## Little Leaguers Make Dist. Finals

Friona's Little League all-stars won the area tournament at Canyon July 21-26, and advanced to the district meet at Pampa. The team won two games at the Pampa tournament, and won the runner-up honors.

Last Friday night at Canyon, the team beat North Randall County, 9-3. Frankie Perez and Lupe DeLaRosa, plus the team's outstanding defense held the Canyon team to three runs, after they had scored 58 runs in four previous tournament games.

Brad Moyer socked a home run over the right field fence in the first inning as Friona took a 3-0 lead and was never headed.

In the district tournament, Friona opened with a 9-3 win over Childress on Monday. Moyer got his third all-star home run in the second inning with Danny Perez on base, and Friona bolted to a 5-0 lead and again was not headed.

D. Perez went the distance. Perez pitched three tournament games and

had a 3-0 record. He also got three hits in the game.

On Tuesday, the team lost to eventual tournament champ Pampa, 6-1, but held the Pampa team to its closest margin of victory in the meet. The Pampa pitcher struck out 12 Friona batters. Friona's run came in the fifth inning when Basilio Ancira led off with a double, and scored on brother Sammy's single, cutting the Pampa lead to 4-1.

Wednesday, the team faced Childress again in the double-elimination meet, and downed that team for the second time, 12-7. Danny Perez again went the distance, to notch his second win in that tournament and third in all-star play.

Friona was hitting the ball. Leroy Mercado led off with a single, Jeff Dickson singled and Perez homered for a 3-0 lead. Mercado, Dickson and Perez had two hits each, and Brad Moyer had a double which scored two runs.

Thursday, Friona again faced the home team, Pampa, in the finals, but dropped a 23-4 decision.

Coach Ron Cain said the Pampa team was as good an all-star team for this age group that he has seen. "They pounded the ball. We used six pitchers, to try to give them a different look, and they got hits off all of them."

On the bright side, Brad Moyer led off Friona's second inning with a home run--his fourth in tournament play, to get Friona on the scoreboard. And the scrappy Frionians were still trying in their last inning, coming up with three runs.

"The kids did a great job, being runnerup Little League team in the Panhandle. We appreciate the great support from the fans," Cain said.

# City Water Supply Improves Somewhat

The City of Friona tied its new water well into its distribution system, and reclaimed one of the wells which had failed in June, to considerably improve its water supply.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland said that well number eight on Grand Street near the school bus barn, was reclaimed, and production was averaging 200 gallons per minute since installation of a submersible pump last week.

That is just about the same amount of water that the new well was producing. However, the city manager said that city officials still would like to urge citizens to be conservative with their use of water.

"Our supply is much better, but we are still not out of the woods by any means. We are doing away with the odd and even day watering system, and asking citizens to conserve on an individual basis as much as possible," Outland said.

The city manager said that readings had been compiled for city water customers for the month ending June 20, and he believes residents are going to be shocked at the amounts of water they used during the month, during which water was rationed.

"Some customers doubled the amount of water they had used from the previous month, and a few even tripled the amounts," Outland said.

Outland blamed the increase on a couple of factors. One was the

extreme heat wave which gripped the area. The city had received no measureable moisture in 37 days prior to the light shower of Thursday evening, which measured .13 inch, and residents were forced to water, or else completely lose their lawns and gardens.

Also, the city manager said that the odd-even system had apparently not been a good rationing system.

"Some people may have been watering just once a week previously, but with the odd-even system, they would rationalize, saying 'today is my day to water, and I'd better water,' when they might not have done so otherwise," he said.

Outland indicated that if rationing ever becomes necessary again, a different system will be tried. It may be an odd-even house number system, so that pressure could be stabilized over the entire city. With the east-west system, pressure was drawn down considerably on the side of town that was using more water.

# Extend Deadline For History Book

If you did not get your family history submitted for the Parmer County History Book by the announced deadline, do not despair. Histories are still being accepted, and will be taken for at least a month, says Otho Whitefield, chairman of the project.

"We wanted to get as many turned in by May 20 as possible, so we could get a feeling as to how it was going, and so as to give us a volume of work on which the publisher could start.

"But we still want every family to be represented in the book, so please complete your family write-ups, and send them, along with your pictures, to us at Box 577, Friona, Texas, 79035," Whitefield says.

Every family in the county is entitled to a free write-up in the history book, up to 500 words, along with a picture. If the article exceeds 500 words, the extra portion will cost the family at the rate of 10¢ per word.

"We have had a good response, from all parts of the county, but we need others to respond. We are still obtaining names, particularly of former residents, and are mailing them copies of the original letter so they may be included if they wish," Whitefield said.

Whitefield in response to queries as

to the charge for memorial pages, tribute pages and business pages, cited the cost for these special pages.

The cost is \$180 per page, \$100 for a half page, and \$60 for a quarter of a page. There are various options as far as the content of these tribute or business pages. A page with no picture may contain roughly 1575 words. A half page would contain 790 words, and a quarter page 395 words.

A page with one picture will still accommodate a write-up of around 1400 words; a half page with one picture will take 620 words, and a quarter page with picture, 225 words.

If two pictures are used, the number of words in the write-up must be reduced accordingly. Each picture takes away roughly about 175 words from the total, Whitefield said.

Any combination of pictures and words may be worked out, so long as the balance is maintained.

If there are any questions, Whitefield may be called at 265-3542.

Businesses are urged to prepare their stories and photos for the business tribute pages. Clubs and organizations within the communities may want their group to be featured. And, of course, a tribute page may honor a member of your family who has passed away.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

### 50 YEARS AGO--JULY 18, 1930

Parmer County now has a population of 5,868, according to the Bureau of the Census, compared to a total of 1,699 on January 1, 1920. The population of Justice Precinct No. 2 as shown by the preliminary figures, is 2,765, which lacks just 338 being one-half of the county's total. The Friona precinct numbered just 408 in 1920, so the precinct has quintupled its population in 10 years, while the city has quadrupled its total.

### 45 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1935

At a mass meeting of panhandle citizens in Amarillo last Saturday, for the purpose of arousing enthusiasm for the completion of Panhandle highway projects, considerable progress was reported. Parmer County was represented by Mayor F.W. Reeve and Hadley Reeve of Friona and Judge J.D. Hamlin and Hamlin Overstreet of Farwell. At the meeting, Judge Hamlin expressed himself as being fully in accord with the project of completing Highway 60 across Parmer County, including the placing of the highway on the north side of the Santa Fe Railroad, as recommended by highway engineers.

### 40 YEARS AGO--JULY 19, 1940

A.N. Wentworth, commonly and affectionately known as "Uncle Andy" departed from Friona Tuesday afternoon for his former home in Cresco, Iowa. Mr. Wentworth is one of the oldest citizens of Friona, both as to years of residence here and his actual age, having come here from Iowa in 1908. He will reach his 88th birthday on the 29th of this month.

### 35 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1945

Seven brothers in the service is unusual enough, but to find three of them at one place at one time--on Okinawa--is something else again. Gilbert R. Baker, radarman, 2nd class in the U.S. Coast Guard, said that while he was at Okinawa, one brother, Pfc. Duke M. Baker, was fighting there with the Marines, and 1st Sgt. Oliver Baker was fighting

with the Army. He did not get to see them, but does have hopes of soon seeing two other brothers, still in this country. They are Captain Elmer Baker, who is in Omaha, and 1st Sgt. Raymond, who is at Fort Leonard Wood. S. Sgt. Arthur B. and Captain George Baker are serving in Europe. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. George Baker.

### 30 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1950

With the Korean War situation becoming more and more serious, Friona citizens, like others all over the United States, are talking and thinking of global war possibilities. When several people were asked the question "What do you think of the United States taking part in Korean fighting?" the answers were unanimously in favor of the step taken by the U.S. Those quoted were Mrs. Henry Lewis, Wesley Hardesty, P.L. London, Charles Allen, Bill Stewart, Weldon Dickson, Leo McLellan, Guy Latta, Ernest Osborn, W.H. Jobe and Rev. B.T. Allen.

### 25 YEARS AGO--JULY 15, 1955

Formal opening of the Rockway-Hurst Department Store has been set for Tuesday, July 19, according to an announcement this week by Andy Hurst. Hurst stated that the store would carry nationally advertised merchandise and complete lines of men's, women's, and children's shoes and clothing, household goods and piece goods.

### 20 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1960

Near-record rains last week succeeded in flooding a goodly portion of the north section of Parmer County this past weekend, as waters from the swollen Frio Draw came out of the banks and came across croplands from the Rhea Community across Parmer County and into Castro County. In Friona, official rain gauge at Friona Consumers totalled 7.61 inches for the week, with the heaviest recording being 2.43 inches on July 7.

### 15 YEARS AGO--JULY 15, 1965

Wade Wright, who has served as

office manager for Friona's branch of Plainview Production Credit Association, since October of 1963, has left Friona for a promotion within the company, and has been replaced by Robert Neelley. Neelley formerly lived in Friona, and attended public school here.

### 10 YEARS AGO--JULY 17, 1970

According to Postmaster Wright Williams, Friona is due to join the trend already underway in other parts of the area, whereby all mail to be sent out of town will be shipped to a sectional center, in this case Amarillo, where they will be given the postmark of the sectional center, rather than their originating office.

### 5 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1975

Bobby Wied entered the design chosen for the Parmer County's official Bicentennial Medallion. Friona City Council met in special session Wednesday night to discuss the city's sanitary landfill situation with Tom Grimshaw of the Texas Department of Health Resources. Grimshaw pointed out that while the city is making efforts to establish a new landfill site, that it was still in violation of state law by burning its trash at the old dump site, and that according to law, the old site could be closed. The city was offered opportunity to apply for a permit to continue to use the present site until obtaining a new landfill.

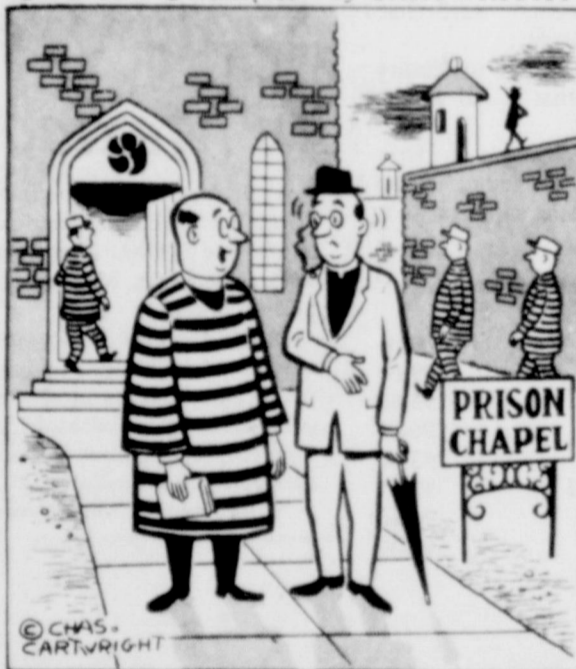

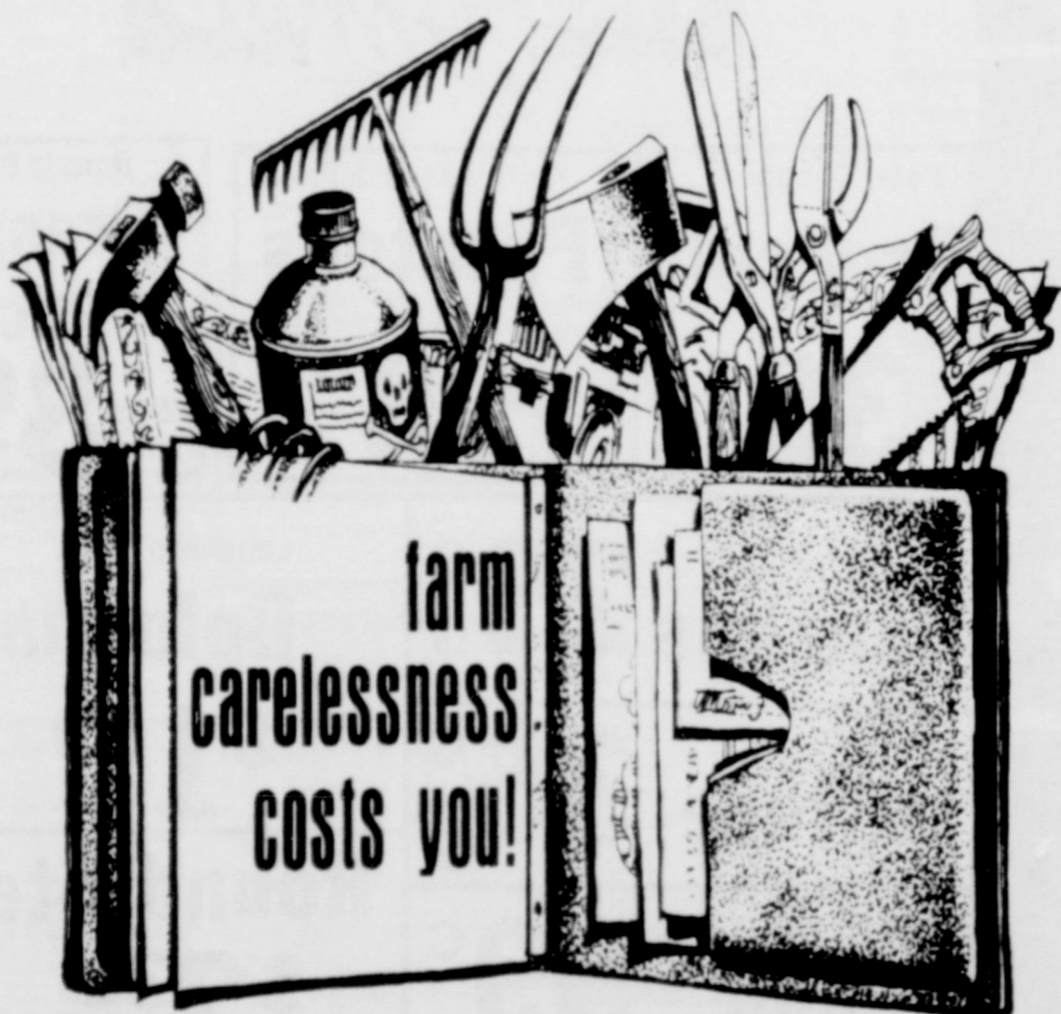

## Cooperatives Granted Gas Rate Increase

The Railroad Commission recently approved new gas rates proposed by three gas cooperatives for the unincorporated areas of Parmer, Bailey, Lamb, and Deaf Smith Counties.

Officers, stockholders, and customers of North Bailey Gas Farmers Co-op, Plains Gas Farmer Co-op, and Tri-County Gas Co. have approved the increase to pay their increased cost of gas. The cooperatives were created by farmers to sell gas to themselves at cost plus system upkeep expenses.

Changes in the rates and areas served by each of the cooperatives are:

North Bailey Gas Farmers Co-op--Rates will increase from \$1.9155 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) to \$2.2609 per Mcf for customers in

unincorporated areas of Deaf Smith County.

Plains Gas Farmer Co-op--Rates will increase from \$1.9603 per Mcf to \$2.1903 per Mcf for customers in unincorporated areas of Deaf Smith County.

Tri-County Gas Co.--Rates will increase from \$2.01 per Mcf to \$2.30 per Mcf for customers in unincorporated areas of Parmer, Bailey and Lamb Counties.

F. Whether the special wheat acreage grazing and hay program should be implemented.

G. Whether to require compliance with the established farm normal crop acreage (NCA) as a condition of eligibility for program benefits.

H. Determine the method to be used to adjust the established "target" price from the 1980 crop level and, if normal crop acreage (NCA) and, if set-aside requirements are deemed necessary, whether the established "target" price should be adjusted further to compensate producers for complying with the NCA and set-aside requirements.

I. The loan and purchase level for 1981 crop wheat must be determined along with other miscellaneous administrative decisions or determinations.

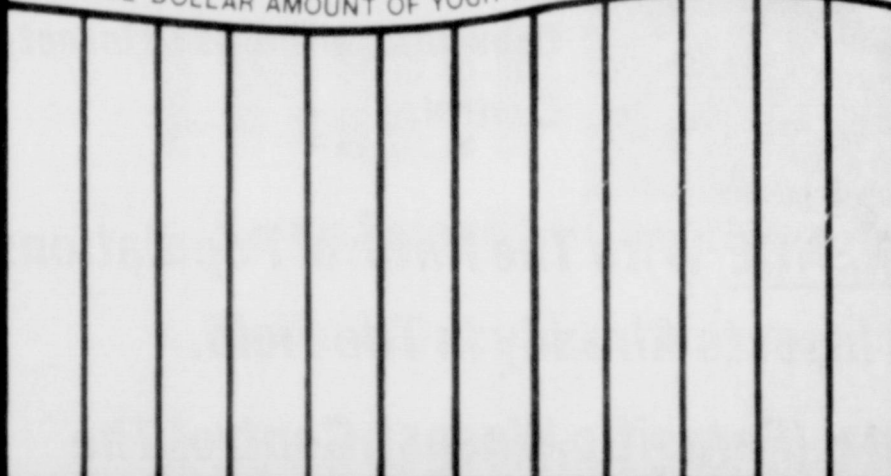
The members also approved July 28 at 10 a.m. for a meeting time for the Board of Equalization.
