THE ECONOMY seems to be off to a shaky start for the 1980s. Interest by investors in gold, silver and other precious metals has caused the market on these commodities to change almost every day, with most of the changes being in an upward trend.

Gold, which could be bought for around \$132 an ounce three years ago, has pushed to over \$700 per ounce. Silver, in the meantime, has gone from around \$4.40 in January of 1977, and no more than \$7 an ounce a year ago, has risen some 450 per cent in the past year, to around \$35 an ounce at the present.

The rush has been on both sides of the counter. People are cashing in such items as old class rings, dental fillings, old family heirlooms, etc., in an effort to get some cash while the prices are high.

Some collectors are turning in their silver coins, now worth many times their value. Others, convinced that the prices will continue to spiral, are buying such coins and bars, virtually as fast as the others are selling.

Some stories have been quoted about big and quick profits being made since the market spiral began. A San Francisco resident with \$5,000 in idle cash was said to have bought a gold futures contract in August now worth around \$50,000.

A young Georgia man reportedly noticed a set of sterling silver pitchers and trays in a department store which had not been marked up. He bought the set, and resold it to a silver dealer for an instant profit of \$7,000.

BILL CLAYTONState Rep.

Bill Sarpalius announced this week that he would be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the Texas Senate from the 31st Senatorial District.

After serving as President of the FFA Bill was married and returned to Clarendon College and graduated in May of 1970. He was President of the Student Body at Clarendon College, received Who's Who in American Junior Colleges, and served as Chairman of the Youth Advisory

Phillips' 1977 team tied for the District 3-AA title with Muleshoe and Littlefield, but then lost the three-way coin flip for playoff rights to Littlefield. The Chieftains were the only team to beat Muleshoe in 1977 as the Mules were 9-1.

"It would be much sadder for me to make this move if Coach Hubbart had not been willing to take the job. I feel the transaction will be real smooth. Pete will give everything he has got to make the program successful," Phillips said.

This is Hubbart's second year in Friona. Prior to coming here, he spent three years at Canadian, four at Vega and one at Silverton, all as an graduate of Amarillo High School.

Hubbart's wife Linda is secretary of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. The couple are parents of three sons. Two, Tim and Russ, are married. Their third son, Mike, is a junior at FHS.

"I have worked closely with Coach Phillips, and have all the respect in the world for him. He has developed a good program here, and we will just try to improve on what he has built," Hubbart said.

Sales for the nine month period totaled \$56,220 for 66 per cent of the 1979 sales goal of \$85,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$23,376,954, while sales for the first nine months of 1979 totaled \$203,964,266 with 67 per cent of the yearly sales goal of 297.2 million achieved.


The Friona eighth grade Maidens traveled to Morton January 3 and returned with a 31-27 victory.



A BIG PUSH has been instigated in some quarters to boycott the 1980 summer Olympics, or at least move them out of Moscow, due to the Soviets' aggression in Afganistan.

Those in favor of the pullout say that Moscow is counting heavily on the Olympics, just as Nazi Germany was in 1936, giving them an opportunity for propaganda.

Loss of the Olympics would be a blow not only to communism, but would no doubt cause more of an economic setback, by losing the money influx the games would bring, than all of the grain embargos we could come up with.

We say, "Move 'em." Canada, which hosted the last Olympics, says they would take them again if asked, and their facilities would require very little getting ready.

It's about time that the free world stood up to the Russians, and this would be as good a time to start as any.



ASCS Has Variety Of Farm Programs

During 1979, a total of 7,466 acres of cropland in Parmer County were treated and served by one or more of the conservation practices available under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) according to David Grimsley, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASCS).

The ACP is the oldest and most widely used of all the programs administered by the ASCS Committee.

In order to help farmers and ranchers solve soil and water conservation problems, ASCS provided cost-share funds totaling \$90,186.00 in 1979. "This assistance was used by 81 producers to carry out needed conservation measures," Grimsley says. These producers installed irrigation pipeline, sod waterways and grass plantings on their farms. Of course, the most widely used practice in Parmer County is the installation of water conserving practices--such as, irrigation pipelines.

Grimsley said soil erosion and water conservation is a number one problem facing farmers today. "With today's more intensive cropping, it is vital that producers perform good soil and water conservation practices such as those offered under the ACP."

He pointed out that the objectives of the program are to provide solutions to the problems of farmland being a course of agricultural pollution, or treating land effected by wind and water erosion.

As mentioned above, about 80 farms were enrolled in the 1979 annual ACP. There is also a long term agreement program now offered to producers.

"We have an obligation to protect soil and water resources for the benefit of farmers and the public, and the ACP endeavors to meet this obligation," said Grimsley

Information on the program is available at the ASCS office in Farwell

"It is to be noted that for each government dollar expended under the ACP, the participating producer spends about \$2.50 of his money in carrying out the practice or practices.'
