be no game.

Q. 2—Both vulnerable, and as South you hold:

♠Q 5 2 ♥A 9 8 6 2 ♦KQ10 ♣J 6

The bidding has proceeded: North East South West

1 ♠ Pass 1 ♥ Pass 2 ♣ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—Three no trump. A mere bid of two no trump by you at this point would be regarded as a bid made under some pressure. The jump is therefore recommended to describe that you have an above average hand.

Q. 3—You are South, vulnerable, and hold:

♠KJ 5 ♥AKJ 9 3 ♦K10 6 ♣K 4

The bidding has proceeded: East South West North

1 ♠ Dble. Pass 2 NT Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—It is quite clear that East has thrown a red herring across your trail. Your partner's hand is equal to a very good opening bid. Remember that he could have shown a strong hand by jumping to two no trump. His jump to three, therefore, shows a hand of great value. We would be inclined to take our chances on a direct slam bid, but surely we would bid at least five no trump.

Q. 4—Both vulnerable, and as South you hold:

♠A10 5 ♥QJ 6 ♦J 7 3 ♣QJ 9 5

The bidding has proceeded: West North East South

1 ♠ Dble. 1 NT ?

What do you bid?
A.—Double, by proceeding along the lines of simple arithmetic we reach the conclusion that East will be unable to fulfill a contract of one no trump. Your hand contains 11 points in high cards, and partner's hand is presumably worth at least 13. Your side, therefore, has at least 24 points to 16 for the adversaries.

Q. 5—As South, vulnerable, you hold:

♠AK 9 3 ♥AQ 6 4 2 ♣A10 6 2

The bidding has proceeded: South West North East

1 ♠ Pass 1 NT Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—Two spades. This is a close choice between a jump shift to three clubs and the reverse bid of two spades with our preference leaning toward the latter call. Although partner's no trump response over a diamond would make it appear likely that he fits one of the minors, he could conceivably have some four card spade holding not worth showing. We can always bid clubs subsequently should it prove expedient.

Q. 6—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

♠8 4 ♥K 9 6 3 ♦KQJ 9 ♣K 6 5

The bidding has proceeded: North East South West

1 ♠ Pass ?

What do you bid?
A.—Double. Your hand figures to produce about five tricks and your trumps are good enough to draw some of East's. If you miss a game by the double, the compensation should prove more than adequate.

Q. 7—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

♠J10 5 ♥AQ10 ♦K10 6 2 ♣Q10 4

The bidding has proceeded: North East South West

Pass Pass 1 ♠ Pass 2 ♣ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—Two no trump. Even the partner has passed originally, his jump shift is forcing for one round. With the jack of spades promoted in your hand is the equivalent of a sound opening bid. However, three no trump appears to be the most promising contract, as you want your hand led to.

Q. 8—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

♠J10 6 ♥8 7 2 ♦J10 9 2 2 ♣K 9

The bidding has proceeded: North East South West

1 ♠ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—One no trump. This hand does not quite measure up to the requirements but it does have a partial spade fit plus two tens. An effort should be extended to keep the bidding open and the alternative of an immediate spade raise would be too drastic.

Governors May Hatch Plans For Ousting Demo Chairman

WASHINGTON (AP) — Five in his capacity as chairman of Democratic governors may hatch strategy for ousting party chairman Jean Westwood when they meet here today in the wake of President Nixon's landslide victory over George McGovern.

The governors have no formal power to take action against Mrs. Westwood, but a source involved in the anti-Westwood effort said Sunday they probably will begin pressuring her publicly to resign.

Many party officeholders, representatives of organized labor and others have said, mostly in private, that Mrs. Westwood is so closely associated with the badly beaten McGovern and party reforms spearheaded by him that she would no longer be effective as head of the party apparatus.

Expected at today's meeting were Gov. Dale Bumpers of Arkansas, who called the meeting

tempt to dump Mrs. Westwood. The 303-member committee, which meets here Dec. 9, can vote her out of office on its own, however.

On another front, McGovern enthusiasts in the party are coming under attack from a new organization appealing to moderate and so-called "old line" Democrats.

Traffic Deaths

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Traffic deaths in Texas continue to run slightly ahead of last year's pace, with 2,994 fatalities reported since Jan. 1, the Department of Public Safety said Saturday.

During the comparable period of 1971, 2,970 had died in motor vehicle accidents. The DPS said these have been 2,513 fatal accidents this year, up 3 per cent from a year ago.

Folks Migrating Back To The Farms

HOUSTON (AP) — Gov. Elect Dolph Briscoe will address the 39th annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau at its first general session today.

Some 1,500 delegates representing the 130,000-member organization are holding a four-day convention here which ends Wednesday.

Sunday the president of the organization, J. T. Woodson, said 1972 is a good year both for the Farm Bureau and farmers.

The election of Briscoe, himself a farmer and rancher, should help state farmers, Woodson said.

The bureau itself registered its largest membership gain in 17 years in 1972 with 172 of the 207 organized county Farm Bureaus showing increases.

Woodson said much of the increase came about because more persons are moving back to the land in Texas.

"There's no doubt about it," he said. "People are migrating back to the farms. The opportunities are like they have never been before."

"There's more farming area

here," Woodson explained about the growth of Texas farming. "The lending agencies are better, the ways and means are here to make farming successful and the facilities for marketing area available."

Many small farming communities are being developed to the point where both big city living and the outdoors can be enjoyed, he said.

Much of the growth in farming is coming from young persons and from older couples who wish to retire to a small farm, Woodson said.

"Let's look at Madisonville, for example. The population up there has increased 30 per cent, and most of those are new farmers."

Charge Scout Executive With Assaulting Officer

WEEHAWKEN, N.J. (AP) — The second highest officer in the national Boy Scout organization is free today on \$10,000 bail after being charged with assault with intent to kill following an altercation in the Lincoln Tunnel.

According to Port Authority police, George C. Freeman, 65, of Alexandria, Va., became embroiled in an argument Sunday evening with an off-duty New York City patrolman, John Reig, after the cars driven by the two men collided on the tunnel here. The tunnel links midtown Manhattan with New Jersey.

Freeman drove into the tunnel after the collision but was overtaken by Reig, who ran after him. Traffic was so heavy that Reig was able to catch up to Freeman's car on foot, authorities noted.

After overtaking Freeman, Reig climbed onto the hood of Freeman's car and fired one shot through the windshield, striking Freeman on the wrist, police said. Freeman was treated for the gunshot wound at North Hudson Hospital and released.

After the shooting, the two men were separated by Port Authority police. Freeman was charged with assault with intent to kill because he allegedly tried to run down Reig. Freeman in turn had Reig charged with assault, police said.

Lock Boa In Jail

LIGHTHOUSE POINT, Fla. — (AP) — Police didn't know what to do with a 7-foot boa constrictor they caught wriggling across a highway here so they locked it in a cell at the city jail.

Lt. D. S. Pigman said the snake spent most of its time in the cell wrapped around pipes underneath the sink.

After several hours, Pigman said an animal cage was found and the boa constrictor was moved to other quarters.

Texas Politics Has Unique World Rating

"One of the few definite, indisputable facts about Texas politics is that there is nothing like it anywhere else in the world," said Mrs. Margaret White, Friday for Modern Woman's Forum.

Mrs. White was quoting the book "Money, Marbles and Chalk," written by Jimmy Banks, a political columnist known to Texans for his articles in the "Texas Star." Various Texas politicians were the subjects of a panel discussion at the home of Mrs. T. G. Adams, 507 Johnson. Panel members, in addition to Mrs. White, were Mrs. Harwood Keith, Mrs. S. R. Nobles and Mrs. W. A. Laswell.

"Politics is a profession; a serious, complicated, and, in its true sense, a noble one," said Mrs. White, quoting the late President Dwight Eisenhower.

"In Banks' book he takes readers behind the scenes of Texas politics for visits with famous Texas officeholders, and gives a candid look at outstanding political figures. His years as a political columnist make it possible for him to express his opinions frankly and sometimes bluntly."

The personal, educational and political background of former President Lyndon Johnson were outlined by Mrs. Keith, who said he was criticized by Democrats and Republicans alike about problems which he could not cope with.

"He (Johnson) will leave footprints on the sands of time," said Mrs. Keith, "and his name will go down in history as one of the greatest presidents of all times."

Allan Shivers still looks back on his decision in 1952 to support Dwight Eisenhower for president, as one of the hardest he ever called on to make," said Mrs. Nobles. "Once the decision was made, he campaigned diligently to support the Republican candidate, but when Shivers won his third term as Governor of Texas, he made every effort to get the Democratic party back on the track." Mrs. Nobles said Shivers supported Eisenhower because he felt the best man should always win. He favored the two-party system for Texas, but refused to switch to the Republican party. She said he further believed a candidate should have his own issues and

stand up for them.

"John Tower is a man of strong Christian background," said Mrs. Laswell, "and his good credentials have carried him fast and far. At 35, he was the youngest member of the Senate. His early political ventures were an uphill, but his recent re-election as senator must prove that the people of Texas feel he is serving them well."

Mrs. White concluded the program by reviewing a chapter of the book entitled "Birth of

a Campaign," which describes when and how, in 1969 during a fishing trip on his ranch in Uvalde, Dolph Briscoe made the decision to start mapping his campaign for Governor in 1972.

Skillet Care Will Prevent Rusting

Iron skillets should be left to air dry after washing. It is moisture that causes rust, whether the skillet is seasoned or not. After washing and towel drying an iron skillet, be sure it is completely dry by putting it on the range over the pilot light, or, with an electric range, on very low heat for a few minutes. This procedure "cooks" all moisture out, helping to prevent rust.

Should rust appear, scrub away the blemishes with soap or detergent and a scouring pad or brush. An iron skillet should be seasoned at least every six months, more often if in frequent use. To do this, first wash carefully, rinse and dry. Then liberally coat the inside with vegetable oil or shortening and heat so that the oil permeates the porous surface.
