THE ECONOMY seems to be off to a shaky start for the 1980s. Interest by investors in gold, silver and other precious metals has caused the market on these commodities to change almost every day, with most of the changes being in an upward trend.

Gold, which could be bought for around \$132 an ounce three years ago, has pushed to over \$700 per ounce. Silver, in the meantime, has gone from around \$4.40 in January of 1977, and no more than \$7 an ounce a year ago, has risen some 450 per cent in the past year, to around \$35 an ounce at the present.

The rush has been on both sides of the counter. People are cashing in such items as old class rings, dental fillings, old family heirlooms, etc., in an effort to get some cash while the prices are high.

Some collectors are turning in their silver coins, now worth many times their value. Others, convinced that the prices will continue to spiral, are buying such coins and bars, virtually as fast as the others are selling.

Some stories have been quoted about big and quick profits being made since the market spiral began. A San Francisco resident with \$5,000 in idle cash was said to have bought a gold futures contract in August now worth around \$50,000.

A young Georgia man reportedly noticed a set of sterling silver pitchers and trays in a department store which had not been marked up. He bought the set, and resold it to a silver dealer for an instant profit of \$7,000.

While there are some big winners on the investment side when the market rises like it has been, there are also some losers, and in this case it appears that the American consumer will be the "stuckee," as usual.

The price of film of all kinds is expected to skyrocket. Eastman Kodak has announced that it will raise film prices as much as 75 per cent. If you like to take pictures, you're going to have to really like them when the prices level off.

Unfortunately for us, we use a considerable amount of Kodak products in producing our newspaper, as our news and advertising is now set on paper

## Political Pot Begins To Boil In Area

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake said today that he will seek re-election to the District 74 seat he now holds in the Texas House of Representatives.

The district includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Oldham and Parmer counties.

In making the announcement, Clayton said it has been a distinct honor to serve the people of this district the past several years.

As a member of the House of Representatives, Clayton has established a historical first by serving three consecutive terms as Speaker of the House.

"Serving as state representative for District 74 and as Speaker of the House of Representatives, I have worked double duty at addressing the needs of the citizens of this area in their dealings with government.

"I have attempted to maintain a direct line of communication with all the people of our seven counties and as a result a great many of the problems we have faced have been resolved.

"We have been successful in dealing with short-term problems of energy for agriculture, in helping with improvement of our roads and highways, with providing tax relief for both homeowners and farmers and ranchers, and providing an economic climate that is conducive to bringing new business and industry to Texas."

"In the upcoming session of the Legislature it is imperative that through redistricting we see that the strong voice of our area is not diminished in Congress, the State Senate and the House of Representatives," Clayton said.

Clayton added that he intended to continue every effort possible to keep him in daily contact with all areas of the district.

Roberts was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill the vacancy on the retirement of Judge Paul Fortenberry at the end of December.

Born in Oklahoma, Roberts attended grade school at Maud, Oklahoma; and graduated from high school at Ada, Oklahoma. After approximately three years in the Army, serving as a Combat medic in Germany, he attended East Central State College at Ada, Oklahoma for three years, majoring in Business Administration.

Since coming to Texas in 1949, Roberts has worked for Southwestern

## Phillips Resigns; Hubbart Is Hired

Lonnie Phillips, head football coach and athletic director at Friona High School for the past four years, resigned his position this week to enter private business.

Phillips, who says he plans to stay in Friona, will announce his plans in the near future.

Phillips submitted his resignation at the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees Monday night.

At a special meeting of the school board on Wednesday, former assistant coach Clayton (Pete) Hubbart was elevated to the position of head football coach and athletic director.

Phillips' 1977 team tied for the District 3-AA title with Muleshoe and Littlefield, but then lost the three-way coin flip for playoff rights to Littlefield. The Chieftains were the only team to beat Muleshoe in 1977 as the Mules were 9-1.

"It would be much sadder for me to make this move if Coach Hubbart had not been willing to take the job. I feel the transaction will be real smooth. Pete will give everything he has got to make the program successful," Phillips said.

This is Hubbart's second year in Friona. Prior to coming here, he spent three years at Canadian, four at Vega and one at Silverton, all as an

assistant although serving as head boys basketball coach at Canadian and head girls basketball coach at Silverton.

Hubbart has a bachelor of science degree in Physical Education and English, and a master of science in secondary education, both from West Texas State University. He is a graduate of Amarillo High School.

Hubbart's wife Linda is secretary of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. The couple are parents of three sons. Two, Tim and Russ, are married. Their third son, Mike, is a junior at FHS.

"I have worked closely with Coach Phillips, and have all the respect in the world for him. He has developed a good program here, and we will just try to improve on what he has built," Hubbart said.

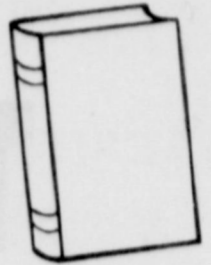

"The Hour Before Midnight" by Velda Johnston is available at Friona Public Library.

Mrs. Johnston's skill in bringing a chapter of English history into today's world will be appreciated by anyone interested in good, clean, romantic reading. I intend enjoying some of her other work.

"Night Shift" by Stephen King is also available for local readers.

Mr. King reminds me of Edgar Allan Poe in that his stories are really "far out." He is a good story teller whose work will appeal to young adults.

I guess there is a moral to be found in most of them but you have to look carefully to find the grain among the chaff.

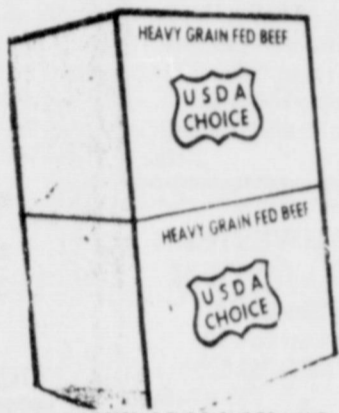

I've learned a lesson some never do, and one I'll not likely forget.

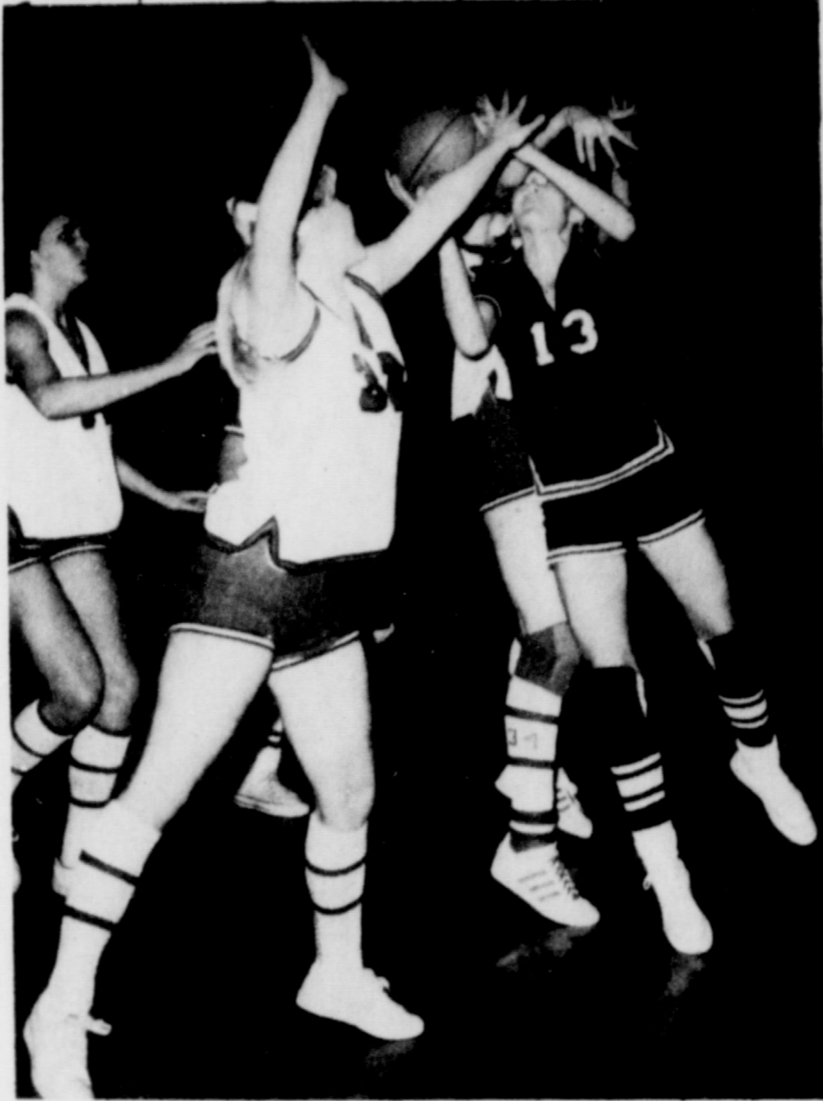

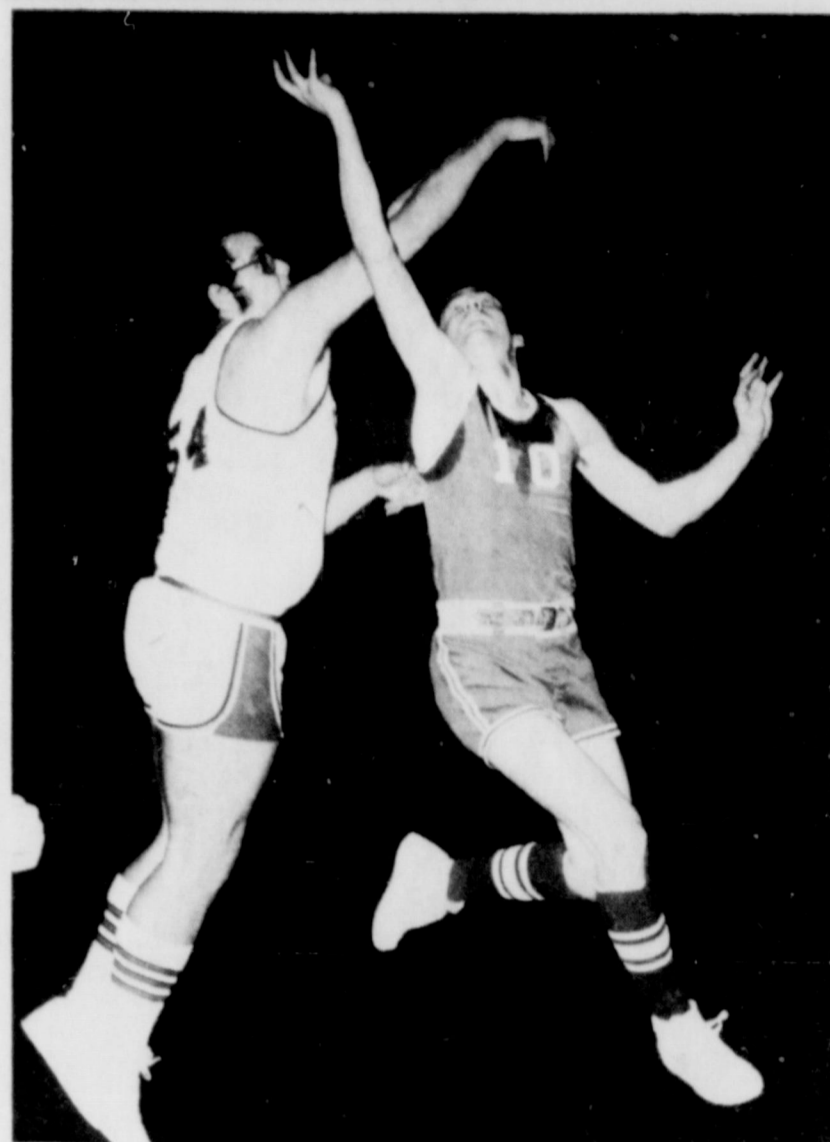
The Friona eighth grade Maidens traveled to Morton January 3 and returned with a 31-27 victory.

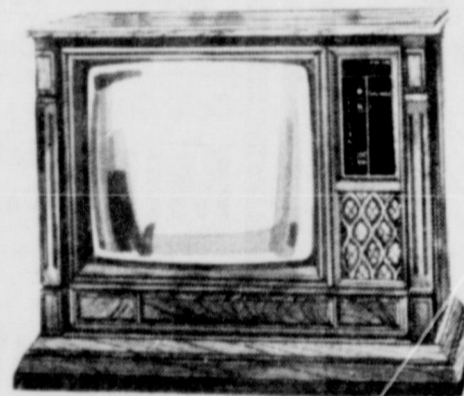

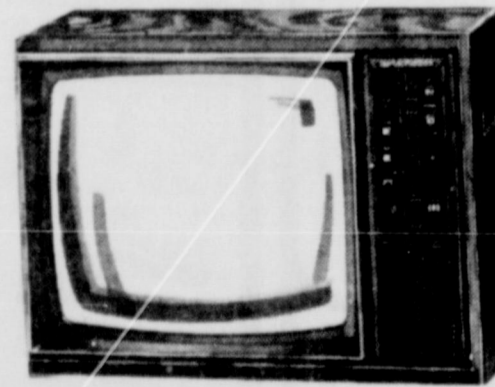
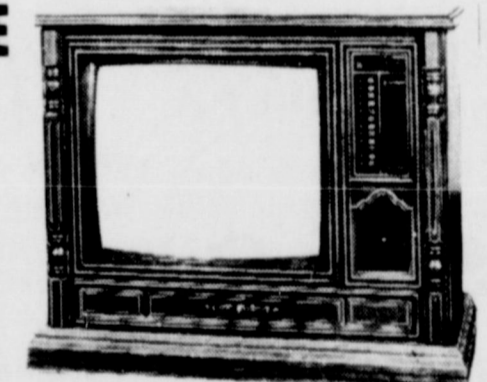

## ASCS Has Variety Of Farm Programs

During 1979, a total of 7,466 acres of cropland in Parmer County were treated and served by one or more of the conservation practices available under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) according to David Grimsley, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASCS).

The ACP is the oldest and most widely used of all the programs administered by the ASCS Committee.

In order to help farmers and ranchers solve soil and water conservation problems, ASCS provided cost-share funds totaling \$90,186.00 in 1979. "This assistance was used by 81 producers to carry out needed conservation measures," Grimsley says. These producers installed irrigation pipeline, sod waterways and grass plantings on their farms. Of course, the most widely used practice in Parmer County is the installation of water conserving practices--such as, irrigation pipelines.

Grimsley said soil erosion and water conservation is a number one

problem facing farmers today. "With today's more intensive cropping, it is vital that producers perform good soil and water conservation practices such as those offered under the ACP."

He pointed out that the objectives of the program are to provide solutions to the problems of farmland being a course of agricultural pollution, or treating land effected by wind and water erosion.

As mentioned above, about 80 farms were enrolled in the 1979 annual ACP. There is also a long term agreement program now offered to producers.

"We have an obligation to protect soil and water resources for the benefit of farmers and the public, and the ACP endeavors to meet this obligation," said Grimsley.

Information on the program is available at the ASCS office in Farwell.

"It is to be noted that for each government dollar expended under the ACP, the participating producer spends about \$2.50 of his money in carrying out the practice or practices."

## Corn Growers Set Referendum

Texas corn growers in seven Plains counties will have the opportunity to vote February 27 on 1/2-cent-per-bushel assessments to be used for improving research, promotion, education, and marketing of their product.

Counties included in the referendum are Bailey, Castro, Deaf

Any person in the seven counties engaged in the business of producing corn for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such persons would be required to pay the proposed assessment.

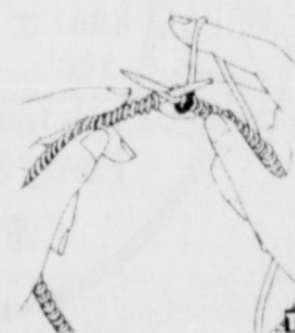

#### Knitting Nicely

Did you know you can create a piece of knitted flatwork from the inside out? It's done with circular knitting needles.



A circular needle can help you zero in on an easier way to knit large items.

The circular needle is practical for any large item. It holds a great many stitches and permits most of the weight of the item to be supported by your lap, thus lessening the strain on your arms.

To knit an afghan, for instance, on circular needles, points out the new Reader's Digest Complete Guide to Needlework, a big, beautiful, profusely illustrated book, available at bookstores, that almost any needleworker would love to get as a gift, hold the needle tip with the last cast-on stitch in your left hand, the tip with the first cast-on stitch in your right. Knit to the last stitch, then flip the needles around so that the wrong side faces you. Continue turning the work with each round. Use a marker after the last cast-on stitch and make sure all stitches face the center. Twisted stitches cannot be adjusted without unraveling the work.

Fewer knitters might be quitters if circular working gets around.

## Contracting Underway For Sugarbeet Crop

Contracting the 1980 sugarbeet crop began last week as Holly Sugar Corporation Agriculturnists began visiting growers to contract the needed raw material for the Hereford Plant.

Cal Jones, Agricultural Manager for the Hereford Plant, said soil sampling began following harvest in December. "The soil sample is a service we provide our growers in an effort to improve the sugarbeet quality, thus increasing the grower's return. We know that nitrogen in large amounts drastically suppresses sugar production. When we detect

this in the soil prior to planting, we can advise the grower for a more profitable crop," Jones stated.

Farmers interested in growing sugarbeets need to contact the Hereford office or Tony Edwards, Agriculturnist for the Friona and Bovina area at 1-364-2593 in Hereford.

"The outlook for 1980 is very encouraging," Jones said, "World sugar analysts say demand for sugar in the coming year will surpass supply, thus increased prices may be seen in 1980."

# 1979 IN REVIEW

## Another Busy Year

### Logged By Chamber

Friona kicked off the year of 1979 with its Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet on January 6. Bill Young, head coach at West Texas State University, was the speaker.

Award-winners at the banquet were Hollis Horton, Man of the Year; June Floyd, Woman of the Year; Wanda Brewer, Teacher of the Year; Coy Jamison, Most Courteous Employee; Chris Barrett and Vickie Smiley, Outstanding Young People.

On Saturday, January 13, farmers from Friona, Bovina, Malshire and Permaton, N.M., met in Friona to form a small portion of the National Tractorcade. The tractorcade from this area and then gathered in Amarillo and proceeded to Washington, D.C. Later, the farmers used their equipment to help the city of Washington clear the streets and parking areas following a 23-inch snowfall at the nation's capital.

Nellie Shelton, Friona businesswoman for the past ten years, announced on January 14 that she had sold her business, Nellie Jane's, to Diana and Geneva Gustin, who plan to operate the new business as The Middle Door.

The opening of the new Ace Hardware store in Friona, a new division of Parmer County Implement Company, was announced in January. Grand Opening of the new facility was held on February 2.

Laura Ellis, retiring Maize Queen, represented the Friona Chamber of Commerce in the "Miss Irish Rose" contest in Shamrock, and was named second runner-up on March 17.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce approved a donation of \$1,000 to the building fund of the Senior Citizens House of Friona at its regular monthly board meeting on Tuesday, April 17. The new clubhouse became a reality, thanks to donations from the entire community, and the "Seniors" held open house for the facility on September 16.

Adding a title to her list, Miss Laura Ellis was crowned "Miss Tri-County" in Malshire on April 21, being selected from a field of 21 contestants and winning a \$300 scholarship. Laura was sponsored in the event by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Extensive renovation of Friona's East Little League park, plus improvements at the new softball field at Reeve Lake were approved for funding by the City of Friona and the Friona Chamber of Commerce in May. Cost to each entity was \$3,500.

Property Associates, Realtors announced the purchase of the former Carol Gatin Land Company on June 24 and the 22-year-old Friona business was reorganized. Janet Buske will serve as manager of the firm. Marshall Elder will handle farm and ranch transactions, and B.K. Buske manages the company's commercial and investment division on a consultant basis.

Joe Tongate served as chairman for the events of the Chamber's annual July 4th activities. The events were well-attended. The barbecue luncheon, sponsored by the Friona Noon Lions Club, had a turnout of over 500 people. High winds that evening diminished somewhat the fireworks display.

Patrick Pace was named chairman of Friona's 1979 Maize Days celebration in July. The Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture held a poster contest for the youngsters of Friona in conjunction with the theme for Maize Days, "The Great American Cowboy."

Approximately a year after the kickoff of the fabricating plant at MBPXL things were going smoothly and the company launched a drive to improve its appearance and community relations on July 13.

The oldest business under continuous ownership in Friona made a change in ownership structure after 72 years under the same owners in July of 1979. Rockwell Bros. & Company, Friona's lumber and building supply headquarters since 1907, and owned by the Rockwell family of Houston, sold its local outlet to Billy Gene Zachary.

Sharla Duggins was named Maize Queen from a field of 28 contestants during the city's annual Maize Days celebration, which is sponsored by the C&A. Brenna Evans was named "Little Miss Friona" as another highlight.

Friona Industries announced in September its plans to acquire all of the stock of Village Packing Co. of Columbus, Ohio. Village is the largest supplier of beef to Wendy's International, which owns 1,600 fast food restaurants.

Friona Cablevision Corp. received its large receiving disc in late October, and in mid-December expanded its service to offer nine channels to its local subscribers. Added were independent stations WTBS, Atlanta, WGN, Chicago, and the Christian Broadcasting Network.

Open house for Tri-County Savings' new Friona branch headquarters on Highway 60 were held December 17-20. B.K. Buske is the local manager. Chamber president Jerry Poarch participated in a ribbon-cutting ceremony December 17.
